## South Plains School annexation approved by Commissioners Court

The final days of the South Plains Independent School District are fast approaching as approval of the annexation of SPISD to other county school districts came from Floyd County Commissioners Court on Monday, March 14. This action followed earlier approval from both the Floydada Independent School District and Lockney Independent School District, the two entities absorbing the annexed district, which also approved the measure.

Bill Hardin, county judge, told the court, "It is a matter of formality for the court to approve this annexation. The action has already been approved by the three school districts involved."

The target date for closure of SPISD is "the end of school this year."

A motion by Sam Spence, seconded by Floyd Jackson, adopted a resolution authorizing the annexation. The vote of the court was unanimously in favor.

According to Jim Word, the group "wanted to let the court know what they were working on for the future." Word stated, "The Friends of the Library and the Floyd County Library Board have worked together over the years to enhance the services of the library."

Janet Lloyd called the library "a center of learning" and pointed out that "Our center is too small." She asserted that there are "many programs we could bring to the residents of the county if we had more space."

Olin Watson stated, "We want to improve the library as a gift to Floyd County and its residents." Watson expressed the belief that there is a need for "twice as much room."

Watson told the court that the group was seeking permission to begin raising funds for a library separated from the courthouse. Several ideas for raising the necessary funds were presented, including memorial rooms, contributions and grants. He estimated the cost of the new library at "about \$300,000."

Watson indicated that the target date for opening the new facility would be "the last week in May, 1990, in honor of the Floyd County Centennial Year."

Dee Sanders emphasized "Nothing is definite yet concerning the type of structure or cost, we just hope to be able to find a place and raise enough money to make it happen."

### a view from The Lamplighter

The Big Day, Super Tuesday, is now history. Despite the very best effort of Dan Rather and CBS, George Bush swept Texas and the South and is now in position to wrap up the Republican nomination for President. Unless he stumbles badly he will be the nominee and in all probability will be the next President.

And despite the cooing, fawning endorsement by Mr. Jim Hightower, Jesse Jackson did not win the vote in Texas, although we must admit he did extremely well. He got nearly 25 percent of Texas Democrats' vote, to Gov. Dukakis' 33 percent. It must surely cause wonder among those Texas Democrats who still cling to the faith of their fathers to see the two most leftward of all the candidates emerge as the two top vote-getters in the Party. For those of us who grew up in the party, being taught that it was the party of states rights, of strong local government, of limited national government, of individual rights and individual responsibility, it is all difficult to comprehend. Still, it happened. Which proves that from the standpoint of its instigators, Super Tuesday was a bust.

Super Tuesday was designed by the more moderate and conservative elements within the Democratic Party to move the Party back toward the middle of the road, it having been pulled leftward by the candidacies of McGovern and Mondale. Unfortunately that did not happen. When Sam Nunn, the Democratic Senator from Georgia, and Chuck Robb, the former Governor of Virginia, decided not to enter the fray, the die appeared to have been cast. The vote on Super Tuesday proved that it indeed had been cast. Unless we miss our guess Al Gore will end up as an also-ran, having much less to say at the table when they crown Gov. Dukakis at Atlanta, than will Jesse Jackson, who will dictate the terms of the platform and who will be promised anything he wants in return for staying put. And there we will have it. Jesse Jackson, the friend of Castro, the defender of Guadafy and other terrorists at home and abroad, the champion of gays and lesbians everywhere, giving advice and counsel to the party that once boasted Harry Truman and Andrew Jackson. It's hard to figure.

But enough of the national picture. We are equally concerned with what happened in races for Congress and the Legislature, not all of which was entirely good, or entirely bad. We just wish the rest of the state had had the generally good judgement of the people here. For example:

First off, the race for Congress. On the Democratic side the outcome, in our humble opinion, was a disaster. Bill Sarpalius won without a runoff. How the Democrats in District 13 could look at the three men in that race, and give the nomination to Sarpalius is beyond our comprehension. One can only suppose it was simply a matter of name

## 108,851 county bales

'87 ginnings surpass previous year by 40 bales

Cotton bales processed by Floyd County gins from the '87 crop were almost identical in number to the previous year. Fourteen county gins handled 108,851 bales, a gain of 40 bales over the '86 ginnings.

