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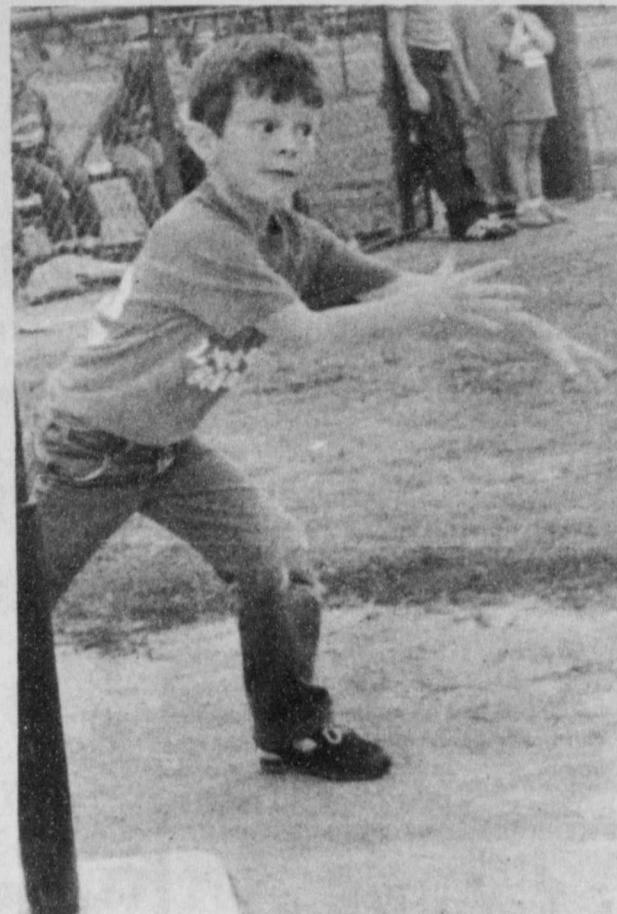
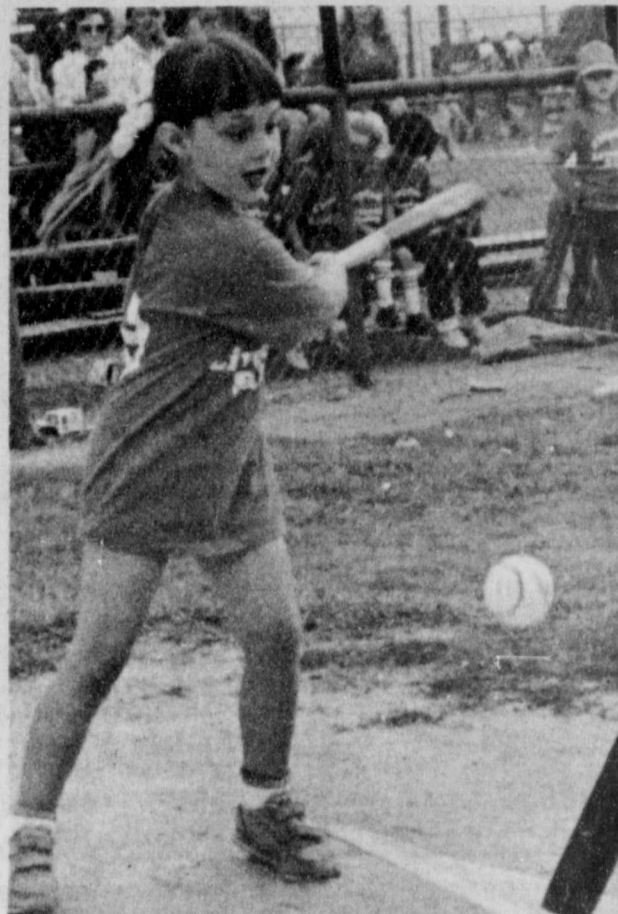
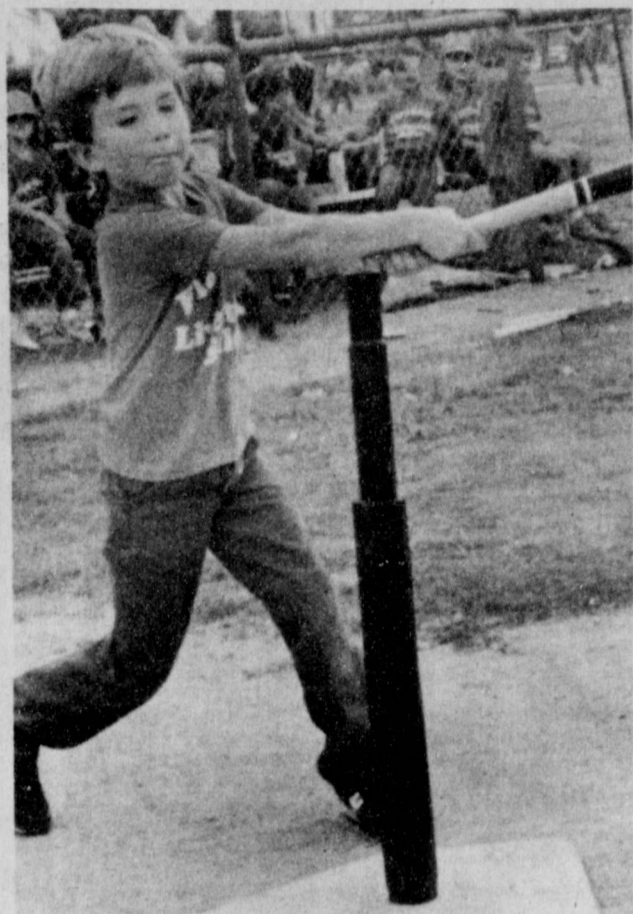

