## Browns observing 40th year

Claude and Wilma Brown celebrate 40 successful years in business in Lockney this month. Their business venture began in Lockney January, 1946, with a dry cleaning shop. This shop grew into a highly successful department store, which brings people from surrounding areas into Lockney to shop.

Claude is a native of Lockney, born in the Muncy community. He began a dry cleaning career at the age of 14, working for Glynn Carroll after school and on Saturdays in a small shop on Main street. He worked in dry cleaning all thru school until graduating in the Lockney High School Class of 1939. After graduation he began a full time career of dry cleaning in Tulsa for two years, where he met Wilma Holcomb, who later became Mrs. Brown.

From Tulsa, Claude moved to Lubbock and continued in dry cleaning, but military service called and Claude was drafted into the Air Force. He spent several months in Hawaii as post-exchange manager, the job he also held later in Okinawa. While in Okinawa he opened shop in a tent for sewing and alterations in addition to his post exchange work.

Claude came home from overseas December 21, 1945 and in three short weeks had opened his own dry cleaning shop in what was the Rose building at the corner of Main and Locust streets.

In 1949, he and Wilma bought a 12 foot wide building of their own, which is the original part of their current building. After moving into their own building, the Brown's decided to get into the retailing of men's wear.

The first order of merchandise for Mr. Brown was \$66.00 worth of men's socks. The socks sold and the store's stock of men's clothing grew and so did

the building. Additions were built on the side and rear for more display room, with Claude and the employees doing most of the work. By 1956, the Browns had a complete and modern men's store.

It was at this point in 1956 that the Browns bought the fixtures and put in another store at the Lockney Dry Goods location, which is now the pool hall. This became strictly a department store which they ran while maintaining their original dry cleaning and men's store. This store also prospered and with two thriving retail businesses and one equally thriving dry cleaning business, the Browns decided to put it all under one roof.

In 1960 they moved their store from the old Lockney Dry Goods building into the Outlet Store on Main. The Outlet Store was used, as it is now, for selling lower priced merchandise and for selling sale items from Brown's Department Store.

The Browns also expanded in 1960 by buying the building joining their dry cleaning and men's shop on the south side from Lloyd Wofford of Wofford Manufacturing Co. They spent two months remodeling and renovating both buildings and providing openings between the buildings, new fixtures, and a new front entrance. A grand opening was held on September 30, 1960.

The citizens of Lockney responded to Claude Brown's hard work and service to the community by electing him Outstanding Citizen in 1958. He served on the city council for six years, and in 1965 he was elected mayor. He was re-elected repeatedly by the citizens of Lockney, serving as mayor for 16 years.

He has served two separate terms as president of the Rotary Club and two different terms as president of the

Chamber of Commerce. The Browns are Baptists and Claude is also a member of the Masonic Lodge, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and The Lockney Rotary Club. He is currently chairman of the Housing Authority and also serves on the hospital board.

Besides Wilma, who has always helped in the business, his daughter, Ann Race, is the bookkeeper in the store. Ann, who is married to Bill Race, is a graduate of Lockney High School and has two sons, Karl and Randy. Karl Race is a senior at Texas Tech, and

Randy is a senior in high school. Bill Race, who farms, also works part-time at the store.

The dry cleaning operation of Brown's was stopped six years ago, but the family operation of Brown's Department Store and The Outlet Store continue to thrive. The Browns are known and greatly appreciated in Lockney for their community service, hard work and determination. The future looks bright for Claude Brown, as all signs point to continued success in his business.

## Rewards being offered

## Two Floydada teens arrested

The arrest of two Floydada men could clear up as many as 24 auto burglaries in the Plainview area during recent weeks. Arrested on warrants the afternoon of December 31 were Willie Cortinas and Noah Espinoza, both 17 and giving home addresses in Floydada. The pair were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Glenn Stone on two counts each of auto burglary. Stone set bond for the two at \$10,000 each.

According to police, the arrests resulted from a routine investigation being conducted by Capt. William Mull, Lt. Michael Carroll, and Sgt. Carol DeBerry of the Plainview Police Department. Mull said the arrests cleared up several thefts between December 20 and December 31 and estimated the value of the stolen property recovered by officers following the arrest at around \$2,000. Investigation of the thefts continues at this time.

## Tax Appraisal Board of Directors sworn in

Members of the Board of Directors for the Floyd County Central Tax Appraisal District were sworn in by County Clerk, Margaret Collier during the January 8 session of the board. Tom Duvall, Adrain Helms, Eddie Teeter, Fred Zimmerman III, and Jack Lackey will serve from now through December of 1987. Members re-appointed Tom Duvall as Chairman and Adrain Helms as Secretary for the current term.

