Charity on display

Christmas spirit decorates Floydada streets

Besides the religious symbolism behind the Christmas decorations displayed in the city of Floydada, citizens should know that the birth of Jesus is not the only Christian message these decorations are portraying. Another message being sent out to everyone who sees them is that of charity. The combined efforts of charitable organizations and individuals in the community of Floydada are responsible for the decorations in this city.

The money for the decorations comes from the Chamber of Commerce, which of course is funded by businesses and individuals in the city. The work of the chamber is one way that a Floydadian can see the direct result of money he spends in this city, such as Christmas decorations. Funds are always necessary for any project, but money is not the motivating force behind this project, Connie Galloway is.

Anyone living in Floydada for more than a year has seen the decorations get

better and better every year. The original "S" decoration which used to be hung, has been replaced by candles, stockings, trees, bells, angels, and canes.

The "S" decorations had been around for a long time, when in 1984 the Chamber President Tommy Ogden dragged them out of the courthouse basement and asked Galloway, the electrical department in the city, to re-work them.

Galloway, who has lived in Floydada for 47 years, has been a city employee for 22 years. He is married to Sharon and has two children: Steven, 19, and JaNae,

"I did not like those "S's" and I hated putting them up every year, so we added the lights and they looked better, but I still didn't like them," said Galloway.

"I then started looking in catalogs at all the different decorations that could be bought for cities. They were so expensive and the more I looked the more convinced I was that we could build them ourselves."

Beginning in 1985 with the help of the Chamber of Commerce, the FFA, the City of Floydada, SPS, and Lighthouse Electric new decorations started coming

"In 1985 Chamber Director Wayne Tipton came up with the idea of the Adopt A Decoration Program," said Chamber Manager Nettie Ruth Whittle. "For \$15.00 or more, you could adopt a decoration. All the money raised went to buying the materials to build new decorations. The program, which lasted for three years, was a big success. We have gradually added more and more."

With the money from the Adopt a Decoration Program, Galloway then approached the FFA for their help. "We just looked at the decorations we wanted," said Galloway, "and then made our own patterns. It was a combined group idea of what we wanted to build. The FFA then built the frames and the city employees and Lighthouse Electric put tinsel and lights on them and hung them."

During the Christmas season there are no idle days due to bad weather, for city employees. "We stay busy outside on pretty days," said Galloway, "but on rainy days and real cold days we now work indoors on the decorations. All the city employees chip in together in mak-

In another effort to support the city all the supplies are bought locally. "We buy everything we need here in Floydada," said Galloway. "The only thing we can't buy here is the tinsel, and we get that wherever we can find it. Sometimes it is very hard to find all the tinsel needed."

Looking around town during the holidays you can tell that this project is not carried out by disgruntled employees forced into a project that doesn't pay them anything. It is obviously a labor of love. Year after year the city, Lighthouse Electric and SPS hang the lights and keep them maintained. "We have had plenty of help and lots of good luck," said Galloway. "It makes you feel real good to do this. The public has been real nice in supporting us with nice comments and donations, and I thank them for that."

After three years of FFA construction and "Adopt A Decoration" programs, there are some changes this year. The construction of the decorations are now being handled by Al Galloway's general mechanical repair class, and because of the successful Chamber of Commerce membership drive there is no Adopt A

"This year we decided not to ask for donations," said Whittle. "The money from the membership drive will go toward the decorations, and we will hold off from the adoption program. We appreciate the way people always came through with the money when asked. It has always been a strictly volunteer program, but then that is what the chamber is made up of - volunteers."

Little by little the decorations keep growing. "This year we added 10 stockings," said Galloway. "In a period of about three years we have made approximately 90 new decorations. We have even made individual Christmas trees for businesses that want them out front. People like our decorations so much they are always asking us to put them in front of their business, but we can only put them where there are light poles."

"There will be no more "S" decorations, laughed Galloway. If they want an "S" they will have to build it themselves."

People in Floydada have the right to proudly display their signs of love and community dedication to all those passing through the city, for they know when they see the symbols that they are a

product of a community full of charity.

Arrest of Plainview man clears 10 burglaries in Floyd County

Because of one Lockney man taking the time to record a serial number from his shotgun and immediately reporting his burglary and serial number, a chain of events was started which resulted in four vehicle burglaries in Lockney being cleared and six vehicle burglaries in Floydada being cleared.

"The close cooperation between Lockney Police Department, Floydada Police Department, and the Hale County Sheriff's office resulted in a pickup load of stolen items being recovered," said Police Chief James Hale.

