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Fortenberry designs and manufactures hay equipment at Cedar Hill

After baling some hay for a neighbor who was having difficulty in picking up the hay and loading it with a conventional loader, Durrel Fortenberry told his neighbor if he would give him four days, he would be back and load the hay for him.

In the haste of a real need in assisting a neighbor, Fortenberry mentally drew a plan for a loader. He and his son, Bryan, went to work in their shop in the Cedar Hill community 20 miles northeast of Floydada. His original design has only been altered for a three point and mounting the pick-up loader on a trailer.

That was three years ago. Presently, Fortenberry and his son design and build more than 10 pieces of different kinds of hay equipment including various trailers, feeders, loaders, kits, and winches and parts.

"Farmers think different to anybody," Fortenberry commented. "He thinks how things can work and how he can depend on its durability and convenience. Our equipment has as few movable parts and as few bolts as possible. That lends to fewer breakdowns."

Fortenberry, who carries on his manufacturing business in addition to his farming and ranching operations, has advertised in publications such as the Mexico Stockman and Weekly Livestock, but most of his purchases have been made through word of mouth. He estimates he has sold from 300-400 pieces of equipment so far. They have been dispersed all over Texas. Many are in Louisiana, Kansas, and Oklahoma. He appeared in farm shows in Ft. Worth and Oklahoma City last year.

"Our sales this year vary from those of last year because of the weather. Most of our sales are from Matador and Memphis west. We have built 72 pieces in the last seven weeks. 10 were sold in Floyd County in the last three weeks."

"I don't use a blueprint. I couldn't draw a blueprint if I had to. I just start throwing steel at them. I can build it in my mind."

When the demand exceeds the efforts of the two Fortenberrys with some hired help they contract some of the work out. "But," Fortenberry admits, "We try to do all of the work, even if we have to put on extra hands."

Only one dealer to a town is allowed to sell the locally manufactured implements unless a dealer handles only one type. Producers Cooperative in Floydada, Brown-McMurtry in Silverton, Perry Implement in Petersburg, and the John Deere dealer in Memphis are local dealers. Gebo's in Plainview, Hereford,

and Amarillo are also distributors.

Fortenberry applied for a patent last year. Although he has encountered some difficulty with the process, he said, "I'll just keep on till I get it."

The 3-in-1 trailer that started Fortenberry on his new business is designed with two prongs on the lift and "gets down to the ground," enabling the loading of "anybody's hay. I can load from the front or from the side, round bales or rectangular, and load bales weighing up to 2250 pounds." The spikes penetrate a bale 8 to 10 inches from the ground. Axles have a ground clearance of two feet.

"We have a lot of bales with soft centers now and I can pick them up with my lift, load it on my pickup, (3/4 ton without any special equipment), and load on a trailer in the convenience of the cab of my pickup without a tractor in the field," Fortenberry commented.

Three bolts hold the loader operated

with the 12 volt 3000 lb. vertical winch. By removing one pin, the loader can be removed from the trailer and mounted in the pickup with the replacing of that pin. By removing two pins, the loader can be mounted on a tractor.

Fortenberry manufactures trailers that will transport 4, 5, or 6 bales of hay behind a vehicle at 60 miles an hour with ease without whipping. "We service what we sell. That makes us more efficient in our manufacture and more competitive too."

"Our equipment may not be the sleekest design or the prettiest, but we build it heavy duty and durable."

Fortenberry admitted the one factor that makes the purchasing of his implements a difficult decision for a potential purchaser is that the equipment is welded together and cannot be broken down for transporting. "But when they see how durable it is, they are willing to do whatever is necessary to get it to their operation."

Comptroller sends checks

Monday, November 5, Comptroller Bob Bullock forwarded checks totaling \$99.5 million in local tax payments to the 985 cities that currently levy the one-percent local sales tax. November checks represent taxes collected on sales made in September and the third quarter and reported by October 20.

"So far this year, we've sent 13 percent more money to these cities than we did last year," Bullock said. "And they can expect another increase next month as we begin sending them receipts we collect on the new items and services that became taxable October 2. We'll be getting this extra money later in November and sending it to the city halls in December."

Houston received the largest check, \$16.9 million with Dallas coming next receiving \$11.4 million. San Antonio's payment was \$6.2 million and Austin received \$4.8 million. The total sent to Fort Worth was \$3.6 million while El Paso took in \$2 million. All of the collections in these cities are an increase over 1983 tallies.

Floydada received a check for \$10,730.89, bringing the year to date total to \$84,404.67. This is \$3.84 behind the total received on this date in 1983.

Lockney is ahead of last year's total by over \$3000 with a total of \$37,662.89. The payment for this period was \$4,923.30.