## a view from The Lamplighter

It now appears we are going to have another special session of the Legislature. Governor White made the announcement a few days before he went before his party's convention and apologized to the teachers for making them take the tests he has been defending all this time, and it came a few days after State Comptroller Bob Bullock reported that state revenues are falling so rapidly that state government will face a \$2.3 billion shortfall by 1987.

The Governor promised the teachers they won't have to take any more tests, and he promised the rest of us we will have a special session, provided the legislative leaders can come up with some ideas that might make the special session worthwhile, from his standpoint. On both issues he reversed positions he recently held.

Mr. Bullock thinks we will need to approach the problem with the idea of cutting expenses and raising taxes as well. Former Governor Clements says we don't need new taxes, that state revenue is still the highest it has ever been, and that what we need is to "scrub" the budget and cut expenditures. Governor White won't say, at least at this point. His position seems to be that it is up to the legislature. He has already asked state agencies and departments to cut their budgets. Most of them simply thumbed their noses at the governor, which prompted veteran Democratic legislator Bill Hollowell of

## Trustees name task force members

The board of trustees for the Floydada Independent School District met Monday, June 30, at 7:00 p.m. to select nine district residents to serve as a task force in planning the proposed redistricting of the FISD.

Local residents chosen to serve on the panel were Randy Bertrand, John Campbell, Hulon Carthel, Adolpho Garcia, Adrian Helms, Mary Martinez, Tino Morales, Mary Muniz and Fred Thayer.

This group represents an approximate cross section of residents in the school district as well as approximate percentages of students in the schools by ethnic break down. The number of Anglo and Hispanic students in Floydada schools is about even so there are four Anglo and four Hispanic panel members and one Black member.

These people will work closely with attorney Paul Ly and other district experts in making recommendations to the board for drawing up a plan to convert to single member district elect-

ions for selection of school board members.

School superintendent Jerry Cannon will notify each panel member of their

appointment by letter. A series of hearings around the district will be scheduled at a later date to gather the input of concerned residents.

## Vandals cause power outage

A "fairly extensive" power outage Friday afternoon was experienced by Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Inc., in northern and eastern Floyd County and in Briscoe County as the result of vandalism. Lighthouse customers at Lone Star, South Plains and Cedar Hill were without electricity for "about an hour and a half."

Silverton's power was off for a longer period.

Alton Higginbotham, general manager of LEC, said vandals shot insulators off of a 69,000 volt transmission line, near Silverton. This caused the power outage.

