Hundreds register at reunion, Floyd County pioneers named

Seven hundred and forty-six people took the time to register, Saturday morning, for the Old Settlers Reunion. Considering the crowds of people covering the well manicured courthouse lawn this was a small representative of the numbers attending.

A closer count may be the lunch count guessed at by those serving the bar-b-que lunch. Approximately 1036 people were fed the tender beef, while hundreds more opted for the many concession stands around the square.

The bar-b-que meal was prepared by Travis Jones, Norman Muncy and their enormous and capable committee. A huge pit was dug, filled with mesquite and then the mesquite was burned down to coals. The meat, wrapped in foil, canvas and wet burlap was laid on top of six inches of dirt covering the smoldering coals.

Another six inches of dirt was placed over the meat. More coals were placed on top of the dirt and more dirt on top of the coals (with a little extra dirt to guard against the threatening rain which never materialized). The meat cooked all night Friday and was perfect for Saturday's lunch.

The Old Settlers Reunion committee held their business meeting at 9:00 a.m. in which new officers were elected, a memorial service was held, and awards were presented.

PIONEER MAN-WOMAN COUPLE

Walton Hale, of Floydada, was named the Pioneer Man of the Year, by the reunion committee. Elfie Sherman, of Lockney, received the honors of Pioneer Woman. J.D. and Arla Copeland, of Lockney, were named Pioneer Couple.

Hale was born in Huckaby, Texas, on August 9, 1900.

He attended Thorpe Springs Christian College for two years and worked as a teacher and oil field supply hauler before becoming a merchant.

Hale moved to Floyd County from Lubbock in 1929 to open a J.C. Penney store on the south side of the square in Floydada. His wife Mary, who passed away in 1989, and his 4 year old daughter Floy Jean, accompanied him to Floydada. His son, Bill, was born in 1930.

Walton managed the J.C. Penney store until 1946, when he left to open Hale's Department Store, which is now under the management of his grandson, Richard Hale.

He has been involved in many community efforts during his lifetime, including service on the city council and Caprock Hospital Board of Directors. As a long time Rotarian, Walton served at one time as president of the Rotary Club and was named a Paul Harris Fellow.

He is a member of the City Park Church of Christ. His daughter, Floy Jean Adkisson is a retired school teacher who now lives in Kerrville. His son, Bill, has lived all his life in Floydada, except for a stint in the service and Texas Tech.

One of Walt's most interesting stories about the dry goods business occurred in 1933, the first year Floyd County had made a good cotton crop during the great depression. He can still remember selling 16 bales of duck - with 1,000 yards to the bale - for people to make cotton sacks. That duck sold for 16 cents a yard. In addition, he sold 1,000 ready-made cotton sacks, and 700 dozen canvas gloves for the cotton pullers to wear. These sold for 90 cents a dozen.

Pioneer Woman Elfie Sherman, was born at home, in Lockney, on January 23, 1911, and weighed only 3 1/2 pounds at birth.

Her mother, Marcia Ellen had moved to Floyd County in 1894, with her parents J.B. and Anna Jones. Elfie's father,

George Thomas Meriwether, with his mother Mattie and step-father C.R. McCollum. Marcia Ellen and George Meriwether were married in Lockney in 1903.

Elfie graduated from Lockney High School in 1929 and went on to attend Lippert's Business College in Plainview and beauty school in California.

She married Lewis Kenzie Sherman, October 31, 1931. He died in 1974. They had three children, a daughter Billie Gayle, a son William Kenzie and another son Thomas Joe.

Gayle and her husband Boyd Reay live in Lockney, Bill and Mary Joe, and Tommy and June, live in the Lone Star community. She has 9 grandchildren, 2 step-grandchildren, 14 great-grandchildren and 5 step-great-grandchildren.

Elfie worked as a beauty operator while her husband worked in the banks in Haskell and Plainview before they moved to the farm south of Lockney. She began working at Lockney General Hospital in 1952 in the collection department. She became administrator and served in that capacity for 23 years until her retirement in 1975.

She is an artist and has taught oil painting to adults and children in her studio in her home until 6 years ago. She continues her picture framing business, records births and death certificates for Floyd County Precinct #2, and takes the money for the noon meals at Lockney Senior Citizens.

