19-Year-Old Is Held In Shooting

THE YEAR OF 1982 was an especially hard one locally from the standpoint of the loss of a number of longtime residents, including several businessmen, former businessmen and community leaders.

Since our last issue, the community was saddened once again by the death of ElRoy Wilson, longtime owner-manager of Plains Hardware.

For two generations, ElRoy had served the farmers and other residents of the area, first as manager of Friona Consumers, and then later at Plains Hardware and Furniture.

It was our distinct pleasure to have known ElRoy and to have been associated in business with him for a number of years.

Once again, we extend our sympathy to his family.

IT'S NICE TO be missed. Several people called to advise us they had missed their paper last week. That was because we followed our procedure of skipping publication the week after Christmas, as we have for a number of years.

We published a notice to this effect in our Christmas issue, but it must have gone unnoticed by several readers.

AREA RESIDENTS ARE trying to remember when we last received a snow which fell as nicely, and with virtually no drifting, as the one received Christmas week, and was still much in evidence well into the second week after it fell.

There have been other times when the area received as much snow, but most times the snow has drifted, and most of the snow was blown into narrow ditches, or onto turnroads.

Although the extreme cold temperatures which have followed up the snowfall have brought folks a glimpse of what it might be like to live in Minnesota during the winter-time, there are a lot of plusses for the snowfall.

A 19-year-old Friona man, Thomas Sotelo, is in custody at the Parmer County jail following the Christmas morning shooting death of Inocencio Camarillo, 47.

Sotelo was charged with involuntary manslaughter, and bond was set at \$10,000 by justice of the peace Blackie Smith. He was bound over to action by the Parmer County Grand Jury.

The Friona Police Department and Parmer County Sheriff's Department investigated the incident after Camarillo was dead on arrival at Parmer County Community Hospital.

Friona Chief of Police Bill Denney said his department was called at 2:20 a.m. Christmas morning and advised that a man in Apartment 6 of the Saratoga Apartments had been shot.

There reportedly had been gunshots from a neighboring apartment (number four), and when Camarillo stepped outside his front

door to see what was happening, he was struck in the stomach with a bullet.

Camarillo then was said to have re-entered his apartment, and roused a young son who was sleeping in the floor in front of a television set, and asked him to get help.

Friona ambulance was summoned, and took Camarillo to the local hospital, where he was pronounced dead.

Denney said there had apparently been some shots fired from Apartment 4, Sotelo's apartment, prior to Camarillo being shot. Sotelo was arrested for investigation of the shooting, and later was arraigned and charged with involuntary manslaughter.

An autopsy was ordered by Justice of the Peace Frances Euler, to determine the exact cause of death.

Camarillo was said to have been a Mexican National, living here on a special work visa. He was employed at Excel Corporation.

Area Gets 10" Moist Snowfall

The Friona area received a nice snow the day after Christmas with measurements of around ten inches being the average.

Apparently the snowfall was very general in nature. Jim Dixon of the Rhea Community said he received ten inches. The fall to the south and east was somewhat heavier, due mainly to the second snowfall of New Year's Eve and New Year's, which barely grazed the local area, but dumped up to 13 inches in the area around Lubbock.

"I think most people got a good snow, and it was real wet. It will be a big help to the wheat crop," Dixon said.

The snow began in the early morning on December 26, and continued throughout the day and into the night. It was accompanied by very little wind, and for the most part, stayed right where it fell.

Trees and shrubbery made some beautiful winter pictures the day following the snowfall. Fences also made a pretty sight, as the tops were lined by the snowflakes.

The day or two following the snow proved to be a nightmare for travellers, many of whom found themselves in snowbanks off the highways in the area.

Snowplows operated by the Texas Highway Department ran continuously during the week, and by week's end most of the main roads were clear. Hampering the clearing efforts to a large extent were low temperatures which prevented melting and some wind which put some snow back onto the roadway after it had been cleared.

Aside from the general run of fender-benders and drivers getting into the ditches, no bad wrecks were reported in the area during the storm's aftermath, and authorities felt this was a lucky break, due to the after Christmas traffic, which continued in spite of the road conditions.

The official snow measurement in Friona was 10½ inches, with near an inch in moisture content.

Gas Line Break Was Close Call

Friona's Energas Company employees were involved in a situation at Bovina Friday, December 31, which was a serious problem after a break occurred in one of the main gas lines into that city.

In fact, had that problem been discovered a few minutes later than it was, and appropriate action not been taken, Friona's gas pressure might have been similarly affected.

