Burglary intercepted at school

Final day of school activities at Floydada High School was more volatile than expected as a school aide witnessed two young men remove an object from Hunter Smith's 1985 Jeep, which was parked on the west side of the school about 2:35 p.m. She jotted down a license number from their vehicle.

Smith and three cohorts confronted the two males, riding in a 1981 tan with brown top Pontiac, on the east side of the school.

Smith noticed that a Roadmaster equalizer, which had been stolen from his Jeep a short time earlier, was among items inside the Pontiac. He removed the equalizer before the man sitting on the passenger side of the Pontiac told his companion, "Break out the guns."

The Pontiac sped away. Floydada Police Department and officers in both Garza and Hale counties were continuing their investigation early this week. Arrests are anticipated.

Born July 15, 1963 in Houston, she was reared in Floydada. She was a member of the Church of Christ.

Old pumper earns retirement

Floydada fire truck chosen for state pumper races

If it could talk, a 1940 Ford pumper truck could relate unlimited tales about fires — great and small — in Floydada during the past half century.

This grandad of Floydada Volunteer Fire Department equipment was in the front lines combatting a March 11, 1949 blaze which "burned out" the second and third floors of the county's official place of business: the courthouse.

The fire, of undetermined origin, was discovered at 6:10 a.m. on that fateful Friday and "within a period of less than an hour and a half all of the super-structure had been burn-

ed in spite of the fact that Floydada Fire Department, Lockney Fire Department and Plainview Fire Department had streams of water pouring into the blaze at the rate of 750 gallons per minute."

According to Hesperian files, "In four hours (after the fire was discovered) the master meter of the city water department indicates the three departments poured approximately 200,000 gallons of water on the blazing building."

That old '40 Ford was also a key combatant when a gasoline truck crashed on the "Y" and burned and in literally hundreds of business,

residential and other fires during its 40-odd years of service.

Floydada citizens "got their money's worth" from the pumper, which initially cost \$3,500.

Although active use "as a first-line truck" was discontinued "during the late '70s or early '80s," during last state test, "that sucker still pumped over rated capacity, which is 500 gallons per minute (GPM)," according to Carroll Sims, assistant chief of Floydada Volunteer Fire Department (FVFD).

The old '40 pumper is now kept on reserve and "as an antique more or less now. It reflects the history of

our community."

REFURBISHED

As a matter of respect to the old timer, local firemen are "in the process" of refurbishing the truck. "Fireboys are donating the money and virtually all the labor" to return the truck to its former condition. Stanley Covington painted it.

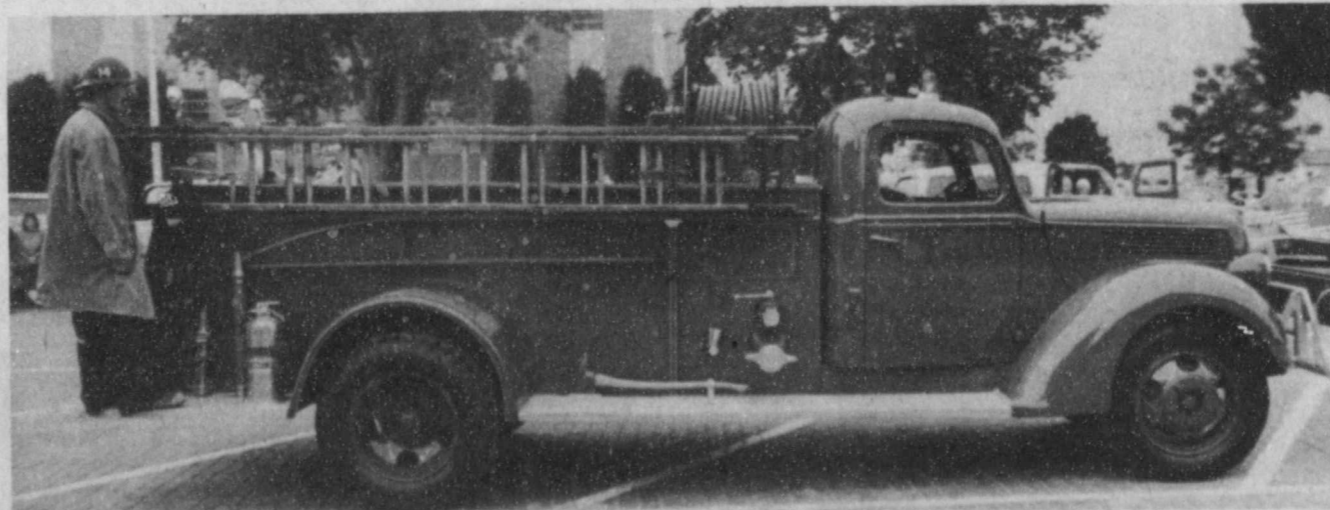
All of its splendor from yesterday was reflected as the 57-year-old pumper rolled along the recent Old Settlers parade route for public viewing.