The incident has been reported to the Briscoe County Sheriff's Department for investigation.

Higginbotham explained that "as soon as we determined the trouble, we isolated that one segment" and were able to resume service to the other areas.

Service personnel for the cooperative replaced insulators shot off the pole near Silverton. The vandal(s) had destroyed all 15 "bell-type" or "skirt-type" insulators from the pole.

The incident represented "a potentially serious offense considering the possibility of injury" to customers, but expensive for Lighthouse. Officials point out that life-support systems are necessary in a few homes and an electrical outage renders these systems inoperable.

# Housing renovation with \$383,000 grant

Ina McDowell was "speechless" when she received a call from the governor's office last September, announcing that the Housing Authority of Floydada's grant application had been approved to allow for renovation of its 40 oldest units.

Nine months later, the HAF executive director is even more excited because the \$383,000 grant from HUD (Housing and Urban Development) is being used to refurbish the units.

"We're tickled to death" about the improvements, Mrs. McDowell says, although "we realize it is a temporary inconvenience to these tenants. We realize, and believe they do too, that the inconvenience is very worth while because of the lower utility rates they will have, plus the like-new appearance of the units."

Mrs. McDowell explains that due to the age of the 40 units, "it was difficult to find materials, many of them obsolete, and this made maintenance very hard."

**CLOVIS CONTRACTOR**  
Robert Howell of Clovis, New Mexico, was the successful bidder from a field of five. His \$408,960 proposal was the lowest of the five submitted to the housing authority.

Each bid contained several "deductive alternates". Since Howell's offering was almost \$26,000 greater than the

HUD grant, several improvements were deleted.

Howell has a team of six persons in Floydada for the major project. He has hired one local person to date to

complement his crew.

According to grant specifications, the project which started June 2 must be completed by November 7.

The 40 units which are undergoing

renovation or will receive attention later this year are at "scattered sites" throughout Floydada. They are located on West Ross, East Ross, Tennessee, East and West Grover and East California streets.

## FUEL EFFICIENT

"When we get through the units will be fuel efficient . . . that was our main goal," Mrs. McDowell emphasizes. Insulation in ceilings and walls, new storm windows and doors and solid core back doors will "give us greater fuel efficiency," the HAF executive director says.

Other improvements include: new wall finish, some landscaping, new cabinets, stove and refrigerators in the kitchens, changed sewer lines, vandalized porch lighting, new exhaust vents and ceramic tile over the kitchen stove, almost complete bathroom renovation including new ceramic tile, new water heaters, new blinds, new flooring and base boards, new closets and closet doors and "quite a bit of electrical work." In addition, all doors are being "re-keyed" for vandalism purposes.

"The biggest problem I've had so far is moving people out -- particularly the elderly," the housing authority director notes. She purposely kept nine units vacant and these are the first being renovated. When they are completed, occupants of an equal number of

units will be moved into these apartments and the second phase begins.

"About six weeks" are being required to complete the initial nine units, but Mrs. McDowell hopes that only "three to four weeks" will be required for renovation of the other groups of nine or 10 units. "Moving people is just our greatest obstacle."

Executive director of the Housing Authority of Floydada for 11 years, Mrs. McDowell says most residents are requesting that they be returned to their original housing. She "quite taking applications on January 1" on the 40 units and plans to "start back taking (rental) applications on September 1."

## AUTHORITY GROWTH

Housing Authority of Floydada has grown appreciably since Mrs. McDowell was named executive director in 1975. The 40 units presently being modernized were the lone rental apartments at that time. This group includes four one-bedroom, 14 two-bedroom and 22 three-bedroom units.

The housing authority has grown in these 11 years to include 220 units in Floydada and 20 in Lockney. "The authority's intention is to meet all rental needs," Mrs. McDowell explains.

Added during her tenure are 78 farm labor units, 90 Section 8 Housing units (70 in Floydada and 20 in Lockney), 16 units at Duncan Plaza (near Duncan

Elementary School) and 18 more public housing units.

