



Filing deadline near for spring elections

Deadlines for filing in the scheduled April 6 General Election for the purpose of filing several positions in local government are rapidly approaching. Taxing entities with positions up for election include the City of Floydada, the Floydada Independent School District, and the Caprock Hospital District. The Mayor's seat, currently held by Parnell Powell, and two council posi-

tions, currently held by Wayne Russell and Frank Breed, are on the ballot. Powell, Russell, and Breed have not indicated if they will be running for re-election at this time. Persons interested in filing for the positions should contact Jimmie Lou Stewart at City Hall before March 6, the last day to file. FISD Board of Trustees has two three

year terms and one one-year term up for election. Weldon Pruitt, Freddie Morren, and Hulon Carthel currently hold the positions. All three have filed for re-election. Joyce Kimble has filed for one of the three year terms. Other interested parties may contact Ben Ayres, the school attorney, for the necessary application prior to the deadline, March 6.

The Hospital Board has three positions up for re-election. Seats currently held by Louis Anderson, Jo Wester, and Don Bean may be filed on by contacting the hospital administrators office in advance of the March 11 deadline for filing. The current board members have given no indication of their intentions to file for re-election or retire from the board.

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Floydada wins Bi-District

Floydada's third appearance in bi-district play during the last 20 years was momentous as the Winds claimed a decisive 72-57 victory over Perryton. Floydada with a 25-5 record was the District 2-3A runner-up and Perryton was the District 1-3A champion with a 21-9 record. Floydada's win felled the winning streak that had carried Perryton through 13 games.

The first half of the Class 3A boy's bi-district basketball game in Amarillo on Thursday, February 21, was played see saw fashion as the ball and the score changed hands frequently. The game, played in the Tascosa High School gym, proved to be an excellent showcase for the varied talents of the Whirlwinds.

The Rangers scored first, accumulating 6 points before Floydada was able to score. The Winds came back with 9 unanswered points, five of which were scored by Alvin Cooper. The Rangers reeled off 4 baskets to take the lead and held it 16-12 with less than 20 seconds left in the first quarter. The Winds' Rabel Contreras, after missing his first four attempts of the quarter, scored a three point play and a lay up to give the Winds a 17-16 lead going into the second quarter.

Derrick Jenkins drew first blood in the second quarter with a shot from the top of the key and hit again from the corner after a bucket by Perryton's Clint Dear. The Winds picked up two more fastbreak baskets to garner a 25-18 lead. Perryton answered with three successful attempts, cutting Floydada's lead to 27-24 with 4 minutes remaining in the half. The Winds tried a spread offense in an attempt to force Perryton out of a zone defense and get the middle open for Jenkins. Perryton failed to be tricked, and Floydada soon returned to a more conventional defense, with Jenkins scoring twice more from the outside. The Winds went to the locker room with a 36-28 lead at halftime.

Jenkins again led the scoring, beginning the third quarter by stealing the ball and going the length of the court to score. He topped a nine point scoring spurt with a three point play, putting Floydada ahead 47-30 with 5:31 remaining in the quarter.

Fourth quarter play went back and forth between the two teams, but Perryton was not able to overcome the sizeable lead forged by Floydada.

Perryton Coach Charles McLarty said, "Jenkins is the one we were

worried about. We worked on slowing down his penetration, but he was even hitting from the outside tonight." Jenkins, 5'10", had averages better than 20 points per game this season.

"He's our quarterback out there; he's the one that made us go," said Floydada coach Mike Cocanougher. "He's a super athlete and a real smart basketball player. He is not really a consistent outside shooter. He gets most of his points on steals, drives, and lay ups."

Cocanougher also stated, "The records I have researched indicate that Floydada has not won a bi-district title in the last 30 years. I do not know if they ever did." He continued, "The boys got off to a slow start, but they got it together and played really well when it counted. They were able to frustrate the Perryton team just a little, and that's just what we wanted to do. They really wanted this win."

