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Floyd County receives disaster aid designation

The guessing game is over. Floyd County has been designated as a "disaster county."

Bob Lotspeich, executive director of the Floyd County ASCS office, learned of the disaster designation during a Tuesday phone conversation with his district director.

The designation means that Floyd farmers whose production from 1986 crops was less than 50 percent of their payment yield are eligible for disaster payments.

The rub is that only \$400 million has been appropriated nationwide for crop disasters.

"If more money is not appropriated (by Congress)," Lotspeich says, "funding will be handled on a pro rata basis."

The majority of county farmers who believe they are eligible for disaster payments already have filed a 574 form at the ASCS office in Floydada and brought in their production records for verification.

However, due to delayed harvesting, some producers signed the form but did not have production records available at that time. Lotspeich reminds these individuals to bring production records to his office as quickly as possible.

"If anyone thinks he is eligible and has not been into the office for the first

time, please come in and check with us," Lotspeich says.

When all production records have been received, the county ASCS staff will determine eligibility and forward information to farmers on a disaster application form. Producers should then sign and return the form to the ASCS office.

Forms must be signed and returned by Jan. 30.

The ASCS staff "has our work cut out for us" in order to adhere to the timetable, the county executive director says.

NEW OFFICE HOURS

Floyd County ASCS office, along with others in the area, is establishing new office hours. Effective Tuesday, Jan. 13, the local office will be closed to the public from 8 a.m. until 12 noon each Tuesday and Thursday.

Pointing out that the intent is to "serve farmers faster," Lotspeich believes he and his staff "can operate more efficiently by having this time to get some of our paper work completed." This includes processing and issuing checks, payments, the disaster applications and other data.

"We ask for your cooperation and understanding in this matter," the director says.

Floydada building permits total \$283,760 in 1986

Both the number and dollar amount of building permits issued by City of Floydada during 1986 decreased from the previous year, but the value of new dwellings in '86 increased.

Dollar volume of the 18 permits issued during the year just past

totaled \$283,760. These permits included five new residences — including one mobile home — and 13 home improvements such as additions, garages, etc.

By contrast, 30 city building permits issued during 1985 totaled \$580,328. These included 10 new or move-in residences, one church,

one commercial warehouse and 18 home improvement permits.

No commercial permits were issued in '86.

Residential dwelling permits totaled \$238,500 during the past year, which far exceeded the \$154,400 in residential value the previous year. Actually, permits for 1986 were

greater than those of the previous year except for erection of the Trinity Church building and a Shop Rite Foods warehouse in '85. The church facility was by far the largest single permit issued in the past two years.

In addition to the abovementioned permits, nine houses or

buildings were destroyed by demolition or fire during the past year. There were five demolitions in '85.

The 18 permits secured through the city office in 1986 were for: Move house from one lot to another, add double garage, rebuild garage, add one room, move in mobile

home, add workshop and cellar, double car garage;

Also, add bedroom and bath, addition to house-garage, move-in new residence, carport, new red-built, garage, storage and workshop, move-in residence, add sun room and, new house and residential addition.

Rev. Earl Blair undergoes fourth surgery on Sunday

The Rev. Earl Blair, hospitalized since Dec. 2, 1986 in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, underwent his fourth surgery Jan. 4.

According to a hospital spokesperson on Jan. 6, "Rev. Blair is in critical but stable condition — his vital signs are O.K."

This most recent surgery, to remove his spleen and part of his pancreas, comes after several operations have failed to stop complications arising from his Dec. 2 gall bladder surgery.

According to Gail Noland, the secretary of the First United Methodist Church, "Rev. Blair has been up and down ever since his first operation. The gall bladder surgery was undertaken to remove a stone obstructing his upper

R Photography, destroyed by fire early last week, is being relocated. Owners Jack and Allison Robertson expect to reopen their studio "within two or three weeks" in a portion of the former Anderson Department Store building.

Robertson says R Photography is temporarily operating from the couple's residence at 129 W. Jeffie. The firm is able to reprint damaged orders, deliver

previews or proofs and, accept portrait orders.

"We are still able to do location work," Robertson adds. No studio work will be available until the new facility is completed.

Miraculously, none of R Photography's negatives were destroyed in the devastating fire. Reprints are available from any of the negatives.

'86 temperatures 'mild'

It hasn't made oldtimers forget 1941, but the year just ended will long be remembered as an "extremely wet" year.

Excessive moisture in October, accompanied by devastating hail in some areas, interrupted harvest of some commodities and damaged both quality and quantity of cotton and grain sorghum.

