## Penny Lynn Mulder, Jana Lawson valedictorian and salutatorian

Penny Lynn Mulder has been revealed as valedictorian of the Floydada High School Class of 1986 with a grade point average of 3.804 for her four-year high school career. Salutatorian, with a 3.784 average, is Jana Lawson.

For the first time, Floydada High honor students were determined on the basis of a grade point system, which "weighs" advanced academic courses in conjunction with an individual student's grades.

This system was adopted last year by the board of education.

Miss Mulder, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Mulder of South Plains, is to deliver the valedictory address during Friday, May 30, commencement exercises.

The salutatory address is to be spoken by Miss Lawson in the ceremony in Floydada High School Auditorium. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Lawson of Floydada.

Also scheduled to speak during graduation exercises is Haney Robertson, the top-ranking male student.

The school has a policy that in the event both valedictorian and salutatorian are of the same sex, the high ranking class member of the opposite

sex also makes an address during graduation exercises.

Diplomas are to be presented by Superintendent Jerry Cannon as students are introduced by FHS Principal Ronnie Wood.

Baccalaureate service is planned for Sunday, May 24, in First Baptist Church.

Class of 1986 has approximately 63 candidates for diplomas.

## Tom Duvall dies in Aiken mishap

A stunned silence fell over Floyd County as news spread Tuesday afternoon of the accidental death of widely-known Aiken farmer Tom Duvall, 59.

Duvall's body reportedly was discovered "about 2:35 or 2:40" by two friends, Glen Cooper and Larry Mullins. A small tractor with which he had been shredding weeds had "toppled over sideways" and trapped the victim underneath.

Location of the mishap was described as approximately one mile south and one-half mile west of the Aiken Post Office.

Lockney Justice of the Peace C.L. (Mike) Mooney pronounced the victim dead at the accident scene at 3:10 p.m.

Officials believe death occurred "instantly".

One observer who arrived at the scene shortly after the body was

discovered said that Duvall obviously had been shredding weeds near a tailwater pit on one of his farms. A "trough about four feet deep" reportedly is located immediately west of the pit, and to the west of the "trough" lies "a big mound of dirt."

The source said tracks were visible where "the tractor has been on the dirt." Front two wheels of the north-bound tractor were on an incline.

After the body was discovered, Cooper reportedly drove to the Loyd Duvall residence and summoned the Lockney ambulance and a wrecker.

### WIFE CONCERNED

According to information secured by Pam Armstrong of The Lockney Beacon and The Hesperian staff, Cooper had received a message that Duvall "wanted to see him." He drove to the Aiken farm but was unable to locate the friend and returned to Lockney. He contacted Larry Mullins, who replied that he had seen Duvall earlier in the day and that he was shredding weeds.

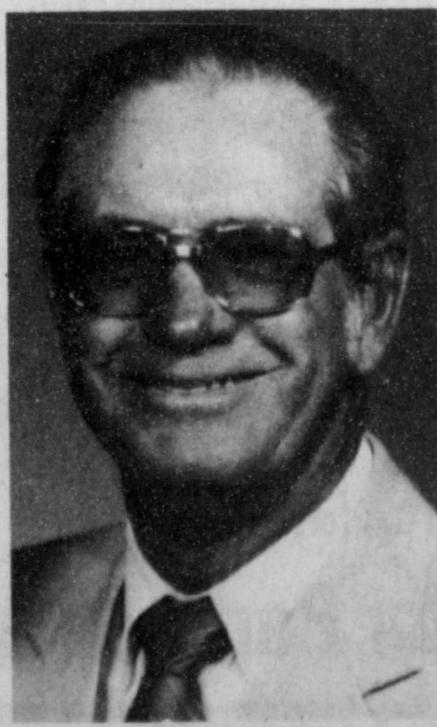
The pair drove to the Duvall home, where JoAnn Duvall told the men she was concerned because her husband had not come in for lunch. She had unsuccessfully attempted to locate him or his pickup.

Mullins knew where the victim had been mowing, and he and Cooper drove to the site, which reportedly is "hard to see from the road." They immediately discovered that accident, which friends believe "probably happened some time before lunch."

## Sheriff's sale slated by appraisal district

Meeting in regular session on May 7, the board of directors for the Floyd County Central Tax Appraisal District discussed the sheriff's sale scheduled for June. A total of fifteen properties in Floyd County are set to go on the auction block due to non-payment of taxes.

Included in the lots to be auctioned are two with houses. The auction is scheduled for 10:00 a.m. on June 3.

Information concerning the lots to be sold can be obtained in the Public Notice section of the Hesperian. The sale will take place on the Floyd County Courthouse steps.

Chief appraiser Sheila Faulkenberry told the board that tax collections for the year are now 93% complete. "This is the same percentage that we had collected last year at this time," said Faulkenberry.

Faulkenberry also reported that the computer purchased by the district will be paid for following the payment of the June installment.

Notices concerning changes in appraised values of \$500 or more have been sent to taxpayers following the reappraisal of commercial property according to Faulkenberry. Taxpayers who disagree with the new values placed on their property have until 5:00 p.m. on May 22 to file a protest with the appraisal office.

