County bank deposits increase \$5 million

Is the Floyd County economy beginning to "turn the corner?"

One examining county bank figures could reach that conclusion.

Combined deposits in the two Floyd banks increased by slightly more than \$5 million at the latest call — March 31 — over figures released 12 months earlier. At the same time, loans declined half that amount.

Deposits at the two Floyd County financial institutions totaled \$73,999,640 at the conclu-

sion of the 1987 first quarter. This represents a gain of \$5,122,558.18 or 6.92 percent.

Asked to explain the significant increase in deposits, coupled with a drop in loans, an officer of First National Bank in Floydada pointed to cotton equity and the fact that "government payments are up." He also alluded to "decent crops" harvested last fall.

Portions of the Lockney community pro-

By contrast, loans were \$21,073,149, a \$2,561,684 decrease from the \$23,634,833 on March 31, 1986.

duced some of the South Plains area's top crops. These excellent yields came during a year in which portions of the area produced extremely sub-par crops.

Both Floyd banks reported greater deposits and lower loans.

First National Bank in Floydada reports deposits of \$48,796,181 at the latest call, and deposits twelve months earlier stood at \$45,006,744. The increase is a substantial \$3,789,437.

Loans on March 31 at the Floydada bank

were \$12,206,845. This is \$1,610,018 less than the \$13,816,863 in loans three months deep into 1986.

Deposits climbed \$1,333,121.18 at First National Bank in Lockney. They were \$25,203,459.54 on March 31 and \$23,870,338.36 a year earlier.

The Lockney financial institution revealed loans of \$8,866,304.07 at the end of the first quarter, compared with \$9,817,970.67 on the

Loans were shown at \$5,600,000 at the close of business ending the first quarter both years.

Jail and TA/C focus of commissioners agenda

The major topic of discussion at the April 13 session of the Floyd County Commissioners Court was the future of the county jail. A recent communication from the Texas Jail Standards Commission prompted the items' inclusion on the days' business.

Among actions taken to avoid closing the jail facility were authorization for hiring an additional jailer, immediate renovation of the first floor holding cell and beginning the process of renovating the third floor to house prisoners and alleviate overcrowding. The additional cells would also provide for segregating prisoners according to classification.

Stated Precinct 3 Commissioner Thomas Warren, "We seem to be at the point of either making the changes or closing the jail." He stressed that "there is only so much a county with our resources can do. When it reaches the point where we can no longer afford to keep the jail open, we may have to face closing it."

County Judge Bill Hardin reminded the commissioners that "If we close the jail, we have to make arrangements for another jail to house our prisoners. With every jail in the area in much the same predicament we are, we can not depend on others to have a place for our prisoners."

The unexpected resignation of the current tax assessor/collector, Jonelle Fawver, has necessitated the search for a successor in her office. Mrs. Fawver, presented her resignation to the court during their Monday meeting, indicating that she would be leaving the office effective May 1, 1987 to "enjoy retirement."

The commissioners voted to accept

applications for the post until "10:00 a.m. on Friday, April 17, at which time interviews will be held and a new tax assessor/collector will be appointed." Judge Hardin indicated that the urgency in filling the post is due to the fact that the state comptroller's office will close the office if there is no "bonded tax assessor/collector in the office after Mrs. Fawver's departure."

Fawver also presented a report comparing the collections made in her office during the first quarter of each of the last three years. The report showed a steady increase in monies brought in by the office. Collections for January through March of 1987 are up about 25% over last year to a total of \$120,859.05.

Offering suggestions for a smooth transition of the TA/C office to the next appointee, Fawver suggested that it would be appropriate to have two full time people in the office and to hire an additional part time helper to handle the increased work load encountered on "Mondays, Fridays, the end of the month, and during March and April." This request for additional funding was "taken under advisement" by the court.

Lewis McDaniel, manager of the Floydada SPS office, met with the court to ask that Floyd County consider switching their business from Floydada Power and Light to SPS. McDaniel and two other SPS representatives told the court "under rates agreed to by Floydada in April of 1984, SPS can offer you a savings of at least \$2521.14 per year based on your bills from Floydada during the last five months." Wind-aided fire razes Dougherty grain facility

Spawed by winds which observers believe gusted to near 60 miles-per-hour, flames swept through the D&P Grain Co., Inc., "woodhouse" Monday and that night, inflicting substantial damage. The facility is located on the east side of Dougherty.