Authority's housing "stays virtually full most of the time, except for the farm labor housing which is full "about eight months of the year. We're in the peak time now due to onion harvest and hoeing. Cucumber, pepper, jalapeno and melon harvest will follow." The 78 farm labor units are "all occupied" at present.

Section 8 Housing -- consisting of the 70 Floydada and 20 Lockney apartments -- also is "100 percent full." Duncan Plaza has total occupancy "except for two teachers" who recently moved.

The 58 public housing units (40 which are undergoing the renovation and 18 newer) are "full" except for the nine units needed to transfer tenants during the modernization project.

The housing authority staff also has grown to accommodate the increased number of units. Cindy Dudley is assistant director, Charles McDowell serves as maintenance supervisor, and Rey Garza is a full-time maintenance employee. In addition, a part-time summer employee is used for yard mowing and a housekeeper is utilized "when needed -- about three-fourths of the time."

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## 'I never intended to be a teacher...'

At one time, retiring A.B. Duncan Elementary School principal Bob Copeland held four jobs in order to support his family and continue to be a teacher. His dedication to the teaching profession and his enjoyment of his work gave him the stamina and incentive he needed in order to make it through the tough times. Copeland drove a school bus route, sold encyclopedias and carried the mail while he taught school and earned a masters degree in education and administration from Texas Tech.

"I never intended to be a teacher," says Copeland with a grin. "I had studied pre med at WTSU, concentrating on science and math. After I received my degree and returned to Floydada, I was asked to teach the seventh grade math classes for a year and that one year was all it took. I was hooked. I have loved every minute of the past 37 years of my association with the Floydada schools and the children of Floydada."

Asked his philosophy about teaching, Copeland said, "My feelings about education can be summed up by saying a child should always ask why and learn to understand the answer and the reason for it."

Moving to high school math during his second year as a teacher, Copeland taught there for eight years and served as either the junior or senior class

sponsor each year. He was the teaching sponsor for the Inter-scholastic League Number Sense team during that time.

"I was very proud of the kids on my team," remembers Copeland. "They were all very bright and quick. The number sense teams won at regional nearly every year and a few of the students went to state. I had one boy who won at state in his junior year. This meant that he could not compete in his senior year because at that time, a student who won at state was not allowed to go to state a second time."

Copeland moved to R.C. Andrews in the mid sixties as a teacher and assistant principal before becoming a full time principal. The past ten years, he has served as principal at A.B. Duncan Elementary.

"The teaching part of my career was my favorite," said Copeland. "I have enjoyed the years as principal and I hope that my contributions to the system have made the years better for everyone."

A point of special pride for Copeland has been the implementation of the aides program at Duncan.

"I feel that it has been most beneficial for the students and that it has been especially helpful in maintaining the bilingual education program so necessary to many of our students," stated Copeland.

## 'I never intended to be a teacher'

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A native of Floyd County and a resident of Floydada for most of his life, Copeland graduated from Floydada High School. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. H.A. Copeland operated a tourist court in Floydada for many years and were involved in various other enterprises as well. His grandparents were the G.P. Ewings who farmed in the McCoy Community.

Copeland met his wife Nina while attending WTSU. He sang in the choir and she provided the piano accompaniment for the group. The couple had two children, Kara and Ken.

Concerning his wife, Copeland says, "Her death when our children were 17 and 21 was an unexpected shock. I have missed her loving support terribly. She was a remarkable woman who did

everything she tried and did it well."

Kara is presently a dental hygienist in Lubbock. Ken, who suffered from cerebral palsy, died in his early twenties.

Copeland is an avid hunter and enjoys fishing as well. He spent the first two weeks of his summer this year on a fishing trip with friends. The group went to an island off the coast of Belize on the Gulf of Honduras in Central America.

"The accommodations were simple, but clean," said Copeland. "We were warned not to drink the water because it is contaminated, but after it is treated it is all right. The food was good and the fishing was a real treat."

"I took time to visit some of the schools in the area and that was an eye opener for me. The buildings are pretty old and not in

the best of shape and all the desks are at least fifty years old. The books I saw were soft cover, like workbooks are here. I did not see any desks for the teachers, nor any chalkboards.

