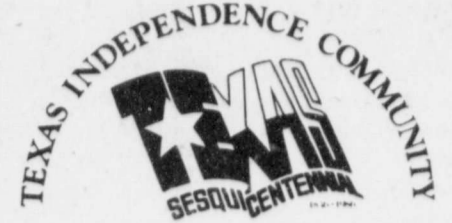

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Hollums elected president of Association

Floyd County District Attorney Randy Hollums was elected to serve as president of the District and County Attorneys Association of Texas during the annual meeting held in Galveston on September 26. The 1500 member association of elected prosecutors works primarily to encourage changes in law and law enforcement practices which will be helpful to prosecutors and law enforcement agencies.

Hollums explained, "I will be assisting with state legislative sessions with an eye to improving both the law and its enforcement." He continued, "The association attempts to hold training programs for prosecutors and their staffs. We also try to function as a source of reference for them."

The District and County Attorneys Association also publishes material related to the law field and to prosecution in particular.

His term as president will run from January 1 through the calendar year of 1985. He currently serves as vice president of the 30 year old association. Hollums has been very active in legal circles statewide for several years. In 1981, he was vice chairman of the state legislative committee and advanced to co-chairman in 1983. That year he was also a member of the prosecutors council, a group with the authority for

removal of a prosecutor from office when necessary.

"Being elected to a position such as this is a measure of your position and reputation among your peers. It is very nice to know they feel you are doing your job well," said Hollums. "I could not do as well if I did not have the cooperation of Judge (George) Miller and the four county attorneys I work with. My own office staff is excellent, as well." He continued, "A supportive and understanding family helps, too."

Hollums, district attorney since 1976, and his wife, Teresa, have two children. Fourteen year old Jay is a freshman at Floydada High School and seven year old D.G. is in the second grade at Duncan Elementary. Mrs. Hollums teaches life science at Junior High.

History to come alive at ranch day

The foothills of the Caprock at the old Matador Ranch line camp, Cottonwood Mott, will be crawling with Texas History students and buffs on October 27 when the Daughters of the Republic, General James Smith Chapter of Lubbock, present "History Day at the Ranch," a sesquicentennial project for the group.

Beginning at Mott Camp, groups will tour a portion of the ranch, hearing lectures on the history of the Matador Land and Cattle Company by local historian Judge Billy Whitaker, former manager Johnny Stevens, and Bundy Campbell, grandson of the founder of the ranch. Some of the colorful history recounted will be the shoot-out of Harkey and Barbee which took place on the site.

Wayne Parker of Ralls, distantly related to Quannah Parker, will describe the life of the Comanches from a campsite as he illustrates his talk with an extensive artifact collection. Wayne and his assistant, Judge Choise Smith of Floydada, are known for their contributions of Blanco Canyon history and artifacts to the Crosby County and Ralls Museums.

Ruins of a dugout, probably built around 1900, will be the setting for a talk by Mrs. Edna Leonard Waybourn of

Childress on pioneer life. Mrs. Waybourn was born at Mott Camp in 1906, and often visited the dugout as a child to pick fruit or picnic with the family. Her father, J.F. Leonard, purchased the site from James Fields in 1903, but was pressured into selling this and his other holdings, some he had filed on in 1898, to the Matadors when homesteading became too difficult surrounded by a big ranch.

To round out the tour, a visit will be made to a chuckwagon for a sample of cowboy grub. Cook Eddie Joe Fortenberry of Lockney will be dishing out black coffee, beans, son-of-a-gun stew, and his specialty Sourdough Dutch Oven Biscuits. Sitting around the campfire, ready to spin a yarn or two will be former Matador cowboys including the likes of Wild Horse Warren, Banny Bandon, and Tutt Garnett. Fiddling a tune to liven things up, J.B. Cooper, descendant of one of the area's earliest pioneers, will be playing old favorites as the tour comes to a close.