However, the weather extremes of 1986 were confined to moisture. Temperatures were mild, at least by West Texas standards.

Most frigid temperature came Feb. 10 when the mercury slipped to one degree below zero. This was the only day of the year's 365 that zero or below was recorded.

Following the "mild" trend, only

five days of 100 or above temperatures were recorded, according to records kept by Energas. These were 101 on July 26, 100 on the 27th, 104 on the 28th, 100 on the 29th and 101 on the 31st.

Ironically, the mercury did not reach 100 except for this "hot spell" in July.

The year started with basically above-average temperatures, including a tornado alert issued for southern sections of the South Plains in late January. Basically, the only other deviation was cooler than normal temperatures in October, prompted by the long-to-be remembered "wet spell."

Following are monthly summaries of 1986 temperatures:

JANUARY

A high of 82 degrees was reached on Jan. 19, a month in which the temperature escalated to 70 degrees or above on seven days. The low was only 19 degrees on Jan. 7.

FEBRUARY

The above-average trend continued with a high of 84 degrees recorded on both Feb. 24 and 25. Ten days included temperatures of 70 or above.

Low reading for the year came on Feb. 10, one degree below zero. During the same wintry blast, which included one of the year's snow, the mercury climbed to only 16 degrees on Feb. 11. Lows of 22,

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14, -1, 5 and 19 were registered on Feb. 8-12, although freezes were received only 10 days during the month.

MARCH

A single freeze occurred during March, 29 degrees on the first day of the month. Ninety degrees on March 30 was the high, with 70 or above recorded on 17 days.

APRIL

Ironically, the April "high" was a single degree below March's warmest day: 89 on April 29. Seventy or above temperatures were gauged on 24 days, with the month's low being only 39 degrees on April 4.

MAY

Summer temperatures seemed to appear early as 90 or above marks came on 10 days. The high was 97 degrees on May 21, and the low was 42 on May 17.

JUNE

Ninety-eight degrees was June's high mark, arriving on the 29th. Ninety or above temperatures were recorded only nine times during the

month. The low was 60 on June 2.

JULY

This undoubtedly was the "hottest month" of 1986, with 101, 100, 104 and 100 recorded on consecutive days, July 26-29, and 101 on July 31. July 15 and 19 both produced the month's low, 66 degrees.

AUGUST

Untypically, August '86 bore no 100 degree days although the mercury climbed to 90 or above 13 times. The high was 92 on Aug. 3. Low was 62 degrees on the 29th.

SEPTEMBER

September started cool, with daily highs being only 71, 66, 75 and 74 the first four days of the month. High was only 86 degrees on Sept. 19, and the low was 56 on Sept. 4.

OCTOBER

Prompted by prolonged wet conditions, the highest temperature came Oct. 3 — 84 degrees — and the mercury reached only 40 on Oct. 12. Temperatures slipped to 60 or below minimums on 28 of October's

days, although an official freeze did not result. Some crops reacted as if a freeze had occurred. Low marks were 38, 34 and 44 on Oct. 12-14.

NOVEMBER

The first freeze officially arrived on Nov. 11: 23 degrees for an overnight low. Freezes were recorded on five November dates, with 17 on Nov. 13 being the coldest.

Maximums contrasts showed 73 degrees on Nov. 19 but a high of only 28 on Nov. 13. The temperature failed to reach 50 on seven days.

DECEMBER

Christmas month's maximum was 62 degrees, recorded on Dec. 2. However, the mercury reached freezing for every 24-hour period except on Dec. 10, when the high was 27.

The month's temperatures were above normal, with 25 degrees on Dec. 11 being the month's low mark. Freezes were recorded 12 December dates, although temperatures dipped below 30 only four times: 26 on the 10th, 25 on the 11th 28 on the 12th and 29 on New Year's

Eve.

MILD START

The new year started mildly, despite a "norther" arriving this Tuesday. Prior to that, freezing temperatures were recorded only two of the first five nights — 32 degrees on New Year's Day and 30 degrees on Jan. 3.

Daily maximums and minimums for the first five days of 1987 were: 46-32, 64-36, 50-30, 62-36 and 59-41.

MOISTURE AVERAGES

While 1986 was a wet year, its predecessor also yielded far above normal temperatures. Fall moisture in 1985 contributed to the 30.84 inches recorded.

The 10-year moisture average for 1976 through 1985 was 20.872 inches. This was almost exactly the same as Floydada's 30-year average of 21.0 inches annually.

