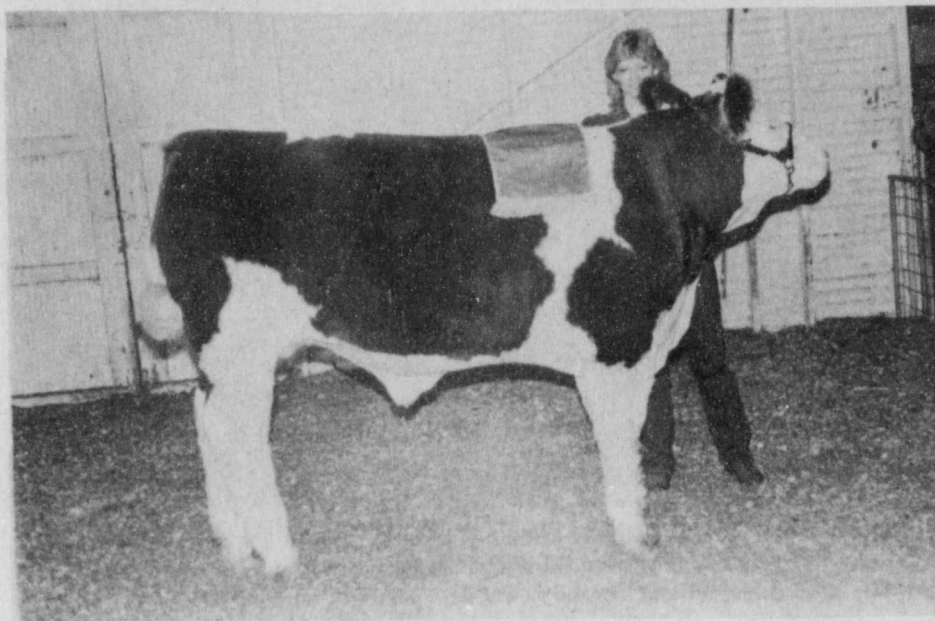

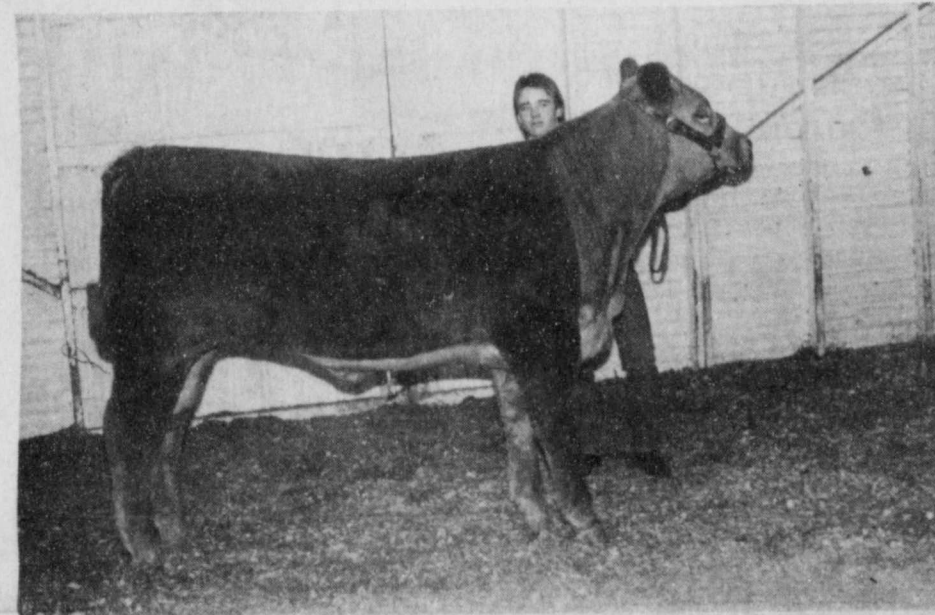

Plans for Frontier Days celebration are finalized

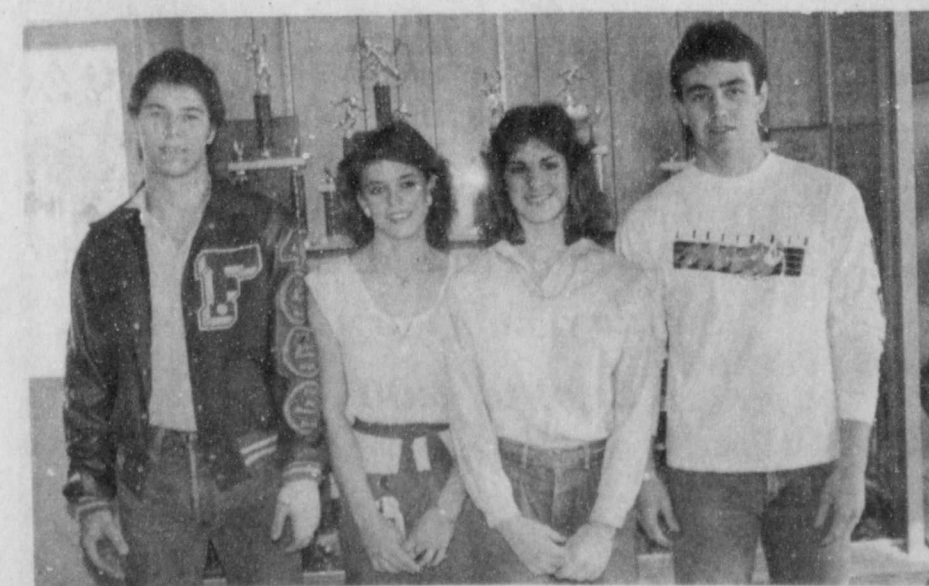
Plans for a week long frontier celebration have been finalized according to Judy Mulkey, coordinator for the event. "Local businesses have actively supported the event and it is shaping up nicely," said Mulkey.

The week will begin with an appearance by the 1984 National Kid of America, 9 year old Raquel Chavez of Lovington, New Mexico. She is an accomplished vocalist and will be performing at intervals on Saturday, March 1. Also scheduled for March first are demonstrations with live rattlesnakes by the Sweetwater Jaycees.

Free stagecoach rides will be available on March 1 and several concessions

will be operating. Stick horse races for 1 to 10 year olds and a greased pig chase are also on the agenda. Those attending the events are urged to "get in the spirit" and dress pioneer style.

Tickets for the Treasure Hunt drawing will be available at participating merchants after February 24 and are free. The drawing is scheduled for 5 p.m. on Saturday, March 8. Also scheduled for March 8 will be a cowchip throwing contest, a cookie eating contest and a fiddling contest. The South Plains College Blue Grass Band will perform from 1:30 to 3:30 and a group of fantasy animals will be out and about throughout the day.

Top honors at the 42nd Annual Floyd County Juniors Livestock Show were awarded to local exhibitors at the show on Saturday, February 15 and Sunday, February 16. About 150 participants from around the county took the opportunity to display their FFA and 4-H livestock projects.

Aric Hendricks captured the Grand Champion Lamb spot with his heavy-weight Suffolk entry. The Reserve Grand Champion slot was filled by Jason Brown with a mediumweight Suffolk. Both boys are Floydada students.