Although hail ravaged various areas of the county, land which escaped hail storms generally yielded well. One individual alludes to the crop year as being "feast or famine" for producers.

Some growers produced little or no crop due to the hail. By contrast, one producer in the north part of the county told Floyd County newspapers that "This is the best cotton crop I ever raised."

According to Bob Lotspeich, manager of the Floyd

County ASCS office, planted cotton acreage totaled 153,803. However, thousands of acres were eliminated by the weather. Planted acreage the previous year was reported at 143,726 acres.

Production and ginnings will not parallel exactly because some cotton grown in adjacent areas of other counties was ginned in Floyd County, and some crop produced in this county was processed elsewhere.

The 14 gins include: Brown Gin, Crume Gin, D&J Gin, Darty Gin, Floydada Cooperative Gin, Hendricks Barwise Gin, Lockney Cooperatives (Lockney and South Plains plants), Lockney Gin Co., Marble Bros. Gin, McCoy Gin, Providence Gin, Scott Gin and Sterley Gin.

Helen Farabee has served and continues to serve on a variety of state and national boards including the Maternal and Child Health Advisory Committee, the State Coordinating Council on Long Term Care for the Elderly, Select Committee on Medicaid, Child Abuse Prevention Foundation, United Way of Texas, Long Range Planning Group for Texans with Disabilities, and several mental health committees.

Farabee is running to fill the vacant 30th District Senate seat. Governor Bill Clements is expected to call this special election for Saturday, May 7.

A motion by Spence, seconded by Kay Crabtree, was passed unanimously approving the proposed project and authorizing the group to pursue the project and report back to the court on their progress in the months to come.

### FIRE TRUCK SOLD

The old fire truck recently replaced by the county was sold to the only bidder during the March regular session. The community of Dougherty submitted a bid of \$500. A motion by Crabtree, seconded by Thomas Warren, approved the sale. Title transfer will be completed upon the return of the county attorney who is currently in the hospital.

The landfill contract was renewed with the City of Lockney under the same terms as the previous year. The county will pay a fee of \$2000 for the use of the landfill by county residents and dig the pits as necessary for Lockney.

A Mastercard account in the name of the county currently used by the Sheriff's Department for travel was cancelled. Instead of using a credit card for travel by the department, a petty cash fund will be set up to disburse

funds for this type of expense. This will allow the county to avoid the fees and charges associated with a credit account.

### FISCAL YEAR CHANGED

The court approved a motion to change the fiscal year for budget and bookkeeping purposes to run from October 1 to September 30 instead of from January 1 to December 31. The change will become effective October 1, 1988.

This action will make it more convenient to prepare end of the year reports and will make the receipts more closely match the budget as taxes are collected beginning in October. Under the current budget guidelines, this money is held on deposit until the budget year begins on January 1.

The South Plains Health Provider Organization, represented by Sue Terry and Melvin Prado, showed a video tape of the various clinics and services they operate in the area. SPHP operates nine clinics in 11 counties to provide medical services to "indigent, low income persons in an effort to take some of the burden off of the county."

Mike Whitely presented a proposal for pruning the trees and shrubbery on the grounds of the courthouse. He quoted a charge of \$1200 for the service. No action was taken on the proposal as the court felt "it was only fair" to ask the pruner who has been doing the work for his estimate before making the decision.

Treasurer Glenna Orman presented her monthly report, showing a beginning balance of \$93,300.27 and receipts of \$512,369.62. Disbursements totaled \$491,341.93, leaving a balance on March 1 of \$114,327.96. She reported \$757,000 in certificates of deposit which have earned \$6,876.16 in interest to date.

The court approved the report and passed a series of budget amendments to transfer funds from accounts which have surplus funds to accounts in the same departments which have a shortfall of funds.

