Liquor search also produces marijuana

Floydada residents attempting to develop a new cash crop — marijuana — had their experiment sidetracked about 5 p.m. Thursday by local peace officers.

City and county law enforcement, armed with search warrants, arrived at residences located at 519 East Jackson and 304 North 10th in quest of illegal alcoholic beverages. They found what they expected and more: marijuana.

"We were searching for beer and liquor," said James Hale, acting Floydada police chief. "but we also found outside of 304 North 10th marijuana growing in the garden. Also out in the open at 519 East Jackson we found marijuana growing in a styrofoam cooler and an old rubber tire."

Four persons — Lonzell Brown, Ella Davis, Francis Collier, and Vella Acy — were apprehended on possession of marijuana charges. Three of the four — Brown, David and Collier — were also charged with possession of liquor for resale in a dry area.

BURGLARIES SOLVED

Police also cleared up three burglaries last week with the arrest of two people.

"A small tip through crime line gave us enough information to get started with the investigation that led to the arrest," said Hale.

The residential burglary that occurred on April 25, 1986 was cleared with an arrest on May 13 and an arrest on May 22.

On May 20, the McCandless Tire burglary that occurred on April 24, 1986 was solved with an arrest.

Also an arrest on May 22 cleared the Hammond Sheet Metal burglary that occurred on May 7, 1986.

"The same man was involved in all three burglaries," said Hale. "but he had an accomplice in the residential burglary."

New surgeon, Dr. Lopez, joining Caprock Hospital medical staff

After completion of his training in Augusta, he relocated to

Bonham, Texas, where he has been for the last ten years, in private practice.

Dr. Lopez is certified by the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates, holds a current Texas State License to practice medicine, is a member of the American Medical Association, is a member of the American Abdominal Surgery Association, and is a Fellow of the American Association of Specialty Surgeons.

Hospital medical staff privileges were approved for Dr. Lopez by the Caprock Hospital District Board of

Directors on April 28th, upon the recommendation of the Medical Staff Executive Committee. Privileges were granted in the following major areas: general surgery, plastic surgery, emergency room medicine, and family practice. Five wheat loads arrive Thursday

From points throughout the county, no fewer than five loads of wheat were delivered last Thursday to different receiving points to inaugurate the 1986 Floyd wheat harvest.

Elevators at Muncy, Lockney, Dougherty, Floydada and Cedar Hill all received wheat on that day, May 22. Information was not available on which was actually the county's first wheat.

E. R. Melton delivered the initial load to Producers Cooperative Elevator's Cedar Hill location. Cut from a 40 acre block near Cedar Hill, the moisture content ranged from 8.10 to 11.0 percent and the test weight was 57.61, according to Bob Vickers, Producers general manager.

Yield was 24 bushels per acre from the dryland plot.

Roger Poage said that both Lon Davis Grain Co. in Floydada and D&P Grain Co., Inc., in Dougherty received grain Thursday. Delmas McCormick harvested from his place southeast of Floydada and delivered to Lon Davis Grain Co. wheat that contained 12.9 percent moisture and

was 57 pound test weight.

The D&P Grain Co., Inc., terminal received a load from Vernie Moore. Coming from land south of Dougherty, it had 12.0 percent moisture and was 60 pound test weight.

Byron Brock brought the first load to Patterson Grain Co. in Lockney on Thursday. With a test weight of 57 pounds, its moisture content was 13.50 percent, according to Kelton Shaw.

Brock had the initial load of wheat in the Lockney area last year.

Jimmy Kemp and Kropp delivered wheat to Muncy Elevator on Thursday. It contained 13.2 percent moisture and had a test weight of 60 pounds, according to Herman Graham.

Barwise Elevator expected a load of wheat Saturday, but harvest was delayed by rain.

Vickers believes that "if the weather cooperates," a bulk of the harvest will occur during the two weeks beginning next Monday. "It all depends on the weather," he adds.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

Q—I was married to a World War II veteran for 40 years. After his death I learned he had been married before and had never divorced his first wife. Will this bar me from a widow's pension?

A—No. If you had no knowledge of the legal impediment, the VA may deem the marriage to be valid. This type of case requires special consideration and may delay a final decision.

Q—Are common-law marriages recognized by the Veterans Administration?

A—The VA can recognize a common-law marriage only if it was legal under a state's law at the time it occurred.

