City Receives Sales Tax Check

State Comptroller Bob Bullock today sent checks totaling \$43.8 million in local sales tax payments to 974 cities that levy the one-per cent sales tax.

"The cities who lean most heavily on oil and gas for their local receipts are still suffering, but the rest of the state is beginning to make up for the drops in revenue we saw earlier this year," Bullock said. So far this year, in local sales tax cities have received \$353.5 million, less than one per cent behind the \$354 million total paid by this time last year.

Friona's check amounted to \$4,342.02, which was up from the same period a year earlier, when the city's check was \$3,701.65.

For the year, however, Friona's sales tax receipts amount to \$46,383.37, down 6.21 per cent from the \$49,454.57, as of the same date in 1982.

Parmer County's three municipalities received \$6,331.02 for the period, up from \$5,914.25 a year earlier. For the year, the county total receipts are \$69,414.94, compared to \$72,145.92 a year ago.

Houston received the largest check, \$8.4 million, a 12.5 per cent increase from the city's June 1982 payment, but year-to-date payments for Houston are still about 8.3 per cent behind last year. Dallas' check for \$5.2 million brought that city's 1983 total to \$41.7 million, 8.5 per cent ahead of last year.

San Antonio received \$2.9 million, boosting that city's increase over 1982 to 10.7 per cent. Austin's check for \$1.7 million equals a 16.7 per cent rise above last year. Fort Worth's check of \$1.7 million represents a ten per cent increase for 1983.

Midland and Odessa payments still lag behind last year. Odessa's \$456,000 June payment leaves 1983 year-to-date payments to that city 32.1 per cent behind last year. Midland received \$376,000, leaving that city 25.5 per cent behind 1982.

Bullock also sent June rebates to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. The Houston MTA received \$9.3 million, up from last June's \$8.7 million check. The San Antonio MTA got \$1.3 million, up from last June's \$976,000.

The June checks were for taxes collected on sales made in April and reported to the Comptroller by the end of May.

Complete Addresses Are Needed

Some people take pride in the fact that they are well known by citizens in their community. It is sometimes felt that a letter addressed to John Doe and the town should be sufficient address to get a piece of mail delivered. This may have been the case in years gone by.

"Due to increasing mail volumes, duplication of names, etc., it is very important that each piece of mail be properly addressed," says Postmaster Bill Wells.

"Each postal customer who has a post office box should use his complete address, including ZIP code, when corresponding so the correspondent's reply will contain the complete address," he continued.

One problem encountered by your friends at the post office is what to do with a piece of mail addressed to John Doe where there are two or more John Does. This type situation requires extra time which can cause delay to other mail. Also, we sometimes have new employees who do not know every John Doe. The box number on your mail is very important.

"The Postal Service wishes to better serve you. You can help. Please use your box number and insist that your correspondents do also. Your cooperation is needed and appreciated," Wells concluded.

Conservation Choices Are Available

Farmers have an unparalleled opportunity this year to improve their soil and water conservation systems, said Peter Myers, Chief of the USDA's Soil Conservation Service.

Under the Payment-In-Kind (PIK) program and other acreage limitation programs, farmers in Texas are taking 9.3 million acres out of production. One-fifth of the nation's cropland is pledged to the program and now farmers can put a great deal of soil and water conservation on the ground.

Some of the erosive and less productive acreage will be taken out of annual crop use and planted to grasses and legumes as cover crops. This has the potential for saving soil and water resources as well as building up natural fertility.

Myers said this is also a good time for planning ways to fit no-till or other conservation tillage methods into the farm operation.

On more erosive acres, permanent conservation practices such as terraces, grassed waterways, windbreaks and other enduring practices can be installed without interrupting cash crop production.

On the most erosive or other marginal land, farmers are encouraged to discontinue use of those acres for crop production. Those acres may be best suited for permanent grasses, trees, or wildlife habitat.

The 1983 programs offer farmers a rare opportunity to balance their short-term cash needs with their longer conservation and productivity goals, said Myers.

Afternoon activities will include the annual 42 tournament, horseshoe pitching contest, ping pong tournament, tennis tournament and volleyball tournament.


For the youngsters there will be the

USDA Exercises PIK Option For '83 Wheat

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block today said it will be necessary to require wheat producers who do not have sufficient quantities of wheat pledged as price support loan collateral to meet their payment-inkind requirements to obtain loans on their 1983 crop production.

Producers who have no 1983 crop wheat planted for harvest or who do not have sufficient wheat planted for harvest to meet their PIK requirements will receive payment-in-kind from other wheat in Commodity Credit Corporation inventory, he said.

