The Lamplighter By Ken Towery

Will the world of wonders never cease?

Or, could we have been wrong all these years?

Press reports out of Washington indicate Ted Kennedy has made a "major" speech, calling on the Democratic Party to change its course. He urged his fellow Democrats to begin acting in the "broad national interests", even if it means disappointing some of their long term allies. They will have to curb their tendencies to promote high-priced government programs, promote efficiency in government, "do more with less", and admit that many programs have outlined their usefulness. "The mere existance of a program is no excuse for its perpetuation, whether it is a welfare plan or a weapons system," he is quoted as saying.

He even came out for merit pay for teachers, for goodness sake, and backed income tax simplification. He went on to say that "We must understand that there is a difference between being a party that cares about labor, without being a labor party, and there is a difference between being a party that cares about women without being a women's party. And we can and we must be a party that cares about minorities without becoming a minority

The political pundits up there were quick to say that Teddy is apparently "repositioning himself" for a possible presidential bid in 1988. If that is true it is good news, in a way. But it will be most disconserting to an awful lot of people, in both parties.

Throughout Ted's political life he has suffered from a strange affliction that seems to be endemic among eastern politicians, particularly those from Massachusetts That affliction causes them to believe that their own view of what's best for the country is the only view of what's best for the country, and that if the rest of the country believes differently, well, they just have to be "educated" to the correct view. They have had tremendous resources with which to help them in that educational process, and for many years it worked. But the people of our country do have the intellectual capacity to eventually sort out all that flim-flam and move in

the right direction. The problem I have with all this is that I have never thought of Teddy as being particularly bright. In that we seem to be in the minority, but my memory goes back to the days when he first came to the Senate as a freshman Senator from Massachusetts. One of his brothers was President, another was Attorney General, and Teddy, of course, was accorded a status far different than that given others serving their first term. He seemed far more concerned with the shape of a woman's ankle than he was about the shape of any legislation that might be considered in the Senate. As far as the business of the Senate was concerned, he wandered around in perpetual fog, guided by a staff of like-minded folks. He seemed to forever bend with the wind, or what his staff told him was the wind. And in those days the wind always blew from

the East. Now he has gotten much smarter, or at least the appearance is there. Either that or he is bending to what his staff tells him is a new wind, from the West and Southwest.

What this will do in terms of politics is yet to be determined. So devout are Teddy's true believers they will probably salute and take the new course. understanding that his heart is probably still where it always has been. But among the broad constituencies of organized labor, of the welfare community, and of the left in general, there is bound to be confusion and disarray. Teddy will have to explain his new position to them, in private, no doubt, and whether they will be satisfied with his explanations is open to question. In this day and age people can understand a switch in parties very easily, given the realignment that is going on. But a change in philosophy is something else. Continued On Page 2

Voting is light in elections

Jonelle Fawver in the county tax office estimated the total number of voters eligible to vote in the election to choose a mayor for Floydada at 2198. With only 562 ballots cast, this indicates that about 25% of the voters turned out. There were approximately 2852 voters eligible to cast ballots in the Floydada Independent School District election with 19%, or 555 voting. Only 12% of the voters who could have voted in the Caprock Hospital District election did so by Fawver's estimate, with 3177 eligible voters in precincts, 1, 3, and 4 of the county, of whom only 391 voted.

The city of Floydada will again have Parnell Powell serving as mayor. Powell ran unopposed, receiving 480 votes. Five write-in candidates received 33 votes with Bill Dawson taking the most at 27. Sammy Hale and Carroll Sims each received two votes and one vote each went to Bill Hardin and Wayne

Council positions were once again won by the incumbents, Wayne Russell with 427 votes and Frank Breed with 358 votes. Challengers Ginger Warren with 199 votes and Tino Morales with 82 votes were joined by four write-in candidates in defeat. Oscar Garza received 14 write-in votes and Oscar Sanchez, Joe Martinez, and Larry Ogden each received one.

All three recently appointed members of the Floydada Independent School Board were returned to office by local voters. Freddie Morren received 459 votes, Weldon Pruitt received 338, and Hulon Carthel received 361 votes. The only challenger to the board was Joyce Kimble who received 241 votes. Sixtyseven write-in votes were cast for Larry Barbee and 10 for Tino Morales.

The three incumbent Caprock Hospital District board members running for reelection were returned to office with Jo Wester and Don Bean receiving 386 votes each while Louis Anderson received 384 votes. There were eleven write-in candidates when the tabulations were finished. Tino Morales and Joe Martinez each received three votes and Aaron Carthel, Kinder Farris, and Jim Word each received two votes. Larry Barbee, R.O. Turner, Don Hardy, Leonard Matsler, Sammy Hale, and Bill Hale each received one vote.

Court approves audit

Fred Thayer of Gary, Thayer, and Bowers, CPA presented the proposal for conducting the yearly audit now required for any entity receiving more than \$100,000 in revenue sharing funds during a year. The county is required to provide an audit of revenue sharing funds for the fiscal year of 1984 to revenue sharing officials. Thayer proposed billing the county on an hourly basis with the audit taking approximately 130 hours at a cost of approximately \$5,000.00. "The conversion to the accrual basis of accounting which was made in connection with the audit done last year cost us more than \$9,000.00 in time and work. We charged the county only the pre-audit agreed upon of \$4,500.00," said Thayer. The court agreed to the terms of the audit and approved the local firm for the

Both the county auditor and the county treasurer submitted their reports on the financial status of the county as of March 31. County auditor Bobbie Hamilton reported, "We have spent a little less than one fourth of the budget as of this date." Minor budget adjustments totaling \$438.00 were necessary to facilitate the payment of current obligations were made by the court.

County treasurer, Glenna Orman reported that the county has earned interest to date of \$22,462.23 on money invested in CD's.

The court approved payment of monthly bills with the exception of a hospital bill on a local jail prisoner. The court tabled payment of the bill pending action by the hospital board of directors on a request for adjustment of the charges to a lower figure. Also tabled at the meeting on April 8 was the issue of increasing the fee for housing out of county prisoners in the Floyd County jail facility. Sheriff Fred Cardinal was unable to be present at the session due to ill health, and the matter could not be

"We will also have stickers for people to put on their windows and doors letting burglars know that the property is marked inside," said Hale. "This discourages burglars from even coming into the house.'

"People also need to know," says Hale, "that if you get a security survey done on your home and implement the recommendations, it may even lead to a reduction in your insurance rates."

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
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FFA president addresses banquet

thew Redding, Shannon Edwards, and Troy Don Faulkenberry.



While proposals as to specific rates vary, it is expected that the requested rate schedule will furnish a 10.5 percent increase in the Company's unadjusted test year intrastate revenues or a 9.7% increase in test year revenues as adjusted for test year customer growth and annualization of test year rate increases. The rate application seeks an annual increase of \$323.9 million in revenues. All customers and classes of customers of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company within

Texas will be affected by the proposed changes. Most rates proposed for increase would increase by about 18.5 percent, including local exchange rates. However, there are some exceptions. For example, those customers residing in cities that will be reclassified into larger rate groups will experience local exchange rate increases greater than 18.5 percent. Also, the rate increases proposed for private line services in El Paso, due to a proposal to restructure such rates, are greater than 18.5 percent.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas and with each affected incorporated municipality served by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's rate application.