She has donated many of her paintings and handmade crocheted afghans for Chamber of Commerce banquets, Floyd County Art Association, and various other benefits. She has donated her time and talents in past years painting cheerleaders megaphones, items for Junior and Senior banquets, and signs for the front yards of the local football team. She has also donated the frames and framing for the certificates for the Pioneer Man, Woman and Couple for several years.

Elfie is a member of the Main Street Church of Christ in Lockney, the Lockney Chamber of Commerce, South Plains Art Association, Lockney Senior Citizens, Buffalo Grass Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and was a member of the Floyd County Arts Association until it recently disbanded.

Pioneer Couple Dee and Arla Copeland, of Lockney, were married February 6, 1934.

J.D. (Dee) Copeland was born 1/4 mile south of Lockney on October 24, 1908 to Frank and Lula Wellman Copeland. He began the first grade at Lockney Christian College, attended school in the Lone Star community, and finished his 4 years of high school at Gunter College in Gunter, Texas where his father was teaching music.

Arla Wheeler was born November 9, 1908 in Arkansas. She and J.D. met while they were both attending Gunter

Art teacher dies in mishap

Floydada Junior High art teacher, Dewane Franklin, 46, died at 4 p.m. Tuesday, May 28, from injuries suffered in an automobile/motorcycle accident in Miami, Oklahoma, located on the Oklahoma/Missouri border. He died at St. John's Hospital in Joplin, Missouri, where he had been taken following the accident.

The accident occurred at approximately 9:20 a.m. Tuesday. Available information indicates that apparently a car pulled around a truck it was passing and did not see Franklin, who swerved to miss the car, and hit a guard rail.

Franklin, who was traveling by motorcycle, had left his home in Floydada on Monday morning on his way to Lake George, New York, where he was to attend a motorcycle rally.

He had been an art teacher for the Floydada Independent School District for the past 21 years. He and his wife, Pat, have two daughters, Karrie Williams of Floydada and Teresa Burns of Baxley, Georgia, and two granddaughters.

Funeral services are pending with Moore-Rose-White Funeral Home, Floydada. Memorials may be given to the Dewane Franklin Art Scholarship Fund that has been established at First National Bank in Floydada.

Marker dedicated at Zimmerman house

Robert (Shorty) and Louise Turner, current owners of the "Zimmerman" house at 516 S. 1st Street, played host to a large crowd who came to witness the historical marker dedication of the Zimmerman house.

Mrs. Turner stood at a podium on her shaded front porch and greeted the guests who came for the historical event. Nancy Marble, a director of the Floyd County Museum Board gave a brief history of the home and then stepped back for the unveiling of the marker by Kimberly and Stephanie Zimmerman (great-granddaughters of the original owners).

After the unveiling guests were asked into the home for refreshments and tours of the house and its grounds.

Mr. and Mrs. Turner have lived in the

home since 1972, after purchasing the home from Turner's sister and brother-in-law Loretta and Leroy Burns. The original owner of the house was Fred Zimmerman.

Zimmerman who was originally from Portland, Oregon, left his home for Texas in the hopes of engaging in the land and cattle business. He began to acquire farm properties in Floyd County in 1916.

In the summer of 1929, Zimmerman initiated planning the construction of an "unusual residence" to be built in Floydada. He wanted the home to be of adobe construction.

He purchased the vacant south one half of Block No. Two in the Barker addition from R. Fred Brown on March 7, 1930, for \$1,600.00. The home was to

overlook adjacent pastures and wheat fields.

Zimmerman engaged architect Ray C. Arnold of Wichita Falls to draw blueprint plans and specifications for this residence.

Mr. Arnold visited Taos, New Mexico to study Santa Fe-Taos homes for construction and interior design to make the Zimmerman residence compatible with this style of architecture.

The home was to feature adobe brick walls, wooden ceiling beams, fireplaces in most of the rooms and flat roofs. The architect's fee for the plans and specifications was \$400.00.

The contract for the construction of the home was in the amount of \$11,200.00, and was awarded to M.D. Hicks, of Hamlin, Texas, on March 24,

1930.