"The schools I visited were getting ready to let out for the summer and even in the heat, there was no air conditioning. The children in the elementary grades were dressed in uniforms, but the high school age kids did not seem to be wearing a standard type of dress."

"It really made me appreciate the equipment and opportunities we have here," said Copeland.

Copeland says he has no specific plans for his retirement.

"I am just going to take it slow and easy and see what comes along. Right now, I am working in my yard."

The governor's request to the agencies was somewhat akin to asking an alcoholic to voluntarily reduce his drinking by just a little bit. In the first place it won't happen. The agencies will cut their spending when the legislature cuts their funds, not before.

For the past twenty years or so this state's spending patterns have aped that of the federal government. Millions, even billions, of dollars have been "dedicated" to this arena or that, effectively removing them from control of the legislature. The funds then become looked upon as "entitlements", wherein the recipients of those funds seem to think their civil rights are being violated if the taxpayers don't keep coughing up enough money to keep the spiral going upward.

There is at least one "given" in Texas state government. That is that the expenditures of government will automatically expand to absorb all available revenue. In the federal government it goes even further. The expenditures will be made regardless of available revenue. The difference is called "the deficit." It is supposed to be paid by our grandchildren.

There is a way, we believe, that the current problem can be tackled with some hope. The legislature, with or without Mark White's leadership, ought to "un-dedicate" the dedicated funds throughout state government. And we would include within that process the dedicated funds now committed to higher education. The Legislature could then re-establish priorities for this state in the expenditure of tax revenues. To the extent that any governmental undertaking could prove its worth as a priority item, it could be funded accordingly. Those that could not prove their worth would also be funded accordingly.

If, when that is done, there is a crying need for more taxes, the people could at least cough up the money knowing that some rational thought had been given to the matter. Taxpayers in Texas are not a niggardly lot, despite what some left-wing pundits might claim. They have always done their bit and can be counted on to do it again and again, although I confess I don't know where we will get the money. But before we start sending still more money down to Austin, we would like to believe it won't be spent on play pens.

