The Lamplighter

Well folks, the deed is done. We will now begin to dig a little deeper to pay for the cost of state government, and in short order, mark my word, we will dig deeper still.

The Legislature, under pressure from Governor Mark White, Lt. Governor Bill Hobby, and House Speaker Gib Lewis, not to mention the influence of Ross Perot's bank roll, has presented us with an additional \$4.8 billion in taxes. Their work is finished, for now, but the work of Texans who will pay the bills has just begun. They will be paying for a long, long, time.

I remember the day, back at the beginning of the 1960-'61 biennium, when the total cost of state government first hit the astounding figure of \$4 billion. It boggled the mind. Now they add more than that as a mere add-on to our taxes, and they do it with a few days of debate.

It was quite a spectacle, after it was over. There was Mark White, so jubilant over his victory he could scarcely contain himself. One would have thought, from his actions, that he had just lowered taxes on the people, not raised them. There was Gib Lewis, boasting of the power that could be exercised when he and the governor and lieutenant governor came to terms. And there was Bill Hobby, so pleased with his part in the affair that he personally delivered to the House the message that the Senate had passed the bill to raise

Mark White is the governor, it should be remembered, who promised Texans solemnly, during his campaign for office, that should the people elect him there would be "no new taxes as long as I am governor."

Many members of the Legislature wanted to take a hard look at current state spending before they considered placing new tax burdens on the people. But such was not to be. The Governor, who determines what can be considered during "special sessions", would have none of that. There was a feeling among some of the members that perhaps money could be found unspent in the bank accounts of the multitude of state agencies and departments that could be "reprogrammed", thereby relieving at least some of the need for additional taxes. (After all, Mark White did just that when he wanted a playroom for his kids.) They were perfectly willing to stay in Austin and do the work necessary to find the money, if indeed it was there.

But again, the "leadership" would have none of that. They knew full well that if the Legislators returned home and began talking to the people, the tax bill was doomed. The only alternative was to ram it through at the end of the session, before people back home became thoroughly familiar with what was in the bill.

We do not have space here to dissect the entire tax bill. But it is about as full of inequities as a tax bill could be. If you call a repairman to fix your refrigerator, or televisions, or wristwatch, for instance, you will be required to pay a tax of 4 1/8 percent for his services, plus 4 1/8% for all the parts needed, unless he pays for it himself and absorbs the cost. If, on the other hand, you own an airplane, as some members of the legislature do, you can have it repaired without paying the tax for service. That's the way it goes. It should be remembered in all this that not every member of the Legislature voted for it. Among those who did not succumb to the threats and blandishments of the Governor was our own Foster Whaley. He and 65 others were counted in opposition. So if you thought you were not paying enough taxes, and wanted to pay more, you should call or write him and complain about his stand. If, on the other hand, you appreciate his stand, he would probably like to know that as well.

We know that taxes are necessary. No one, or at least very few, complain about reasonable and fair taxes. But we can hope for, and work for, the day when our political "leaders" automatically look to spending, rather than taxes, as a way to make the books

Council supports soccer program

Vickie Rainer met with the city council Tuesday night, July 10, to present a budget for the youth track and soccer program. Track is already underway this week. Rainer believes that "this is a beneficial program for children, particularly for those who are not involved in the baseball program, by providing an athletic outlet."






Travis Bishop attends GT summer sessions


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Twirlers bring home trophies



LANDSCAPE AND GARDENING

SUMMER OFTEN MEANS LAWN

Along with hot temperatures, midsummer in Texas may bring special lawn problems- drought, weeds, insects and diseases.

These lawn problems can cause concerns for homeowners unless accurate diagnosis and proper treatment takes place before they become severe.

Dry spots, thin turf and weeds can result from improper watering, fertilizing and mowing practices. Follow recommended cultural practices before applying a chemical to correct lawn

Drought stress most often occurs in mid-summer and shows up as wilted, discolored turf. Adjust watering schedules to wet soil to a depth of four to six inches, and water only when grass shows symptoms of moisure stress.

Also raise mowing heights one-half inch to improve drought tolerance in mid-summer.

Lack of nitrogen or iron often creates lawn problem. Grass with a nitrogen deficiency may have a pale color and be heavily infested with weeds. A light application of a nitrogen fertilizer will improve the lawn's appearance.

Grass leaves that have yellow strips parallel to the leaf margins may be deficient in iron. A foliar application of iron sulfate at six ounces per 1,000 square feet will usually solve this

If a St. Augustine lawn has symptoms similar to nitrogen or iron dificiency but does not respond to applications of either material, suspect St. Augustine Decline (S.A.D.). Close examination of S.A.D. infected turf will show green and vellow blotches on the leaves. Continue good maintenance practices where this problem exists. Also, Floratam, Raleigh or Seville, new St. Augustinegrass varieties resistant to S.A.D., may be sprigged into the infected area.

Leaf spot diseases are generally a problem when lawns are under stress and increase with high temperatures, drought, heavy shade and close mowing. While proper mowing and watering will reduce these problems, fungicides may be required to prevent serious damage.

Chinch bugs and white grubs feed heavily on lawns during mid-summer, and their damage resembles drought injury. If turf does not respond to applications of water, suspect these insects. Both pests damage St. Augustinegrass, but only the white grub damages bermudagraass lawns.

Chinch bugs and white grubs can be controlled with insecticides. Water the lawn thoroughly prior to applying an insecticide for chinch bug control and follow with a light watering.