Q—My son was killed while on active duty and I am receiving Dependency and Indemnity Compensation benefits from the VA. Am I entitled to the CHAMPVA medical benefits program for dependents and survivors?

A—No. Dependent parents are not entitled to CHAMPVA.

Mr. Holland has served the Southwest Parks and Recreation Training Institute as board member, committee chairman on several committees, as a panel chairman and workshop speaker. In addition to receiving the Ruby Award, Mr. Holland has received the institute's ten year attendance award.

The presentation was made at the awards banquet which recognizes attendance to and participation in the training institute.

Floydada woman dies in pickup accident

Sarah Jane Lea, who resided east of Floydada, perished early Friday morning in a one-vehicle accident. She was 21.

The pickup in which Miss Lea was

riding alone was discovered about 7 a.m. Friday near a bridge along Farm Road 651, approximately 10 miles north of Crosbyton.

According to reports, the vehicle's engine was "cold", indicating that the accident had occurred some time before. The victim was pronounced dead at the scene.

Miss Lea was employed at Blanco Gin, located in the extreme northern portion of Crosby County.

Memorial services were at 10 a.m. Tuesday in Harding, Orr and McDaniel Funeral Home in El Paso. Burial was made in El Paso's Rest Lawn Cemetery.

A Houston native, Miss Lea had resided in Floydada for three years. She attended Texas Tech University.

Survivors include her parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Lea of Houston; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Lea of El Paso and Mrs. George Walker of El Paso; and one sister, Catherine Ann Lea of Houston.

Seven pound bass caught

Bass fishing is "excellent", catfish catches are "very good" and crappie fishing remains "good", according to Mackenzie Lake personnel.

R.M. Hubbard of White Deer reeled in a seven pound bass during the past week. It was caught on buzz bait. Buzz bait also was used by another fisherman to haul in a five pound bass.

Glen Zeek of Tulia used a topwater lure to hook a six pound bass. Most crappie are being caught on minnows in approximately 15 feet of water, lake personnel say.

Ken Sanders of Amarillo "brought in several three-four pound catfish, using large minnows." He was "fishing up the creeks in shallow water."

Walleye are "still flowing." Hybrid stripers are "still being caught late in the evening near the dam."

Water temperature early this week was 68 degrees, and the lake depth was 112 feet.

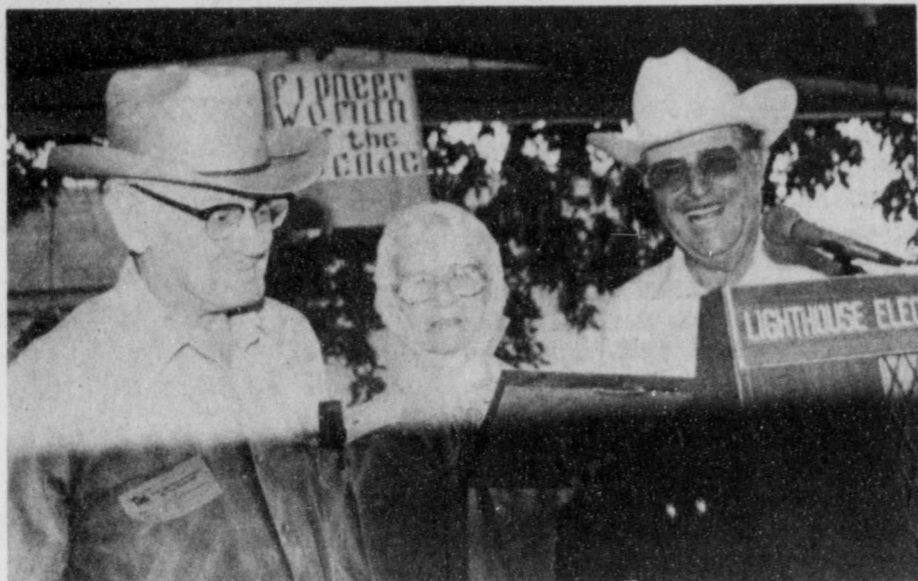
Jess and Bessie Glover were honored as the Outstanding Pioneer Family. The pair have been married for 65 years and have been residents of Floyd County for their entire married lives.

