# Residents endangered by shooting incident

A shooting on May 6th at approximately 12:30 p.m. at 10th Street and Virginia endangered residents in their homes and passengers in a vehicle by leaving two bullets in a passing car and a bullet in two nearby residences.

According to James Hale, Acting Police Chief of Floydada, "A car occupied by three men was traveling north on 10th Street when they were fired upon by assailants. Four shots were fired with two shots going into the complainants' car and two shots going into two different homes. No one was injured; an investigation is underway."

# City Council meets in called special session

# TCR establishes goals

Texans for Children's Rights (TCR) announced the establishment of specific goals and by-laws under which the organization will operate at a May 2 community meeting. According to chairman Jimmy McGaugh, "There are two goals. The first is to raise \$20,000. This will enable us to pay the retainer fee for a lawyer to pursue the second goal. We intend to file a class action lawsuit against the state school board to modify the rules of House Bill 72. We want the six week ineligibility amended to a one week ineligibility."

The by-laws state that the committee may consist of any number of persons and that all money raised will be expended for the lawsuit. In the event the group disbands before completion of a lawsuit, all money collected will be returned to the donors.

The organization has had expressions of support from numerous communities around the state. A regional magazine published from White Deer is to carry

an article about TCR in the June issue. The group plans to erect a booth on Old Settlers Day in Floydada to collect donations and dispense information concerning the aims of TCR.

"Donations have begun to come in slowly, but we have pledges from many areas," stated Lynn Marler, one of the founders of the organization. "We are also conducting a letter to the editor campaign throughout the area."

McGaugh says, "We are having a





# **SocialSecurity News**

by Terry J. Cements

Several firms are operating across the nation that solicit people through direct mail and advertisements in various publications. These firms are selling services which are provided at no charge by every social security office.

The most common is the company. which obtains local marriage records and then mails new brides an offer to change their name in social security records for a \$10 fee. This service can be obtained without charge at any social security office. In addition, the bride has to do everything for the company she would have to do if she contacted social security in the first place.

For a bride to change her name in social security records, she needs the original or certified copy of her marriage certificate showing both her new and old names. The bride can contact the Plainview social security office simply by calling 293-9623 to start the

The other service being sold is to obtain a copy of a person's record of earnings covered by social security or providing an estimate of future social security benefits. These, too, can be obtained through any social security office without any charge.

To get a statement of earnings covered by social security, all a person has to do is get Form SSA-7004PC, available free at any social security office, complete it, and mail it. In return he or she will receive an extract of his or her social security record.

People younger than 60 can get a benefit estimate by making the request on the form. People 60 or older can get an immediate benefit estimate at any social security office. There is no charge for these services.

The Museum has family files, many of which contain lineage charts, family group sheets and items of interest on several Floyd County families. Anyone having information or items of interest



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

High Plains cotton producers signed contracts to enroll 4,566,015 upland cotton acres in the 1985 acreage reduction program, 93.1 percent of the 4,902,985-acre total base for the 25county area represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

Corresponding figures for all of Texas are 7,162,087 acres enrolled (73.6%) out of an 8,118,243-acre base. For the 19-state U.S. Cotton Belt producers signed up 13,094,290 acres (72%) of a 15,825,600-acre total. The highest percentage sign-up among the major producing states was in Missouri with just over 80 percent of the acreage base enrolled. Lowest percentage was in California where only 53 percent of growers elected to participate in the

Farmers who signed to participate in

agreed to reduce base acreage plantings by at least 30 percent. They qualify for a diversion payment of six cents per pound on one-third of the reduction, access to non-recourse loans, and deficiency payments if the average cotton price to U.S. farmers in 1985 falls below the 81-cent target price. Deficiency payments will equal the difference between the 81-cent target and the 57.3-cent base loan or the U.S. average farm price for the year, whichever is

# Mesquites need spraying

This may be the year to put the "whammy" on mesquite.

Soil moisture conditions are a key to mesquite control, and good rains since last fall over most of Texas should increase the effectiveness of mesquite control with foliar herbicides, says Dr. Tommy Welch with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Now that mesquite is starting to grow actively due to good soil moisture, ranchers should gear up for a spray program, notes Welch, a range bush and weed control specialist. Correct timing and proper application are most critical.

Before applying a herbicide, make sure mesquite leaves are fully extended and have turned from light to dark green in color, advises the specialist. This usually occurs about 40 days after bud break.

Spraying during the period of seed pod elongation will result in less control because the plants are using food reserves. Also, about 90 days after bud break, control with foliar herbicides decreases as wax builds up on leaves and overall growth slows down, Welch

Proper timing also relates to soil temperature. Research by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Tech University has shown that soil temperature at 12 to 18 inches of depth should be 75 degrees F. or above for good control of mesquite.

Soils on upland range sites and soils with a higher sand content usually warm up faster than bottomland and clay soils. Thus ranchers need to pay attention to particular sites when planning a mesquite control program, suggests the specialist.

If rains during the spraying period start new leaf growth on mesquite plants, leaves should be allowed to mature before spraying. If foliage is damaged by insects, disease or hail, do not spray until new foliage has deve-

loped and mature, advises Welch. Four herbicides are registered and effective for mesquite control on rangeland, says the specialist. These include triclopyr (Grazon ET); 2,4,5-T; picloram
