

## Warren submits Mother's Day poem

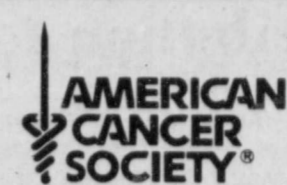
The following poem was submitted by Bud Warren, in memory of his mother, Mrs. R.E. Warren, and dedicated to the mother of his children and other good mothers.

## Residents endangered by shooting incident

A shooting on May 6th at approximately 12:30 p.m. at 10th Street and Virginia endangered residents in their homes and passengers in a vehicle by leaving two bullets in a passing car and a bullet in two nearby residences.

According to James Hale, Acting Police Chief of Floydada, "A car occupied by three men was traveling north on 10th Street when they were fired upon by assailants. Four shots were fired with two shots going into the complainants' car and two shots going into two different homes. No one was injured; an investigation is underway."

James Lyle Pope pled guilty Monday, April 20, in the 110th Judicial District

Court to two counts: escape from Floyd County Jail and the unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. He received two three year sentences in the Texas Department of Corrections.

Pope escaped the early morning hours of March 9 due to an improperly locked door, and turned himself in to the Plainview Sheriff's Department later in the day. He was being held in the Floyd County Jail for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle out of Motley County when he escaped.

Also, on April 29th in the 110th Judicial Court, 20 year old Morris Dean Knott pled guilty to Burglary of a Vehicle. He received a three year probated sentence.

## Mobile home damaged by water heater fire Monday

Floydada Fire Department responded to a call on May 6 at approximately 6:00 p.m. to a mobile home fire at 1010 South Tree Street.

The mobile home is located in Evans Traller Park and owned by Ruth Evans, Leighton and Sandy Batey are current residents of the mobile home. Sandy Batey, her son, Anthony and her two brothers were at home at the time that the fire broke out. She said, "I smelled something burning and sent my brother outside to see what it was. He went out and came running back in and told me to get my son out of his room, because the water heater was on fire."

Bobby Weiborn, fire chief, stated,

"It appears the fire started in the hot water heater. The floor gave way a little and caused the hot water heater to drop down slightly."

The estimated damage at this time is accessed at \$2500.00 with the heaviest fire damage in the water heater closet. There was minor fire damage to the kitchen area and heavy smoke damage throughout the trailer, with some water damage also.

There were no injuries. "Thanks needs to go to the prompt reaction by the fire department," says Mrs. Evans. "They got here so fast, and all the neighbors were great in helping out during the emergency."

## TCR establishes goals

Texans for Children's Rights (TCR) announced the establishment of specific goals and by-laws under which the organization will operate at a May 2 community meeting. According to chairman Jimmy McGaugh, "There are two goals. The first is to raise \$20,000. This will enable us to pay the retainer fee for a lawyer to pursue the second goal. We intend to file a class action lawsuit against the state school board to modify the rules of House Bill 72. We want the six week ineligibility amended to a one week ineligibility."

The by-laws state that the committee may consist of any number of persons and that all money raised will be expended for the lawsuit. In the event the group disbands before completion of a lawsuit, all money collected will be returned to the donors.

The organization has had expressions of support from numerous communities around the state. A regional magazine published from White Deer is to carry

an article about TCR in the June issue. The group plans to erect a booth on Old Settlers Day in Floydada to collect donations and dispense information concerning the aims of TCR.

"Donations have begun to come in slowly, but we have pledges from many areas," stated Lynn Marler, one of the founders of the organization. "We are also conducting a letter to the editor campaign throughout the area."

McGaugh says, "We are having a

flyer made up and are trying to get a date to set up in the mall in Lubbock. The public needs to be aware of what we are fighting. A lot of parents won't realize what a six week ineligibility can mean to a student until it happens to their child."

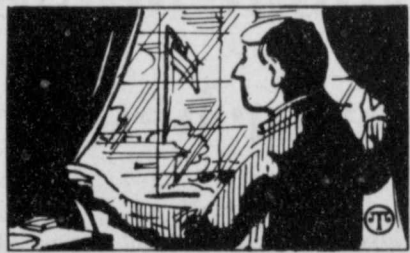

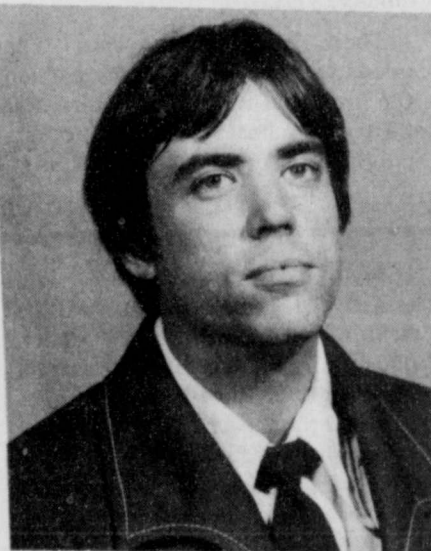

### OF TARIFF CHANGE FOR PRIVATE LINE CUSTOMERS

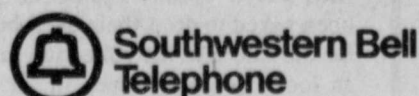

We have the lawyers who are willing to take the case, but, we must have a \$20,000 retainer fee. This would be 500 people willing to give \$40 each or 1000 giving \$20 each.