Roger Poage, a partner in D&P Grain Co., Inc., which has leased the Dougherty facility for "12 or 13 years" — said the "woodhouse," the dryer leg and one of five tanks were "lost" to the flames. The "woodhouse" is the firm's main receiving and loading facility. The structure, about "40 by 40 square and about 95 feet high," had a wooden frame covered with sheet metal.

Lon Davis and Poage are partners in D&P Grain Co., Inc., which leases the facility, owned by a partnership known as Dougherty Grain Co.

"Winds are so extremely high," Poage said. "It just kept getting worse and worse." The U.S. Weather Bureau in Lubbock reported wind gusts at 53 miles-per-hour, but sources believe they were higher here.

WINDS 'MAIN PROBLEM'

Bobby Welborn, fire chief of Floydada Volunteer Fire Department, agreed. "High winds were our big problem. We had to stay with it," he said.

Welborn termed the blaze "one of the worst in several years" which had been combated by the local fire department, "as far as being time consuming and probably damage-wise, too."

Donna Pernell attempted to summon the fire department but experienced difficulty with phone service in reaching the FVFD number. The Hesperian was told, and contacted the Sheriff's Department, which phoned the fire department.

Welborn said the call was received "about 1:30" p.m.

Poage said no damage estimate was available at press time. The first of a battery of five 64 feet tall bolted steel tanks "folded over the top" of the "woodhouse" due to the intense heat. The tanks are located east of the "woodhouse."

The second tank was "scorched" and all four of the standing tanks "still have smoke coming out of them," Poage said Tuesday afternoon. "We still haven't got the fire out." He added that grain was "smoldering" at that time.

The tank nearest the woodhouse was described as "a total loss." It contained approximately 20,000 bushels of milo.

WOODHOUSE 'GONE'

The woodhouse is "completely gone." The 70,000 bushel capacity facility was partially filled with milo and wheat.

"We were unloading grain from it that (Monday) morning," Poage explained. Smoke from a nearby "burr pile" was in the atmosphere at that time but the fire had not spread.

One source told this newspaper that sparks from the burrs, which were first

VOTING PLANNED

In order to feel the community's

pulse, "Voting on the proposal will commence the next morning (Tuesday, April 21) at The Hesperian office and will continue for two weeks," Hale explains.

"We hope those who did not vote last time because they did not feel they had adequate information and those who voted on their 'gut feeling' will come and hear the speakers at this meeting," Hale says.

"I'm sure all questions will not be

answered at the hearing," he adds "but we will have speakers who will give us some relevant information. I know I have learned a lot about prisons the last few weeks and much of it is very surprising."

Balloting will be "secret," with no signature line appearing on ballots. However, individuals will be asked to sign a legal sheet at the time of voting to ensure that each person casts a single ballot.

School administration offices hit by fire

The Floydada school payroll was not met Monday.

However, the reason was not financial insufficiency but rather a Thursday night fire which struck the school administration offices. The checks, due Monday, were "a couple of days late," according to Superintendent Jerry Cannon.

Cannon explains that "We feel very fortunate to get out with a minimum of damage. It could have been much worse. We were just very fortunate that we didn't lose our office."

Damage resulting from the fire was discovered about 7 a.m. Friday by custodian Sammy Mercado. The blaze was extinguished itself and "everything was cool" by Friday morning, according to the superintendent, who left his office at 6:30 p.m. Thursday.

Payroll checks had been placed atop a desk in an inner office of the building, where the fire originated. A formica top

on the metal desk was "melted"

The desk and a calculator were lost to the fire. A professional cleaning service was engaged to clean offices Monday and early this week. Paneling covers much of the building's interior, but repainting will be necessary on walls which bear no paneling.

School officials theorize that "a burst of air" from the building's heating system caused flames to spread from a lighted candle. They believe a "highly flammable" bottle of eyeglass cleaner on the desk could have exploded.

"About an eighth of an inch of soot was left on everything" in all offices, according to the superintendent. The soot apparently was transmitted via the heating system and deposited into the various rooms.

Portions of the payroll checks were "just ashes" following the blaze, which was confined to the single room.

