We have just been hit by some very unwelcome word from the U.S. Postal Service. It will require changes in the way we publish the Floyd County Hesperian and the Lockney Beacon. We will try to explain the situation as it now exists, tell you what they told us, and then explain what we are going to do about it and why.

Many years ago an agreement was entered into between the publisher of the Lockney Beacon, the Hesperian and the Post Office in which both the Beacon and the Hesperian could be distributed and mailed in combination in a single package. This meant that a subscriber to one newspaper could and would receive both newspapers. A subscriber living anywhere in the county, or out of the county for that matter, could receive news and advertising from both major communities in the county. It helped everyone. The subscriber got two newspapers for the price of one, he, or she, got news from all over the county and the advertiser was able to get his, or her, message to all subscribers.

We were not here when the original agreements were entered into, but we fully understand the reasons. It was made necessary, in a very real sense, for financial reasons. Newspapers, like all other businesses, have been hit repeatedly over the years with rising costs of doing business, not the least of which is the incessant rise in the cost of using the U.S. mail. But the Postal Service is essentially a monopoly in the areas in which it operates. In other words, it tells us, and you, what it will charge for delivering the mail and we must pay; we have no other place to go.

When that factor is combined with other factors, like the decline in the advertising base of smaller communities, we reach a stage where it becomes financially impossible to publish a newspaper. That has happened to a number of smaller communities across the country. A certain number of people are required to publish a newspaper, no matter how small. (Unless, of course, one wishes to turn the paper into nothing but a shadow of what a newspaper ought to be.) And those people must earn a living like everyone else. Too, the people of Lockney were very proud, and are very proud, to have their own newspaper, their own "flag", as we call it in the business. Out of a combination of those circumstances, the decision was no doubt made, many years ago, to save the Lockney paper by publishing it with some of the same production workers who put out the Hesperian, which, being in Floydada with a larger circulation and advertising base, could financially afford to help out.

In our opinion it was a good solution and has worked well for a number of years. The Post Office was not only aware of it, they were part of the process. They know exactly how many papers are distributed through their facilities, how much weight is involved, everything about it. And, in our opinion, they have been paid well for their services over the years. In 1990 alone, our postal bill for the two newspapers was \$9,900. That did not include another \$1,640.99 that went to them for regular mail. With the recent increases in postal rates, this will no doubt be higher this year.

Now, suddenly, out of the blue, an authority up the ladder in the postal department's hierarchy has decided that the process under which we have been operating violates some heretofore obscure rule governing the way newspapers are supposed to be distributed by mail. They say we can no longer distribute the Floyd County Hesperian and the Lockney Beacon through the mails in a single package, as we have done in the past, while charging our readers for only one subscription. That would mean we would have to separate the two, and charge separate subscription fees for

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Papers combine as county publication

Effective immediately, due to postal regulations, The Floyd County Hesperian and The Lockney Beacon will no longer be published separately and mailed together.

The news of both towns will now be included in one county wide newspaper. Beginning March 14 the "flag", or masthead, of the county newspaper will contain the names of both publications. It will be called, The Floyd County Hesperian-Beacon.

The subscribers of both The Hesperian and The Beacon will be combined into one mailing list and will continue to receive their newspaper with their hometown news. Their yearly subscription rates will also remain the same for the remainder of their subscription.

The Lockney Beacon will still maintain its local office and will continue to cover the local news. The deadline for The Beacon will be changed to 5:00 p.m. on Mondays. All subscribers will continue to receive their paper on Thursdays.

Floydada and Lockney will share the front page but will have separate pages for school news. Other news will be placed throughout the paper in place of news importance and "where it fits."

The change in mailing has been brought about by a ruling from the Lubbock rates and classifications department of the U.S. Post Office. According to Mr. Jerry Lee, who manages

that department, two newspapers cannot be mailed together (one stuffed inside the other).

Even though the Floydada and Lockney newspapers paid two post office entry fees in two separate towns, paid for two postal permits, and paid for the cost of mailing both papers in both towns, the Post Office maintains that subscribers are still getting two papers for the price of one.

In order to continue to mail the papers as has been done in the past, The Hesperian would have to pay for two entry fees and two mailings out of Floydada, and the Beacon would do the same in Lockney. This would double the cost of mailing in both towns, and double the cost to our subscribers.

"Of course this would not be economically feasible for either paper or our subscribers," said Alice Gilroy, editor of the Floyd County Newspapers.

"Because both papers have played such a large part in the history of this county, we did not want to lose the name of either one. The Hesperian and The Beacon have been respected names in the South Plains, and we want them to continue making history under that masthead for another hundred years. For that reason, the new "flag" will contain both names.

"We know the change will be hard for some, but we also know we are going to be able to provide our readers and advertisers with an even better newspaper."

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Terrell's lose family member in Gulf War

A local family received news last week that one of their family members, Pfc. Corey Winkle, was killed in a non-combat grenade accident during the Desert Storm Operation.

Winkle was the nephew of Helen Terrell of Floydada, and the grandson of Frank and Pauline Webb, formerly of Floydada.

