Contestants and spectators will gather at Burleson Arena, Flomot, on July 21, 22 and 23 for the 6th year of the Burleson Memorial Roping. The annual event benefits the Dusty Burleson Scholarship Fund at Clarendon Jr. College in the ranch and feedlot management course.

The 1989 Dusty Burleson Scholarship recipients are Kenneth Blackwell, Childress; Shawn Scrogum, Throckmorton; and Tracy Vigil, Las Vegas, New Mexico. Through an admission at the gate of \$2 dollars, the contestants in all the events; those who attend and of course those who volunteer their help make these scholarships possible.

Jo Goen, Floydada, has been getting artist ready to display their creative talent for this year's art show at the Big Barn on Saturday July 22. This year's art includes two newcomers, Jim Eppler, Lubbock and L.W. Whitley, Crowell.

Jim Eppler has been painting professionally for about 20 years. His subjects are primarily wild life of the Southwest, but he does alot of portrait work. His portraits include many for the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame. His work is also represented in museums, private

collections and books and album covers.

K.W. Whitley, Crowell has been exposed to art all her life and has won lots of awards for her paintings. She was born in Austin and received a degree from the University of Texas in Art. She is a Western Art painter. She has ridden and trained horses and continues to do so in Crowell with her husband.

Returning artist to the western art show will be Penny Golightly, Floydada; Glenn Lyles, Plainview; Florence VanHoose; Jill Warren; and Jo Goen, all from Floydada. The art show is an event to be enjoyed by all ages who view the artist creations. All of the art on display is for sale, so visit the Big Barn on Saturday starting at 10 a.m.

Judges for the Friday morning 10 a.m. cutting horse events will be Foy Acker, Tulia and Smokey Alexander, Lubbock. Moorehouse Eastern Cattle Company of Seymour will be furnishing the cattle for the three divisions. Entry time for the open, ranch, and novice cuttings will begin at 9 a.m.

On Friday afternoon following the Cutting Horse Events the team penning will take place followed by a new event this year, the team branding. A four

member team, one of which is female, will rope, mug, and brand a calf. The team with least time will be the winner. This new event should prove to be fun to those who participate and of course to the spectators.

Walter Jones of Matador will again be on hand all three days to provide bar-b-q and hamburgers to the hungry cowboys, cowgirls and spectators.

One of the most tense events of competition at the Burleson Memorial week-end of activities is the washer pitch contest. The coordinators for this event for the past 5 years has been Patsy and Judge Jay V. Johnson from Tulia. The Johnsons are skilled at keeping the contestants on their toes as the process of elimination progress toward a "buckle winning team."

Prizes for this years winners are being made by area craftsmen. Jim Bo Humpherys, Dicken is making "bits" for the cutting horse events and the open pasture roping. Alvin Durham, Roaring Springs, is showing his leather crafting skill with headstalls for the top boy and top girl in the youth events. Wade Brannon, Silverton, is new as a prize maker this year and will be making "bits" for a couple of team roping events. Terry Hester, Graham, will show his skill in spur making for the Ranch Cutting winner. Leather creatsman Roy Stone, Hale Center is making breast collars for

a Team Roping.

Saturday morning begins with the youth horse events. A professional roder performer in her own right, who will be assisting Kirk Brock in the youth timed events will be Dude Barton, Flomot. There are three divisions in the youth, Pee Wee, junior, senior, and sign up time is at 8 a.m. The 4 timed events will be stake, flag, potatoe, barrel races. Ronee Thorton Patton of Lubbock donated the trophies to be given to the 1st Place winners. The headstalls go to the Top Boy and Top Girl from the 4 events. Featured this year as the first roping event on Saturday beginning at 1 p.m. will be the women team ropers. The Roping is sanctioned by the WPRA and rope in this event. Carl and Johnnie Alford, Hereford and their twin daughters, Carla and Darla will furnish the roping stock and be in charge of the team ropings. There will be an open team roping; 1 over 40; #8 and #4 ROPING during the afternoon and evening on Saturday.

Sunday's entertainment is the open pasture roping where anything can happen and always does to the enjoyment of the spectators. Introduction of the Ropers will begin at 1 p.m. Floyd Hardin, Childress and Sam Fortenberry, Lockney will be making the introductions. The open pasture roping will begin following the introduction of Ropers.