All of these events were occurring at a time when the United States was in the early stages of the Great Depression. M.D. Hicks did the carpentry work and was assisted by his son, C.D. (Charlie) Hicks, and local carpenters Sam Thurman, James Colville and H.E. Cannaday.

The Hicks family were on hand at the recent marker dedication to pay tribute to the work of Charlie Hicks who died earlier this year, past the age of 90 years old.

Plans for the interior of the home called for classic Santa Fe-Taos style with "vigas" and "latillas" in the ceilings of the living and dining rooms. These timbers were to be 6" by 8" yellow

Marker dedicated at Zimmerman house

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pine or fir in the living room and 6" by 6" yellow pine or fir in the dining room.

The original blueprints as well as the construction records and contracts were kept in detail and still in the possession of Zimmerman's grandson Fred Zimmerman III.

All of the beams, or "vigas", were to be "roughly hewn", which was done personally by Mr. Charlie Hicks. The timbers of the ceiling beams were "foot adazed" and weathered at the construction site to create an antique appearance that is characteristic of "vigas" and to prevent warping as they dried.

The ceilings in the living room, dining room, and front porch were to be laid on top of the beams, and the ceilings, or "latillas," in the living and dining rooms were to be "laid diagonally as shown on the plan." The three bedroom ceilings were made "of 7/8 inch matched and beaded wood driven up tight and nailed to ceiling joist."

According to C.D. Hicks, the "interior doors for the house were built at the construction site and the braces which made the distinct "z" design on the doors were beveled with a drawknife instrument."

The interior doors were enhanced with wrought iron hardware brads that outlined the face of the "z" braces on each door, and heavy brass hinges.

The brick for the structure was made of dry, common press bricks manufac-

tured by the Ferris Brick Company, of Ferris, Texas. The specifications for the house called for all "outside walls...to be 13" thick, 4" of common brick backed up with 5" by 8" by 12" hard burned

hollow building tile." The walls were plastered and finished to appear like adobe construction, which was the owner's original desire.

The living room, dining room and

three bedrooms all possess fireplaces similar to the Santa Fe-Taos style. The mantel shelves over the fireplaces in the living and dining rooms were "rough hewn" and distinctively southwestern in likeness.

The construction of the residence was completed and accepted by Mr. Zimmerman on August 25, 1930. The final cost of the vacant lot, the contract price for the house, and the additions to the original plans was approximately \$17,000.00.

The sequence of ownership of the house is as follows: Fred Zimmerman, Sr. 1930; Eloise S. Zimmerman, 1944; W.U. White and wife Monte Ray White, 1946; W.U. White, 1958; Bob White and wife Geraldine White, 1964; Leroy and Loretta Burns, 1971; Robert O. and Louise Turner, 1972 until the present time.

The wording on the historical marker placed on the front porch wall of the home reads: "ZIMMERMAN HOUSE—Oregon native Fred Zimmerman, Sr., (1885-1954) came to the Texas Panhandle in 1916. He acquired a number of farm properties in the area and began a thirty-eight year career of farming and ranching in Floyd and Deaf Smith counties. In 1930 Zimmerman hired Wichita Falls architect Ray C. Arnold to design this house. A fine example of pueblo revival architecture, the stuccoed brick house features hand-hewn beams, vigas, and columns."

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College. J.D. finished an accounting course by correspondence from the International Accounting Society and Arla went on to graduate from the University of Arkansas.

After marriage, Arla taught home-making in Lockney High School for 4 years during WWII. She then received her masters of education degree from Texas Tech. She taught in the elementary grades until her retirement making a total of 29 years in the teaching profession. She has served on the Floyd County Library Board, is a member of Delta Kappa Gamma and El Progreso Study Club and was named Lockney's Woman of the Year in 1968.

Dee's first job was "busting flats" at Consumers Fuel in Lockney. He was promoted to clerk and then to manager. He became business manager for the hospital in Lockney in 1947. In 1948 he helped to organize, and became the general manager, of the Lockney General Hospital. The hospital was then located above the Greer Drug Store.

He was also instrumental in obtaining the buildings that are currently being used as the hospital.

He farmed from 1952 until 1956 when he opened an office on Main Street and began an insurance business and Income Tax Service. He still maintains this same office in the same location.

