City accepts radio bid

Floydada's mayor, Parnell Powell, opened the regular city council meeting Tuesday night with a public hearing concerning a letter of intent from Energas Company to raise domestic and commercial natural gas rates by 7.7%. Percy Edwards, Floydada's Energas manager, met with council. The increase was suspended by the council in the regular July 24 meeting for 90 days. A committee has been selected representing the 63 cities to be effected. The results of their study will be considered at the end of that three-month period, November 9.

Bids were received and opened for a municipal, two-way base station, mobile units, remote control units, base station antenna and transmission line. CL Two-Way of Plainview submitted a bid of \$29,319. A bid of \$27,097.35 was accepted by the council by Motorola of Lubbock. An estimated four to six weeks would be required to receive the order, according to a Motorola representative. Installation will take about two weeks, he assured. The radio system will have a one year parts and labor warranty.

Bids were opened for the demolition of two properties failinng to meet city standards as previously determined in a prior council meeting: North 1/2 of Lot 6, Block 17, in Bartley Heights Addition located at 111 W. Crockett belonging to Billy Kirk and Lots 10, 12, 14, 16, 18, and 20 in Block E, of Andrews Addition at 515 N. First Street belonging to the J.P. Looney Estate. AROUND THE COUNTY

The following is an article received from Dr. Carl Anderson, marketing economist with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service. It pertains to high interest rates and how they can cut farm income. I believe it is circumstances such as the following that effects the lives of everyone that lives in an agricultural related county.

The recent rise in interest rates is adding substantially to the financial pressures of farmers and ranchers in Texas. With incomes already low, the added burden is cause for considerable concern by both agriculture lenders and borrowers alike.

Very high interest rates not only increase cost, but also strengthen the dollar against foreign currencies. And a strong dollar discourages exports, encourages imports, and stimulates foreign production.

During the early 1970's, interest rates adjusted for inflation ranged from 0 to 3 percent. Subsequently, farmers relied heavily on borrowed capital to expand operations. However, when interest rates skyrocketed in the late 1970's, export markets began to disappear and stockpiles of surplus grain, cotton and dairy products began to build up.

Interest rates eased down slightly to an average of about 13 percent last year, now they're back up to more than

to expense. With agricultural income after expenses running at one billion dollars or less, that one percent increase in interest rates reduces net farm income by 10 percent or more.

The glimmer of hope that Texas farmers have of improved income in 1984 may be lost to higher interest rates. Those producers with heavy debt, whose production outlook this year has been adversely affected by freeze damage last winter; or hot, dry weather this spring and summer are in serious financial trouble. As a result, the need for emergency and guaranteed farm loans will likely expand for these producers this fall and winter.

HOME ECONOMICS TODAY By Mary True

The "secret" to making good jelly is than citric or acetic acid. no secret at all--it's a combination of pectin, acid and sugar in the right amounts. Whether you make your own jelly each year or you're trying for the first time, it pays to know how these ingredients work together.

Pectin determines the firmness of the jelly. Too little pectin can produce a jelly too soft to hold its form. But good homemade jellies don't have to have as much pectin as commerical jellies, which must be firm enough to withstand shipment.

Different kinds of pectins produce jellies with various degrees of firmness. For example, cranberry pectins yield jellies that break easily into small clumps, while apple pectins create more elastic jellies.

The acidity of the fruit also has something to do with the firmness. Juices from higher acid fruits yield firmer jellies than juices from lower acid fruits, even where the pectin content is the same. Fruits actually have a mixture of acids in them. But tartaric acid, which is plentiful in grapes and currents, is more efficient for jelly-making
