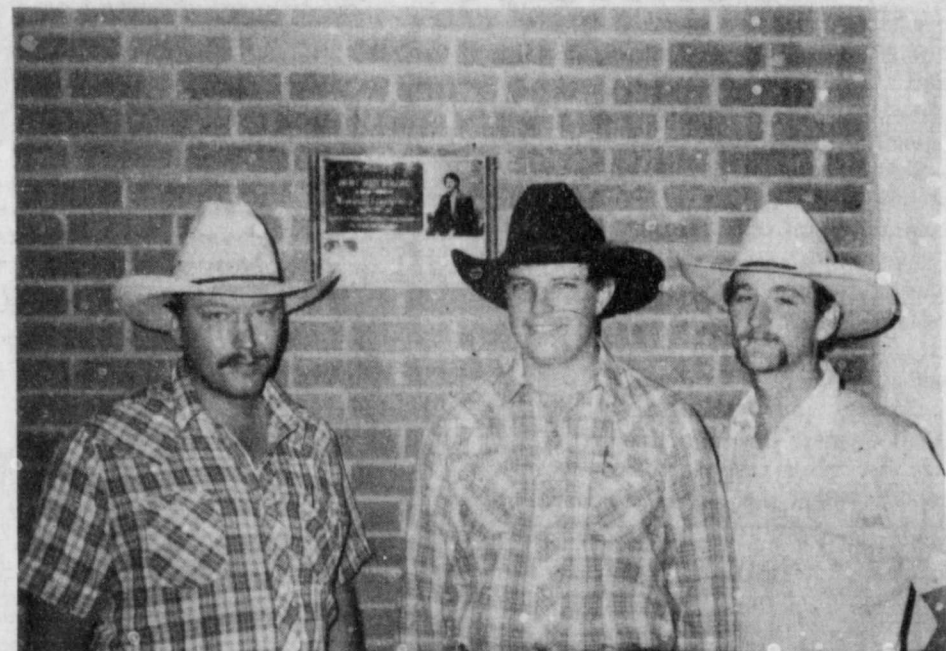
Kent Pittillo, a graduate of Olton High School and Clarendon Jr. College with an Associate of Science Degree, is farming in the Olton area while seeking

## County Commissioners work on \$2 million budget

Floyd County Commissioners Court conducted a budget work session at a special called meeting on July 22. The proposed budget includes estimated revenues of \$2,018,887.46 and estimated expenditures of \$1,739,803.52. With these figures, and barring any unforeseen emergencies or circumstances, the county should complete the 1986 budget year with a surplus of \$208,580.00.

Budgetary requests from all county departments were reviewed and will be taken under consideration for inclusion in the budget when it is finalized early

next month. The proposed budget allows for a 5% salary increase for employees. The court also expects to set a tax rate at that time.

Easements for the right of way on the Baker Road project were signed at the Monday session. Representatives of the Texas Highway Department assisted County Judge Choise Smith in explaining the procedure to county residents living on or owning the property needed for the road expansion. The necessary signatures were obtained with a mini-

## FISD school board discusses appropriations

A budget workshop on July 22 has put the finishing touches on the 1985-86 Floydada ISD budget. The more than four million dollars scheduled for expenditure includes \$2,961,431.00 for salaries. Expenditures for Floydada High School total \$619,956.00 and the Junior High budget is expected to total \$454,238.00. R.C. Andrews Elementary has been allotted \$326,224.00 and A.B. Duncan will have a budget of \$513,307.00.

No area has been scheduled for a decrease in appropriations. Total expenditures for athletics is currently calculated at \$54,750.00. The Vocational Agriculture program will receive \$8,748.00 in local funds and will share in the \$17,680.00 in federal matching funds allotted to all vocational departments.

The district has a carryover surplus of more than \$400,000.00 to begin the year. This will allow the financial obligations to be met without borrowing money to operate on until school funds for 1985-86 begin to arrive in October.

"This is the first time we will not have to borrow money to begin the school year in the eight years I have been here," said superintendent Jerry Cannon. "I do not know how long it has been since this district was able to operate in the black."

The proposed current budget is expected to increase the surplus to more than \$500,000.00. Cannon hopes this extra financial security will allow the board to refrain from having to raise taxes within the next several years and still provide an increasingly better education for Floydada youngsters.

