The Sadat Assassination

4. The Attack on the Pope

Pope John Paul II was shot by Mehmet Ali Agca, a 23 year-old Turk. as the pontiff greeting pilgrims in St. Peter's Square on May 13. Prosecutors say they were unable to prove that Agca was part of a conspiracy.

5. Reagan Takes the Lead

Ronald Reagan, with the support of a newly Republican Senate and a House in democratic power, proceeded to cut taxes and government spending in all areas of government. He opened a new era in the nation bringing with him a time of conservatism and glamour to the White House. Mrs. Reagan met with criticism because of her elegant and sometimes extravagant taste.

6. The American Economy

Reaganomics became the rule of thumb for government spending ideals. yet the country saw a rise in unemployment and soaring interest rates.

7. The Space Shuttle

On April 12. the space shuttle Columbia, a reusable space cargo ship. zoomed into space from Cape Canaveral with astronauts John Young and Robert Crippen aboard. The missions was successful as the craft landed at Edwards Air Force Base 541/2 hours

8. PATCO Strike



When Justice Potter Stewart announced his stepping down, Reagan named Sandra Day O'Conner, a 51-year old Arizona appeals court judge to the Supreme Court where 102 men had served but a woman never had.

The threat of Soviet Intervention in troubled Poland was disspelled when the Polish government and military forces declared marital law on December 12 in Warsaw. Solidarity and dissident leaders were imprisioned and the government sought a "return to normalcy."

Floyd County Library Board

Trustees named

The Floyd County Commissioner's Court approved the formation of the Floyd County Library Board in Decem-

The Floyd County board will function in an advisory capacity because such a board appointed by a local governing body is only qualified in the advisory

Library boards, either advisory or governing, are created by laws to act as citizens' agents and protectors of community property. By definition, this function is that of trustceship, and the library board members are frequently called trustees. They are all trustees. for they are entrusted with community property and programs.

"In most cases the first responsibility is to advise the librarian and the local government on library concern: the second duty is to use its influence to promote services and programs of the library in the community." said Virginia Young of the Texas State Library Development Division.

Floyd County's library board will mainly be a policy-making group. It will help in such decisions as hours the library is to be open, basic policies regarding books and material selection and purchase and charges for lost library materials and fines on overdue materials.

Other duties outlined for trustees by the Texas Library Handbook for Trustees include the promotion of library legislation which extends and improves library service. The trustees are also asked to

promote and support adquate funding of the library program and plans for expansion of service and facilities.

Texas is rated as 35 in 50 states for the amount of state aid per capita with sixteen cents alloted per capita.

The Friends of the Library, an auxiliary group of volunteers, will work closely with the board to establish and support a planned program of public relations. The two groups will also promote and support adequate funding of the library program as a coordinated

"The Friends and the advisory board will work to complement each other and work for better library facilities in Floyd County, including the branch library. said a spokesman for the Friends.

The Friends will continue their annual book sale at the Floyd County Pioneer Reunion. These sales have helped obtain various equipment for the library and helped to supplement the funds already reserved for the library.

The Floyd County Library, like other public libraries, is funded by various mixtures of local, state and federal money. The largest proportion for Texas libraries (as a whole) is 88 to 90 per cent. This amount comes from appropriations by local governing bodies, such as the commissioner's court.

State funds account for about 5 per cent of Texas library budgets.

Members of the board, appointed by the county commissioners, are Barbara Bernard and Pat Zimmerman for Preeinet One, G.B. Johnston and R.I. Knox for Precinct Two. Francis Staniforth and June Ware for Precinct Three, and Amy Hollums and A.C. Pratt for Precinct Four. Martha Farris is member at large. Jackie Walls is advisor to the board.

The board has not met formally but will schedule a January meeting.

Agricenter located in Memphis

MEMPHIS - A \$12 million permanent exposition opening in Memphis will become a focal point for American agribusiness and for agribusiness around the world.

The Agricenter International at Memphis - where research and technology will converge - represents the first permanent facility for farmers, researchers, equipment manufacturers and others in the world of agribusiness.

Located in the eastern part of the city on Shelby Farms, the Agricenter will span 1,000 acres of rich, fertile Mid-South land ideally suited for almost all crops. About 800 acres will be for demonstration plots where the latest in breeding research and advance production practices will be on display for visitors. Exhibition and administrative buildings will provide facilities for displaying machinery, pesticides and fertilizers and for seminars and workshops dealing with agribusiness.

A final hurdle has been crossed: only recently the Tennessee State Building Commission gave approval to the Agricenter site plan - the final step before construction can begin. This Fall contractors will bid for the project. Ground breaking is slated for early

According to civic and county leaders. the Agricenter will fill a void in the Mid-South community: the need for a "single, conveniently located resource and technology center for agribusiness.

'Now is the time for such a facility." says William N. Morris, Shelby County Mayor. "Agriculture is perhaps the most important industry in this region. And we feel the Agricenter will be a perfect way to exhibit this industry to

"The center will be a combination of 'hands on' experience for equipment and production practices." he added. "By bringing the latest agricultural technology together, it will serve as a 'think tank' in helping meet the challenges of agriculture in the future."

Continuing. Morris said. Memphis offers several advantages for the Agricenter. The climate is suitable for vear-round exhibits and events, soil is ideal for demonstrating almost all major crops, and it is near major transportation and lodging facilities."

The Agricenter is expected to draw growers, ranchers, researchers, government specialists, foreign trade delegations, trade associations, cooperatives and many others as visitors each year. according to officials. Recently conducted surveys have shown that one grower from 23 percent of the nation's farms, or about 500,000 people, will make a vearly visit to the center.

Already several potential tenants. including a major tractor company and a cattle breeding research operation. have expressed an interest in centing a display area. Other companies have done likewise. Memphis State and the University of Tennessee have said they will participate in the Agricenter.

Memphis State will stage seminars and education workshops for the agribusiness community. Topics will range from marketing strategies to commodities futures and forecasting. Leaders in the world of agribusiness will be invited to speak at these seminars.

The university will also operate a data

center at the Agricenter. Video display terminals will be on-line with a mainframe computer on the MSU campus. UT and MSU will decide what types of statistics will be in the data banks and acting director. how they will be used. Examples of systems to be used are the Cooperative Research and Information System and Lockheed and Smithsonian systems. Officials believe that instant data avail-

The center will contain 140,000 square feet of exhibit area. Included in this will be four exhibition buildings, an administrative building, auditorium, and seminar rooms.

RENDITION, EXEMPTION FORMS MAILED TO PROPERTY OWNER JAN.1, 1982

Rendition and exemption forms, as required by Sec. 5.07 of The Property Tax Code, are scheduled to be mailed to The Public, Jan. 1, 1982. The deadline for filing Exemptions and Renditions is May 1st, 1982.

After filing the following Exemptions in 1982, they need not be claimed again: Residence Homestead, Over 65, Disability, Charitable Organizations, Religious Organization and Agricultural.

A person who receives a one-time exemption must notify the Appraisal Office by May 1st, after his property no longer qualifies. If he fails to do so, he incurs a Penalty of 10% of the difference between the taxes he erroneously paid and the taxes he should have paid.

The Appraisal Office urges the Property Owner to sign only the exemptions which you qualify for and return them with your rendition form as soon as possible. Many people last year misplaced the forms they received from The Appraisal Office. When they received their Tax Statement, they found their Taxes were higher because they failed to sign exemptions. To prevent this and help The Appraisal Office, please return the Exemptions and Renditions, properly signed, as soon as possible.