"We don't know the circumstances of his death yet," said Helen's husband, Melvin Terrell. "The whole family has been waiting to hear, and waiting for him to come home so we can have a funeral."

The exact day of his death is also not known at this time. Family members were notified on Tuesday, February 26 of his death.

Winkle, 21, was a former Texas Tech University theatre arts major. He enlisted in the U.S. Army in August 1988 and was assigned to the mechanized infantry unit. He was deployed to the Persian Gulf from Fort Stewart, GA., shortly after the August 2, 1990, Iraqi invasion of Kuwait.

As a part of Operation Desert Storm, he drove M2M3 Bradley Fighting Vehicles.

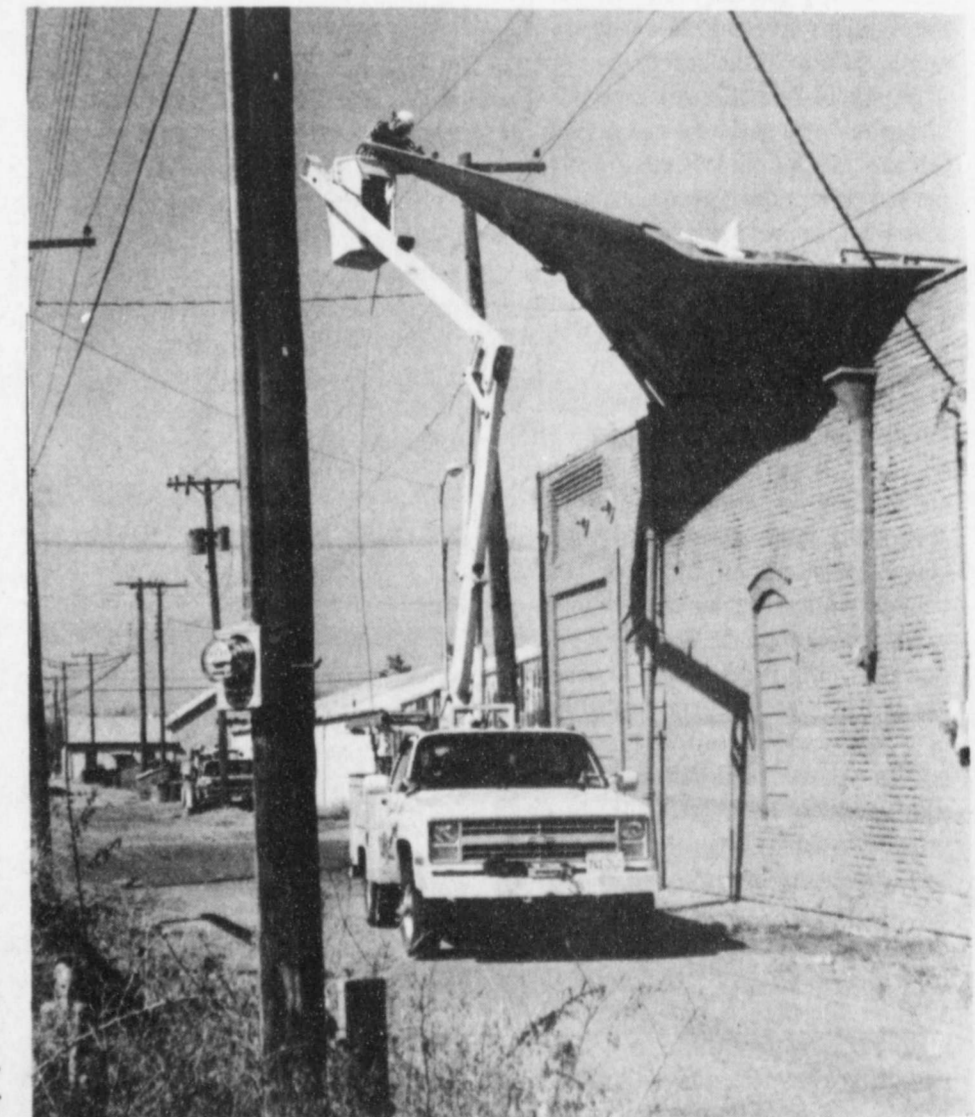

By The Way

If you haven't read the Lamplighter or the front page yet, let me be the first to inform you about the new county-wide paper you will be receiving.

I haven't felt this anxious over an announcement since I've been working at the paper. We are expecting all kinds of reactions around here.

All of our readers need to know that beginning immediately the Floyd County Hesperian and The Lockney Beacon will now join together into a county wide newspaper.

There will no longer be a Beacon stuffed inside the Hesperian, and vice versa. The new newspaper will be called, The Floyd County Hesperian-Beacon, and will continue to cover the news in both towns.

We are changing the way the news will be published and mailed out because the U.S. Post Office, (namely the manager of the Lubbock rates and classification division) told us we had to.

