Serving as mayor of Bexar from 1841 to 1842 , Seguin was thrust into a
leadership role as Mexican Americans leadership role as Mexican Americans
turned to him for protection from the turned to him for protection from the
immigrants. "Could 1 leave them defenseless," "Seguin wrote later, "exon the pretext that they were Mexicans, treated them worse than brutes?" Ultimately, Seguin became the victim
of a fate akin to that which befell so many tejanos, DeLeon says. Already the target of a smear campaign by a faction of Anglo political opponents in San
Antonio, he was implicated as an accomplice in Rafael Vasquez's expediAntonio in 1842 . He fled to Mexico to evade assassination.
