

Scores Improve In **Star Football Event**

Given a respite by the absence of a tie game on the contest lineup, E.V. Thompson turned in the best score of the 1983 contest season in winning the eighth week of the Friona Star's annual football predicting contest.

Thompson tallied 19 correct games to capture the weekly first prize of \$10.00.

The contest also caught our schedule-maker in a slight error, as we had Atlanta playing the wrong New York team on game number 15. In order to treat everyone fairly, all contestants were given this game as a right answer, so for the first time in seven weeks, contestants had one automatic "right" game, rather than one automatically wrong.

Isacc Briones of Hereford won second place, after missing the Friona-Dimmitt score by just five points. Briones picked the Chieftains to win, 24-14, missing Friona's score by just one point and the Bobcats' score by four. Briones receives \$6.00.

A tie for fourth place developed between Damon George and Wayne Amstutz of Hereford. Both contestants picked 18 games correctly, and were each 17 points off on their tie-breaker score.

City's Tax Receipts

Show Gains

Parmer County received a total of \$7,287.32 from the Comptroller of Public Accounts in sales tax payments for the month of October. This was an increase of almost

\$1,000 from the figure of \$6,384.65 for the comparable period a year ealier, and brought the county's totals closer to the totals for 1982 through a nine-month period.

The City of Friona received \$5,291.68 for its share of the sales tax. This was up from the figure of \$4,121.98 a year earlier.

For the year, Friona has now received \$73,893.75. This compares to \$75,038.79 for the same period a year ago, and is down by 1.5 per cent.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Motorists and parents need to take precautions to protect children and prevent disasters this Halloween."

He stated, "I would suggest house or block parties for the kids. Children will invade many neighborhoods in spite of past unfavorable incidents, and he offered the following safety rules to help protect the kids."

Cawthon said, "Small children should be accompanied by older children or adults and trick or treating be confined to their own neighborhood. Costumes should be light in color, short enough to prevent tripping and non-flammable. Facial make-up should be used instead of masks or hoods that restrict vision."

Trick or Treaters should not eat unwrapped candy until the parents inspect it and fruit should be washed and cut into small pieces to be sure nothing has been placed inside it.

Children should be told to look in all directions before crossing streets and to walk, never run. A flashlight carried by a child can serve as a warning to motorists and children should be instructed to use sidewalks when possible.

Seth Thomason **Is New SPS**



RARE WIN AT DIMMITT Chiefs Down Rival 'Cats

To Stay In 2-AAA Chase

The Friona Chieftains scored an important District 2-AAA win over the Dimmitt Bobcats in Dimmitt last Friday, by the score of 23-10.

The win gave Friona a 2-1 district record, and kept them in the running for a playoff spot in district. It was only the third win for a Friona grid eleven at Dimmitt in the past 21 years. Previous wins had been scored there in 1963 and 1973, so Friona kept its "every ten year" average going.

The first half was a tight, tough battle, before Friona broke the game open in the second half with a rushing attack that left the Bobcats

on one eight-yard strike, then on third and goal from the 15, he spotted Caballero open in the end zone, and rifled a strike which the Chieftain receiver caught while on his knees. The PAT kick was blocked, but Friona had regained the lead at 9-7 with 1:59 left in the half.

Friona drove 72 yards following the second half kickoff, in quick fashion. Fleming provided the big offensive spark, with a 45-yard burst up the middle and down the west sideline to the Dimmitt five.

Two plays later, Morgan scored, and Carthel's kick ran the score to 16-7, only 2:51 into the third quarter.


which was played in near ideal conditions.

frustrated. Friona outscored their hosts, 14-3 during the second half.

Friona's defense played another super game, intercepting two Dimmitt passes, recovering a fumble, and catching Bobcat runners for losses eight times during the course of the game.

It was an interception by Eloy Caballero on the opening series of plays that set up Friona's go-ahead score. Caballero stepped in front of a Woody Glass pass at the 45, and ran it all the way to the Dimmitt eight before he was tackled.

Two plays gained to the Dimmitt two, and on third down, Charlie Veazey's pass was just out of Charlie Morgan's reach in the end zone. Doug Carthel was called on to kick a field goal, which he did. His 22-yard kick gave Friona a 3-0 lead with 8:46 left in the opening period.

Dimmitt drove to the Friona 20 on their next try, but a 37-yard field goal was short and wide.

Later, however, the 'Cats took over following a Friona punt at their 25 yard line and proceeded to drive 75 yards for a touchdown.

The Dimmitt score came on the first play of the second quarter, and gave the hosts a 7-3 lead.