Reappraisal of Floyd County real property is progressing according to schedule according to Chief Appraiser, Sheila Faulkenberry. Notices will be sent notifying property owners of

increases in the taxable value of their property if the increase is \$500 or above. Increases of less than \$500 will not receive a notice and decreases will not receive a notice. Faulkenberry noted that an increase in taxable value of \$500 would mean an increase in taxes of approximately \$9 on property in Floydada or Lockney, less on property in rural areas of the county.

Notices should go out during the month of April on the results of the reappraisals being done this year. Anyone not receiving a notice may contact the Appraisal office to find out the status of the taxable value of their

property. Anyone not satisfied with the valuation placed on their property may request a meeting with the Board of Review to discuss the value placed on their property.

Faulkenberry reported that current collections of \$2,565,094.24 have been

made on the tax levy of \$3,344,027.08. This places collections at 77% compared to 65% at this time last year. The total dollar amount collected is over \$300,000 ahead of last year.

The board went into executive session to discuss personnel.

## Floyd County properties offered at public auction

Several properties in Floyd County were on the public auction block at the Floyd County Courthouse on Tuesday, January 7. The first and largest property was offered at public auction by the Small Business Administration to satisfy a public foreclosure on the account of Mack Hickerson. Sale of the 320 acres involved was conducted by Bobby Fletcher acting as substitute trustee for the SBA. The property went to the SBA on a bid of \$275 per acre after none of those in attendance made bids.

A series of eight lots were offered at auction to satisfy delinquent tax judgments awarded to the Floyd County Central Appraisal District in behalf of the taxing entities of Floyd County. City lots in Floydada and Lockney carried on the tax records as belonging to Oscar Barrera Sr., Hattie Foster, W.W. Payne, H.B. Peak, A.D. Perryman, and Mid States Homes reverted to the ownership of the taxing entities involved in the judgments after no bids

were submitted. Minimum bids required on the various properties ranged from a low of \$269 to a high of \$789.

The auction was conducted by Sheriff Fred Cardinal with the assistance of attorney Terry White who represented the taxing entities. No bidders were present.

Chief Appraiser for the district, Sheila Faulkenberry said that she was not surprised by the absence of bidders, adding "At least this action clears up a portion of the delinquent tax role."

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# 1986 primary elections scheduled

1986 is an important year for Floyd County voters. Although it is not a presidential election year, Texans will be choosing a governor as well as other state officials. Floyd County voters will be selecting county officials to represent their interests for another four year term.

## Construction permits up

During the calendar year of 1985, the City of Floydada issued building permits totaling \$582,328.00. This total represents an increase of more than three times the \$172,700.00 in building permits issued in 1984. A major factor in the total increase was due to the construction of the new Trinity Church facility which included a church building, Sunday school rooms and an auditorium valued at \$345,000.00.

The remaining \$237,328.00 in permits were issued for a variety of construction projects. Shop Rite Foods obtained a permit for a warehouse addition valued at \$24,300.00. One new home construction permit was issued for a total dollar valuation of \$66,500.00. One home, valued at \$35,000.00, was moved into the city and nine mobile home permits were issued for a total value of \$52,900.00. Eighteen additions, varying from storage sheds and carports to additional living space were issued permits with an estimated value of \$58,628.00.

Construction within the city has fluctuated up and down for the past few years. In 1982, a total of 15 permits were issued for construction valued at \$180,690.00. 1983 saw the total valuation rise to \$498,517.00 on 32 permits. The 1984 total of \$172,700.00 was issued in 24 permits and the 1985 total of \$582,328.00 was accounted for with 31 permits.

## Tip solves burglary

A Crime Call tip to the Sheriff's office on January 2, led to the arrest of two men responsible for the December 30 burglary of Lonnie Hinsley's barn. The Hinsley's barn is located two miles south and two and one half miles east of Floydada.

"Kim Hinsley called us", said Sheriff Fred Cardinal, "and reported that a large amount of tools valued at \$3,661.93, had been stolen out of their barn."

"On January 2, around 1:00 p.m.," said Cardinal, "we received some very good information thru a tip on the Crime

Call phone. With the information we were able to arrest two men responsible, in Plainview, at 4:50 p.m. \$2,427.93 worth of tools were recovered from the trunk of the suspect's vehicle. The rest of the tools had already been sold."

Bond was set on each man at \$15,000.00. One of the men arrested was an illegal alien and was sent to Mexico. The other man arrested, whose name is withheld at this time, is currently being held in the Floyd County Jail.