For those wondering how Floydada Independent School District measures up to statewide averages, here is the answer. FISD gets an above average grade in school property tax rates for the 1984-85 school year because the trustees lowered the tax rate instead of raising it as most other districts did. FISD also rates above average in the amount of money expended per student, using more than \$300.00 more than the state average. The overall ratio

of teachers to students is also a high scoring category. FISD maintained a teacher-student ratio of four students less than the statewide average.

On the down side, FISD used 5% more of the available money for salaries. The other major area in which FISD lags behind the state averages is teacher salaries. Floydada teachers earn, on the average, \$2,000.00 less than the average teacher salary in Texas.

Changes in the educational system and the financing of that system which resulted from the special session of the legislature during the summer of 1984 increased state aid to local schools by \$1 billion last year. State aid to local school districts totaled \$4.6 billion which was financed by the largest tax bill in the state's history.

Not to be outdone, school trustees in 1,068 local school districts levied the largest school property tax increase in history. The increase, totaling \$519 million raised the total tax bill to \$4.1 billion. Locally, this was not the case. The Floydada Independent School District decreased its total tax levy by 4.4% for the 1984-85 school year. This compares to a 14.3% increase for the average Texas school district.

These figures come from the latest issue of Benchmarks For 1985-86 School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the Texas Research League. The league is an Austin based educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

School budgets adopted last year called for the spending of \$3,103 per

student for current operations. The Floydada ISD budget provided for \$3,445.90 per student based on an average daily attendance of 1161 students during 1983-84.

Four of every five dollars were spent for salaries. Statewide, payroll expense averaged \$2,487 per student. The Floydada district averaged \$2,647 per student. Payroll expense is a combination of salary levels and staffing patterns.

The average salary for classroom teachers paid by the Floydada Independent School District in 1983-84 was \$17,936. The average among all school districts in Texas was \$20,117 per classroom teacher.

Floydada schools were able to maintain a teacher-student ratio of one teacher for twelve students, compared to a statewide pupil teacher ratio of one to 16.2. Because of small classes, especially on the high school level, and abbreviated teaching schedules, many classes have more than the average number of students. The new educational reforms require no more than 22 students in kindergarten, first, or second grade classes this year.

School property tax rates in 1984-85 average \$0.622 per \$100 or market value (selling price). The local rate was \$0.650, making the school property tax on a \$100,000 property \$650.00. An additional \$0.08 is collected on the local level to be applied to bonded debt retirement. This makes the effective tax rate for Floydada ISD \$0.730.

## U. S. Postal Service is 210 years old in July

The forerunner of the United States Postal Service was quietly born on July 26, 1775 when the Second Continental Congress met in Philadelphia. The concept originated, however, in 1639 when the General Court of Massachusetts designated a tavern in Boston as the official repository for all mail received or sent overseas.

Mail services continued to be operated on a local level until 1691. At that time, Englishman Thomas Neale received a 21 year grant to operate the North American Postal Service on a franchise costing \$0.80 per year. Andrew Hamilton was appointed Deputy Postmaster General. A succession of appointees followed until 1753 when Benjamin Franklin and William Hunter were appointed joint Postmasters General for the colonies.

With the increasing unrest between Britain and the Colonies, Franklin was removed from his post in 1774. Fueled by the suspicion with which the colonists viewed the British postal services, William Goddard established a Constitutional Post for inter-colonial mail service in 1774. This service flourished until the adoption of the postal system set up by the Continental Congress and the appointment of Benjamin Franklin as Postmaster General in 1775.

Americans today enjoy the services of an organization which descends in an unbroken line from the operation planned and placed into service by Franklin. Mail service contracts are credited as the single most important factor in the development of the great highways, railways, and airways which now span the United States. Modern mail service has evolved from foot to horseback, to stage, steamboat, railroad, automobile, and airplane in direct proportion to the settling of the shifting American frontier.

The United States Postal Service now handles approximately 131,544,620,000 pieces of mail of year. Employees number more than 700,000 and more than 200,000 vehicles are used to deliver mail each day. More than 176,315 city and rural routes are served daily.