A little later, Friona took over on its own 38, and set sail on a 62-yard scoring drive. The running of Morgan and Reese Fleming sparked the drive. Veazey connected with Caballero

Dimmitt had a drive going at the close of the quarter, getting to the Friona 31. However, a Bobcat runner was separated from the ball by a hard tackle, and Friona took over.

The Chiefs proceeded to drive 69 yards in only five plays. Fleming again provided the big spark. The hard-running fullback raced 42 yards for a touchdown, and Carthel's kick made the score 23-7 with 9:41 left in the game.

Dimmitt drove to the Friona 23, where again the defense held. This time Bobby Nino kicked a 40-yard field goal for Dimmitt to trim the margin to 23-10.

Alfredo Mata returned the kickoff to the Friona 16. He gave the team two consecutive first downs with runs of 16 and 14, as Friona drove to the Dimmitt 21. But on fourth down, a pass fell incomplete, and for only the second time in the half Friona failed to drive for a score whenever they got the ball.

Dimmitt was able to complete a couple of desperation passes toward the end of the game, but on the final play, Troy Crutchfield sacked the Bobcat quarterback for a ten-yard loss, to end the game appropriately for Friona.

The game was played on a wet but good-conditioned turf. The area had received around three inches of rain through Thursday, but the weather cleared in time for Friday's game,

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Social Security Money Will Become Taxable

January, 1984 will bring a change to the Social Security system -- for the first time, Social Security benefits will be subject to income tax under certain conditions. This change is part of the Social Security Amendments of 1983, which are designed to financially strengthen the system.

The taxation of benefits will apply only to those people whose income is more than a certain amount:

--\$25,000 for an individual,

--\$32,000 for a couple filing jointly, and

--Zero for a couple filing separately.

To compute whether or not your countable income is over the base amount, you will need to add:

-- Your adjusted gross income (as shown on your tax return), plus -- Any non-taxable interest income

The amount of your benefits to be included in taxable income will be the lesser of:

--One-half of your Social Security benefits received for the year, or --One-half of the excess of your combined income (adjusted gross income plus one-half of benefits) over the base amount.

People who receive Social Security should keep a record of the amount of each month's check. This record will make it much easier for you or your tax-preparer to compute your 1984 taxes.

This provision is estimated to affect about ten per cent of Social Security beneficiaries in 1984. However, taxes will not be withheld from your Social Security benefits during the year unless you are a nonresident alien receiving Social Security. A free leaflet, "Social Security Strengthened," is available from your local Social Security office; it describes the changes in Social Security brought about by the 1983 Amendments.

The recent cold wave and the fact that November is right around the corner seem to herald the coming of winter.

Here are a few timely hints about cold-related injuries from paramedic Don Spring of Bovina.

A severe and dangerous coldrelated condition is frostbite. This condition is rare in the Panhandle and usually occurs in the elderly person who is outdoors, and for whatever reason is unable to make it back inside to warmth.

"As the tissue, usually in the extremities, freezes, the cells rupture and the blood vessels seal off so there is a double trauma situation present. The cells, deprived of oxygen from the blood, shortly begin to die and the area takes on a dark splotchy blue or black color," Spring said.

"Remember, anyone suffering

frostbite is assumed to be

hypothermic, suffering from low

body temperature. It is vitally

drops below 96° F, you should seek medical help because that person may be suffering hypothermia. Do not attempt car transport of the patient. Hypothermia may become life threatening.

The win extended the JV Chieftains' season record to 3-1-1.



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

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



HUNTERS--TAKE NOTICE!

Q: Why should hunters have their vision checked annually? A: A hunter's decision to squeeze the trigger is influenced primarily by what he "sees," or more especially, "what he thinks he sees." Many hunters are unaware that their vision is defective. They may think they see just fine, while others hesitate to admit they have a problem for fear they must give up their sport. Fortunately, most vision defects can be corrected and there is no need to give up hunting.


Q: Is defective vision really that dangerous?

A: A Minnesota Hunter Casualty study showed that 77 per cent of those who wounded fellow hunters had defective vision--and half of them were not aware of it. Also, it is estimated that as high as 15 per cent of our male population are either color-blind or color-deficient. Of approximately 17 million hunters, 850,000 cannot distinguish color properly, a dangerous threat to fellow huntsmen.

Q: What vision skills are needed to be a safe and successful hunter?

A: Hunting is a sport that requires excellent hand-eye coordination. Reflexes must be fast, and the hunter's eye true if he is to hit his target with any degree of accuracy. He must be able to:

1. Distinguish detail at considerable distance and against
