With water standing everywhere, this may not be the best time to bring up the subject of HJR 6, which will appear on our November 5 ballot as Amendments 1 and 2. These are the constitutional amendments which provide the mechanism by which some \$980 million in Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued for a variety of efforts aimed at improving the long range water situation in Texas.

We do not propose to analyze the amendments here. That has been done in many forums and we can well imagine most of our readers are familiar with the fundamentals of both amendments. We merely want to say that we believe the amendments should be adopted. There are certain aspects of the matter that give us pause. The very fact that Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby is in favor of both amendments is enough to cause us to look at the fine print. Hobby has opposed previous attempts to improve the water situation in West Texas, but this time he seems sincere in his support of the proposals. Perhaps he is finally beginning to understand that the great wealth of his native Houston is built upon the grain, cotton, oil and other commodities that flow there from elsewhere in the state. At any rate we think adoption of the amendments would be in our best interests, and we urge a "yes" vote.

Amendments 1 and 2 are not the only important proposals we will be asked to decide. Amendment 11 also deserves adoption, if you feel that murderers ought not go free because a typist in the District Attorney's office makes a mistake in spelling.

For years we have had a Court of Criminal Appeals that has seized upon every conceivable excuse to overturn convictions in capital cases. I remember one case in which the Court overturned a conviction stemming from a murder in Waco, in McLennan County, because at one place in the indictment the typist has misspelled the name of the County, placing an "o" where an "a" should have been. The Court, in its august wisdom, pointed out that there was no McLennon County; therefore the indictment was faulty and the conviction reversed.

Amendment 11 is an attempt to get at this problem by making it possible to perfect indictments. As one would expect, this all gets very involved. But the bottom line is that something needs to be done, and Amendment 11 is a reasonable attempt to do that. It was proposed by Senator Buster Brown of Lake Jackson, a former District Attorney for that region.

There will be a number of other amendments to vote on as well. Some are self-explanatory, and some are the usual amendments of local application. For instance we will be called on to abolish some local county offices in various counties. Presumably this is on the ballot at the request of people in those counties. We may as well help them out.

TEA monitoring local ISD schools

There have been some new faces in the halls and classrooms at Floydada Independent School District schools this week. Members of an audit team from the Texas Education Agency are making the first monitoring visit to judge the districts degree of compliance with standards set for special programs.

Among the programs being scrutinized are the Vocational Education programs, Special Education, Bilingual ESL and all federal programs. This visit is not aimed at finding fault with the programs and punishing the school. The monitoring visit, mandated by H.B. 72, is for the specific purpose of locating any deficiencies and making suggestions which might help bring the programs into compliance with accepted operating standards.

Over 1100 Texas schools will be the object of such visits on a three year rotating basis. Each school will be visited each year to monitor one of three

items. FISD is being checked on special programs this year. The next two years will find the inspection team either auditing the school records or investigating the school programs for accreditation purposes.

The preliminary report Cannon received following the visit was highly complimentary and indicated that FISD has some of the best schools the team has monitored so far.

Cannon stated, "We have a right to be justifiably proud of our district, our students and especially our teachers. We are very pleased with the preliminary report and look forward to receiving the final version."

Superintendent Jerry Cannon says, "We feel very comfortable with the visit. We are confident that we will receive a favorable report."

According to Cannon, a written report will be forthcoming from TEA within 30 days.

Understanding your local government

Collier, McPherson responsible for county, court records

The county clerk in Floyd county is Margaret Collier. This elected office requires that the holder serve as court clerk and as recorder for the county. As recorder, the county clerk is responsible for maintaining and preserving records of all legal documents filed in the county. These include not only instruments relative to court action but also areas of vital statistics.

This office issues marriage licenses, birth certificates, and death certificates. The county clerk also maintains records concerning the licensing of nurses and dentists in the county.

In supporting the county criminal, civil, probate, and juvenile courts, the clerk is responsible for receiving and filing all papers and documents concerning the proceedings. She also issues all processes and preserves all filed documents for use by the courts. For civil actions, the clerk must file and record all documents submitted by the parties, issue all necessary processes before and after a judgement is rendered, and denote all case action on the case docket.

Another, and very important, duty of the county clerk's office is the supervision of elections in the county. She serves as the county election official and prepares the election supplies and voting boxes which election judges use on voting day. In Floyd county, the clerk also records the minutes of the commissioners' court.