If the postal service were considered a non-government business, it would be the second largest employer, the second largest retail business, and the largest transportation related business in the nation. All in all, a great accomplishment for an organization which originated with a mail repository in a colonial Boston tavern 210 years ago.

owned by a senior citizen, the school tax would be less because of various exemptions. Open-space land that qualified be valued on its productivity value rather than market value. Revenue lost due to these exemptions last year totaled \$780 million, an increase of \$99.5 million over the previous year's total. To compensate for this, most school districts raised the tax rate last year. Floydada ISD was one of the few fortunate ones to give taxpayers a decrease.

Texas school districts received more than a billion dollars in state aid during the 1984-85 school district. Only \$129 million in additional aid will be distributed to school districts for the 1985-86 school year. 492 districts will receive more money. The other 576 will receive smaller amounts. This strategy to equalize was developed under the assumption that local school property taxes will remain about the same. The Texas Research League's report concludes however, that the large increases of last year will substantially negate the equalization of legislature tried to achieve.

The local school district in Floydada anticipates no tax rate increase this year. A budget totaling over \$4 million has been proposed and is being researched and developed at present. Approximately 75% of this amount is scheduled to go to salaries.

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## Finley retires after forty-nine years of service

On July 26, 1985, the United States Postal Service celebrates 210 years of operation. One Floydada family has been a part of this operation for over sixty years. Wayne Finley, the second generation of three to have served, recently retired from the Postal Service with 49 years of service.

Finley began working as a substitute rural carrier in 1936, the same year he and Beulah Francis (Pansy) Shirey married. He carried mail for his father-in-law, G.N. Shirey.

When Shirey relinquished his mail route in 1980 after 56 years, Finley became the regular carrier on the route.

Born in Jacks County in 1913, Finley came to Floyd County at the age of six. He attended school in Floydada and farmed in the area. The Finleys raised their family on the combined income from the mail route and his farming.

Finley says he enjoyed his work with the Post Office and with the patrons he served. When asked if he had noticed any great changes in the post office during the years he worked Finley replied, "The people in the offices and the town carriers probably saw more changes than I did. Rural carriers have not seen so many." He added, "It was the same old work and when it rained, it was the same old mud."

The routes changed considerably in length and so did some of the roads," stated Finley. "So did the vehicles. My

father-in-law delivered mail in a model A Ford with a plywood body. He called it a gully jumber and he could get around when no one else could."

Pansy Finley says, "It seems as though I have never really known anything else but the mail." She explained, saying, "I used to help my father whenever I could and then my husband. Since they ran rural routes, I used to be able to go along. Now my son works for the Post Office, too."

The Finley's son, Jerry, has been employed by the Postal Office for about 18 years. He recently transferred to the Levelland office from Floydada.

The Finleys also have two daughters, Kay Tipton of Plainview and Pat Conklin of Pampa.

Finley recalls his days on the mail route with humor and joy. He remembers being written by only one dog, and "that was more of a pinch," said Finley. "The dog was very old and had no teeth. It belonged to Bill Stringer. The old dog just sort of gummied me on the leg while a little dog did all the barking," laughed Finley.

Recovering rapidly from a recent bout will ill health, Finley is cheerful and looking forward to relaxing. A retirement party was held for him at the Ronnie Smith residence on July 22. There, among his family, friends, and former co-workers, Postmaster Gary Reckling presented the former employee with a certificate of appreciation.

"The postal service has grown and operated for over 200 years through the hard work and dedication of employees

like Wayne. We are sorry to see him retire, but we wish him the very best as he does," stated Reckling.

Members of the Youth Conservation Corps from the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge and their leaders Rod Krey and former Floydada resident, Britt Gregory, toured the Floyd County Historical Museum Saturday morning. Texas, and Tanya Tyer, cousin of the bride of Hale Center.