Twenty-seven farm work contracts were approved on a motion by Crabtree, seconded by Warren. They include one in Precinct 1, four in Precinct 4, two in Precinct 3 and nine in Precinct 4. The approved contracts were William

E. Brown, Bob Ross, Roy Turnbow, Tommy Lyles, Jim H. Jackson (2), Wayne Collins, Lonnie Hinsley (3), Ward Brothers, J.R. Belt, Q.D. Williams, J.A. Welch, Eddie Smith, Stephen A. Newsome, Robert Hefflin, Travis Jones, Hulan Hamlin, Carmel J. Eastham, Glenna Miller, Jan. B. Smith, Jack Estate, Fred Jackson, Elfie Sherman, Ray Lloyd and Edna E. Gilly.

identification, for he certainly did not deserve to be the front runner. In fact, he deserved to be the last-runner, if there is such a word.

Let me tell you just a little about Mr. Sarpalus, gentle reader. He got the idea, not without reason, that his days were numbered as a Democratic State Senator from the Amarillo area. Oh, he had done some good things. He carried some bills for some good people that earned him a lot of good publicity. But he had some other problems that were not generally publicized. And he could see the growing strength of Republicans in his area. So he sent word through an intermediary to some Republicans that he would consider switching parties and running as a Republican. His intermediary said he wanted, in return, some assurance of support. The word was

sent back, or at least his intermediary was told, "we don't want him." Given that alternative his reasoning must surely have been, well it's better to quit a seat while ahead and run in a new district for a seat that is sometime perceived as being "higher." Even if you lose, you go out in a blaze of glory. It looks better on the resume.

And that's the way it will finally work out, if the Republicans choose wisely in the April runoff election between Larry Milner and Bob Price.

Some good things and some bad things happened at the state level on Super Tuesday. Beau Boulter made the runoff. He will go against Wes Gilbreath of Houston in the runoff. We think that is good, but Beau will have his work cut out for him. Gilbreath has, we are told, plentiful resources of his own and is willing to spend.

We had hoped Gary Ivey of Ralls would win the Republican nomination in the race to replace Foster Whaley. Gary carried this area handily but his opponent, Tom Christian of Claude, carried the northern end of the District by enough to offset the favorable vote here. So in November it will be Democrat Warren Chisum against Republican Tom Christian for District 84.

Those who vote in the Republican runoff will have a choice between Ed Emmett and Mr. P.S. "Sam" Ervin over who is going to face Jim Nugent in November for a seat on the Texas Railroad Commission. We recommend Ed Emmett most heartily.

By the way, I suppose at this point we should correct an error that appeared in an Associated Press story carried in the Lubbock A-J. They said Supreme Court Justice William Kilgarlin was ahead of State District Judge Carol Haberman of San Antonio in the race for the Republican nomination for Place Two on the court. The last time we looked Mr. Kilgarlin was very much a Democrat, serving as such in the Legislature for awhile and as Democratic County Chairman for Harris County. We suspect it was an error. Those things happen, unfortunately.

## Carthel-Bearden commissioner run-off race

With the dust having barely cleared from the first primary election, several candidates are gearing for the run-off on April 12.

Of greatest concern to local voters is the Precinct One run-off between Hulon Carthel and Connie D. Bearden for the Democratic commissioner nomination. The two men are survivors from five-person primary race.

Spotlight in the Republican run-off will be on the GOP nominations for United States senator and U.S. representative. Beau Boulter, congressman for this district, is matched against Wes Gilbreath for Senator. The winner takes on incumbent Lloyd Bentsen in the November general election.

For congressmen, Larry S. Milner of Amarillo and Bob Price of Pampa are run-off opponents. Six men vied for the nomination in the first primary. The winner takes on Bill Sarpaluis in November for the right to succeed Boulter.

Feature race for county residents in the general election will be for sheriff. Fred Cardinal, the Democratic nomi-

nee, and Ray Macha, the Republican standard-bearer, will face off.

Absentee balloting for the run-off will be April 4-8 in the county clerk's office.

## Jodi's dress shop plans to open outlet in Floydada

The new offices of the Farmers Home Administration will have new neighbors in the recently renovated building at 104 E. California. Jodi's, a dress shop, owned by Jean Wood of Plainview, will be moving in, in "about five or six weeks."

