## School To Open Aug. 27

**FARM CROPS** IN Parmer County are much better than average at this point of the growing season, according to all indications.

In spite of some nagging problems to some crops, this year's overall crop outlook is the best it has been in a number of years.

The corn is looking great, and has been helped considerably by some timely rains, as well as a cooler than usual summer. Corn is known to suffer when the temperature hits the 100-degree mark for a consistent period, and so far this summer our area has been spared that type of weather.

Sugar beets and maize are both looking great. Boosted by the super rains of this week, a lot of dryland maize should have enough moisture to make a good crop. One more late-season rain would insure a super dryland crop year.

The cotton crop, where the herbicide drift has not affected the crop, is looking especially good. Although fields in some areas have been drastically affected, this problem has luckily escaped many of the farmers.

The herbicide drift situation is developing into quite a deal. Outside of the farm strike and the American Agriculture Movement, nothing has happened in the past 20 years to focus such attention on an agricultural situation, particularly in our county.

It looks as though there have been enough affected farmers--and acres--that the growers may be able to get something done, and eliminate this unfortunate problem.

As stated elsewhere in this issue, the farmers are making plans to file a class-action lawsuit in conjunction with their damage.

The Texas Department of Agriculture certainly has made the herbicide problem in Parmer County's 1984 cotton crop a top priority. They have moved in with all the man-power they could muster, and have gone about the business of documenting the situation.

Even the CBS-TV news team, which was in the county last week to film a news segment for television, was impressed by the scientific approach the TDA crews and officials have made toward the situation.

We've never had an agricultural situation which has commanded so much outside news attention, that we can recall offhand. The area's daily papers, television stations, and even the media from the Dallas area has been here to find out what was happening.

No doubt the interest of the outside and national media was whetted by the fact that the problem concerns the environment, which makes bigger news in some circles. Half of the ingredients of "Agent Orange" is 2,4-D.

The legal team which is bidding to handle the litigation on behalf of the area's cotton crop was successful in securing a settlement on behalf of those affected by the Agent Orange.

**WE HEARD THIS** item on the news this week, and thought it was pretty typical of some folks:

Seems that the town of Elk City, Oklahoma recently had some new motels added, during the oil boom. Now that the oil situation has leveled out, they may have more new rooms than they need.

One motel owner, hoping to attract tourists on Interstate 40, erected a billboard, which says something like: "Elk City, Oklahoma--400 motel rooms--Get in bed with Us!"

Naturally, one of the town's purists thought the wording was a big "suggestive." To which, the originator of the billboard said perhaps they should change the wording to read: "Elk City--a town of 12,000 smiling faces and one old sour-puss."

School will begin in Friona on Monday, August 27, according to Superintendent Tom Jarboe.

High School students will pre-register on Friday, August 24.

Students who are new to the system are asked to contact their respective principal beginning August 15. "It is very important, and will save a lot of time and effort if the new students will do this," Jarboe said.

Also, the superintendent reminded of the time change, with classes beginning at 8:20 a.m. and running until 3:45 p.m. Buses will run from 20 to 25 minutes earlier than usual, he said.

# Farmland Saturated By Four-Inch Rainfall

One of the best August rains ever witnessed in the Friona area was still falling at the Star's press time on Friday.

Farmers were all smiles, as many were in the process of giving their crops one more watering, or were ready to start. The savings, measured in natural gas or electricity for the irrigation wells, could be in the millions of dollars.

It has been estimated that on the average, it costs a farmer about \$100 per day for each irrigation motor he runs. When you multiply this by the number of wells and farms in the area, the rain will be as good as a price increase for the crops.

The rain started at about mid-week, and the amounts have increased as the week went along.

Official measurements in Friona (which are made daily by Rodney Dunnam, at 7 a.m.), showed the following: .80 inch Wednesday, August 8; 1.18 inches Thursday, and 2.05 inches Friday, for a grand total of 4.03 inches for the period.

**According to Friona Cablevision, an additional .24 inch had fallen between the hours of 7 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. Friday morning, at their transmitter site just north of town.**

Virtually all of the rainfall received this week has been beneficial.

The current rains will benefit all agricultural crops with the exception of vegetables, some of which were being harvested. Cotton farmers will be wanting it to clear off and get hot again. Otherwise, the ideal rainfall could boost the area's crop yields to their best potential in a number of years.

On Tuesday, parts of the area had a good rain which was not as general as the rains of later in the week. Jim Dixon, who lives in the Rhea Community, said he had an inch of rain Tuesday morning.

That night, Friona received its first good rain of the week, eight tenths of an inch, but the areas south of town still were not as fortunate.

However, on Wednesday and Thursday, the entire area has registered good rainfall.

Dixon said Friday morning he had received 2.9 inches for the week, and it had all fallen beneficially.

"We have some of the best maize we've ever had, and this will be enough moisture to make the crop," Dixon said. He added that the good, soaking rains would also give farmers in that area moisture on which to plant their wheat, and that planting would begin "as soon as it's dry enough."

Although most crops have received about as much moisture as will be beneficial at the present time, Dixon pointed out that the grassland will take more moisture, giving the grass a better foundation. This will bode well for cattle grazing.