The largest city in our area, Lubbock, received a payment of \$1,361,754.68, bringing their year-to-date total to \$11,551,428.90. That city is over \$1 million ahead of the 1983 total at this time.

Plainview has shown an increase this year of \$97,157.87. The check received by that city was for \$126,938.60 which is a decrease from the \$134,819.97 payment for the same period last year.

Abernathy received a \$5,963.31 payment, bringing the year to date total to \$47,546.99, an increase of over \$5,000 above the total at this time last year.

In Crosby county, Crosbyton is more than \$4,000 ahead of last year with a total to date of \$43,453.09 after the current check for \$5,315.14 was received. Ralls is about \$1500 behind last year with a total of \$46,388.28 after the latest payment of \$5,711.71 was added.

Matador is running about \$100 behind their total to date in 1983. The payment of \$3,359.17 which was received in November brings the total this year up to \$19,139.03.

Texas food stamp benefits to increase in November

The 1.3 million Texans participating in the Food Stamp program will receive increased benefits beginning November 1, it was announced by Martin Dukler, Deputy Commissioner for Programs of the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Dukler said the increase in food stamp allotments will average about \$3 a month for a four-person household. Allotments vary with size of households

and family income.

Authority to increase the allotments is contained in a joint Congressional resolution passed October 12, 1984, and signed the same day by President Reagan.

The increase will provide an additional \$12,000,000 in benefits to Texans annually, Dukler said. The food stamp program is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and administered by the various states.

City awards bids

Commercial Body Corporation and West Texas Equipment Company were awarded bids for new equipment required by the City of Floydada at a meeting held on November 19. Bids received and opened at the November 12 meeting were reviewed and discussed before the awards were made.

Bids for the elbow type aerial insulated unit and utility body of the 34 foot class (bucket truck) were \$25,379.43 from UEC Company of Oklahoma City and \$25,201.00 from Commercial Body Corporation of San Antonio. The bid was awarded to the lowest bidder, Commercial Body Corporation.

A 1984 Caterpillar 953 track loader or its equal brought bids from four Lubbock firms. Couey-Lott Nichols Machinery Company bid \$77,512.00 on a Liebherr crawler-loader. Case Power and Equipment offered a Case model 1155D crawler-loader for \$78,409.00. Yellowhouse Machinery Company bid \$77,244.00 on a John Deere JD-644 crawler-loader. The West Texas Equipment Company price for a Caterpillar 953 track-loader was \$73,886.00. All bids were with trade-in. The bid went to the low bidder, West Texas Equipment Company.

The city council went into an executive session following the awarding of the bids.

Thanksgiving meal has an interesting history

The Thanksgiving season in America, with its traditional pictures of the bountiful harvest, the Pilgrims seated at the dinner table with the Indians, and the customary displays of pumpkins, all serve to remind us of the productivity of the nation's farms.

But from those early days of settlers scratching out enough food to survive, to the tremendous harvest of 1975, there are a lot of interesting sidelights. Some of these little-known facts of American agricultural development have helped give us more to be thankful for when we sit down to our Thanksgiving meal.

We've probably all read or heard about the Indians who helped the Pilgrims plant corn with a dead fish as fertilizer. It was a great idea that worked well for the Indians. But there

was a bit of a problem the new settlers also had to learn to cope with. Dogs liked to dig up the dead fish, and with it came the seed corn.

So, once again the Indians passed along a farming tip. There dogs were placed under a handicap at planting time. The forepaw of every dog was tied to its neck leaving only three legs to hobble about on. This prevented digging and saved the Indian's crops.

It didn't take long for the Pilgrims to catch on to this trick. And there were more to be learned as settlers moved westward.

Indians didn't take time to clear the land for what little farming they did. Instead, trees were girdled at the bottom by stripping away the bark around the trunks. The trees soon died and sunlight reached the floor of the

woods. The fertile ground was ready to produce good crops with very little work.

As land-hungry settlers needed new acres to plant, they put it into production quickly by this method. And, the expansion of our agriculture was underway.

But, the demand for new and better seeds wasn't as easily met. It took some high level shadowy dealings to help improve the American agricultural scene in those early days of the nation.

Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson and John Adams were not only great patriots, they also engaged in a smuggling operation. In many foreign nations it was illegal to carry seeds out of the country. Franklin was a skilled smuggler who brought back many seeds for new plant varieties from nations he visited.

Jefferson, an impeccable dresser, always made certain his clothes had plenty of little pockets. These were convenient for tucking away a few seeds he managed to pick up on his travels. And, John Adams always reminded his diplomatic corps of the importance of securing seeds and information on new farming practices from the nations where they were assigned.