The break occurred between the Oklahoma Lane Highway and the Cemetery, just south of town. This was about one-half mile from the main source of gas coming into Bovina, according to Dan Koelzer, Bovina's Energas manager.

As a result of the break, gas pressure to customers in Bovina dropped drastically for a time.

When the pressure was restored, Energas employees had to go door to door and make sure that heaters were still operating, and had not gone out during the pressure drop.

"We found about 30 to 40 places where the stoves had gone off," said Ralph Shirley, Energas manager at Friona. It was explained that pressure in the main line dropped from a normal of 350 pounds to around 198 pounds, and that at the residential source, this pressure dropped from a normal of ten pounds to about two.

Energas employees and officials from Friona, Dimmitt and Hereford converged on Bovina at an early hour Friday morning to help with the emergency.

MONDAY MEETING

City Sets "Cleanup" On Old Laws

The Friona City Council will meet Monday at 7:30 p.m., with the passing or amending of several city ordinances on the agenda. "These are ordinances which have outlived their usefulness, and either need to be off the books or amended," said City Manager Jerry Lewis.

Among the ordinances to be considered by the council will be one to repeal ordinance number 328, to require weeds and grass to be cut and removal of trash and rubbish, and providing penalties for violations.

Also, the council will consider an ordinance prohibiting the running at large of animals and fowl and designating the control of such in the city limits.

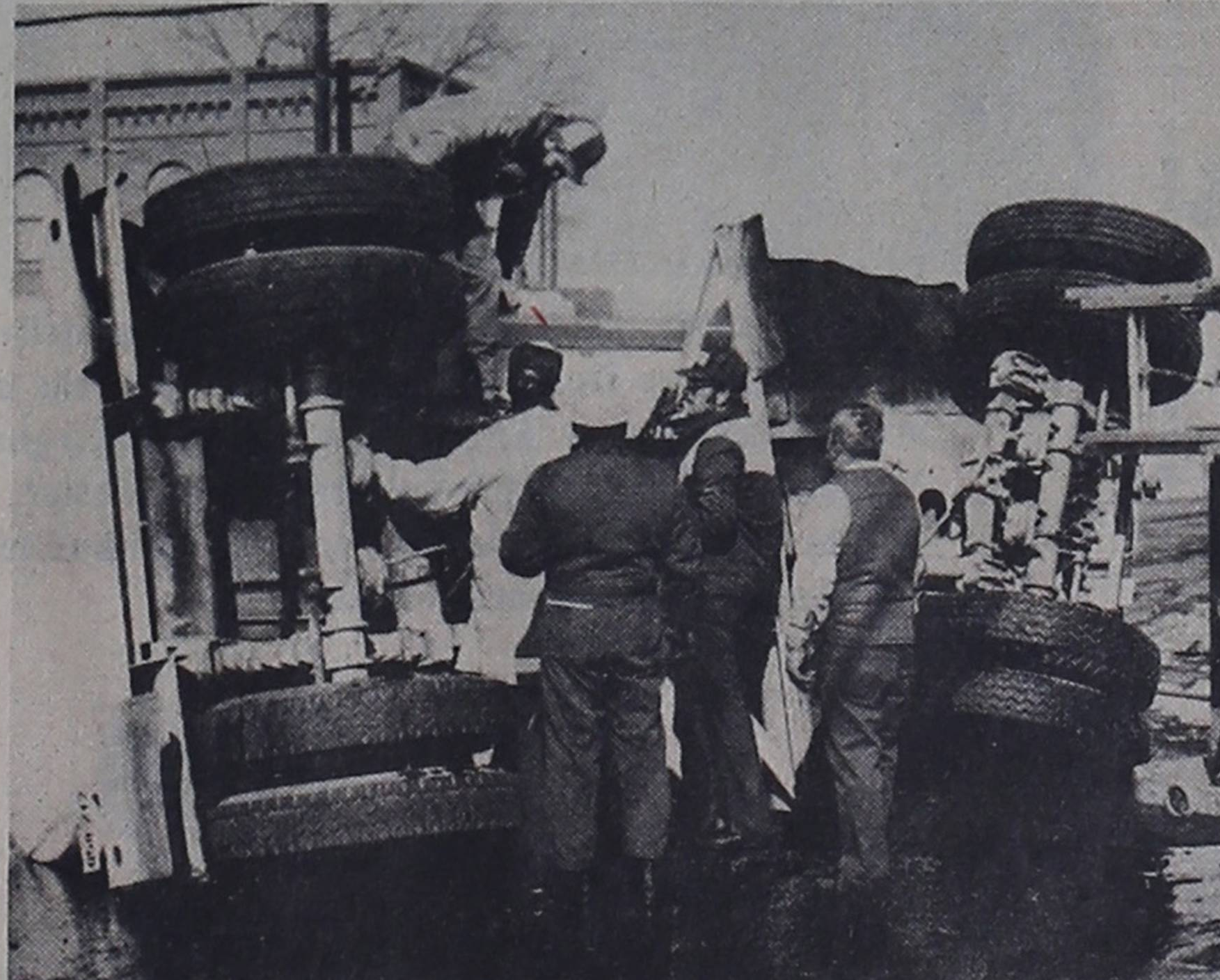
Another ordinance will prescribe regulations for traffic, both vehicular and pedestrian, within the city limits.