No damage estimate was available early this week. The office and contents are insured.

billing would result in additional savings under this rate.

McDaniel explained that SPS offers a rate for commercial customers who have all electric heating during the November to March period. McDaniel indicated that he was unaware of any reason why Floydada did not offer the county this rate as set forth in a 1984 city ordinance.

SPS also proposed upgrading the setup connecting the courthouse to the outside power source since "the existing connection is made through pole top transformers which are set on the ground and do not provide adequate safety."

Commissioners agreed to consider the matter and will take it up again after checking into the rates being paid to the city.

The court approved closing a mile of county road in Precinct 4. The half mile stretch runs east of and parallel to a new section of Baker Road. Closing the road was a formality as no one lives on the road. The closure will necessitate moving five electric poles by the county. The road was closed on a unanimous vote on a motion made by Warren and seconded by Precinct 4 commissioner Kay Crabtree.

County employees will continue to enjoy health insurance coverage under Blue Cross as no other bids were

submitted for the coverage. Commissioners voted to continue the contract despite increased rates this year.

Mary Curry of McAdoo met with the court to present a cancer insurance plan and ask the court to consider offering this unique coverage to county employees. The court will consider the matter before making a decision concerning enrolling the county in it.

County treasurer Glenna Orman presented her monthly and quarterly reports. The county began the month of March with a balance of \$435,409.02, taking in a total of \$653,488.44 and disbursing \$724,717.13 leaving the balance at the end of the month

\$364,180.33. \$669,000 in certificates of deposit have earned the county coffers \$15,819.51 in interest to date. Tax collections are 93.43% complete.

Two contracts with the city of Floydada were considered. The first, a mutual cooperation contract for law enforcement, was approved. The second, a contract for rural fire service was again tabled pending further discussion between the county and the city.

Private farm work contracts were approved for Carthel Brothers and Eddie Smith in Precinct 1, Roy D. Baccus and M.A. Ulmer in Precinct 2, and John Dunlap and J.L. McGowen in Precinct 3.

Attending the session were commissioners Warren, Crabtree, Sam Spence and Floyd Jackson in addition to Judge Hardin.

Trustees approve \$81,148 in capital improvements

New board members Michael Hinsley and Adolfo Garcia signed their oaths of office and the scheduled election of officers for the coming year was postponed until a full board could be present. John Dunlap was unable to be present at the Monday evening session, and the six members present voted 3-3 for the two nominees, Freddie Morren and Weldon Pruitt, for the post of the president. The unbroken tie necessitated the postponement and left Superintendent Jerry Cannon presiding over the April session.

Newly elected school board trustees Hinsley and Garcia cast their votes in favor of several capitol improvement projects at the April 13 FUSD board meeting. The pair joined serving board members in approving a total of \$81,148.17 in capitol improvement expenditures, \$25,115.39 out of the remaining 86-87 budget and the remaining \$66,032.78 to be paid from the 87-88 budget.

The initial project to be approved was the construction of an addition to the current fieldhouse of a 25' x 50' weight room. Four bids were received: Brown-McKee, Inc. of Lubbock at \$23,011; Plains Builders, Inc. of Lubbock at \$23,468; Hallmark Builders of Lubbock at \$23,943 and Walter Davis Construction of Floydada at \$18,963.39. The bid was awarded to Walter Davis Construction on a motion by Pruitt, seconded by Morren and passed by unanimous vote.

Enlarging the parking lot at the field house brought only one contender. Fred Lipham of Floydada bid \$6,152 for the project. His bid was accepted on a motion by Don Hardy, seconded by Hinsley and approved by unanimous vote.

After considering bids from four firms on locker replacement projects at high school and the junior high gym, the board voted to proceed with the installation of new hallway lockers at high school, but wait until next month to decide on the replacement of junior high gym lockers. Bids on the high school lockers came from: Vaughn Storage Systems of Lubbock at \$29,694; Construction Specialties of El Paso at \$31,485; American Desk of Lubbock at \$49,104.22 and Indico of Lubbock at \$31,176. The bid was awarded to indico on a motion by Pruitt, seconded by Morren and passed by unanimous vote.