Another honor is in store for the '40 Ford. It will be used as "official pumper" for state championship pumper races during the annual State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Convention on Saturday, June 13. Amarillo is hosting the state con-fab, with "pumper races" planned at the firemen's training field in Amarillo.

Actually, the "pumper races" have absolutely nothing to do with road speed of trucks.

As Sims explains, the "races" are a test of speed and skill among firemen.

Five-member teams are stationed at various positions. On a given signal, one team member drags a 100-foot section of the hose from the truck. Another pair hook the "hard section" of the hose from a hydrant to the truck, and the remaining two disconnect 100 feet of hose and hook it to the side opposite the

hydrant. Object of the timed event, which is "run by the clock," is to determine which team can get water from the nozzle in the shortest period of time.

"Some real good teams" from throughout the state will be vying for honors in the 2:30 p.m. June 13 event. Sims says divisions are planned for both men's and women's teams. He adds that some South Texas' teams "practice nearly every day."

DESPERATE SITUATION

Purchase of the 1940 Ford pumper "brand new" was a matter of desperation for City of Floydada.

In 1937 — during the heart of the Great Depression — American-La France Foamite Industries, Inc., repossessed one of the city's fire trucks.

Not only did this create a shortage of fire-fighting equipment, but it posed the possibility of substantially increasing insurance rates for local businesses and residences.

A May 6, 1937 article appearing in The Hesperian was headed, "City Ponders 'Way out' Of New Dilemma" and bore sub-heads which stated: "Key Rate Increase Can Be Met Partially By New Truck Purchase," "Penalty Due Soon" and "Loss of Fire Truck in Law Suit Will Hike Insurance Cost."

The article:

"Loss of one of the city's fire trucks in a law suit recently is due to cost citizens of Floydada some \$1,200 in insurance premiums annually beginning soon, and city fathers are pondering a way out, Glad Snodgrass, mayor, said this week.

"L.B. Newsome, engineer from the State Insurance Commission, who spent Tuesday and Wednesday in inspections of the city's fire hazards and fire fighting equipment, said an increase in the key rate for local insurance risks would become effective soon, probably June 1, and that the advance would be approximately four and a half

cents, raising the key rate to approximately 39 cents.

"Loss of one of the city's fire fighting trucks recently in a law suit that was decided adversely in the federal circuit court at New Orleans is the immediate cause of the expected advance. The remaining equipment is inadequate to justify the rate the city has enjoyed the past several years, the mayor and council were told by the engineer.

"What we are going to do is the question, the mayor says. In a statement yesterday he asked every business man in the community to put his head to working and render the council and mayor every assistance.

"Purchase of a truck that will meet the needs of the community will entail an estimated expenditure of \$4,200. This purchase, if made, would render property more safe from fire and additionally save about \$700 of the \$1,200 annual cost that would follow an increase in the key rate, in other words cutting this increase to about two cents instead of the four or four and a half that otherwise will be made.

"The key rate increase will be announced formally in an order to be issued by the State Fire Insurance Commission, acting on the report of its engineer. The last visit of the engineer to this city was in 1934, when a crisis was precipitated by objections raised by him to manner in which the local building code was being enforced."