## Square dance lessons start in Floydada

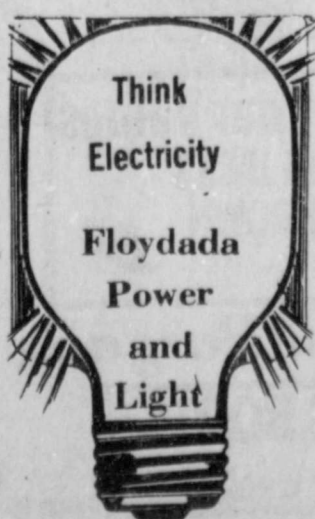

Among the offices appearing on the ballot this year are County Judge, District Clerk, County Clerk, County Treasurer, County Commissioners for Precincts 2 and 4, and Justices of the Peace for Precincts 1 & 4 and 2 & 3. The initial party primaries are scheduled for May 3. A second primary or runoff primary, will be held June 7.

Filing fees for all positions this year are \$600 except for the Justice of the Peace position which requires a \$300 filing fee. Candidates for the Democratic Primary need to file with the Democratic Party Chairman, Ben Ayres by February 3. Candidates filing for the Republican Primary need to file with the Republican Party Chairman, Albert Scheele, by February 3. All first day filers for positions on the May 3 ballot were Democrats. They included Choise Smith for County Judge; Barbara Edwards for District Clerk; Margaret Collier for County Clerk; Glenna Orman for County Treasurer; Jack Lackey for Commissioner of Precinct 4; Lowell Bilbrey for Justice of the Peace of Precincts 1&4, and Garland Sams for Justice of the Peace of Precincts 2 & 3. Democrat Bob Jarrett joined the ranks of those running for office by filing for the position of Commissioner of Precinct 2 on January 7.

All candidates will be required to submit sworn statements of campaign contributions and expenditures at intervals throughout the campaign. The first statement is due on April 3 and will cover the period ending March 24. The second interval covered ends on April

23 with the statement due on April 28. June 2 is the due date for the period ending May 28, the last reporting period for the May 3 primary. June 2 is also the reporting date for the period ending May 28, the first reporting period of the second or runoff primary. The final reporting period for the second primary ends on July 2 with the report being due on July 17.

## In times like these... By Mary Jo Fielding

For policymakers in the United States events have taken their most favorable turn in six years across turbulent Central America.

In almost every country, democracies are sprouting up again or U.S.-backed armies have begun to defeat Marxist-led units. El Salvador's U.S. equipped and U.S. trained military forces hold the clear initiative over weakened leftist insurgents. President Jose Napoleon Duarte has neutralized political foes and made a start on economic and social reforms.

Honduras and Guatemala have just held presidential elections that should bring both closer to stable democracy. Pacifist Costa Rica is hardening its stand against Nicaragua's Sandinistas while strengthening its ties to the U.S.

El Salvador has scared some of the biggest gains. With U.S. aid, the army

and moderate political leaders have stemmed an insurgent tide that seemed headed for victory only two years ago. American military training and increasing use of U.S.-supplied helicopters have enabled government forces to break up large guerrilla concentrations. An army that was notorious for its 9-5 schedule and barracks-bound mentality now mounts increasing numbers of night patrols and stages frequent ambushes to keep the Marxist-led rebels off guard.

However, in Nicaragua, not even the combination of a U.S. boycott, attacks by American-financed contra rebels and widespread domestic grumbling poses a threat to the Soviet-supported Sandinistas. Some analysts predict that the hardline regime in Managua will be so entrenched within another year that only U.S. military action could topple it or force it to make major policy changes.

## Optimal profits mean one calf per cow each year

In today's economy, optimal profits for cow-calf herds means producing one calf-per-cow every year.

To do this, claims David McGowen of Producer's Coop in Floydada, cattlemen must meet each cow's nutritional needs. And, to do so profitably, it means using whatever forage is most readily available.

That forage, however, may vary significantly in quality of nutrition that it delivers based upon weather or seasonal conditions and how it is fed. That's why local cattlemen rely heavily upon nutritional supplements, McGowen said. But, feeding the right supplement often requires guesswork.

"The number of nutrients cows need and those available in forage make choosing a balancing supplement a very complicated task," McGowen said. "That includes forage analysis, complicated pencil-pushing on formulas and then trying to find a combination of supplements that comes closest to your

needs without expensive over-supplementing of some of the nutrients."

The dealer said the entire process usually results in a compromise, at best. "No supplement ever seems to meet your needs right," he said. "This leaves cattlemen concerned that money might be wasted or some need of his cows not met."

But the local Purina Mills dealer says he has the answer to these problems in the original weatherproof block supplement available in 50-pound and 500-pound sizes.

