## Floyd bank deposits increase \$2.6 million

Floyd County banks closed 1987 with a \$2.6 million increase in deposits over the previous year. Loans increased slightly over half a million.

First National Bank of Floydada and First National Bank of Lockney revealed accumulative deposits of \$73,954,638.63 on the final day of business last year. This represents an increase of \$2,672,334.82 over the \$71,282,303.81 on deposit at the conclusion of 1986.

The two banks had loans of \$25,621,402.98 as the year ended, \$588,743.88 more than the \$25,032,659.10 in loans 12 months earlier.

### RECORD DEPOSITS

Tom Farris, president of First National Bank of Floydada, says "over \$2 million" were deposited on Monday,

Jan. 4, first business day of 1988. Deposits at the conclusion of that day stood at \$51,668,907.

That figure probably is a record for deposits in the Floydada bank.

Although deposits have dropped somewhat from Jan. 4, FNB of Floydada still has in excess of \$50 million on deposit.

The heavy influx on the initial business day of 1988 indicates that some individuals likely were holding checks until the new year for tax purposes.

The Floydada bank concluded the year with a significant increase in deposits of \$3,335,949.42 over the '86 year-end figures. Deposits stood at \$49,690,819.82 on Dec. 31, 1987, compared with \$46,354,870.40 the previous

year. Loans also increased. Loans from the Floydada bank stood at \$16,061,091.85 when '87 ended, \$1,726,281.14 more than the previous year's end.

First National Bank of Lockney showed deposits of \$24,263,818.81 on Dec. 31. This represents a decrease of

\$663,614.60 from the \$24,927,433.41 on deposit 12 months earlier.

The Lockney financial institution also had a decrease in loans of \$1,137,537.08. The year ended with loans of \$9,560,311.31, compared with \$10,697,848.39 on the final business day of 1986.



## More winter . . .

### Groundhog not reliable forecaster

Mr. Groundhog was less than honest!

Two days after he failed to see his shadow last Tuesday — which allegedly signals the end of winter — another "front blew in" late Thursday and snow began falling that night.

The ground was covered with white by Friday morning. More than a few Floyd County residents termed this "the annual stock show spell."

However, temperatures were slightly more moderate on Saturday than had been predicted and the temperature climbed into the low 50s on Sunday. The extremely wet snow quickly disappeared those two days.

Strangely, snowfall was heavier to the south than to the north. Now, the weatherman is promising more frigid temperatures later this week. That brings up the point that the groundhog's forecast does not always ring true!

## Post Office forced to shorten hours

Due to the "budget deficient reduction" by the U.S. Congress, one hour daily is being eliminated from window service.

To comply with this mandate, the Floydada Post Office will be opening 30 minutes later each morning and closing 30 minutes earlier each afternoon, Monday through Friday. The new hours will be from 9 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.

The change is scheduled to become effective next Monday. However, since that is a holiday — President's Day — customers will not notice the change until next Tuesday.

The public is reminded that "anyone needing mail out on a particular day should mail it 30 minutes earlier." The change affects all Panhandle-South Plains postal offices. Local personnel emphasize that the abbreviated schedule is being mandated by the postal service.

## School board extends contracts and increases salaries

Contracts for six administrative personnel at Floydada Independent School District were extended one year and salary increases granted following an executive session of the district trustees on Monday, February 8.

The board voted to extend the contracts of administrative assistant Jimmie Collins, principals Ronnie Wood, Joe Christian, C.E. Tyer and Bobbie Weir as well as athletic director Earl Overton. The one year extension makes these contracts effective through the 1989-90 school year. Salary increases

of \$1100 per year were granted to all except Collins. He was given an increase of \$1712 per year.

Each of the building principals presented an overview of the operation of their school and an evaluation of the teachers working in their area. Teacher contracts will be considered during the March meeting.

The regular March session has been rescheduled due to spring break. With the second Monday of March falling on the 14, during spring break, the board voted to meet instead on March 8, the

second Tuesday.

### SPRING BREAK

Discussion pertaining to the approval of the school calendar for 1988-89 was tabled until March to allow the board to weigh the advantages or disadvantages involved in scheduling either the usual spring break week or to change to a series of four-day weekends during the spring semester.

John Campbell met with the board to present a request that he be allowed to rent the gymnasium at Della Plains

School on Saturday evening, May 28 for a family reunion. Campbell stated that he would be responsible for possible damages and cleanup. The board agreed to rent the facility to Campbell at the standard rate of \$25 with the stipulations that the reunion be over by 12:00 midnight and no alcoholic beverages be allowed on the premises.

### ELECTION CALLED

Jack Stansell was appointed election judge for the upcoming trustees election. The election will take place on May

7. Only candidates residing in Precinct One and Precinct Two will be elected this year. The first day to file for candidacy will be February 22 and the deadline for filing is 5:00 p.m. on March 23.

At present, two board members reside in Precinct 1, Freddie Morren and Weldon Pruitt. No member of the board resides in Precinct Two. Both Precincts are located in the western sector of the city. Precincts Three, Four and Five and both at large positions are

## 300 animals viewed at county stock show

Chad Edwards, Matt Williams, David Turner, Rhanda Hickerson exhibit grand champions

A rookie and a second-year 4-Her exhibited grand champion animals Saturday at the 44th annual Floyd County 4-H and FFA Junior Livestock Show, but Sunday it was a pair of veteran ringmen vying for top honors in the steer division.

Chad Edwards' 1,300 pound cross was singled out by judge Larry Gray as grand champion steer to conclude animal placement in the county show. A 1,218 Angus, owned by Matt Williams, was tabbed as the reserve grand champion steer.

Edwards, a Floydada 4-Her, and Williams, a Lockney 4-Her, were teammates on last year's Floyd County 4-H livestock judging team which won state and ranked high nationally.

Rhanda Hickerson of Lockney, a first-year 4-H member, became the first grand champion exhibitor when judge Charles Cypert placed her 146 pound Suffolk at the head of the lamb division.