TRUCK PURCHASED

On July 22, 1940, the City Council contracted "for the cash purchase at a price of \$3,500 of a new fire truck, which will be equipped with a Mercury 95-horse power engine."

Meeting on a Friday night, the city governing body received eight sealed bids but did not take action until a called meeting the following Monday morning.

"General Fire Truck Corporation, of Detroit, Michigan, contracted to deliver the new equipment within 45 to 60 days," according to Hesperian files. "Power plant for the new equipment will be furnished by Bishop Motor Company." The mayor and council members viewed several cities and towns to inspect equipment before reaching their decision.

"Keeping all the present equipment, the added truck and modern fire fighting devices with which it is equipped, will enable the city to regain a 2-center lower key rate on all insured property in the city, according to advices from the State Fire Insurance Commission to Mayor Glad Snodgrass."

The bright red Ford pumper rolled into town on Oct. 14, 1940. It was equipped with a 500 gallons per minute pumper.

And what a bargain, considering the fact that the latest truck purchased by FVFD bore a price tag of approximately \$107,000.

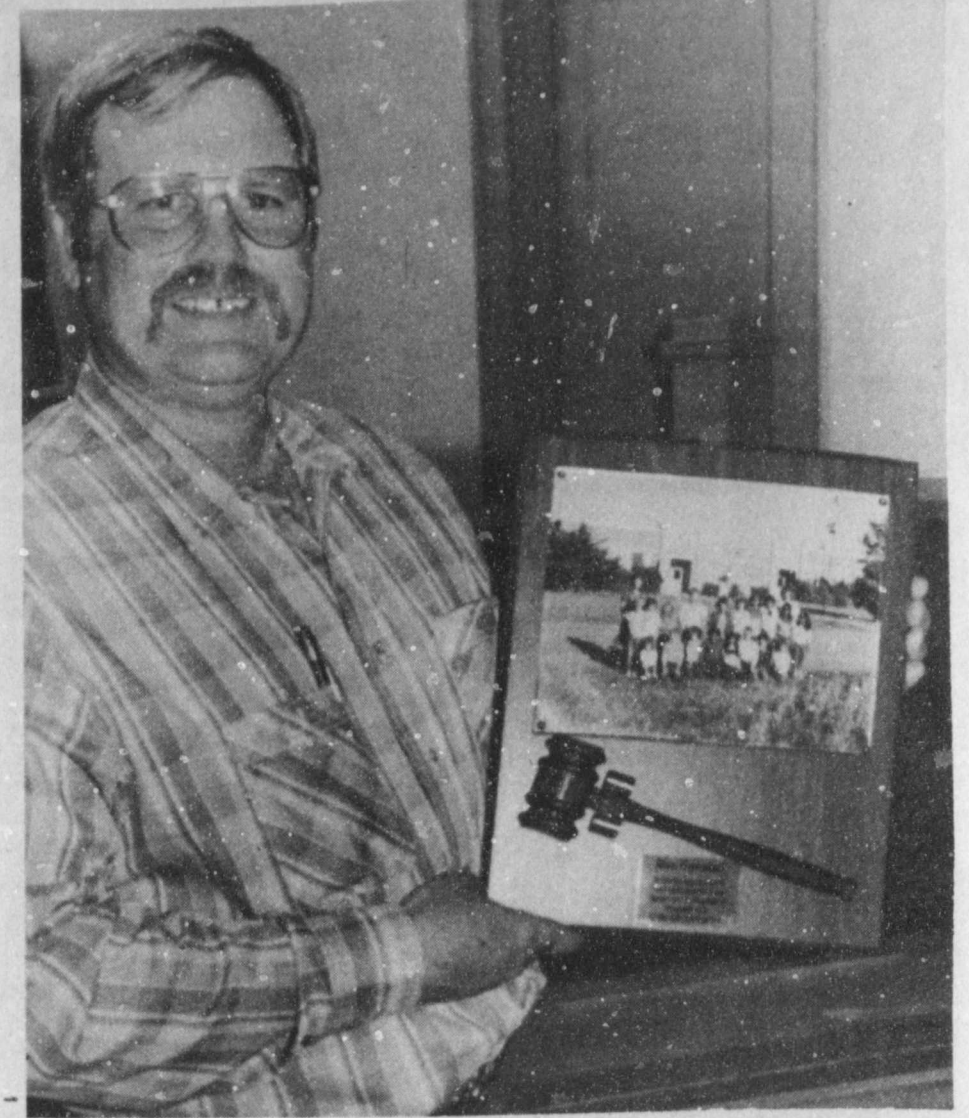
City Council minutes from 1911 reflect that provisions for a volunteer fire department in Floydada were made, although The Hesperian first mentions an organized department in 1916. Warnie Hilton, who recently celebrated his 105th birthday and presently resides at Floydada Nursing Home, apparently was a charter member.