Collier would like to remind county residents that all of her records are public with the exception of juvenile proceedings and adoptions which are considered confidential as they deal

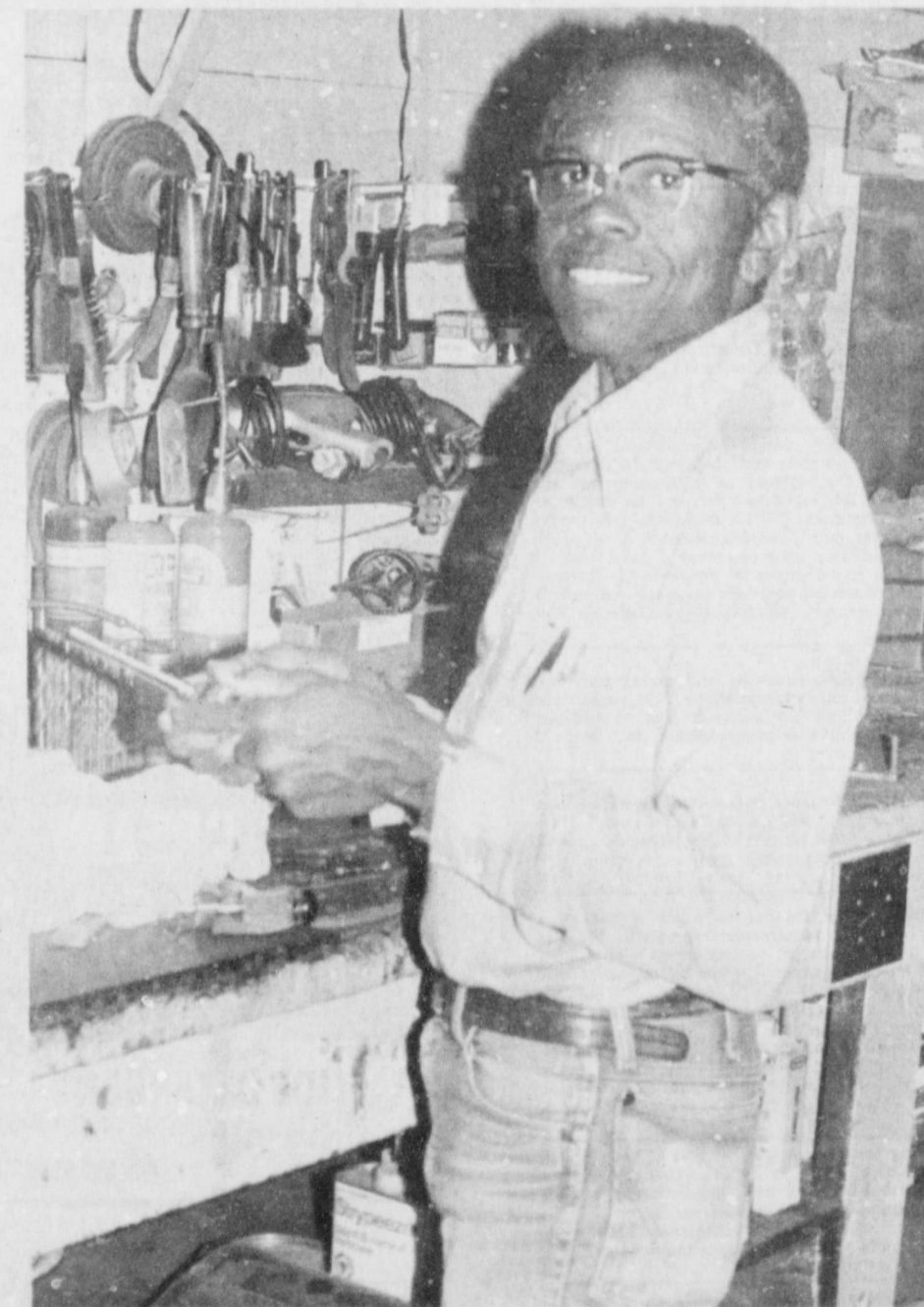
with underage persons who must be protected under current laws.

The district clerk is responsible for providing support to the district court. Floyd county is under the jurisdiction of the 110th District Court and Mary McPherson serves as District Clerk. She receives and files all papers, motions, and the like regarding civil and criminal cases. Also among her responsibilities is the proper docketing of cases and the issuing of processes necessary in the conduct of any case. This includes receiving indictments from the Grand Jury maintaining a criminal and civil docket and a judge's docket, receiving and filing proper bonds and charging proper fees. All fees, fines, child support payments, and other funds are received, recorded, and duly disbursed by the District Clerk.