Moisture totals for the abovementioned 10-year period include: 1985, 30.84 inches; 1984, 16.81; 1983, 16.55; 1982, 19.08; 1981, 24.43; 1980, 19.87; 1979, 23.56; 1978, 15.33; 1977, 18.30; and 1976, 16.45.

The Hesperian was unable to secure rainfall amounts for 1986.

Danny Huggins drew the winning door prize number which happened to belong to his dad, Jim.

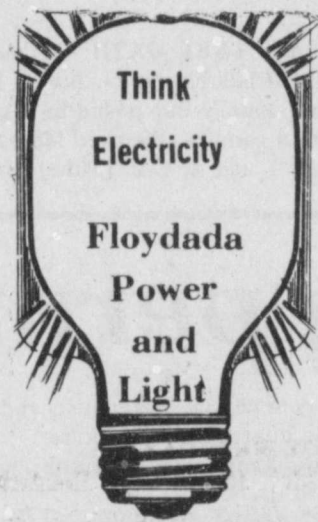
Next dance will be January 17 with Sid Perkins calling.

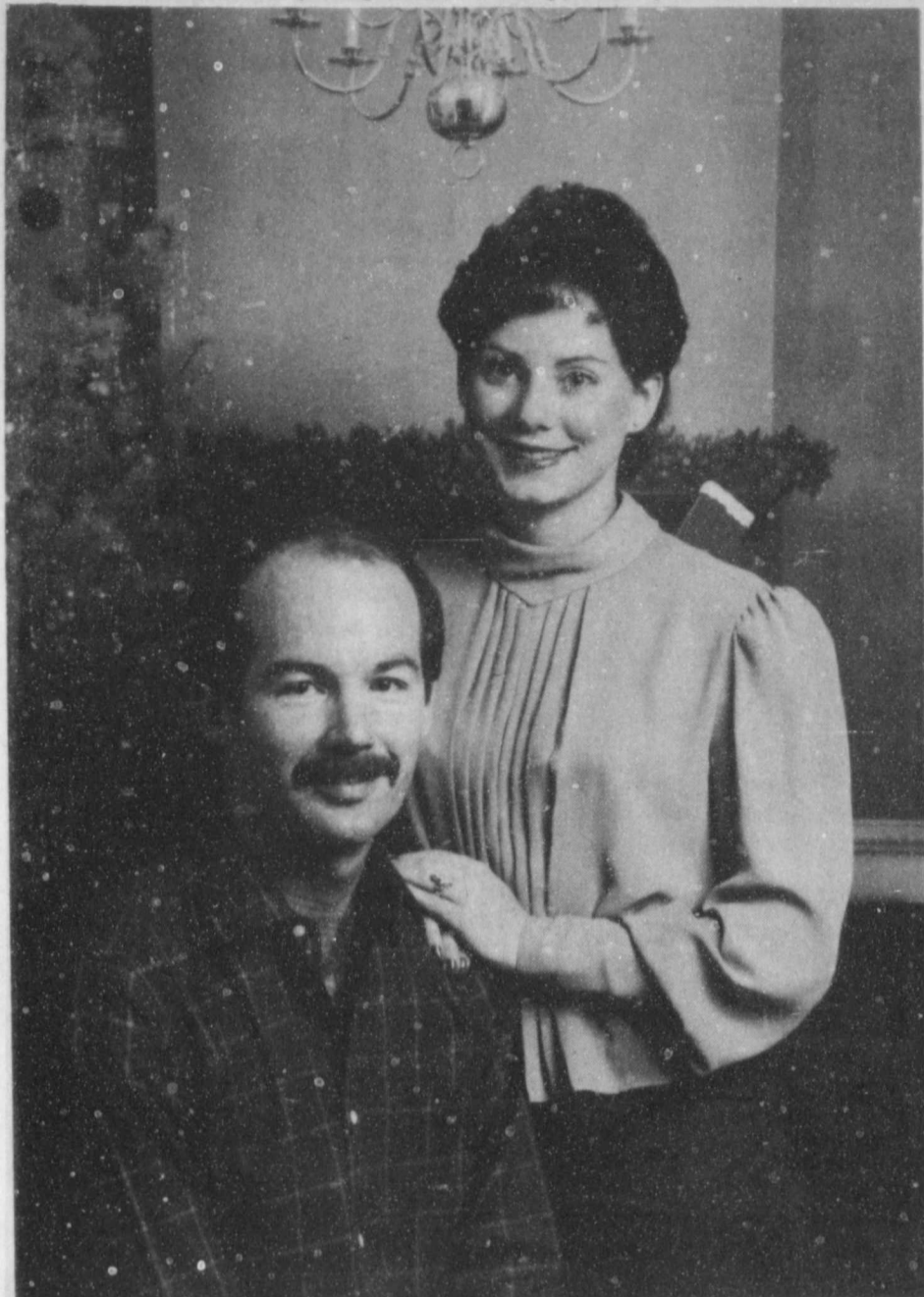

"ARMAGEDDON"

"And he gathered them together into a place called in the Hebrew tongue Armageddon." — Revelation 16:16.