Any protest that cannot be resolved by the office may be presented to the Appraisal Review Board for consideration. The appraisal office personnel will

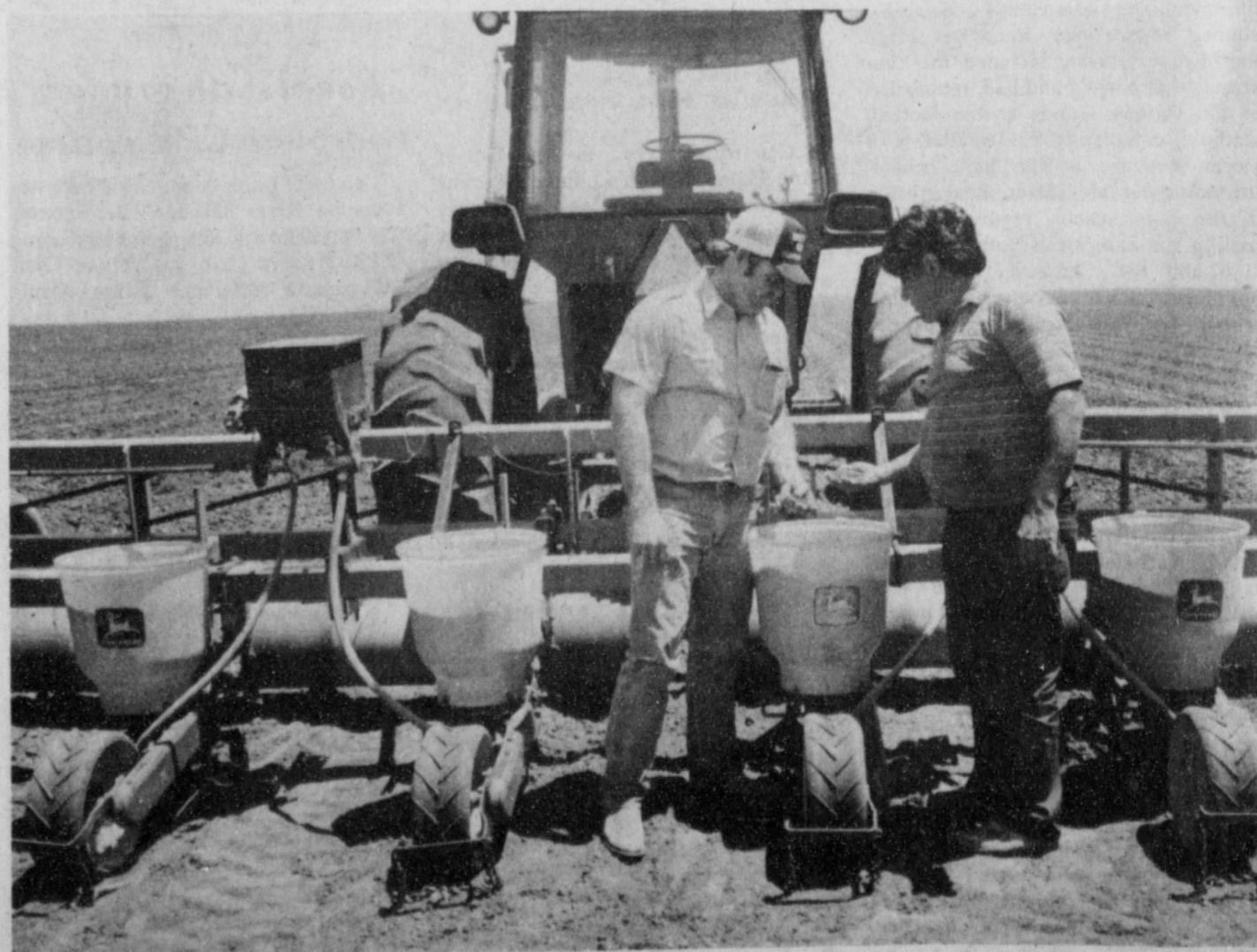
Serving of the barbecue lunch begins at 11:30.

# Interpretation difference spawns trustee split vote

Which constitutes a school year: 180 classroom days or 365 calendar days?

That difference in interpretation caused a split vote among Floydada school trustees Monday night as they were confronted with a decision on whether the recently elected Floydada High School Student Council president should be allowed to serve.

The situation developed when the eligibility of the SC president-elect, Alfred Medrano, was questioned by Larry, Stella and Rickey Benjamin. Medrano was elected to the post last Tuesday by the student body.

Local school by-laws stipulate that, in order to be considered as Student Council president, a student must be a Student Council representative/one year (elected by his/her class), have an 80 or above average, have leadership and good citizenship traits and have been a Floydada High student two years.

The interpretation difference came over the stipulation that "The president of Student Council must have at least one year of active membership (as a representative or an officer) on the council."

Medrano was elected to the Student Council in May 1984, according to school officials, and served until he withdrew April 9, 1985, as a Floydada High School student and "attended school in Oklahoma for a few weeks" last spring before returning to Floydada and resuming his studies here at the beginning of the 1985-86 school year.

"I considered him eligible due to his involvement in student activities on the Spirit Committee as an elected position," FHS Principal Ronnie Wood informed trustees. "Rules and regulations are never meant to hinder a student; their purpose is to encourage."

Wood added that "It was my interpretation and my decision" that Medrano was eligible to serve as Student Council proxy. "It is my opinion that both (Medrano and Rickey Benjamin) were highly qualified to run," he continued.

In contending that "one year" means 365 school days, Stella Benjamin said, "If it (365 days) isn't a full year, it (by-laws) needs to read the correct way."

Larry Benjamin believes "It is crystal clear he (Medrano) must have served at least one year. A year is 365 days."

Following the discussion and departure of the Benjamins, trustees went into executive session to discuss this and other matters.

After reconvening in open session, the board heard a motion by Freddie Morren, seconded by Charlene Brown, to hold a second election for Student Council president.

Morren and Mrs. Brown favored motion, while Harvey Allen, Don Hardy, Bill Orman and John Dunlap voted "no".

Then came a motion by Allen, seconded by Hardy, to allow the election to stand "as is". Trustees again voted along the same lines with Morren and Mrs. Brown casting "no" votes and the others voting "yes".

This means that Medrano is to serve as Student Council proxy for the ensuing school year.

Wood explained to The Hesperian on Tuesday morning that "Alfred was elected to the council in May of 1984 and actively served until he withdrew from school here in April of 1985. He returned to school in Floydada at the beginning of the 1985-86 school year. In my interpretation, the seven months he served would constitute a year, considering his activities."

Among other matters taken up at the May 12 trustees meeting were capital improvements to be considered for the coming budget year. Items suggested for further scrutiny included the construction of a new band hall, renovation of the visitors stands at the football stadium, completing the installation of storm windows at the high school, extending the sidewalk on the northside of the high school, resurfacing and sealing the exterior of both the junior high and R.C. Andrews Elementary buildings, further re-roofing of the high school, and the replacement of the exterior doors at the junior high.