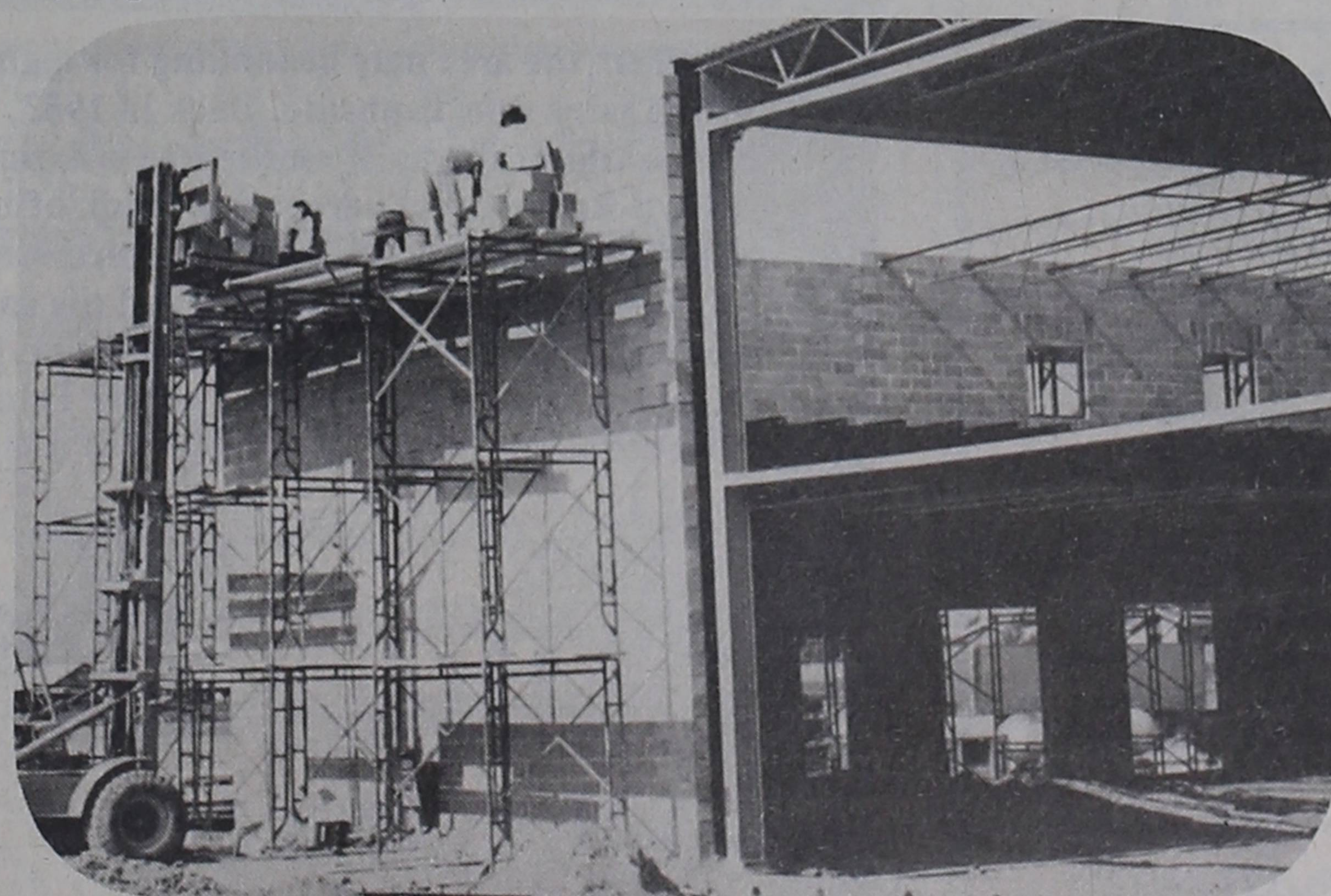
Some of our rainfall reports will be out of date, due to the continuing nature of the current rainy spell. Some reports we compiled on Thursday were: Mike Riethmayer, an inch of moisture; Dickie Garner, 1.3 inches; Ricky Rector, 2.9 inches; and Johnny Tannahill, 1.5 inches.

Rainfall reports gathered Friday morning indicated the following amounts:

Tom O'Brian said he had received seven inches of rain during the week; Raymond Milner reported five inches at his place; Fern Barnett reported four inches and Jayson Grimsley's total was 3.5 inches.

Grace Whitefield said she had measured 3½ inches the past two days, and that the big lake had the most water it has had this year. J.B. Buske said he had measured 3.6 inches, and Joe Wilhelm had 4.15 inches.

A flash flood warning had been issued by the National Weather Service on Thursday which included Parmer and Castro counties, but fortunately for the immediate area, the rains have come at a leisurely pace.

# FRIONA FLASHBACKS

## 55 YEARS AGO--AUG. 2, 1929

The largest wheat harvest the Friona country has ever experienced is now practically over with the exception of perhaps a few scattered fields. An inquiry revealed that 470 cars of wheat had been shipped from Friona on Tuesday, with an average load of 1550 bushels.

Within the next few weeks Friona can boast of one of the largest and most up-to-date picture show houses in this part of the state and our local produce merchant, H.P. Eberling, will have sole control of the business.

## 45 YEARS AGO--AUG. 10, 1934

It appears that no one knows for a certainty whether or not Federal Highway 60, which is also State Highway 33, will be hard surfaced across Parmer County or even any part of, and should this be definitely known, no one knows when it will be done. One of the hopeful facts is that the portion of State No. 7 that crosses Bailey County is receiving considerable attention and State Highway Engineer Guy R. Johnston of Lubbock, has written to Mayor Reeve, sending him a copy of a resolution and asking that it be adopted by the city and incorporated in its records.

## 45 YEARS AGO--AUG. 11, 1939

On Thursday night of last week as Miss Rachel Terry, accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Rosa Terry, and her brother, John, were enroute to visit friends in East Texas they met with a serious mishap on the highway between Paducah and Childress. A careless driver ran into her car and it turned over, landing in the bar pit at the side of the highway. None of the passengers were seriously injured, but the mother received a few cuts and bruises about her face.

## 40 YEARS AGO--AUG. 4, 1944

Citizens of the Lakeview School District, southeast of town, have

made consolidation with the Friona Independent School District, and a petition has been filed calling for an election in both districts to establish the fact as to whether or not the consolidation may be made.

New restrictions on farm building, announced this week, reflected the continued seriousness of the lumber supply situation and promised considerable tightening of building regulations for farmers. The County AAA Committee, must act on all applications for farm building materials and certificates approved by the committee can then be submitted to dealers.

## 30 YEARS AGO--AUG. 5, 1954

Superintendent Dalton Caffey announced this week that the Friona schools will re-open September 1, which leaves less than four weeks for vacation time.