The oldest woman in attendance was Mrs. W.A. Lovell, who admitted to "at least 93 years on this earth". Warnie Hilton, at 104, was the oldest man in attendance.

Ann Swepton was honored posthumously with an award as Pioneer Woman of the Decade. Mrs. Swepton was noted for her participation in the Pioneer Association, the Floyd County Historical Museum, and her many years as a teacher.

Lovene Moore conducted a special

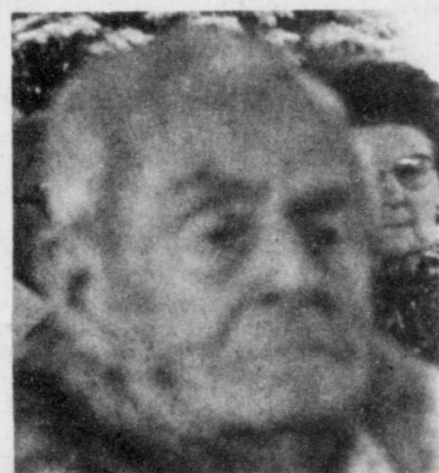


PIONEER FAMILY — Jess and Bessie Glover (left to right) received a plaque from Hubert Frizzell honoring them as

Lightning possible fire cause

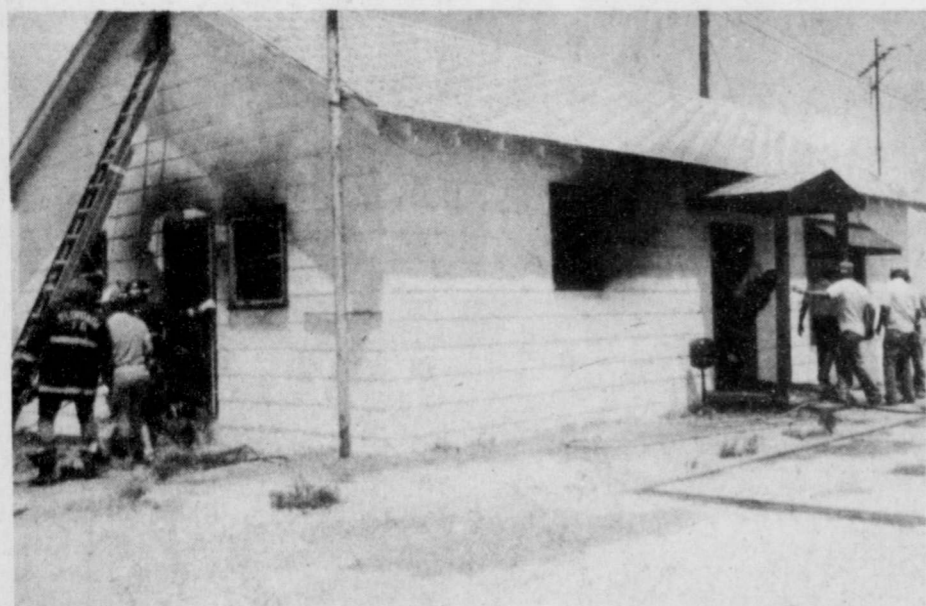
The home of Marion Hughes was damaged by fire, possibly started by lightning, during Saturday night's storm.

At approximately 11:29 p.m. the Floydada Fire Department received a call of a fire at 625 West Ross. "We believe the fire started from an electrical short possibly caused by lightning,"

said Fire Chief Bobby Welborn.

"The fire started in the kitchen," continued Welborn, "either in the refrigerator wire or the plug behind the refrigerator. The fire mostly destroyed kitchen and there is smoke and heat damage throughout the house."

There was no one home at the time of the fire.