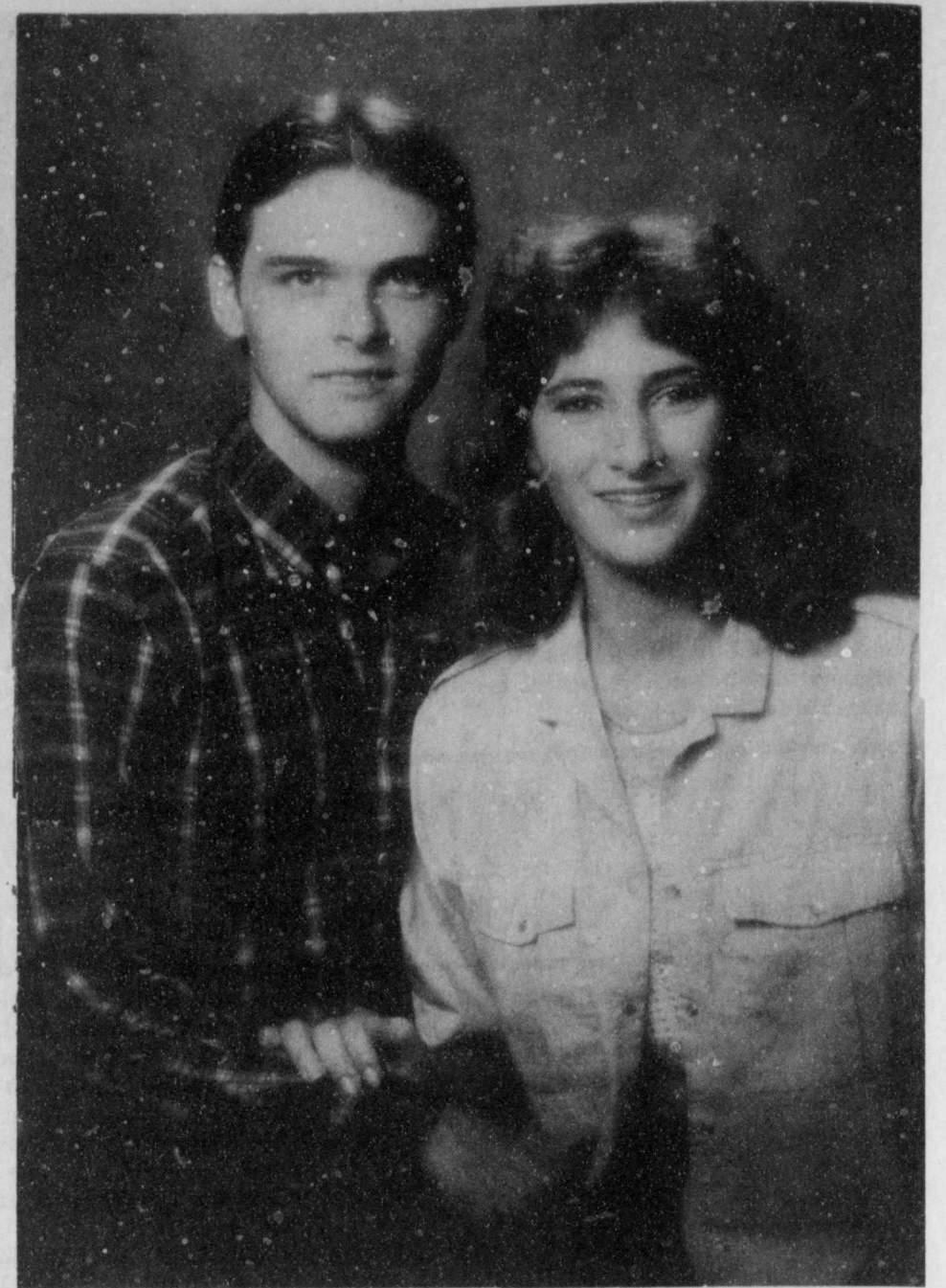

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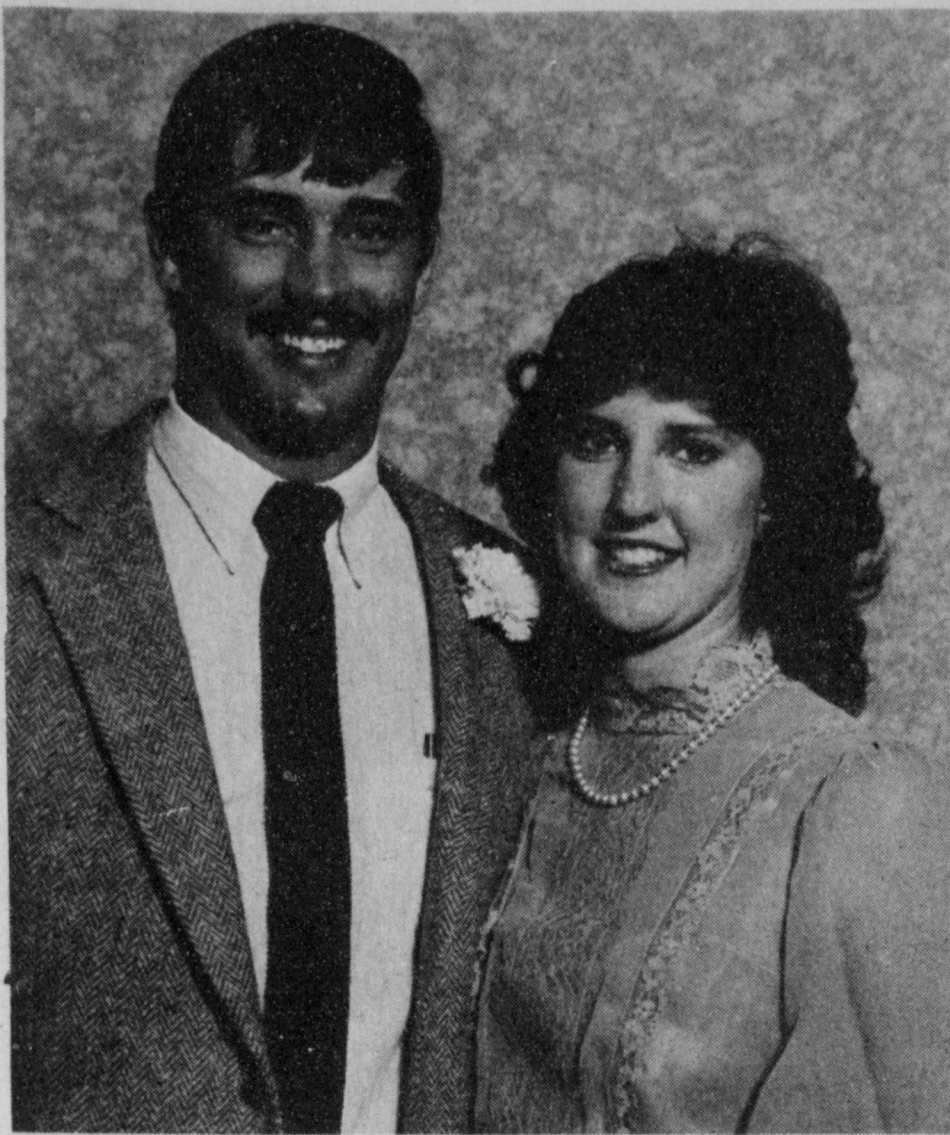

## Floydada sales tax shows 13.96% increase

Floydada's city sales tax rebate for the month of July totaled \$4,878.00 bringing the total for the year to \$57,322.62. This reflects an increase of 13.96% over the 1984 total at this time. Lockney totals show an increase of 11.34% over the 1984 totals in July after receiving a check for \$2,026.10 this month.

1,001 other cities in Texas that levy

the one percent city tax also received rebates for July this week. State Comptroller Bob Bullock mailed checks totaling more than \$56.8 million to participating towns. July payments reflect taxes collected on sales made in May and reported to the comptroller by June 20.