Later that day, Joe Tarter judged David Turner's 225 pound cross as the grand champion barrow. Turner is a second-year Lockney 4-Her.

Another Lockney youth, Wesley Teeter, showed his 129 pound Suffolk to reserve grand champion lamb honors. Cypert chose the top two lambs from the heavy Suffolk class.

Kelli LaBaume of Floydada had the reserve grand champion barrow, a 224 pound cross. Both the grand and reserve grand barrows came from the medium weight cross class.

### CATTLE JUDGE SUNDAY

Before judging steers Sunday afternoon, Gray stepped into the ring to choose Williams' registered Angus as champion heifer. Reserve champion heifer honors went to Zane Colston, a Floydada 4-Her, also with an Angus.

In addition to being senior students at their respective high schools, being veterans in the show ring and being members of the state-winning livestock judging team, Edwards and Williams had another thing in common: their steers were bred by their fathers.

Both the cross which won the

Floydada show the previous week — and was not entered in county competition — and the cross which earned county grand champion honors were bred by Craig Edwards.

The son of Craig and Betty Edwards has won both the Floydada and Floyd County grand champion steer laurels for the past two years as well as placing high in major shows. The 18-year-old Floydada 4-Her has copped top honors in the local steer show on four

occasions. Williams, a 17-year-old Lockney 4-Her, has exhibited the reserve champion steer in the county show twice and four times was at the halter of the grand champion steer in the Lockney show. Both his champion heifer and his reserve champion steer were bred by JK Angus, operated by his parents, Jerry and Kay Williams.

His heifer was calved March 10, 1986. Williams also exhibited the grand

champion heifer at the '87 county show. Colston's reserve champion heifer, calved May 12, 1986, was bred by Richard Stotts of Clarendon. The exhibitor, a 13-year-old Floyd 4-Her, is a son of Sherry and Billy Don Colston and is a Floydada Junior High seventh grader.

### REPEAT WINNER

Rhanda Hickerson will not soon forget her first year of exhibiting livestock. Saturday, her Suffolk was not

only grand champion but her fine wool cross lamb won its breed. She had showed a lamb to grand champion honors in the Lockney show the previous week.

The 11-year-old sixth grader at Lockney Junior High is a Lockney 4-H member. She is a daughter of Randy and Julie Hancock and Blake and Carroll Hickerson.

Teeter's lamb followed Miss Hickerson's animal to the top of the lamb show. It was second to the Hickerson wether in the heavy weight Suffolk reserve breed champion and, finally, reserve grand champion.

Teeter, 16, is a Lockney 4-Her and a Lockney High School sophomore. A son of Eddie and Cheryl Teeter, he purchased his lamb from Miller Brothers.

David Turner, 11-year-old Lockney 4-Her, knew that his older sisters had qualified animals for the county livestock show auction and realized when he entered the ring with his medium weight cross barrow Saturday that it was his final chance to place an animal in the sale.

The classy animal caught the eye of Tarter, who made him class and breed champion before going back to him as grand champion.

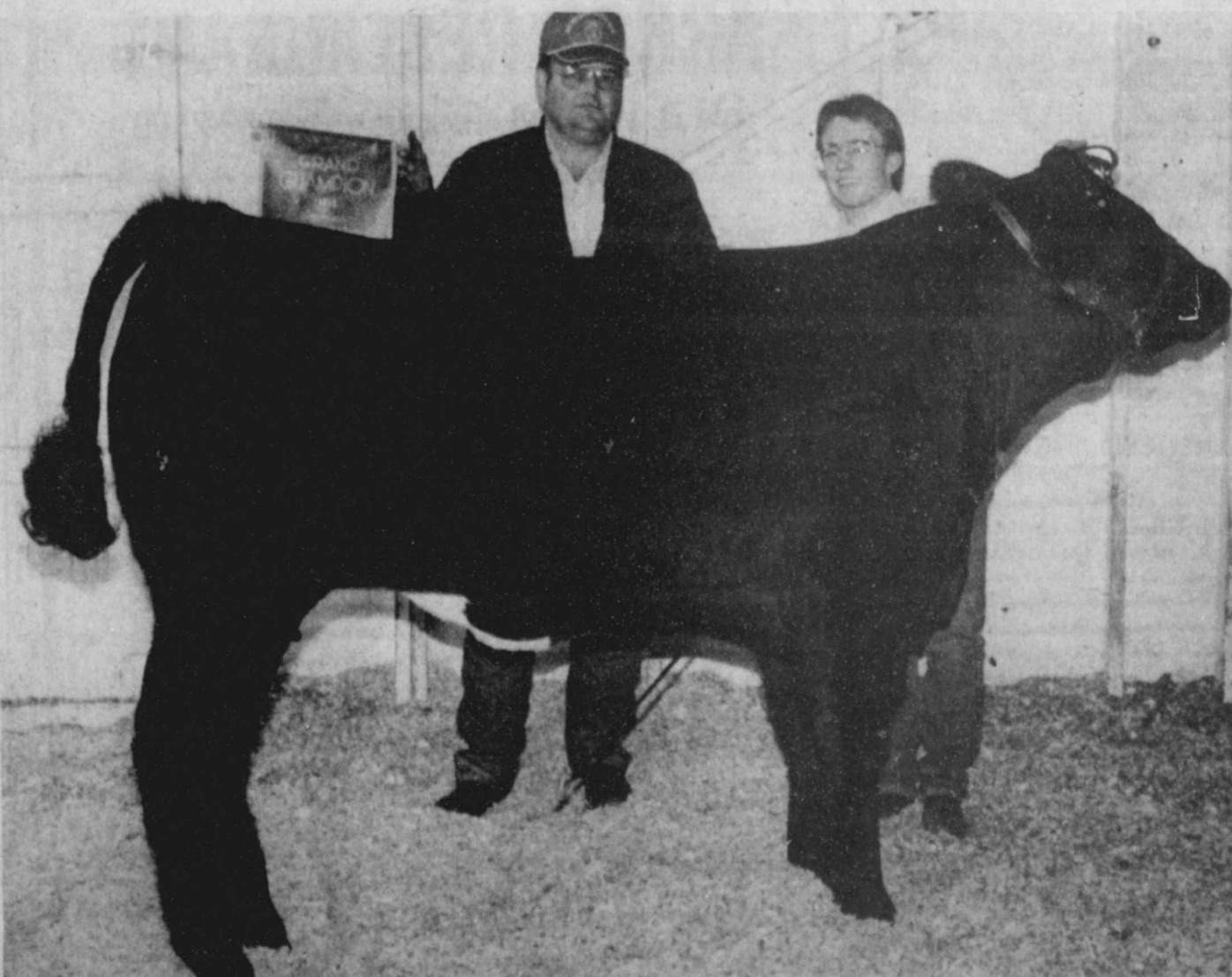
A sixth grader at Lockney Junior High, Turner is the son of John David and Mary Turner. His champion barrow was bred by Power Line of Olton.