To add color and interest, Daughters of the Republic of Texas will be in costume, attempting to demonstrate early pioneer skills such as quilting, churning and making soap, and Buckskinners, an area historical club known for their authenticity, complete with

costumes and guns, will set up a teepee campsite.

Junior Historians, Texas History teachers and students from twenty-two area schools, scouts and heritage groups have been invited to the event, available on a reservation-only basis, with about 200 expected to attend.

From Floydada a group of about twenty seventh grade Texas History students, led by Junior Historian sponsors, Norma Feuerbacher and Sallye Lyles, are expected for the two to three hour tour.

Assisting DRT members Mrs. S.C. Burleson and Mrs. Frank Potts of Floydada, Mrs. Furman Vinson of Flomot, and Mrs. William E. Moore of Lubbock with the sesquicentennial project are Mrs. W.E. Burleson of Floydada, owner of The Mott and chief telephone information officer, S.C. Burleson, Carrla Burleson, Kirk and Beverly Burleson Brock, and Rob Potts worked to ready the site for the history day visitors. Bundy Campbell served as a consultant, as well as a representative to the Avalanche-Journal reporter. Too numerous to mention are the many local residents and volunteers interested in sharing and preserving a portion of their Texas heritage with others by

participating in "History Day at the Ranch."

Amanda Loudermilk, an employee of South Plains Health Provider Organization, Inc., is saying farewell to work Friday after more than 14 years.

The billing clerk went to work for the clinic as a nurse's aid about three years after opening its doors. The clinic had its beginning in the Floyd County Courthouse in 1967. The facility was served by J.K. Holmes as director of the migrant program with Olin Watson as its finance officer. Mrs. Loudermilk said she could remember when she and Billie Jordan, R.N.; Choise Smith, health inspector; Evelyn Omar, nurse; and Beverly Kincer, secretary, made up the staff. "We probably served 20 to 25 patients a day; anything we could not handle in the office, we handled through referrals to county doctors."

Under a new grant the facility was moved into its present location at 319 S. Main in 1977 when the program was increased to serve anyone "no matter what age or income." Dr. Vond Patel of Crosbyton works in the office four hours a day. Jimmie Minnitt is the nurse on the staff and Anne Januta is lab technician. "We see, on an average, 45 patients a day," Mrs. Loudermilk said. "Our caseload is probably 75% children."

"The biggest changes I have observed during the years I have worked in this office is in the people themselves. They are striving for better health standards, so we are seeing far less disease and illness caused from neglect or unsanitary conditions. The people are educated on health and are improving their day to day surroundings."

"The doctors and hospitals in the county have all been very cooperative when we had emergencies to arise. I want to express my sincere thanks to them for coming to our aid every time

we called on them.

"I am so indebted to the Health Provider office for providing me with a job all these years, making it possible for me to raise and educate my children. That was the important thing," Ernie Torrez, 24, works with his father at Ernie's Body Shop; Alex Torrez, 22, is a student at South Plains College in Levelland; and Linda Hernandez, 21, is a meat packer at Excel in Plainview. Her husband, Billy Jack, owns a private club in Silverton.

"I have enjoyed my work so much. It has been my pleasure to help and serve the residents of the community and assist with the communication in the office, but when by husband offered me the opportunity to quit, I accepted," she said.

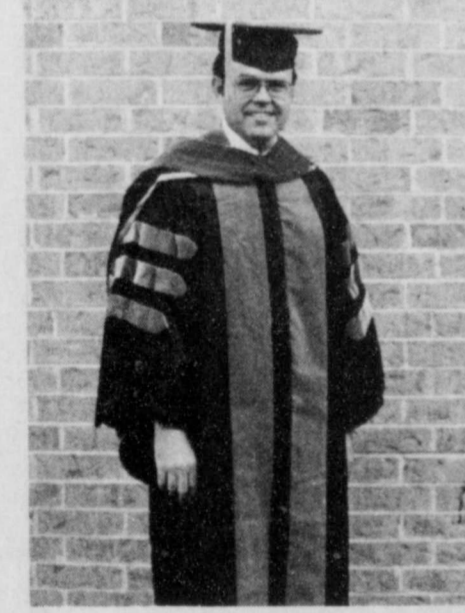
His brother, I.T. Graves and wife from Stephenville, were also present and acknowledged.