Varsity competes in area contest

The mighty Whirlwind Varsity boys basketball team, under the leadership of Coach Mike Cocanougher, met their final challenge against the Seminole Indians in the Coronado High School gym in Lubbock Tuesday night for the Class 3A area contest.

In the opening minutes of the game the score was tied 2-2 and continued to remain close until Bell for Seminole dropped in two baskets. Floydada's Alvin Cooper answered that challenge by nailing 18-foot shots consecutively to cut the deficit to 10-8. Cooper tied Jenkins for a total of 14 shots for the game.

Derrick Jenkins, repeatedly the high pointer for the team, was held to a total of 14 points by the opposing team; he had been averaging 20 points a game.

In the first quarter of play both teams seemed to be approaching their opponent with caution, and the play was fairly even with the score at the end of the period 12 to 17 in favor of the Seminole team. The Whirlwinds were hitting 6 out of 14 attempts for a 42%

scoring average. The second quarter they returned with renewed vigor, and fought vigorously for a 57% scoring record, hitting eight of 14 attempts, for the second period, but they were again outscored by 28 to 40.

The second half of the game seemed to increase the lead of the opposing team in each quarter only after a valiant effort put forth by each of the Winds individually and a well-coordinated team.

The Whirlwind team dropped to 30% average in scoring, converting only five of the 18 attempted shots in the third quarter. Joey Kemp with six rebounds and David Morren with seven for the game helped to convert some of the baskets. After Seminole went on an 18-6 binge, the score stood at 39 to 68 at the end of the quarter.

The fourth quarter was similar to the third in that the Winds dropped four in the basket of the 17 attempted. In spite of the ever-increasing odds, the Whirlwinds never gave up; they fought a

valiant battle to the end. It was apparent the team was not playing up to their potential in comparison with Thursday night's exhibition.

Joey Kemp racked up 12 points with David Morren and Rabel Contreras both scoring four points each.

Brad Rainer, Terry King, Tony Caballero, Larry Smith, completed the lineup for the Varsity squad, with F.L. Williams and Haney Robertson, JV members, as backups.

After the 48-90 defeat, the Whirlwinds ended the 1984-85 season at 25-6. Cocanougher commented after the Tuesday night game that five of the team members are seniors and will not be returning next year. "But we are going to be ready for them next year. We have some good boys and a good foundation for another really strong team next year."

"Our games have been well attended this year, particularly in the playoffs. We have only 30 years of records to use as reference, but we have not found where Floydada has ever won a bi-dist-

ric game; we know they haven't for 30 years.

"The support of the fans and the community have been superb. Residents of our town have found any number of ways, including Whirlwinds sent to the team, to express their support in the last week. The kids appreciate it, and I appreciate it," he concluded.

Social Security News

Because the Social Security and supplemental security income (SSI) programs are designed primarily for people who are aged, disabled or blind, and families of deceased workers, many people overlook the aspects of these programs which protect children, particularly disabled children. However, these benefits mean the difference between a lifetime of dependency and a measure of dignity to many people disabled in childhood.

Social Security benefits may be paid to a person disabled before age 22 if a parent has retired, is disabled, or died after having worked long enough under Social Security to qualify for benefits. The monthly benefits may continue as long as the child is disabled, so long as the retired or disabled parent continues to receive benefits or if the parent dies. An application may be submitted at any age if it can be shown that the disability began before age 22 and that the person is still disabled. About 500,000 persons are receiving benefits as adults disabled in childhood.

SSI, which makes monthly payments to people who are 65 and over or blind or disabled with little income and resources, also makes payments to blind or disabled children. Some of the parent's income is considered to be that of the child when determining the

child's eligibility. Approximately 230,000 persons age 17 and younger are receiving SSI benefits as children.

The medical requirements for disability are the same for children under both programs and, in general, is the same definition which applies to adults. Eligible individuals must have a physical or mental impairment which prevents them from working for a year or more or is expected to result in death.

Most who qualify for child's disability benefits have some form of mental impairment or mental retardation. Other common qualifying disabling conditions include birth defects, muscular dystrophy, and muscular sclerosis.

and a \$10.00 gift certificate from Lockney Oil and Butane was also donated.