Early-day firemen utilized "a two-wheel cart with shafts to pull it with." It bore "about 200 feet of hose."

First motorized fire truck owned by Floydada was a Model T fire truck, purchased in 1922.

In 1926, the city purchased a Dodge truck.

It was not the first nor the latest in Floydada Volunteer Fire Department's arsenal, but none has stood prouder than that 1940 Ford pumper which is now an honorary member of FVFD.

Fifth and Columbia streets at 12:10 a.m. A Hart resident for only two months, Rodriguez was taken to Vale Hermoso, Tamps, Mexico, for funeral services.



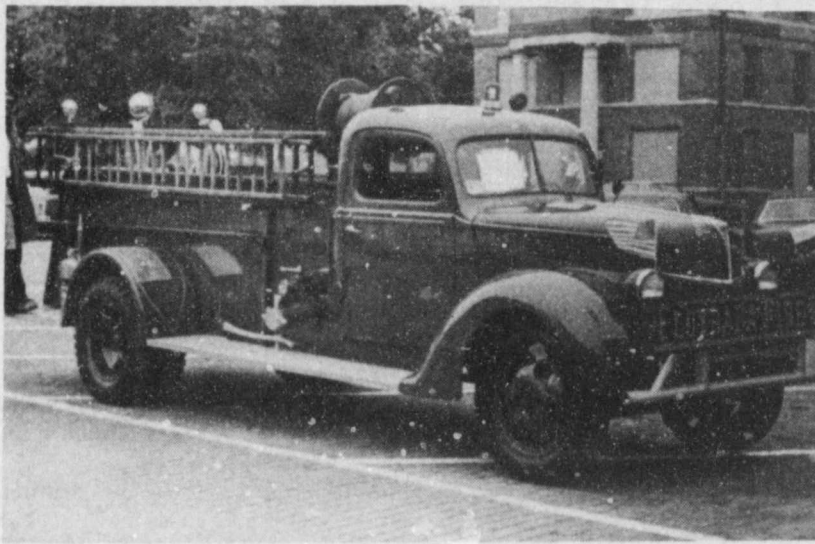

"My goal is to evoke a feeling or bring back a memory that gives pleasure to the eye and soul of the viewer," says Fox.

Garren, a West Texas native, attempts the capture of a mood or the creation of one existing in the mind's eye with her artistic talents. While Southwest landscapes dominate her work, Garren also ventures into representational or symbolic still lifes, florals and figures. Each of her works challenges her to depict the subtlety of earth colors in concert with the tension produced by the sudden changes in the climate of her native West Texas.

"I seek to make tangible the spiritual essence of form, remembering that form alone is not art and spirit alone without form is unmanifested art," states Garren.

Garren's works hang in public and private collections in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas and New Jersey. She has had numerous one woman shows and her works are on display at Alley Gal'ry and Bent Tree Gallery in Lubbock.

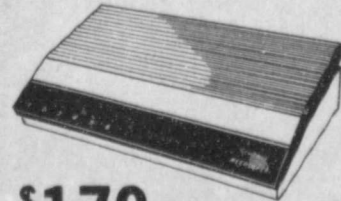

Hale updates Chamber on prison proposal

Floydada Chamber of Commerce directors met Wednesday, May 20, and heard Bill Hale's update on Floydada's proposal to bring a minimum security prison here.

