characteristics help determine the economicteristics help determine the eco-
cattle specialist. cattle specialist.
"Frame size refers to the animal's
skeletal size-its height and body skeletal size-its height and body
length-in relation to its age," explains Boleman. "These evaluations in feeder colves are directly related to diffiferences
in mature sizes of cattle and therefore in mature sizes of cattle and therefore
have an have an important bearing on the
animal's performance in the feedlot." Frame size designations are referred. to as large, medium or small and are used
in the USDA feeder cattle grading in the USDA feeder cattle grading
system. According to the specialist, muscling
in feeder cattle refers to the developin feeder cattle refers to the develop-
ment of the muscle system in relation to ment of the muscle system in relation to
skeleta size. Feeders of the same age
sked skeletal size. Feeders of the same age
and frame size vary in thickness due to and frame size vary in tickness due to
differences in bone structure, muscling
and degree of fattess. and degree of fatness.

wess will normally produce higher yield carcass than an animal of
the same frame size that is narrow throughout,", says Boleman. Muscle
thickness is classified as thickness is classified as to three
levels-No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 and is included in the USDA grades of feeder cattle. No. 1 is the most muscular and
No. 3 is the least muscular. .
As far as breed characteristics are
concerned, Boleman points concerned, Boleman points out that
buyers usually pay the highest prices buyers usually pay the highest prices
for rossbred feeder calves that contain
varying percentase varying percentages of tradititoonal, exo-
tic and Brahman breeding depending tic and Brahman breeding depending on

preferences.

adds. "Ideally, they want an animal that will produce a Choice carcass with a No. 2 yield grade. That's the target that
all cattlemen need to shoot at,"
says an agricultural engineer. Aeration is the practice of forcing desirable temperature and moisture conditions through stored grain to cool conditions through stored grain to cool
and equalize temperatures, explains and equalize temperatures, explains
Richard Withers with the Texas Agri-
cultural Extension Service. cultural Extension Service.
The air delivery system to handle this task should be well-engineered and
properly installed and managed properly installed and managed, With-
ers emphasizes. When atmospheric air moves through stored grain, both heat and moisture are exchanged until air and grain have contents, explains the engineer. Once this equilibrium condition exists, the moisture content of stored grain is content (EMC). The relative humidity of the atmospheric air in equilibrium with the grain is called the equilibrium relative humidity (ERH). When the air's relative humidity is
below that of the ERH, moisture will be evaporated from the grain during the aeration process, and the grain temperature will decrease due to the
evaporative cooling effect, says Withevaporative cooling effect, says With-
ers. The amount of cooling resulting ers. The amount of cooling resulting
from evaporation may be as much as 50 percent or more of the total heat
removed.

Store pesticides properly, safely

| By C. Mark Brown <br> Extension Agent - Entomology [PM] <br> Crosby/Floyd Counties <br> Is that bottle of malathion still on the workbench where you left it when you sprayed the apple trees? Homeowners and workshops to be sure that pesticides have been properly stored. Proper storage will prevent potential hazards around the heme asd shelf-life of the pesticides. <br> The best way to store small amounts of pesticide is in a locked cabinet located in a ventilated area. The pesticide should always be stored in the original container displaying a legible label. <br> If at all possible, protect the pesticide from extreme temperatures. At $32^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$. or below, chemicals may crystallize out of solution and lose their effectiveness. | Any chemical with a flash point of $140^{\circ}$ F. or less is a possible fire hazard and should be protected from direct heat sources. Producers should not attempt to store sodium chlorate because of the extreme fire hazard involved. <br> Producers storing more than a few gallons of pesticides should check with local fire protection authorities and public health officials concerning legal ordinances. Remember that according to the new Community Right-to-Know Act, you will be required to report stored chemicals if the amount exceeds the threshold planning quantities designated by the EPA. When storing any significant volume of pesticides, you should adhere to the following rules: <br> *Keep chemicals in a locked storage area, well-ventilated and clearly posted at all points of entry. <br> *Date all containers. | *Keep a $\log$ of pesticides and amounts in storage. <br> *Check containers periodically for leaks, tears, etc. <br> *Do not locate storage area near feed or seed. <br> *Always store "empty containers" in the storage area pending disposal. <br> Properly dispose of all empty pesticide containers. Generally, a homeowner can dispose of an empty container by wrapping it and placing it in a dumpster to be disposed of in a sanitary land fill. Most farmers are exempt from any special hazardous waste disposal laws because of the minimal amount of wastes they work with. However, producers are required to dispose of the container properly, according to the pesticide label directions. For further information you can contact your local Extension Service office. |