Ex-Friona Boy Wins Grid Honor

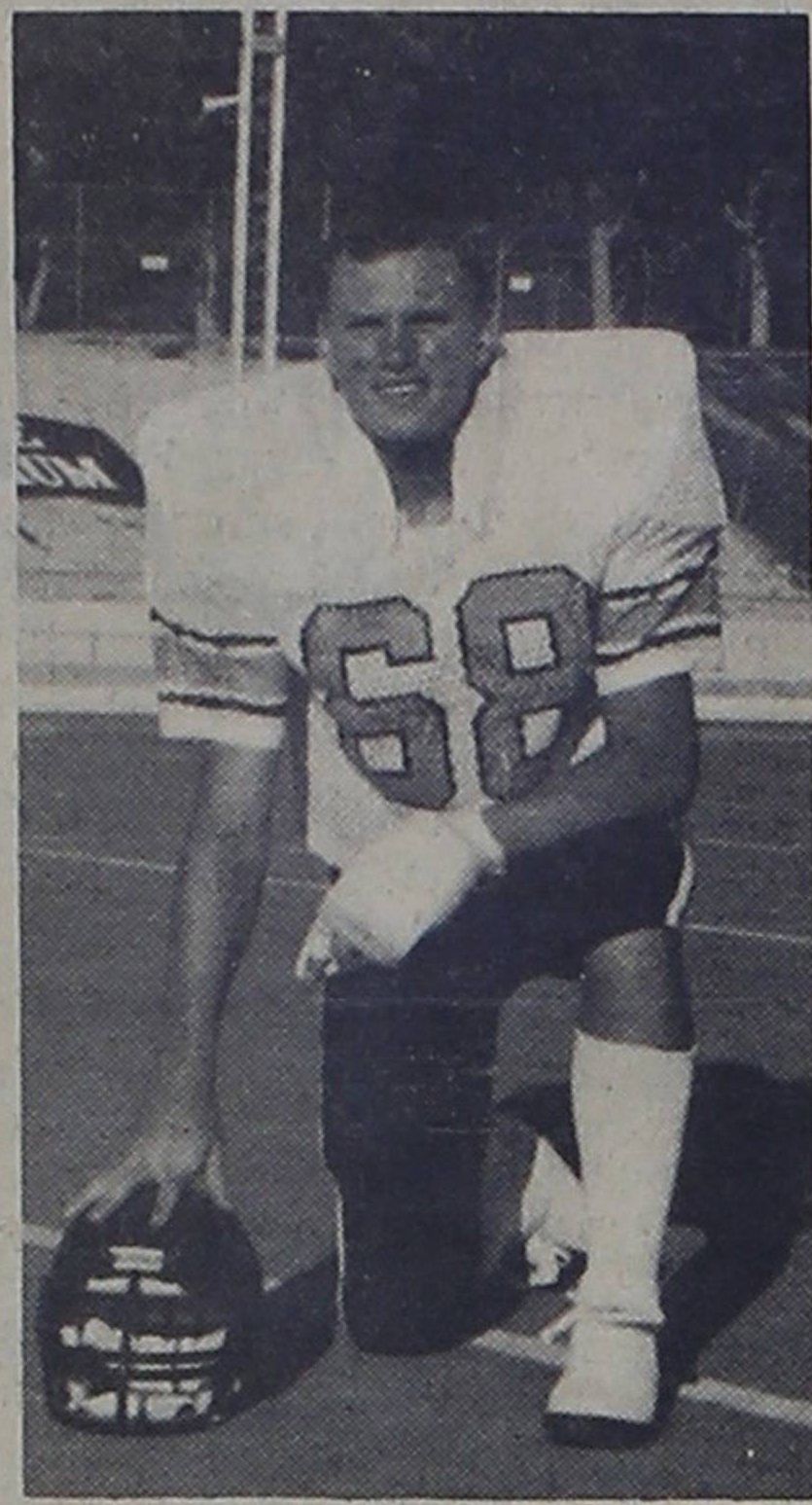
A former Friona boy, Jay Hight, has earned a number of honors in football this year at Albuquerque, N.M.