The Friona School building under construction is considerably ahead of schedule, according to Dalton Caffey, superintendent. The contract was originally let for 180 days completion period, but if no material or labor shortages occur, it should be completed in 150-160 days. Brick-laying will be finished sometime next week.

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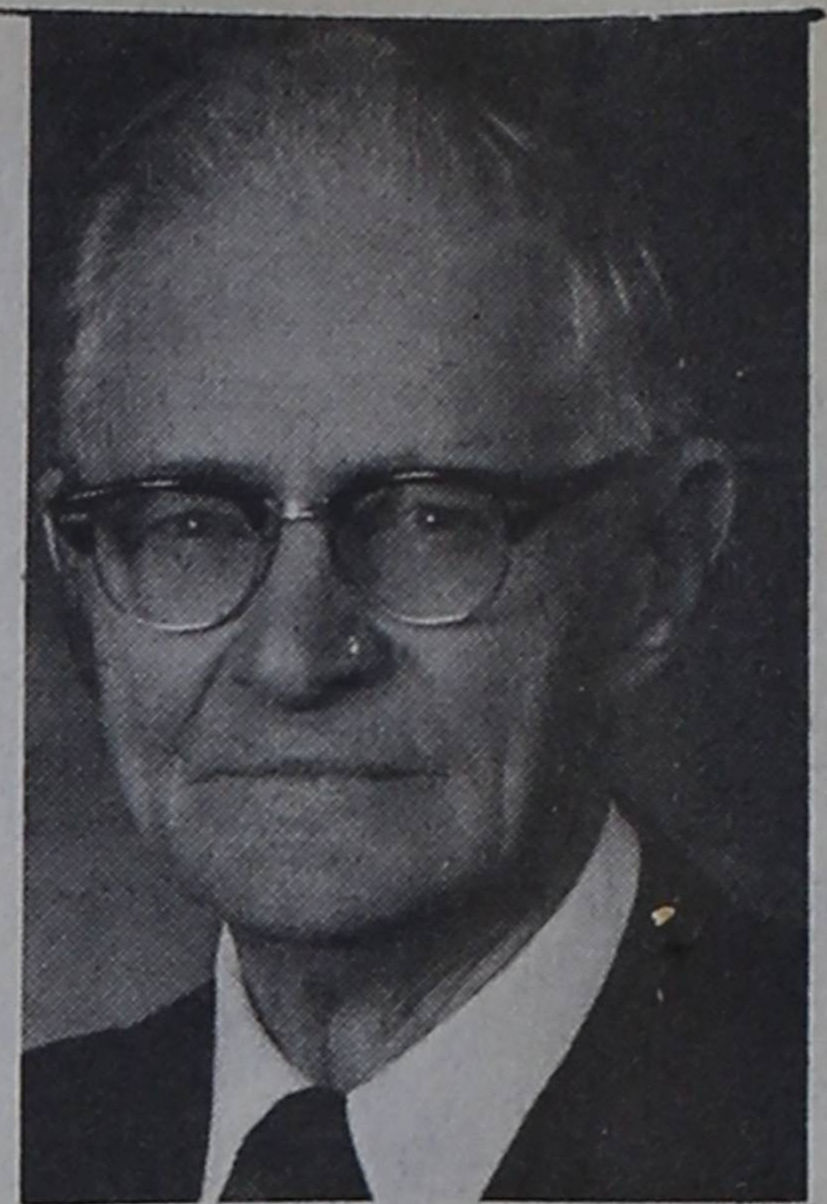
## Rites Held Sunday For S.B. Gowens

The entry fee is \$75 per team entered, and must be paid by August 15.