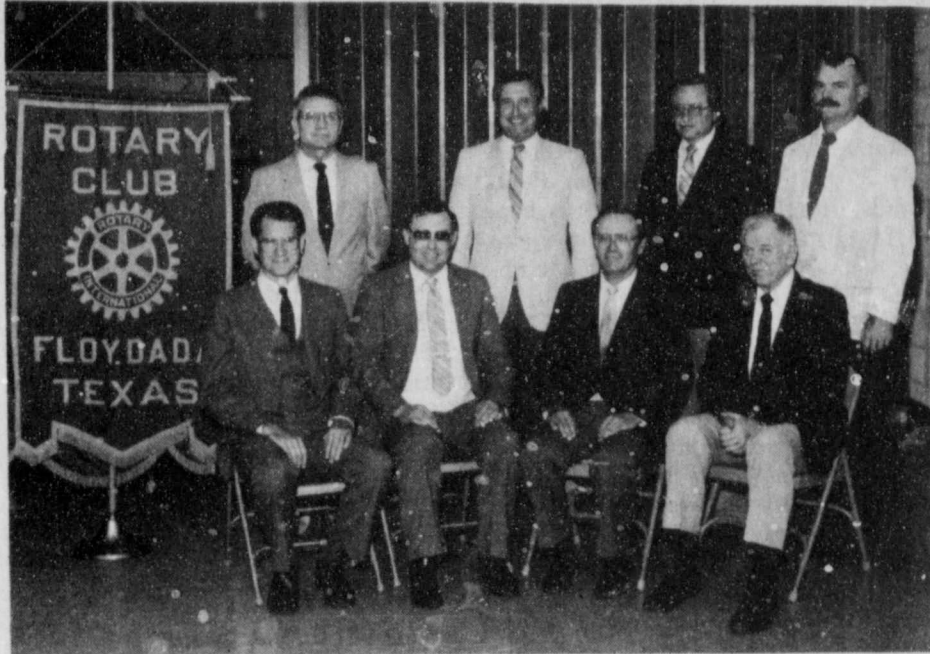
Checks ranged from a low of \$503.65 for Roaring Springs to a high of \$9.5

million for Houston. Lubbock received \$795,500.72 this month. This brings the total for 1985 up to \$7,414,804.83, an increase of 4.18% over the same date in 1984.

Hale county cities show increases with Plainview posting a 7.05% increase over 1984 after receiving \$65,661.98 this period. This brings their total to \$614,877.23 so far in 1985. Petersburg received a check for \$812.83, bringing that city's total to \$12,631.66, an increase of 15.81% above the same month in 1984. Abernathy has totaled \$31,010.39, a 3.49% increase over the July 1984 total after adding in a \$3,328.01 check this month Hale Center received \$1,609.03, reflecting an increase of 2.14% over 1984. Matador received a \$983.76 payment, bringing their total to \$11,694.28. This

total reflects an increase of 10.44% over the total at this time in 1984. Quitaque received a check in the amount of \$800.95, raising their 1985 total to \$6,804.02, an increase of 8.31% over the 1984 totals at this time. Silverton has shown an increase of 0.09% with the July payment of \$860.36, bringing the year to date total to \$10,712.52.

Crosby county cities also posted increases. Lorenzo lead the field with an increase of 19.13% after receiving this month's rebate of \$1,106.92. The year to date total for that city is \$13,317.65. Crosbyton has generated a 10.63% increase over 1984 with a July payment of \$1,545.15, bringing their total to \$27,640.64. Ralls reported the smallest increase, 2.19%. The current payment of \$2,715.14 brings that city's 1985 total to \$29,182.64.

## No-pass, no-play rule remains in effect

A Texas Supreme Court ruling upholding the no-pass, no-play section of 1984's House Bill 72 makes the law a certainty to contend with at the beginning of the 1985-86 school year. The nine Texas justices affirmed the constitutionality of the law, overturning an earlier opposite ruling by a Houston state district court judge. Made on Wednesday, July 10, the ruling has generated little change in local opinion.

The controversial no-pass, no-play rule is still viewed with a jaundiced eye. On the whole, local school officials agree with the intent and purpose of the plan. A student who is failing a course needs to bring the grades up. The major point of disagreement is the six-week suspension from school sponsored activities which results when a student receives a six-weeks grade below 70 in any subject.

"I am against the six-weeks suspension," stated Floydada Independent School District superintendent, Jerry Cannon. "I believe it is too long. I also feel that this law penalizes the student who cares enough to become involved while it does nothing to encourage the student who doesn't care about school work or extra curricular activities."

High school principal Ronnie Wood said, "I feel that the no-pass, no-play rule has a place. My main concern is the length of the suspension." He explained his statement by saying, "Kids that really try and have difficulty may view

the suspension period as a punishment rather than as an incentive to do better. My concern is for the small portion of students it affects adversely."

"Six weeks is an eternity to a student. The lost workouts or missed practices will make it difficult for a student to maintain his proficiency and condition."

Floydada High School athletic director Joe Paty said, "It is here, we have got it, we are going to work with it, and we are going to encourage our kids." He also expressed the desire to see the six week suspension modified to a lesser time period in the future. "ing in any field, academic or athletic," stated Paty. "We intend to encourage our students and emphasize the positive aspects of doing well academically while they are a part of our athletic program."

