THE "PIK" PROGRAM (Payment in Kind) may be a two-edged sword for agricultural areas. While farmers have been mulling over the government proposal, businessmen have been doing some "mulling" of their own.

On the one hand, the program might not be so bad for the producer, who can cut back on his expenses if he lays out a big percentage of his land.

But, on the other hand, if the farmers cut their acreage 30 to 50 per cent, it may mean that farm suppliers will be selling that much less seed, fertilizer and equipment.

But, in the long run, most farmrelated businesses and other businesses in the immediate area realize that unless the farmers get back on their feet, they may not be in business for long at any rate.

"If we're going to make a living from farmers, we have to go along with what's best for the farmers. We should have some kind of program where the farmers can make some money or we aren't going to be selling anything," was the reaction of one agri-businessman in the area.

"I would call the PIK program a short-term inconvenience for a longterm benefit," was another comment.

And one man who deals in fertilizers and insecticides said it might be that those products will be even more in demand in 1983. "If farmers set aside 50 per cent of their land, they are going to take better care of the 50 per cent they are farming. Where last year they cut back on fertilizers and insecticides, maybe this year they will fertilize and spray more," the agri-businessman

"It's going to be a rough year or two, but it couldn't be any worse than this past year," was the reaction of another agri-businessman.

The concensus among farmers is that the PIK program will help them.

Martin Chandler of the Parmer County ASCS office says that his office has been barred by state headquarter from giving out any information as to what percentage of the farmers are participating in the "PIK" program until after the March 11 deadline.

However, judging from the crowd of pickups which have been surrounding the County ASCS office in recent days, it would appear that the program is being accepted by a high percentage of the farmers.

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

Cream butter and sugar, add milk and eggs and beat. Add flour and spices, then fruit (use some of the flour and work in dates, etc. to keep them from sticking together). 1 Tbsp. vanilla

Place sugar, Karo, butter and 1 cup whipping cream in pan. Cook until boiling good; then add another cup of whipping cream--real slowly stirring all the time. Cook until it forms a firm ball in water. Take off fire. Add 1 Tbsp. vanilla and pecans. Pour in buttered pan and cool or spoon out on buttered cookie sheet. Dip in:12 oz. melted semi-sweet chocolates and ½ block parafin. Instead of making caramel, you can use one pkg. of Kraft caramels melted in microwave or double boiler. If you use caramels, add 2 Tbsp. water.

### PECAN ROLLS By Beulah Miller

1-7 oz. jar marshmallow cream 1 box powdered sugar 1 tsp. almond flavoring 1 pkg. Kraft caramels Chopped pecans

Mix marshmallow cream, powdered sugar, and flavoring. Work with hands to form rolls, about four to six inches long about 1 inch around. Put on wax paper and let stand overnight uncovered. Melt caramels in double boiler, add a small amount of milk if needed. Dip rolls into caramel and then in nuts. Cover well and let set on wax paper until firm. Makes about six rolls.

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# Telephone Co. Seeks Rate Hike

General Telephone Company of the Southwest asked the Public Utility Commission of Texas for \$85.5 million in new revenues, almost half of which the company says is due to changes dictated by various governmental actions.

The proposed changes in rates will affect all customer classes, and are designed to increase the company's gross annual revenue in the state of Texas by approximately 15 per cent.

E.L. "Buddy" Langley, president of General Telephone, said the request is being made because earnings have fallen to 9.5 percent from 12.5 percent authorized last year, which was never obtained; interest coverage, critical to the company's bond rating among financial agencies, has fallen to 2.68 and poses a danger of having the company's A-rating downgraded to a BBB; and the dramatic impacts of deregulation of the industry and the restructuring of prices mandated by governmental actions.

"All of these factors require us to either raise rates or cut back our service improvement and modernization program," Langley said. "As distasteful as raising rates is, we prefer this rather than reducing these programs which our customers have told us they expect.

"During the 12 months covered in our filing, we reduced our companywide work force the equivalent of approximately 700 employees in an effort to reduce costs, but we have reached the point we cannot reduce much more without adversely affecting service," he continued.

"As a public utility we do not have the option of curtailing expansion and investment during periods of recession and high interest rates. We have the obligation to have facilities to meet our customers' needs when they request them. Therefore, we can only proceed with prudent programs and seek permission from the state commission to raise our rates.

"We realize our customers expect quality service and it is our objective to provide it. It is unfortunate that this costs money."

The company president said earnings have been reduced despite stringent budget controls and

# Farmers Are Urged To Seek Breaks

"Farmers who survive 1983 will be ones who cut corners without cutting their jugular," says a leading Southwestern Panhandle agricultural banker.

In speculating on how Southwestern Panhandle area farmers can offset high interest rates and depressed crop prices, Hal Easley, vice president of agricultural loans for First National Bank of Hereford, stresses, "Only producers who find ways to save on production expenses and not put their yields in jeopardy will succeed in making a profit for the coming year.

