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Connie Bearden candidate for commissioner in Precinct One

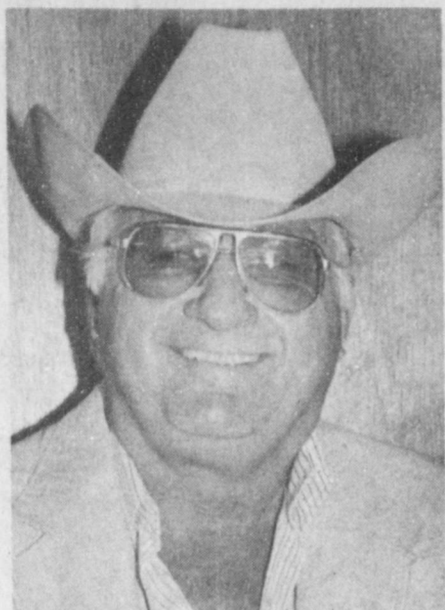

"The taxpayer is the number one concern of any public official, as far as I'm concerned. You just do the best you can for him," Carthel says.

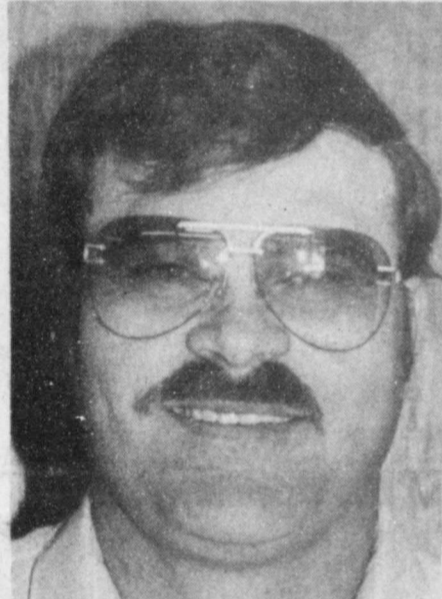
He believes that his younger enthusiasm would be an asset on the commissioners court.

McCormick's candidacy is subject to the Democratic Primary.

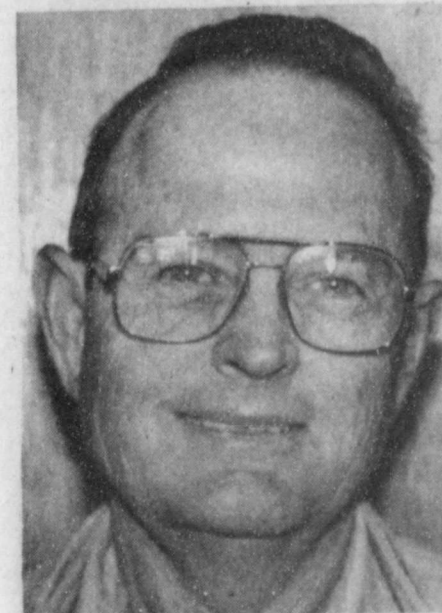
He attended Liberty School for five years and then attended Floydada schools, graduating from high school here in 1954. Following graduation, he served two years in the U.S. Army.

Five-man race for commissioner

Five men have tossed their hats into the political arena, figuratively speaking, in quest of the Precinct One commissioner post.

Incumbent Sam Spence was the first to file. Then came (listed alphabetically) Connie Bearden, Hulon Carthel, Bill Hopper and Delmas McCormick, all plunking down their \$600 filing fee during the first three days that candidates could place their names on the ballot.

For county tax assessor-collector, Penny Golightly and Carolyn Redding have filed. Ms. Golightly presently is serving by appointment.

Another race that has developed is for commissioner of Precinct Three. George Taylor and incumbent Thomas Warren are the candidates.

County commissioner, Precinct Three — George Taylor, Thomas Warren — County commissioner, Precinct Four — Kay Crabtree

The order in which names will appear on the ballot will be determined by drawing after the filing period has expired.

County attorney is the only post to face Floyd voters next year which did not have a candidate at latest report. Kenneth Bain is the incumbent.

Unexpired terms are to be filled in the

county judge and commissioner of Precinct Four positions. All other positions are to be filled for full terms.

As of Tuesday, no Republican candidates for county positions had been reported.

JANUARY DEADLINE

The filing period continues through Jan. 4, 1988. Application forms can be obtained from the respective county chairmen or from the county clerk.