Top winners in the swine division were two Lockney students. Troy Bigha was awarded the Grand Champion Barrow title for his mediumweight Hampshire and Robert Wofford's mediumweight Cross Breed barrow won the Reserve Grand Championship.

Three Floydada youths were the only entries in a new class of competition for the county, Registered Heifers. Chad Edwards won the Grand Championship for a Limousin heifer born August 10, 1984. The Reserve Grand Championship went to Ross Lee Colston for an Angus heifer born September 20, 1984. Both were entered in Class 1. Billy Zane Colston showed an Angus heifer born February 3, 1984 in Class 2.

In the steer division, Angie Hinsley of Floydada won the Grand Championship with a medium-heavyweight Cross

Breed. Matt Williams of Lockney was awarded the Reserve Grand Championship for his heavyweight Angus steer.

Hunter Smith won both Breed Champion and Reserve Breed Champion in the Finewool category of lambs. Jennifer Crow's Shropshire lamb was named Breed Champion. Corey Carthel took the Breed Championship in the South-down class. Jamie Crow won the Breed Championship in the Hampshire division and Zach Nutt was awarded the Reserve Breed spot. In the Suffolk class, Aric Hendricks took the Breed Championship and Jason Brown won the Reserve Breed Championship slot.

In the barrow competition, Coy LaBaume won the Breed Championship in the Berkshire class with Shane Orman capturing the Reserve Breed award. Shayla Barbee was named the Chester White Breed Championship and Jana Lawson won the Reserve Breed. Tim Julian received the Reserve Breed Championship award for his Duroc entry and Melissa Faulkenberry won the Reserve Breed Championship in the Spotted Poland China division. Jeff Matsler earned the Reserve Breed Championship in the Yorkshire division to round out the Floydada participants earning honors in the swine section of the show.

