Those who read political tea leaves will be busy for some time, trying to determine the real meaning of an election that saw a sitting governor barely win the nomination of his own party's primary when pitted against five opponents few people had ever heard of.

Mark White made it, barely, but from here it appears he can take scant comfort in the outcome. In Floyd County, for instance, he garnered only 35 percent of the Democratic vote for governor. The story was the same throughout the Panhandle and South Plains, where he got about 34 percent of the vote in his own primary. One of the more startling developments was the surge in Republican primary voting. Despite the fact that no Republican primaries were held in a number of the 33 counties we surveyed, 25,340 voters cast their primary ballot in the GOP primary, against some 45,552 who voted in the Democratic gubernatorial contest. When Lubbock County is included in the total the Republican vote jumped to 47,644, against 52,541 in the Democratic contest for governor. Here in Floyd County a record 261 voters cast their ballot in the Republican primary for governor, despite the fact that no Republican races were on the ballot locally, and in face of extremely heated races for local office on the Democratic

Local voter turnout for the May 3 primary elections was above average. Approximately 1769 voters came out to cast ballots in the Democratic Primary. Another 261 voted in the Republican Primary in Floyd County.

On the local level, George Miller carried the county in his return bid for district judge, but was defeated by David Cave in the four county district.

Barbara Edwards posted a decisive victory in the race for District Clerk. She totaled 945 votes to Kathy Green's 551 and Linda Jackson's 331.

Unopposed candidates for county offices included Choise Smith for County Judge, 1,313 votes, Margaret Collier for County Clerk, 1,414 votes, Glenna Orman for County Treasurer, 1,210 votes, and Lowell Bilbrey for Justice of the Peace in Precincts 1 and 4, 966 votes.

Contested races in Precincts 2 and 4 for the commissioners post yielded Floyd Jackson as the winner in Precinct 2 and a runoff for Precinct 4. Jerry Williams posted 187 votes against Jackson in Precinct 2.

Jack Lackey, the Precinct 4 incumbent maintained a narrow lead over challengers Don Green and Delfino Pesina. Lackey had 210, Green received 192, and Pesina got 87.

Incumbent C.L. (Mike) Mooney won the nomination for the Justice of the Peace position in Precincts 2 and 3 with 413 votes. Bill Fewell got 299 votes and Garland Sams, who had withdrawn from

the race received 28.

Ben Ayres was reelected as Democratic Party chairman and Albert Scheele will again be the Republican Party chairman in Floyd County.

In the race for United States Representative, District 13, Doug Seal defeated his Democratic opponent Don Strubling, 558 to 414. Beau Boulter, unopposed on the Republican ticket received 169 votes. Seal will face Boulter in the November elections.

The Governor's race on the Democratic ticket had six candidates. Mark White received 532 votes, Andrew C. Briscoe III received 419, A. Don Crowder received 192, Ron Slover received 148, Bobby Locke received 131, and Sheila Bilyeu received 65. On

the Republican ballot, Kent Hance led the field with 201 votes. Bill Clements received 50 and Tom Loeffler received 10. Although Hance carried Floyd County, Clements carried the state and will challenge Mark White in November.

The Lieutenant Governor's race had two Democratic candidates, incumbent Bill Hobby who received 999 votes and David Young who received 496. The Republican ballot listed four candidates. Aaron L. Bullock received 49 votes with David Davidson getting 46, Glenn Jackson getting 39, and Virgil E. Mullanax getting 32 votes in Floyd County.

Running for Attorney General, Democratic candidate Jim Mattox received

1263 votes. Republican candidates Roy R. Barrera Jr., Ed Walsh, and John Roach received 67, 68, and 37, respectively in the county.

Unopposed candidate Ann Richards garnered 1154 votes in the Floyd County Democratic Primary. There were no Republican candidates for the office or for the office of Comptroller of Public Accounts. Bob Bullock received 1207 votes.

Garry Mauro also ran unopposed, receiving 1100 votes on the Democratic ticket for Commissioner of the General Land Office. Three candidates split the Republican vote. George Collis received 44, Grady T. Yarbrough received 50, and M.D. Anderson Jr. got 61.

Entomologist named for Floyd and Crosby areas

A new Extension agent-entomologist has been appointed for Crosby and Floyd counties. C. Mark Brown began serving the two counties on Monday.