Block said all producers who signed a contract to participate in the 1983 PIK program agreed to obtain a loan on their 1983 production for PIK purposes to satisfy program needs if required by CCC. USDA decided to exercise this option after determining there is an insufficient quantity of wheat currently available to CCC to meet PIK needs, he said.

CCC has developed special provisions to permit producers to use their 1983 wheat production for

PIK purposes even though they do not have warehouse or on-farm storage available, Block said. The producer must certify to the local county office of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service that the required quantity was harvested from an eligible farm and has not been sold prior to the certification.

The producer can obtain the loan, redeem the loan collateral and sell it to CCC. The producer then will be eligible to immediately receive the payment-in-kind from CCC inventory. However, these producers will not receive the proceeds of the sale of the wheat to CCC until their PIK availability date, Block said.

Producers with eligible 1983 crop wheat stored in an approved structure on the farm or in a warehouse covered by a uniform grain storage agreement may receive a regular price support loan for the wheat and earn storage payments for up to five months beginning on the PIK availability date.

There will be a Jack and Jill invitational softball tournament in Muleshoe Saturday and Sunday, June 25-26.


This will be a double elimination with ASA rulings. There will be first and second team trophies and first, second and third place individual trophies.



Close Battles Rage In Major League

During the past two weeks of play in the Major League division, Friona Star has upped their undefeated record to 8-0.

They met Friona Feed Yard on June 2 and showed the opponent no mercy as they won the game 24-3.

Scoring was at its highest mark in the first and third innings for Friona Star as they scored nine runs in the first and twelve in the third. They picked up only three points in the second. Andre Duran led the scoring attack with four runs.

Friona Feed Yard was unable to score until the third time at bat when they scored all of their runs during that time. James Monk, Johnny Ibarra and Ernie Crutchfield were the players scoring runs for Feed Yard.

Reeve Chevrolet took on Friona Feed Yard June 6 in a close match that ended up Reeve Chevrolet 14, Feed Yard 9.

At the end of the second inning, the score was already 9-2 in favor of Reeve. But Friona Feed Yard had an impressive third inning when they scored five points and held Reeve scoreless. However, Reeve did not intend to take that lightly, so they scored four runs in the fourth period and held Feed Yard scoreless.

The Feed Yard team was only able to pick up two in the final period of play and Reeve picked up one additional run to bring the final score to 14-9, Reeve Chevrolet's favor.

Daylen Gallman, Sammy Garcia and Daniel Chavez were the top scorers for the winning team with three runs each. James Monk led the Friona Feed Yard pack with three runs.

On June 9, Bovina pounded Friona State Bank 33-9. Bovina had control throughout the game. They scored 14 points their first time at bat and after a slow second round of batting with only three runs scored, came back and added 16 more in the third.

The score was tied at the bottom of the second inning, 5-5 and again at the bottom of the fourth 8-8. Reeve Chevrolet came out in the fifth inning and outscored Bank 11-5 to chalk up another victory.

The most exciting game of the season was played on June 13 and featured Bovina and the undefeated Friona Star team. Bovina came prepared to try to be the first team to defeat the Star and it appeared they would succeed.

A bad case of nerves proved disastrous for Friona Star's pitcher in the first inning as he walked eight batters. In addition to that, Bovina had a single hit and a home run to

bring their first inning score to 11. The Star team only brought home five runners in the first inning and found themselves down by six runs to the strong Bovina team.

Clint Deaton took the pitcher's mound in the second inning to try to bring his team to life and when the dust settled he had succeeded. The Bovina team did not score a

single run in the next three innings, while Friona scored four. That made the score 11-9 still Bovina's favor. Bovina picked up two more in the

fifth and held Friona Star scoreless. The score was then 13-9. Bovina was unable to score points in the sixth and the Star picked up two to make the score 13-11.

In the seventh inning, the Bovina team scored two points and Friona scored four tying the ball game 15-15 at the end of regulation time. An extra inning had to be played and Friona Star took the first bat.

Robert Sandoval got on base with a single, Jerry Lafuente walked after being hit by the pitcher and Jacky Lafuente hit a single. Hector Perez hit a sacrifice ball to bring Sandoval in and Cody Bracken was hit by the pitcher and walked, but was later put out at home.

Clint Deaton was the next batter and he socked a triple to bring in the remaining runners. The next batter was put out and Friona Star had to settle for three points.

Bovina only needed four runs to win the game. Randy Stone was up first and hit a single, but was put out trying to steal second base.

Mike Bermea, the next batter, was struck out by the Star pitcher. Hippy Gomez was the next batter for Bovina and he hit a hard grounder between second and first. 

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