Angie Hinsley was awarded the Grand Champion award for the Cross Breed steer division. Troy Don Faulken-

berry was the winner of the Reserve Breed Champion designation. Amy Hinsley won the Breed Championship in the Hereford classification and Chad Hinsley was named to the Reserve Breed spot.

A complete list of the entrants and their finishing positions can be found in the Lockney Beacon this week.

The annual buyers luncheon was held on Monday, February 17. Caprock Meat provided the meat for the dinner which was enjoyed by all attending.

Auction sales of participating animals brought a total of \$86,330.16 to the young livestock raisers. Angie Hinsley's Grand Champion Steer brought \$2075.00 at \$1.75 per pound from Producers Coop and Floydada Coop Gins. Lockney Coop paid \$828.75 for Troy Bigham's Grand Champion Barrow and Aric Hendricks sold his Grand Champion Lamb to Paymaster Seed and W.T. Industrial for \$1008.00.

Rounding out the scheduled activities for the 42nd Annual Floyd County Junior Livestock Show was the awards banquet sponsored by Floyd County Farm Bureau. Over 200 people attended the Mexican dinner at the Lockney Elementary Cafeteria Tuesday, February 18.

Michael Hinsley, president of the Livestock Show Association, presented awards and trophies to the numerous FFA and 4-H participants of the show. Among those receiving trophies were the owners of the Grand Champions, Reserve Grand Champions, Breed Champions, and Reserve Breed Champions.

Results of other competitions related to the show were also announced. Winners of the judging contest held on February 17 were named and trophies awarded. Showmanship awards went to Haney Robertson for sheep, Robert Wofford for swine, and Chad Edwards for steers. Junior Showmanship awards went to Rain McCandless for sheep, Max Green for swine, and Kristy Hinsley for steers. Herdsman awards were presented to Wesley Teeter for sheep and Shayla Barbee for swine. There was no Herdsman award for steers.

City rebates distributed

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$131.1 million in local tax payments to the 1,017 cities which levy the one-percent local sales tax on February 12. Floydada's rebate totaled \$14,945.81, a decrease of 9.94% from the February payment in 1985.

Lockney received a check for \$7,281.51, an increase of nearly \$600 over the previous year's February payment. The overall total for 1986 to date in Lockney is \$9,331.81, a decrease from last year of 3.35%. Floydada's total for the year is \$22,090.40 as compared to \$22,307.29 at this time last year.