His appointment was announced by Bob Robinson, district director for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Brown will work with Floyd County Agent Richie Crow and Crosby County Agent Andy Vestal in conducting pest management programs and training in the two counties.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Brown of Plainview. He holds an associate degree from Clarendon Junior College. He was graduated cum laude from Texas Tech University in 1984 with a Bachelor of Science degree. He is completing requirements for a master's

degree at Tech.

At Tech, he received the Hale County Soil and Water Conservation scholarship and two scholarships from the university. He was named the outstanding student in plant and soil sciences in 1984.

He is a member of the Entomological Society of America. Prior to joining the Extension Service, he was employed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock as technician for the boll weevil project in the cotton insect research program.

First place state awards for GCT

"Everyone is a winner in vocational classes," stresses Dale G. Smith. He could get few arguments after his general construction trades (woodworking) class returned home from May 2-3 state competition with seven first place and two second place awards.

The state event was Friday and Saturday in Fort Worth.

ALL STUDENTS WINNERS

Smith, a Floydada native who taught nine years in Colorado before returning to his home town in 1978, says "All our students are winners, but these students have worked hard to compete in

state in their project areas. More importantly, they have worked hard with their regular classwork. They had to pass all subject areas to qualify for contest.

"I have been in teaching many years and some of these students had to over-achieve to pass. I am proud of these students, especially because they have put out that special effort it takes to win. No matter if it's vocational or football, the student must put out the extra effort it takes to be a winner."

Explaining his pride, Smith says "In all vocational classes, students are taught essential elements of good work habits, safety and attitudes, ability to follow instructions, practice punctuality and dependability, observe rules of the work place, work with others harmoniously, follow through on assigned tasks and know how to participate and carry on an orderly meeting according to parliamentary procedure which prepares them for work and citizenship in our democratic society.

"These are taught along with the

trade skill of carpentry, welding, auto mechanics, homemaking and other vocational classes.

"Our goal in GCT is to give a student basic skills, knowledge and attitudes through study and practice to become an honorable worker."

He explains that "Our main goal is to see that students are good workers, work with proper respect for others, respect themselves and learn the satisfaction that is gained from GOOD work."

"We hope, as teachers, some of our students will stay employed or become foremen and/or owners of their own businesses in the trade we teach them."

"The business community tells us if we instill in students all of the above good attitudes and work habits, then they can train them in the specific area of job skills."

"So a student doesn't need to think he must stay in that particular skill he takes at this time in vocational. He can use it so many ways: to build his own home, build a room on, build part-time for extra income, build while changing jobs or in between jobs. Any skill learned can be used."

Jim Hightower finished first in the Demo race for Commissioner of Agriculture with 1138 votes. Noel S. Cowling received 408 votes. Republican Bill Powers received 104 votes and Charles F. "Farmer" Trompler received 57. Powers will challenge Hightower in the November balloting.

Four candidates in each party vied for votes in the race for Railroad Commissioner. John Thomas Henderson lead the field in the Republican race with 66 votes. Milton E. Fox received 43 votes. Ralph Hoelscher received 26 and Ed Emmett received 25. John Sharp took a substantial lead in the Demo race with 625 votes. W.A. (Bill) McNaughton received 230, P.S. (Sam) Ervin received 208, and John C. Poulard received 134 votes.

In the race for Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1 Oscar Mauzy led the Demo candidates with 581, Shirley Butts received 340, Sears McGee got 225, and Hugo Touchy received 63 votes. Republican candidates Nathan Lincoln Hecht and Charles Ben Howell received 56 and 95 votes respectively. Supreme Court, Place 2 candidate on the Republican ballot Nathan E. White Jr. received 141 votes. Jim Brady lead the Demo candidates with 439 votes. Robert M. Campbell received 373 votes. Colin Kelly Kaufman received 165, and Ted Akin received 119.

Jim Wallace ran unopposed for Justice, Supreme Court, Place 3 on the Democratic ticket. He received 883 votes in Floyd County. There was no candidate on the Republican ticket.

Two Republican candidates vied for the unexpired term of Justice, Supreme Court, Place 4. Bill Stephens received 85 votes to John L. Bates' 68. Democratic candidates for the post were: Raul Gonzales, 387; David M. Ivy, 195; John E. Humphries, 237; and Jay Gibson, 404.