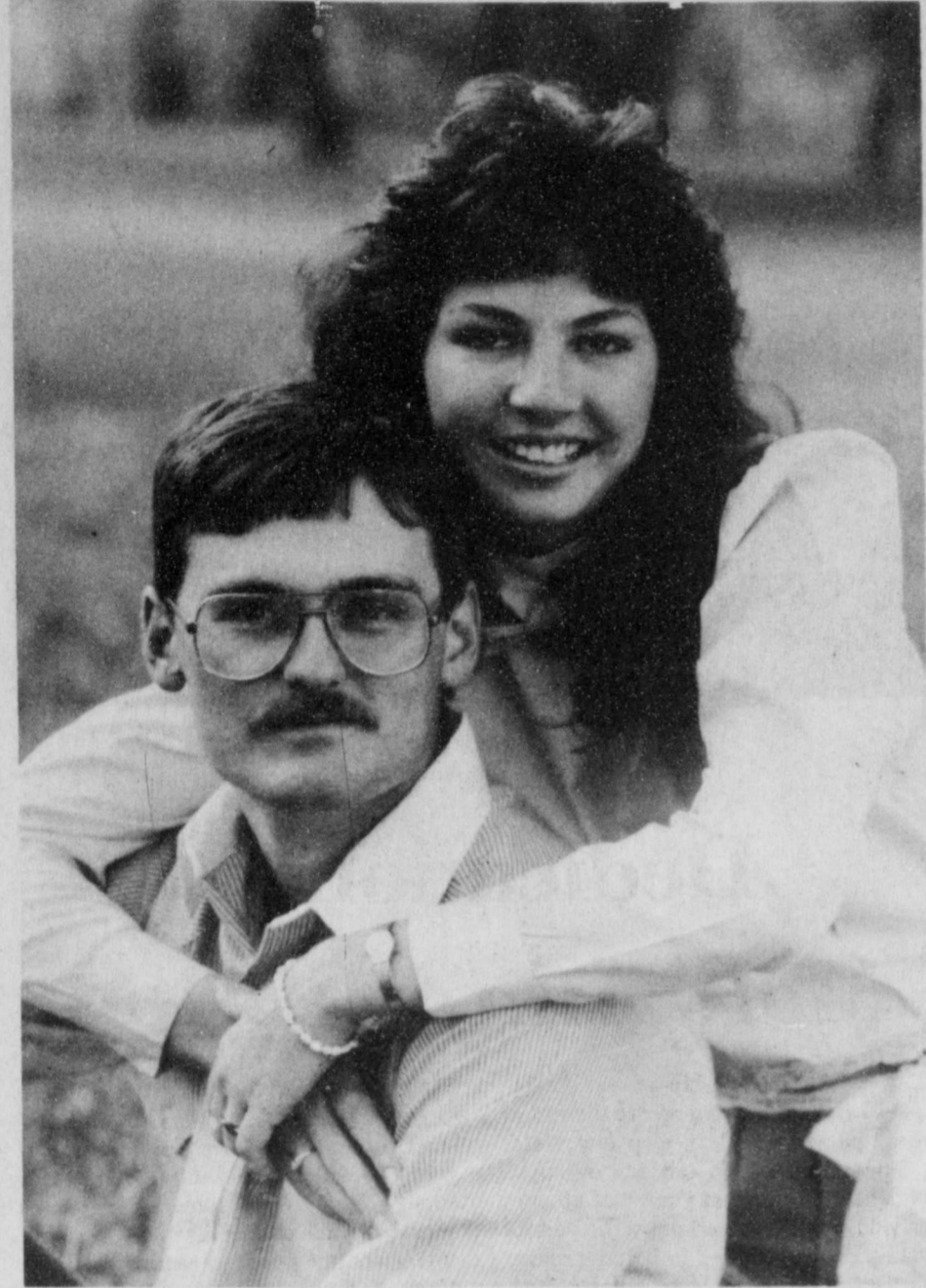

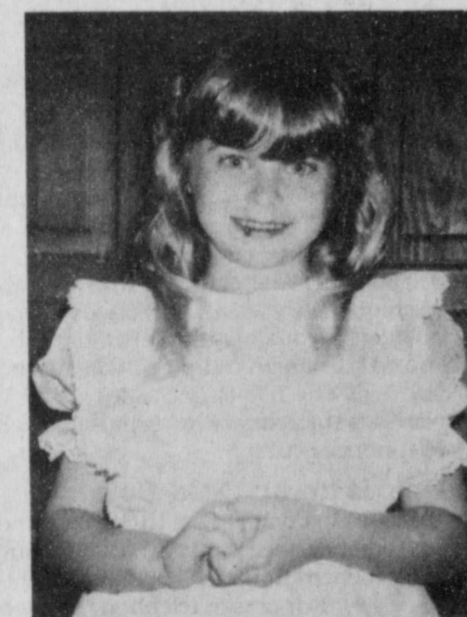
Cummings awarded at auditions

Fulfillment of promise nets HSU \$750,000 gift

The \$750,000 gift to HSU was earmarked for the purpose of endowing a chair in English and establishing two additional endowed funds. HSU president, Dr. Jesse C. Fletcher, announced the gift at the April 25 spring meeting of the board of development for the university. Fletcher said the commitment came in the form of a deferred gift.