Miss LaBaume — who previously had showed a grand champion barrow in both the county and local shows — believed that her final day in the show ring would not be overly successful as Tarter placed her animal second to Turner's in the medium weight cross class. Although she failed to realize it at that time, her day was far from over.

After Turner's barrow was tapped as breed champion, Miss LaBaume reentered the ring to show for reserve cross champion and won that honor. The selection was repeated in the grand champion barrow drive.

with the school ordering the materials and doing the work they can to replace the floor, repair the foundation, and repair the old plumbing. He estimated the costs at "\$4500 for materials, \$2500

for labor and less than \$5,000 for plumbing." The board authorized the action.

The third item was tabled for the time being. Collins asked that a door be

installed to replace the window across the hall from the principal's office at A.B. Duncan Elementary. "There is a good sidewalk which connects there and could be used to take students in and

out to the physical education facility on pretty days" said Collins. At present, the sidewalk cannot be utilized. The matter will receive consideration at a later date.

Board members voted to authorize the hiring of Sharon Vickers as a kindergarten teacher at Duncan.

Attending the Monday evening session were Jerry Cannon, Jimmie Collins, board members Freddie Morren, Don Hardy, Charlene Brown, John Dunlap, Adolfo Garcia, Weldon Pruitt and Michael Hinsley. A parent group which had asked to be included on the agenda did not appear.

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# Implementation of 911 emergency service endorsed by commissioners

Members of the Floyd County Commissioners Court expressed their "wholehearted support" of the establishment of a regional 9-1-1 emergency service and the implementation of a fee and surcharge to fund the operation in Floyd County during the regular February session of the court.

Meeting on Monday, February 8, the commissioners unanimously passed a resolution on a motion by Thomas Warren, seconded by Sam Spence approving the service and authorizing a fee of "not more than 50 cents a month per local exchange access line and a 9-1-1 surcharge on each customer receiving intrastate long distance service of not more than one-half percent."

The Monday morning action is the first step in providing 9-1-1 emergency telephone service to Floyd County residents for summoning assistance of police, fire and ambulance services should an emergency arise.

Joe Bragg, representing the Texas Department of Health, met with the court to discuss regulation of on-site sewage disposal systems inside the county, but outside the city limits of Floydada and Lockney. The county commissioners have requested that they be approved as the agent for the state health department in this matter. Approval of the request would mean that anyone installing or replacing a sewage system on a tract of "less than 10 acres" would need the approval of the court to do so and would have to have the system inspected and approved by the court. No action was taken on the matter at present.

A group of Dougherty community residents appeared before the court to express their interest in obtaining the old county fire truck for use at Dougherty. The county recently replaced the truck with a new model for the Floydada Volunteer Fire Department to use in serving fire calls outside the city limits of Floydada. The group was told that the vehicle would have to be put up for bids. A motion by Warren, seconded by Kay Crabtree, was approved by unanimous vote authorizing the solicitation of bids for the 1974 fire-truck.

A motion by Crabtree, seconded by Floyd Jackson, committed the court to "keep two sets of Blacks Statutes current." The motion carried. The action followed an attempt to sell one set, but according to Judge Bill Hardin, "There is no market for the law books at this time. The county will continue to keep the extra set up to date in hopes of selling it at a future date."

Treasurer Glenna Orman presented her report, stating that the county began the month of January with \$489,252.05 and took in receipts of \$126,409.91 with disbursements of