A complicated series of bids concerning the re-roofing of another section of the high school resulted in the acceptance of Walter Davis Construction Company's bid on two portions and no action on the third. A split vote of five in favor and one abstention carried the matter.

Morren abstained from the vote saying, "I just hate to vote on this after we approved a three year roof maintenance contract with Dunavant last year."

Six firms bid on the measure, submitting three part bids, vied for the work. Walter Davis Construction of Floydada submitted a bid of \$18,525.39 on the band hall/cafeateria roof, a bid of \$49,075.39 on the auditorium roof and \$16,331.39 on the Ag department roof with a total bid for all three of \$82,254.39. Hallmark submitted bids of \$20,810 on the band hall/cafeateria, \$57,454 on the auditorium and \$18,634 on the Ag department with a total bid on all three of \$96,898. Brown-McKee bid \$22,721 on the band hall/cafeateria, \$57,987 on the auditorium and \$19,753 on the Ag department with a total bid for all three of \$100,461.

Smith and Dunavant of Floydada

submitted only a total cost bid of \$89,325 for all three sections of the roof. Parsley Construction bid \$28,100 on the band hall/cafeateria, \$72,900 on the auditorium and \$25,400 on the Ag department with a total for all three of \$126,400. The final bid was from Hamilton Roofing of Lubbock bid \$27,863 on the band hall/cafeateria, \$61,224 on the auditorium, and \$22,358 on the Ag department with a total for the three of \$111,445.

Charlene Brown made the motion accepting the Walter Davis bids on the band hall/cafeateria and the Ag department. Hardy seconded the motion.

The fieldhouse addition and the fieldhouse parking lot will be paid from the 86-87 capitol improvements budget and the high school lockers, band hall/cafeateria roof and ag department roof will be paid from the 87-88 capitol improvements budget.

Counselor Sheree Cannon and school nurses Billie Jordan and Gladys Jones presented an overview of a new curriculum for self responsibility to be incorporated into the existing classroom situations in the coming year. According to Cannon, "This is an effort by educators and the state to get all elements of the community to band together to reach all teens with the emphasis on the 'at risk' segment likely to drop out or encounter the problem of teen pregnancy."

Cannon stressed that the program utilizes skills and concepts already in place to incorporate the teaching of self responsibility and good self image in the current curriculum.

The ladies offered to assist in forming a committee to study ways and means of bringing the community as a whole into the project. Board members Brown and Hinsley offered to serve on the committee.

Two school buses, a 1972 and 1973, were sold to the highest bidder, Socorro Martinez of Muleshoe, for a total of

\$2315.70. City Auto of Floydada submitted the only other bid, \$1500 for the two. The sale was approved by unanimous vote on a motion by Hinsley, seconded by Pruitt.

Superintendent Cannon reported on upcoming school board training sessions available to those needing hours to meet the state requirements. He also reported that the accreditation report from a visit in late March was "extremely good." He noted that a few recommendations had been made for improvement, but "none of these are required, and we were not written up on anything."

Administrative assistant Jimmie Collins presented a proposed salary scale for administrators. The formula he has developed would regulate administrative raises according to the raises authorized by the state for teachers. The board agreed to study the plan for possible implementation in the 1988-89 school year. Salaries for the 1987-88 school year have already been set for administrative personnel.

Collins also reported that a roof on an ag storage barn had fallen in and needed to be repaired if the building was to be used to store hay and work with other ag projects. Collins estimated that he and the ag department could re-roof the facility for about \$1800. The board approved the work on a motion by Hinsley, seconded by Morren.

The resignation of Ella Stapp, a secretary in the administration offices, was accepted on a motion by Pruitt, seconded by Hardy.

An executive session was called at the conclusion of the regular session for the purpose of discussing personnel. No action was taken following that session.

In addition to the bidders present and those speaking at the session, the meeting was attended by principals Ronnie Wood, Bobbie Weir, parent Joe Stepp and the Hesperian reporter.

noticed burning "about midnight" Sunday, possibly spread to the grain facility. The real culprit was the highest winds of the year.

The "burr pile" is approximately "300 yards away" from D&P Grain Co., Inc., improvements. Another source placed the distance at "about a quarter mile."

One individual told The Hesperian of a man working "about a mile from the burrs" who was struck on the neck by an ember. "The wind was that bad."