She displayed a picture of the church her family has always attended and noted that all churches were built on a hill or elevation where it could be seen by all. This church of her families dates back to 600 A.D. and they have been having problems with vandals carrying off parts of it. We all think we speak English but Mrs. Rucker proved we do not, some very interesting comparisons were given on our use of words and the English meaning of the same word. The display of China, woolens, pictures and talk was greatly enjoyed.

Dr. and Mrs. Hong entertained with the beautiful furniture, pictures that tell a story in their native land of Korea. Among these were chests hand decorated with abalone shell, lacquered and hand carved tables, dolls dressed in silk and representing the elderly farmer, the youth, and the wealthy women. 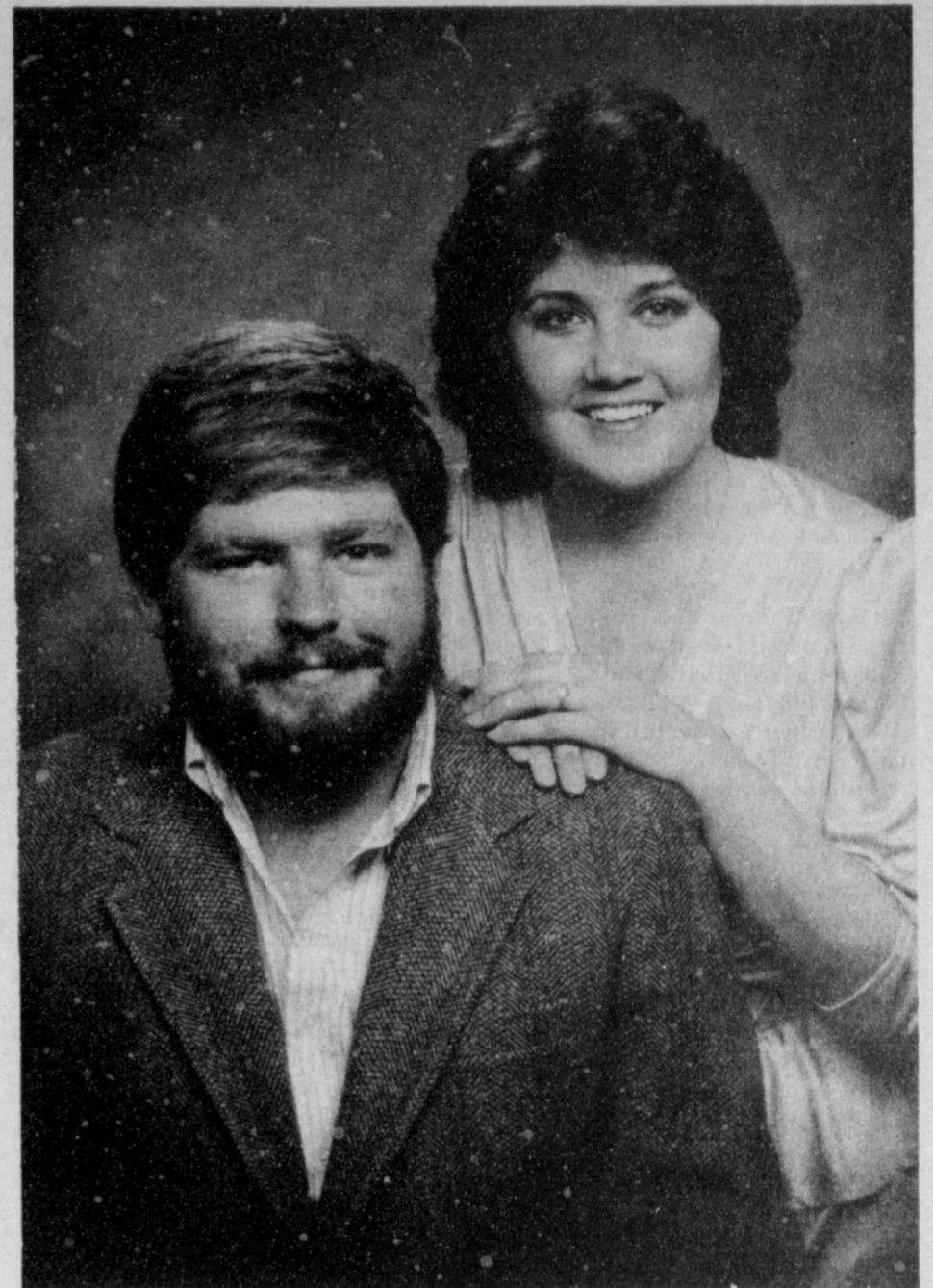