The board elected to delay making a final decision on the matter until the full extent of 1986-87 state funding is known. A motion by Freddie Morren, seconded by Don Hardy, served to narrow the items to be considered by deleting the band hall and the exterior of R.C. Andrews Elementary from the list for the time being. The vote following the motion was carried unanimously.

Bids were opened for the current re-roofing project at the high school. Walter Davis Construction of Floydada received the go ahead with a bid of \$38,930 for installation of a sloped tin roof over the original classroom section on the northside of the high school. The only other bid submitted came from Melvin Dunavant and totaled \$56,563. Jimmie Collins, administrative assistant, presented a tax report showing collections on the current tax levy to be 92.93% complete with \$816,882.41 collected to date. Collections at this time last year were 91% complete with \$836,978.65 collected. The district bud-

get is calculated with an estimated collection rate of 94% as a working base.

The resignation of Gina Patterson, a first grade teacher at A.B. Duncan Elementary, was accepted by the board. Patterson has accepted employment at another school and will be leaving her job in Floydada as of the end of the current school year.

The Fisd board of trustees will be meeting again on Monday, May 19, at

7:00 p.m. to consider applications for an elementary school principal to replace Bob Copeland who will be retiring from his post at Duncan this year. Interviews will be conducted at this time. The meeting will be an executive session as permitted by law for discussing personnel.

Future board meetings will be scheduled at 8:00 p.m. to accommodate the longer daylight hours of daylight savings time according to superintendent Jerry Cannon.

Highlights will include performances by the Caravan Brass, Caravan Cloggers, Caravan Band and a team of talented young vocalists from throughout the nation.