"These durable, convenient Sup-R-Block brand supplements have been proven to provide the exact balance that cattle need in virtually any forage situation," he explained. "Because they're self-limiting based on the quality and amount of forage available, cow will eat just the right amount so there is no overfeeding of expensive nutrients."

## BBB warns of scam

South Plains consumers are currently receiving offers of free "sports boats" with inboard motors from various promotional companies. Although some offers are by telephone, most announcements of the "free" boats come through the mail.

One such offer is from the National Businessman's Co-operative of Beverly Hills, California. They inform the consumer that he is to receive a powersport motorboat as part of a marketing test. The letter plainly states that "purchases are not permitted." The mailer has several clever inducements to make the offer look appealing. The use of the phrase "final notice" is intended to make the consumer call immediately. The envelope contains the

phrase "Buy and Hold U.S. Savings Bonds" and a picture of an eagle with the term "official mail" are designed to make the envelope appear very official.

When consumers call the company, as per instructions, they find that they must pay a \$119 processing fee to receive the boat. The boat turns out to be a poor quality rubber affair with a cheap plastic motor. It appears to be worth approximately \$50.00. When one/BBB tested the boat, they found that it sprung a leak on the second trip across the public swimming pool, the motor did not last one trip. The entire promotion makes the consumer feel that he has "won" something but in fact he simply is buying a cheap boat.

## FmHA notifies borrowers of delinquencies

The Farmers Home Administration will be notifying more than 7000 Texas farmers that they must find a way to create a positive cash flow in their farm business in order to avoid foreclosure. Area farmers receiving the notices aren't necessarily doomed to facing foreclosure according to a local FmHA official.

Under new regulations, FmHA is required to notify each borrower with a deficiency of at least \$100 for the past year that the federal government will be accelerating accounts. These notices are being sent to approximately half of the 20,000 borrowers in District II which includes Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Swisher, Briscoe, Castro, Bailey and Parmer counties.

According to Becky Via of the Floydada FmHA office, "There is no way to know how many or which farmers will be affected by the notices." Via stated, "We are just beginning to calculate 1986 loans as the crop money

for 1985 comes in. This means we will be sitting down with each farmer and working through his particular situation to see where he stands before making any hard and fast decisions."

The new program will include deferrals, consolidation of loans, rescheduling of payments, reamortization, and

subordinating the loan to other lenders as possible solutions to the problem.

"Farmers are going to have to project their income and expenses and be able to demonstrate a positive cash flow and an ability to meet their obligations," said Via.

Area farmers receiving the notices in

January will have 30 days to contact FmHA and seek assistance with their loans.

"Everyone will be considered on an individual basis," stated Via. "We will try to help each borrower work through it and we will stay with everyone we can."

## Irrigation conference scheduled

The latest wrinkles in an old concern of area farmers and ranchers will be examined in Amarillo January 9 during the annual High Plains Irrigation Conference.

Farmers, ranchers, scientists and educators will share their experience and research on an issue which has been of vital importance to area producers for several decades: effective and efficient use of water.

The conference, sponsored by the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be held at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd., West. Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m.

The conference is focused upon needs expressed by producers, said Leon New, Extension agricultural engineer and irrigation specialist. He is conference coordinator.

"One of the high points of this

conference every year is the panel discussion by a group of producers," New said. "They tell what they've been doing in irrigation, what has worked and what hasn't, and problems and needs they've found."

This year's panelists will be West Spurlock of Stratford, Lyndon Wagner of Bushland, and Dale Coleman and Harold Grall of Dumas.

Paul Gross, Panhandle District Extension director, will report on field tests that help producers make sound irrigation decisions. Dr. Steve Amoson, Extension economist and management specialist, will present economic evaluations of furrow and center pivot systems.

Don Hardy, owner of Don Hardy Race Cars, Floydada, will discuss the benefits of high engine efficiency in irrigation systems. Walter Hughes, branch manager of Tide Products, Friona, will discuss the potentials for chemigation, the application of chemicals through the irrigation system.

State Rep. J.W. "Buck" Buchanan, Dumas, will outline options available under the state's new water plan. New will discuss the worthiness of soil moisture sensors.

There will be exhibits of chemigation injection equipment, surge valves, low energy precision application (LEPA) irrigation components, drip irrigation equipment and soil moisture sensing equipment.

Additional information is available at county Extension offices in the Panhandle District.

Maynard closed the interview with this comment, "With the backing of the administration, the public and the interest of the students in the Lockney FFA program, this program has got the potential to go far."

Miss Jack will conduct educational programs for adults and youths and provide leadership for 4-H youth home economics programs.