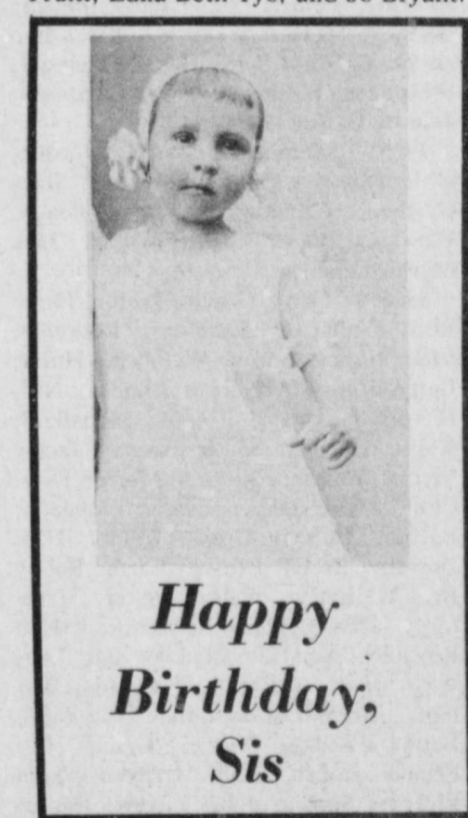

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"My love for Critters"

Farm animals were both prevalent and necessary in the early days. People had a better chance to know and love "critters" than now, although many have a fondness for animals that will never be replaced.

Grandpa gave Mama a mare about 1900. He called Mama "Sallie." He said she was fine stock like the mare he was giving her. The mare was half percheron. He laughed and told Mama she and the mare both had big feet.

I don't know why Granpa did not give Maude, as they named her, to Papa. He took care of her and worked her to the plow on a wagon mostly.

I don't know how many colts Maude raised, but I remember Kate, one of the last two. A brown mare, good and kind. I thought of her as my favorite. We kids worked her and if Papa didn't see us, we would ride her. (Papa did not want his work horses ridden. He said it was too hard on them to work at the plow and be ridden too.) He loved all his horses.

Kate loved to be loved and petted. She would catch us near the lot fence, rub up against our neck and shoulders. We would pet and pat her most everywhere we could reach. When we would stop, she would nudge us with her nose and mouth for more. This

would go on until we would get tired.

Kate raised several colts. Her last colt was a pet like her mama. She was gentle, kind, and good-natured. Light brown as a colt, she turned to an iron grey color when she got older. I never knew why unless it was a process of nature like we humans go through as we get older. Papa gave her to Brother Henry, but he never took her away from Papa. Papa used her as one of his plow team as long as he lived, if I remember clearly.