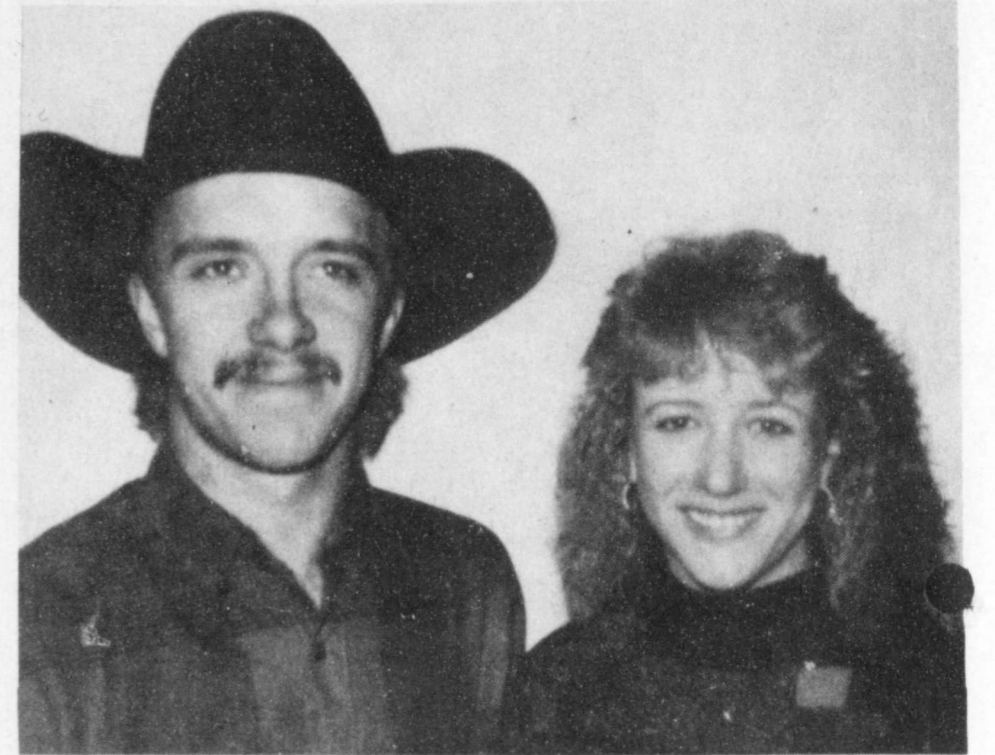

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As of this writing on the morning of February 5, active forces pushing a stronger 1988 cotton acreage reduction program have been fragmented and regionalized. But that may change.

Frank Jones of Lamesa, chairman of the National Cotton Council's (NCC) Producer Steering Committee (PSC), thinks chances are good that the PSC will endorse a voluntary paid diversion program to supplement the 12.5 percent acreage reduction program announced in late October.

If a recommendation to that effect is approved by the full NCC delegate body at the organization's annual meeting February 8 and 9, he points out, the effort would have solid support, belt-wide, from all seven segments of the industry. And a request to the Secretary for a diversion program from producers, ginners, merchants, manufacturers, cottonseed crushers, cooperatives and warehousemen obviously would carry more weight than a request from any one segment, he reasons.

When USDA fixed the 12.5 percent acreage reduction before November 1, as required by law, the 1987 U.S. crop was estimated at 13.3 million bales and the 1987 carryover was expected to be 3.8 million. The low acreage reduction requirement, down from 25 percent in 1987, even then brought rumbles of protest from some quarters.

Among those expressing dissent was Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., of which Jones is a director. The PCG Board, sensing the threat of a return to burdensome stocks and low prices, over a month before the announcement had

recommended a 15 percent acreage reduction program and a 5 percent paid land diversion.

Since that time the threat has become fact. USDA's estimate of the 1987 crop now stands at 14.7 million bales, up over 10 percent and 1.4 million bales from the October projection. The 3.8 million-bale carryover anticipated in October has grown almost as much, to 5 million bales, right back where it stood at the end of 1986. And the average spot price for base quality cotton has tumbled from over 75 cents to under 58 cents per pound.

The result of an NCC survey of 1988 planting intentions will be announced at the PSC meeting. And if it confirms the 11.8 million planted acres indicated by an earlier Cotton Grower magazine survey, says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, normal yields could portend a 1988 carryover of 6 million bales or more. Such figures should refute any argument against the industry's need for holding down cotton acreage and production in 1988, Johnson thinks.

But even if the Secretary agrees to the need, he cautions, before such a program can be implemented the Office of Management and Budget will have to be convinced that paying to take more acres out of production will result in a net reduction in program cost.

Private studies already have been made that show the cost effectiveness of either a five or ten percent paid diversion program. But if USDA has done its own calculations, the conclusions have not been made known.

# Mini-produce has maxi-potential

Hulon and Gary Carthel's fields become a festival of color each fall when tens of thousands of mini-pumpkins, gourds, and ears of decorative corn ripen.

The brothers are hoping for big things from their small produce, and they're working hard to establish a niche for their specialty crops. This will add diversity to the Carthels' 4,000-acre cotton, grain, and vegetable operation near Floydada, Tex.

They began the venture a couple of years ago because of the potential for more profit than from their conventional crops. Overall, however, planting and harvesting the specialty crops costs about four times as much as producing their conventional crop.

They've been able to show a profit, but they've had headaches too. "We're feeling our way and learning as we go," Hulon says. "This business takes a strong commitment."

The Carthels have learned that growing specialty crops involves more risk and marketing savvy than growing conventional crops.

"With edible vegetables, you usually line up your markets ahead of time through brokers," Hulon explains. "But since mini-vegetables are so specialized, we have to sell directly to stores and florists. There are no advance commitments, so you risk your profit potential by trying to estimate what the demand will be before you plant."

Last year they estimated too high and were caught with a surplus of mini-pumpkins. "We got a little too optimistic after selling most of our 7 acres of

mini-produce the first year," Hulon explains. "We planted 40 acres in 1987, and that was too much."

Gary confirms that they've made some mistakes. "We haven't found the right crop mix," he says. "This year we plan to cut back acreage of the mini-pumpkins and add some acreage of large decorative pumpkins as well as some cooking pumpkins."

In 1987, the Carthels produced and shipped almost 10,000 boxes of miniature pumpkins, small- and standard-sized novelty corn, and decorative gourds. "We wholesaled most of that directly to major retailers such as supermarket chains and florists, but we're also working to build a retail mail-order business," Hulon notes.

Their retail price for a box of 50 mini-pumpkins, 50 ears of strawberry popcorn, or 50 mini-corns is \$15. A box of 18 ears of regular-sized Indian corn is

\$13, and one box of 35 colorful gourds sells for \$12.

Growing mini-vegetables creates a lot of production problems, the brothers point out. "To get the top quality that buyers demand, you have to keep the crops free of insect damage," Hulon says. "We average making 15 spray applications, and we're careful not to skimp on water and fertilizer."

"These crops really get expensive at harvesttime," Gary adds. "Everything—from harvesting to cleaning, sorting, and packing—is done by hand."

Marketing is their greatest challenge, however. "Getting your foot in the right doors takes time and patience," Gary explains. "We're trying to build a loyal market by providing a superior quality product. This market is specialized and extremely competitive, so some growers who are growing these products may not continue. But we're in it for the long term."