According to Mr. Jerry Lee, it is illegal for us to mail one newspaper inside another. It doesn't matter how long we've been doing it, what kind of agreement was reached years ago, or that we have been paying postal permits, entry fees and the postage from both Lockney and Floydada post office. What mattered to Mr. Lee and his regulations was that subscribers were getting two newspapers for the price of one.

I don't necessarily understand why we have to change, but what I did understand was we had to do it and do it NOW!

If we had continued to publish the paper the way we always had, we would basically have had to pay postage, etc. for two separate papers from two different towns. This would in effect double our rates in both towns. We could not afford that of course. As it is the new postal increase is costing us approximately \$50.00 a week more to mail just The Hesperian.

We know there are going to be people that feel they are losing their newspaper, but we want everyone to realize that it will still be the same paper—just packed

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each. That would effectively double the cost to our readers, if they desired to keep abreast of happenings throughout the county as most of them do. And, as a practical matter, it would essentially kill the Lockney Beacon.

We are determined that this will not happen. We will combine both papers into one county-wide newspaper, serving the purposes now served by both papers. Editorial and advertising offices will be retained in exactly the same fashion they are now, as will be the production operation. The contents of both papers will be combined into a single paper. The name, or "flag" of both papers will be retained in the future, or at least the foreseeable future, if we can obtain that authority from postal authorities in Washington. Those who have a subscription to one of the papers now will continue to receive the paper, just as in the past they have received both editions. The only difference is that they will receive this in an expanded, larger, edition of the combined paper.

Details of how this will be done will be the decision of the Editor and staff of the papers. Our current thinking is that the paper will have separate pages for school and sports news from the different communities, but that "news" will be treated as news no matter where it happens in the county, and will be placed accordingly.

We have worked long and hard to build these papers into something the people of Floyd County can be proud of, and that other communities take note of. And while none should ever be completely satisfied with his labors, we do believe we have achieved a degree of success in this regard. We have no intention of seeing it go by the boards. Indeed, it is possible, even probable, the new operation will turn out for the better. As we have said before, it is sometimes possible for a beautiful flower to grow from a dung heap, the dung heap in this case being the problem caused by the postal service's decision, and the flower being the new product of our labors.

Time for the change-over will be announced by the Editor, as will be the details. We have been given a very short period, as it were, in which to work out the details. It will be costly for us, but those things appear to be immaterial for the government, or monopolies operating under government license. We will simply adjust what needs to be adjusted and continue to try to give our readers a good product, and hopefully an even better product.

We will still have The Beacon office open on the same days, but the deadline will now be 5:00 p.m. on Mondays instead of 3:00 p.m.

For economic reasons we had considered combining the newspapers before this, but since we knew how important the different papers were to both towns, we have held off until now. Because of that importance the new county wide paper's masthead will contain the name of both papers.

It has been easy to blame this whole change on the Post Office but we see positive changes coming from it.

We believe the paper will be a "tighter paper", meaning it will be full of local news with little "filler" from somewhere else.

We believe that the advertisers will benefit from having a county wide paper. We may save some money from printing and we believe we will have a good impact on the county.

When I say good impact, I mean that I believe in a small way we can help bring the county together.

Lockney and Floydada have always been fiercely independent of each other, and in the past maybe they could afford to be. They can't afford it any longer. The two towns will have to pool their resources and political clout to make it in the future.

Maybe, just maybe, a paper that is county wide and not worried about keeping everything separate can help the county feel the same way.

Before I close off of this subject I want to say one thing more.

The post office has taken a lot of heat off us the last week or so, concerning everything from their mailing rates to their regulations.

I'm not taking anything back as far as the federal bureaucracy goes, but I do have something to say about our local human beings that keep the post office running.

The local post masters, Tommy Rice, of Floydada, Terry Jones, Lockney, and Doug Meriwether, past Lockney postmaster, were very helpful through all this transition.

Before I even heard about what we were going to have to do, Tommy Rice was arguing for our cause. Tommy and Doug spent many hours debating and explaining "our case" to the fellow in Lubbock.

They didn't make the rules—they are employees who have to interpret and impose all the regulations that come down to us. Our local folks are on the front lines listening to our complaints, because whoever is making these stupid rules has enough sense to stay behind the scenes.

Our mailmen and postmaster have to buy stamps and pay just like we do. They suffer the consequences of higher postal rates raising consumer prices in other areas, just like we do.

Anyway—I appreciate what they did for us, and I'm going to get off their backs (at least for a week or two).

Don't forget the Lockney Chamber Banquet, Friday night. It starts at 7:00 p.m. in the elementary cafeteria. If you buy your ticket early it is only \$7.00, if you pay at the door, it is \$10.00.

Everyone should be on notice that if you go to the banquet you won't get in the door unless you pay for a ticket. You can't just come to watch the entertainment (which is sure to go down in history), and then leave.

You aren't going to want to miss the entertainment. Local folks will be singing and doing skits, and veterans will be honored.

I know everyone is going to find this hard to believe, but I got a call last week about plans in the process now for Old Settlers. It's a new year and Old Settlers is only 3 months away. Didn't we just do that yesterday?