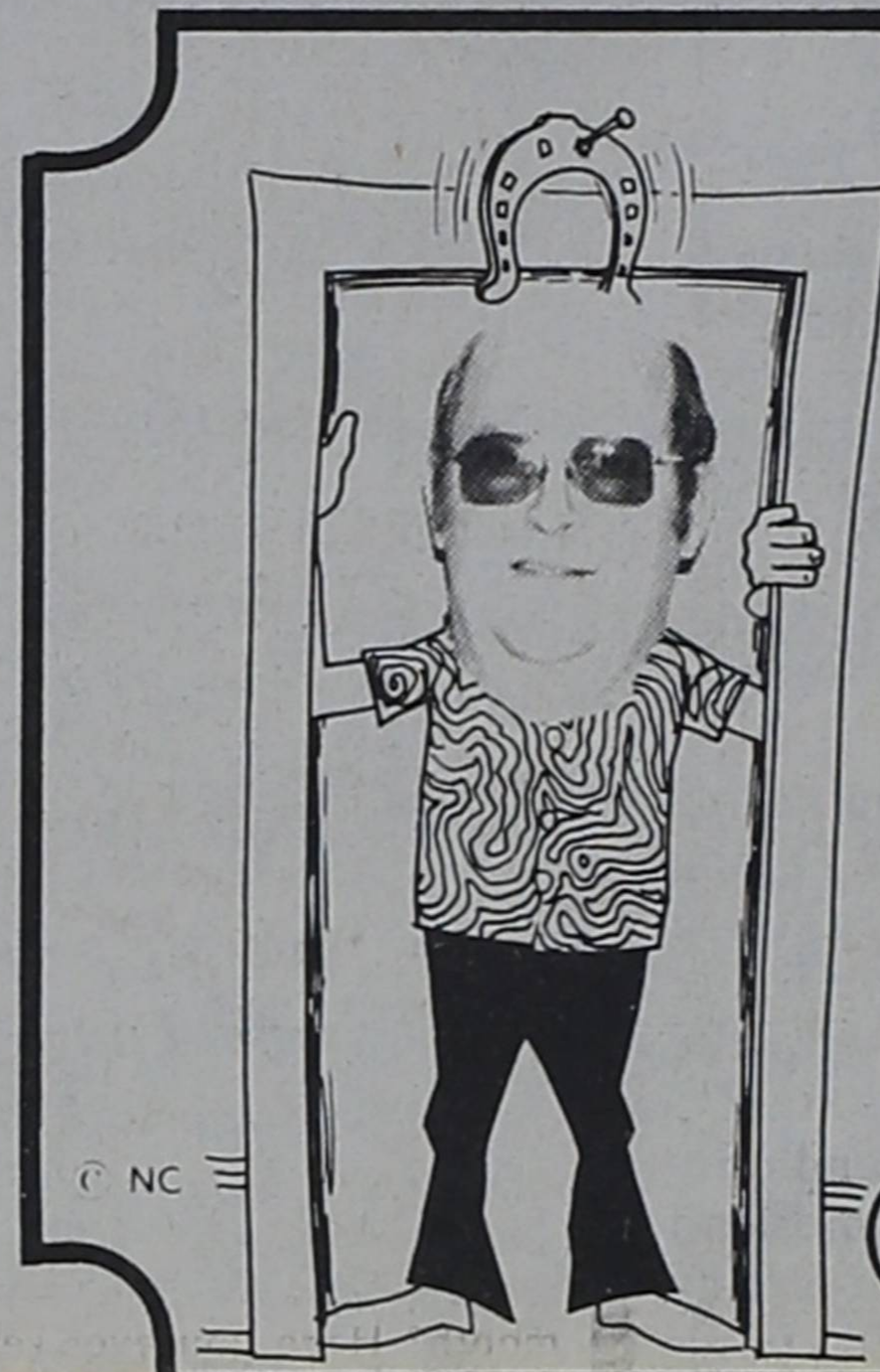

## Bangs Test Explained

An explanation of the brucellosis two-test requirement for movement of some classes of cattle from the Class C Area of Texas has been issued by Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission.

Classes of cattle affected are bulls and non-vaccinated female cattle over 18 months of age moving out of the Class C Area of Texas.

"Bulls and non-vaccinated female cattle over 18 months of age moving out of the Class C Area of Texas must have two consecutive negative tests at least 60 days apart unless going to slaughter or quarantined feedlot. The last test may be conducted at a livestock market. Vaccinated female cattle may move on one negative test," Dr. Holcombe explained.

There is one exception to this two-test requirement as follows:

Bulls and non-vaccinated female cattle over 18 months of age from a herd which have been together for 120 days or more: entire herd must be tested negative; individuals can move out of the herd on this test for a period of up to 30 days. For 11 months thereafter, animals may

move with one additional negative test within 30 days before movement. This test may be made at the market.

Animals moving under this exception must be accompanied by a written statement signed by the owner and accredited veterinarian or by other documentation which will establish that such animals originated from a herd which have been together for 120 days or more before movement.

A permit for movement from the C Area for this exception must be obtained. A request for the permit may be made to Dr. E.S. Cox, federal veterinarian in charge, Austin, telephone 512/482-5551.

Implementation of this regulation has been slowed due to dry weather resulting in few cattle being sent to West Texas.

Enforcement will be expanded when normal movement of cattle into that area occurs beginning in September.

"Despite the dry weather, Texas must substantially adhere to federal regulations so that this state can remain in compliance and continue its progress in control of brucellosis," Dr. Holcombe said.

Michael placed second in the poles and third in the barrels.

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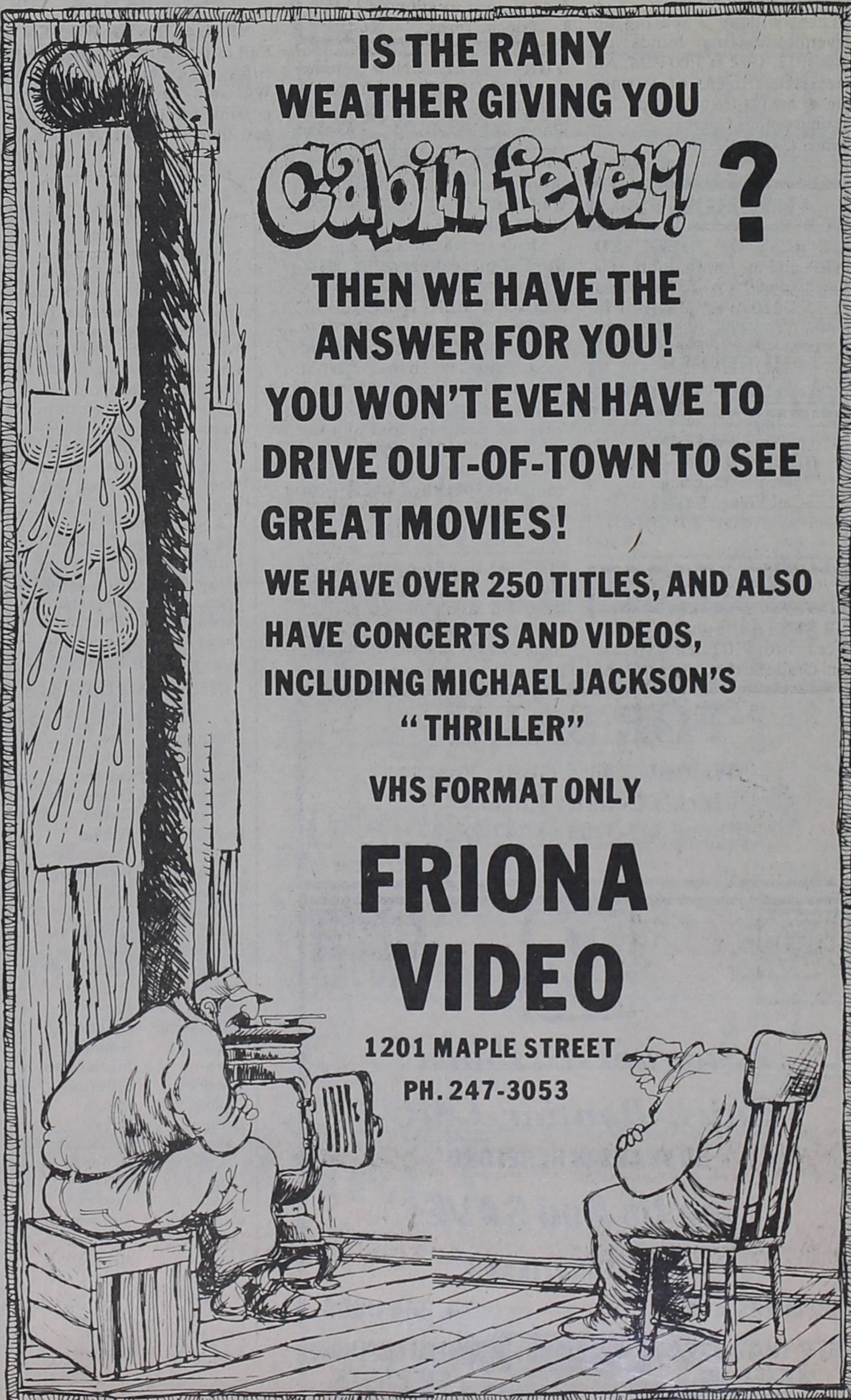