Dee has been a Rotarian since 1945 and has served in all the offices. In December he was awarded the Paul Harris Fellow award. He has been a member of the Lockney Chamber of Commerce for 50 years, and was a treasurer and bookkeeper for 28 of those years. He was selected Lockney's Man of the Year for 1969 by the Chamber of Commerce.

He has served on the Lockney City Council for 32 years, 6 of these years as Mayor of Lockney. He is a member of the Executive Board of the Floyd County Museum, Floyd County Historical Commission, Floyd County Pioneers' Reunion Association, and president of the Lockney Cemetery Association since 1977. He was honored by the Odd Fellows with the "Good Citizenship Award" in February of 1979.

He was ordained as an Elder of the Church of Christ in 1967 and served as treasurer of the congregation since 1950. He has been a song leader in the church for as long as any member can recall.

J.D. and Arla Copeland were blessed with three children, Bob (who was killed in an auto accident in 1961), Francis Huddleston and Celia Webb who both reside in Lubbock. They have six grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.

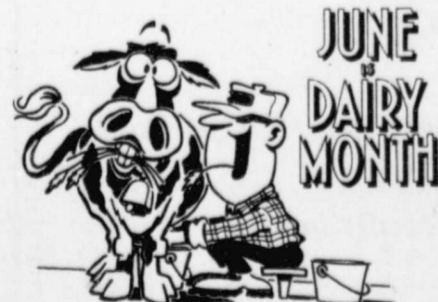

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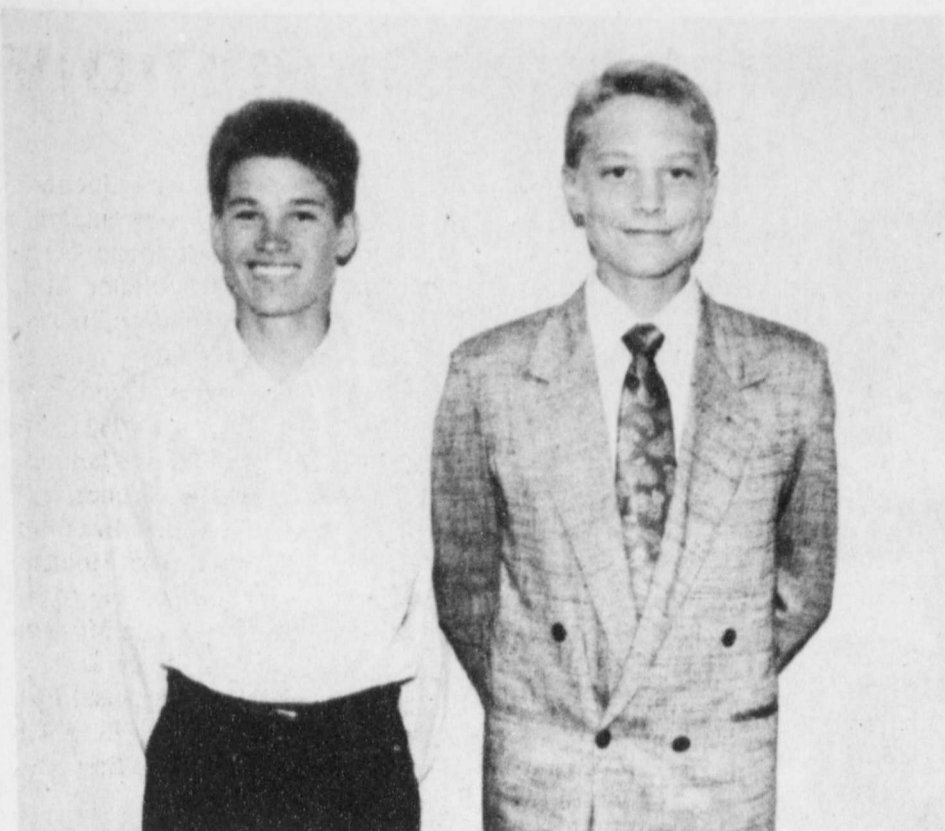

DPS Trooper Bud visits Lockney Elementary School students

Approximately 400 Lockney Elementary students were treated to a Trooper Bud program, sponsored by the Lockney Police Department, the Department of Public Safety and the Lubbock Police Department, on May 21.