Both Rosa and Lori Gonzales sustained severe injuries. Mrs. Gonzales dislocated and fractured her knee, which required surgery, and she also dislocated her collarbone.

Lori Gonzales suffered a broken finger and other injuries. Both were transported to Lockney General by Floydada EMS and Mrs. Gonzales was later transported to Central Plains Regional Hospital.

Harbin sustained minor injuries. He and a passenger in his vehicle, Michael Doerschuk, 18, of Floydada, were both transported by private vehicle to Caprock Hospital, where they were treated and released.

"Everyone was wearing their seat belt," said Lucke. "I feel that it minimized the injuries. Both vehicles were totaled."

Lucke also expressed his appreciation to all the law enforcement, medical technicians, and private citizens that helped with traffic control and aiding in the care of the injured.

The highway patrol also investigated an accident earlier in the day on Friday in which seatbelts can once again be credited with preventing injuries.

According to Lucke, "At 8:30 a.m., on Friday we got a call of an accident on US 62, 2 miles east of Floydada. A 1984 Red & White GMC Pickup, driven by Paul Sidham, 47, of Quanah, was traveling west on Hwy 62. The vehicle ran off the road and the driver over corrected causing the vehicle to turn totally around facing east. The vehicle slid off into the median and the right tires dug in causing the vehicle to roll over the top and come to rest on its left side facing east."

Two passengers were also in the pickup. The driver and passengers were all wearing seatbelts. The pickup was totaled but the passengers and driver sustained no injuries.

Resident awaits return of two sons from Middle East

Texas Tech Journalism Student Carolyn Cheek of Floydada takes each day one day at a time as she waits to hear that her two boys are on their way home.

Cheek's oldest son, Air Force Staff Sgt. Derek Cheek, 30, and her youngest son, Marine Cpl. Laron Cheek, 21, are serving in Saudi Arabia.

Derek, who lives in Orange, Calif., is

active in the Air Force Reserves, 68th Aeromed Evac Squad as a medic. After serving four years in the Air Force, Derek went straight into the reserves. Currently, in the war, he flies missions between a field hospital in England and Saudi Arabia.

"He first became interested in the military because he wanted to see the world," his mother said.

Derek is an LVN, licensed vocational nurse, working towards an RN, regis-

tered nurse, at St. Joseph's Hospital in Orange, Calif.

Derek, who graduated in 1978 from Floydada High School, has a wife, Lori and two sons, Jonathan, 3, and James, 23 months. Derek left for the Gulf War near the middle of January.

"Lori is coping by not staying home much. She stays busy. It has been a hard time for her as well as the children," Carolyn said.

When Carolyn last talked to her grandson, Jonathan, he said, "Gran, I want to come see you but first I have to go see my daddy. I need to see my daddy."

Laron, of Floydada, enlisted a year before he graduated from Floydada High School in 1987.

"I had to sign for him to go in and believe me, I fought him," Carolyn said. After enlisting for six years, he was stationed at Camp Pendleton, Calif.

"Boot camp was very hard yet Laron did well and even won awards. I was very proud of him," Cheek said. "He found out life as a Marine is tough."

Laron, on his second tour in the Gulf, is on the U.S.S. Okinawa. Laron was in the Philippines in July when the ship was called to Saudi Arabia.

Laron, trained in ordnance, usually maintains, prepares, and loads helicopters for flight. During the Gulf War, he has been put in charge for the ordnance of machine guns.

"When I talked to Laron, he said it was an honor to be put in charge of machine guns," Carolyn said.

Tragedy struck the Cheek family on Dec. 26, 1990, when Derek and Lori lost their youngest child, Jeremy, 4 months old, to Sudden Infant Death Syndrome.

"It was a very hard time for everyone," Carolyn said.

Laron, who was in the Philippines, heard of the child's death by phone.

"He was real upset. He'd never even gotten to see Jeremy," Carolyn said. "He is just crazy about his nephews."

The Air Force gave Derek two months, from the death, before they would call him for duty. Yet, three weeks later, he was called.

When Carolyn asked Derek why he was leaving early, he said, "Mother, our country is at war. I am in the U.S. Air Force and they need me. I'm going."

Carolyn last heard from Laron in a letter dated Feb. 8. She has not heard from Derek. His mother does hear of him indirectly through Lori. Derek has not been able to tell his family exactly where he is. Carolyn writes one to two times a week.

"I am very proud of my boys and that they are fighting for this country," Carolyn said.

Cheek has three other sons. Jett, 29, and Don, 26, are both seniors at North Texas State University in Denton. Lane, 24, lives in Orange, Calif.

"I'm doing okay, I guess," she said. "I have wonderful friends."

Carolyn Cheek said that "not a day goes by that I don't get a call, a card or just someone stopping me to ask how things are and to tell me we are in their thoughts."

"I am so thankful I live in Floydada. The people are wonderful," Carolyn said.