Poage, who highly commended firemen, said the firm's office — which along with the scales is situated some 50 yards from the woodhouse — "caught on fire three times and they (firemen) put it out three times." Although "it is structurally still there," the office is "badly damaged."

The five tanks, each of which has a 20,000 bushel capacity, were repainted "about a week ago."

HOUSES NEARBY
Houses located near the burned facilities reportedly were engulfed by "heavy smoke." One source said they sustained smoke damage, but further information was not available. One resident reportedly "sprayed his house" with a hose.

Dougherty is located 14 miles east of

Floydada on Highway 70 and then about two miles south.

One Dougherty resident told this newspaper that hopes were raised Monday afternoon as sprinkles developed. However, no significant moisture fell and "winds just seemed to get higher."

Floydada, Lockney, Matador and McAdoo fire departments were summoned to help counter the flames.

Welborn said two trucks and the department's Suburban were dispatched to the fire Monday and members of the department remained there until "about 2 o'clock" Tuesday morning. Poage said they were "called back about 6 or 6:30" Tuesday morning "when the wind got up again."

The Highway Department assisted with traffic.

COURTROOM ACTIVITIES

In County Court on April 10, Billy Guattlebaum filed an appeal on not wearing a seat belt. There was no disposition on the case at this time.

On April 14, Travis Jury Ysasaga pled guilty to DWI. He was fined \$300.00 plus court costs of \$90.00 plus a jail sentence of 90 days which was probated for two years.

In J.P. court for the week April 7-14, two bad check complaints were filed and 18 other misdemeanor cases were filed.

