Floydada Fire Department sponsors first Agro-Rescue School here

The Floydada Volunteer Fire Department held their first Floydada Agro-Rescue School Saturday, August 18 from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. They had 115 people to register that were from 31 different departments throughout the state. The school was given to keep abreast of the many new problems that are constantly arising in the fire service and experiences in fire control and fire protection methods.

The wives of the Floydada Firemen were in charge of the registration that went from 7-9:00 a.m. They had coffee and donuts and cakes for all the members of the school. The wives that were in charge of this were Nancy Welborn, Rhonda Guthrie, Beth Eckert, Stacy Reeves, Elizabeth Sims, Ginger Warren, and Penny Ogden. They were also in charge of getting all the certificates ready to be handed out at the end of the day.

Classes began at 9:00 a.m. with three hours of lectures and slides given in the fire hall. This covered the following: Overview of Problem, Machinery Construction, Pre-Planning of Farm Rescue, and Safety Devices and Rescue Coordination. A slide presentation was given by Joe Smetena with the Farm Bureau from Waco on Extrication. Doak Enabanit and Jim Majorowsky with the Lubbock E.M.S. gave a slide presentation on victim care and packaging.

Class participation began at 1:00 p.m. and went until 7:00 p.m. For this the students were divided into six man teams and taken outside for their

hands-on training, in which they were taught the following:

1. Safety on original factor safety features of machines. The safety rules around machinery and the safety at the

2. Duties of team members and how to always work as a team and the make-up of a team.

3. Set up and rescue procedures. Here the students set up dummies as victims that were caught in machinery and were taught how to rescue a victim from the machinery without more injury

1936 class project donated to county museum



The quilt was donated to the museum by Fern Finkner Lanier, a member of that class. Her father purchased the





quilt when it was auctioned off between plays at the Junior-Senior Follies on April 30, 1936. Mr. George Finkner was the high bidder according to a May 7, 1936 issue of the Hesperian. A section devoted to the school called "The Hesperette" reported the event as follows: "The Junior-Senior Follies were given Thursday night, April 30. After the votes were counted, the total numbers were 165 for the Juniors and 85 for the Seniors. "Wheatfire," a tragedy given by the Juniors had the following cast:

Martin Wade, James Roy; Ursula Wade, Virginia Simpson; Ann Olson, Elizabeth Hardgrove; a man, Richard Tubbs;

The Senior play "Dead Expense," had the following cast: Sally, Nadyne Wood; Ma, Pearl Croft; Pa, Eulan Williamson; Mannie, Bill Phillips.

The Senior quilt was auctioned off between the two plays. There were several who bid on the quilt. It was finally bought by Mr. George Finkner for \$12.00. This quilt is very beautiful, being made out of pink and blue, the class colors."

In the dedication for her donation, Mrs. Lanier says, "I believe it cost 10 cents to get your name on the quilt." Mrs. Lanier's father purchased the quilt as a surprise graduation present for her. Many names of classmates were not on the quilt because they probably didn't have a dime," according to some.