"Farmers will have to become true bargain shoppers, just like other consumers who have learned to track down discounts and sales," he recommends.

Easley encourages agricultural producers of the Southwestern Panhandle area to seek out finance waiver programs, early payment discounts and other money-saving deals now being offered in the agricultural marketplace.

"Something like a ten per cent discount on good quality seed now being offered by some seed dealers can give the farmer a real price break on a product he's going to have to buy if he farms at all," he says.

"You wouldn't want to jump at just any deal that comes down the pike," he points out, noting that farmers operating on borrowed money must carefully weigh the savings offered by the sellers against the interest to be paid on borrowed money.

"For example, if the savings offered by the farm supplier is big enough to offset the additional interest you might pay by buying early, then it's a good deal," he says. "But if the interest costs you more than you save, it's a bad deal."

Easley concludes that "saving ten per cent on seed costs in February when you're ordinarily paying for seed in April or May actually represents around 40 per cent in annualized interest. Play that against production interest of 12 to 14 per cent and you can see this is a good deal." productivity increases due primarily to the new investment in Texas.

"Our customers and regulators have told the company they expect the most modern telephone system available," he explained. "During the period covered in our filing, we spent over \$321 million in Texas to meet our commitments to improve service and to modernize. Our modernization program is in high gear and we want to continue this momentum. But it is essential that we receive adequate revenues if we are to do so."

Langley said that while inflation has not been as dramatic as in the past, it has continued to drive prices up. "Our cost to build telephone plant continues to be higher than past costs. In September 1981, our investment was \$1,561 per customer line. For a 12 month period, we added 33,385 customer lines at a cost of \$7,918 per line. The effect was to raise our investment \$199 per line from the level that was used in setting the rates we now have in effect."

BOND RATING CRITICAL

The telephone executive pointed out that the company was not able to finance internally the millions of dollars required for the service improvement and modernization program. During the period covered in the filing, the company financed \$150 million in common stock, preferred stock and bonds.

"As we continue our modernization program, we will require a tremendous amount of external financing and our bond rating is extremely critical to our customers as well as to us," he said. "The rating agencies look very closely at our interest coverage and we do not look good in this important category. We need our net income to be at least three times our fixed charges or interest expense.

"During the period covered in our financial information, our interest coverage fell to 2.68 and that trend is still downward," he said.

"We do not have the AAA rating which Texans are hearing so much about these days, but have an A- with the possibility of dropping to BBB if we do not receive the required revenues."

# Anthony Re-Elected As GSPS Secretary

A.W. Anthony, Jr., of Friona, was elected to serve his third year as secretary-treasurer of Grain Sorghum Producers Association at a meeting of the organization's national board of directors at Lubbock, Texas on February 15.

Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA) was organized in 1955 to develop markets for sorghum, to promote research in sorghum utilization and production and to represent sorghum farmers in legislative matters. The sixteen-man national board is its governing body and makes its policy decisions. Directors are elected by sorghum farmers on a regional basis. Presently serving, are directors from Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas.

Secretary of Agriculture John Block spoke to the GSPA directors by telephone from his Washington office. Block, along with USDA Chief Economist Bill Lesher and Associate Administrator of ASCS Roy Cozart, answered questions and concerns of the GSPA board.

One of these concerns is the early Internal Revenue Service indication that PIK commodities will be taxed at the time of receipt rather than at the time of sale.

"Farmers should not be concerned about that," Block said. "We may not know by the March 11 deadline, but one way or another, we will solve that problem." The same assurance was stated by Lesher, who said, "There is no doubt we will get the tax law changed so that the commodities will be taxed when sold, not when the grower takes certificates."

The USDA officials also warned that there will be no extension of the March 11 deadline for signup, despite the fact that final announcement of PIK provisions has not been made. County ASCS offices may, however, allow producers to sign a roster before the deadline and return to complete the signup in the following week.

Other GSPA officers are: Mabry Foreman, Felt, Oklahoma, president; Robert Green, Hartley, Texas, vice president for Legislation; Larry Abeldt, Hope, Kansas, vice president for Market Development and K.B. Parish, Springlake, Texas, vice president for Education and Research.







Demolition of one of Friona's older buildings is underway. Workmen and machines are tearing down the red brick building, which was built on the west side and about the center of the 500 block of Main Street more than fifty years ago, and was originally a garage.

It was also the first permanent home of Reeve Chevrolet, which began operation in 1938 in the building which presently houses Dodson's Body Shop. F.W. Reeve, the founder of Reeve Chevrolet, operated the dealership in this location a few months, then moved over on Main. In the late fifties or early sixties a metal shop building was built at the rear of the brick building and was used for Reeve Chevrolet's shop.

At the present time the metal building is occupied by Irrigation Engine Service, which is owned and operated by Mickey Harrelson, and Stevick Pre-Fab, which Ronnie Stevick owns and operates.

Present plans are for the space occupied by the building to be used for customer parking for these two



The next meeting is scheduled March 22 at 7:30 p.m. at Bovina.