Land Bank Interest Drops

Interest rates on Land Bank variable rate loans will be reduced to 11.25 per cent on farm loans and to 11.75 per cent on farm-related business and rural residence loans, said Bill Liles, president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe.

These rates became effective January 1, 1983.

"The Land Bank's objective is to provide credit to Texas agriculture at the lowest possible cost, consistent with sound business practices," said Thomas H. Benson, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas in Austin.

"For over two years the Bank's average cost of funds consistently has been higher than the loan rate," Benson continued. "However, for the past four months, we have begun to see a decline in bond costs.

"As a result of this decline, we are able to reduce the Bank's loan interest rate," he said. "We hope that the decline in bond interest rates will continue, allowing us to make further reductions in the loan rate."

Wilson died Christmas morning in Deaf Smith General Hospital, after an illness of some months.

Wilson was one of the early managers of Friona Consumers, holding that position from 1937 to 1944. He left Consumers in 1944 to become associated with Plains Hardware and Furniture.

Years ago it wasn't unusual to hear someone describe a young woman's cooking ability by saying, "She can't even boil an egg." Even though boiling an egg really doesn't take a lot of skill, nutritionists have discovered a better way of cooking an egg.

It is better, according to the nutritionists to "hard cook" an egg instead of boiling it.

To hard-cook, put eggs in single layer in a saucepan. Add enough tap water to come at least one inch above the eggs. Cover and quickly bring just to boiling. Turn off heat.

If necessary, remove pan from burner to prevent further boiling. Let eggs stand covered in hot water 15-20 minutes, depending upon the size of the eggs.

Immediately run cold water over eggs or put them in ice water until completely cooled. To remove shell, crackle it by tapping gently all over. Roll egg between hands to loosen shell, then peel, starting at large end. Hold egg under running cold water or dip in bowl of ice water to help ease off shell.

If you've never eaten Dilly Deviled Eggs, you've missed a real treat.

They're crisp, cool and refreshing, whether they're served as an extension onto a regular meal, taken to a picnic or prepared for a patio party.

Dilly Deviled Eggs

6 hard cooked eggs
 1/4 cup dairy sour cream
 1/2 cup shredded cucumber
 1/4 teaspoon dill weed
 1 teaspoon salt

Thoroughly combine cucumber and salt. Let stand fifteen minutes. Drain well, pressing out excess liquid. Set aside.

Cut eggs in half lengthwise. Remove yolks and set whites aside. Mash yolks with fork. Blend in sour cream and dill weed. Stir in drained cucumber.

Refill whites using one heaping tablespoon yolk moisture for each egg half. Garnish platter with carrots, radishes and celery, if desired.

Hamburger-Sausage-Cheese Dip

1 lb. hamburger
 1 lb. sausage
 1 medium onion
 2 lb. Velveeta cheese
 2 cans Ro-tel tomatoes (blended)
 Fry meats and onions. Drain grease and add tomatoes. Slice cheese and place on top of meat. Cover and cook

for about fifteen minutes over low heat. Stir often to prevent scorching.

Mix well and serve over vegetables, chips or toast. It is good hot or cold and can be stored in the refrigerator for two weeks. It can be re-heated in a microwave oven or over low heat and makes an excellent quick meal.

Aunt Ruth's Meat Loaf

2 lbs. ground beef
 2 eggs
 1 1/2 cups bread crumbs
 3/4 cup catsup
 1 teaspoon Accent
 1/2 cup water
 1 package onion soup mix
 Mix ingredients thoroughly and pour into loaf pan. Cover with 1 can tomato sauce and bake one hour at 350 degrees.

Easy Chocolate Brownies

1 package (two-layer) chocolate cake mix
 1-17 1/2 ounce can chocolate pudding
 1/2 cup chopped nuts
 1/2 cup chocolate or peanut butter chips
 Combine cake mix and chocolate pudding until well blended. Pour into oiled and floured 9x13x2 inch cake pans.
 Sprinkle with nuts and chips. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 to 45 minutes.

