

Weather Holds Spotlight Here During Past Week


ONE YEAR AGO this week, ye editor and family were on a vacation trip to Salt Lake City, Utah. Naturally, we have watched with more than passing interest the news reports of the floods and mud slides which that area has been suffering during the past week. One news report credited the work by the Latter Day Saints Church (Mormons) as keeping the damage from the catastrophe from being any worse than it was. It seems that the Mormons already had an emergency plan ready to place into operation whenever floods should threaten the Salt Lake City area. One spokesman said "If we should need 20 people, or 200, or 20,000 on an hour's notice--we can have them." It was noted that thousands of members of the Mormon Church gave of their time, tirelessly, packing and placing sandbags, in order to divert the floodwater from homes. In one instance, the Utah residents were sandbagging around one home where the owners were away from home on a trip, and weren't there to do anything in their own defense. "If it were my home, I would want someone to be watching out for it," said one of the workers. In another case, a Mormon church member's home was located near where the volunteer workers needed to divert the oncoming stream, in order to keep it from causing untold damage to a huge residential area. Church leaders conferred with the homeowner, and explained that the new channel might cause his property to be damaged, but they would do all in their power to keep the damage as


Friona had its own version of "Star Wars, Empire Strikes Back, and Return of the Jedi'' this past

The big, booming thunderstorm was part of an early-morning cloud that hit the area beginning Wednesday evening. By morning, the system had deposited 1.05 inches of rain in Friona.

For the week, the official measurement in Friona amounted to 1.98 inches as of Thursday night, according to Louise Dunnam.

The city measured rainfall on five consecutive evenings, as follows: Sunday, June 5, .32 inch; Monday, June 6, .18 inch; Tuesday, June 7, .31 inch; Wednesday, June 8, 1.05 inches; Thursday, June 9, .12 inch; total: 1.98 inches.

The immediate Friona area has been spared the violent weather which spawned tornadoes and hail damage, but other parts of the country have not been as fortunate.

On Tuesday night, an apparent tornado completely demolished a warehouse formerly belonging to Bovina Wheat Growers, now property of Sherley Grain Company, north of Highway 60 in Bovina.

The approximately 40x70 foot cinder block building had all four walls blown down during a storm which hit Bovina with a fury. At the same time, an 18-wheel truck-trailer was laid over on its side in the middle of U.S. Highway 60 about a mile west of Bovina.

Several hundred acres of young cotton, mostly south of Bovina, and toward Farwell, were lost during the storm.

The following night, a funnel cloud was spotted at Farwell, placing the county in a tornado warning area. Funnels were also spotted near Sudan, Littlefield and Shallowater that evening. Bailey, Lamb and Lubbock counties apparently sustained considerable hail damage from the Wednesday storm. An electrical outage was experienced in Friona early Thursday, when lightning apparently struck a transformer. Lightning also struck a gas main, but company employees could not release information concerning the damage.


Practice Alert On Tuesday

The Friona Volunteer Fire Department will have a practice tornado alert on Tuesday, June 14, at 2:30 p.m. to familiarize the residents of Friona with the sound of the new system.

In case of cloudy, inclement weather, the test will be postponed.

There will be three long blasts, lasting about 20 seconds each.

This will be the emergency system that would also be used in case of train wrecks, chemical spills and such.



Is OK'd **By State**

On June 2, 1983, the City of Friona received notification that its North landfill was again in compliance with the State Department of Health.

So, once again the North landfill will be open to the public, beginning Monday, June 13. On that date, tree limbs, concrete and construction materials will be accepted at the landfill.

No paper, garbage, household furnishings, dead animals or wire will be accepted. The landfill will be open on Mondays from 9 a.m.-12 noon, and on Wednesdays from 1-4 p.m. Hours at the Southwest landfill will be Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, from 9 a.m.-12 noon and 1-4 p.m.

No brush, wire, or dead animals will be accepted. Drivers are asked to stay on the pavement until they reach the gatekeeper. There is no charge for use of the landfills by city residents, but for non-residents there will be a dumping charge of \$5 for a pickup load, and \$10 for a truckload. Proof of residency will be required.


A Jack and Jill tournament is scheduled at the Country Club this Saturday and Sunday. Thirty-seven teams had been entered in the event as of Wednesday.



Kill Farm Bill

State Senator Bill Sarpalius spent the last few remaining hours of the 68th legislative session fighting against a bill which would adversely affect Texas farmers.

"The farmers of this state are already plagued with serious financial difficulties. It would be extremely unfair to impose additional hardships on our farmers by passing a bill which would force them to pay a lot of money, which some of them do not have," Senator Sarpalius says.