Maude's last colt was Rilda, a black, ill-tempered, nervous mare from which Papa raised mule colts.

This brings to my memory a good man who lived near us, Gule Snodgrass. I will never forget how good he was to Papa. Papa was meek and a poor trader. A trader in livestock, mostly a dealer in mules at that time. Gule would come by and get Papa's mule and sell it for him when he went to sell his own mules. He would give Papa the full price with no commission. People like Gule are an example of what laid the groundwork for this country, and not like the ME generation we have too many of today. Of course, not all expect to get paid for everything they do today, but far too many do look out for ME.

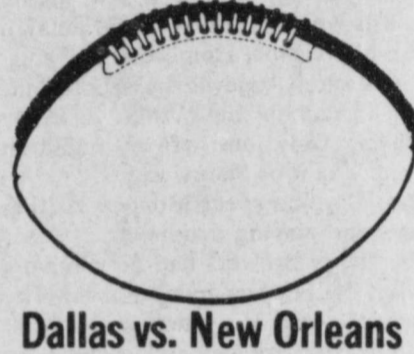

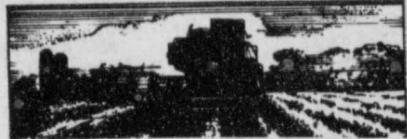

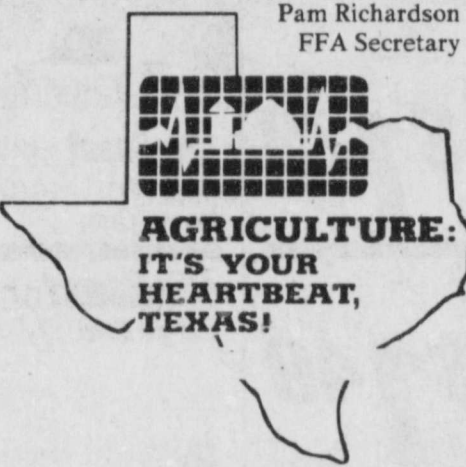

Cotton harvest begins in Floyd County

Cotton harvest time is here, at least it has begun in sections of Floyd County. Floydada Co-op Gins, Inc. ran the first bale of their season on October 4 for Yeary and Sons. The gin has now processed about fifty bales according to a telephone survey conducted on October 11.

Floydada Co-op Gin employee Karol Pigg said, "It looks like a good crop. We won't get into full swing until November, and harvest should last about three months if the weather is with us. We are hoping to process close to 30,000 bales through this gin this year."

Darty Gin in Dougherty ginned their first bale for Wes Campbell on October 6 according to Donna Pernel. "The cotton is a little green yet, but it is early. We are hoping for a good year for all concerned." With about forty bales run so far, Darty Gin expects to run about 7000 bales before the harvest ends.

The Lockney Co-op Gins baled Taylor and Fortenberry's first bale on October 8. That was the first of their season. The season is young yet, but the gin is optimistic that it will be a good one.

L.D. Smith at Hendricks Barwise Gin said, "It looks like a pretty good year. We just ginned our first two bales for H.G. Watts."

Lakeview Gin and McCoy Gin have not begun to gin yet. Lester Green at

Lakeview said, "We are all ready to go, but it will probably be a week or two. Prospects are good for an excellent yield, and we anticipate processing about 6000 bales at this gin. We just hope Mother Nature will be kind this year."

McCoy Gin should be operating in a week or two according to Dan Fry.

"The harvest looks fair but cotton and seed are selling too cheap. That puts us in a bad position."