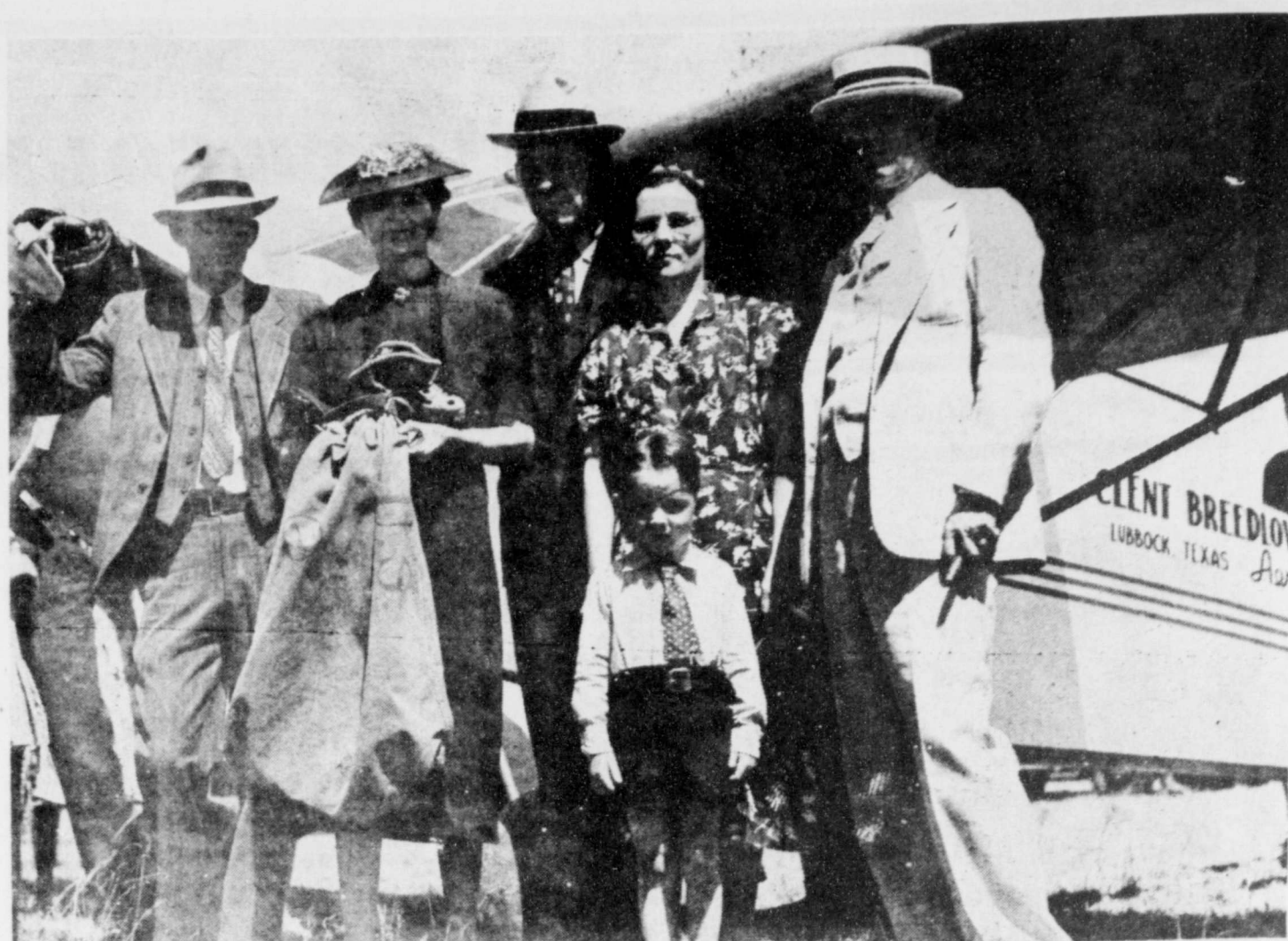

The city is asking that local users of the landfill cooperate in keeping the

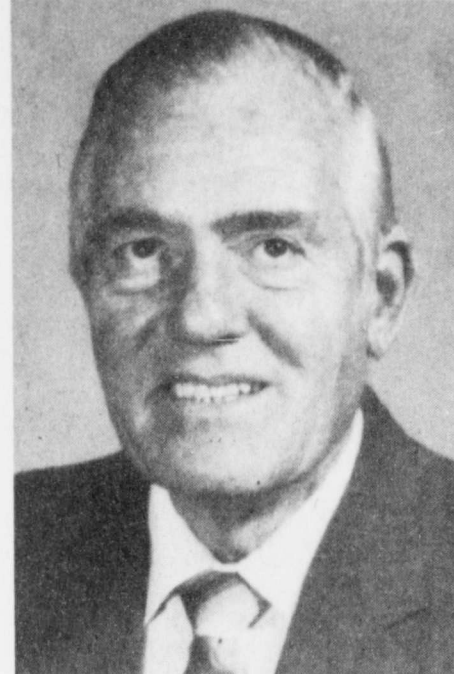
Floydada facility "a safe and sanitary place to dispose of trash and other unusable items."

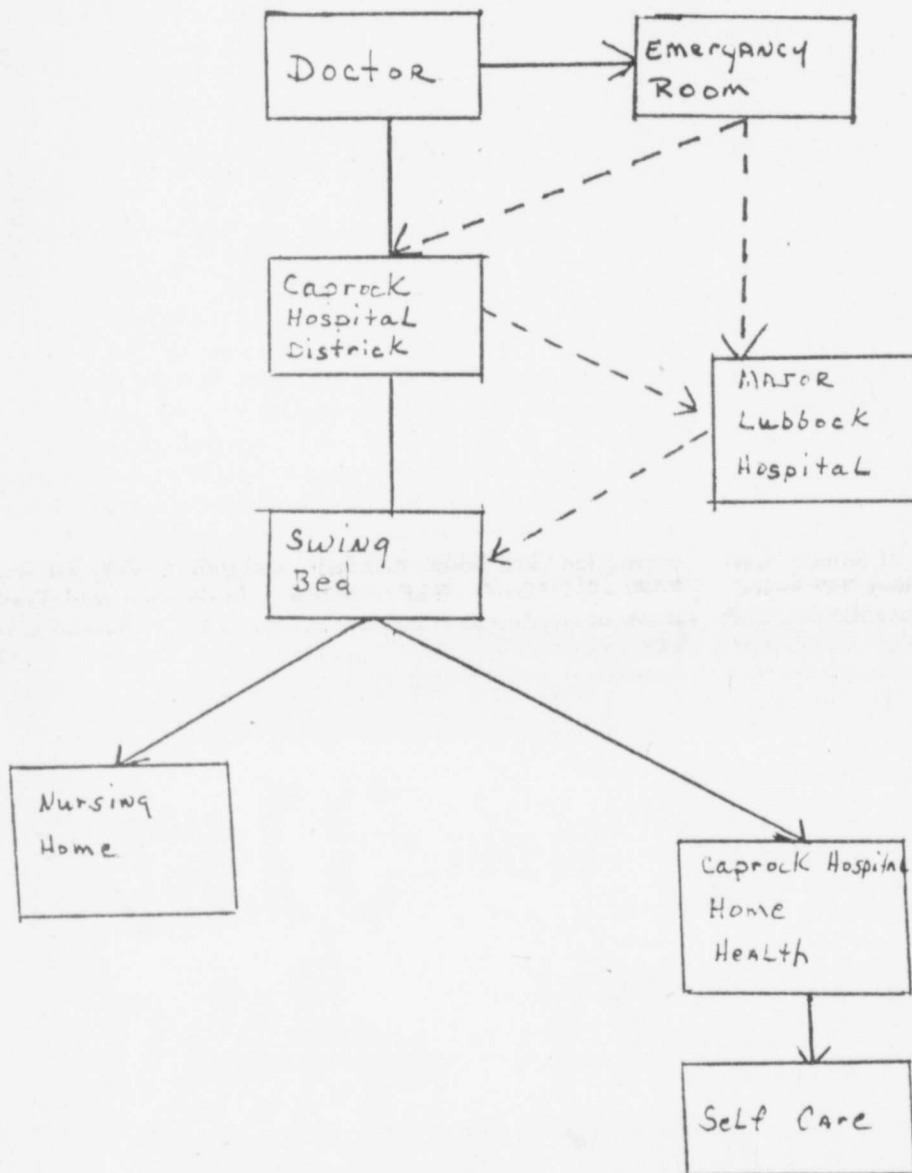
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## 'Swing Bed' approved for Caprock Hospital

Flow Chart  
"Swing-Bed"



On April 28, Caprock Hospital District was surveyed by Medicare and the Texas State Department of Health. A program called "Swing-Bed", was approved without any deficiencies. The following Flow Chart shows how the "Swing-Bed" Program works:

(INSERT CHART)  
A patient goes to the doctor or to the emergency room; at this time, the patient may be admitted to Caprock Hospital District or may be transferred to a major hospital in Lubbock.

After patient is on the road to recovery, yet still requires Skilled Nursing Care, a patient can be admitted to the "Swing-Bed" Program. Services provided by the "Swing-Bed" Program includes: Skilled Nursing Care, Medical Social Services, Dental Consultant, Activities Program and Speech Therapy, depending on the "Swing-Bed" patient's needs.

The ultimate goal for the patient, is to be in their own home and be followed by a "Home Health" nurse for a period of time with the eventual goal of "Self Care". If the "Swing-Bed" patient is unable to go home, they will be transferred to a "Non-Skilled" Nursing Home.

