Floydada stock show sets stage for county show here

FFA and 4-H members in Floydada participated in the initial competition of the Floydada Junior Livestock Show this past weekend. The local show, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, was held at the Floydada show barns on Saturday, February 9. The long months of hard work were put to the test in this event, and many young people received the first rewards for the care and concern they have lavished on their animals in the past few months.

Fifty-eight competitors showed a total of 92 animals, including 46 sheep, 32 barrows, and 14 steers. This total is not as large as past years, but enthusiasm and enjoyment of those involved more than made up for the difference.

Hunter Smith took the Grand Champion award with a lightweight Hampshire in the sheep division. Jon Garrett, who also showed a lightweight Hampshire, was awarded the Reserve Grand Champion title.

Darin Martinez captured the Grand Champion title in barrows with a heavyweight cross. Keith Hancock won the Reserve Grand Championship with his heavyweight Duroc.

The Grand Champion steer was a heavyweight cross shown by Amy Hinsley. Another female exhibitor, Shannon Edwards, showed the Reserve Grand Champion steer, a middleweight

Showmanship awards were made in each area of competition. Coy LaBaume won the Showmanship award in barrows. Haney Robertson was awarded the honor in the sheep division. Chad Edwards earned the award in the steer

Each Grand Champion will receive a

Champion will receive a desk set. Winners placing in each category will receive cash prizes in the amount of: 1st place, \$5.00; 2nd place, \$4.00; 3rd place, \$3.00; 4th place, \$2.00; and 5th place, \$1.00. First through fifth places will receive ribbons and the Breed Champion and Reserve Breed Champion will each receive rosettes. Belt buckles were donated by The Loft Western Wear, Producer's Co-op Elevator, and Floydada Co-op Gins. Gary Brown and the Chamber of Commerce donated the desk sets. The ribbons, rosettes and cash prizes were donated by the Chamber of Commerce, as were the showmanship plaques.

The competition will continue next weekend with the County Stock Show being held on Saturday, February 16, and Sunday, February 17. All entries belt buckle and each Reserve Grand must be in the barn by 6:00 p.m. on February 15 when weighing will begin for barrows and sheep. Steers will be weighed beginning Saturday morning at 9:00 a.m. The lamb competition will begin at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, with barrows following at 2:00 p.m. Steers will be shown at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday. The judging contest will be held at 7:45 a.m. on Monday and the annual buyer's lunch will follow at 11:30 a.m. The stock sale is scheduled to begin at 1:00 p.m. with Kenneth Gregg of Plainview presiding as auctioneer.

The Floyd County Farm Bureau will sponsor the annual banquet at the Lockney Elementary School Cafetorium at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, February 19. Trophies will be awarded to exhibitors at the banquet.

Hale appointed acting police chief

Police Chief Doug Brewer's resigna-Brewer stated his resignation was for 'personal reasons which prevent me from giving a two week notice." He stated he felt that the police department was a good one with good officers and that he had enjoyed working with them. He also expressed his gratitude to the city council for their support. The city council members expressed regret at his leaving and unanimously agreed that Brewer had been a good chief and

that he would be missed. Assistant Chief James Hale was appointed, after an executive session, as Acting Chief of Police and his salary to that of the chief. Officer Roy Muniz was hired fulltime with hours increased from 36 to 45 hours and his salary was increased to that of the assistant chief.

Hale has been a police officer in Floyd County since 1977, serving with the Lockney Police Department and the Floyd County Sheriff's Department, before coming to the Floydada Police Department approximately 21/2 years

The resolution to support the Floyd County Appraisal District in the seizing of delinquent personal property failed to pass city council vote. The council further approved cars and light trucks used for personal use to be taken off the 1985 City Tax Roll. However, if the vehicle is used as a business vehicle or it is a recreational vehicle, it will continue to be taxed.

The rate charges for Floydada Cable T.V. were discussed by City Council. A proposal was made to Joe D. An increase of \$.50 in addition to the current rate of \$1.00 was approved for each additional outlet. After checking with his superiors McKinnis approved the proposal from city council, but stated that for the increase the Nashville station and Spanish International would be provided. Other action taken by the city council was the reappointment of Bill Feuerbacher as the director of the West Texas Municipal Power Agency, for a one year term, the approval of line item adjustments on the current city budget, and the authorization of Glenn Reddick and Larry Gawlik to continue the electric power study started in November, 1984. The discussion of insurance on electric sub-station was tabled until more information could be gathered.


years. The Westwind group is composed of our own Floyd County boys, Roger Alldredge, Brian Sanders, Keith Owens, and Tim Burns.

Baker Road to be complete mid '86

A public hearing for the Baker Road project was held in conjunction with the regular monthly meeting of the Floyd County Commissioners' Court on February 11. Several representatives from the Texas Highway Department met with the court and interested citizens at 3:00 p.m. in the courthouse to exchange information and comment on the project. Glenn Johnson from Lubbock

explained the right of way acquisition and the need for some relocation of utility lines and fencing. The district engineer, James Johnson, stated, "The money is there, and we are ready to

The project will begin at U.S. Highway 70 and travel south and southeast along FM road 602 to join FM

is making tentative plans to present a casual wear. Although there will be no Miss Floydada Pageant on the night of Saturday, April 13.