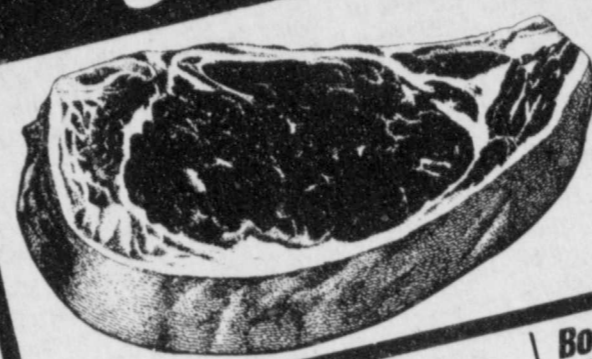

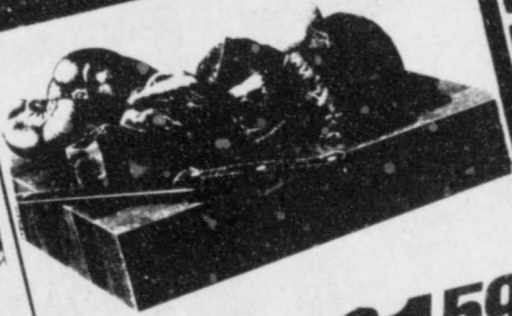

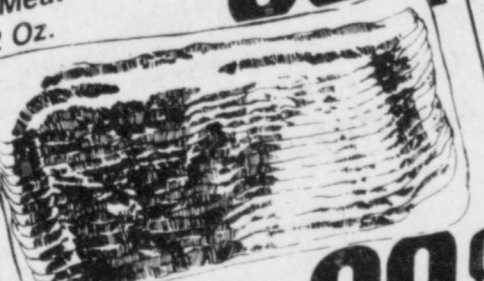

Cooperatives... "Building a Better America"

CO-OPS: WHAT THEY ARE AND DO

Some 60 million people in this country use cooperative—about 50,000 of them. That's a lot of people and a lot of businesses. And they do many billions of dollars worth of business each year. As one example, the farmer-owned marketing and supply cooperatives did almost \$50-billion worth of business at the latest count.

WHAT IS A COOPERATIVE? A cooperative is a business owned by its users. These users, called members, elect a board of directors from their ranks. The directors hire a manager who in turn hires the employees needed and sees that the business is properly run on a day-to-day basis.

The directors, however, retain overall responsibility and authority for operating the cooperative business. Many of our state and national leaders gained experience and stature through their cooperative work—and carried this over into public affairs and other activities.

In a cooperative the money left after operating costs are paid belongs to the members. Members receive a portion or all of it back at the end of the year as patronage refunds based on the amount of business they have done with the cooperative. Many times they re-invest this money in the cooperative to help finance expansion, needed buildings and equipment, or other expenses to keep the business operating effectively.

Cooperatives operate under law, regulations, and rules just as other businesses do. They are incorporated as businesses; they pay taxes to their local and state governments just as other businesses do. One thing about cooperatives

One thing about cooperatives is different: the law limits the dividends that can be paid on stock in cooperatives to eight percent. This is to keep control in the hands of member users and out of the hands of those who might want to use the business merely as an investment or speculation.

WHAT DOES A COOPERATIVE DO? Cooperatives do many things for people. They can be places to buy, places to sell, places to get a needed service.

Members use them to market farm products...obtain farm supplies such as petroleum products and fertilizer...get groceries, and other consumer goods... provide themselves with health insurance, housing, and other consumer-type services...obtain credit in the large amounts needed for operating farms and cooperatives through the Farm Credit System...get consumer-type credit through credit unions...provide themselves with electricity and telephone services in the rural area.

FOR MEMBERS--

The purpose of the cooperative is to make money for members, reduce costs for products they buy, and provide better services and quality goods to them.

FOR THE COMMUNITY--

Cooperatives not only put money in members' pockets, they also add to the community's financial base. They provide jobs to local people who in turn buy goods and services and pay taxes ; they pay for telephone, transportation, and other services a business needs ; they pay for telephone, transportation, and other services a business needs ; they use hometown banks and stores ; they pay all the local taxes other businesses do to keep schools, roads, and like community needs going; they return money to members that in turn is spent in the community.