Hale showed directors copies of Floydada's proposal that was recently given to legislators and the governor's office. He stated that a lobbying effort in Austin by the Floydada Development Company had gone very well.

Floydada's proposal will be based on a 1,000 inmate facility. It should have room to go as high as 2,200 inmates at the maximum. The two sites that may be proposed are the industrial park

which consists of 70 acres and/or possibly a site in the country.

"Our industrial park is the best place for the prison itself," said Hale. The biggest sewer line goes through there, and electricity and gas can be brought to them at no cost. We can also get water there cheaply. However we may have to end up with a site out in the country.

"I was told that there are different kinds of prison. If this would be a farming prison they would want some land to farm to grow pinto beans, onions, and Irish potatoes. We should be prepared to provide some land to farm, or they may want to put the prison

out in the country on the farm land itself. We don't know any of that yet. It could turn out to be an industrial prison, where they learn different trades.

"Our utility companies will be offering reasonable rates. I am also attempting to find someone from our schools to go to the Texas Department of Corrections and find out what's important to them as far as education goes, so we can learn what we can propose.

"We have also based our proposal on public support. We have shown them our votes and our support and it's very impressive. This is very important to TDC.

"I have also been able to show

regional support through letters of support I have from mayors, judges, chief's of police, sheriffs and attorneys from all over West Texas.

Hale thanked the Chamber directors for getting out the vote and thanked the community in general for their help and interest.

Also discussed at the meeting was an idea presented by Larry Ogden on the possibility of having a farmers market in Floydada.

It would be limited to Floyd County growers, and if it could be set up downtown, Chamber directors thought it might generate a lot of activity. It was decided that the chamber would explore the possibility and contact the Texas Department of Agriculture and also find out who was in charge of the farmers market in Plainview.

The board agreed, at the request of the Floyd County Historical Commission, to purchase two historical markers to be placed on Highway 70. The markers will read, "Historical Markers in City." The markers will cost \$80.00 each.

Also planned by Chamber of Commerce is a membership drive. It was reported by Nettie Ruth Whittle that it had been 1 1/2 years since there had been a membership drive.

The Chamber of Commerce board also agreed that this was not a good year to give a scholarship. It was felt that it is too late to get an endowment together this year for that purpose, and that chamber resources might be needed to help with the prison location.

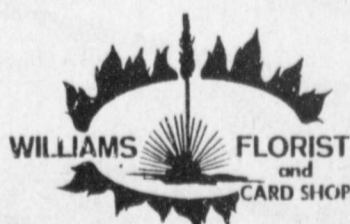

TEC to certify eligibility

Effective June 15, local Texas Employment Commission offices will begin certifying the employment eligibility of job applicants for employers under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 (IRCA).

According to new TEC procedures, employers who hire job applicants through TEC for jobs lasting longer than three days will receive employment verifications as soon as the employer notifies the TEC office that an applicant has been hired. This will insure that employers are in full compliance with the provisions of the IRCA.

For jobs lasting three days or less, employers will be responsible for their own verification of the employment eligibility of job applicants.

All individuals registering for work with TEC after June 1, 1987, will need to provide evidence of identity and employment eligibility. Documents used to establish identity must contain a picture of the applicant.

A Texas driver's license will satisfy this requirement. To establish employment eligibility, applicants may use an original Social Security card, unless it states that employment in the United States is not authorized.

Anyone interested in more information on these new TEC procedures should contact their local Texas Employment Commission office.

Post office laborer exam to be given

Donald S. Bloyd, Sectional Center Manager/Postmaster, Lubbock, has announced that the Cleaner/Custodial Laborer Examination will be open from June 8, 1987 through June 19, 1987 in the Pampa, Texas Post Office. These positions are restricted by law to individuals entitled to veteran preference. Applications received from individuals not entitled to veteran preference will be returned.

The position will be twenty (20) hour per week, at a starting salary of \$7.93 per hour.