Trooper Bud, the D.P.S. version of Robo Cop, is a remote control robot equipped with a video camera, flashing emergency lights and siren. Through his handler, Trooper Bud talks to the school kids about safety, drugs, child abduction, seatbelts, etc.

A four year veteran with the Texas Department of Public Safety, Trooper Bud is responsible for the arrest and conviction of two Brownfield me for the sexual assault of a young retarded child.

The child would not talk to anyone about the assault, but because the child felt comfortable with Trooper Bud, the mechanical trooper was able to take the child's statement. As a result of the statement the two men were arrested and convicted.

D.P.S. Trooper Eusebio Baiza operates and escorts Trooper Bud all around the D.P.S. region five area, from Muleshoe to Dickens and from Tulia to Lamesa. Baiza has operated Trooper Bud for two years and does approximately six programs a week for the public. D.P.S. Trooper Chris Ray, from Floydada, assisted Baiza with Trooper Bud.

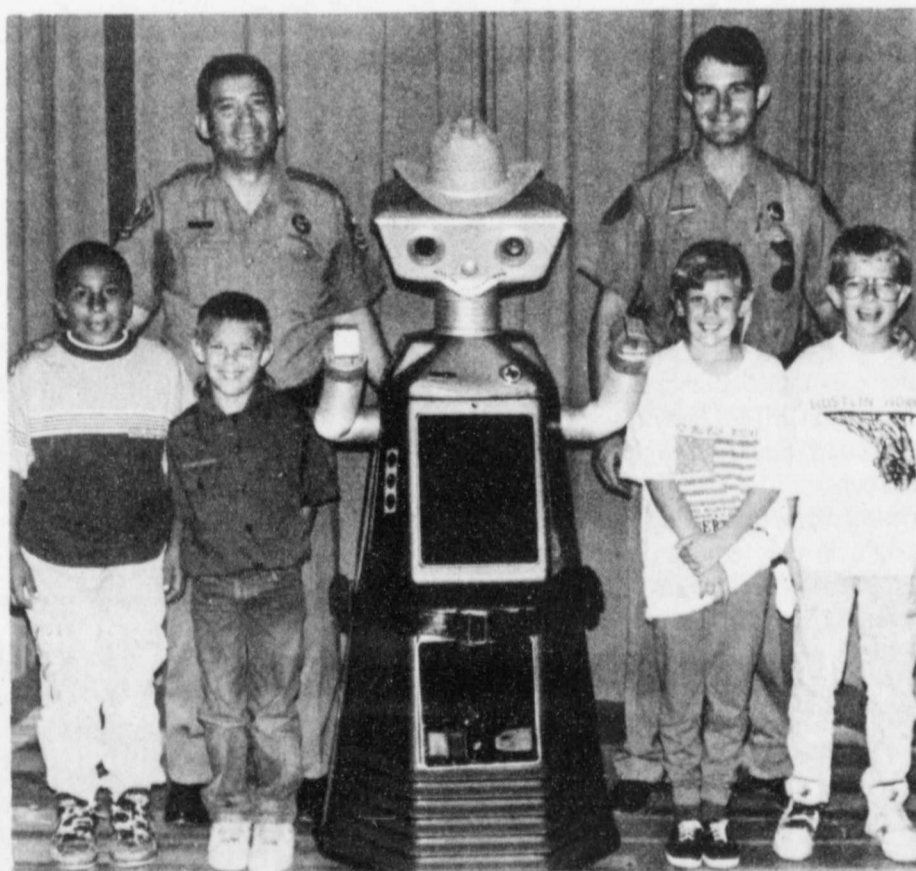
Lubbock Detectives Porfirio DeLeon and Floyd Price, with the Lubbock Crime Prevention Unit, were also on hand to participate in the program. Price and DeLeon often appear with Trooper Bud when their schedule allows them to do so.

"Detectives Price and DeLeon have been in Lockney a number of times," said Police Chief Lennie Gilroy. "Whenever we call them they show up and give programs on satanic cults, drugs, etc. You name it, and they can talk about it. I have never seen anyone who can keep an audience laughing one minute and crying the next minute, like they can. We really look forward to them coming to Lockney."