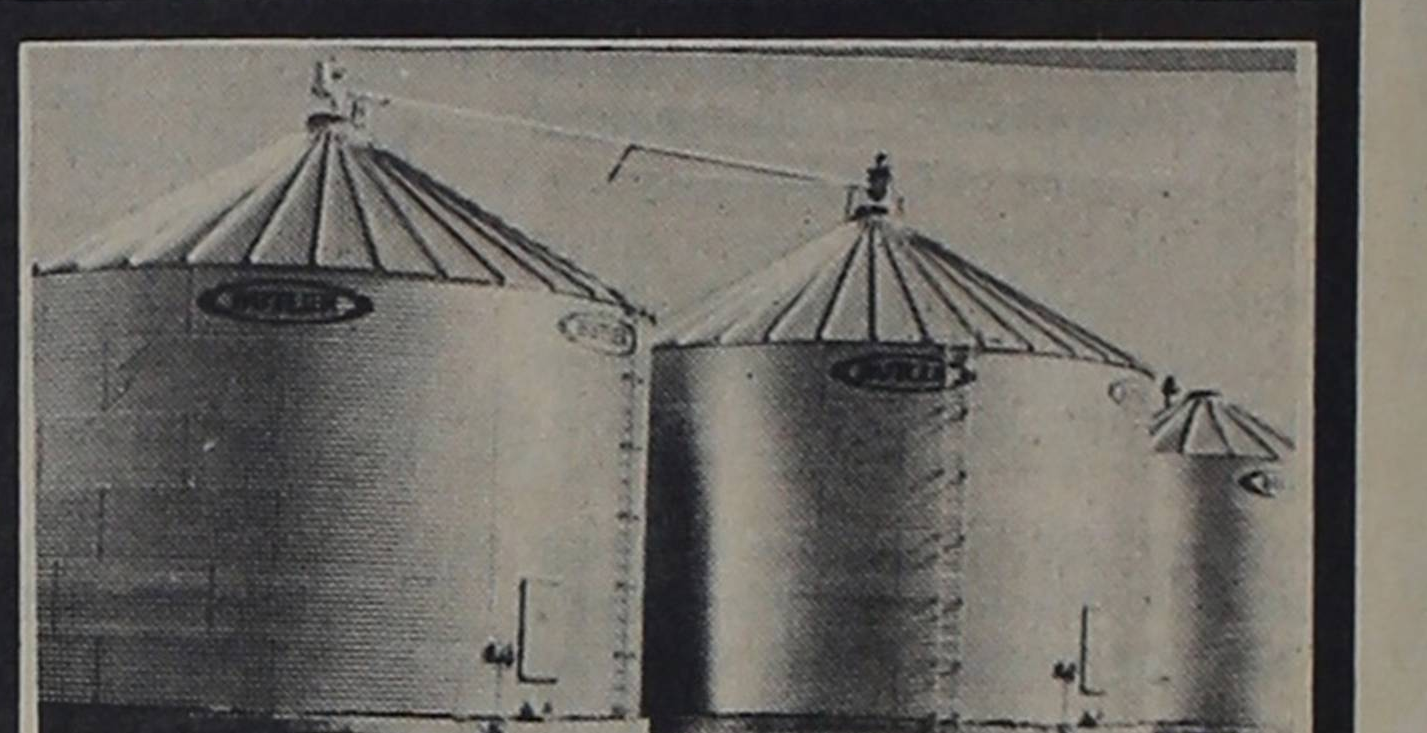





Commissioners Hold Final '82 Meeting

The need for maintaining a dump ground in the Lazbuddie area, which would meet state requirements, was a main item of business at the last meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Wednesday, December 22.

Dr. Henry C. Moritz, Jr., Regional Director for the Texas Department of Health, met with the court and explained some of the requirements and needs for the dump ground.

The commissioners stated that before they would accept the responsibility of maintaining the dump ground, they would have to know how much work and expense would be required to meet requirements of the State Health Department. After a lengthy discussion, Dr. Moritz said he would have an engineer meet with the court on January 24, to work out the details.

Discussion was held concerning re-establishing an outreach office for mental health/mental retardation in Friona. This office would be maintained by the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center of Plainview. This item was also tabled for further study.