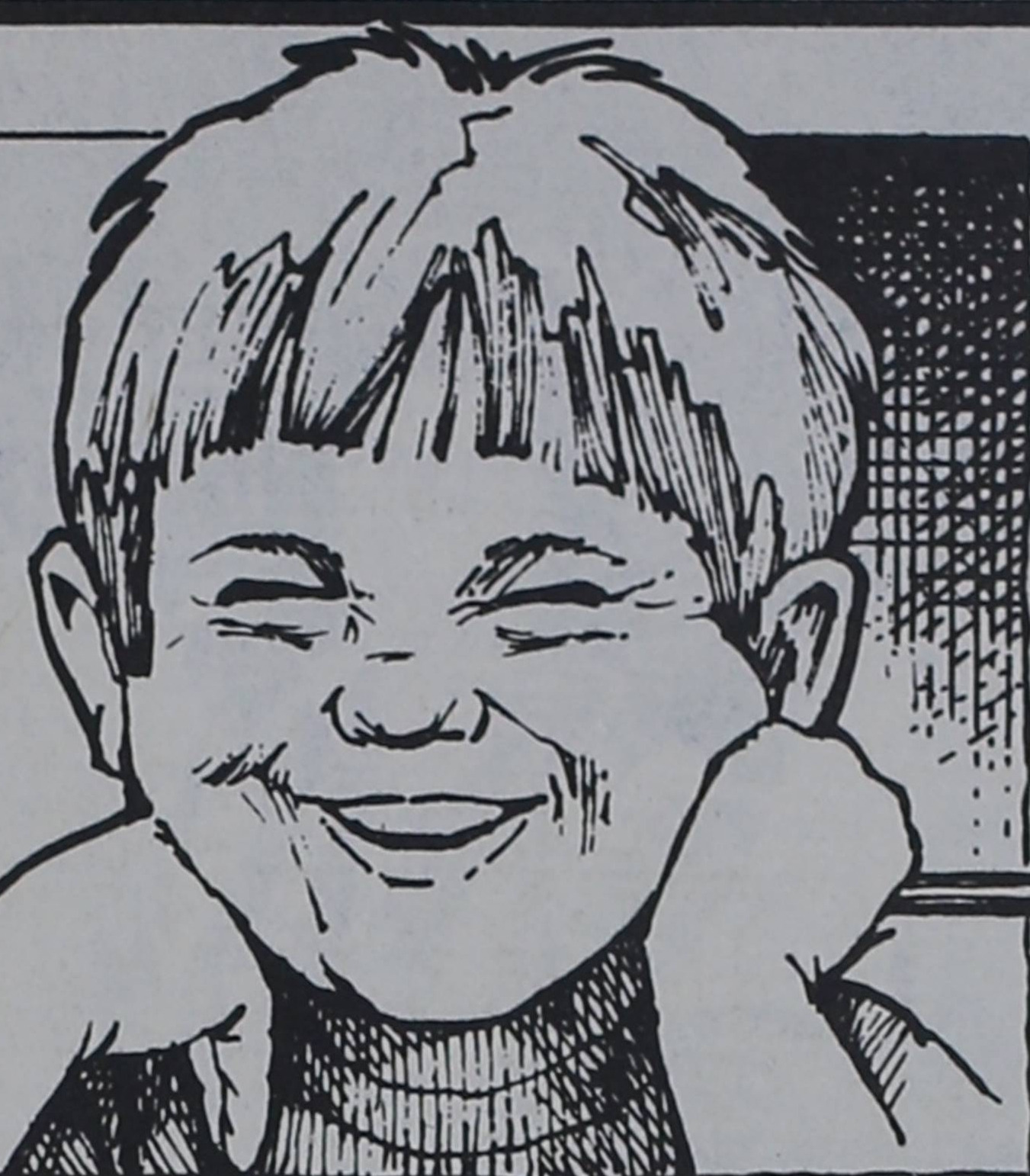

## City Gets Sales Tax

The City of Friona's monthly sales tax check for the month of August amounted to \$11,542.95, it was reported by state comptroller Bob Bullock this week.

The August check for the city was down somewhat from the total of \$13,663 it had received for the similar period in 1983, but the city's net payments for the calendar year continue to run significantly ahead of those for 1983.

Bullock said that bookkeeping changes which were a part of last year's tax deadline speedups made the current payments smaller than that of the previous August in virtually every Texas city. However, the yearly comparisons should be true, and they reflect healthy growth, according to Bullock.

Since the payments are based on sales made through June, the yearly totals amount to one-half of the calendar year.

The checks mailed out on August 3 were for taxes collected on sales made in June and the second quarter, and reported to the comptroller by July 20.

For the calendar year, the city has received checks totalling \$68,625.51. This is up from the total at the same time in 1983 of \$64,051.81, an increase of 7.14 per cent.

Friona's sales tax check amounted to 67 per cent of the total which went to three Parmer County municipalities, whose combined checks for August were \$17,239.34.

For the year, the county's three cities have received \$101,203.91, compared to \$95,579.08 a year ago, a net increase of 5.89 per cent.

