There is a lot about Perot that I admire. He's shown how the American system works, that one can succeed if he works hard, has some imagination, is willing to take a gamble and depends on private


Abernathy managed to beat Roosevelt, 35-14, before a six turnover game cost them a win against Lockney, 34-20.



Outstanding Chieftain Defense Leads Friona To 13-0 Victory

The Friona Chieftains' defense keeps getting tougher as the season goes along.

Last Friday at Tulia, the Chieftains scored their fourth shutout win of the season, and third in a row, in blanking the Tulia Hornets, 13-0. The win also opened the team's district season on a winning note.

A pair of first-half turnovers cost the team in the first half, which ended in a scoreless tie.

Although held well below their season average of 320 yards offense, Friona's defense also was equal to the task, giving up just 153 total yards.