1985 rain hits 30.5 inches

Rainfall totalling 30.5 inches has been recorded in Floydada as of this date in 1985. According to Jon LaBaume of the Soil and Conservation Service, Floydada's record keeper, "This is not entirely representative of the whole county. Several areas of the county have recorded five or six inches when we only

had three or four in town."

The average rainfall for this area is around 18 inches per year. As of this date in 1984, Floydada had recorded 19 inches. "Many places in the county are looking at about 48 inches already and we still have two months to go in the year," said LaBaume.

JV sustains winning streak

The Floydada Junior Varsity string of winning games held up during the Idalou match last Thursday, October 24. Playing in Idalou, the J.V. racked up 316 yards rushing and 12 yards passing for a combined total of 328 yards. The J.V. made 15 first downs while holding Idalou to 4.

During the first quarter, Ty Stovall scored twice from one yard out. Both extra point attempts failed, making the score 12 to 0 in favor of Floydada. A hard fought second quarter yielded no scoring by either team.

Following the halftime break, both teams were able to score. Floydada crossed the goal line first with Julio Flores scoring from 24 yards out. A Stovall pass to Pat Hazlett was successful to add two points to the total. Idalou made their only touchdown on a 13 yard run, but the extra point attempt failed. The score entering the fourth quarter

was 20 to 6. Manuel Suarez intercepted an option pitch from the Idalou quarterback and raced 50 yards for a touchdown to begin the action in the final quarter. Jeff Smith kicked the PAT. Flores made the final touchdown of the game on a run from five yards out and Smith booted the PAT over the crossbar to end the game with a final score of 34 for Floydada and six for Idalou.

Offensive standouts for the game were: backs Julio Flores, Ty Stovall, and Joe Collins; linemen Roel Cisneros, Randy Enriquez, and Raymond Gutierrez; and kicker Jeff Smith. Defensive standouts were Rupert Jimenez, linebacker; Manuel Suarez, corner linebacker; Darin Martinez, defensive tackle; and Rene Soliz, defensive halfback.

The J.V. record now stands at 7-0. The team will face Dimmitt on October 31 at Wester Field in Floydada. Game time is scheduled for 6:30 p.m.

Service concentrates on "care"

The basic premise of Caprock Hospital District Home Care Service is "Care" according to Louann Brittain, the Registered Nurse who coordinates the service. "We care about our patients and their families," says Brittain. "Not only do we provide care at home, but we are able to assess the type of care needed and often just be available for support to families or patients in need of support."

Working under physicians orders, the service is prepared to offer care for persons of all ages and all economic levels, as long as it can be safely given in the home. Designed to function in a rural setting, Caprock Home Care will serve both town and rural residents within the eight county area it serves. Due to the sparse population of this geographic location, home care is particularly beneficial to the elderly and lower income residents of inaccessible rural areas.

Nursing care will be provided, according to physicians instructions, in

the home of the patient and will range from such everyday concerns as bathing and skin care to more complicated services involving special procedures such as injections, surgical dressing care, catheter care and colostomy care. Other services include monitoring vital signs, medication routine, and dietary needs.

Home care service can be paid for in a variety of ways. Payment can be made by assignment of insurance benefits, through medicare or medicaid, veterans benefits and Champus as well as personal payment.

Community education programs are a vital part of the home care program. Blood pressure clinics, presentations to community service organizations and assisting with public school health education programs are essential to the home care concept.

The home care program allows recovering patients to leave the hospital sooner and still receive good, well supervised nursing care. It also makes care of patients with home manageable

health problems possible at home, instead of requiring hospitalization.

"This program will enable us to provide care and monitoring of patients with less expense than they would incur in a hospital setting," says Brittain. "Hopefully, this will result in people who otherwise would not seek medical care, receiving better care both during an illness and as a preventative measure."