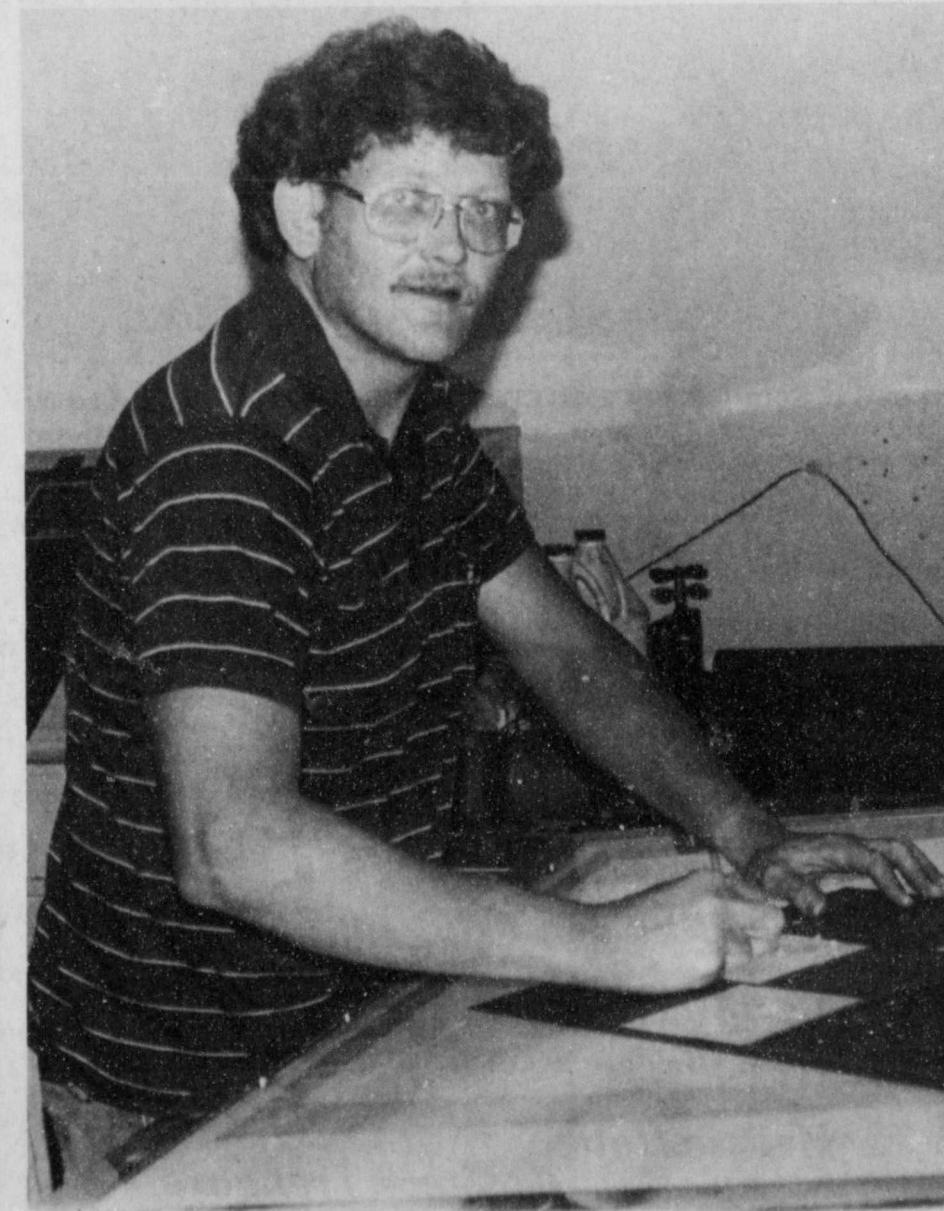
Crosby County cities all suffered decreases. Crosbyton decreased 18.35%, Lorenzo decreased 31.88%, and Ralls decreased 1.17%. Hale County's Abernathy decreased 10.96% and Hale Center decreased 4.03%. Plainview showed an increase of 18.68%. Edmonson posted a 51.45%

increase and Petersburg increased 12.32%. Quitaque in Briscoe County showed a 16.33% increase and Silverton increased by 1.96%.

Houston's check for \$21.3 million was the largest, up 12% from last year's payment of \$19 million. Dallas received \$14.7 million, up eight percent from the \$13.5 million sent last year. San Antonio's payment of \$8.3 million was up 22 percent from 1985's figure of \$6.8 million. Austin received \$5.9 million, up 17 percent over last year's February payment of \$5 million. Fort Worth's check for \$5 million was a 27 percent increase over last year's \$3.9 million check. El Paso's payment was \$3.1 million—a 27 percent increase over the \$2.4 million received last February.

February checks represent taxes collected on sales made in December and reported to Bullock by January 20, as well as quarterly returns for the last three months of 1985 and sales made by annual filers.

City elections postponed due to pending lawsuit

The spring city election for council positions will not be held this year. Scheduling for the election, usually held the first Saturday in April, will not be possible with the pending lawsuit unsettled.

The lawsuit, originally filed in December of 1984, seeks to convert the present system of electing all council positions on an at-large basis to a system of single member districts. City Secretary Jimmie Lou Stewart indicated at the February 11 regular council meeting, that communications between the city and the judicial system indicate that elections are inappropriate until such time as the lawsuit is settled.

Under these unusual circumstances, the three city council members due to stand for reelection will continue to serve until an election is scheduled. Those positions are currently filled by Ginger Warren, Leroy Burns and Don Green.

Floydada Cable T.V. notified the city by letter on January 23 of their intention to adjust cable rates as of March 1. The adjustment will be done under the cable communications Policy Act of 1984 which allows the company a 5% rate increase once a year.

Basic residential rates will increase from \$10.25 to \$10.75 per month for the first outlet with an increase from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per month for each additional outlet. Rates for premium channels are not due to increase.

Following an open hearing on airport improvements, the council opened bids for the installation of a medium intensity runway lighting system at the Floydada Municipal Airport. Three bids were received. Pecan Valley Electric of Brownwood submitted a bid of \$28,755 and Gifford Electric of Fort Worth bid \$28,173. The contract was awarded to Ray Electric of Amarillo with a bid of \$26,762.80.

The council also accepted a grant contract with the Texas Aeronautic Commission for funding of the MIR lighting system. TAC will provide funds for 75% of the project up to \$28,500.