Houston received the largest check, \$17.1 million, bringing Houston's yearly total to \$99.3 million. Dallas' check was for \$11.7 million. Dallas has received \$66.9 million so far this year.

San Antonio's check was for \$6.1 million, a 6.1 per cent increase over the July 1983 payment. Austin received \$4.3 million, boosting that city's total for the year to \$24.1 million. The Fort Worth payment was \$3.5 million.

Midland received \$911,000, bringing the yearly total to \$5.3 million, ahead of last year's total through August by 10.7 per cent.

Bullock also sent checks to the four Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston MTA received \$19.5 million, bringing the total for 1984 to \$114.6 million. DART's check was for \$15.9 million. San Antonio's VIA payment was \$3.3 million, and the Fort Worth Transit Authority received \$799,000.

# TDA Completes Area Field Work

Nothing new had developed this week on the herbicide drift damage situation with the area's cotton crop.

Al Hernandez, administrator for the enforcement section, TDA, and his crew of Texas Department of Agriculture field workers, completed their field inspections as of Thursday morning and moved their mobile office, planning to return to Austin.

Due to the extreme wet weather, Hernandez decided it best to close the local mobile office and conclude the record work in Austin.

He said that the TDA field workers had inspected 116 complaints by Parmer County farmers. "Some of the complaints may have listed up to six or seven fields of cotton, so this really involves more fields than the number indicates," he said.

Hernandez said that his employees had also finished checking the applicator records in Parmer, Deaf Smith, Curry and Roosevelt counties.

"We will be completing the work on our map of the area, and will be making comparisons with our field inspections and the records showing where (2,4-D) applications have been made," Hernandez said.

The TDA official said he was certain that the affected acreage would exceed 21,000.

Hernandez also said that once the record work is completed, the cases will be taken before a review committee. The committee will review each complaint, on a case-by-case basis, and then decide upon a course of action.

When the investigation is completed, Hernandez said that the Department of Agriculture will call a press conference, at which time the findings of its investigation of the area's cotton crop will be made known.

Hernandez said that those still needing to register a complaint in reference to herbicide damage may do so by calling the district office of the TDA in Amarillo, at 358-7285. They also may call their ginner.

D.L. Carmichael, a member of the five-member committee appointed last week to work on details of litigation in conjunction with the damage, said the committee is basically waiting on the results from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Meanwhile, local attorneys are scheduled to meet with Benton Musslewhite of Houston to discuss the proposed lawsuit. Musslewhite's law firm was instrumental in affecting a settlement in the "Agent Orange" case. Since Agent Orange is composed of 50 per cent 2,4-D, Musslewhite felt he had considerable expertise in this field.

On Monday, August 13, a petition is to be presented before the Deaf Smith County Commissioners, asking them to outlaw the use of butylester forms of 2,4-D during the growing season. Representatives of the TDA, as well as Deaf Smith County cotton growers, are expected to attend the meeting.

The butylester form is thought to be among the most volatile

forms of 2,4-D, and is supposed to be apt to be carried along on moist air for "30 to 40 miles."

## Grid Workouts Begin Monday

Football practice begins for the prospective 1984 Friona Chieftains on Monday, a sure sign that summer is about to give way to fall.

Coach Tommy Moss said that the grid hopefuls will begin two a day workouts on Monday, with sessions scheduled at 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Shoes and equipment were checked out beginning Wednesday of this past week, although some of the gridders had not made it by the athletic department, probably due to the heavy rain in the rural areas.

"If you have not checked out your gear, please be there by 8:30 a.m. Monday to do this," Moss said.

The Friona coach said he was expecting around 112 boys to report for football, from the ninth grade on up. About 70 or 72 of these will be freshmen and sophomores, with close to an equal division in these classes.

The boys will work out in shorts through next Thursday. Then on Friday, they will put on their pads for the first time.

Friona's first scrimmage session is Friday, August 24, with Springlake-Earth visiting. A second scrimmage is tentatively scheduled against Olton, details to be worked out.

Coach Moss is facing a rebuilding year, off his team which strongly challenged for a playoff berth last fall, missing by the slightest of margins.

Only one full-time offensive

starter is returning for the Chieftains, but that returner is a good one--running back Alfredo Mata, who will be Friona's top offensive weapon in 1984.

Also back are part-time starters Ben Neelley, a split-end, and Daniel Gowens, a lineman.

On defense, big tackle Jose Samarron is a returning starter, joined by John Aguirre, who was the team's leading pass thief on defense in 1983, and part-time starter Gowens at linebacker.

"I think our line should be all right," said Moss, indicating that the defense might not have been hurt as badly by graduation. Matt Osborn, who missed last year due to an injury, will be back, and this should be a big boost to the team.

Brent Gatlin is a prospect who moved back to Friona during the summer. He is a 165-pound junior who will vie for a fullback spot on offense and linebacker on defense.

Coaches are once again picking Littlefield as the pre-season favorites in district play. Muleshoe is rated second, and Idalou, new to this district, is rated third. Then, the Chieftains are picked fourth. This isn't a bad pre-season rating considering the losses the team had by graduation.

However, Moss is looking forward to a good season. "I think we'll have a successful season. And, looking at the numbers coming up on the freshman and sophomore teams, the next couple of years after this can only be better," says the fourth-year Chieftain mentor.

## COMBEST COMMENTS

### Working for Fair and Effective Farm Policy

Last month I was invited to Dallas to join a group of farm representatives in a meeting with Agriculture Secretary John Block. Secretary Block's stated purpose in calling the meeting was to hear our recommendations on rewriting farm policy for 1985.

Tommy Fondren, representing the Texas Association of Cotton Producer Organizations, spoke about federal laws that increase our costs of production, laws that foreign producers do not have to contend with, and that hinder our ability to compete in the world market.

S. M. True of Plainview, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, told how important exports are to the future of America's farmers.

And I presented six proposals to help make future agricultural policy more fair and effective

for the people of the 19th district.