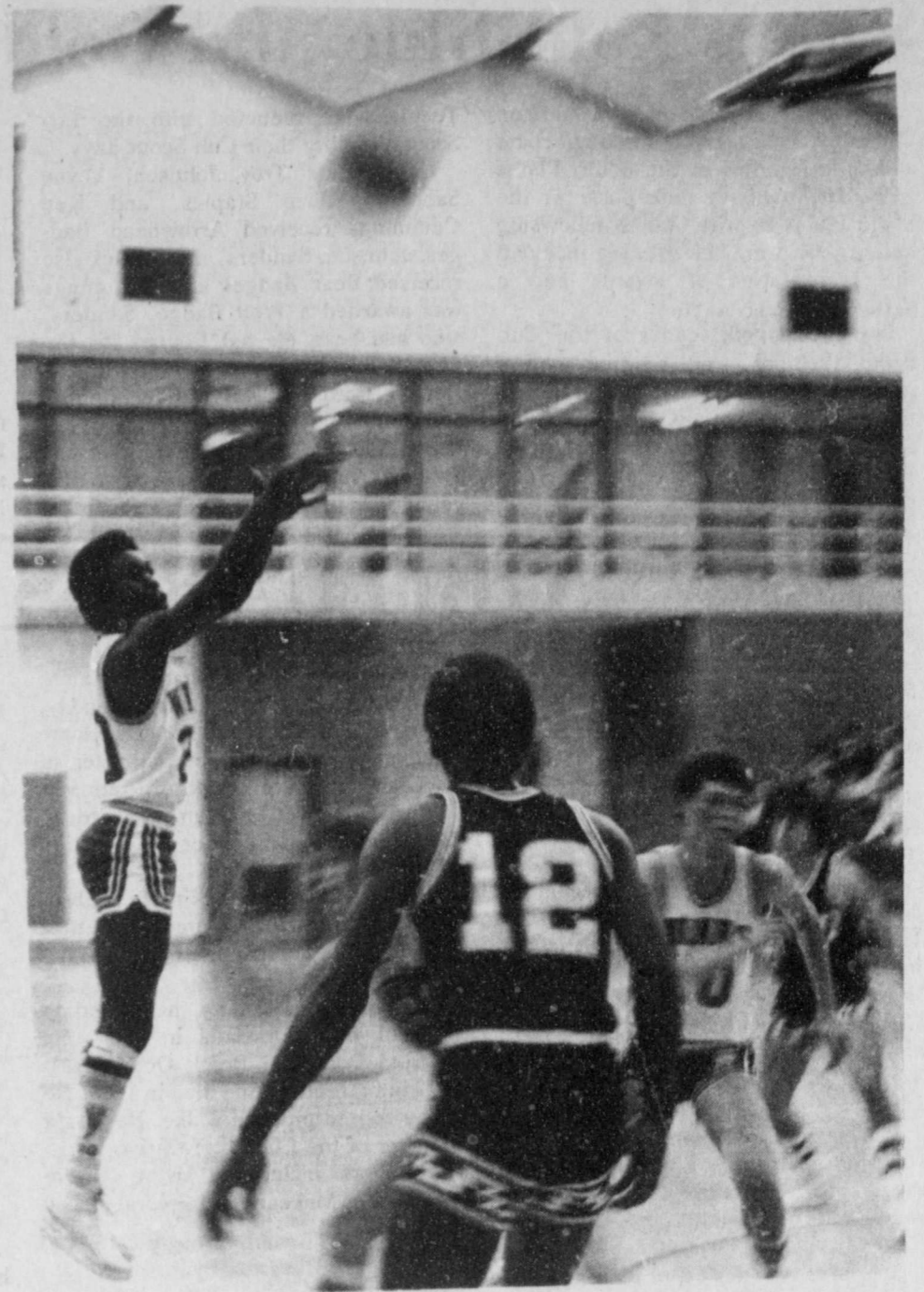

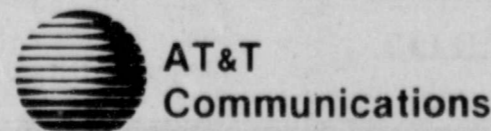

A reception and dance were held in the atrium area of the Holiday Inn Civic Center. Natural foliage and a large marble fountain provided decoration.