To qualify for the "Swing-Bed" Program, a patient has to be hospitalized prior to admission and they must require "Skilled Nursing"

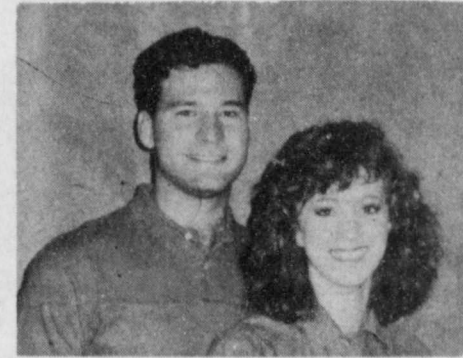

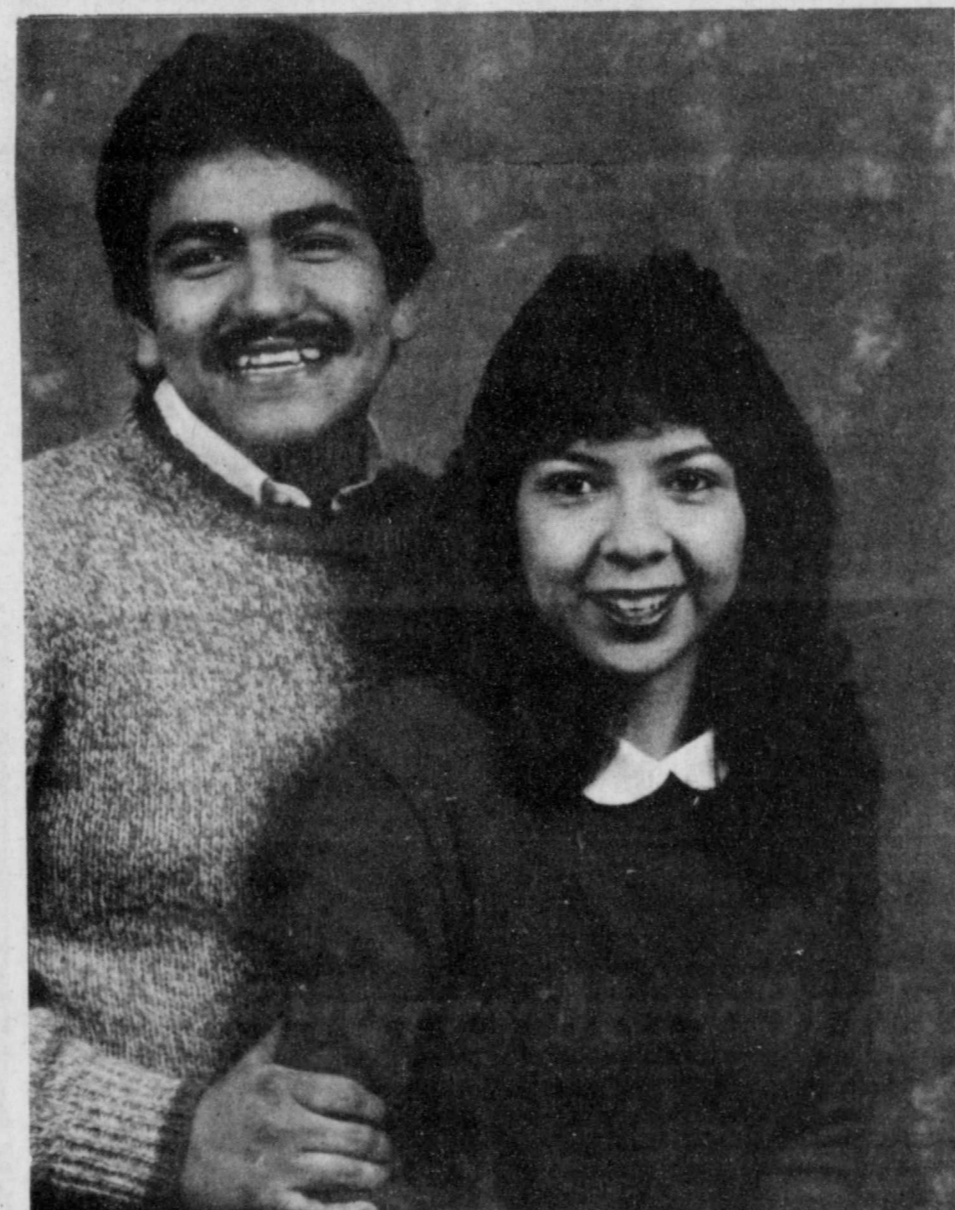

"I look forward to my new position, and my family and I look forward to getting to know the people of Floydada better," Schacht told Floyd County newspapers. "I also look forward to working with the Farm Bureau board and members in a different capacity."

He added that: "I would like to thank James (Race) for all the leadership he has given me; and I hope to carry on the type of job he has been doing."

Schacht, who joined the Floyd County Farm Bureau Insurance agency as a career agent in July 1982, and his wife, Judy, are parents of one child, Meredith, five, who will enter kindergarten this fall.

Born and raised in Lockney, he is a son of Eleanor Schacht and the late Fritz Schacht. He graduated in 1968 from Texas Tech University and received a masters of education degree from Texas Tech University in 1972.