The High Individual trophy was awarded to Shannon Barbee who earned 394 points. Jeff Matsler was second with 385 points and Matt Mitchell finished third with 382 points. Jeff Webb received the sheep judging trophy with Clay Lowrance second and Matt Mitchell third. Tony Banda collected the swine judging trophy. Shannon Barbee placed second and Darin Martinez was third. Barbee won the trophy for steer judging with Jeff Matsler second and Troy Don Faulkenberry third.

The Producers and Top Flight Fed award went to Jason Brown. Coy LaBaume received the sweepstakes trophy, a traveling award. He was also awarded a plaque to commemorate the event and a \$100 scholarship from the Floyd County Scholarship Fund.

Debora Reeves was selected as sweetheart of the show this year. The four candidates raised over \$2400 selling memberships to the Floyd County Junior Livestock Association. The funds will go towards maintaining the show facilities and supporting association projects.

The bid for the 1986 seal coat program for city streets went to Applan Corporation of Hereford for \$37,502.85. Other bidders on the work were Hi Plains Pavers of Plainview at \$39,845.00 and Caprock Highway at \$44,644.15.

One bid was received on the proposed sale of a 6x6, 1954 GMC 2 1/2 ton truck. Council elected to reject the bid which amounted to \$101.

Two ordinances were passed at the session. The first approved an increase in electric rates for Southwestern Public Service. The increase is offset by a decrease in the fuel adjustment rate so residential customers should see little difference in their bills.

The second ordinance lowers the rate for water service outside the city limits from 2 1/2 times to 1 1/2 times the in-city rate.

Summer programs were also on the February agenda. Mike Cocanougher has notified the city that he will not be interested in operating the swimming pool this summer. The city is investigating other possibilities for finding someone to operate the facility for the summer.

Bob Gilliland, Alan Fondy, Wally Padgett and Larry Noland presented a proposal for operating the city summer baseball program to the council. Council members accepted the proposal and approved the four as supervisors for the program.

A landfill contract with the county was approved. This contract is a yearly matter, allowing Floyd County residents to use the dump ground facilities maintained by the city.

Council members voted to renew liability coverage, with Markel Services, Inc., for public officials and law enforcement officers at a cost of \$6,590.00 for one year. The cost of coverage last year was \$4230.00.

Authorization was given by the council to include a 5% salary increase in the 1986-87 budget. A public hearing was also scheduled concerning the budget. The hearing will be during the regular session of the council on March 11.

Dr. Hong to close office

Dr. Hong has announced this week that he is closing his practice in Floydada and moving to Dallas. Dr. Hong has been in practice here in Floydada for six years and eight months, after coming here from a five year surgical residency in New York. "I am leaving for varied personal reasons," said Dr. Hong. "I hope to open my own practice in Dallas. I will be

leaving by the end of the month. I really think it is best if I leave."

Hospital Administrator, Guy Hazlett said, "We really hate to see Dr. Hong go. He is going to be difficult to replace because of the quality of Hong's practice. We all feel very strongly that he is a great friend of the medical staff and everyone associated with the hospital. It is a unanimous feeling among the staff that it will be a real loss for the community and hospital."

Finding a surgeon for the hospital will be difficult, according to Hazlett, but not as difficult as it would have been ten years ago when there was a shortage of physicians. "We don't have the shortage we used to have," said Hazlett. "I know it was a difficult decision for Dr. Hong to make," said Hazlett, "but we want him to be happy. The door is always open for him should he decide to return."

