Plains into Oklahoma. Army cutworm numbers of as many as 6 to 8 per row foot have been recorded in the Cone area of Crosby County. Both wheat and alfalfa producers need to be aware of this situation, since this pest is of cconomic Concern in these crops. The army cutworm is the larva of a fall; and the larvae hatch after rainfall and feed during warm weather throughout the winter and early spring. Cutworms hide under dirt clods and loose soil during the warm, sunny days. These cutworms can be detected by loosening the upper two inches of soil around the a grayish color, with a few black dotson a grayish color, with a few black dotson
the body. Mature larvae are about $11 / 2$ inches long and curl into a " C " shape when disturbed. Army cutworms complete feeding by late March or April and the adult moth emerges in May. There is only one generation per year.