The Bond Chair is to be a memorial to Mrs. Bond's husband and his brother, Professor W.D. Bond. Professor Bond taught English at HSU for almost 40 years. The gift specifies a \$500,000 financial commitment to establish the chair.

\$250,000 is scheduled to endow two special funds. One is for missions in memory of Mrs. W.D. Bond, the wife of Professor Bond. The fund is being established in recognition of her contributions to HSU and of her affection for the school.

The second fund is an endowed scholarship fund for philosophy students in honor of Truett Walton. Walton is vice president emeritus at the institution and is also a former dean and

philosophy teacher. The fund recognizes his many years of service to HSU.

The Bond name has long been associated with HSU. W.D. Bond joined the faculty in 1919, teaching until the late 1950's. He was a popular figure on campus. He wrote a newspaper column on fishing for many years and hosted a radio program on outdoor life for a while. He died in 1981.

A daughter of the W.D. Bonds, Helen Jean Parks, is an HSU graduate. She is the wife of Dr. Keith Parks, president of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board. Her brother Hall, graduated from HSU in 1943. He is a retired airline

captain and lives in Irving, Texas with his wife, the former Janelle Bartos, a 1945 HSU graduate.

Mrs. Hollis Bond is herself a graduate of HSU. She and her husband were in general land service, sales, leases, and management in Floydada for many years. Mrs. Bond still lives in Floydada and remains active in the community and the business. Bond died in 1981.

"Both my husband and I firmly believe in the value of education. This is our way of making it possible for others to benefit from our own good fortune and to receive an education," said Mrs. Bond.