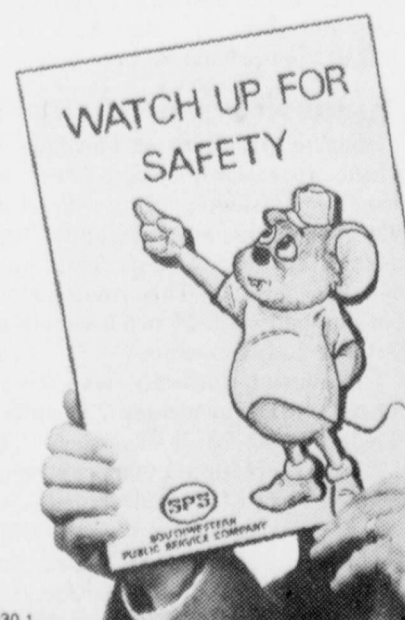

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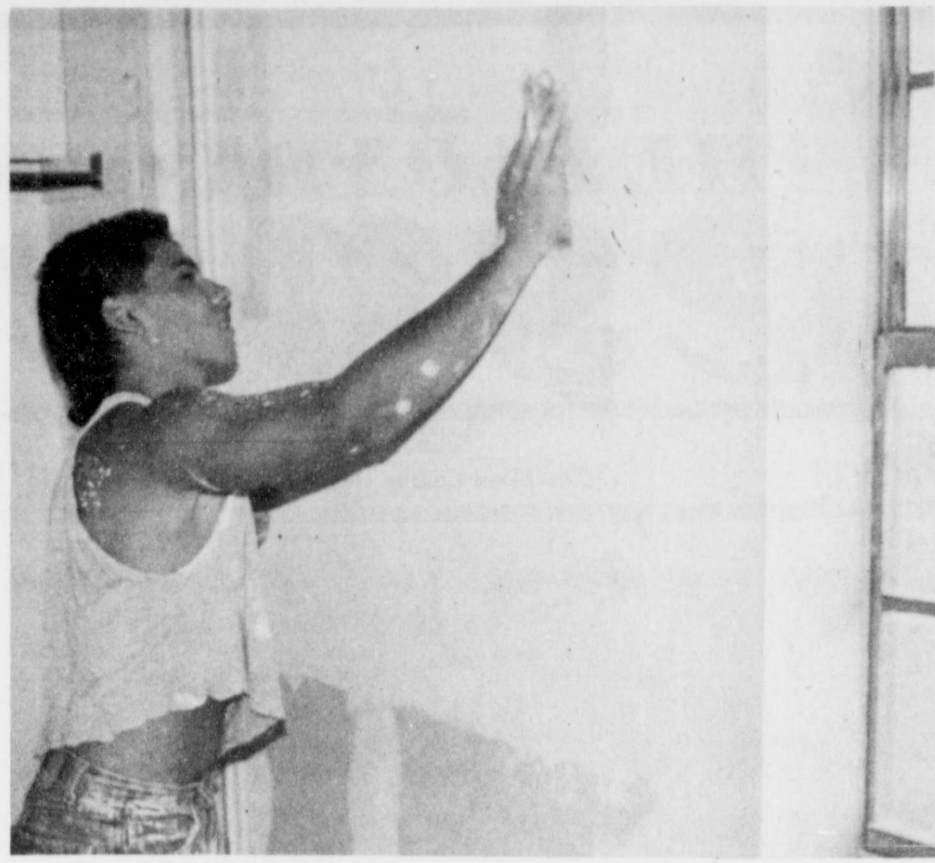

# Alma Holmes visits Floyd Museum

Alma Smith Holmes, not only a pioneer descendent of Floyd County, but a pioneer in her own right in the field of West Texas radio, paid a visit to Floydada last week. Holmes stopped off to visit family and friends as she journeyed to a Smith-Mickey family reunion at Ceta Glen Christian Camp between Happy and Canyon in the Texas panhandle.

Holmes and her late husband Ed, along with Mr. and Mrs. B.A. Robertson and Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Formby, started one of the first radio stations in West Texas in the spring of 1951.

The group could not have chosen a more inauspicious day to sign on the air waves. The initial broadcast of radio station KFLD was made from Floydada on Friday, April 13. Superstition not

withstanding, the station (now known as KKAP) is still filling the air waves with sound more than 35 years later.

Along with other duties at the station, Holmes was the mistress of ceremonies for "Listen Ladies", a daily program for 22 years. Listeners in the caprock communities were greeted daily with a soft West Texas drawl and the words "Hi there, neighbor, and a great big happy good morning to you."

Holmes was active in community affairs as long as she lived in Floyd County. She remains interested in the events and happenings of her native area. Among the positions she held in the county were seats on the board of directors for the Floydada Chamber of Commerce, the Floyd County Fair Association and the Floyd County Historical Museum. She was also an active member of the City Park Church of Christ.

As a charter member of the museum, Holmes worked diligently to see the facility organized and developed.

"We really got into it," remembered Holmes, with a twinkle in her eyes. "Eli Neff and I helped make the adobes used to construct the old ranch buildings inside the museum, mixing the mud with our feet like natives."

She has also compiled several booklets concerning the history of the area. Holmes was especially enthusiastic about the recently opened east room of the museum.

"This is one of the things I wanted to see happen so badly when I was here, a place that could be used for meetings and working sessions," stated Holmes. "I have always felt that a museum should be used, not just looked at. It should be as concerned with current events and the future as it is with the past and events of historic nature."

Holmes was born almost 80 years ago to Charlie and Annie Mickey Smith, residents of Floyd County since 1890. Smith, a Church of Christ preacher, and

his wife raised 13 children, including Holmes who was the youngest daughter. She is one of four children still living. A brother, Milton Smith, lives in Mountainair, New Mexico, and two sisters, Irene Pope and Alice Smith, reside in Amarillo, Texas.

A 1926 graduate of Lockney High School, Holmes was raised in the Sandhill Community. Although music was not a central part of her religious upbringing, Holmes says the family was always a singing family and continues to enjoy singing at family gatherings, "especially reunions."