Places 1, 2, and 3 on the Court of Criminal Appeals were on the Democratic ballot. In place 1, George "Jorge" Martinez garnered 257, Preston Dial got 560, Paul R. Reagan had 384, and Rusty Duncan got 372. Mike McCormick, running unopposed, got 938 for place 2, as did Marvin O. Teague for place 3.

Foster Whaley received 1132 votes in Floyd County in his unopposed candidacy for State Representative of the 84th District. Carlton B. Dodson, also unopposed received 905 votes for Justice, Court of Appeals, 7th District.

tic Primary and there is no Republican aspirant, Cave's election was assured Saturday.

Complete but unofficial totals show Cave with 2,157 votes and Miller named on 1,969 ballots.

Floyd (895-874) and Motley (175-123) counties went into the Miller column, while Cave carried his home county (Dickens, 664-465) and Briscoe County (469-434).

In this county, nine boxes had a Cave plurality and eight boxes plus absentee were in Miller's corner. Three boxes and absentee went to Cave in Briscoe County and Miller garnered two boxes. Cave received a seven (including absentee) to one plurality in Dickens County boxes.

No breakdown by boxes was available

in Motley County. The Hesperian garnered its figures by contacting a newspaper in each county. The count, based solely on Saturday count, possibly will be changed slightly when votes are canvassed by Democratic executive committees in each county.

In Floyd County, the incumbent Miller was favored in Southwest Floydada, Allmon, East Lockney, Harmony, McCoy, Southeast Floydada, Northeast Floydada and absentee boxes. The challenger was favored in Sandhill, Providence, Lone Star, South Plains, Cedar Hill, Baker, Goodnight, West Lockney and Dougherty boxes.

The contest, which had captured interest throughout the district, polled a greater number of votes than any other on the Floyd County Democratic ballot.

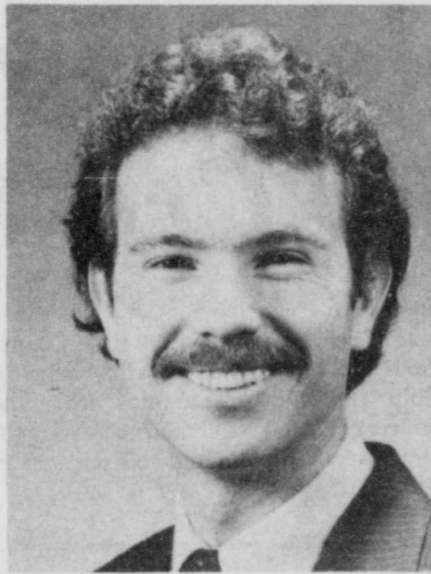
Free Mackenzie Lake passes available when taxes paid

Persons whose Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority taxes are "paid and current may obtain a free entry pass to the lake at the tax appraisal office. This pass is for Mackenzie taxpayers and household members only."

Water authority officials report that passes will not be honored for a boat,

overnight camping or guests. The entry tag must be signed on request by MMWA personnel.

"The 1987 entry passes will be issued upon payment of 1987 taxes," Floyd County newspapers were told. "At that time, all free entry passes will change colors."

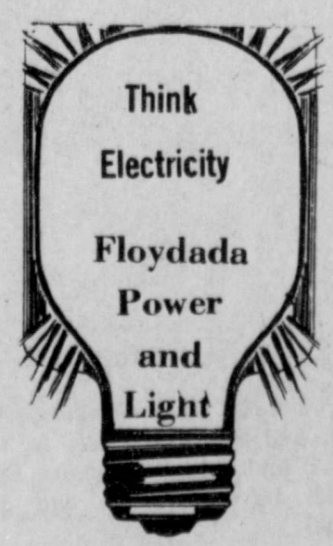

ballot. What this portends in November is anybody's guess. It may be that the relatively light vote for Mark White in the Democratic primary, and the surge in Republican strength was a result of Kent Hance's presence on the ballot. He received 43 percent of the Republican votes in the 33 counties we looked at. But Bill Clements got 45 percent in those same counties. If Lubbock County is added to those counties, the percentages change drastically, of course, as a result of Hance's 19,000 votes there. (The entire Democratic slate for governor received only about 7,000 votes in Lubbock) Or, the vote could reflect part of the "anybody but White" mood that has evidently affected a significant segment of the state's voters.