"Armageddon" is a word that sends chills down the spines of many people. "Armageddon" literally means "the Mount of Slaughter." "Armageddon" is the place here on earth where many armed conflicts have taken place in time past. Deborah and Barak defeated the Canaanites there in Judges Chapters 4 and 5. Gideon triumphed over the Midianites there in Judges Chapter 7. Saul and his sons were slain in this place when they fought the Philistines. Ahaziah was slain here by Jehu in II Kings 9:27. Josiah was slain here in the invasion by the Egyptians as recorded in II Chron. 35:22.

"Armageddon" is mentioned by name only one time in the Bible in Revelation 16:16. "Armageddon" was called the ideal place for a world-wide conflict by Napoleon Bonaparte. "Armageddon" has been the battleground of world conquerors such as: Sargon, Tiglath-Pileser, Sennacherib, Nebuchadnezzar, Cambyses, Alexander, Pompey, Caesar, Titus, Hadrian, Omar, Saladin, and Napoleon. Three times in the Revelation we find "Armageddon" described other than in our text in the 16th Chapter. One description is found in Rev. 14:14-20. Another description is found in Rev. 17:10-14. And a third description is found in Rev. 19:11-21. Armageddon refers to the hill and valley of Megiddo in North Central Palestine some 10 miles south of Nazareth and 15 miles inland from the Mediterranean Sea.

What is the "Battle of Armageddon?" The word translated "battle" in Rev. 16:14 is "polemos" which means a great war or military campaign rather than "mache" which means a single or small conflict. The Battle of Armageddon is a conflict that will dwarf all other military conflicts previous to it. It is a time for "the great winepress of the wrath of God." It is a time when the armies of this world will yield 200 miles of blood "even to the horses' bridles." It is a time when Satan and his Antichrist and his False Prophet shall go forth to deceive the kings of the whole world and gather them to the "battle of the great day of God Almighty." It is a time when Jesus Christ will mount a white charger as the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. His eyes will glow as a flame of fire. His clothing will be dipped in blood, not His own blood this time, but the blood of His enemies. A long sharp sword shall go out of His mouth to smite the nations. The kings of this earth shall pit themselves against the King from Heaven. The beast and the false prophet will be captured and cast alive into a lake of fire burning with brimstone. The armies of the world will be slain by the long sword and all fowls will be filled with their flesh.

"Armageddon" is not some battle in history. It was not World War I nor World War II. It is not some battle that will develop because of the tension in South America. It has nothing to do with the present conflict between the Jews and the Arabs. It will not stem from the Russian invasion of Afghanistan or Poland. It is a battle that will take place SEVEN YEARS after God's children have left this earth.

How strange it is that when one nation builds up their military might, many began to cry, "Armageddon, Armageddon." Russia and Red China look cross-eyed at each other and someone cries, "Now it is come. Armageddon, Armageddon!" Some little brat punches another kid in the nose and they cry, "Armageddon! Armageddon!"

The Battle of Armageddon is the GREAT DAY OF GOD'S WRATH. The Battle of Armageddon is the last event before the 1000 year reign of Christ on earth. This great Battle will end Satan's reign on earth. Satan is NOW the "god of this earth", the "prince of the power of the air," the "lion walking about seeking who he may devour." The Battle of Armageddon BEGINS the reign of Christ as He should have always reigned.

Satan will deceive ALL the nations of the world and will lead them to fight against God and against God's people Israel. Someone says, "Oh, men wouldn't fight against GOD!" THEY DO IT EVEN NOW! They quench and grieve the Holy Spirit; they tell God to get off their back; they trample underfoot the precious blood of Christ and count it an unholy thing.

Someone says, "A terrible nuclear holocaust will destroy the world." NO! The last Battle will be God's Battle and will take place 1000 years AFTER Armageddon. GOD WILL DESTROY THIS OLD WORLD AND NOT MAN! It will be destroyed by fire, but God will kindle that fire.