Even George Washington contributed to the development of agriculture. During his tenure as commander of the Continental Army, and later as President, farming was much on his mind. He spent huge sums of money developing a new strain of work animals at Mount Vernon.

Word of his work spread and animals from other countries were sent as gifts to help improve the strain.

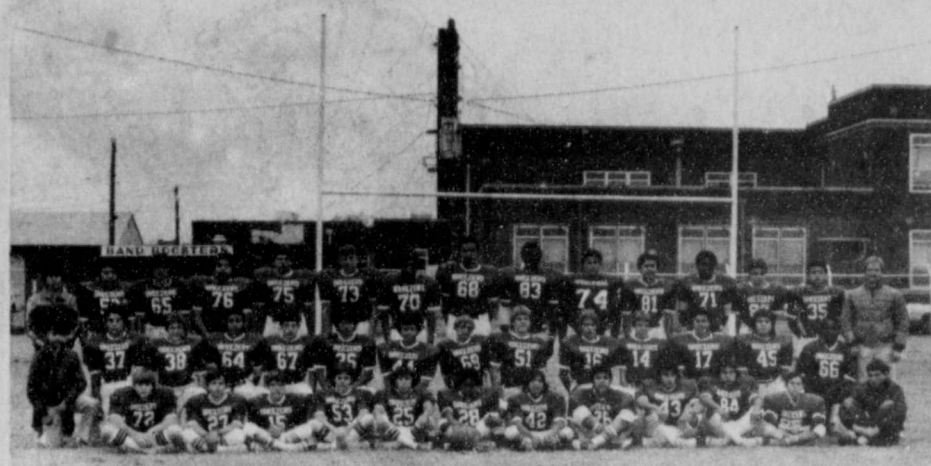

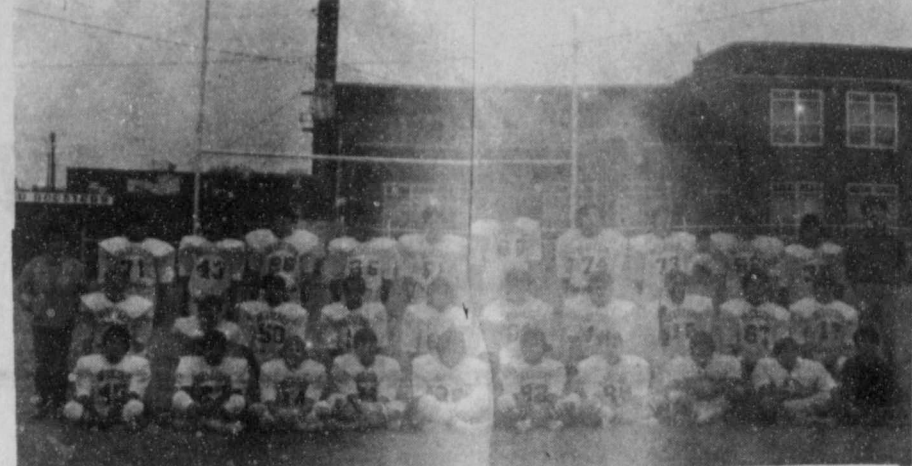
Going into the final game of the season, the Breezers were 7 and 0 and hoping to win the District Champion-