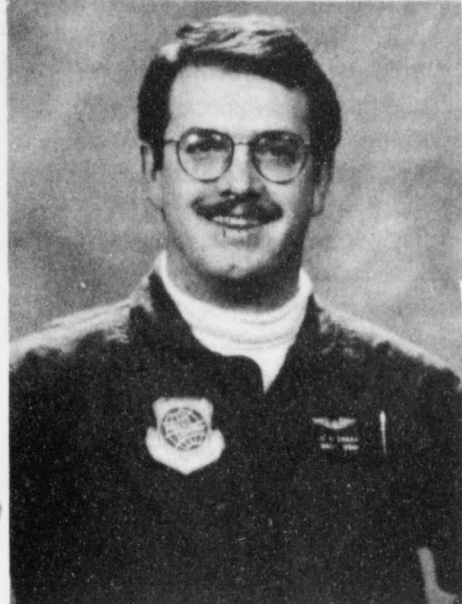
"This is definitely the place I want to be. I wouldn't want to live anywhere else," Carolyn added.

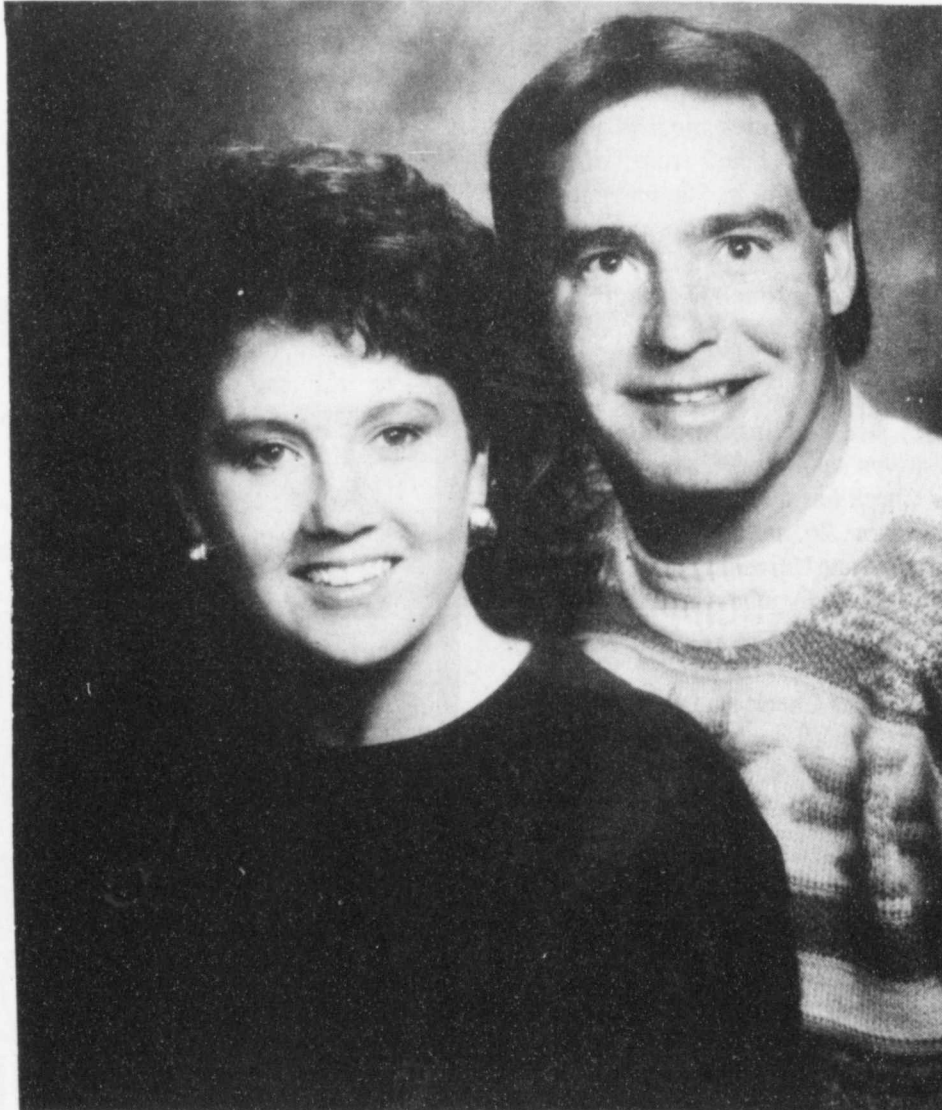

Air freshener, for one source, releases pollutants almost continuously, another is unvented space heaters when in use. Most pollutants cannot be seen, felt, tasted or smelled. Some pollutants cause illness in families. Indoor pollutants can be five times worse than outdoor pollution.

She told what one tree could do to help outdoor pollution: 1. supply enough oxygen to keep 18 people alive and use up the carbon dioxide, 2. being an "air conditioner", 3. control flooding, 4. soak up noise pollution, 5. serve as a wind break, 6. its leaves trap and filter ashes, dust and pollen from the air.

Arrest during February included: one for burglary of a habitation, one for criminal trespass, 4 for DWI, and 4 for warrants.