Our main concern today should be this: Am I one of God's children? Will I be taken out of this world as pictured in I Thess. 4:13-18? Armageddon is at least SEVEN YEARS AWAY.

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"ARMAGEDDON"

"And he gathered them together into a place called in the Hebrew tongue Armageddon." —Revelation 16:16.

"Armageddon" is a word that sends chills down the spines of many people. "Armageddon" literally means "the Mount of Slaughter." "Armageddon" is the place here on earth where many armed conflicts have taken place in time past. Deborah and Barak defeated the Canaanites there in Judges Chapters 4 and 5. Gideon triumphed over the Midianites there in Judges Chapter 7. Saul and his sons were slain in this place when they fought the Philistines. Ahaziah was slain here by Jehu in II Kings 9:27. Josiah was slain here in the invasion by the Egyptians as recorded in II Chron. 35:22.

"Armageddon" is mentioned by name only one time in the Bible in Revelation 16:16. "Armageddon" was called the ideal place for a world-wide conflict by Napoleon Bonaparte. "Armageddon" has been the battleground of world conquerors such as: Sargon, Tiglath-Pileser, Sennacherib, Nebuchadnezzar, Cambyses, Alexander, Pompey, Caesar, Titus, Hadrian, Omar, Saladin, and Napoleon.

Three times in the Revelation we find "Armageddon" described other than in our text in the 16th Chapter. One description is found in Rev. 14:14-20. Another description is found in Rev. 17:10-14. And a third description is found in Rev. 19:11-21. Armageddon refers to the hill and valley of Megiddo in North Central Palestine some 10 miles south of Nazareth and 15 miles inland from the Mediterranean Sea.

What is the "Battle of Armageddon?" The word translated "battle" in Rev. 16:14 is "polemos" which means a great war or military campaign rather than "mache" which means a single or small conflict. The Battle of Armageddon is a conflict that will dwarf all other military conflicts previous to it. It is a time for "the great winepress of the wrath of God." It is a time when the armies of this world will yield 200 miles of blood "even to the horses' bridles." It is a time when Satan and his Antichrist and his False Prophet shall go forth to deceive the kings of the whole world and gather them to the "battle of the great day of God Almighty." It is a time when Jesus Christ will mount a white charger as the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. His eyes will glow as a flame of fire. His clothing will be dipped in blood, not His own blood this time, but the blood of His enemies. A long sharp sword shall go out of His mouth to smite the nations. The kings of this earth shall pit themselves against the King from Heaven. The beast and the false prophet will be captured and cast alive into a lake of fire burning with brimstone. The armies of the world will be slain by the long sword and all fowls will be filled with their flesh.

"Armageddon" is not some battle in history. It was not World War I nor World War II. It is not some battle that will develop because of the tension in South America. It has nothing to do with the present conflict between the Jews and the Arabs. It will not stem from the Russian invasion of Afghanistan or Poland. It is a battle that will take place SEVEN YEARS after God's children have left this earth.

How strange it is that when one nation builds up their military might, many began to cry, "Armageddon, Armageddon." Russia and Red China look cross-eyed at each other and someone cries, "Now it is come. Armageddon, Armageddon!" Some little brat punches another kid in the nose and they cry, "Armageddon! Armageddon!"

The Battle of Armageddon is the GREAT DAY OF GOD'S WRATH. The Battle of Armageddon is the last event before the 1000 year reign of Christ on earth. This great Battle will end Satan's reign on earth. Satan is NOW the "god of this earth", the "prince of the power of the air," the "lion walking about seeking who he may devour." The Battle of Armageddon BEGINS the reign of Christ as He should have always reigned.

Satan will deceive ALL the nations of the world and will lead them to fight against God and against God's people Israel. Someone says, "Oh, men wouldn't fight against GOD!" THEY DO IT EVEN NOW! They quench and grieve the Holy Spirit; they tell God to get off their back; They trample underfoot the precious blood of Christ and count it an unholy thing.

Someone says, "A terrible nuclear holocaust will destroy the world." NO! The last Battle will be God's Battle and will take place 1000 years AFTER Armageddon. GOD WILL DESTROY THIS OLD WORLD AND NOT MAN! It will be destroyed by fire, but God will kindle that fire.

Our main concern today should be this: Am I one of God's children? Will I be taken out of this world as pictured in I Thess. 4:13-18? Armageddon is at least SEVEN YEARS AWAY.