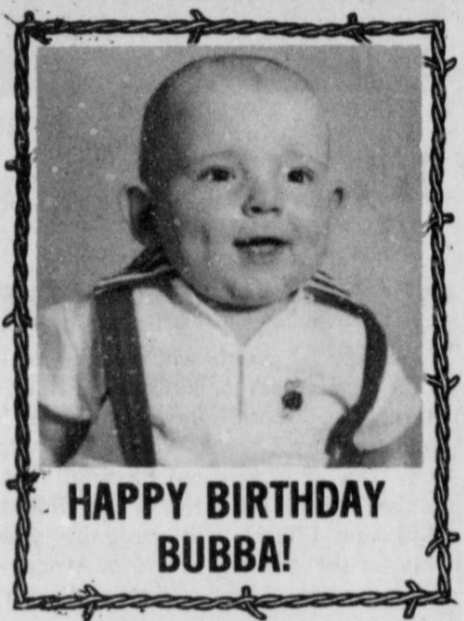

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FmHA offers more credit help for farm borrowers

The Farmers Home Administration is making changes in its regulations to encourage commercial lenders to help their farm borrowers, who are having economic problems, by taking advantage of the FmHA's debt adjustment program according to Becky D. Via, County Supervisor.

The debt adjustment program is part of the Farm Credit Initiatives announced by President Reagan last September. It is designed to help banks and other lenders reduce the amount of loan payments down to a level farmers can afford.

The program allows FmHA to guarantee a portion of farm loans owed to banks and other lenders under certain conditions. FmHA agrees to make up part of the loss to the lender if the borrower defaults. This government guarantee makes it possible for the lenders to stay with their farm borrowers longer than they could otherwise.

The new regulations will help banks and other lenders cooperate with the program by allowing them to write down interest in exchange for the government guarantee. Previously, they were required to write off a minimum of ten percent of the principal of the loan. When the change becomes effective,

they can reduce the loan through interest or principal or a combination of both.

Under another part of the President's Farm Credit Initiatives, FmHA is reviewing loans of its own borrowers. So far, in Floyd County, Ms. Via said FmHA has been able to adjust loans for well over 100 borrowers. FmHA county Supervisors will be getting additional staff help from other U.S. Department of Agriculture agencies to review FmHA loans.

FmHA also has selected expert credit teams that will assist farm borrowers if the bank they have loans with has failed. In addition, the agency is cooperating with state and other agriculture agencies and groups to establish a "HOT LINE" telephone service in some areas.

The Agriculture Department is working closely with other federal and regulatory agencies such as the Treasury Department, The Farm Credit Administration, The Comptroller of the Currency and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) to provide whatever help they can for farm borrowers in economic trouble. Ms. Via said.

Additional employees to help with FmHA loans

The Farmers Home Administration will hire additional temporary employees to help process farm loan applications in Texas FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch said today.

"We will begin hiring the extra staff immediately," Futch said. "The new employees will be temporary. They will serve for four months to help with the seasonal loan peak and to process loans for hundreds of farmers who have requested a review of their debt situation to see if they qualify for the new debt restructuring program."

Under the new program, farmers who are having trouble meeting their FmHA payments, may have their loans re-scheduled or have up to 25 percent of their loans, up to \$200,000, set aside for

five years with no interest. Farm loans held by commercial banks and other lenders that are classified as "problem loans," can be reduced by ten percent in exchange for an FmHA guarantee.

"We already know where qualified potential staff people are," Futch said, "and we hope to put them to work as soon as possible. Most of them are familiar with our loan processing requirements, and a minimum of new training should be required."