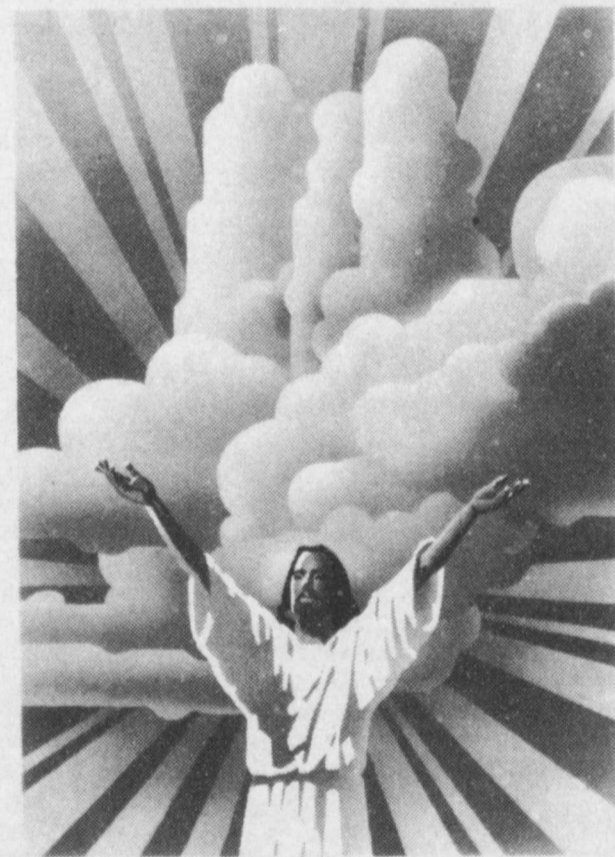

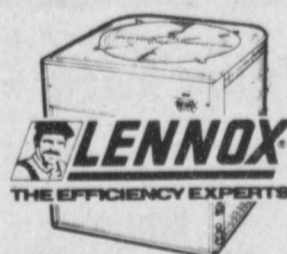

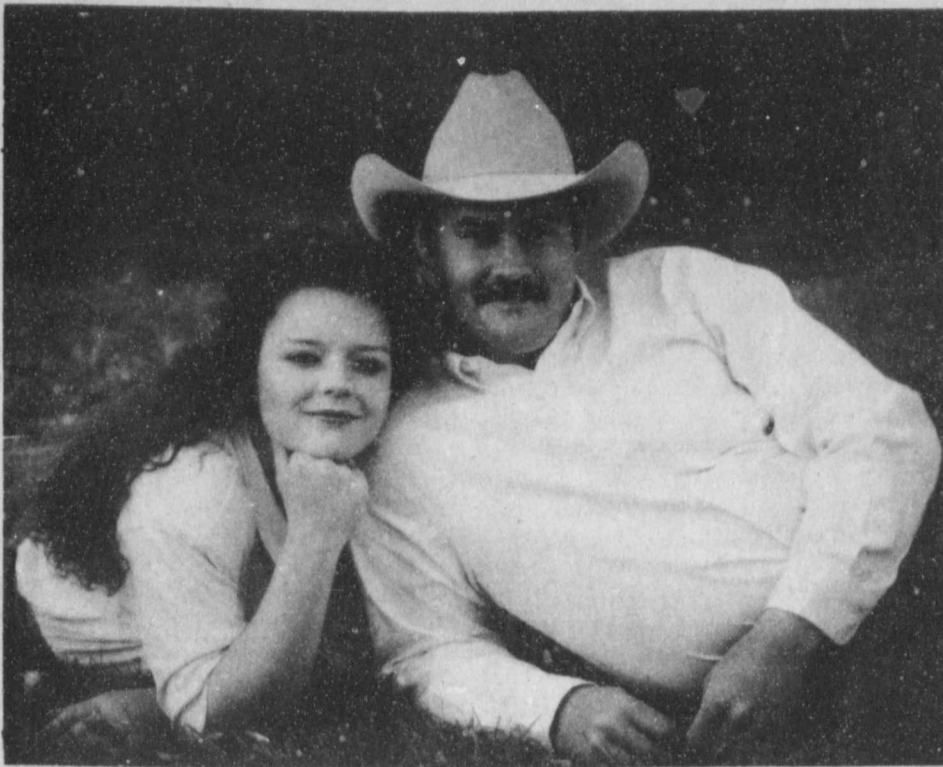

"To say we are pleased and excited would be an understatement," a smiling Coach Tommy Baxter says after his Whirlwind girls had scored 167 points to outdistance runner-up Muleshoe by 39 points for their second consecutive district track championship. The district meet was Friday and Saturday in Tulia.

"Winning last year was satisfying, but to repeat as champions and repeat in such magnitude is exceptional," Coach Baxter added.

"We had a lot of girls turning in some big performances. Not only did those winning firsts do their best but the girls outdid themselves in going for other places and points for their team. Every girl threw personal gain aside and went on to help the team in every way possible."

"Our field events really did the job by scoring 62 points before we ever ran a race," Coach Baxter explains. "My hat is off to Coach (Dianne) Mitchell. She got the discus throwers ready and we grabbed the top three places."

"After being nipped in the two sprint relays last year, we really felt we had a score to settle and the girls proved themselves Saturday with two runaway victories."

"There were others who healed old wounds from the past. Paige Cannon was beaten in the discus last year on the final throw and this year, she took charge from the first throw. Tana Turner has been chasing and coming up short for three years in the 100. I know Saturday's win has to be sweet for her."

Coach Baxter lists "other big performances" as:

"Pam Woody — first in hurdles after not being able to compete last year.

"Angie Bertrand — second in 800 — just missed qualifying last year and this time qualified and missed the school record by three-tenths of a second.

"Jane Willson — second in long jump after only jumping two weeks. Her opening leg of the 800 relay was a 27.03 which got us off to sure victory.

"Shot putters Norma Cisneros and Denise Morren, stunned by surprise throws from Muleshoe and Dimmitt, still kept trying and threw their bests for team points.

"Kim Perry — With second place well in hand, hit a hurdle and went down. She still got up with scrapped knees and finished to score for her teammates."