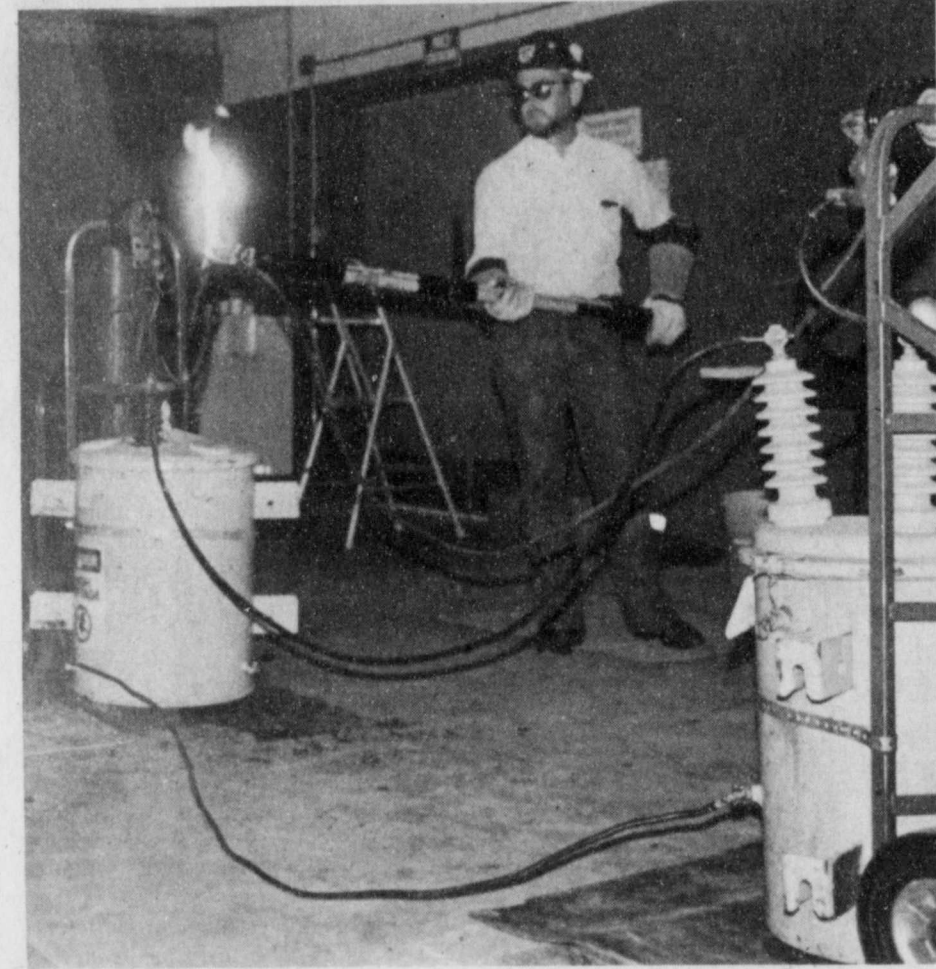
### SAME STAFF

## Safety demonstration conducted

Floydada and Lockney students and instructors were introduced to the potential hazards associated with overhead power lines at a safety demonstration arranged by Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, and presented at the Cooperative headquarters in Floydada on Monday, May 5.

Larry Baker and Bob Smith, Job Training and Safety instructors for the Electric Power Utilities Training Division of the Texas A&M Extension Service, conducted demonstrations several times throughout the day for the different classes.

Attending the sessions were the Floydada vo-ag classes of instructor Alan Akers, Lockney vo-ag students of Randall Robbins, and Floydada vocational education students of instructors Al Galloway, Dale Smith, and Joyce Williams.

Using lectures, slides, and a live arcing demonstration, Baker and Smith not only explained, but showed by simulation what happens when an object comes in contact with high voltage power lines.

The electrical conducting properties of several items which can and do come in contact with power lines were spectacularly demonstrated. Included in these items were tree limbs, metal ladders, irrigation pipe, wire, rope, and perhaps most impressive, a wiener used to represent human flesh.

Those attending were reminded to be particularly alert when working around the farm with machinery or equipment which could come in contact with power lines, and to remind others when they are observed in a potentially hazardous situation.

Objectives of the demonstration were summarized by the instructors in their closing remarks: "In conclusion, we hope that you have not enjoyed this demonstration. There is nothing enjoyable about human injury, suffering, and death. Electrical contact injuries always involve injuries, and so often a loss of life. So, let's all look up, down, and around, and stop this endless waste of human life."

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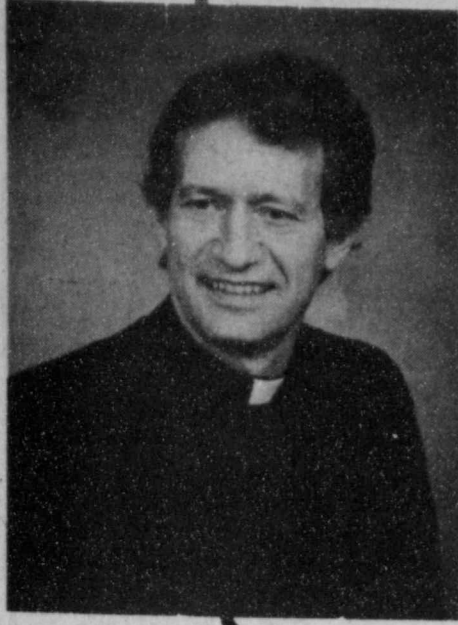

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The Rev. Jack Gist was born in Brownwood, Texas and grew up in Lubbock. He was ordained in 1965. He was the administrator of Blessed Sacrament Church, in Amarillo, from 1968 to 1970, and Pastor of St. Ann's University Parish, Canyon, from 1970 to 1982. He has been Pastor of St. Alice, in Plainview since August of 1982 and also of St. Joseph's, in Lockney, since October 1983.

## Generativity

We have just observed Mother's Day and Father's Day come soon. We remember our parents in a golden-rule kind of way - in order to do for others what they have done for us. They gave us life; they generated life.

"Generativity" is a jargonish word for a dimension of maturity that we must all deal with whether we are parents or not. It is a part of our commitment to life that is important even if we are not married. The term unfortunately conjures up visions of kilowatt hours but refers to the stage of personal development during which an individual is challenged to look beyond his own interest and his own years and into the future with a sense of caring. In other words, the adult estate is reached when, having dealt with our own identity, we can then concern ourselves with handing on and enlarging the life of the next generation. If you want a good sign of being "a man" or grown up, don't look for sexual prowess, the big car or that knowing way about wines. Look for the person who has come to terms sufficiently with his own life to be able to give his energies to the lives of his children - whether these are his own or those who are, for one reason or another, in his care or under his influence. The generative person - man or woman - gives away what cannot be purchased and cannot really be lost once it is given: the loving concern that opens life up to the growing generation.

Being generative, then, does not just mean being genital, although it includes this in a mature understanding and integration of sexuality into life. It is a funny thing that the movies that are marked "Adults Only" are hardly that at all; in their exploitation of all age groups these films often betray the destructive self-absorption of their producers and directors. A generative person, a life-giving person authentically involved in life is not - repeat is not - just the middle aged individual whose love affair with his own lost youth leads him to affect the styles and jargon of youth in order to fit into their ranks. That person, like the teacher who plays favorites instead of playing fair, is a victim of his own needs to such an extent that he cannot enlarge the lives of those around him. He can only drain others for his own nourishment, trying to squeeze out of them a sense of himself that is always just beyond him.