Paty expressed no fears that the local athletic programs would suffer excessively from suspension of athletic students. Based upon his experience with the suspensions during the spring semester, Paty said, "Only six or eight out of sixty involved in the track program were declared ineligible. I believe there were two in the golf program and four in tennis," he said.

Lynn Marler, a local resident who has spoken out and actively pursued the revocation of the six week suspension feels that the length of the suspension period will be addressed at a later date and could possibly go to the federal court system if a favorable state decision is not forthcoming.

"The majority of our citizens are opposed to the six week suspension, not to the no-pass, no-play aspect of the law," says Marler. "I firmly believe that this will eventually force a change. Our local organization, Texans for Children's Rights, has discontinued plans to file a lawsuit in view of the several suits already underway in the Houston area. We are lending our support to these ongoing efforts."

The Texas High School Coaches Association and the Texas Association of School Administrators organizations expect the number of litigations to increase dramatically after the first six weeks grades become available after school begins in the fall. "Many people who have not been effected up to now will be touched this fall due to such activities as football, cheerleading, and marching band," said a spokesman for the groups.

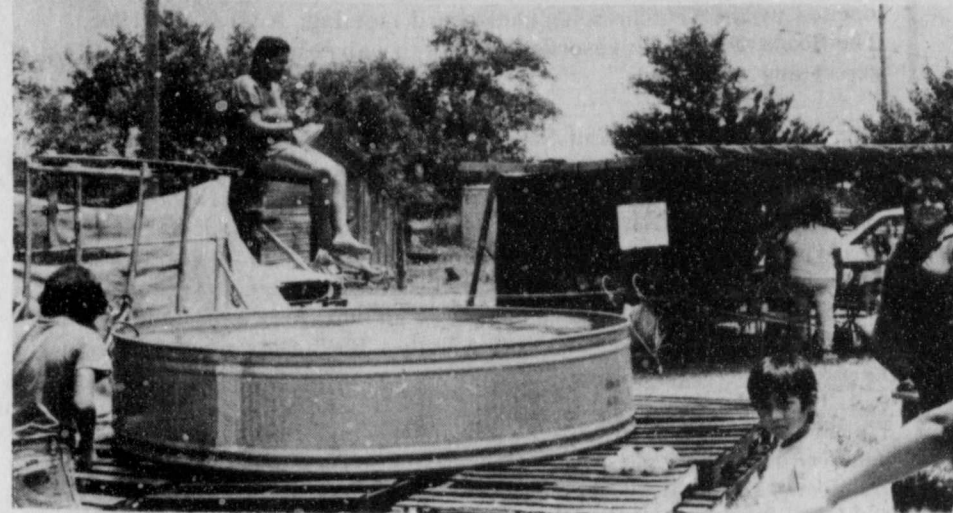

Tuesday morning devotions were by Rev. Travis Curry. In the afternoon we had a good time of Bible study, about the healing of Naaman.

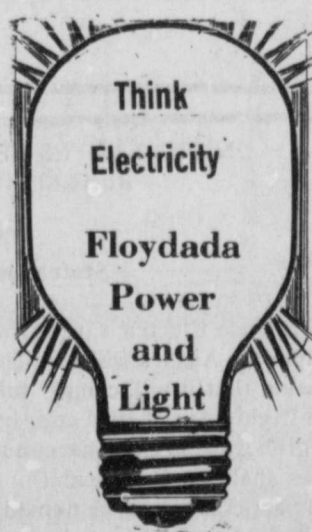

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## McPherson speaks in Lockney