Senator Sarpalius successfully fought against a bill which would have brought most farmers and ranchers under the state's workers compensation law. The senator filibustered against the legislation for more than two hours Monday night. Senator Sarpalius filibustered for more than nine hours Friday night, when the bill was first introduced in the Texas Senate, by Senator Hector Uribe of South Texas.

Senator Sarpalius opposed the legislation despite strong lobbying efforts to pass the bill and despite Agricultural Commissioner Jim Hightower's support of the bill. Proponents of the legislation said the bill would affect a small percentage of Texas farmers. However, a large number of Panhandle farmers, who would have been affected by the bill, disagreed. "The bill would have hurt at least 30 to 40 per cent of all Texas farmers," Senator Sarpalius said. The senator's filibuster forced final defeat of the bill. "I'm happy the farmers of this state won an important victory Monday night. If



Land Commissioner **Authorizes Bond Sale**

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro has announced that the Veterans Land Board authorized the sale of an additional \$50 million in bonds for loans through the Veterans Land Program on May 10 which will maintain the current 8.5 per cent interest rate on loans.

Mauro, chairman of the Veterans Land Board, said, "Because the strength and stability of the program brought such a favorable bond sale, the Board can continue to offer 8.5 per cent loans to veterans."

In addition to the \$50 million sold to provide new loans, the Board authorized the sale of an additional \$36 million to restructure the debt of the program.

"The Veterans Land Program's very competitive interest rate, five per cent down payment, semi-annual payments, and the long-term 40-year payoff period offer an excellent investment opportunity to all Texas veterans," Mauro stressed. "I encourage all eligible Texas veterans to participate in this outstanding program."

Mauro noted the situation for veterans applying for loans has changed dramatically since January 3. By LAURA JACOBS The United States Department of Agriculture this week released new processing recommendations for tomatoes and tomato juice, applesauce, fruit purees and pumpkin.

To prevent food borne illness and the loss of valuable home canned foods, specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are urging home canners to follow the new USDA guidelines.


The USDA now recommends the following:

*The one-step, cold pack method for canning tomatoes should no longer be

should not be canned at home. Instead, cubed pumpkin and squash may be canned using a processing time of 55 minutes for pint jars and 90 minutes for quart

jars. *The processing times for applesauce and fruit puree should be increased to 20 minutes for pints, quarts, No. 2 and 21/2 cans.

According to Marilyn Haggard, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Extension Service, the changes in canning recommendations are based on research conducted at land-grant universities and





Tom Johnson Takes Post At Three-Way


Tom Johnson, who has served as basketball coach at Friona High School the past three years, has resigned to accept the position as principal at Three Way Schools, in southern Bailey County.


The minimum age limit for the preteen group has been changed to age ten this year. Ages for the High School group will remain the same as in the past.

Friona Police Offer Tips To Vacationers

With the beginning of vacation season, Friona Police Chief W.D. (Bill) Thieman this week offered some suggestions to local residents about how not to advertise their absence from home during holiday weekends and during vacations.

Thieman suggested that residents do the following:

*Leave your house keys with a neighbor or someone you trust and ask that person to stop by your house and check the inside once a day. Also leave a telephone number with them where you can be reached in case of an emergency.

*Contact the Post Office and have your mail stopped and held there until you return. Also advise your milk and paper delivery to stop delivery while you're gone. Nothing advertises a house better to burglars than milk bottles and newspapers stacked up at the front doors. Another way to do this is to have the person checking your house to take in all mail, milk, and papers for you. While there they can also switch on various lights such as kitchen, spare bedroom, hallway or bathroom lights and make it look as if you're home. These lights may be left on all night long and not look too obvious. Also have them turn the radio on to your favorite station and leave it on. Burglars get shook if they think someone is at home.

*Another measure is to call the Friona Police Department and request a security check of your home and possibly your business. Officers will physically check the outside of these buildings at least once per shift during the day and drive by frequently during the evening. The members of the department believe in the proverb that "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." The officers are not authorized to gather your mail, papers, milk or water the plants and take care of your pets.

*After making sure your home is secure enjoy your vacation and be sure to check back with your neighbors and police department when you return.

Milestones Listed In UCC'S 75-Year History

When the Spirit of Progress led ambitious people from the crowded sections of the north and midwestern United States to begin building homes in the newly-founded town of Friona, it did not dim their ideals to the fact that a place of worship was a part of their ambition.

In less than one year after the community was given a name-quoting from record, June 14, 1908, "Pursuant to a call, the people of Friona assembled to consider the organization of a church."