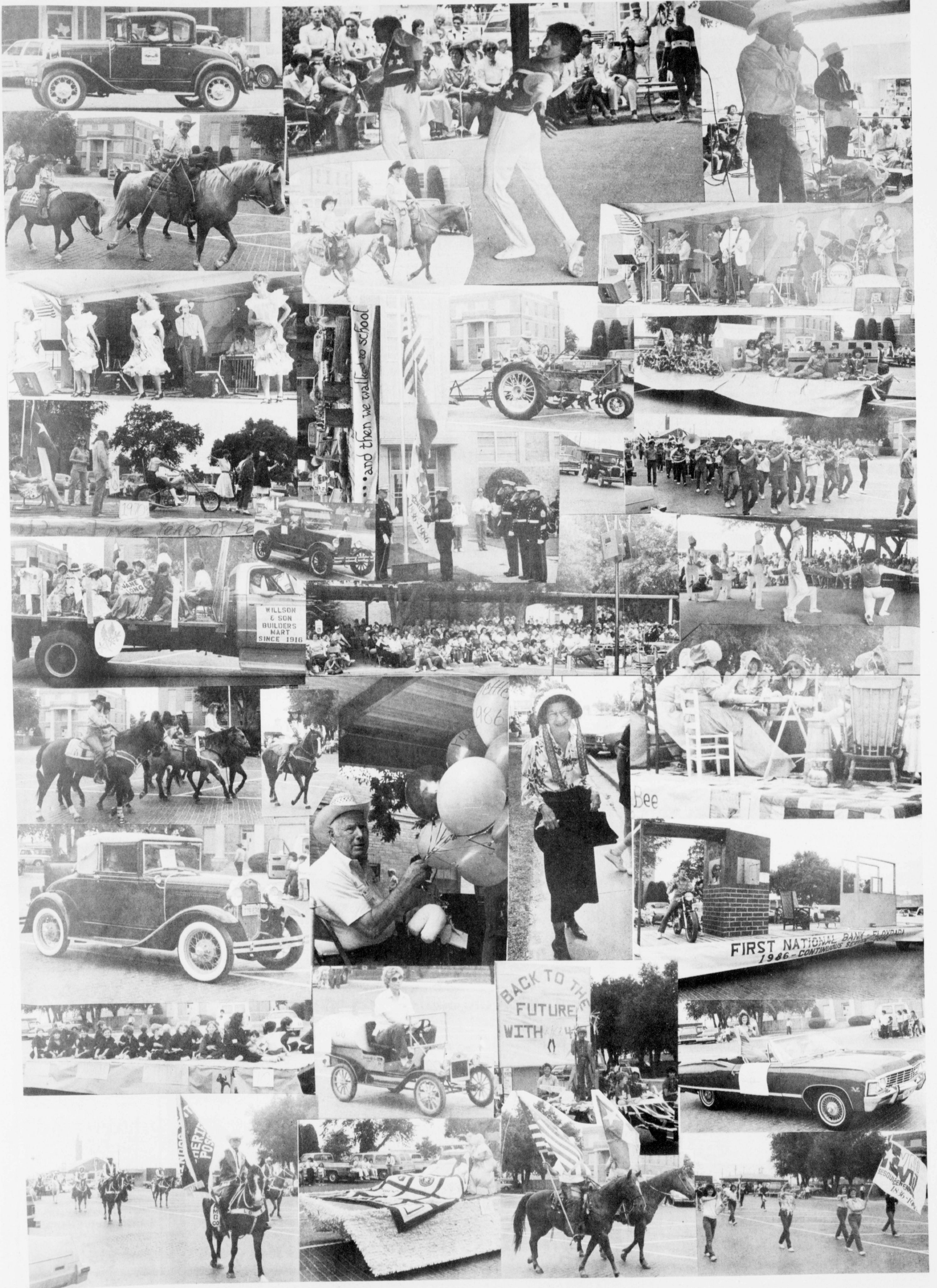

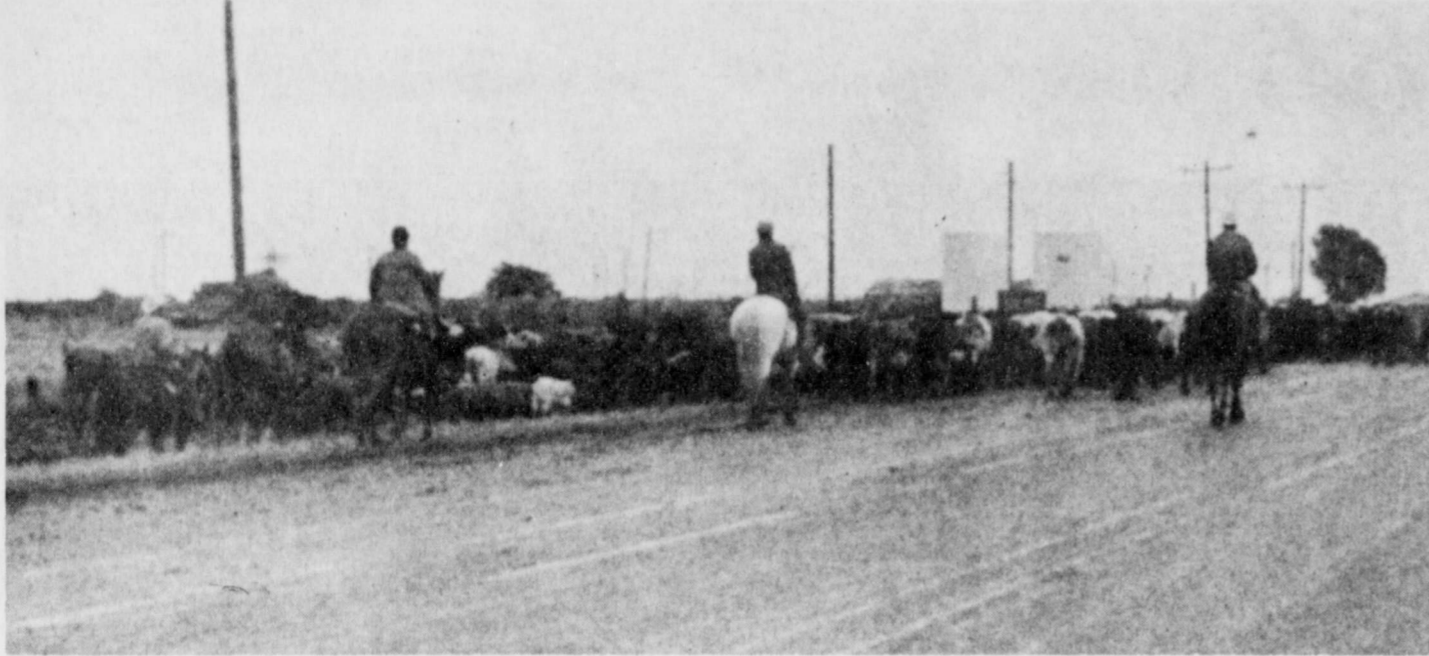

Water level shows "0" decrease

For the first time in the 35-year history of the High Plains Water District, the depth-to-water level measurements made in the district's observation well network show a "0" average change from January 1985 to January 1986. In other words, the volume of water in storage in the district's service area as of January 1986 is the same as it was in January 1985.