In some ways I was encouraged by the meeting in Dallas. This was the fifth regional meeting and others are planned before the policy is written next November.

These "listening sessions," as Block calls them, are a step in the right direction for the administration. Listening to farmers is essential to building a foundation for good farm policy.

But there was something the secretary said at the meeting that concerned me as I'm sure it did many others there. Block said the meeting should "help us understand why everyone can't always have everything he wants." This made me wonder if he'd fully understood the needs we presented.

The common thread that ran through the statements of almost

every representative there was that agricultural policy should be fair to all farmers. West Texas farmers don't need the government's help to understand that "everyone can't always get everything he wants." We don't want or expect anything more than we deserve from Washington—an effective agricultural policy that realizes farmers must make a profit, a policy that gives all farmers a fair shake on government programs.

In my closing statement I invited Secretary Block to conduct a similar hearing in the South Plains area. I did this to give him the opportunity to hear from the many outstanding farmers who could not attend the Dallas meeting and to let him know we intend to make sure he keeps the promise he made to us that day: "In the end, we will all get together and write the farm legislation."

This law applies whether you are meeting the bus or whether you are going in the same direction as the bus. It also applies inside the city limit as well as outside the city limit. The only exception to the law is that drivers on the other side of a divided highway (roadways separated by a physical median) are not required to stop. Motorists who fail to stop for a school bus could be fined up to \$200.00.

State law requires drivers on the same roadway as a school bus that has stopped to load or unload school children: to stop and remain stopped until one of three things happen. The bus driver

## Reagan Releases Housing Funds

A bill signed by President Reagan July 2 enhances the use of funds for the single-family housing program operated by the U.S. Department of Agricultural Farmers Home Administration, J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State Director, said recently. No additional funds are involved.

The new law clears up the division of loan funds that must be allotted to "very" low-income applicants and to those in the next higher bracket, low-income.

The earlier congressional requirement that FmHA housing loans must be made so that 40 per cent were constantly going to very-low-income people has been replaced so that now up to 40 per cent of the funds will be used for very-low-income families, Futch said. "This means that loan applications from both low and very-low-income rural applicants can be processed at the same time without regard to some arbitrary

relationship between the two groups."

The new law divides available loan funds into two amounts, up to 40 per cent for the very-low-income and the remainder for low-income borrowers.

"That will revive our program substantially," Futch said. "We will now be able to process applications for both very-low and low-income people."

Very-low-income is defined as not more than 50 per cent of an area's median income. The low-income ceiling is 80 per cent of the same income base.