The group being of various denominations, it was agreed that a union organization was practical. Plans were made to begin the invisible.

II. We believe in Jesus Christ the Only Begotten Son of God to be our Savior and Lord, who was crucified for our sins and rose for our justification.


III. We believe in the Holy Spirit, our Teacher, Our Comforter and our guide.

IV. We believe in the Divine Inspiration of the Bible, both of the Old and the New Testament Scriptures as our only rule of faith and practice.

The laymen, like the Pilgrims, carried on the work with the occasional support of the District Superintendent Rev. C.S. Murphy and the ministers of the Panhandle Congregational Churches--Amarillo, Farwell, and Springlake, Texas. The Council Manual was adopted May 9, 1909. At this time a vote carried to proceed with the dedication of the church building. May 23, 1909 was set for the event and invitations were sent to Amarillo, Farwell and Springlake churches to be present and assist with the dedication. On May 23, 1909, with Superintendent C.S. Murphy acting as Moderator, the Congregational Church of Friona, Texas, was organized with appropriate services; the Articles of Faith were found to be in accord with the Congregational Churches; a house of worship was almost complete; the membership numbered twenty-one; and, in general, prospects for a future for the church were good. Rev. J.L. Parker came as supply pastor during July 1909. On August 1, 1909, W.A. Hensel accepted pastorate of the church and remained as leader until January 8, 1912.

construction of a building. Later development revealed that local contribution was inadequate for completion of the building, and it was obvious that some individual or missionary society would have to assume responsibility in order to continue with the work.

This opportunity was extended to all denominations represented and none responded except the Congregational--there was one member, Mrs. J.W. Karr, of the Congregational Church at that time in Friona.


The Congregational Missionary Society rendered aid on the condition that the organization remain a Union Congregational Church; and the money furnished by them was to be conferred as a grant or loan, without interest, providing that the church raise a voluntary offering annually for the Church Building Society. The term *union* was later explained to mean congregational.

Adequate corporation papers were drawn and signed by J.W. Karr, R.V. McWilliams and D.W. McMillen on August 7, 1908 with John F. Lillard, Notary Public. The Church charter was filed in the office of the Secretary of the State of Texas, August 28, 1908.

On December 8, 1908 a meeting was called by the missionary pastor, Rev. John G. Lange of Amarillo. A quorum of the church was present and past activities of the organization were reviewed and the future discussed. As a result the group pledged itself to one bond of fellowship. Names of the charter members are: J.W. Karr, Mrs. J.W. Karr, R.V. McWilliams, Mrs. R.V. McWilliams, C.L. Furgus, Mrs. C.L. Furgus, Seth Roush, Mrs. Seth Roush, D.W. McMillen, Mrs. D.W. McMillen, William McCandlish, A. Wentworth, Carrie Oleson, C.B. Oleson, Walter Kell, Mrs. Nellie Shattuck, Bert Shattuck, John Orbaugh, Mrs. John Orbaugh and Charles Karr. The following Articles of Faith were adopted: I. We believe in one God, the Father Almighty, Maker of Heaven and earth and of all things visible and

Changes took place as time advanced. Loved pastors felt the urgent call to other fields and left rich, lasting memories with the congregational people at Friona. One change which showed the flint of the membership occurred August 7, 1921 in the early hours of the morning, about 2 a.m.

During an electrical rainstorm, lightning set the building afire and it was completely destroyed with all furniture and fixtures, several tons of coal, two pianos, and a small organ. Insurance was one thousand dollars and grant about \$775.00. A canvas the next day resulted in a subscription over the one thousand dollar figure for a new building. Services were held in the Public School building until that, too, was soon destroyed by fire. Then the people opened their homes for worship. Work soon began on a new structure for the Congregationalists and the adobe building was dedicated on June 17, 1923. District Superintendent Dr. A.E. Ricker held a full week of evening meetings concluding on the 17th with a basket dinner at noon and the dedication. Evening services that night were cancelled when word came that Mark and Russell Reeve had drowned at Reeve's Lake. Church members went out to give assistance. The membership has come to this church from many faiths: United Brethren, Friends, Congregational, Presbyterian, Episcopal, Evangelical, Roman Catholic, Christian Church, Methodist, Baptist, Assembly of God, Church of God, German Lutheran, and confession of the Faith.

Under the able leadership of Rev. Skip Sirnic the membership had grown until the need arose for additional Sunday School Rooms. In 1979, an additional three Sunday School rooms and a large fellowship hall were added to the present building. In the meantime, the adobe church building was returned to the church as the Girl Scouts did not have adequate funds to preserve it. In 1982, it was sold to Mike Hanes.

