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

May Qualify For **Higher Payments**

People who continue to work, or return to work after applying for social security benefits may quality for higher payments because of additional earnings, R. R. Tuley Jr., district manager of the Abilene social security office, announced today.

"The Social Security Administration will use its electronic computers to determine whether recent earnings will increase benefit amounts," according to Tuley. "If so, the increase will be made automatically. In the past it has been necessary for a beneficiary to file an application to have his benefit amount refigured. Now the application is not necessary."

Tuley emphasized that this change should encourage people to file an application for benefits before they become 65. Such and application can be filed as months before early as three one's 65th birthday.

An additional and very important reason is the fact that applicants who file applications during the three month period before they reach 65 will have medicare protection at the earliest possible date. A delay in filing would, in turn, delay the date their medicare protection would become effective.

Persons born before March 2. 1901 must enroll for medicare before May 31, 1966 or be barred from such enrollment until October, 1967, he conluded.





During Texas' first century of oil production (29 billion barrels), Callahan County has contributed approximately 50.4 million barrels, its record dating from 1923.

The latest U. S. Bureau of Mines figures (1964) show Call-ahan County produced more than 2.3 million barrels of crude oil valued at \$6.7 million; and 832 million cubic feet of natural gas worth about \$103,000. The 1965 output would be approximately the same, preliminary estimates indicate.


Callahan County ranks 11th among the Texas counties producing oil and gas.

Payrolls, distribution of royalty checks to local landowners, new drilling ventures and tax payments are some of the way by which oil and gas revenu Parents will be responsible for are injected into the Callaha County economy.

One of the most important "crops" harvested by Texas ranchers, farmers and other landowners is the royalty interest from oil and gas operations. These payments are at the rate of \$856,000 a year in Callahan County. Many more thousands a year ar epaid in lease rentals and bonuses on acreage which operators hope will some day yield oil and gas.

In addition to sharing the tax load for local schools and levels of government, oil and gas producers and royalty owners send some \$317,000 a year to the Etate Treasurer in severfor \$310,000; gas, \$7,000. Several schools in this county depend on the oil and gas property taxes for a sizeable part of the annuall locally-raised budgets Example: Eula, 64%.