County and precinct Democratic and

Republican chairpersons also are to be elected.

Gary Ivey of Crosby County and Tom Christian of Armstrong County are Republican candidates for the 84th District seat in the Texas House of Representatives. Warren Chisum of Pampa is the lone Democratic aspirant at present.

The state representative post is being vacated by veteran legislator Foster Whaley, who has announced that he will not seek another term.

Council inks Energas franchise

An issue which has plagued the Floydada City Council since early this year was resolved during the regular December session on Tuesday. Percy Edwards, manager of the Energas office in Floydada, presented a franchise agreement to the council and council members authorized the signing of the pact for a 25 year franchise in the city.

The franchise ordinance, #702, calls for the payment of a 3% fee on Energas sales in the city of Floydada. The franchise contains a 5 year renegotiation clause as well as provisions for an automatic 0.5% increase should the city deem it necessary. This was passed on a motion by councilman Leroy Burns, seconded by councilman Don Green and approved by unanimous vote.

An accompanying ordinance, #703, was also approved, allowing the city to

levy a permit fee of 3% on any industry which purchases gas from an outside source and has it delivered via Energas lines. Councilman Wayne Russell made the motion for passage of the ordinance and councilman Frank Breed seconded. Unanimous approval was given by the remaining members.

ELECTRIC REBATE DUE

Approximately \$20,000 is expected in a rebate for fuel cost adjustments paid

by Floydada Power and Light. When the overcharges are returned to the city, customers of FP&L will receive a credit on their bill for their share of the rebate. The refund was due December 1, but had not been received at the time of the December 8 meeting of the council. A schedule of rate changes is also expected to accompany the refund.

"I can and will devote all the time necessary to serve the people of Precinct Three as your commissioner," Taylor says.

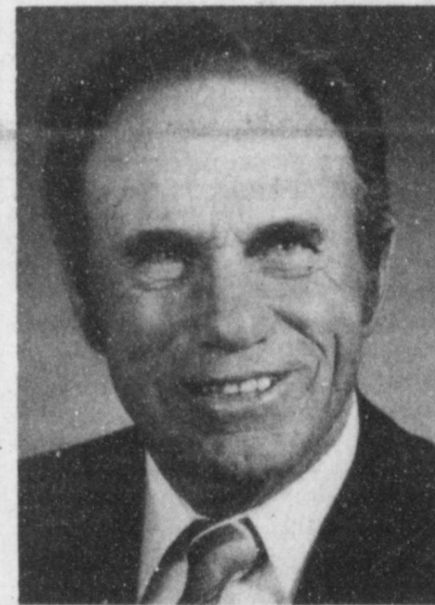
His candidacy is subject to the Democratic Primary, to be conducted in March.

Fred Cardinal candidate for re-election as county sheriff

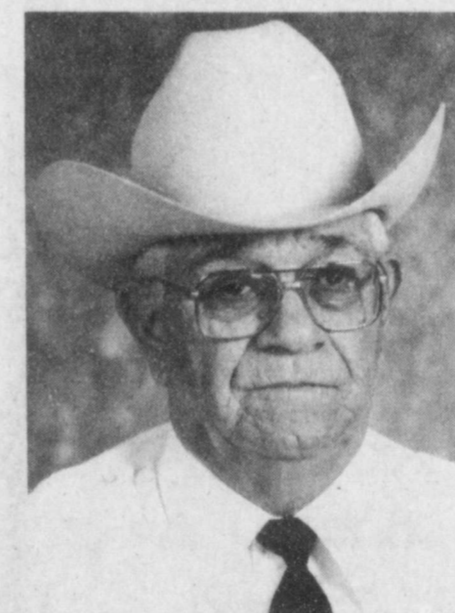
Fred Cardinal is announcing his candidacy for re-election to the office of County Sheriff of Floyd County subject to the Democratic Primary.