Some thirty-five ministers have served the church in its seventy-five year period. A historical marker from the State of Texas marks the site of the first church in the city of Friona.



Work was begun and the new building was finally dedicated on December 7, 1969. In June of 1973, the old adobe building, which still stands on Sixth Street in Friona, was donated to the Friona Girl Scouts as a meeting hall and a "Pioneer Heritage Chapel and Museum." When the Girl Scouts accepted this gift, Alice Whaley wrote the following about the old adobe building: "Many people have been sheltered by this old church house. Many hours of peace, joy, and sadness have been spent here. And even though many of us have never worshipped within its walls, it still represents something sacred and dear to us. For here stands a monument of the hopes and dreams of those lonely, homesick pioneers who banded together to work and labor in a bond of love so that they and future generations of Friona people would have the influence of

Cross-Country Walker Spends Night Locally

A couple of cross-country travellers spent the night in Friona this past Monday. Ordinarily, this would not be an uncommon event. There was something unusual in the way Patrick Warren is making his trip.

He is walking.

Warren is in the midst of a crosscountry walk, in order to call attention to epilepsy, and the fact that people with epilepsy can accomplish a great deal.

The Philadelphia, Pennsylvania native began his 3,000-mile hike about a month ago in Los Angeles. If he stays on schedule, he plans to be home in Philadelphia by August 6, in time to help his youngest daughter celebrate her fourth birthday.

And when Monday evening arrived, and Warren had made it to his stopping place for the night, in Friona, he was a full day ahead of his original schedule.

"We've been at it a month, and we've been over mountains and across deserts, but we really haven't lost any time due to weather," Warren said, with a note of thankfulness. But when Monday dawned, it first

appeared that he might have his first "rain out." He had spent Sunday night in Texico, N.M., and when he awakened on Monday, it was raining. However, by about 7:30 Texas time, he was able to resume his journey. He usually is out and walking by 6 a.m. each day, says the cross-country hiker, who says that walking has always been his hobby.

By prior arrangement, Warren and his accompanist, Ron Miraflor, were given supper and rooms at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona. Warren said that hospitals from coast to coast are cooperating by donating him a place to spend the night and a hot meal. Also, the Pizza Hut chain is donating meals. He is receiving no money for the effort, but is doing it solely to call attention to epilepsy.

So far, after about 1100 miles on his trip, highlights include:

*Killing two rattlesnakes, one near Kingman, Arizona which had six or seven buttons, and another near Portales, N.M.

*Meeting U.S. Senator Pete Dominici and Agriculture Secretary John Block this past weekend in Portales, N.M., where he was persuaded to stay an extra day in order to meet the two government officials.

*A little extra excitement Sunday night when he saw the tornado warning put out for this area (complete with the little funnel cloud on the television screen). Warren says that everyone he has met on the trip has been exceptionally nice. He has received official -proclamations from several cities, such as Needles, California, Gallup and Portales, N.M. He also was given the "Red Carpet Award" by the City of Albuquerque, and the "Key to the City" at Portales. He has been offered rides, water, and even money by passing motorists, but refuses money, suggesting instead that they send a contribution to an epileptic center. "Hey, I'm giving the people a little good news for a change. Instead of having to hear about the trouble in the Mid-East or the economic problems, they can read about me, and take their minds off the bad news they're used to hearing," Warren said. Warren is married, and he and his wife Patricia are parents of two daughters, Denise, 12, and Desiree, three. He said his wife was one of the

Sunflower Deadline Is June 15

June 15 is the final planting date for insured sunflowers.

Acres of sunflowers planted by June 15, insured by FCIC (or by a private company reinsured by FCIC), must be reported by June 30 to receive full crop insurance coverage.

Acreage planted after June 15 must also be reported on the June 30 acreage report as being planted too late for insurance.

Farmers unable to plant prior to June 15 because of excess moisture conditions may sign a 20-day late planting arrangement, which permits insurance coverage, but provides for a lower guarantee due to the late planting.

Farmers wishing additional information about the new late planting agreement should contact their local, authorized crop insurance agent.


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"They've had it coming. They had been there three years," said Miraflor, who is a former state Golden Gloves boxing champion.

New Senate Bill To Assist Buffalo Lake

Governor Mark White this week signed into law a bill, sponsored by Senator Bill Sarpalius, which calls for the creation of the Buffalo Lake Water District. Senator Sarpalius says, "The purpose of this legislation is to form the Buffalo Lake Water District from three separate counties: Randall, Potter and Deaf Smith."