# Update on new pesticide laws

## DISCONTINUATION OF SINGLE USE CERTIFICATION

'Emergency situation - single product/single purchase/single use' certification has been a means by which a producer not previously certified as a private applicator could qualify for one time purchase and use of restricted or state limited-use pesticides.

This emergency situation certification has been provided by Texas Agricultural Extension Service and TDA employees, as well as certain 'approved dealers'. However, this emergency situation certification has been discontinued by the TDA. Currently, the sale of 'Restricted-use' and/or 'state limited use' pesticides will be limited to only those producers who are certified as private applicators or commercial applicators.

Producers in need of private applicator certification can become certified either by completing a home study course or by attending a private applicator training program conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Details on private applicator certification can be obtained from the TDA or from your local county Extension office.

## EPA DEFERS IMPLEMENTATION OF PESTICIDE PROGRAM TO PROTECT ENDANGERED SPECIES

According to a TDA press release received in our local Extension office, The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency announced that it is deferring

the implementation of its pesticide program to protect endangered species until the 1989 growing season.

This law, when implemented, will affect pesticide use in approximately 910 of 3,050 counties in the United States where endangered species exist. The original implementation plan would have affected approximately 110 active ingredients in pesticide products and would have called for product labels to include a list of states and counties containing endangered species potentially affected by these pesticides.

The program has been deferred to ensure that it is based upon accurate and practical information, and that adequate time is taken to obtain input from all affected groups. During the coming year, the EPA will be working closely with each state to customize the program to fit states' needs. EPA intends to solicit suggestions for program revisions from the public, conduct a broad public-education effort, refine scientific data supporting the program, and work with involved federal and state agencies.

## TITLE III REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

The Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986 (SARA) was signed into law on October 17, 1986. Title III of this act, also known as Emergency Planning and Community Right-To-Know Act establishes requirements for federal, state, and local governments, and industry regarding emergency planning and reporting on the use and storage of hazardous chemicals.

This law, which is currently in effect, pertains to more than 400 hazardous chemicals, including the active ingredients of many agricultural pesticides. This law will affect any facility that has present at any one time any of the extremely hazardous substances listed in the Nov. 17, 1986 Federal Register in a quantity greater than the threshold quantity set forth on the list. This will

include manufacturers, many business and agencies, and also could include larger farm operations, pesticide applicators and dealers, and seed and grain companies.

Any facility that uses or stores any of these hazardous chemicals in excess of the threshold planning quantity is required to report to the State Emergency Response Commission, as well as the local fire department and Local Emergency Planning Committee. Those facilities which have not yet been reported should currently be reported to the Texas Department of Health-Occupational Health Program in Austin, through a letter of notification containing the name of the facility, a facility representative's home number and work number for emergency notification, and the reason the facility is subject to SARA Title III (manufacture of hazardous chemicals, storage of

specific chemicals in excess of the threshold planning quantity, etc.)

Any facility that manufactures or creates any blend of the listed hazardous chemicals is required to file a chemical inventory report form with the Texas Department of Health-Occupational Health Program by March 1, 1988.

By means of example, a few of the hazardous chemicals included on the list are: Aldicarb (Temik), Carbofuran (Furadan), Coumaphos (Co-Ral), Dicrotophos (Bidrin), Dimethoate (Cygon), Phorate (Thimet), and Ammonia. Trade names are listed for educational purposes only, and no endorsement or discrimination is intended.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has been given responsibility in conjunction with TDA to provide educational programs explaining SARA Title III to agricultural workers.

## Farm News

### VA questions

Editor's Note: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.

Q — Why is it necessary to have a property appraised under the VA home loan guaranty program?

A — The law requires that the amount of a VA guaranteed loan may not exceed the reasonable value of the property construction, alterations, improvements, or repairs, as determined by the VA. In order to make this determination, the VA requires an appraisal of the property by a designated appraiser.

Q — Does a general discharge from military service qualify me for benefits from the VA?

A — Yes. Honorable and general discharges qualify veterans for benefits, unless other statutory bars to entitlement exist.

### Deficiency payments paid only in generic product certificates

Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng announces that upland cotton and rice deficiency payments due in February and five-month 1987 corn and sorghum deficiency payments due in March, will be paid only in generic commodity certificates.

## Director of 'Bootstrap' explains Agricultural Credit Act of '87

The "Agricultural Credit Act of 1987," signed into law early this year by

the President, extends to farm borrowers from PCAs and Land Banks many of the rights previously granted only to Farmers Home borrowers, as well as adding to the rights of Farmers Home borrowers, Bruce Magness, Operation Bootstrap director, said Friday in an interview at the Hesperian offices.

Magness, in town on the 1988 version of the "Bootstrap Tour," commented on the statute after holding a meeting of farmers in Floydada Friday, February 5.

The main new rights granted FCS (Farm Credit System) borrowers with loans with PCAs and Land Banks are the right to notice of their eligibility for the new expanded version of restructuring of loans, and of the criteria to be used, according to Magness.

"Homestead protections" for failed FCS borrowers and "first refusal rights" for foreclosed farmers are also built into the new law, Magness said.

"No foreclosures are to take place before completion of consideration for the new restructuring to see if such action might result in keeping the farmer afloat," Magness continued, "and the statute says this provision shall take effect on the date of enactment of this section."

Essentially, this means no farmer should be foreclosed on by any Land

Bank or PCA without first having been fully informed of his rights under the new law, according to the Lubbock attorney.

"A farmer who educates himself on this statute could save his farm, simply by requesting the information and then applying it," Magness said.

"The statute says: 'No qualified lender (which includes PCAs and Land Banks) may foreclose or continue any foreclosure proceeding with respect to any distressed loan before the lender has completed consideration of the loan for restructuring or preventive action under this section.'"