The court discussed the new Job Training Partnership Act (Public Law 97-300), which replaces the CETA program late in 1983. A resolution was passed for the county to become a member of a Job Training Consortium, so as to be able to participate in the new program.

DPS Reports 22 Accidents

Sergeant Billy Don Scott, area supervisor of Parmer County, reports that for the month of December the Texas Highway Patrol Troopers investigated a total of 22 accidents in this county.

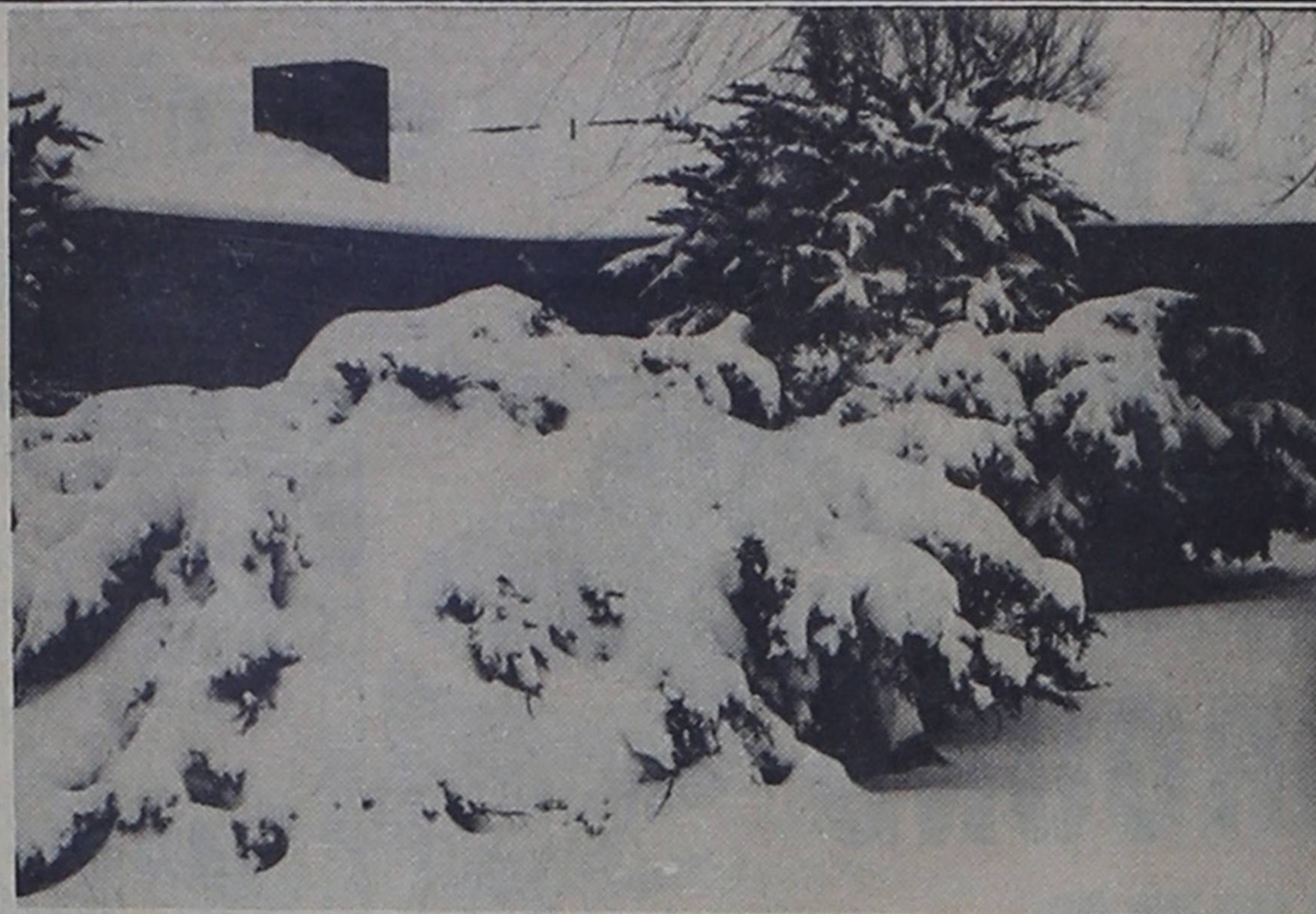
There were seven injury accidents with a total of 28 persons injured and 15 property damage accidents.

In District 5B, which includes the top 31 counties of the Texas Panhandle, there were 404 accidents investigated by the Texas Highway Patrol.