Whether the Chamber proceeds with the project will depend on the number of girls who enter the contest. A minimum of 15 contestants is needed.

The application forms are available in the junior high and high school offices. There will be a \$25 entry fee, which will be used to defray the expense of trophies, crown, decorations, printing, etc. To be eligible, contestants must be a student of Floydada High School next school term and must secure parental consent. Those who wish to do so may ask a merchant or an organization to be her sponsor and pay her \$25 entry fee. The deadline for entry is March 14.

Impartial, out-of-town judges will conduct a private interview of all the contestants on the afternoon preceding the pageant. During the pageant, girls

1958 about 4 miles east of Lakeview and 5 or 6 miles west of Dougherty. The project is 7.86 miles long and will cost approximately \$846,400.00 to complete. The road will have two 10 feet wide paved lanes with two four feet wide paved shoulders when complete.

The estimated date of completion is mid 1986, according to highway department personnel. The completed plans must be approved in Austin and the right of way easements obtained before a bid letting can be held, "sometime in June if there are no major difficulties," said Judge Choise Smith.

Residents of the area voiced comments in favor of the project as they are now inconvenienced by the poor quality of the present road and many have suffered damage to their vehicles when traveling the road.

Actions occurring at the February session of the court included the monthly reports of the County Treasurer, Glenna Orman, and the County Auditor, Bobbie Hamilton. Both reported that monetary matters in the county are adhering closely to the budget adopted by the court. Orman reported that 88.81% of the current tax roll has been collected and that over \$27,000 in delinquent taxes have been collected since January 1.

Hamilton reported that the county has \$1,267,000.00 on deposit in certificates of deposit which earned \$5,770.54 in interest in January. She also told the court, "The equipment purchases made by the court recently have been well planned for over a period of years as funds have accumulated."

Judge Smith said "We are not in debt, and we have a little surplus. I think that shows we are tending to business, and we are prepared for an emergency if one arises.'

The Friends of the Library have applied for tax exempt status and will now be handling the funds being set aside for the construction of the Floyd County Library. The court voted to release the funds under their control which are earmarked for the project to the organization. A total of \$13,037.36 will be transferred to the Friends of the Library and all future donations will be forwarded to the organization.

The bids for the county depository were opened at 10:00 a.m. First National Bank of Floydada was the only bidder and the institution will continue to be the agency of deposit for the county as it has in the past.

Karen Stallings, a representative of Blue Cross from Lubbock, met with the court to report the health insurance rates for the county will remain the same as last year when the contract comes up for renewal in April. "The rate for life insurance will decrease by \$0.07 per \$1,000 of coverage. The rate last year was \$1.43 and the new rate will be \$1.36," she stated. "Rates for health insurance are based on the benefits package chosen and the amount of

usage the plan receives." The court made necessary line item adjustments to the budget and approved a farm work contract for Louis and Robert Pyle 11/4 miles south of the Lakeview Gin. The request was for a pit to be dug and an old foundation moved.

Freshman girls lose by 35 to 20


Floydada's Freshman girls basketball team played Dimmitt there on January 28, to lose by 35 to 20.







An executive session following the regular meeting of the Floydada Independent School District yielded some changes in the administrative end of the system. The contracts of several principals and program directors were to be reviewed before renewal. Ronnie Wood, principal of high school, was extended for one year, which will carry his appointment through the 1986-87 school year. Charles Tyer, principal of Andrews Elementary, and Joe Paty, director of the athletic program, received extensions of their contracts through the same date.

One of the most significant changes occuring Monday night was the transfer of Jimmie Collins, currently principal of the junior high, to the administrative office at the end of this school year. Effective June 1st, Collins will become the administrative assistant to superintendent Jerry Cannon. Cannon said, "Mr. Collins will be handling purchasing, transportation, curriculum, cafeteria and other business affairs."

Bob Copeland and Bob Alldredge, principal at Duncan and Caprock Plan A Director, respectively, failed to have their contracts renewed. The two current contracts will expire with the 1985-86 school year. Copeland, in a telephone conversation on February 12, stated, "I am planning to retire at the





Doug Brewer resigned his position as Chief of Police on Wednesday, February 6th. This brought to an end almost five years of service on the police force of Floydada.

The reason given by Brewer for resigning is, "It is personal and does not reflect in any way any unhappiness with my job." Brewer said, "I have had more cooperation from the citizens and support from the city council than in any other job I've ever had in my 10 years as a police officer. The city council never turned down a request by the police department while I was the chief. I want to thank them for their support and also the support of the citizens of this town."

Brewer's parents, Riley and Inez Brewer, moved to Clovis, New Mexico, in 1940, where Doug Brewer was born in 1947. His career in law enforcement

started in Clovis as a deputy sheriff. Brewer moved to Lubbock in 1977 and began work in January of 1980 for the Lubbock County Sheriff's Department.