Caprock Hospital District Home Care Service will provide care in not only Floyd County, but also Briscoe, Hall, Hale, Motley, Crosby, Dickens and Kent. 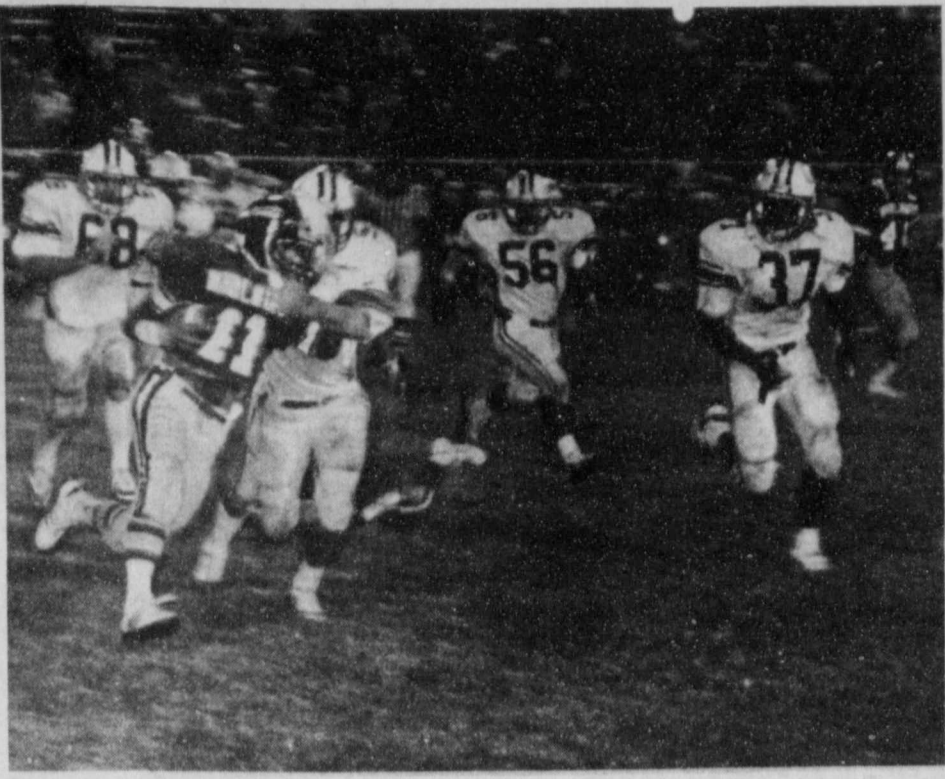

Even though surrounded by Idalou defenders, Pernel made an excellent reception and the 'Winds had a first down on the 'Cat 11 yard line.

The 'Winds next drive was short lived and shanked 16 yard punt gave good field position back to Idalou. Seven plays later, Jones scored once again for Idalou from 19 yards out. Again, the PAT was good and the Wildcats took a 17-0 lead to the locker room at intermission.

The second half was pretty much a repeat of the first, with Floydada unable to penetrate the tough 'Cat defense. Jones continued to lead the Idalou charge, eating up large chunks of yardage and scoring again in the third quarter. Late in the third stanza, Barbee was dropped in the end zone for a safety, bringing the score to 26-0 in favor of the visitors. In the fourth quarter, a questionable pass interference call gave Idalou a first down at the Floydada two yard line. Idalou fumbled into the end zone and the 'Winds took over at their own 20 on the touchback. Still not being able to move the ball consistently, Cooper again punted for 60 yards.

On the next play, Idalou scored on a 65 yard pass and run a TD. The PAT failed and the score was upped to 32-0. Woman's Worth in God's Plan

"And the Lord God said, It is not good that man should be alone, I will make him and help meet for him." Genesis 2:18

Teaching the book of Genesis on Wednesday evening has reminded me again about God's plan for his creation. The realization in the closing verses of Genesis Chapter 2 that man was lacking something in creation looms large. The Bible says in verses 19 and 20; "and out of the ground the Lord God formed every beast of the field, and every fowl of the air; and brought them to Adam to see what he would call them: and whatsoever Adam called every living creature, that was the name thereof. And Adam gave names to all cattle, and to the fowl of the air, and to every beast of the field; but for Adam there was not found a help meet for him."

The last phrase "there was not found a help meet for him" tells us that there was not a companion fit for or compatible to Adam. He could not talk with or fellowship with the animals God had formed. He was alone and incomplete. Look back at verse 2:18 of Genesis. "It is not good that man should be alone." God saw the loneliness and need of man for someone to stand with him and to be his companion.