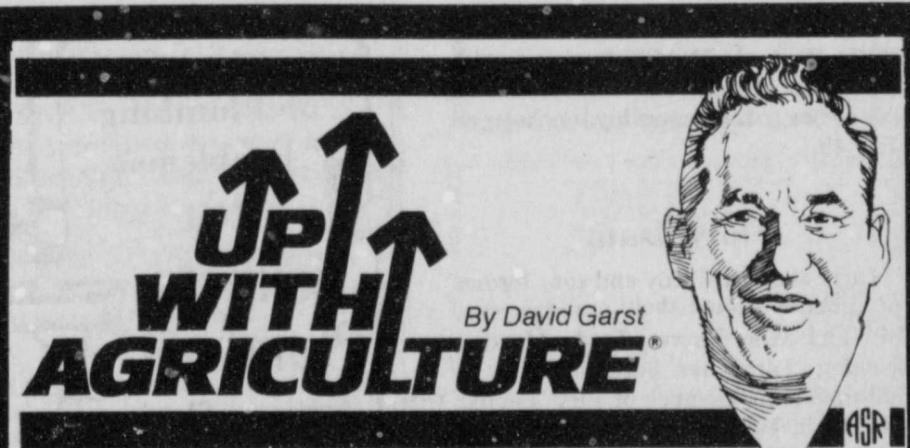
Becky McPherson of Plainview was guest speaker at the monthly meeting of Lockney Business and Professional Women's Club.

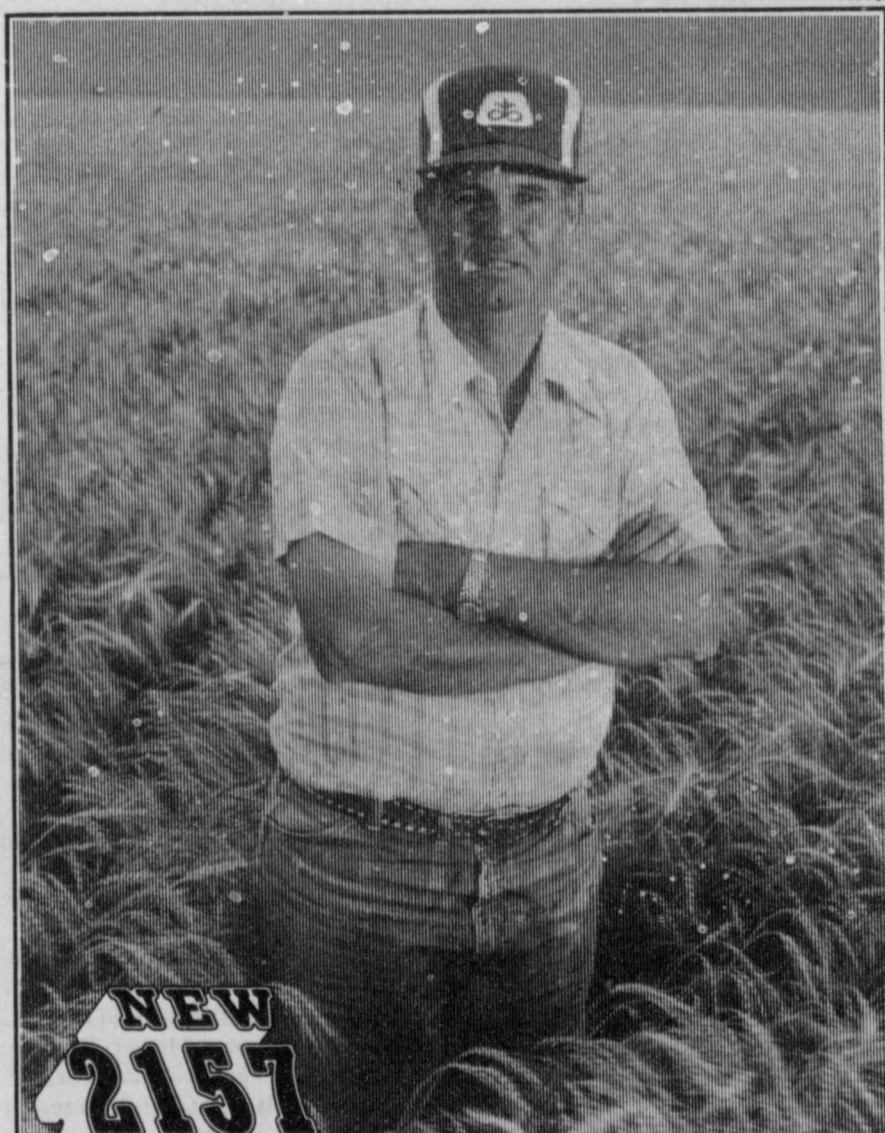
But through it all, as Barbara points out, they remain kids, always finding time to build a treehouse or play ball. Turning the farmstead into a giant playground.