Being generative does not call for a superhero or superwoman either. It is, in fact, just that ordinary persons have a marvelous talent for, when they are themselves and have learned some of life's hard lessons of loving. Average people, unadorned and unaffected, break out of themselves and the search for their own comfort when they continue to grow in their mature years. All persons, always, need to be asking, "Which way is maturity?" even those who have reached what others call the "crest of maturity" or the "declining years". We can have a human sense of direction that is strengthened by the Holy Spirit; there is nothing sentimental about giving up yourself in order to bequeath life to others in the here and now. Generative love - the kind found in good parents, teachers, pastors, and even bachelor uncles - flows from an act of faith in the possibilities of today's children, not just from an expectation that they will like us for our concern or that we will be paid back for it here or hereafter. Rather it is a commitment made for the sake of the young persons themselves, because, in and for themselves, they are worth caring about. This is the kind of love Jesus preached, the kind of love that allows people to discover their own lives out of the shadow of our own life.

In this time between Mother's Day and Father's Day we remember our parents in order to do for others what they have done for us - to give life to a new and arising generation. To give us to receive and thus we enable ourselves "to live until we die". Amid these parents' days we remember as well the Lord's mandate, "call no man father". It is entirely appropriate for us to add, "call no man teacher" or "preacher" for it is God who teaches us to give and enlarge life, to be caring and responsible.

## Trapping service to rise in cost in Floyd County

Meeting in regular session on May 12, the Floyd County Commissioners Court learned that the services of a trapper will be more expensive to the county in the future. Jim Winnett of the Texas Cooperative Trapping Fund reported to the court that the state has authorized an increase in the compensation paid to a trapper from \$700 per month to \$900 per month. This increase will be effective with the beginning of the next budget year for the county.

Floyd County now shares the services of a trapper, Fred Stockton, with Briscoe County on a fifty-fifty basis. The county currently pays \$400 per month including a mileage allowance. The new rate would require payment of \$450 per month, excluding mileage. This rate would become effective as of January 1, 1987 if the county chooses to continue utilizing the services of a trapper. The court will take the matter under consideration during upcoming budget hearings for setting the 1987 operating budget.

A service and maintenance contract on the new teletype in the Sheriff's Department was approved. The five year agreement will cost the county \$89 per month. A service contract on the elevator in the courthouse was tabled until the next regular court date. The contract proposed by ESCO Elevators, Inc. of Ft. Worth calls for payment of a premium of \$222.40 per month.

The court approved a motion to allow any qualified county employee to apply for credit towards retirement for time served in the armed forces was unanimously approved. This will enable county employees to count their previous military service when calculating retire-

ment benefits from the county retirement plan.

Members of the court, in their capacity as a taxing entity, approved a Floydada city request for permission to demolish the delapidated structures at 1008 South 4th Street in Floydada. The property is listed on tax roles as belonging to the taxing entities in lieu of unpaid taxes and the buildings on it are considered a hazard.

Routine matters handled by the court included the monthly reports of the county auditor and the county treasurer. Seven requests for farm work were approved. The requests were made by Deryl Evans, Kenneth Willis (two requests), Robert Daniels, Lonnie Hinsley, Joe Hinkle, and James Cage.

## Trustees hear TEAMS results

Floydada school trustees received a report of the 1986 Texas Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) results at their May 12 meeting. Sheree Cannon, TEAMS coordinator, presented the report on grades, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11. Grade 1 results were not available at this date.

TEAMS tests are a result of the 1984 school reforms mandated by the Texas Legislature in 1984. The tests were designed to measure minimum basic skills in reading, writing and mathematics for all pupils in grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11/12.

Of the third graders in Duncan Elementary School, 78 percent mastered math, 76 percent reading and 53 percent language arts.

Fifth grade reports indicated that 79 percent mastered math, 79 percent mastered reading and 64 percent language arts.

Eighty-three percent of the seventh graders mastered math, 85 percent reading and 76 percent language arts.

In the ninth grade, 90 percent mastered math, 80 percent reading, and 79 percent language arts.

Results of the eleventh grade tests were reported earlier in the year. Floydada juniors scored extremely well as only two juniors failed to master the mathematics portion of the test and all demonstrated mastery of the language arts portion. Students who fail one or more portions of the test have as many as four opportunities to demonstrate mastery of TEAMS during their junior and senior years. They must pass the test in order to graduate from high school.

Students in Floydada schools exceeded statewide mastery percentages in grades 7 and 9 in all three subject areas and were only slightly below in grades 3 and 5. The minimum criteria for mastery in the basic skills areas of mathematics, reading, and language arts is established by the State Board of Education.

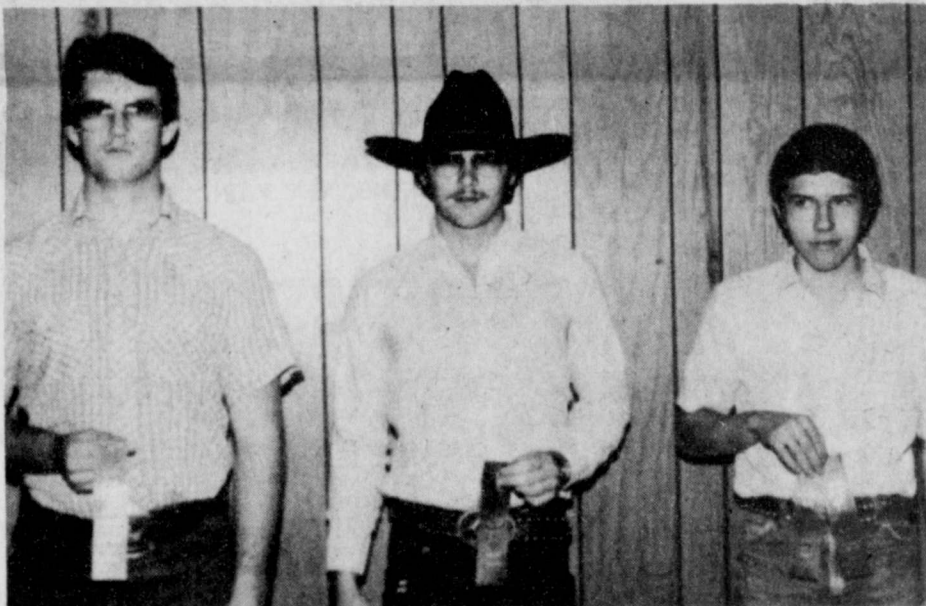
The results from this first year of implementation of TEAMS are "benchmarks" against which the Texas Education Agency can measure future benefits of the educational reforms.