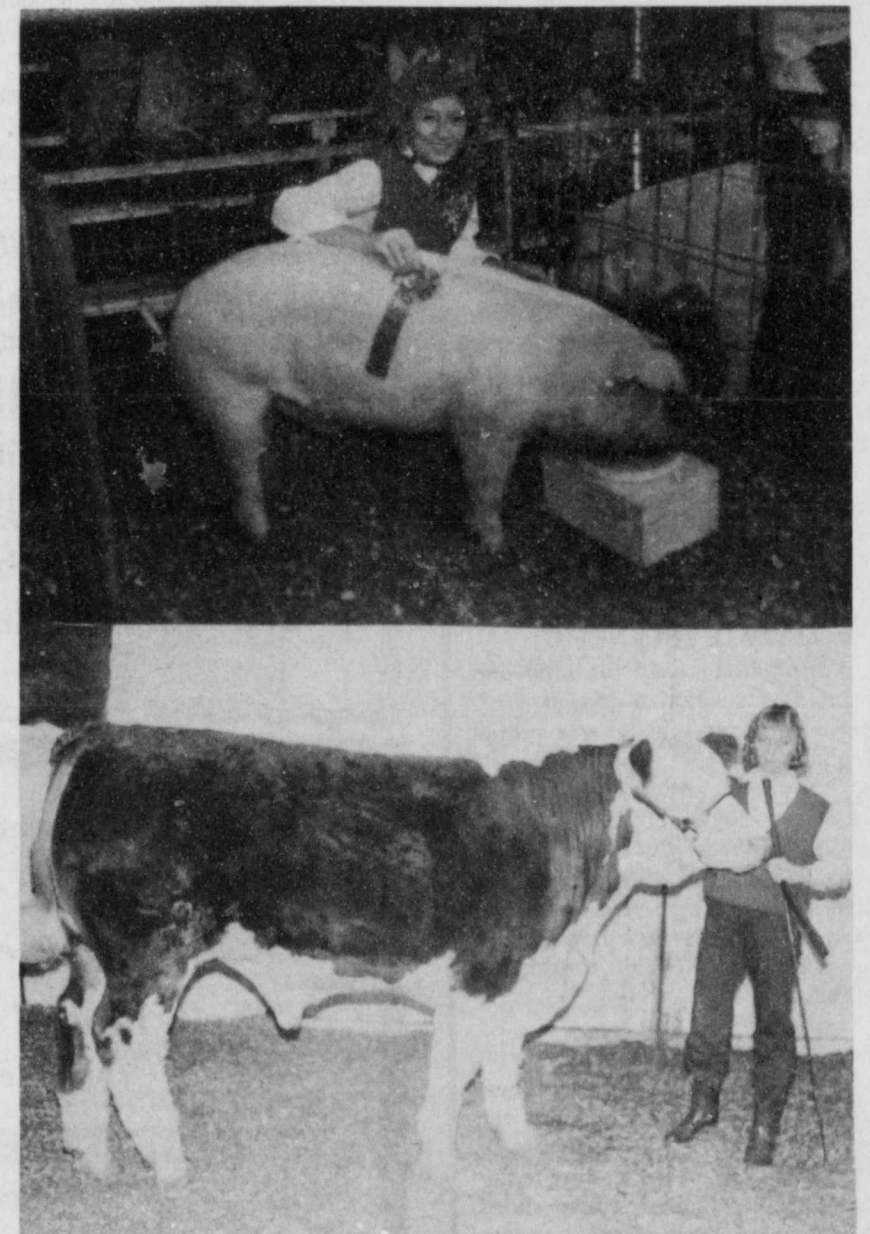

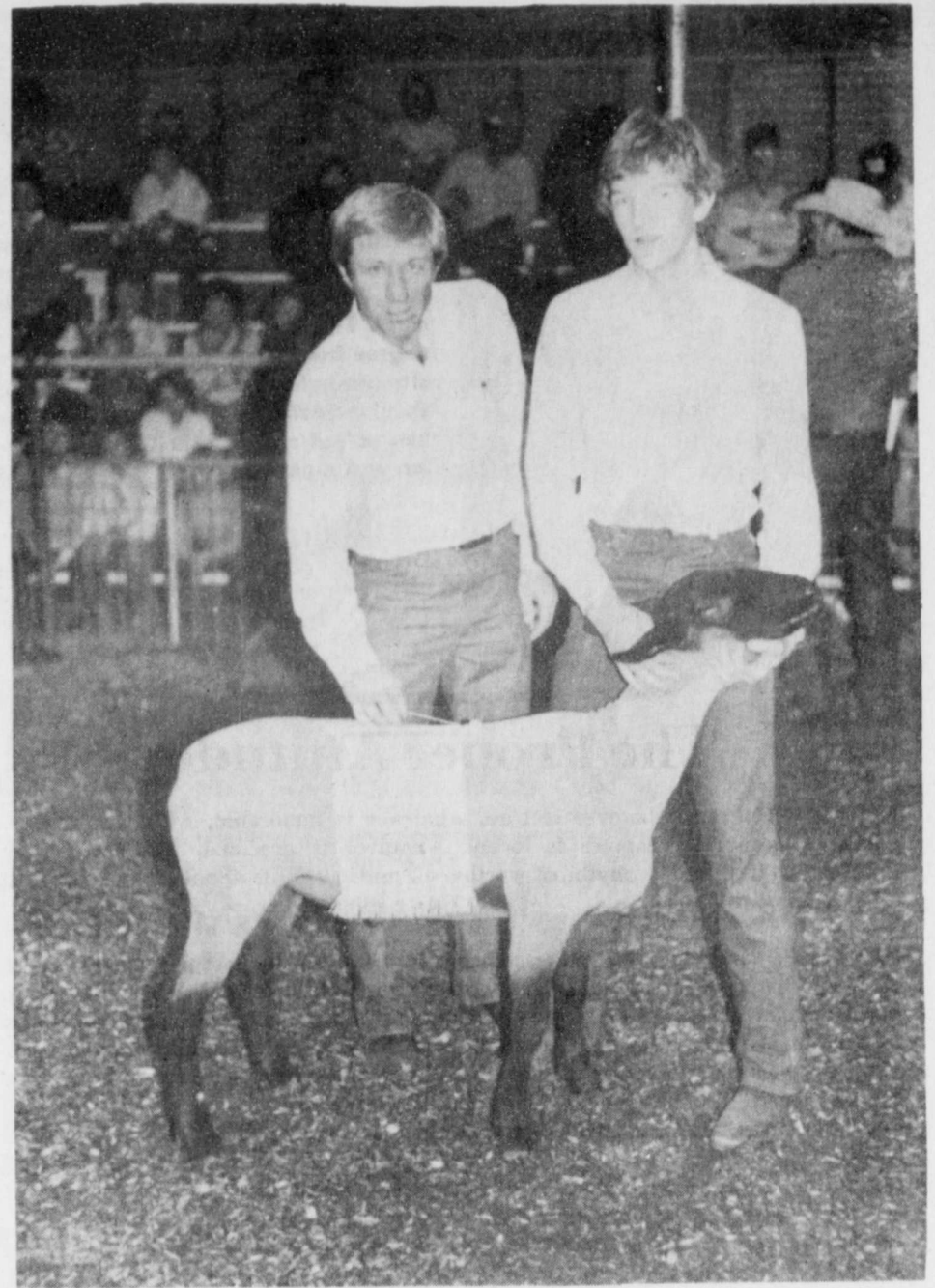

COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

The last week in January is probably the earliest that producers can expect details of the 1986 cotton program, speculates Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

We recognize that each day that passes without full knowledge of program decisions tightens the time frame for making financial arrangements, planning crop acreage mixes and completing advance field operations, he says, adding that "PCG is urging USDA to make program announcements at the earliest possible time."

Recalling 1981 when the last omnibus farm bill was passed, Johnson points out that the Act was signed into law on December 22 and program particulars weren't issued until five weeks later on January 29. President Reagan signed the new law, officially dubbed the "Food Security Act of 1985," on December 23.

"And since the new measure is decidedly more complex than the 1981 Act, he continues, "it would be overly optimistic to expect any significant improvement on the 1981 record."