"We are going to have the clothing store and a Diet Center in the same building," said Ms. Wood. "I have had the Jodi's in Plainview for eight years and I have another one in Snyder. We are real excited about opening this new store in Floydada."

Jodi's will feature junior sizes 3-13, women's sizes 6-20, and will also have slightly larger sizes in sportswear. Also available at the store will be a complete

line of lingerie, purses, belts, scarves, hose, and accessories. "Our hours will be 9-6, Monday through Saturday."

"I have been associated with the Diet Center for 10 years. We own them in Texas and New Mexico," said Wood. "It is the number one diet in America because there are no drugs. You are given a food supplement to keep you from getting hungry and we have daily weigh-ins and counseling on a one to one basis." There will be a weight loss of 17-25 pounds in six weeks.

Ms. Wood has been a resident of Plainview for 18 years. She is married to Bill Wood who after 39 years retired from Perry's as a district superintendent.

A Plainview man has been charged with passing two forged checks in February at Pay-n-Save. One check was in the amount of \$114.39 and the other was for \$120.

Floydada Police Department, Plainview Police Department and Lubbock Sheriff's Department are working jointly on the case. Investigation continues into other possible forgeries.

# City adopts budget for 1988-89

Delayed from last week

Following a public hearing on the 1988-89 budget, the Floydada City Council approved the budget as presented. The new budget will cover city operations from April 1, 1988 to March 31, 1989.

Estimated city revenues total \$2,395,526 from taxes, water operations, sewer operations and the electric department. Expenses are estimated at \$2,157,866, leaving a balance of \$237,660 after expenses. Transfers to the general operating fund total \$176,176 and bond payments take another \$57,750, leaving a \$3,734 balance after all estimated expenses, transfers and bond payments.

In addition to approving the budget, the council passed ordinance #708, prescribing new decreased electric rates. Lewis McDaniel, representing SPS met with the council to present the new schedule of charges.

Ordinance #706 was passed at the regular March session of the Floydada City Council on Monday, March 7. Passage of the ordinance adopted the official Code of City Ordinances prepared by SMC, Inc. Bill Stephens, representing the firm, presented and explained the new code during the evening meeting.

Over the past several months, the city has been involved in a project to update and revise the 24 volume city code into one concise volume. This volume combines all existing permanent general ordinances and is indexed according to subject in specific chapters and sections.

The measure passed on a motion by councilman Frank Breed seconded by councilman Don Green and approved by unanimous vote of the members present.

A mutual aid agreement was approved dealing with fire and emergency services. This agreement allows Floydada firefighters and emergency vehicles to operate in outlying areas of adjoining counties with the protection of city insurance. The insurance coverage would be invalid without the pre-arranged agreement in the event that city personnel were called to assist in an adjoining area. A motion by councilwoman Ginger Warren was seconded by Breed and approved unanimously.

Floydada citizens will again enjoy the benefit of lowered summer water rates. A motion by Warren, seconded by Green, reduced the water charge from \$2.00 per thousand gallons over the minimum to \$1.00 per thousand gallons over the minimum from April 15 until September 15. The minimum charge will remain at \$14.00 for the first 2,000 gallons used. It is hoped that this

reduction will encourage residents to water lawns and make the city more eye-appealing during the summer season. The measure was approved by unanimous consent. The new charges will first appear on the June billing statements.

Bids were opened on one city purchase and one sale of city property. The sale concerned 25 1 1/2 cubic yard EMCO containers being taken out of use by the sanitation department. Two bids were received. Don Hardy bid \$25.50 each without the lifting brackets and Clinton Fawver bid \$5.00 each. A split decision awarded the bid to Hardy on a motion by councilwoman Nancy Willson, seconded by councilman Leroy Burns. The vote was opposed by Green who stated, "I just feel that they ought

to be worth more than that." Willson, Burns, Breed and Warren voted in favor of the sale.

Two bids were received on the proposed purchase of a 1984 or 1985 Suburban for use by the city. Sheryl LeCroy submitted a bid of \$9200 for a 1984 Chevy 1/2 ton Suburban and City Auto submitted a bid of \$10,200 on a 1985 Chevy 1/2 ton Suburban. The council opted to purchase the newer model with the lesser mileage, awarding the bid to City Auto. The motion was made by Willson, seconded by Warren, with Breed and Green voting in favor. Burns abstained from voting.