Plans progress for Centennial

The Floyd County Centennial met on July 17 in the County Courtroom, with Chairman Bill Gray presiding. After the reading of the June minutes by Secretary Bill Hardin, a report was given by Gray on the progress being made in finalizing some of the proposed activities for next year's centennial celebration.

The selling of Centennial caps is being proposed as a fund raiser. Firm prices and availability will be discussed at the August meeting. A centennial calendar from Canyon and Randall County was displayed, and hopes were expressed that a similar project will be undertaken in Floyd County.

The "Kick-Off Breakfast" has been scheduled for January 6, 1990, in Lockney, with the speaker and program yet to be determined. Also, the Commission voted to include the (Floydada) Pay-n-Save July 4 activities as an official function of the 100th Anniversary celebration.

Several state officials were mentioned as possible speakers for the courthouse marker dedication on May 25, 1990. This event will take place prior to the "Hall of Fame" induction ceremonies at the courthouse.

It was also determined that the Centennial "Time Capsule" dedication ceremonies will occur at 1:30 p.m. on Mon-

day, May 28, 1990 (Memorial Day). Hopefully, many of the surviving elected county officials of 1965, who deposited the 75th Anniversary time capsule, will be able to attend this event on the 100th commemoration of the Charter date of Floyd County.

A joint venture with Motley and Briscoe Counties was discussed. A "trail drive" or wagon train is being proposed for this activity. Even though the three counties have different dates of formal organization, it was pointed out that they share the common day in 1876 when 54 new counties were created by the Texas Legislature.

It was also discussed that at this time many of the study clubs in the county are planning events for publication in their 1989-1990 yearbooks. Any of those organizations desiring a program or speaker with a Centennial theme should contact Bill Gray (983-5440), J.D. Copeland (652-3813) or Judge Bill Hardin (983-3432) in order for such programs to be scheduled.

Vice-chairman J.D. Copeland announced that the next meeting of the Centennial Commission will be on Monday, August 14, at 7:00 p.m. The location will be the First National Bank in Lockney. All interested citizens are urged to attend.

Floydada resident sustains self-inflicted gunshot wound

A local man is in a Lubbock hospital this week after receiving a gunshot wound to the upper left chest on Sunday, July 16.

According to police reports, police received a call that there was a man with a gun at a residence located at 208 W. Missouri. Upon arrival, police searched the area and found a man, identified as Jerry Warren of Floydada, in the backyard of the residence with a gunshot wound to the upper left chest, just above the nipple.

A .22 revolver was found at the scene and according to the District Attorney's office, "it appears the wound was self-inflicted. The investigation is continuing."

Warren was listed in stable condition Tuesday, July 18.

Council authorizes 3% pay increase for city employees

Convening in a special session for the purpose of holding an executive session to evaluate and discuss salaries and responsibilities of city employees, Floydada City Council members followed the executive session with a vote giving all city employees a three percent increase in salary in the proposed budget for 1989-90. If the budget is adopted by the council at a later meeting, the raise would become effective October 1 for all employees.

The council handled a two item agenda prior to the executive session at the July 17 evening meeting.

A discussion of the possible types of block grant money available this year (1989) from the Texas Department of Commerce for community development projects yielded the information that "water and sewer improvements are expected to receive the majority of the funds," according to Mayor Parnell Powell.

Powell and city manager Gary Brown told council members that they had talked with consultant Kay Howard, who has worked with the city on the paving grant project currently being implemented. She advised that water and sewer improvement projects would likely take priority positions for funding in the next state department of commerce funding disbursement.

With this in mind, Brown suggested that the city consider applying for a water improvement grant to complete the 12 inch water line around the city, thus increasing water volume and pressure and providing more adequate water

supply for fire protection.

Councilman Amado Morales objected, saying that he preferred to go after another paving grant. Since remaining unpaved blocks in Floydada probably would not meet the criteria for the block grants and since paving grants are not expected to be funded this year, the council ultimately voted to apply for water funding. A unanimous vote approved a motion by Councilman Frank Breed and seconded by Councilman Wayne Russell.

A survey of city areas involved will be conducted to obtain the necessary information for the grant application. Citizens are urged to co-operate with the surveyor when the survey begins.

The council approved the appointment of Bill R. McMorris & Associates, one of four firms considered, as the consulting engineer for the current paving project and authorized the mayor to sign the agreement for the work. Morales cast a dissenting vote, saying "We need to start checking with other consultants instead of just using the same one."