Here in Floyd County a good bit of fence-mending will be in order, now that the bitterly contested race between District Judge George Miller and challenger David Cave of Spur is settled. District Attorney Randy Hollums came out strong for Miller, only to see Cave win. The outcome of that race was somewhat a surprise to us, for we had expected Miller to run stronger in his home county, particularly with the support of the District Attorney. But voters have their own way of making up their minds, and judging from the comments we have heard after the race, the debate over "reversals" by higher courts had little to do with their thinking. To the voters that seemed to be a debate among lawyers, over their heads. Principal determinants in that race, if what we hear is a fair reflection of the electorate's reasoning, were the issues of "probation" and the Massie Estate. Rightly or wrongly, those two issues seemed to influence more voters than anything else.

Mr. Cave expressed to us, during the course of the campaign, his surprise and anger over the fact that the District Attorney would take sides against him. He then took his anger public. Now that the race is over we would hope that whatever ill feelings resulted from that race will be forgiven, if not forgotten, and that the two men will develop a working relationship that will benefit all of us. It is the nature of the two jobs that there must be a high degree of trust and confidence between those who hold the offices if the "ends of justice" are to be served. We see no real problems here. We believe both to be men of good will

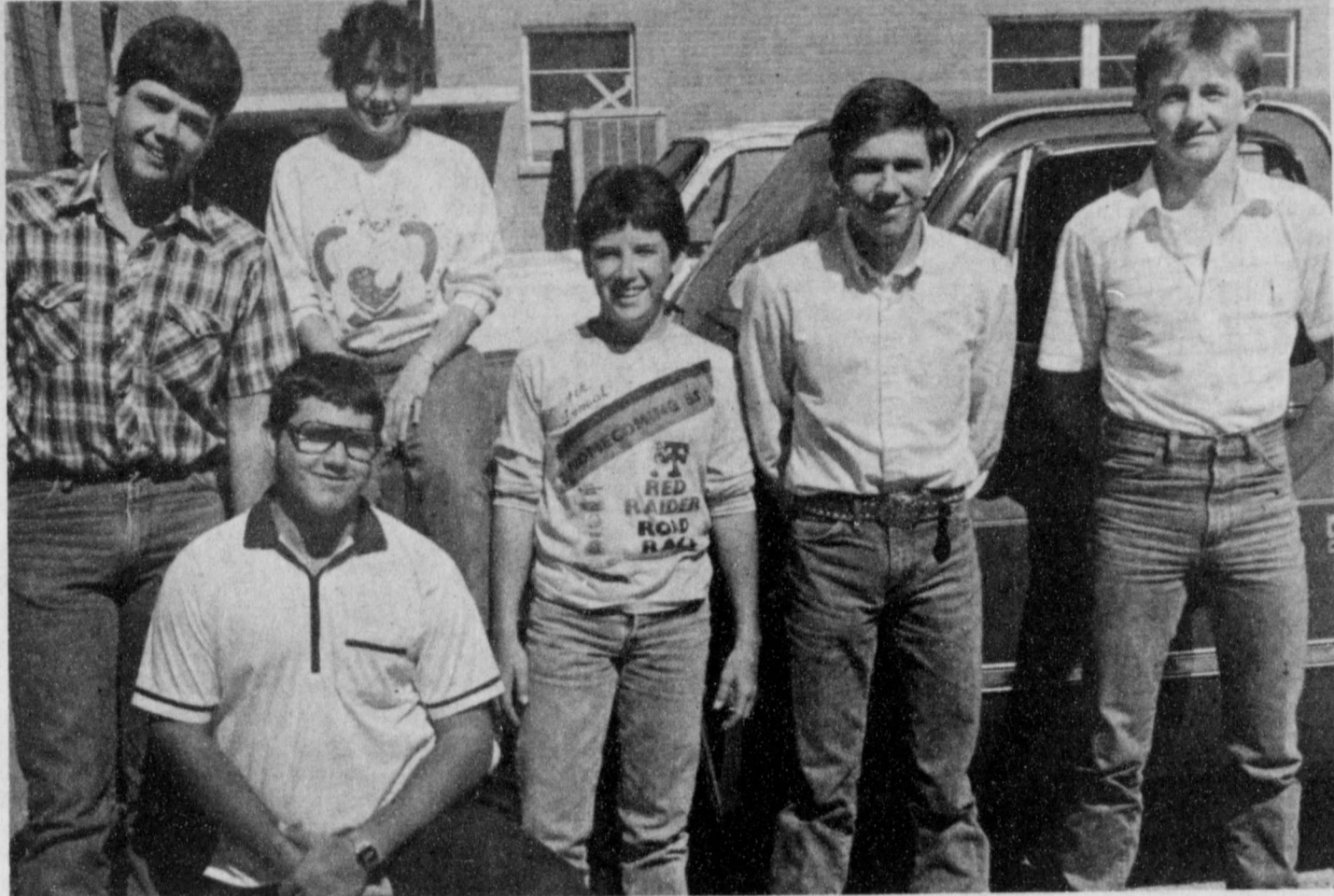

Heflin has been elected to serve as board president for the ensuing year. Lloyd is the new vice president and Willis was chosen secretary.

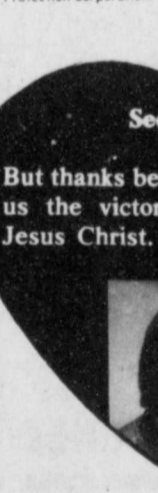

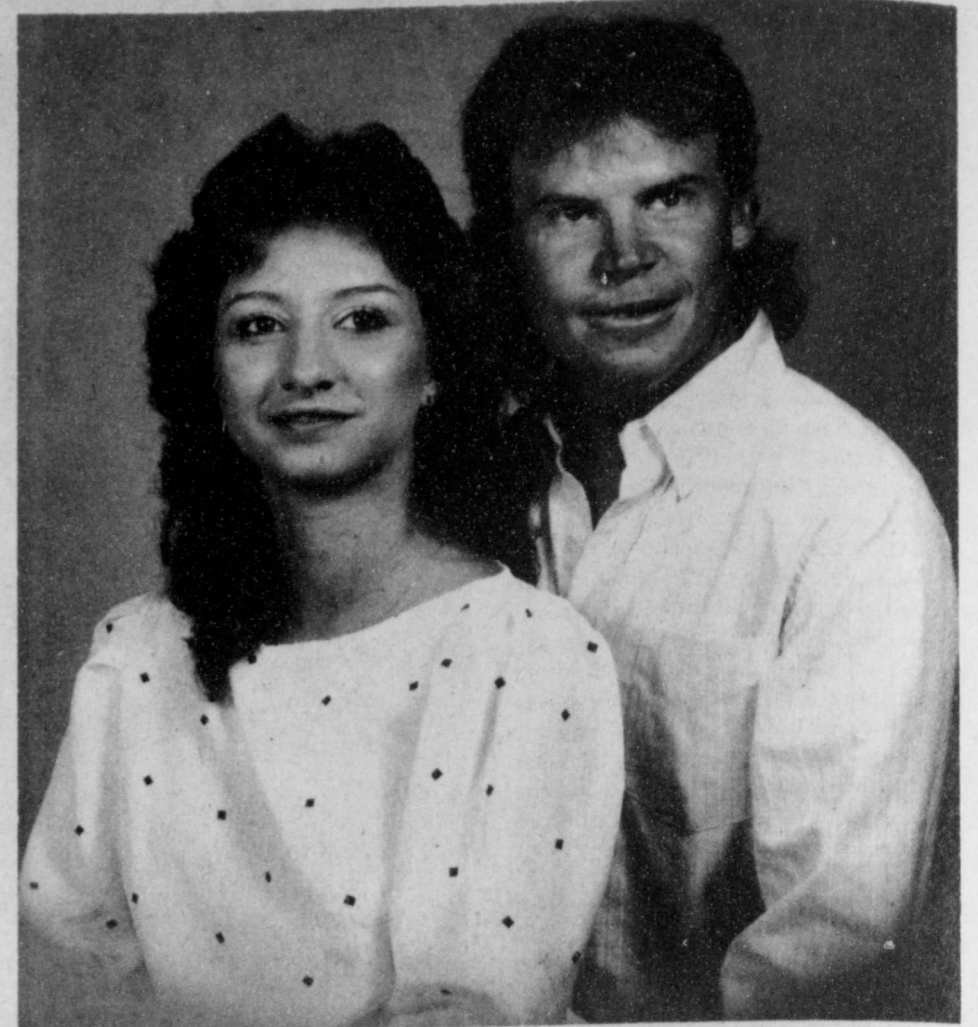

Moosberg's vacation in Manzanilla, Mexico

Mr. and Mrs. Carl A. Moosberg flew to Manzanilla, Mexico last week to observe the "winter crop" of cotton varieties at the Mexican Experiment Station at nearby Colima (in cooperation with our National Cotton Council).