The landfill use contract with Floyd County was renewed with the same provisions as prior contracts. The county will continue to dig the pits plus pay a \$2,000 fee each year. In return, county residents who live outside the city limits of Floydada will be able to utilize the landfill area.

A request from Doyle Moore for permission to remove a portion of the curb between Sue's Gifts and the Barber Shop on South Main Street was denied. Moore wanted to remove the curb and make a driveway between the two buildings. Council members denied the request after hearing the objection of Melba Bryant, the shop operator, that the removal of the curb would effectively limit her available parking to two spaces. Added to this objection was the possibility of an accident when backing out of the proposed driveway or an accident if someone fell due to the height of the curb which would remain on each side of the drive. The motion for denial passed 4-1. Burns, Warren, Breed and Green voted for denying the request with Willson opposing.

Discussion of instances where private contractors or individuals have dug up streets or alleys to perform services for a business or resident led to an authorization to prepare an ordinance requiring the reconstruction of such areas by those who have disturbed them. The proposed ordinance would mean that the street or alley would have to be returned to its original condition before the project is finished.

Payment of the court ordered fee to the three special commissioners who served during the condemnation hearing was approved. The city had been ordered by the district court to provide \$500 compensation to the three man panel, Mal Jarboe, Dale Goen and Larry

Jones.

In attendance at the session were Mayor Parnell Powell, city manager Gary Brown, city secretary Jimmie Lou Stewart and council members Burns, Green, Warren, Breed and Willson. Also present were Lewis McDaniel, Melba Bryant, Joe Stepp and the Hesperian reporter. Councilman Wayne Russell was absent as was city attorney Steve Hale.





# Russian aphid on rebound in area wheat fields

The return of warm weather is bringing with it the return of the Russian wheat aphid, and farmers across the High Plains need to keep close watch on their fields, cautions an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "This pest has survived the winter and its populations are now beginning to increase on the South Plains," said Dr. Pat Morrison, the Extension entomologist.

The Russian wheat aphid first appeared in the U.S. in March 1986 near Muleshoe. Since then it has spread into 14 western states of the Great Plains. Its economic impact on farmers in this area has been estimated at some \$50 million. "Research plots monitored at Lubbock by Dr. Tom Archer, research entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, showed the Russian wheat aphid numbers declined during the colder winter months of January and February," Morrison said.

"However, they have increased significantly in the last three weeks. We expect the populations to continue to increase into May," Morrison said.

The insect overwinters on wheat and certain other host plants as both mature and immature females, he explained. There are no males in the population. "They give birth to living young and therefore have the ability to increase rather rapidly," Morrison noted.

Last year, the aphid had a tremendous rate of increase in April, he

said. The aphids appear to more heavily infest stressed wheat and are often worse in dryland wheat, he said.

Morrison urged wheat growers to begin scouting their wheat carefully now for these aphids as populations begin to surge.

As the aphids feed on the wheat leaves, they cause the leaves to turn purplish in color, often with longitudinal white streaks, the entomologist said. This results from a powerful toxin injected into the leaves while the pest feeds. "Infested leaves also will curl up, much like a soda straw," Morrison said.

Economic thresholds, or treatment levels, haven't yet been determined for wheat grown in the U.S., Morrison said. He said a general guideline is to consider treatment when 10 percent of the plants are infested at the growth stage when the first nodes of the stem are visible.

"Research in South Africa has shown that most damage is done between the time the flag leaf first appears and the head is first visible," Morrison said.

"Making control decisions on tillering wheat is difficult," the Extension specialist said, "because we have only limited research at this time."

Several registered systemic insecticides are effective in controlling the pest, Morrison said. He said systemic insecticides are needed because the aphids are inside and the curled leaves and protected from contact insecticides. He urged growers to consult the insecticide label for small grain restrictions in that grazing and pre-harvest intervals vary for each product.