Attending the session were Mayor Parnell Powell, council members Wayne Russell, Leroy Burns, Ruben Barrientoz, Frank Breed and Amado Morales. Council woman Nancy Willson was absent. Also attending were Jimmie Lou Stewart, Gary Brown, Steve Hale, Connie Galloway, Bobby Welborn, James Hale, Jim Green, Frank Morales Sr., Frank Morales, Jr. and son, Tino Morales, and the Hesperian reporter.

Board adopts 1989-90 budget

Meeting in special called session on Monday, July 17, the board of trustees of Floydada Independent School District adopted a budget for the 1989-90 school year. The newly approved budget includes an estimated \$4,781,869.00 in revenues from all sources and an estimated \$4,895,463.55 in expenditures. The difference will be made up from reserve funds now in district coffers.

The budget includes \$917,461.00 for operation of the High School, \$428,841.00 for the Junior High, \$750,360.00 for A. B. Duncan Elementary, \$472,222.00 for R. C. Andrews Elementary, \$525,497.00 for the administration office, \$174,290.55 for

transportation and \$408,305.00 for utilities and maintenance. Other expenses include \$290,848.00 for Chapter I regular and \$206,670.00 for Chapter I migrant, \$246,500.00 for special education, \$200,991.00 for compensatory education and \$58,992.00 for air conditioning. Items common to all schools are estimated to cost \$214,486.00.

Attending the brief session were Superintendent Jerry Cannon, administrative assistant Jimmie Collins, board members Charlene Brown, Cyndiann Williams, John Campbell and Adolfo Garcia, John Doerschuk, Michael Doerschuk, and the Hesperian reporter.

On July 14 a domestic disturbance call was reported from the labor camp. Police responded and after taking complaints the case will be turned over to child welfare.

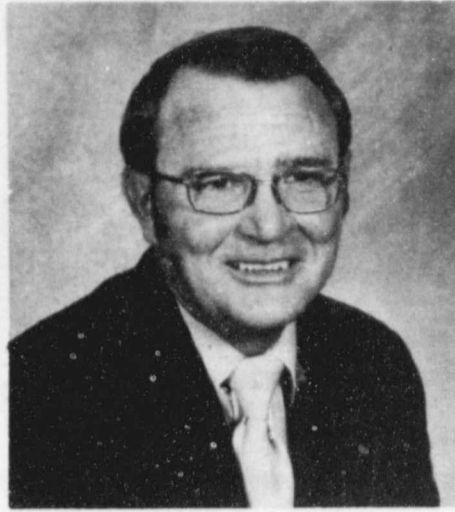

Floydada sales tax rebates continue to rise during the second quarter of 1989

Cities throughout the area received rebate checks from the state comptroller's office for their participation in the one percent levy on sales made by local businesses.

Checks totaling \$68.7 million were mailed last Monday, July 10, to the 939 cities currently imposing the local sales tax, according to the comptroller's office. Another \$6.9 million was allocated to counties that have elected to collect a one-half percent county sales tax. Floyd County does not levy this tax and received no rebate.

Floydada received a rebate of \$6,459.91 for July. This is down by 10.69% from the \$7,233.19 rebate received in July 1988. The city has received rebates totaling \$63,252.22 in 1989. The 1988 total at this time was \$57,381.79, making the year to date total 10.23% ahead of last year.

Lockney received a rebate of \$2,937.88 this month. This represents an increase of 14.93% over the \$2,556.13 for the same period in 1988. The city's rebates for 1989 now totals \$41,927.72, an increase of 53.98% over the \$27,228.98 received at this time last year.

July checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in May and reported to the comptroller's office by June 20. Area cities receiving rebates, the amount of their rebates and percentage of change are listed below.

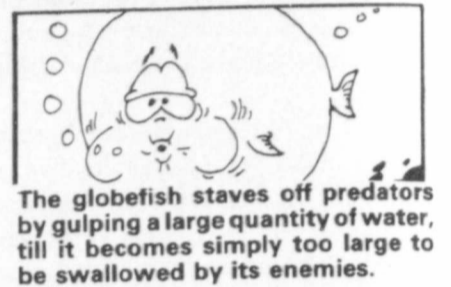

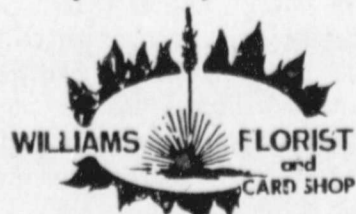
He married Dora L. Rawls on January 26, 1969, in Dougherty, Texas.