The additional personnel will be assigned to FmHA offices where the work load is greatest," Futch said. "The new temporary employees will include both loan specialists and clerical staff."

DECIDING ON RESIDING?

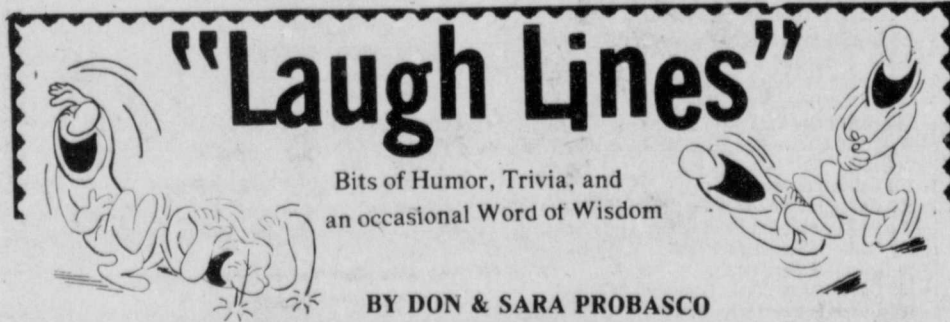
If you decide to re-side and hire a siding contractor, here are some guidelines for insuring that you get a quality product from a reputable dealer:

*Collect competitive estimates from dealers. Do labor costs include preparation work, such as removing old siding and clean up? Are trims and accessories included in the estimate?

*Ask for references from those who had siding put on by the dealer, and talk to them!

*Compare the warranty on the product as well as on the surface paint or coating - they may be different. Is the warranty on the house or the owner? Is it transferrable? If it is a lifetime warranty, is that defined?

*Choose a reliable contractor/dealer with experience and no unresolved reference problems in the past. You can check with the Better Business Bureau. Have a contract that includes a guarantee on work, lien agreement, time and payment schedule.

Gins providing totals include Brown Gin, Darty Gin, Floydada Co-Op Gins, Hendricks Barwise Gin, Lakeview Gin, Lockney Co-Op Gin, McCoy Gin, Scott Gin, Lockney Gin, Marble Brothers Gin, Providence Gin, Crume Gin, Evans Gin, and D&J Gin. Total bales reported were 130,613.

Farmers have produced considerably more cotton this year than the past years yielded, but it is proving to be worth less than in previous years. 1983 cotton prices ranged from 62 to 65 cents per pound, while current prices are closer to 40 cents per pound and may fall lower yet.

Area farmers had a good year for the most part. The weather and the crops cooperated to yield a promising harvest, but the depressed cotton prices may mean financial trouble to farmers who have debts to pay and who are preparing for spring planting.