Williams, an 18-year-old senior at Lockney High School, began showing at Houston when he was nine years old.

"I can't think of a better way to end up my show career than to have the champion at Houston," he said.

Williams plans to put his heifer, "Dutchess," in the pasture so she can have her calf. He has 20 head of Angus cattle that have expanded from the first heifers he began showing.

A son of Jerry and Kay Williams of Lockney, he is a Floyd County 4-H member. He plans to attend Clarendon Junior College next year, and hopes to be on the livestock judging team.

"This was a really good heifer that won the show," judge John Edwards of College Station said. A total of 97 Angus heifers were paraded in front of Edwards.

Chris Chaffin of Duncanville, another

high school senior, exhibited the reserve champion Angus heifer. He and Williams have been competitors throughout their showing years, and both were able to retire from the junior shows in style.

"Matt and I have shown against each

other for several years, and my older brother showed against his older brother when they were in school," Chaffin says.

The registered name of Williams' grand champion heifer is 6 Bar D Duchess 36.

## Amarillo event set on lowering estate taxes

Farmers and ranchers have been concerned for years about high taxes that erode their estates. To help take the bite out of their high estate taxes, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is planning several educational programs.

A two-day seminar is planned for Amarillo, March 28-29, 1988, which will help farmers and ranchers learn how to reduce taxable estates and learn new methods for passing their operations to the next generation without tax and administrative burdens.

"Of major importance is how every farm estate will be affected after the recent estate tax law changes," points out Dr. Wayne Hayenga, a lawyer and Extension economist. "The best tax planning of the past may be the worst under the new law."

The seminar will begin with a discussion on estate taxes, including deductions, expenses and tax rates.

Basic estate planning devices will be explained in depth. Among these are wills, by-pass trusts, gifts, disclaimers and property titles.

Relating estate plans to income tax savings can be of even greater benefit than just thinking about an estate plan. In fact, sometimes income tax savings can even be greater than estate tax savings for people with commercial farm and ranch businesses.

There will also be a separate segment of the program devoted to treating beneficiaries fairly. This is a most important subject when there is a farm or ranch in the family and only part of the heirs want to run it.

Another discussion will center on estate planning tools for agriculture and will deal with corporations, partnerships and selling part of the business to heirs.

The second day of the program will be devoted to special estate tax rules for agriculture.

## San Angelo champ heifer

Grand champion Angus heifer, three first place heifers in their classes and two class seconds were captured by Floyd County 4-Hers at the San Angelo Livestock Show and Rodeo last week.

Matt Williams of Lockney exhibited two first place heifers, one of which later was selected as the grand cham-

pion Angus heifer. He had another Angus female which claimed second place in her class.

Zane Colston of Floydada showed Angus heifers which placed first, second and seventh place in their respective classes.

In the medium light weight steer class, Colston's animal placed sixth and Mark Todd Terrell of Lockney showed the ninth place animal.

Also exhibiting stock at San Angelo, the final major show of the year, were: Gwen Lane, finewool cross lamb; Allen Martin, Troy Bigham and Coye Joyce Robbins, one barrow each.

## Water district annexation absentee voting underway

Floyd County voters may cast absentee ballots from March 14th through March 29th to ratify the annexation of a portion of eastern Crosby County into the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

The proposed Crosby County addition includes the portions of county commissioners Precincts One, Two and Four located above the caprock. The western precinct of Crosby County above the Caprock joined the water district in April 1969.

Residents of the Crosby County annexation area will be asked to approve a maximum tax rate of \$0.05 per \$100 assessed valuation, even though the current water district tax rate is \$0.007 per \$100 valuation. This will provide the same maximum tax rate previously approved by residents of the

water district in 1951. The annual tax rate is set by the water district's board of directors and levied uniformly throughout the district.

The water district board called the elections after receiving petitions and hearing testimony from Crosby County landowners in January and February.

Separate elections for the proposed annexation area and for the 15-county area presently served by the water district are required by the Texas Water Code. A majority vote favoring the annexation in both elections is required before the proposed area can be added to the water district.