One writer has calculated that there are 18 separate parts of the 1985 bill's cotton section alone in which the Secretary has discretionary powers.

Already known is that the 1986 base loan will be 55 cents, the target price will be 81 cents, the \$50,000 payment limitation remains in force, 1986 payment yields will be equal to the median three of the 1981-85 program payment yields, and advance deficiency payment yields, and advance deficiency payments up to 50 percent of expected full payment will be made in 1986.

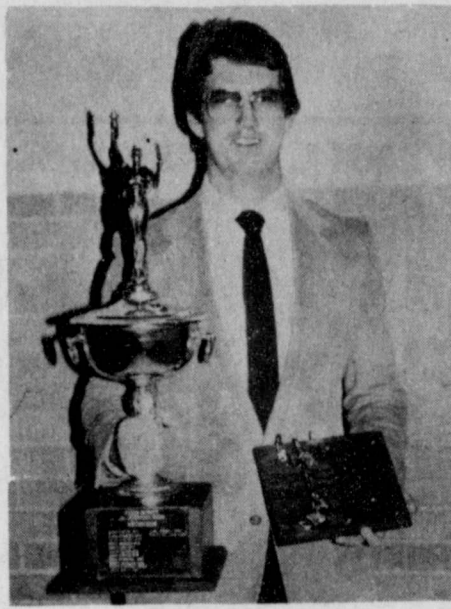
The exact formula for figuring 1986 acreage bases still is in question. However it appears certain that 1986 bases will be no higher than the average of acreage planted and considered planted in 1984 and 1985, and will be no lower than the average of 1981-85 planted and considered planted acres, excluding zero years.

One of the unknowns that is most vital to producer planning concerns the specifics of acreage reduction programs.