Dear Editor:

This letter is in response to the letter from Lynn Marler of Floydada that appeared in the Silvertown paper last week. I am a mother of 3 boys, and I am also interested in "children's rights," although I believe they are achieved in a different way than through UIL sports. I believe it is the right of all of our children to obtain the best education possible to equip them to function as an adult once they leave the educational environment. Therefore, school courses should have precedence over sports.

I believe I can safely say that at least 99% of the students who graduate from any small West Texas school will not make a living in pro sports. However, they will probably be called upon to use their minds in whatever profession they pursue - and what will be in their minds if they are prone to failing and only excel in sports?

There may be many parts of House Bill 72 that are too stringent, but I certainly do not feel this is one of them. I say keep the extra-curricular activities in their place - after lessons and classwork. Let the bad grades that keep students from participating be an incentive for them to perform better in the classroom.

If one wants to spend money to assure children of their "rights," let us use the money to broaden the curriculum of the schools to teach our children to be creative and equip them to compete in the job market after graduation. At Silvertown High we do not have such courses available as foreign languages, art, music, journalism, mechanical drawing, shop, woodworking, sociology or psychology. These courses, rather than football or basketball make for a more well-rounded personality. I say let our children have fun in extracurricular activities only if and when they prove themselves in the classroom. And if we're really concerned about their "rights," given them a better education.

## Social Security News

Several firms are operating across the nation that solicit people through direct mail and advertisements in various publications. These firms are selling services which are provided at no charge by every social security office.

The most common is the company which obtains local marriage records and then mails new brides an offer to change their name in social security records for a \$10 fee. This service can be obtained without charge at any social security office. In addition, the bride has to do everything for the company she would have to do if she contacted social security in the first place.

For a bride to change her name in social security records, she needs the original or certified copy of her marriage certificate showing both her new and old names. The bride can contact the Plainview social security office simply by calling 293-9623 to start the

process.

The other service being sold is to obtain a copy of a person's record of earnings covered by social security or providing an estimate of future social security benefits. These, too, can be obtained through any social security office without any charge.

To get a statement of earnings covered by social security, all a person has to do is get Form SSA-7004PC, available free at any social security office, complete it, and mail it. In return he or she will receive an extract of his or her social security record.

People younger than 60 can get a benefit estimate by making the request on the form. People 60 or older can get an immediate benefit estimate at any social security office. There is no charge for these services.

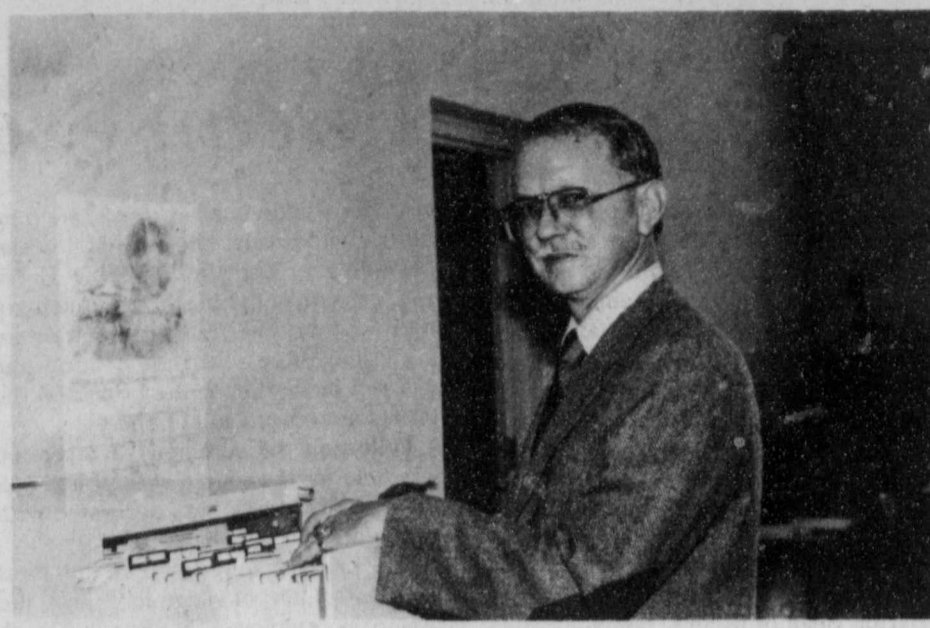

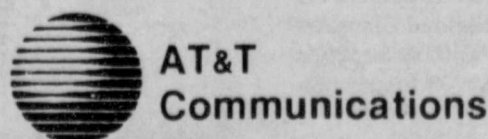
### REMEMBER THESE SAFETY TIPS

- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.