"The game has changed a lot in the past few years," said Don. "Many rule

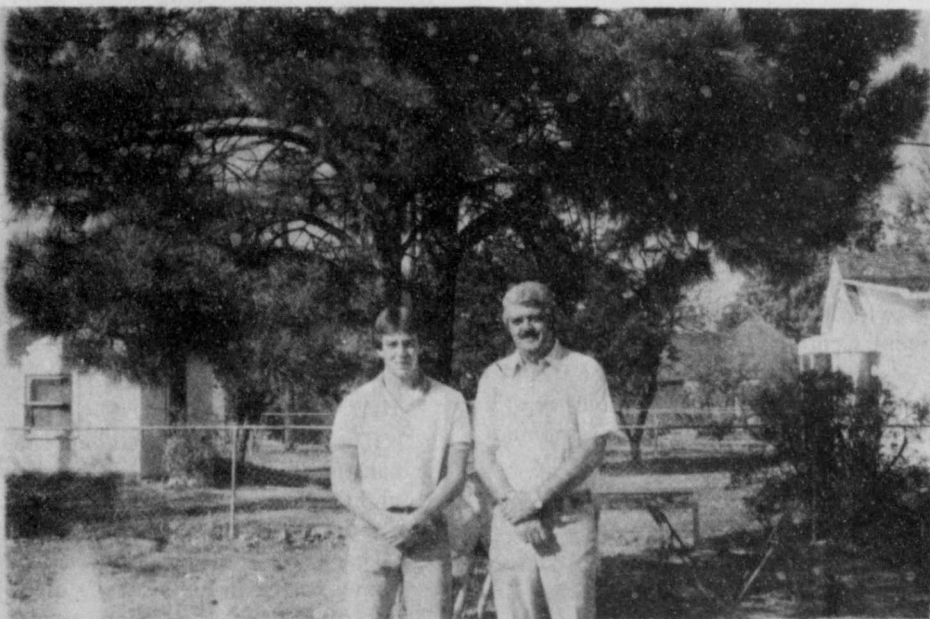

Pritchett is new disc jockey

Floydada radio station KFBA has a new weekend disc jockey, Jim Pritchett. He began broadcasting here in early September. Pritchett chooses his own music for air time and is the sports commentator as well as a DJ. "Good things are happening for this station," he stated. "I hope the listeners will tune in and listen as we grow."

Art association looks for home

After operating under the umbrella of the tax exempt status of the Floyd County Historical Museum since its inception, the Arts Association has now grown in size and strength to a point where it is deemed appropriate to take the necessary steps to incorporate as a separate tax exempt organization. The location must be easily accessible to all and have a measure of security as small groups will be working at often odd hours on the many projects the association is involved in.

A vacant store, office, or residential building would be perfect if it is in usable condition so that maintenance and upkeep could be kept to a minimum. The association would be willing to provide such maintenance in return for the use of the building or would be especially pleased with a donation of such a facility to the association. 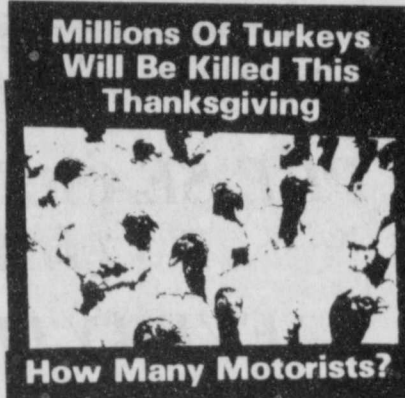

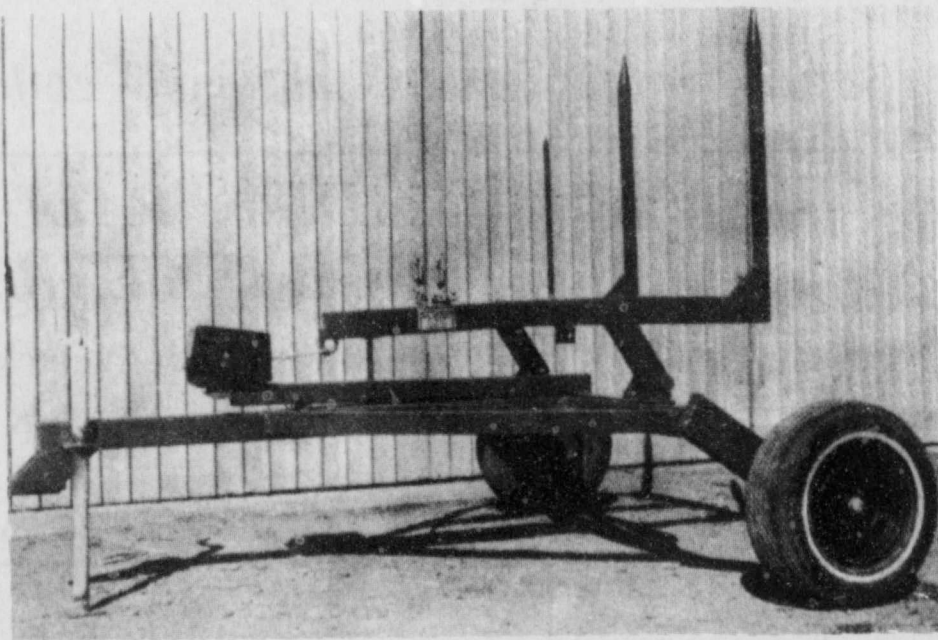

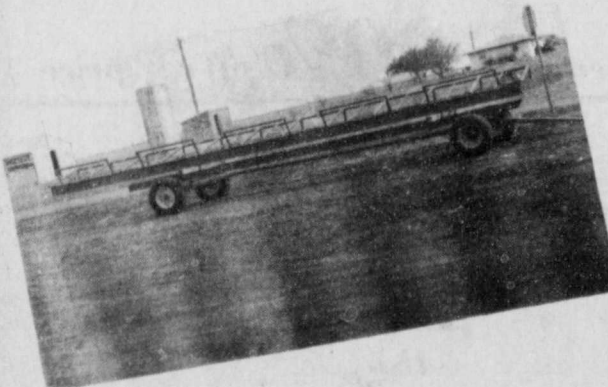