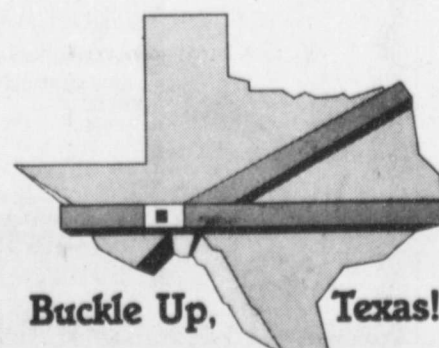
Floydada Allsup's employees enjoy trip to Mazatlan

'Winds capture first track victory

The Whirlwind Relays were held in typical early-March fashion last Saturday, with high, gusty winds greeting the early entrants and events. The final running events were somewhat hampered by afternoon north winds which dropped the chill factor to less than 40 degrees.

A strong showing by several younger members of the Whirlwind boys' team helped pave the way for Floydada's first place standing in the 3A team results. The final Class 3A rankings and points scored were: 1. Floydada, 162; 2. Brownfield, 131; 3. Lubbock Roosevelt, 122-1/2; 4. Lamesa, 75-1/2; 5. Muleshoe, 55; and 6. Lubbock Cooper, 8.

Freshman Adam Gonzales established himself as a district contender in the shot put with a second place toss of 44'7". Gonzales missed first place by only 1-1/2 inches. Gonzales outdistanced Young of Lamesa 125'7-1/2" to grab first in the discus.

Sophomore Michael Henderson registered a 38'3-1/4" in the triple jump to

nailed down first place. Teammate Chad Williams placed third in the event at 38'1/4". Williams added a 20'7-1/2" showing for second place in the long jump (Chad missed first place by only 1-1/2").

Junior Jaime Suarez registered a second in the grueling 3200 meters with a time of 10:53.43. It was Suarez's first competitive attempt in the metric two-miler. A stumble in the second turn in the 1600 meters was costly for Suarez, as he finished third with a 5:05.25 clocking.

Floydada's 400 relay team of Brad Emert, Micheal Henderson, Freddie Portee and Kenneth Collins appeared to have the event won. But, a fast-closing effort by Roosevelt's anchorman edged Collins at the wire. The 'Winds placed second behind the Eagles by only .6 of a second. The Whirlwinds' 1600 relay team, consisting of Kenneth Davis, Michael Aleman, Jaime Suarez and Brian Teeple, ran a 3:46.56 for third place.

Whirlwind Senior Brad Emert blazed

to a victory in the 100 meters with a fine time of 11.77. Freddie Portee helped Floydada's point total with a 12.31 in the 100, good for third place. Emert added a strong 43.10 second place finish in the 300 hurdles. Senior Brian Teeple helped solidify Floydada's team championship by capturing first in the 400 meters with a 55.95 timing.

Michael Henderson's 23.40 and Freddie Portee's 23.89 were good for second and third place finishes in the 200 meters.

Coach David Carr commented, "It was a good, solid team victory. We're proud of the overall effort from all our kids, and we're looking forward to the Roosevelt Relays next week. We're improving times and distances in all events and will be very competitive this year."

The Lady 'Winds placed third in the overall 3A girls' standings, missing second place by only three points. The girls' 3A team results and points were: 1. Muleshoe, 170; 2. Brownfield, 128; 3. Floydada, 125; 4. Roosevelt, 69; and 5. Lamesa, 62.

Elisa Suarez was the outstanding individual performer for the Lady 'Winds as she won the long jump with a 15'10" effort and posted a 30'7" triple jump, good for second place. Suarez was on the winning 1600 relay team and was part of the 400 relay team, joining Linda Dagley, Lesha Black and Angie Maldonado, who placed second in the event behind Muleshoe.