"Farm borrowers must not take the word of these institutions that the law is not yet in effect or that it does not apply to them until they have read the law for themselves," Magness said.

"Nonaccrual loans" as well as 'high risk loans' must be considered for the new loan servicing options, along with properties up for foreclosure," he said.

Magness said the statute is available by contacting his office or by asking for copies, of H.R. 3030 from Congressman Combest's office.

A copy of a 1988 Bootstrap tape was donated and is available at the Floyd County Library.

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# Floydada city council authorizes 5 % per cent salary increase April 1

Members of the Floydada City Council voted Tuesday evening, February 9, to include an "across the board 5% salary increase" in the budget for the next year. The budget, which will begin April 1, 1988, will also include a contingency fund for the purpose of "adjusting individual salaries and hiring additional personnel" should such action be necessary. City employees have not received a raise in two years. The increase was approved unanimously on a motion by councilman Leroy Burns, seconded by councilman Don Green.

The purchase of a backup base station for radio communications was also discussed for inclusion in the 1988-89 budget. Police Chief James Hale requested permission to purchase a radio system to provide emergency radio communications for the police department, the fire department and other agencies in the event that the primary system operating through the sheriff's department should suffer a mechanical failure or be disabled due to a natural disaster. This would allow the agencies to continue to function in an emergency situation. The council approved the

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request, estimated to cost around \$650.

City personnel were authorized to seek bids on a number of items. The proposed sale of 25 one and one half cubic yard trash containers will be handled by bids as will the proposed purchase of a "good used vehicle" for use by city departments. Bids will also be sought for operation of the city swimming pool this summer.

The summer baseball program will again be handled by Bobby Gilliland and Larry Noland. The city will contribute an ice machine and \$2000 for their services. Green made the motion which was seconded by councilman Frank Breed and approved unanimously.

Bids were opened and read on three items on the agenda. Three bids were received on the proposed sale of a 1951 fire truck. The council elected to reject all three bids and put the vehicle up for re-bidding. The rejected bids were: Jeffery Johnson, \$930; Thomas Hurts, \$800; and Carthel Brothers Farms, \$626. Wayne Russell made the motion with Green seconding. Breed voted for, Burns and Willson voted against and Warren abstained.

Bidding on the demolition of a structure at 502 E. Jackson were: Wayne Bennett, \$650; Vernon Wickware, \$400; Kevin Nelson, \$400; and Jessie Morales and David Rodriguez, \$420. The bid was awarded to Nelson based on the council policy of accepting the lowest bid and accepting the earliest submitted bid. The Nelson bid was received by the city on February 8 and the Wickware bid came in on February 9.

There were six bidders on the annual seal coating project for city streets. The bids were two parts, consisting of the seal coating project and the proposed reconstruction of Mississippi Street from Third to Fifth. The council had budgeted \$40,000 for the project.

Jarnigan Construction of Lubbock bid \$37,062 on the seal coating and \$17,000 on the reconstruction. Williams and Peters Construction of Lubbock bid \$49,020 and \$23,270. The bid from High

Plains Pavers of Plainview was \$41,731 and \$12,530. Appian Corporation of Hereford submitted a bid of \$41,042 and \$12,530. Ronnie Zahn of Lubbock bid \$37,848 and \$14,320. The bid from High Plains Sand of Kansas was \$39,937.50 and \$19,153.

After the bids were examined by city engineering consultant Bill McMorries, the council accepted the bid of Jarnigan Construction for the seal coating and elected to reject all bids on the reconstruction project and remain within the \$40,000 budgeted for street projects.

The purchase of a pickup for use by the water department was ratified on a motion by Breed, seconded by Green.

An order calling for a city election on May 7, 1988 was passed. Two at large members will be elected along with one member from District 1 and one member from District 4. Don Green currently serves District 1 and Nancy Willson is the representative from District 4. The first date to file for election will be February 22. More information concerning the upcoming election will be carried in future issues of the Hesperian.

Resolution #115 authorizing the establishment of 9-1-1 emergency telephone service and implementing a fee and surcharge to fund it on a regional basis was passed on a motion by Willson, seconded by Green.

A motion by councilman Leroy Burns, seconded by Breed to authorize the closing of the 200 block of W. Grover Street from Fourth to Fifth was passed by unanimous vote. The one block area will no longer be classed as a city street.

Nancy Willson will make the presentation of the city's bid to secure a Texas Community Development Grant for a paving project. She will address the February 26 session of South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG), the agency which will be scoring the grant applications. Willson is scheduled to speak at 2:20 p.m.

The regular meeting of the council for the month of March has been resche-

duled from March 8 to Monday, March 7. A public hearing is being placed on the agenda regarding the city budget for the next year. Anyone wishing to discuss with the council any item of the budget or any proposed expenditure should appear at the hearing.

Attending the February session of the

council were council members Wayne Rull, Leroy Burns, Don Green, Gary Warren, Frank Breed and Nancy Won. Also present were Mayor Pell Powell, city manager Gary Byn, city secretary Jimmie Lou Sart, city attorney Steve Hale, consulting engineer Bill McMorries,

Police Chief James Hale, Joe Stepp, representatives of several construction companies and the Hesperian reporter.