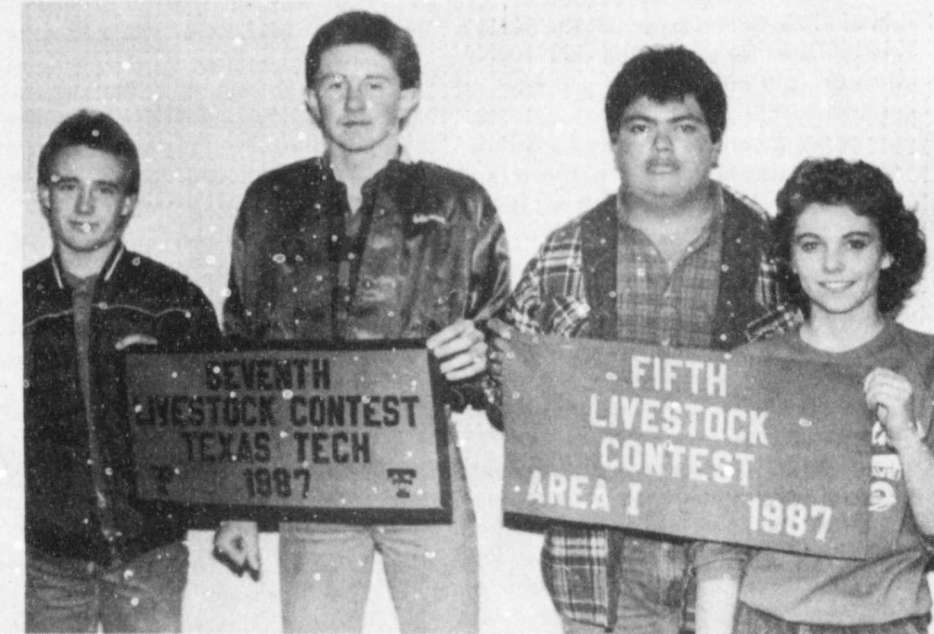

Thefts of pickup and goats reported to sheriff's office

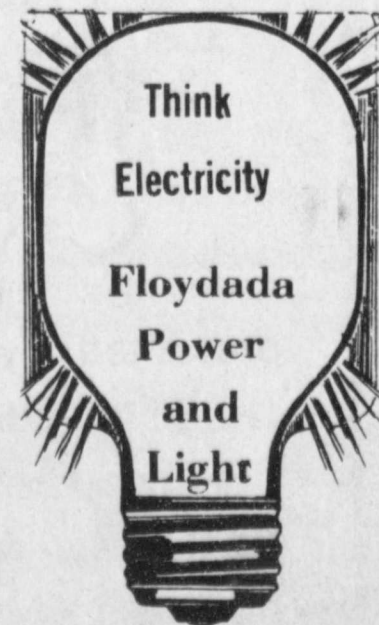
Members of the Sheriff's Department were investigating early this week the theft of a pickup in Floydada and two goats taken at Aiken.

Prison endorsed by the Floydada City Council

The Floydada city council went on record in favor of attempts to persuade Texas Department of Corrections to locate a minimum security prison facility in the Floydada area during their regular April session Tuesday evening. The stand in support of the project was expressed by all present during a discussion with Floydada Development Corporation President Bill Hale.

Hale had come before the council to make a request that the city consider offering the city farm, located outside the city limits, to TDC as a donation or at a nominal lease for a work facility should the department opt to build a prison here. He also asked that the city furnish "utilities to the prison site" at no cost to TDC.

Council members indicated a willingness to consider the request and appointed councilman Leroy Burns to represent the city on the Floydada Development Corporation Board.

A complaint lodged against Floydada Cable TV by Guy Hazlett was reviewed during the April 14 meeting. Council instructed city attorney Steve Hale to "draft and send" a letter to the firm stating that compliance with the current franchise must be made or the city will exercise its option to cancel the franchise.

Attorney Hale was authorized to contact a legal expert in the area of land, real estate and structures in an effort to update and clarify city zoning and building ordinances. The council agreed to allow him a sum "not to exceed \$2,000" to carry out this work on a motion by Nancy Willson, seconded by Ginger Warren.

Hale reported that no progress had been made on the demolition and clearing of the Rilla Sue Woody property as there had as yet been no response from the IRS to requests for a release allowing the city to clear the lot. The release is necessary since the IRS has posted a lien against the property.

Bids were opened on three matters before the council. The first, sale of a 1982 Ford 4 door sedan, was rejected. Only one bid was received. Thomas Used Cars of Matador bid \$650 for the vehicle. The council chose to reject the bid and retain the car.

A contract for the installation of a 14 inch water main improvement project went to H.B. Jordan and Company of Amarillo on a bid of \$21,807.60 with a completion time of 90 days. Jordan was the successful bidder among ten firms vying for the contract.