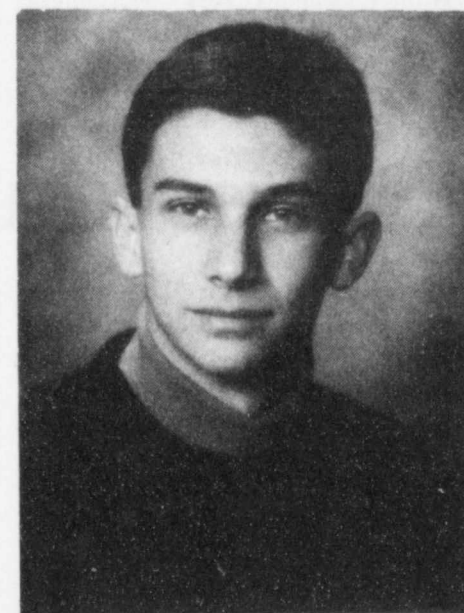

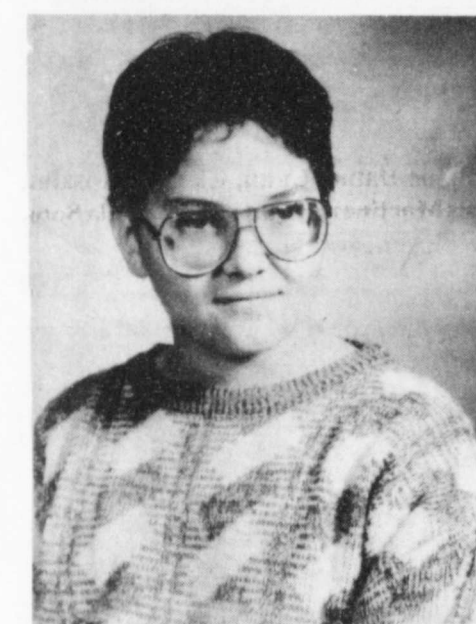

CRP SIGNUP

A tenth CRP Signup will be held March 4 through 15, 1991. There are many changes in the BID Process because of the new farm bill. Selection will be based on the environmental benefits received from placing the land in the CRP when compared to dollars of cost to CCC. Listed below are some of the changes:

1. There will be only 1 bid pool for the entire nation. All bids will be evaluated at the national level.
 2. Acceptance of bids will be limited to 500,000 acres for the entire nation.
 3. Special emphasis is placed on highly erodible land with water quality problems. This includes surface water, ground water and wellhead protection.
 4. Some of the bid ranking factors are based on the greatest improvement for the most people per dollar spent, (population of the county).
 5. The BID ranking is based on the following seven factors (not listed in any priority):
 - a. Surface Water Quality.
 - b. Ground Water Quality.
 - c. Soil Productivity.
 - d. Conservation Compliance Assistance.
 - e. Tree Planting.
 - f. Assistance to State 319 Area (Texas has none).
 - g. Conservation Priority Areas (Texas has none).
- If you submit a CRP Bid, you should also plan to sign up in the regular program.

MAJOR CHANGES IN 1990 FARM BILL

Flexibility - Refer to last newsletter. **Cover on Set-aside** - Producers are required to plant 50 percent of their ACR to an annual or perennial cover, not to exceed 5% of the base. Cover must be established by June 1st and maintained thru December 31st. If you intend to plant wheat in the fall on these acres it is permissible to begin land preparation by August 1.

CU for Pay - CU for Pay has the same requirements as ACR for eligibility. This means skips in a skip row pattern must be at least 4 normal rows or 150 inches from plant to plant to be eligible for CU for Pay.

Corn and Grain Sorghum Bases - No longer combined under new farm

bill. However, for 1991 crop year only, producers may request a base exchange between corn and grain sorghum. A producer who participates in both corn and grain sorghum has until the end of Signup to request an exchange between the bases. The owner and operator must sign the request and understand that P&CP (history) will be credited to the planted crop based on the revised base.

Historical Weighted Yield - The historical weighted yield will be calculated using actual planted history for each farm. A letter will be mailed to you with your historical weighted yield and a more detailed explanation of how it is determined. No longer will a farm have an irrigated and non-irrigated yield.

Minor Oilseeds - If producer plants minor oilseeds on 0/92 CU for Pay, they must choose between deficiency payments on the 0/92 acreage planted or marketing loan eligibility for such minor oilseed. Minor oilseeds are sunflower, safflower, canola, rape seed, mustard seed, and flaxseed. Minor oilseeds are not permitted on 50/92 for cotton.

Integrated Farm Management Program Option - A new program to help producers improve and conserve the soil and water of their farms by planting Resource-Conserving Crops (RCC) in accordance with a Soil Conservation Service approved plan. Resource-Conserving crops (RCC) are legumes, legume-grass mixtures, and legume-small grains mixtures. Producers will receive deficiency payments for the program crop that the RCC replaces. Deficiency payments are not guaranteed. Producers must devote at least 20% of the bases on the farm to RCC for a contract period of three years, four years or five years. Acreage is limited for 1991 in Texas to 48,232 acres.

Sodbuster/Swampbuster Provisions - More emphasis placed on these provisions by the new bill. Be aware of all these provisions when you sign the AD-1026 at Signup. If you are thinking about doing anything to a wet area or wetland that will alter it, check with Soil Conservation first. A violation will occur when wetland is converted by draining, dredging, filling, leveling, or any other means to make possible the planting of an agriculture commodity.