Absentee ballots may be cast during normal business hours at the High Plains Water District Office, 108 W. Missouri, Floydada, Texas. Verna Lynne Stewart is the election clerk.

## COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

The appointment of an advisory group to review issues related to high volume instrument classing of cotton could be the beginning of the end of the grades and micronaire readings traditionally used in marketing U.S. cotton.

That's the opinion of Ralls cotton producer Steven Verett, vice president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., who in February was appointed one of 14 advisory committee members. Others from the High Plains are Wayne Mixon, ginner of Seminole, and C.L. Boggs, president of Plains Cotton Cooperative Association, Lubbock.

The producer-recommended "National Industry Advisory Committee on Cotton Marketing" will hold its first meeting April 13, according to Jesse Moore, Cotton Division director of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. The committee is made up of

representatives from producer, ginner, cooperative, merchant, manufacturer, academic and research sectors.

No significant changes in cotton marketing or the price support loan structure are expected in the short term, Verett cautions, "but over the two-year life of the committee I have high hopes that we'll see some significant moves toward improvement."

High Plains producers have contended that micronaire discounts have unfairly penalized West Texas cotton in the marketplace since they became a part of the loan schedule in 1964. And that's the first area in which Verett thinks USDA and the committee should look to make changes.

Micronaire has been used as an indication of both fiber fineness and fiber maturity. But, as USDA's Moore has acknowledged, a separate measure for each of these two qualities could serve as a more accurate guide to end-use value in today's high speed textile technology.


Speaking at the Beltwide Cotton

Conferences in January, Moore said development of a new system would likely include replacing both mike and grade with other measurements. "In the sophisticated environment of modern textile mills, we're finding that mike does not assess cotton maturity and fiber fineness as well as it should," he stated.

Moore also said class grades now in use probably would be replaced by separate electronic readings to indicate color and trash. He too, however, cautioned that since changing the classing system would change the way cotton is marketed, no immediate changes should be expected.

Momentum for a thorough study of the present cotton classing system and the method of pricing cotton came from the Producer Steering Committee of the National Cotton Council, chaired at the time by Frank Jones, a PCG director from Lamesa. A new system, the committee said, should enhance the establishment of loan values of cotton for spinning purposes.







## Social Security News

Some people think that if, for any reason, they delay filing an application for Social Security benefits, they are entitled to benefits retroactively to the month of their first eligibility. That's not the case. If they apply before reaching 65, with few exceptions, they cannot receive retroactive payments for months before age 65. If they apply after reaching 65, they might be entitled to as many as 6 months retroactive payments. This happens if the claimant meets all the requirements for entitlement to benefits except for filing of an application.

Suppose a worker reaches age 65 in June 1987 but he or she doesn't file an application for retirement benefits until June 1988. This person can be entitled to retroactive payments back to December 1987. Let's suppose now that the worker reached 62 in June 1987 and doesn't file an application until June 1988. Retroactive benefits cannot be paid to a retired worker, a spouse, or a widow or widower if this would result in a permanent additional reduction of the benefits.

We say "if" because the retroactive payments do not always result in a permanent reduction of benefits. If the worker's spouse is over 65, or under with a child in his or her care, their benefits as the worker's dependents are not subject to reduction, and they can receive retroactive payments.

The retired worker can receive retroactive benefits for months prior to 65 if he or she had excess earnings in the year of application, and these earnings can be applied to months before 65. The number of retroactive months that can be paid depends on the months covered by the excess earnings.

Retroactive benefits can also be paid to a disabled surviving spouse or a disabled surviving divorced spouse who is entitled to retroactive benefits for any month before reaching age 60.

Also, a widow(er) or a surviving divorced spouse who files an application in the month after the month of the worker's death may be entitled to benefits for the month of death.

Social Security is always concerned about the rights people have to retirement and survivors benefits under the program as well as to Medicare. There are certain rules and waiting periods that insured people have to meet before Medicare is available to them. However, to permit a disabled widow(er) or disabled surviving divorced spouse to have Medicare as soon as possible (provided he or she meets all the requirements for eligibility) he or she is deemed entitled retroactively for up to 12 months even if monthly benefits are not payable.