The two words translated, "help meet" have wonderful meanings to us as we look at our help meet. The words have the meaning of helper, answering to, and overagainst. We could say that the woman was created to stand by our side to be our helper or co-worker not a slave. Adam was incomplete and God saw the need for him to be a complete man. The woman was to make Adam complete physically, intellectually, and socially. We have always heard it said, "that behind (or beside) every great man there is a great woman". That saying seems to reinforce God's original plan for woman. We need to be thankful for the one God has given us to make us complete and to stand beside or over against us in our lives.

The creation story continues as God causes Adam to sleep in 2:21, takes a rib from his side and in verse 2:22 forms woman. Adam says in verse 2:23, referring to the woman, "this is now bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh." He is saying she is a part of me an important part of me, we are made of the same stuff.

In verse 2:24, "therefore", is a conclusion word. It says to us because of all that has gone before this is the result. We might say when you add this all up this is the total. This is God's plan "therefore shall a man leave his father and his mother, and shall cleave unto his wife: and they shall be one flesh." The word cleave tells us there will be a unity of the two persons, they will adhere closely, cling, or to stick together. The union of these two people into one person with common interests, common affections and common purpose—what a beautiful picture of what it means for the two to become one in the marriage relationship.

The woman in God's plan is a co-laborer, an equal, a helper to her husband who would be incomplete without his help meet.

The first was the Queen Anne flag, being the official flag of the colonies from 1707 up to the time of the beginning of the American Revolution. The next was the Grand Union flag, designed from the crosses of St. George and St. Andrew and 13 stripes representing the 13 colonies. This flag flew over George Washington's headquarters in Boston in January of 1776. Next came Old Glory, being approved by the Continental Congress on June 14, 1777. This was designed with 13 stripes and 13 stars, one for each of the colonies. This was the first truly American flag.

In 1818 Congress passed the adoption of the flag design we have today; one star for each state and 13 stripes representing the 13 original colonies. Word stressed proper respect for the flag, stating that it is very important to honor the flag; that millions of people

have sacrificed to defend the flag and our freedom. He stated also that a flag should be destroyed with dignity and respect when it becomes heavily soiled, torn or badly worn. This should be done by either burning or burial - each to be done in a respectful manner.

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Floydada City Council supports water plan

WHEREAS, rapid economic expansion and population growth are taxing the state's existing water resources to their limits; and to meet the current and mid-term needs of the state will require the construction of at least 44 new reservoirs, 200 major wastewater treatment systems and scores of large-scale flood-control projects; and

WHEREAS, city governments, which historically have borne the major part of the responsibility for financing water resource facilities, will be required to carry an even greater share in the future due to reductions in federal aid; and

WHEREAS, the cumulative cost of the water resource facilities that need to be provided between now and the year 2030 could approach \$100 billion — an amount that far exceeds the ability of local governments to finance without state assistance; and

WHEREAS, the 1985 Texas Legislature approved a new proposed Texas Water Plan that, upon voter adoption will establish a sound methodology for addressing the state's diverse water problems, and create a major new role for state government in helping finance

the solutions to those problems; and WHEREAS, the new Texas Water Plan will appear on the November 5, 1985 statewide constitutional amendments ballot as Amendments 1 and 2, and, if adopted, would:

(1) Create a \$400 million state fund to guarantee water resource bonds issued by municipal governments, thus saving city taxpayers tens of millions of dollars in interest costs;

(2) Allocate \$400 million in funding for state participation in the cost of oversized capacity of reservoirs and other facilities that exceed immediate local requirements, thus alleviating short-term financial strains on local governments;

(3) Authorize the issuance of \$580 million in state bonds to be used for loans to cities and other local governments, including \$190 million for water supply facilities, \$190 million for wastewater projects and \$200 million for flood-control facilities; and

(4) Establish a state loan fund to assist farmers with the purchase of water-efficient irrigation equipment, and provide state financing for agricul-

tural water conservation research programs; and

WHEREAS, state legislation that will be implemented upon adoption of Amendments 1 and 2 would enhance the preservation of the state's water resources by establishing safeguards for bays and estuarine areas; providing incentives for water conservation; and by authorizing the creation of voter-approved mechanisms to protect underground water supplies; and

WHEREAS, voter adoption of Amendments 1 and 2 is essential to insure the state's future wellbeing and

the continued prosperity of Texas cities:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Floydada endorses Amendments No. 1 and 2, and urges their adoption by the citizens of Floydada at the November 5 constitutional amendments election.