According to local police, a citizen of Hale County spotted a shotgun on Friday, Nov. 25, in a building where auctions are held and was planning to buy the gun. As a safety precaution he ran the serial number of the shotgun which matched the serial number in the crime computer (which had been entered immediately after the theft of the gun).

Lockney and Floydada P.D. were contacted by the Hale County Sheriff and the suspect who sold the shotgun to the auction service was picked up and questioned. He later confessed to bur-


glaries in Lockney and Floydada. "We may not be able to return many items simply because the people that had items stolen did not bother to report the theft or burglary," said Hale. "If people can come down to either Floydada or Lockney P.D. and identify items we have, we will be glad to give them back to their rightful owners."

Several burglaries that had been reported last week were solved with the arrrest of the Plainview man. Last week burglaries that were cleared were: a house burglary in the 100 block of East Ollie on Nov. 23. Stolen in this burglary was a telephone, an upright vacuum cleaner and a hair dryer.

Two car burglaries were cleared; one occurring on Nov. 23 where one Remington .410 Single Shot Shotgun was stolen, and a burglary of a motor vehicle on Nov. 24 in which a fire extinguisher was stolen.

A burglary that police have not been able to clear was one occurring on Nov. 24 in the 1100 block of S. 8th in which Pioneer speakers were stolen.

Police also investigated one accident last week in the 100 block of S. 10th Street. A Chevrolet Silverado 10 Pickup entered S. 10th from the west, traveling north. The vision of the driver was blocked by a truck parked in the street and when he entered the street he hit an Oldsmobile 98 traveling south. Both vehicles were driven away.


Holiday blood drive slated by EMS

Weekend accidents send three to hospital DPS reported two accidents over the

Thanksgiving weekend that resulted in injuries and three people being transported to the hospital.

According to Trooper Ray, on Nov. 25 at 7:30 a.m., an accident occurred on FM 2286 near Sterley. A Mercury fourdoor, driven by Graciela Cardosa Trevino attempted to pass an International module hauler being driven by Jimmy Naral Roberts of Lockney.

Roberts was attempting to make a left turn when Trevino started to pass on the left. The Mercury struck the left rear of the truck and slid into the rear dual

"Trevino suffered a broken wrist from the accident and because she was not wearing a seat belt, she also smashed her head into the windshield," said Ray. The Mercury was towed.

On Nov. 26, at 7:45 a.m. at the intersection of Hwy. 62 and 207 DPS were called to investigate another accident. This accident involved a Chevrolet Suburban, driven by Jesus Vela, of Floydada; and a Chevrolet pickup, driven by Libby Anderson, of Floydada.

The Suburban, traveling north on 207, pulled in front of the Chevrolet traveling west on 62, and collided.

An ambulance picked up Anderson and transported her to the hospital. She was released, no injuries.

Jesus Vela was transported by private vehicle to the hospital. He was also released.

SPAG seeks seed money for rail spur

South Plains shippers, counties and cities will be asked to provide \$30,000 in "seed money" to be used to purchase railroad spurs serving those communities, members of the South Plains Rural Rail Transportation District Board said Tuesday.

The affected railway spurs lie in eight counties - Lubbock, Crosby, Floyd, Hockley, Terry, Lynn, Gaines and Dawson. All commissioners courts, except those in Lynn and Gaines counties, have approved resolutions to join a special district to purchase the rural rail spurs and operate shortline railroads. State law allows creation of these special districts, however the districts have no taxing authority and must generate revenue through user fees.

Floyd County has appointed Commissioner-Elect Connie Bearden, to represent the county in this special district.

Tim Pierce, South Plains Association 12. of Governments director of economic development, said Santa Fe Railway announced plans more than a year ago to sell or abandon 224 miles of rail spurs in the Lubbock area. The spurs are in the above mentioned counties.

Pierce said the Texas Railroad Commission provided a \$20,000 grant and another \$8,500 was raised from South Plains communities for a feasibility study by Wilbur Smith Associates, a Columbia, S.C., rail planning consult-

That study, which was completed in June, set a net value of about \$8 million on the rail spurs and real estate, and estimated that another \$17 million in repairs would be needed, Pierce said.

According to Pierce's assumptions the five spurs could be purchased for about \$4.5 million and another \$3.5 million would be needed for repair on the lines. He also estimates that the district would need \$2.2 million a year for operating expenses debt repayment.

The assumption also includes a projected \$2 million grant from the Economic Development Administration.