Measurements of the depth-to-water were taken in January and February in 950 privately-owned water-level observation wells located throughout the district's 15-county, 5.2 million acre service area.

Individual county depth-to-water level measurements show either a small

decline in the water level, or an actual rise in the water level for the one-year average. Average depth-to-water level measurements made in wells in Armstrong, Cochran, Crosby, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock and Lynn Counties showed a rise. Crosby County showed the largest average rise in the water table with a rise of 2.50 feet.

The average depth-to-water in the remaining seven counties (Bailey, Castro, Deaf Smith, Lamb, Parmer, Potter and Randall Counties) showed a small increase in the depth-to-water, indicating a decline in the water table. Average declines for individual counties ranged from 0.08 of a foot decline in Bailey County to a 1.40 foot decline in

Parmer County.

For all wells measured, the 10-year average change shows a total decline in the water level of 9.70 feet, or an average change of 0.97 of a foot per year.

The five-year average change in water levels for the period 1976 to 1981 shows a total decline of 7.40 feet, which is an average decline of 1.48 feet per year.

Over the past five years, 1981-1986, there has been a dramatic decrease in the rate of decline in the aquifer. The five-year average change in water levels for the period 1981 to 1986 shows a total decline of 2.30 feet, for an average decline of 0.46 of a foot per year. The change in water levels from 1981 to 1986 indicates a 69 percent reduction in the rate of decline as compared to the previous five-year period, 1976 to 1981.

The past three-year period, 1983 to 1986, compares almost equally with the five-year period showing a similar average change in the water level. The three-year average change is a decline of 0.44 of a foot.

District Geologist Don McReynolds notes, "In most counties the rate of decline in the water table has been significantly decreased, particularly in the last five years. A combination of non-use, increased energy costs and fortunate rains at opportune times has allowed the aquifer to replenish itself."

Tailwater robs profits

It's planting time on the South Plains and some producers have adequate moisture while others remain in doubt.

Farmers who have applied pre-plant irrigation or who will provide additional water for plant growth during the growing season should be aware that a bandit -- irrigation tailwater -- can rob them of potential profits.

Water District rules and state law both prohibit the waste of ground water. Tailwater waste is defined as "Willfully or negligently causing, suffering, or permitting underground water produced for irrigation or agricultural purposes to escape into any river, creek, or other natural watercourse, depression, or lake, reservoir, drain, or into any sewer, street, highway, road, road ditch, or upon the land of any other person than the owner of such well, or upon public land."

Tailwater is costly and wasteful in terms of both water and energy. For example, on a farm with one 8-inch irrigation well producing 800 gallons of water per minute an irrigator could apply six acre-inches of water on 160 acres in about 542 hours. Average tailwater losses, from land with no means of controlling tailwater runoff, have been calculated at 100 gallons per minute, or 6,000 gallons per hour. On the example farm, tailwater losses would amount to approximately 3,252,000 gallons of water per irrigation application.

Four irrigation applications, such as are frequently applied during a typical irrigation season, without control of tailwater losses could waste about 13,008,000 gallons of water or 40 acre feet. This would be enough water to irrigate 80 acres with one 6-inch application, or enough to completely irrigate 20 acres with four 6-inch applications.