Buffalo Lake National Wildlife Refuge is a federal entity controlled by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Department of the Interior. Currently, the Buffalo Lake Refuge, located in Randall County, is badly in need of restoration. Some people consider the dam unsafe in its present state.

Senator Sarpalius says the district can serve as a funding vehicle in order

to repair and maintain the dam. He says, "This bill sets up a mechanism for the federal government to assist the water district in restoring the lake."

The lake was at one time a refuge for wildlife and a recreational area for people of all ages to enjoy. An estimated 500,000 people live within a two hour drive from Buffalo Lake.

The legislation now must be approved by the qualified voters in Randall, Potter and Deaf Smith counties before the Buffalo Lake Water District can become a reality. If approved by the voters, the district will consist of a nine member board selected from Randall, Potter and Deaf Smith counties.

FHA Workshop Held June 2 In Amarillo


Friona FHA officers and their advisors attended a workshop for Proficiency Events June 2 in Amarillo.

English Farmers Visit Lazbuddie Farm Family

By JUNE FLOYD

Four farmers from England received some first hand information about farming in Parmer County last week. They were Gerald Neesham of Lincoln, Ralph Manners of Darlington, Stuart Chapman of Deerstones and Ernie Fenwick of Park View.

Neesham and his wife, Vicky, and three sons, Lee, Andrew and Matthew, arrived at the Lazbuddie Community country home of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Smith Thursday morning.

Manners, Chapman and Fenwick arrived a few days earlier. The Smiths also had three English visitors last week. They were Ian Clayton and

time homemaker who assists her husband with his office work.

The family, who had never been on the North American Continent before, flew from London's Heathrow Airport to Chicago's O'Hair Airport for a three week holiday.

In a rented car the family drove through Illinois, Iowa, Nebraska, Colorado and New Mexico before reaching West Texas. Their longest stop was at Estes Park, Colorado, where they were snowed in for two days.

The Neesham boys attend public school. Terms begin in early September and run through July, when summer vacation begins. The

equipment, which is mostly manufactured in Germany.

Manners, Chapman and Fenwick were on holiday together. At the suggestion of Eric Clayton, from whom all of them purchase John Deere products, they included a visit with Gene and Betty Smith on their itinerary.

Manners, who has a 1000 acre farm, grows 100 acres potatoes, 250 acres winter wheat, 400 acres winter barley and 250 acres grass for silage and pasture.

He keeps 400 Landrace X-Large White sows which produce approximately 8000 hogs annually. These are sold to a bacon factory, from which comes sausage, ham, pork roast and other pork products. His 600 Hereford x Friesian (Holstein) cow herd is kept confined to straw yards all the time. When calves weigh about 500 pounds each they are put on slatted floors. There they are fed grass silage plus four pounds of barley each day until they reach the age of 14 months. At this time they generally average 1100 pounds and are sold.

Chapman said, "I fear we are on the brink of a trade war with America due to shortage of food. There's too much difference between politicians and grass roots farmers over there as well as here."

He went on to say, "We've found extreme hospitality, good food and much courtesy everywhere we've been. The standard of food here is higher than that in England. We've appreciated the civility of everyone we've met."

These three men had sixteen days to spend in the United States. They flew to Minneapolis, where they rented a car for a drive through Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri,

Neesham is a farmer. He grows wheat, barley and rape on a 1500 acre farm. The rape seed is marketed for its oil content. Mrs. Neesham is a full

"All male hogs and calves are marketed as boars and bulls to improve food conversion and lean meat content," Manners said.

Manners and his wife live on their farm with one son and two of three daughters. The son works with his father and they hire fifteen men full time the year around. Five work full time with the hogs and one works full time with the cattle.

Chapman, whose home is near Deerstones, also produces grain and hogs. His 400 sow herd produces 21.5 pigs per sow per year and averages 2.2 litters per year. All hogs are kept in a confined area at all times.

Most field work on his 600 acre farm is done with John Deere farming equipment, which is manufactured in Germany. Ford is England's largest factory.

He and his wife have three daughters. One daughter is a public school teacher and one is in training college. The son assists his father in Oklahoma and Texas.

Chapman's final remark was, "Most Americans land in London, where they take some tours; visit Stratford and Edinburg and think they've seen England. What they really should do is visit Yorkshire."

Ernie Fenwick has five full time employees and a 125 acre farm, where he raises cereal grains and produces chickens on a large scale. He buys baby chicks by the thousands and markets them at 41/4 to 41/2 pounds at seven weeks.