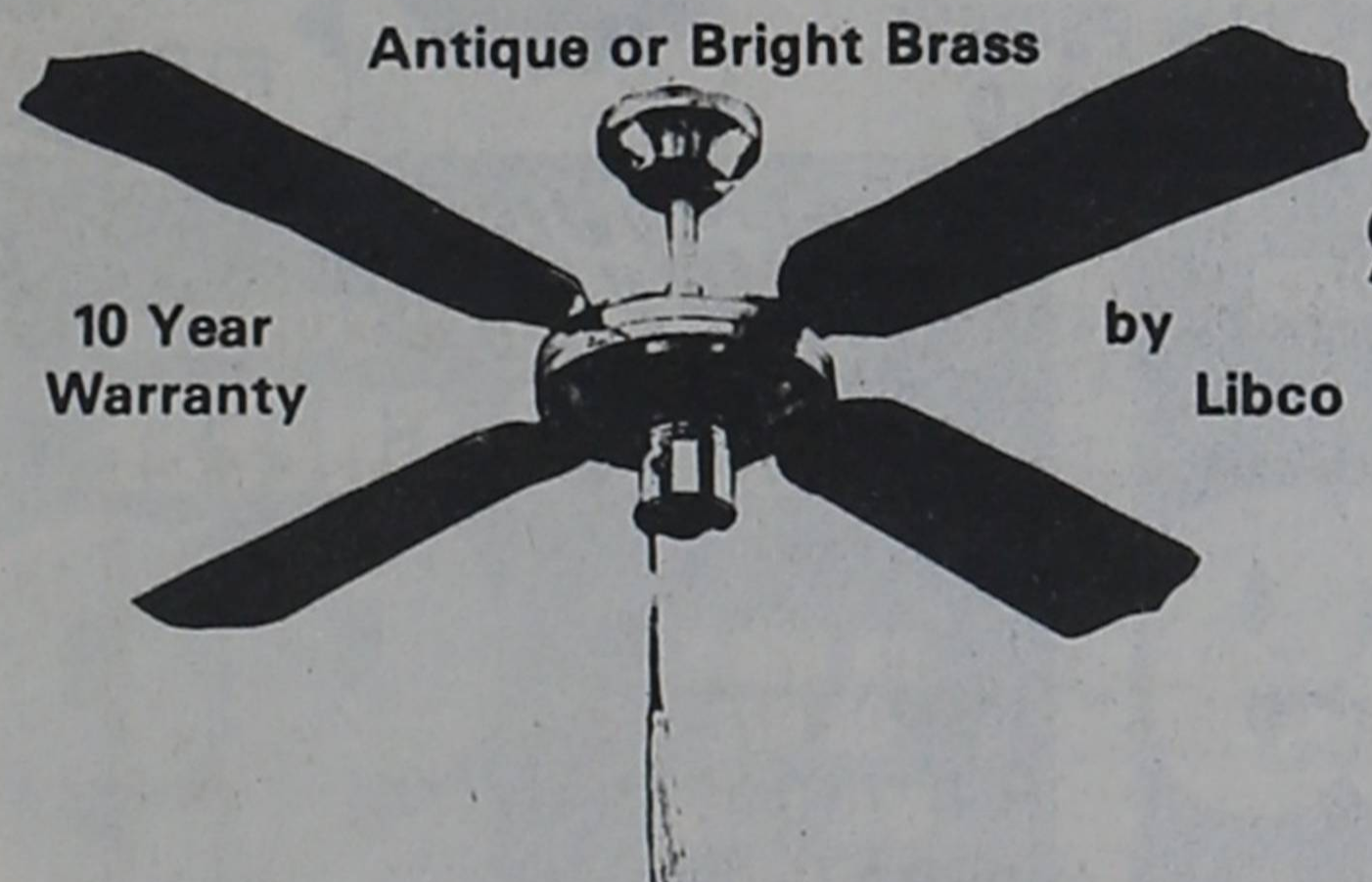

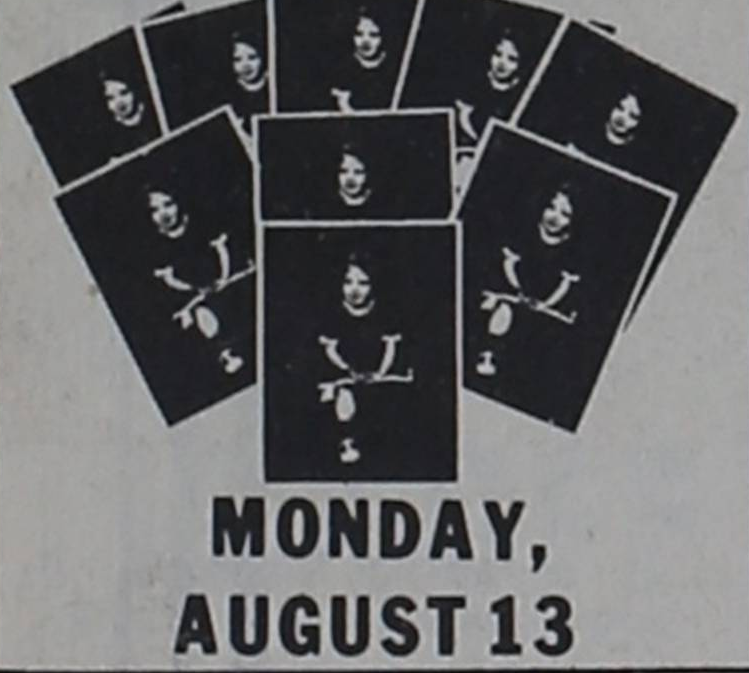

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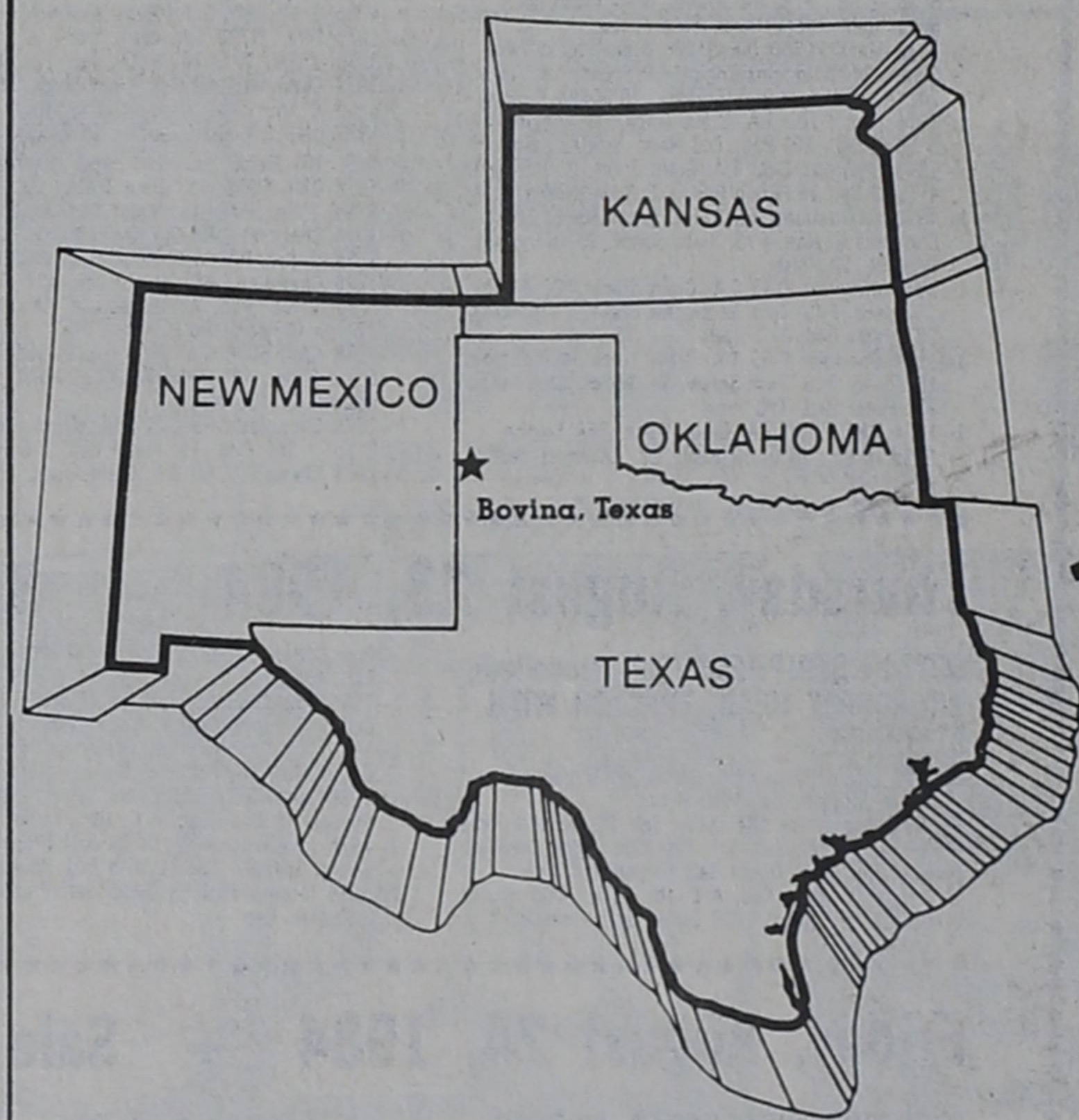