According to a story in the Lubbock Avalanche Journal, Pierce said a Pennsylvania council of governments recently used a combination of federal, state and local funds to finance the purchase of rail spurs from Conrail, and Pierce said he will contact that group to see how they put that package together.

The Avalanche story further states that Lubbock County Commissioner Boyd Roberts said the district needs additional information on revenues and railroad operations before negotiating with Santa Fe.

Whether the district raises the \$25,000 to \$30,000 from shippers and

Ten members of the 1988 Floydada Whirlwinds have been named on the 2AAA All-District first two teams, with two more receiving "Honorable Mention." The 12 'Winds were selected at 14 positions on the elite teams, chosen annually by a poll of the district's coaches. District Champion Littlefield led in the voting as 13 Wildcats were named to 18 positions on the first two squads. Tulia and Dimmitt each had nine members on the two-deep. Eight Friona Chieftains were named, and Muleshoe had three players on the first two teams.

Littlefield's Stephen Hernandez was the most honored member as he was named as 1st Team Offense, place kicker and wide receiver, and 1st Team Defense, cornerback. Adam Cates of Floydada was a consensus choice as 1st Team Offense, center, and 1st Team Defense, lineman. Cates, a repeater from the 1987 All-District squad, was the only junior to garner unanimous choices by the coaches on both offense and defense first teams. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. David Cates.

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

Because it involves continual movement, cycling places as much demand on your heart and lungs as brisk walking or swimming. In addition, cycling won't stress joints or muscles. People with bad backs, knees or ankles, or those who are overweight or out-of-shape may fare better with an indoor exercise bike than almost any other exercise.

To get the most from indoor bicycling, your workout should be continuous and fast enough to raise your pulse rate. Experts recommend pedaling 20 to 30 minutes three or four times a week. As with all exercise programs, it's best to work up to that pace gradually.



Floyd County Arts will present The Night Before Christmas 1988



Floydada residential telephone rates are lower than average

Southwestern Bell Telephone (SWBT) customers in Floydada and across the state pay less for basic residential local telephone service than most customers across the nation, according to a recent study by the Federal Communications Commission.

"In Floydada, residential one-party customers pay only \$8.15 per month which is about the same as the price of a large pizza," said Jim West, Area Manager-External Affairs. "Or, on a daily basis, the basic rate here is 27 cents per day for a service that's always available, providing contact with friends, relatives and emergency services," he said.

Nationally, the average monthly rate for basic residential service is \$12.19. In Texas, residential service rates range from \$8.15 to \$11.05 per month depending on the size of the local calling scope.

Rates quoted in the FCG study include only rotary dial, unlimited calling, one-party basic service. The monthly rates do not reflect federal subscriber line charges, state and local taxes, long distance, custom calling, touch-tone or other optional services.

Southwestern Bell Telephone subscribers in Texas also have a lower-cost option available to them. Economy service, available throughout most of the state, allows 25 outgoing calls and unlimited incoming calls, for half the basic charge.

"The survey demonstrates our employee' dedication to hold down costs," said Jim West. "We're proud of our service and the value our customers receive for their hard-earned dollars."

The FCC study compared basic monthly residential telephone rates in 95 cities. The rates range from a low of \$6.60 in Fort Dodge, Iowa, to a high of \$23.39 in Huntington, West Virginia.

Six Texas cities included in the study rank near the lower two-thirds of the 95 cities surveyed nationwide. The Texas cities, where each ranked in the survey, and the basic monthly residential rate for each: Houston - 57 (\$11.05); Dallas -67 (\$10.40); Fort Worth and San Antonio - both 69 (\$9.85); Corpus Christi - 78 (\$9.10); and, Brownsville - 81 (\$8.80).

Caution urged to prevent head injuries this season





Reye's Syndrome precautions and symptoms explained for parents of teenagers and children

viral infections, and as such, warrant our special attention because a swift and deadly disease is associated with them. The disease, Reye's Syndrome, usually affects people from infancy through late adolescence; however, no age group is immune. It can develop 3 to 5 days after the onset of chicken pox, an upper respiratory infection like flu, or other fever causing illnesses. It affects the liver and brain, is non-contagious and is often misdiagnosed as encephalitis, meningitis, diabetes, poisoning, drug overdose, or sudden infant death.