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

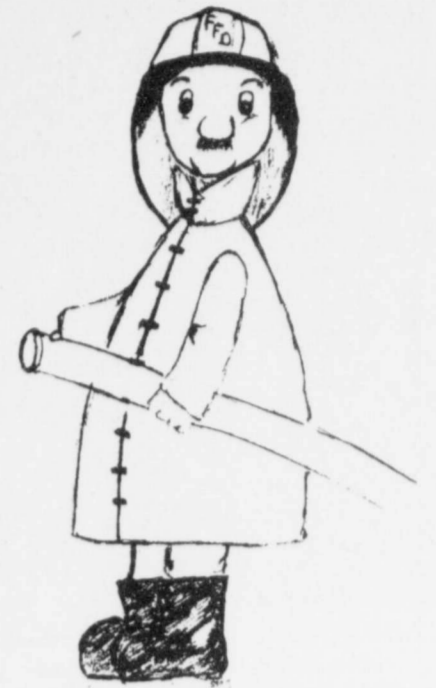

A local woman, Myra Rena Ledbetter, was arrested Dec. 3 and charged with possession of beer for resale.
Police Chief James Hale says a residence in the 600 block of East Grover had been under surveillance for about two months.
Chief Hale observed a "sale" on Dec. 2 and made the arrest the following day.
Bill Tye reported to the police department that several items were stolen from inside a camper shell on his '81 Chevrolet pickup. The vehicle was parked at Tye's residence, 801 West Tennessee.
Reportedly stolen were a one-half inch drive socket set with deep sockets, a three-eighths inch drive socket set with deep sockets and a Sears black and silver router. The loss was estimated at \$250.
Tye initially thought a neighbor might have borrowed the tools. The theft occurred between Nov. 26 and Dec. 2.

Commissioners meet in special session

A special session of the Floyd County commissioners was held on Tuesday, December 8 to approve a deputy district clerk and set a salary for the position. This action was made necessary because the district clerk will be away from her office for several weeks for surgery.

McPherson will keep the office open four hours a day and receive a salary of \$5.75 per hour for her work. The county will pay the necessary bond fee to cover the position. This fee is estimated at "no more than \$50.00 per year," according to Judge Bill Hardin.
This brief session was followed by an

executive session for the purpose of discussing a pending legal action against the county. County Attorney Kenneth Bain was called in to go over a lawsuit which was recently filed by Helen Hammonds. No action followed

the private session.

Council inks Energas franchise

Continued from Page One

ShopRite food store on Wall Street has led to the council's authorization of a letter contending that the alley at the store location has been illegally blocked by the erection of a gate fence. The city says that this obstruction hampers public access to a public alley and must be removed.

The communication being drafted by city attorney Steve Hale identifies the gate structure as a "safety risk to the community" and says that it blocks access to public utility lines in the alley as well as placing the city at risk for liability for any incident involving the unauthorized gates. The letter urges ShopRite to remove the gates.

LAWSUITS DISCUSSED

Both the lawsuit against the city by Helen Hammonds and the condemnation suit against Helen Hammonds by the city came under discussion at the evening session. Mayor Parnell Powell and city manager Gary Brown told the council that no new information has been received on the Hammonds lawsuit.

Brown told the council, "The answer to her petition which our attorney has filed will request that the suit be dismissed for lack of merit and will request that she be ordered to pay all expenses incurred by the city in answering her lawsuit."

According to Powell, the three man panel to appraise the 49 plus acres the city is seeking to condemn and use to expand the present landfill has been appointed by the district judge. The city is awaiting a hearing date in the matter.

PUBLIC HEARING

A public hearing concerning demolition procedures on two properties in violation of city ordinance #622 conducted during the meeting resulted in an order to proceed on one and an order to cite on the other.

I. A. (Bob) Campbell will be notified that the city intends to pursue the demolition of a gutted structure on Lots 7-8, Block 54, Original, in Floydada. According to the city manager, an attorney for Campbell had contacted the city saying Campbell would sign a release authorizing the clearing of the property, but as of now, no such release has been received.

Frank Scott Allen, the owner of record for property on the north part of lots 23, 24, 25, Block 71, Original

Floydada, will be cited for failure to comply with ordinance #622 concerning the condition of the building. City officials will also check into possible lien holders having an interest in the property.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Following a motion by Burns, seconded by Breed, council approval for the lease of the city farm was received. The lease will again be offered to Laron Fulton. Council members stipulated that Fulton be "encouraged to clean up the noxious weed problem on the acreage."

Brown brought up the subject of an ordinance against the use of cotton burrs for "driveways and insulation" with the city limits. He stated that fire chief Bobby Welborn had informed him that such uses were very dangerous if the substance caught fire. The council authorized Brown to pursue the matter for possible action at a later date.

January 18, 1988 at 7:00 p.m. was set as the date for a budget workshop for

the upcoming year.