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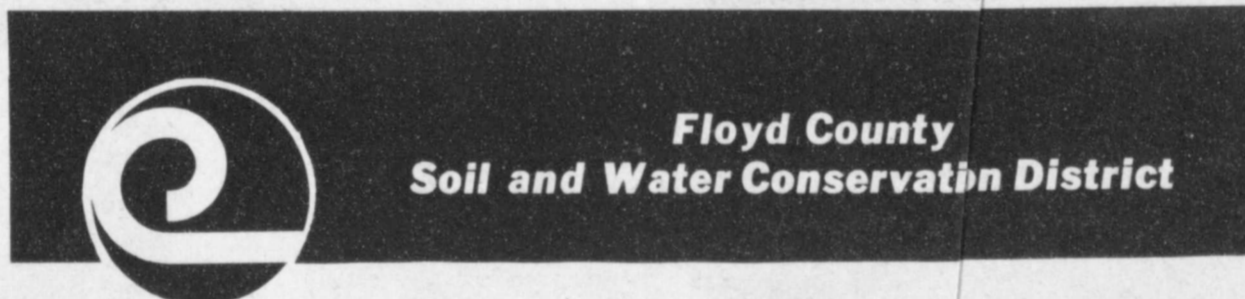

# 1988 ANNUAL REPORT

## Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)

The big news for 1987 was the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). 201 contracts were developed with landowners putting 43,000 acres into native grasses. During 1986, 77 contracts were developed on 17,000 acres. 14,000 acres of grass were seeded during 1987 on these 278 contracts which cover 60,000 acres. About 40,000 acres are scheduled to be seeded this year.

As one of the 5 directors serving on the district board, he will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

Leon Ferguson was appointed to the board in September to fill the unexpired term of the late Weldon Becker for zone 4. Ferguson will have the same responsibilities to the board.

## FSA - 1985

The Food Security Act of 1985 requires an operator or landowner to develop an approved conservation plan if he/she is farming "highly erodible land" to remain eligible for USDA programs. One has until Jan. 1, 1990 to develop and begin actively applying a conservation plan on highly erodible cropland. One has until Jan. 1, 1995 to have the conservation plan fully operational. At this time 5 land owners or operators have already developed a plan in Floyd County. About 10 percent of the land in Floyd County is highly erodible and will require a plan.

Jon LaBaume urges landowners and operators to contact this office to see if a plan is needed and develop a plan as soon as possible.

These are the USDA farm programs affected by the conservation compliance provision. USDA price and income supports; disaster payments; crop insurance; Farmers Home Administration loans; farm storage facility loans; and other programs under which USDA makes commodity-related payments, including annual payments for Conservation Reserve Program.

The conservation compliance provision of the Food Security Act of 1985 discourages the production of crops on highly erodible cropland where the land is not carefully protected from erosion. If you produce crops on such fields without an approved conservation system you may lose your eligibility for certain USDA program benefits.



## Man hours

The Floyd County Soil Conservation Service office has increased from 3 full-time employees and 1 part-time employee last May to a staff of 6 full-time employees and 2 part-time employees. The increased staff is a result of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and the Food Security Act of 1985 which requires conservation plans on highly erodible land for landowners and operators to stay eligible for farm programs. The SCS staff provided 9,465 man hours to the District.

# Premium auction

One hundred and 64 animals passed under the gavel Monday in the 44th

annual Floyd County Junior Livestock Show premium auction. Total price of \$90,945.65 included premiums, add-ons and floor bids on the 164 animals.

The total exceeded last year, although exact figures on floor bids for non-premium auction animals were not known.

Last year's sale, including the non-sale animals, totaled \$99,000 plus.

David Turner entered the ring first with his grand champion barrow. Providence Farm Supply and Frontier Seed joined forces to pay \$4 per pound for the 218 pound cross.

Producers Cooperative Elevator, Payn-Save in Floydada and Floydada Businessmen and Farmers offered \$2 per pound for the grand champion steer, owned by Chad Edwards. The crossbred steer weighed 1,261 pounds.

The final grand champion to enter the auction ring was Rhanda Hickerson with her 142 pound Suffolk lamb. It was purchased for \$4.75 per pound by Attebury Grain of Lockney.

Lockney Businessmen and Farmers paid \$3.50 per pound for Kelli LaBaume's reserve grand champion barrow. The cross tipped the scales at 217 pounds.

Matt Williams' 1,181 pound reserve grand champion steer brought \$1.75 per pound from Providence Farm Supply and Eastmound Gin.

Sun-Vue Fertilizer, D&J Gin and Elanco Chemical joined to pay Wesley Teeter \$4.50 per pound for his 125 pound reserve grand champion lamb.

One observer believes "This was the greatest amount of add-ons the sale has had in several years."

The sale total includes add-ons, although they are not shown in individual animal prices shown below.