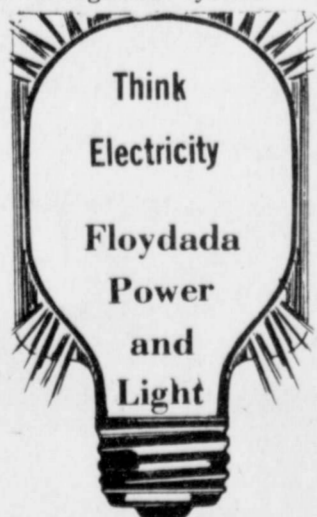
"The cost of producing water nowadays prohibits the waste of water for farmers who intend to stay in business," Obbie Goolsby, engineer technician at the Water District notes. Fuel costs for pumping one acre-foot of irrigation water run about \$33 for natural gas pumps and \$37 for electric

pumps. Assuming a 40 acre-foot tailwater loss as in the example above, the irrigator would pay \$1320 for natural gas and \$1480 for electricity just to pump wasted water.

More modern methods of controlling tailwater include the installation and use of center pivot sprinklers and surge irrigation systems. However, all these methods usually prove to be profitable for the farmer, as well as controlling runoff. Tailwater pits capture the runoff, providing a source for reuse of the water, thus reducing the amount of water that would need to be pumped and saving fuel costs. Pivot sprinklers and surge systems apply water more efficiently, reducing the amount of water needed, lowering energy costs, and avoiding runoff.

Two major causes of irrigation tailwater are long furrow runs, which require large flow rates to push water to the end of the field, and strict adherence to out-dated irrigation schedules. Tailwater runoff can erode topsoil and fill roadway ditches and culverts causing a safety hazard. Runoff can also damage neighboring farms by spreading unwanted water into cropland.

Prevention of tailwater runoff can only benefit the farmer in terms of efficiency, savings in energy cost and water, not to mention compliance with the law. The High Plains Water District encourages every irrigator to make tailwater control an integral part of his farm management system.

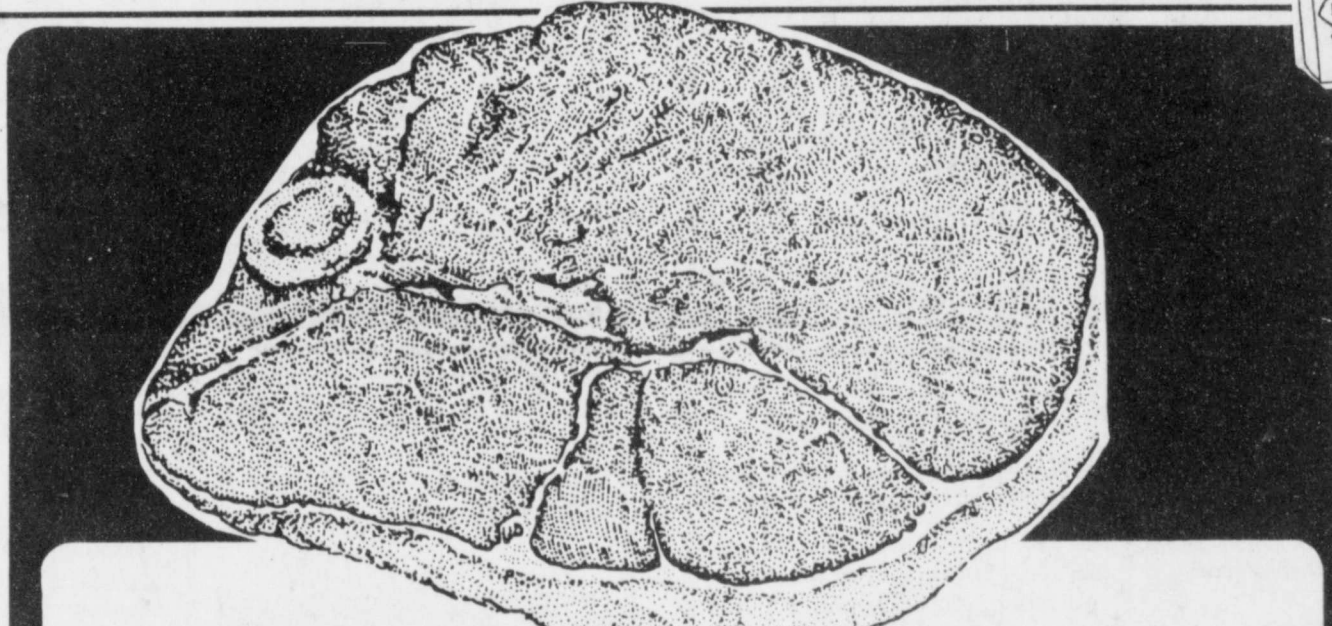