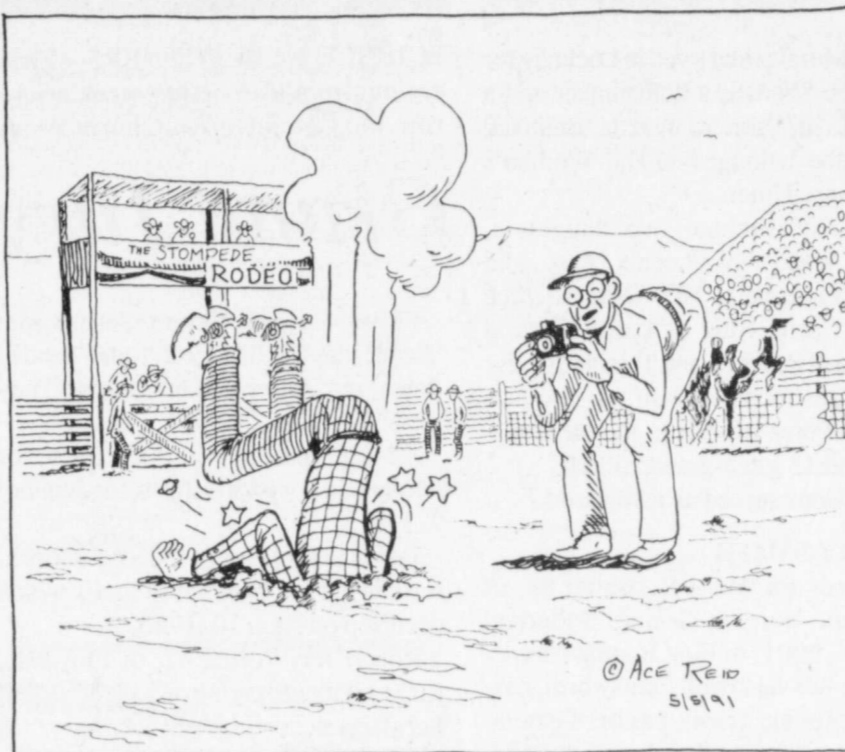
Soil Conservation is in the process of making wetland determinations.

Cost Share Available for ACR (Multiyear Cost-Share) - Producers are offered cost-share assistance to establish a perennial cover on ACR. Cost-share is available on 25 percent of the approved cost of establishing the cover on acreage not to exceed 50 percent of the ACR. The producer shall agree to maintain the perennial cover for three years after the calendar year in which the cover is established.

Tolerance - Tolerance is the larger of 1 acre or 5% of reported, not to exceed 10 acres. This is a change from 1990 when the maximum was 50 acres. There is not tolerance for measurement service. A producer who requests measurement service must destroy acres in excess of permitted.

Training session set for Monday

A meeting has been arranged for Floyd County producers on Monday, March 11, in order for them to receive training and testing for the private pesticide applicator license. Training will begin promptly at 8:30 a.m. at the Massie Activity Center in Floydada. Producers should plan to attend all of the

training, which will last until about noon. Training will be provided by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Then at 1:30 p.m., at the same location, officials from the Texas Department of Agriculture will be present to give the examination for the private applicator license. The exam normally takes 1 to 2 hours for completion.

At another meeting scheduled at Lighthouse Electric Coop community room at 9:00 a.m. on March 13, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will provide training on Pesticide Regulations. Producers attending this meeting will receive two continuing education units (CEU's). The CEU's are required for private applicators to maintain their certificates or licenses.

Effective Jan. 1, 1990, producers of agricultural commodities may qualify for licensing as private applicators only through participation in a training course conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and then passing an examination conducted by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Those producers previously authorized to purchase and use restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides are referred to as certified (not licensed) private applicators. They can still purchase restricted-use and state-limited-use pesticides with their certification, and can apply these chemicals themselves. However, effective January 1, 1990,

even distribution of chemicals. Yet, nozzle tips are undoubtedly the most mis-used, abused, distribution of chemicals. Nozzle tips should be carefully selected so that the nozzle type and size properly matches the intended spray operation.

Tips are made from such materials as aluminum, brass, stainless steel, nylon, hardened steel, and tungsten carbide. The rate of nozzle wear depends on: the make of the nozzle, spray pressure, and the properties of the chemical being applied. Nozzle tips should be replaced after a 10 percent variation in flow begins to occur. Hardened stainless steel tips are the most resistant to wear, followed by nylon. These more wear-resistant tips should be used when spraying wettable powder formulations. Nozzle tips can wear out faster than most people realize. At higher pressures, aluminum or brass tips can be worn out in less than 10 hours of operation, depending on the chemical being applied.

The most commonly used nozzle types include: flat spray (tapered edges), flat spray (even edges), flood type, hollow cone, solid cone, and solid stream.

Flat spray or fan nozzles with tapered edges produce narrow, elliptical spray patterns. These are general purpose nozzles, and are most often used for broadcast the risk of pesticide exposure. Never blow through a nozzle tip to unplug it.

Remember...nozzle tips don't last forever. Worn nozzle tips should be

discarded and replaced. Nozzle tip replacement is pretty economical when one realized that a 10 percent over-application of chemical on a twice-sprayed 1000 acre farm could represent a loss of \$2,000, based on a chemical investment of \$10 per acre. This does not take into account potential crop damage.

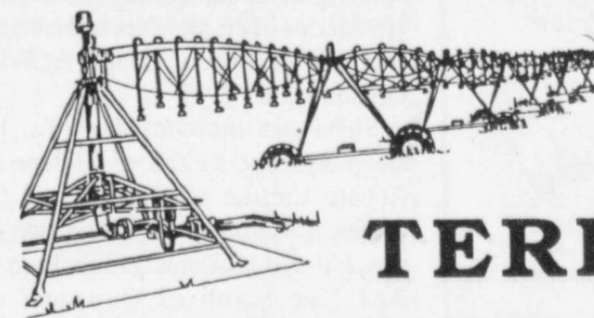