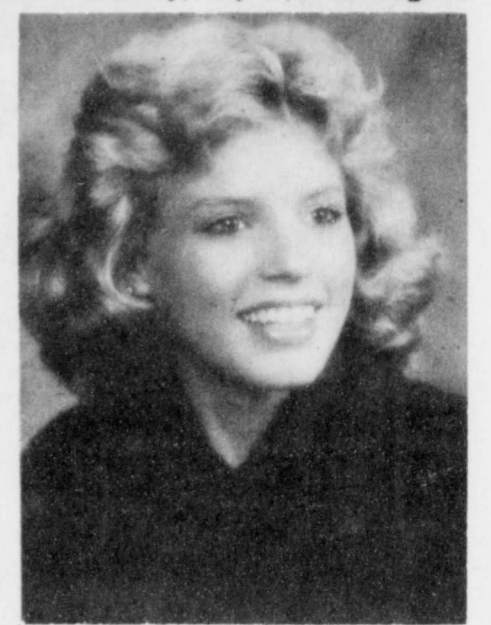

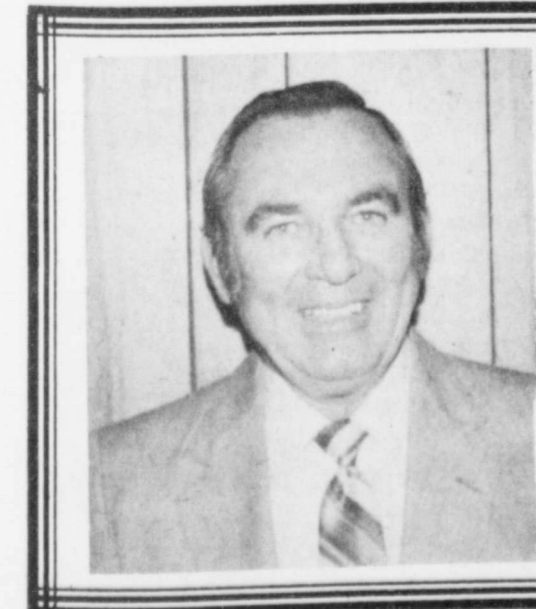

# May national electrical safety awareness month

Anyone working outside around the home this time of year should be careful to stay clear of power lines, says Hermilo Martinez, manager of safety for Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

It's appropriate that May is National Electrical Safety Awareness Month, Martinez says, because people are spending more time outside, near power lines and electrical facilities.

"The slightest touch of a power line can be enough to seriously injure or kill," Martinez says. "Sometimes people forget to think about those lines when they're trimming trees, moving a ladder or putting up a rooftop antenna."

Those who live in neighborhoods with underground electrical distribution lines should be careful when digging, too, Martinez says.

Spring storms pose another potential hazard, he says. "High winds can damage poles and lines," he says. "Anyone who sees a power line sagging or hanging broken should stay away from it, keep others away, and call us immediately. And be sure not to touch anything the line is touching, like a chain-link fence, which also could have become energized and dangerous."

Martinez says parents should teach their children the dangers of carelessness around electricity, especially since school soon will be out for the summer. "Kids will be spending more time on their own, away from the house," he says. "They need to know to stay out of substations and to not climb utility poles or trees near overhead lines."

In this part of the country there can be a lot of irrigation pipe and it should be handled with care, Martinez says.

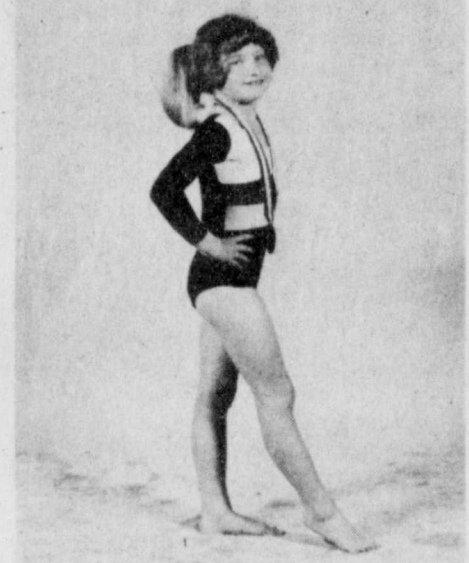

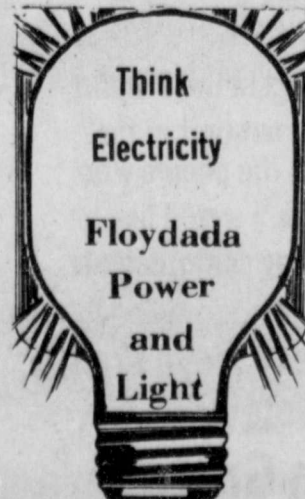

Customers also receive an additional 15 percent discount on the same type of AT&T long distance calls placed during the evening rate period. In addition, an hourly rate of \$12, or \$20 per minute applies for weekend and night rate calls beyond the initial hour of calling provided under the REACH OUT Texas basic rate.

AT&T estimates current annual revenues generated by the REACH OUT Texas service to be over \$14 million.