Sunday services are at 10:30 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Week night services are at

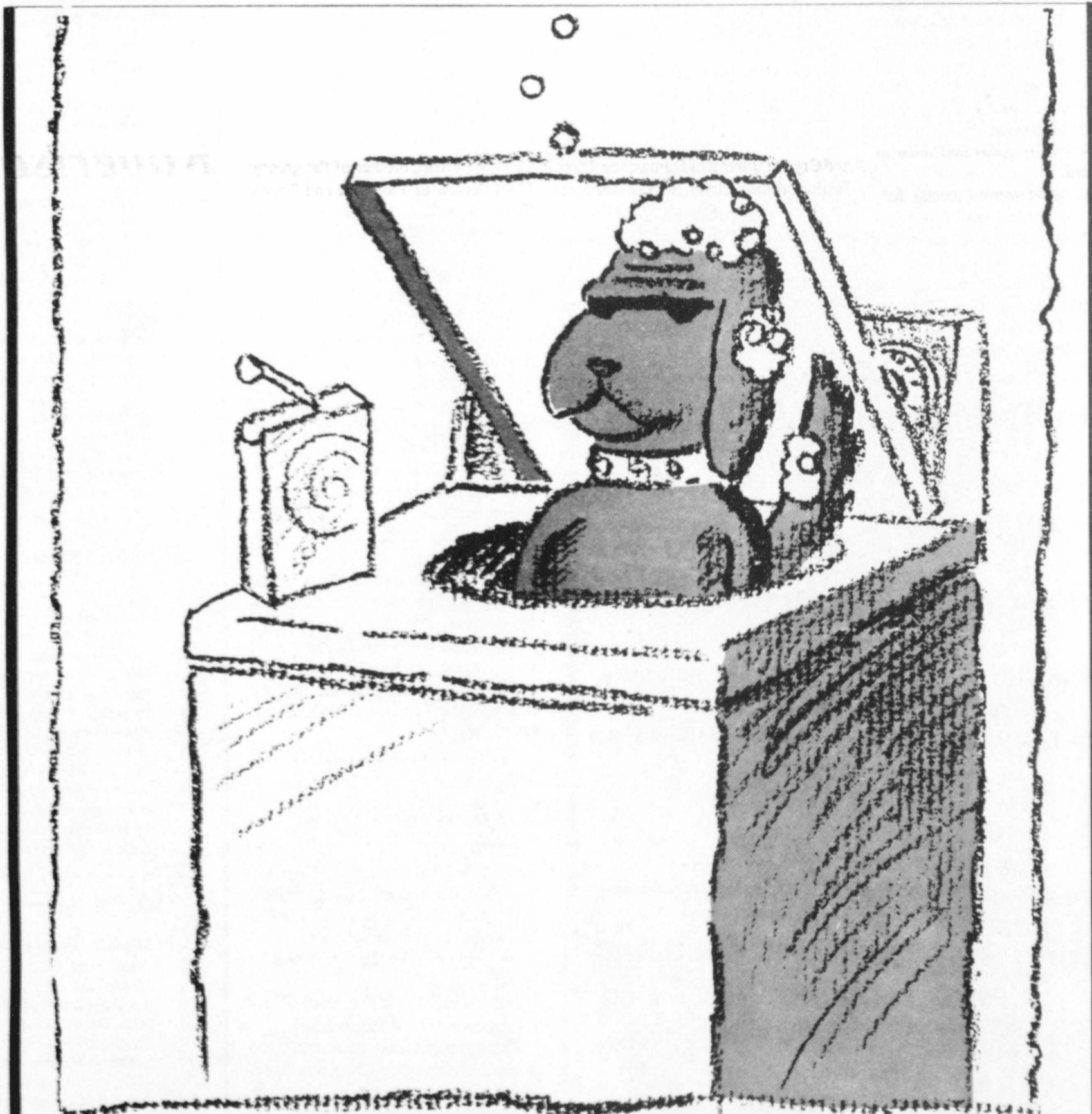