In May of 1981 he came to Floydada and started working with the City Police as a patrolman. When Chief Scott Newton resigned in August 1982, Brewer was appointed acting chief. Following on September 15, 1982, he was appointed the chief of police of Floydada.

The future is uncertain for Brewer at this time. "I'm not sure what I am going to do now, or whether I'll leave town,' Brewer said, "but personal reasons have brought about this decision, and there is one thing for certain, I'm sure sorry about leaving, and I'll miss working for and with the City of

Program looks advantageous for area cotton farmers

Because of a large cotton crop in the United States and abroad the past year that has depressed market prices, producers need to take a hard look at participating in the 1985 farm program.

With the March 1 sign-up deadline looming ahead, farmers must decide soon whether or not the benefits and risk reduction associated with the program will outweigh any lost revenue from acres taken out of production.

The '85 cotton program is much the same as last year, points out Dr. Carl Anderson, economist in cotton marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M Univer-

The target price remains at 81 cents a pound, the base loan rate has increased slightly to 57.3 cents a pound, and the maximum deficiency payment per pound has dropped 2.3 cents. The main change is in the acreage reduction phase; last year it was 25 percent of the base acreage while this year farmers will have to idle 30 percent of their land. Ten percent of that will qualify for 30 cents per pound diversion payments, explains Anderson.

"With cotton farmers facing average prices for their 1985 crop that will likely be near the loan rate, those taking part in the farm program may receive near maximum deficiency payments (the difference between the target price and loan rate)," Anderson points out. "This makes the program fairly attractive to producers.

He notes that a study by the Extension Service has shown that producers in all the major cotton growing areas of Texas would benefit from participating in the farm program. Increased returns would range from more than \$15 per acre on dryland production in the Rolling Plains to over Rio Grande Valley.

Since the '85 farm program for cotton has no cross compliance requirements

between farms, producers with several farms can comply up to the maximum on some and then go outside the program on others. Also, because of depressed grain and soybean prices and the potential to set an approximate price floor with cotton options, producers may decide to plant a sizeable amount of cotton outside the farm program, notes

Anderson. The Extension Service has budgets and worksheets available to aid producers in making farm program decisions, adds Anderson. Interested producers should contact their county Extension office for more information.

A new regulation on brucellosis vaccinations was adopted by the Texas Animal Health Commission last November, point out Richie Crow, County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. The key part of the regulation focuses on the vaccination of heifers before they reach one year of

With heifers approaching this target date, producers must decide how such animals will be handled, says Crow. Their decision must be based on the provisions of the brucellosis vaccination regulation, which applies to 113 eastern, coastal and northern counties:

1. Heifer calves born after January 1, 1984 which are between 4 and 12 months of age and acquired and used for breeding, grazing, dairying, or confinement in a dry lot not under quarantine must be officially vaccinated according to the amended regulation.

2. Heifer calves born after January 1, 1984, which are unvaccinated when they are over 12 months of age may change ownership only after being spayed or consigned to a livestock market to be spayed or "S" branded prior to the sale; or consigned directly to slaughter, quarantined feedlot or quarantined

State funds are available for free vaccinations, notes Mr. Crow. Producers should contact their own private veterinarian or their area Texas Animal Health Commission office for complete

Livestock producers should make sure their calves are properly identified

Samples can still be tested

It's not too late to collect soil samples for testing to determine fertilizer needs for this year's crops.

Collecting soil samples now and getting them tested can help farmers get a jump on the spring rush at soil testing labs, says Benny Butler, County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Once fertilizer needs are determined, farmers can place their orders, Butler says. Again, by ordering early, they can avoid the spring rush. Also fertilizers usually cost more in the spring when demand is greater and supplies tighter.

With fertilizer at hand, farmers can begin application when field conditions permit. This minimizes spring planting delays because of tight dealer schedules and reduces the potential for moisture loss just prior to planting.

SOIL INSECT CONTROL IN

VEGETABLE GARDENS As vegetable gardeners in Floyd County prepare for spring planting, their first step should be to control soil

Soil insects can reduce vegetable quality and yields if left uncontrolled. For effective control, mix insecticides into the soil at a depth of 4-6 inches at least two weeks before the garden plot Among destructive soil insects are

wireworms, white grubs, seed corn maggots, cabbage maggots, mole crickets, sowbugs, slugs, snails and cutworms. Some destroy plant seeds, roots, tubers and underground stem parts while others cut off young plants

at or near the soil surface. Most soil insects can be controlled with diazinon 25 percent liquid concentration or Spectracide 6000 applied as a 5 percent granule. Granules usually give the best control. If cutworms or

garden has been planted, broadcast 5 percent Sevin bait over the soil surface. This bait containing metaldehyde will also control slugs and snails. However, it is no formulated to be mixed into soil.

Garden sites planted for the first time or those previously in grass or weeds are more likely to harber damaging numbers of soil pests. Before treating with an insecticide, inspect the garden site by taking soil samples at several locations to a deptch of 5 to 6 inches. Remove one square foot section of soil from each location and record the number of soil insect pests present. As a general rule, an average of one or more soil insects per sample suggests the need for insecticide treatment.

Before applying any pesticide always read and follow label instructions.