Ed Holmes was killed in a fishing accident in 1954. The Holmes' had five children, two of whom live in Floydada, Chuck Holmes and Nancy Holmes Willson. Beuna Holmes Dallas and Sara Holmes Teague live in Duncanville, Texas, while Dorothy Holmes McGinnis resides in Carefree, Arizona.

Alma Holmes now lives with her daughter Sara and her husband, Dr. Rodney Teague, in Duncanville. Dr. Teague is the son of Mrs. Lula Teague of Floydada.

Holmes feels that her best days were spent in Floyd County ("although I still have plenty of good days left in me") and says she "believes that the best people in the world are those who live in this area."

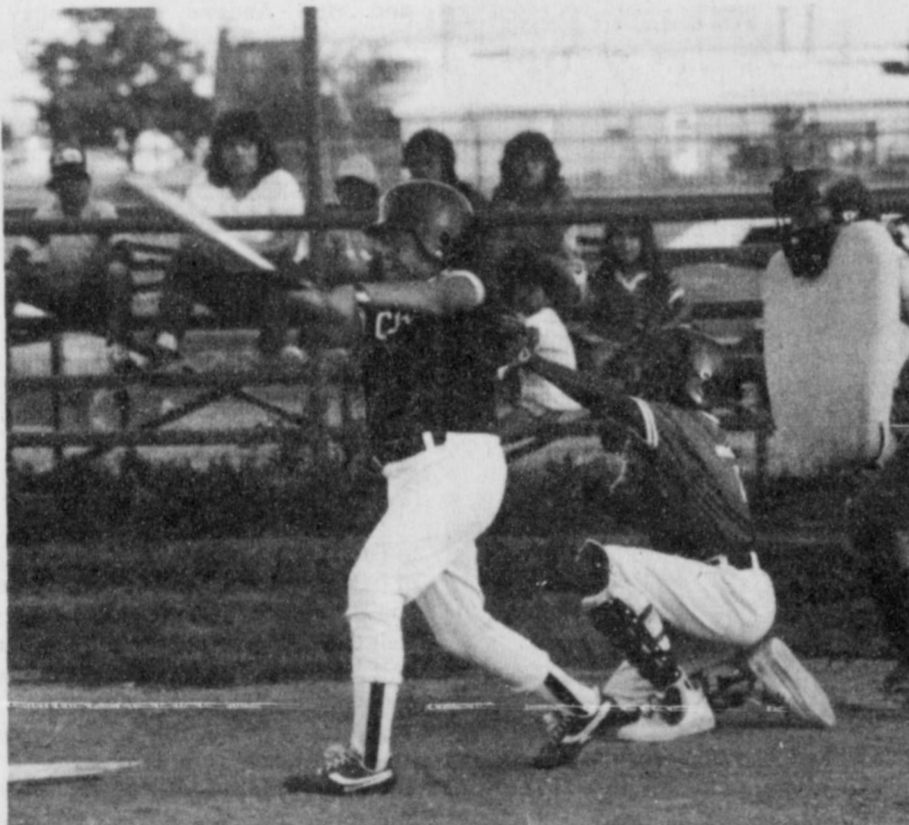

Orman is now a sophomore student in the TTU School of Business Administration.

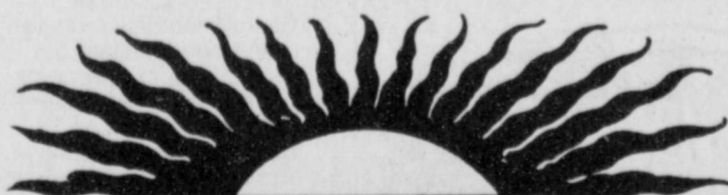
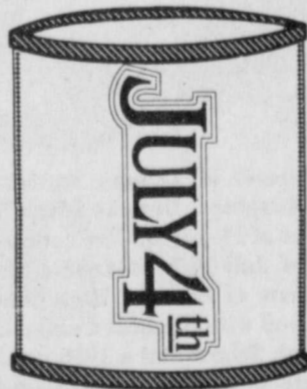