After a viral infection has seemingly run its course and the person is beginning to feel better, the following symptoms should be treated as serious and as possibly the first indication of Reye's Syndrome. Watch for these symptoms usually occurring in this order:

* Relentless or continuous vomiting * Listlessness (loss of pep and energy

bility, slurred speech, sensitivity to * Disorientation or confusion (unable

consciousness A persons life can depend on early diagnosis. Reye's Syndrome should be suspected in anyone with flu or chicken pox who vomits repeatedly. Phone your physician immediately if these symptoms develop. Voice your concern about Reye's Syndrome. If your doctor is not available, take the person to an emergency room promptly. Two liver function tests (SGOT, SGPT) can be done to determine the possibility of Reye's Syndrome. There is a 90% chance of recovery when the syndrome is treated in its earliest stages by physicians and nurses experienced in the treatment of

If you have a flu-like illness or chicken pox, you should consult your physician before using any drugs, particularly aspirin or anti-nausea medicines. Recent studies have shown a link between the use of aspirin and the development of Reye's Syndrome, Anti-nau-

The flu and most flu-like illnesses are sea medicines may mask the symptoms of Reye's Syndrome. Epidemiologic research has shown association between the development of Reye's Syndrome and the use of aspirin for treating the symptoms of influenza-like illnesses, chicken pox, and colds.

The National Reye's Syndrome Foundation, the U.S. Surgeon General, the Food and Drug Administration, and the Center for Disease Control recommend that aspirin and combination products containing aspirin not be taken by anyone under 19 years of age during fever causing illnesses. Aspirin is another name for acetylsalicylate; some drug labels may use the words acetylsalicylate, acetylsalicylic acid, salicylic acid, or salicylate instead of the word aspirin. There is no data as to whether other forms of salicylate than aspirin may be associated with the development of Reye's Syndrome. Until further research has answered this question, the NRSF recommends that products listing any of these substances should not be taken by people of this age group during episodes of these illnesses.



changes in the administration of all ASCS and CCC payments and benefits. Highlights of the changes are as follows:

I. The County Committee must make an "actively engaged in farming" determination for ALL persons receiving of the farming operation. ASCS payments or benefits.

A. A farm operator must make a 'significant contribution" of both: Capital, equipment, or land AND Active Personal Labor and/or Active Personal Management.

B. A landowner is considered "actively engaged in farming" on the land owned by the individual or entity and is active personal labor and/or manage-

C. Legal Entities such as Corporation, Trusts, and Estates who do not qualify as 'actively engaged in farming" as landowners under B. above must meet the requirements of Paragraph A.

1. A "Significant Contribution" of capital, equipment, or land is defined as "at least 50% of the individual or entity's commensurate share of the capital, land, or equipment necessary to conduct the farming operation".

2. Active Personal Labor is defined as PERSONALLY providing physical activities necessary in a farming operation, such a land preparation,

planting, cultivating, and harvesting. Congress has amended the 1985 Food including establishment and mainte-Security Act, which resulted in major nance of cover crops or conserving use acreages. A "significant" contribution of active personal labor is the SMALLER of 1000 hours per calendar year or 50% of the total labor required for the individual commensurate share

> 3. Active Personal Management is defined as personally providing the general supervision and direction of day to day activities and labor involved in the farming operation, including services reasonably related and necessary to the farming operations.

II. The restrictions against custom farming and leasing equipment no NOT required to make a contribution of longer apply as long as the individual or entity meets the "actively engaged in farming" criteria.

III. The addition of an adult family member to a family farming operation is considered, in itself, a change in farming

IV. An Estate will be considered as a separate person from the heirs for two program years after the program year in which an individual dies. After this time, the estate shall not be considered eligible for program payments unless, on a case by case basis, the County Committee determines that the estate has not been settled primarily for the purpose of obtaining program pay-

V. An individual that receives farm program payments may not hold substantial beneficial interest in more than 2 entities that also receive payments as separate persons (3 other entities if the producer does not farm as an individual). An individual involved with multiple farming entities must designate annually the 2 permitted entities in which the individual intends to receive payments. The individual's share of the payments in undesignated entities shall

VI. A husband and wife may be separate "persons" if they can show that each of them brought separate farming operations into their marriage and have maintained them as separate operations throughout their marriage.

VII. A cash rent tenant will be combined as one "person" with the owner of the land being rented unless the tenant makes a significant contribution of labor or a significant contribution of management and a significant contribution of equipment to the farming

Frost can cause prussic acid poisoning in livestock

Grazing of certain frost-damaged are not hungry will not be affected as pastures and forages can lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock. Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazing after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a

As far as the actual poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10 to 15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three

Symptoms of prussic acid poisoning may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also causes the blood to appear bright red.

Here are some steps to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock:

1. Allow plant material effected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.

2. Feed animals hay or a supplement before turning them in on plants that may contain prussic acid. Animals that

seriously by toxic material since their intake will be limited.