The Moosbergs were accompanied by Dr. Bobbie Phipps also with GroAgri

Seed Co. of Lubbock. By growing a crop in tropical central Mexico they are able to develop twice as fast and get on the market sooner with newer varieties of cottons for our area. The seed should be here for planting by May 15.

The cottons were defoliated and ready to pick. Some of the laborers ride a donkey, bikes or motorcycle to work. The high humidity and warm climate make the crops much taller than here but also plant insects are worse and "honey-dew" heavy! The field is in a valley. One side of the field borders a very high steep mountain.

The sudden change of climate (we left Lubbock at 2 p.m. and arrived at Manzanilla at 8:00 p.m.) is a shock to West Texans.

The labors in Mexico receive per day about what the local day laborers here receive per hour! The devalued peso in Mexico is 470 to 500 for our dollar. Motel prices are down 40% at better hotels and there are few tourists. Gasoline prices are so high very few cars are on the road now. Bikes and cycle sales are up and folks who already own cars are driving much less.

Because of above there is less traffic and fatalities on the highways. We had not been down since 1984. The federal government was then beginning extensive highway improvements and an unbelievable amount has been accomplished in the area. Highways are now wider, better marked, and in good condition! A custom in the area when motorists or pedestrians are killed is that wooden crosses are placed along the road where the accident occurred, which has decreased the number of accidents. It was sad to see an adult cross with a small one by it! The fears are that due to economic conditions the road work will cease.

Schools run on a double schedule. Smaller children go to school from 8:00 to 1:00, and older students go from 1:00-6:00 p.m. All students wear uniforms (simple cotton ones). This custom must be a blessing to parents (no peer pressure) or sayings such as, "What am I going to wear?", "I don't have anything to wear," or "Everyone else has such and such - they really do have!"

The area is around a bay. There are miles of pretty beaches, a harbor (world shipping) and "dry dock" for WWII ships.

They go slower and eat two hours later there. Most shops have living quarters for the families upstairs, and fish and rice are two of the basic foods.

It was nice to "visit" but we are appreciating the wind again!

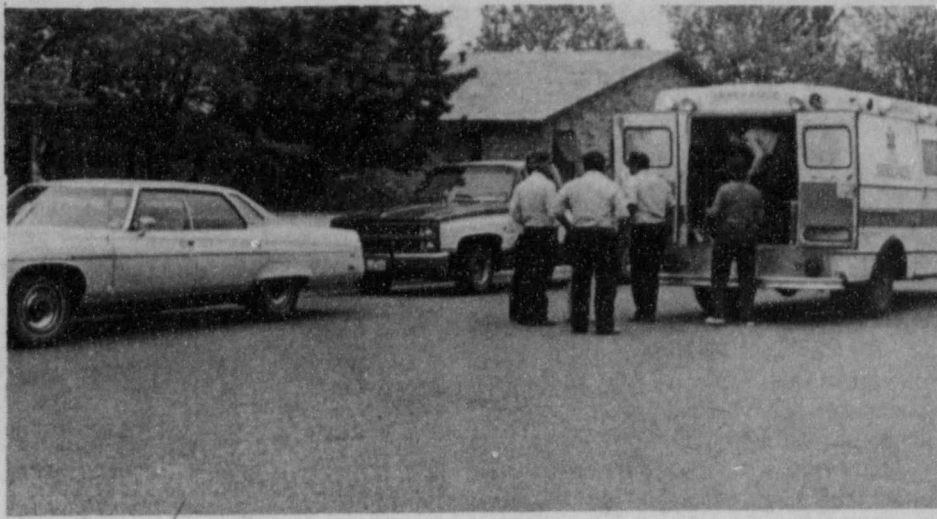