Acreage reduction authority resting with the Secretary includes the option to require a 25 percent unpaid acreage reduction, to offer but not require up to an additional 25 percent paid diversion, or any combination of the two.

The Secretary also has authority (1) to make "loan payments" equal to the difference between the base loan and the "loan redemption rate" to producers who forego deficiency payments and use of the loan and reduce plantings one-half the amount required for full program participation, (2) to make 92 percent of full deficiency payments to producers who plant only 50 percent of base acreage minus acreage reduction and diversion, and (3) to require that cotton program cooperators on a given farm not exceed their acreage bases for

other program crops on which an acreage limitation program is in effect.

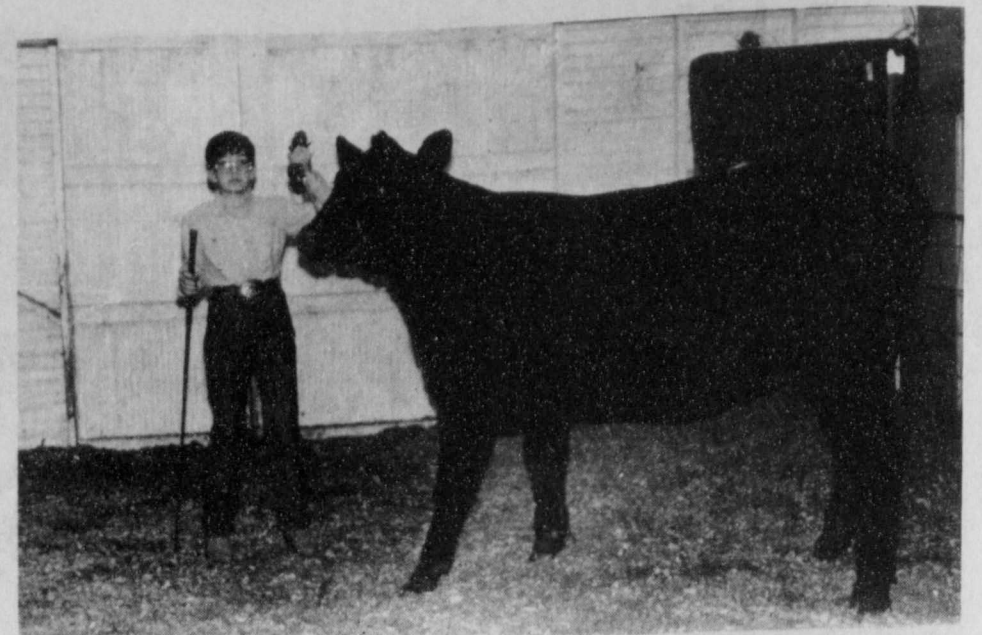

Meetings to explain Conservation Reserve Program to farmers

Farmers in the Panhandle, South Plains and Rolling Plains can learn details of the Conservation Reserve Program contained in the new farm bill at two special meetings February 25 in Lubbock and February 26 in Abilene.

Each meeting will be from 9 a.m. until noon and will include discussions by officials of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and the Soil Conservation Service. Farmers are urged to attend either meeting, said Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension agricultural economist at Lubbock.

The Lubbock meeting will be at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center north of the airport. It is on FM 1294 just east of I-27 at the Shallowater exit. The Abilene meeting will be in the jury assembly room on the third floor of the new courthouse. The meetings are two of five being conducted across the state by the Extension Service to help farmers reach decisions on program participation.

The CRP seeks to take millions of acres of erodible cropland out of production. Some 11.5 million acres will be eligible in Texas, but only 825,000 of these acres will be included this year.

The sign-up period is March 3-14. To qualify, farmland must be classified as highly erodible by the SCS. Farmers with eligible land then may enter those acres into the program by submitting a bid to their local ASCS office. The bid is based upon what a farmer determines his annual return on the land would be if he kept it in production, Dr. Bill Harris, Extension soils specialist said.

Bids will be reviewed by state and county ASCS personnel, and farmers will be notified whether or not they are accepted. If accepted, farmers will receive annual rent payments during the 10-year contract of the program. Annual payments will be limited to \$50,000 per producer.

Land taken out of production under the program must be planted to a permanent cover of grass or trees, and various conservation practices must be used to maintain the land. Costs of establishing permanent cover and for conservation treatments will be shared with the government on a 50-50 basis.

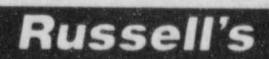