Drench the lawn after an insecticide is applied for grub control, since grubs

Lower income puts squeeze on cash which cater to the small town, agri-

This lower income has put a squeeze on cash flow which is causing many producers to borrow more money than expected. At the present time only a few producers in Floyd County have had to call it quits, but unless this year's crops produces some yields and above normal price, this number will grow.

At the present time only the 1985 wheat program has been published. May be the 1985 feed grains and cotton program will be determined early enough to allow producers adequate time to determine which direction to take. With the present economic situation these programs have a great bearing on the financial stability of Floyd County producers.

Many economist are anticipating a rise in interest rates. This will increase credit problems for many producers. Many banks are caught between exami-

ners and over extended loans. If interests rates increase too much, it won't make any difference what kind of crop we make in 1984. Dr. Anderson says, "As a result in rising interest rates, despite prospects for more income statewide, the need for emergency and guranteed farm loans will likely expand this fall."

Mother nature can control the future of agriculture in Floyd County and if she doesn't cooperate many producers will not have to worry about production and marketing. But his year everyone is going to think posotive and our area farmers and ranchers will produce a crop to be proud of.

According to Dr. Carl Anderson, Economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, farm income appears to be improved somewhat in 1984. He expressed this cautiously optimistic view after studying the latest available information on farm income and production cost. The price improvement, weighed against only a small increase in production cost, indicates a small rise in Texas average agricultural income this year, Anderson noted.

> The Floyd County situation may not be average with the rest of the state. But if you analize the situation, we may not be far off. Farmers and ranchers have encounted a wide difference in the amount of financial stress. The drought has caused increasing production cost to farmers and ranchers, resulting in overall lower income.

Producers encounter more than their share of weed problems

The recent widespread rains, near optimum temperatures and general absence of adverse weather conditions and early season disease have contributed to the phenomenal progress of the 1984 cotton crop. Much of the standing cotton acreage has begun to set fruit and, for the first time in several years, many fields will be sporting white blooms in early July.

In many areas, producers are encountering more than their usual share of weed problems. Perennial weeds such as silverlead nightshade (whiteweed), lakeweed, johnsongrass and problem annual weeds such as cocklebur, devil's claw, prairie sunflower and others that are tolerant to the usual pre-plant incorporated and/or pre-emergence herbicide got the jump on many farmers during the recent rainy spell. In other instances, heavy rains caused some leaching and dispersal of herbicides rope wick applicator, maintain a tractor which allowed an above normal number

In situations where the cotton is still taller than the weeds, post-directed from both directions.

applications of herbicides such as Caparol and Karmex used along or in combination with MSMA can be used to obtain control. The spray must be directed to minimize contact with cotton leaves. One quart of surfactant should be added per 50 gallons of spray mix to enhance herbicide activity on emerged

Unfortunately, in most instances, emerged weeds are as tall or taller than the cotton. This situation seriously limits the chemical weed control options. In situations where the weeds are at least 3 to 4 inches taller than the cotton, a rope wick applicator can be used to wipe on a Roundup solution (2 parts water, 1 part Roundup) to obtain control or at least suppression of problems weeds (including whiteweed, lakeweed and johnsongrass).

In applying the herbicide with the speed of no more than 3 miles per hour. Also, control can be improved by doubling back on the same rows thus wiping the chemical onto the weeds

In fields where herbicides applied pre-plant or pre-emergence are showing signs of breaking down, additional chemicals can be applied to insure season long control. Again, post-directed applications of Caparol or Karmex can be used to control emerged weeds as well as those that will germinate

Dual may be applied post emergence, over-the-top or as a directed spray when cotton is in the first true leaf stage to 6-inches tall to control annual grasses, volunteer sorghum, pigweed and yellow nutsedge. Since Dual has no foliar activity, it must be applied and incorporated before the weeds germinate and emerge. Shallow incorporation is recommended and can be accomplished by rainfall, sprinkler irrigation, sweep or rolling cultivators or "knifing" during or shortly after application.

Also, Treflan can be applied post emergence (over-the-top) in cotton after control annual weeds and grasses. This chemical must be applied before weeds

germinate and be incorporated within 24-hours after application using one pass with a sweep-type or rolling cultivator. Wheat or barley can be planted in the fall following this application at the recommended rates.

Fusilade and Poast can be used to control emerged grassy weeds such as barnyard-grass, volunteer sorghums (sudangrass, hay grazer, etc.), johnsongrass and even bermudagrass. The herbicides can be applied over-the-top of cotton to control grasses in their early stages of development (i.e. johnsongrass 6 to 10 inches tall). Delaying the treatments until the grasses begin to boot and head not only reduces control levels but also allows the weeds to use up precious moisture and nutrients. A second application may be required to provide permanent control of perennial

MSMA can also be applied over-thetop of cotton to control some weeds (including newly emerged cocklebur), grasses and nutsedge. Since MSMA

does have an effect on cotton (slows growth, causes redding of stems and may result in leaf burn if applied when temperatures exceed the high 80's) it's post emergence usage is labelled as a "salvage operation" and even then it must be applied before cotton begins to

Finally, spot treatments with a one to two percent Roundup solution can effectively combat perennial or even annual weed problems. Whiteweeds, lakeweeds, johnsongrass, cocklebur, devil's claw and pie melon are among the species that can be controlled with

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
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