3. Remove all animals from the pas-

ture if one in the herd shows any signs of poisoning. 4. Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is

highly efficient if given early. This product is available from veterinarians. 5. Have suspect plant material checked by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratories at College Station or Amarillo. Local veterinarians will be happy to submit samples for you.

The overall key to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then to keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period

Ag youth group updates name

The National FFA Organization is the new name for the high school group previously known as Future Farmers of America.

"I view this action as a progressive move that needed to be made," said Jay Hays, president of the Student Body at Texas A&M University

Hays, a former Texas FFA vice president, said delegates to the recent national meeting of the youth organization

in Kansas City voted to take the word "farmers" out of the name because it was hurting recruiting.

Hays said that although FFA remains in the organization's title, it no longer reflects farming as a career.

"One might compare the FFA name change with that several years ago of Texas A&M, which no longer stands for 'agricultural and mechanical college' of

Texas," Hays said. "We are now the National FFA Organization, or FFA organization of each state, as a result of action by delegates to the 61st annual conference of the youth group," he said.

Hays is an A&M senior from Wolfe City majoring in agricultural education. Hays said FFA officers and U.S. Education Department advisors to the organization recommended the name change to help reduce a 23 percent de-

cline in membership since the mid-70s. Hays said the FFA has about 416,000 active members nationwide, with about 54,000 of them residing in Texas.

Another delegate to the FFA national meeting, Jeff Darby, a state FFA vice president from Jourdanton, said voting delegates also approved removing the words "vocational agriculture" from the constitution and by-laws and replacing

them with "agricultural education" at the national level.

"In Texas, however, the educational program will be known as 'agricultural science and technology' in high schools to reflect to a higher degree the needs of the biotechnology age," he said.

Darby, a biochemistry major at Texas A&M, served as president of his chapter and district FFA organizations before being elected a state FFA officer.

He said Texas FFA officers at the meeting also included state president Donnell Brown, who attended Texas Tech before taking on the one-year officer assignment; and Lesa Ann King of Howe, first vice president; and state vice presidents Ellen Lumpkin, Lufkin; Stewart Luedke, Kingwood; Shawn Harris, San Antonio; and Chris Britton of Cleburne, all Texas A&M students.

Also taking part were Dr. Herman D. Brown and Dr. Joe Townsend of A&M's Agricultural Education Department, who provided leadership for the science and technology curriculum for Texas schools, and Jay Eudy of Austin, state director for high school agriculture programs with the Texas Education Agency.

"I fully expected these changes to take place at the national level," Brown said.

Social Security News

Aged, blind, or disabled people receiving supplemental security income (SSI) may be institutionalized for many reasons and for varying periods of time, and they should know how a stay in an institution will affect their SSI pay-

Generally, a stay in an institution of less than a month will have no effect on SSI payments. A stay of a full calendar month or longer may affect the payment and, therefore, should be reported to Social Security as soon as possible.

In most cases, someone who enters a city or county rest home, halfway house, prison, or other public institution becomes ineligible for SSI. But there are some exceptions, For example, recipients may continue to be eligible for payments when they enter:

* a publicly operated community residence which serves no more than 16 residents:

* a public institution primarily to receive educational or vocational train-

* a public emergency shelter. (Payments are limited to 6 months during any 9-month period.)

Also, an SSI recipient who was working before entering a public institution may be able to receive payments for the first 2 full months after entering it.

SSI recipients entering certain medical treatment facilities may continue to receive full SSI payments for up to 3 months. The facility entered must be a public medical institution or a private medical facility where Medicaid is paying more than half the cost of their care. SSI recipients can qualify for these payments if a doctor certifies they are expected to be in the facility 90 days or less and they need to maintain and pay expenses associated with their permanent residence. They also must give Social Security evdence that they meet these requirements within 10 days after the close of the month they entered the

facility.

Sometimes, recipients who do not meet the requirements to continue receiving a full payment may be able to receive a "personal needs allowance" of no more than \$30. A personal needs allowance is payable only to recipients residing in medical facilities where Medicaid pays more than half the cost of their care.

Recipients in private institutions may receive SSI payments, but the care received could be considered income for SSI purposes. This income might affect the payment since eligibility for SSI and the amount of the payment are tied to income levels.

As you can see, the rules on how institutionalization affects SSI payments are somewhat complicated. Therefore, it's important for SSI recipients to tell us right away whenever they enter an institution. We can then determine what the effect will be and explain the effect to the recipient.