A motion by Councilman Wayne Russell, seconded by Warren, saw the council approve the purchase of a new sanitation vehicle. Councilmembers voted to accept the bid of Emco in Plainview to provide a 1987 International 1954 "S Series" truck and a 30 cubic yard compactor with a 3,000 pound lifting mechanism. Emco, the only bidder, was awarded the contract for \$45,237. Delivery will take at least 90 to 120 days according to the bid.

Gregory Luna, resident of the first house east of the city limits on East Missouri met with the council to request

trash pick up from the city sanitation department. The request was granted and he will be provided service at the usual rate.

Ed Henderson, the current Floydada representative on the board of directors of Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority was re-appointed for a 2 year term ending April 30, 1989.

Looking forward to plans for the 1987 summer months, the council opted to again provide portable toilet facilities at Annie Taylor Park and at the Floydada City Park. Council also instructed city manager Bill Feuerbacher to secure the necessary insurance information prior to the May meeting so that a decision can be made regarding the city swimming pool. The council has the option of operating the facility, leasing it to an independent operator or not opening it at all.

Police Chief James Hale reported on the progress of implementing the recently approved Junk Car Ordinance. Hale told the council that his department will "hopefully be ready to begin in about a week." He said that he and his officers would be "working from the north side of town to the south and would first be concentrating on junk cars on the streets or adjacent to the streets, then those in alleys."

Hale stated that letters would be sent and "bright orange stickers affixed to the vehicles." This will serve to identify vehicles on which proceedings have been started. The permanent stickers will be placed on windows where possible.

City manager Feuerbacher presented a proposed budget for putting an expanded city landfill into operation. The estimated \$70,000 amount would finance the landfill from the application for a permit and purchase of the land through the necessary testing, engineering and construction phases.

Councilman Frank Breck made a motion authorizing the purchase of a Xerox Model 1012 copier for use in the city offices. The motion was seconded by Warren and approved by the remaining members. The purchase will cost \$2,000.

A proposed purchase of mini-blinds for the city office windows was tabled along with a proposal to replace the last nine old windows in the building with new windows. The matter will be discussed again when price estimates are available.

Henderson & Company CPA's will conduct the annual review and audit for city financial records for the budget year 1986-87. The estimated cost of the review is \$3600. The period covered extends from April 1, 1986 to March 31, 1987.

Bill Feuerbacher will represent Floydada at the Texas Public Power Association meeting in Austin on April 26 to 28.

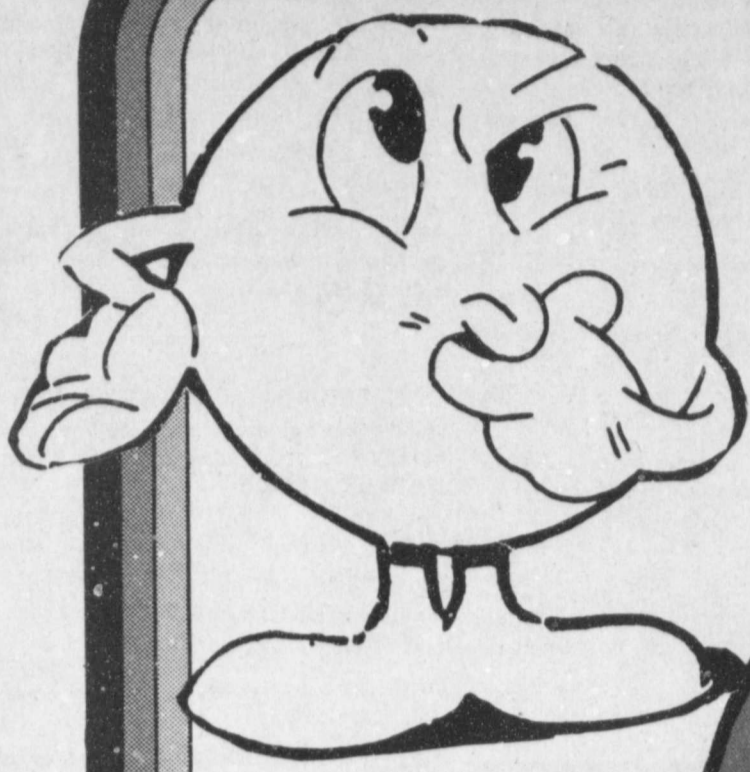