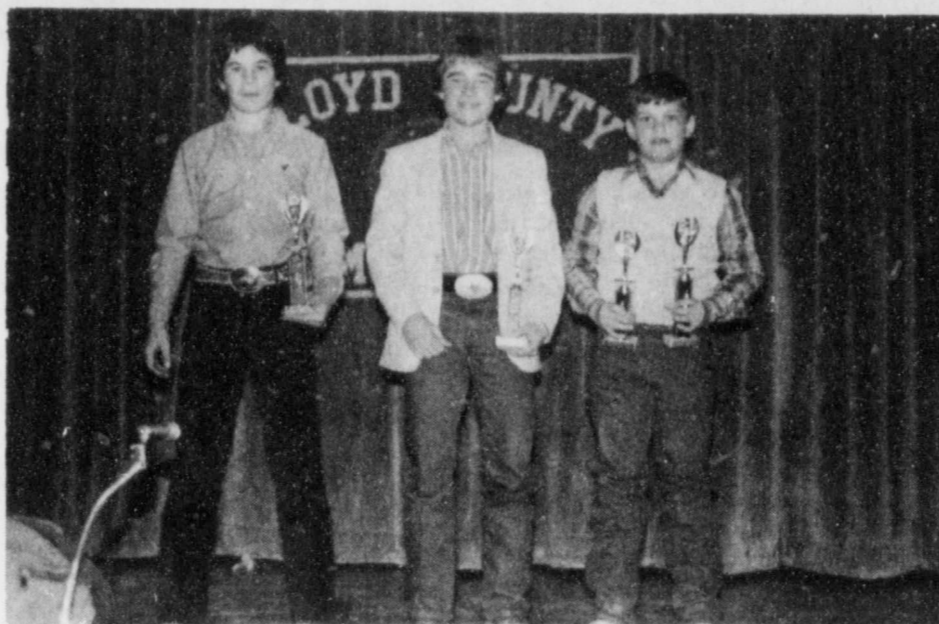

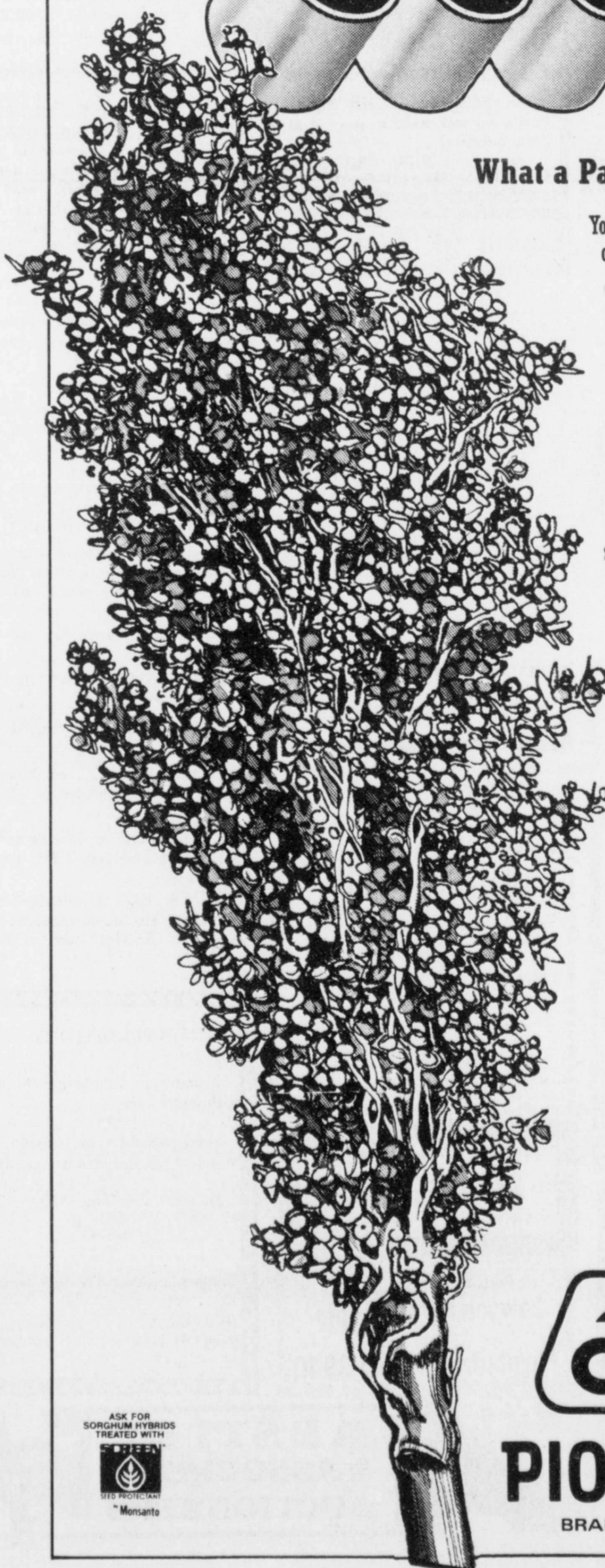

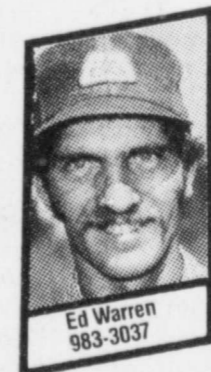