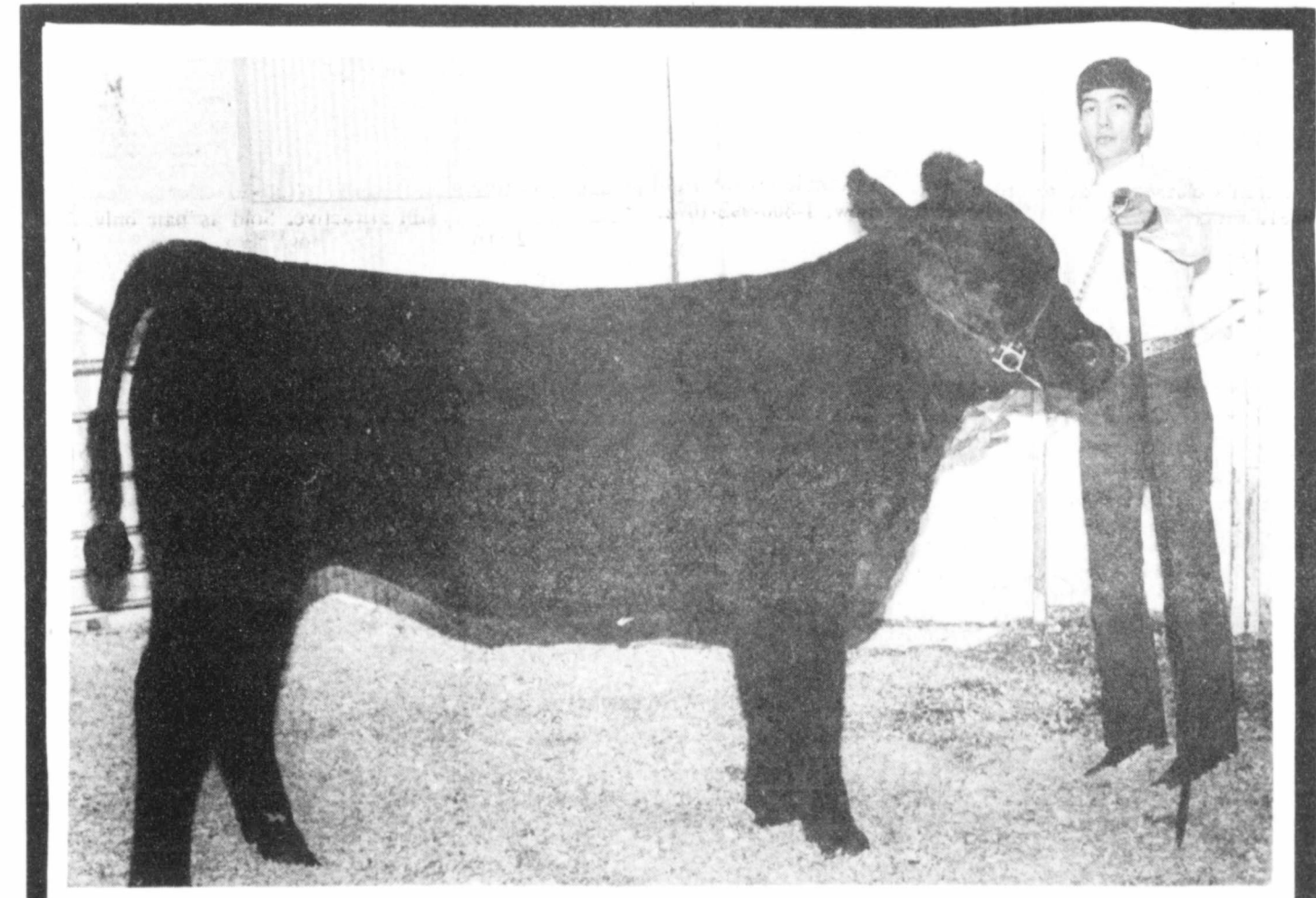

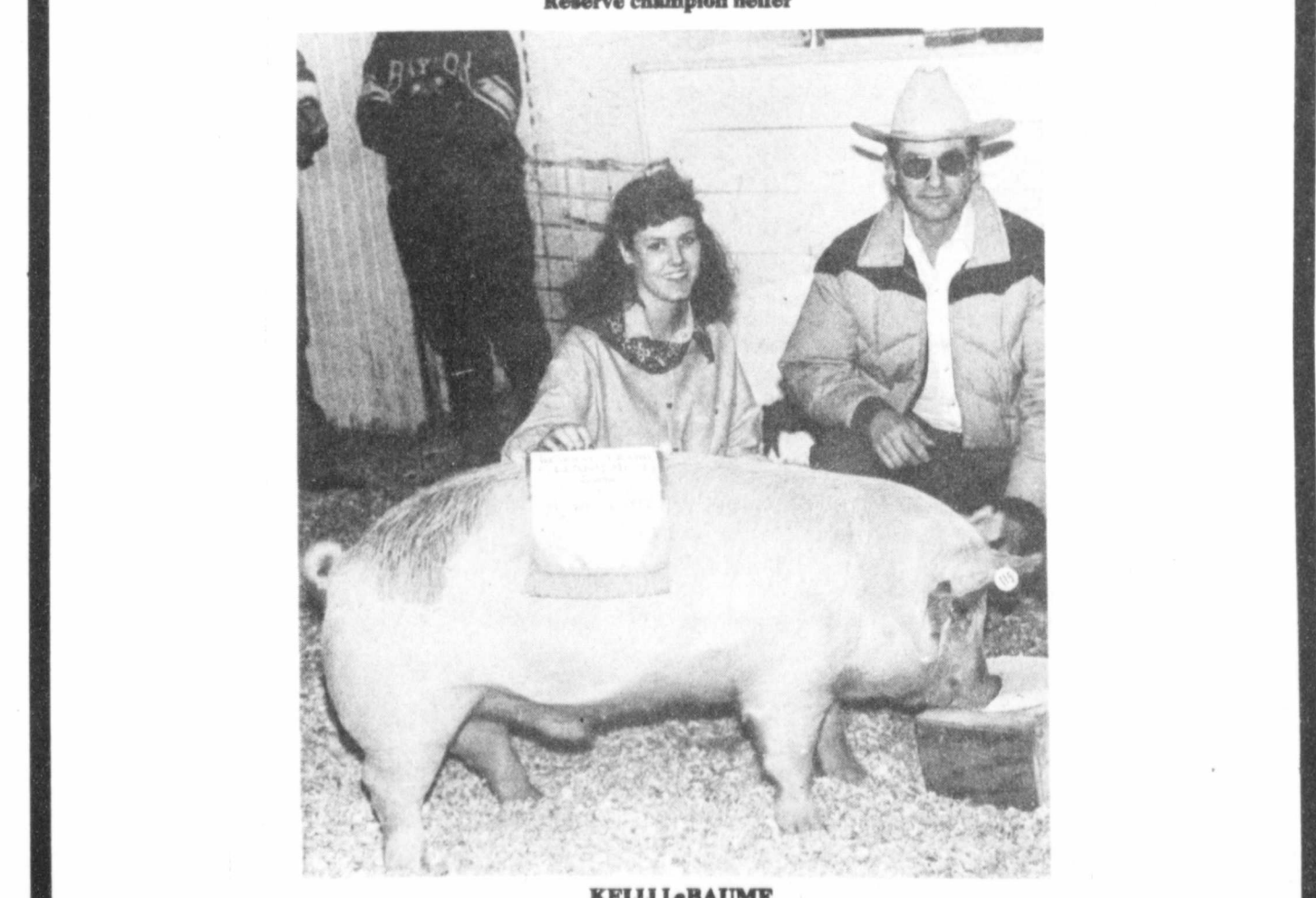