Sgt. Jerry Edwards, with the Lockney Police Department, set up the Trooper Bud program at the Lockney Elementary school. "This is the first time we have had Trooper Bud in Lockney," said Edwards. "Because of the good response at the school, we are going to try to get Trooper Bud in Lockney every year if possible."

Bill Staples earns grant for ag project

Ten engineering students at Texas Tech University recently completed research projects funded by a \$48,000 grant from the National Science Foundation.

Individual stipends of \$3,000 enabled undergraduate students to embark on extensive, independent research projects that are part of a new program called "Project Succeed." Supplies and equipment for the projects were purchased with the remaining \$18,000.

Bill Staples, a freshman agricultural engineering major from Floydada, was a grant recipient for his project "Effects of moisture and temperature on grain damage."

The goal of the project focuses on strengthening the learning skills of students through applied research projects. The most effective form of accomplishing the goal is to incorporate quality research experiences at the undergraduate level, said Clifford Fedler, associate professor of agricultural engineering at Texas Tech.

"While basic engineering principles are taught in core courses, rarely are they applied to real world problems. However, if students are required to apply these principles and use or develop a methodology, the result often is a stronger understanding of those principles," said Fedler.

Throughout the fall and spring semesters, students worked one-on-one with a faculty member on their selected research topics. They met weekly to discuss their projects and to exchange ideas, he said.

Students participating in the project were composed of non-conventional students, including minorities, females, adults age 25 or older and students from small schools that lack the personnel or facilities necessary to properly prepare them for university level work in engineering.

This is the first year for Texas Tech to participate in the program. Currently, students from a dozen universities throughout the nation are participating in the project.

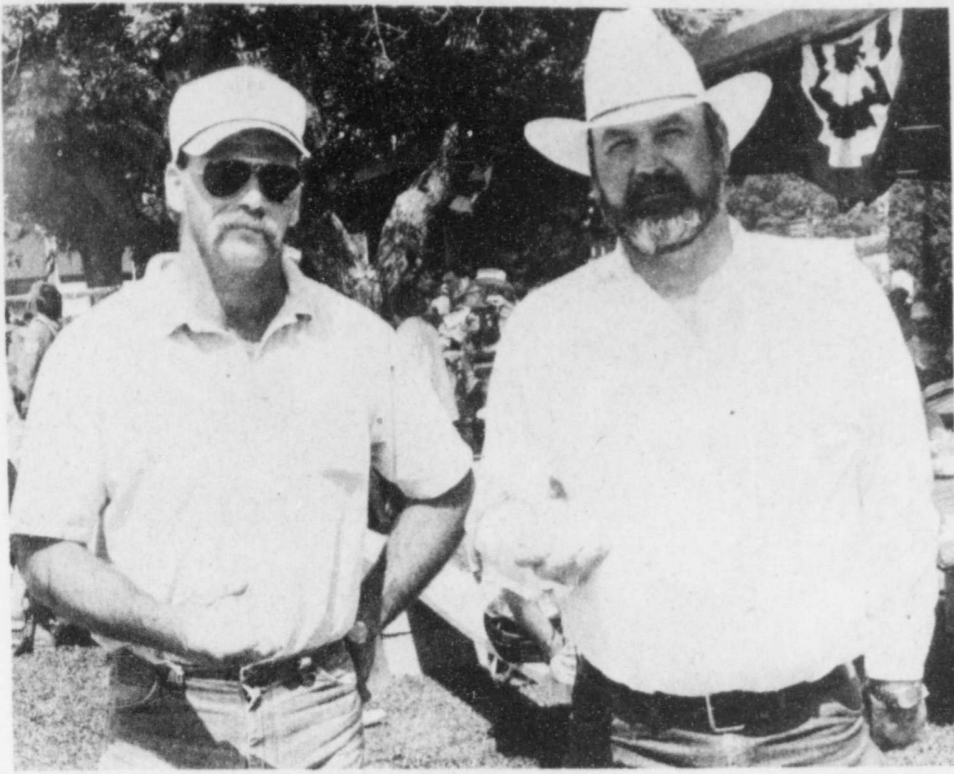

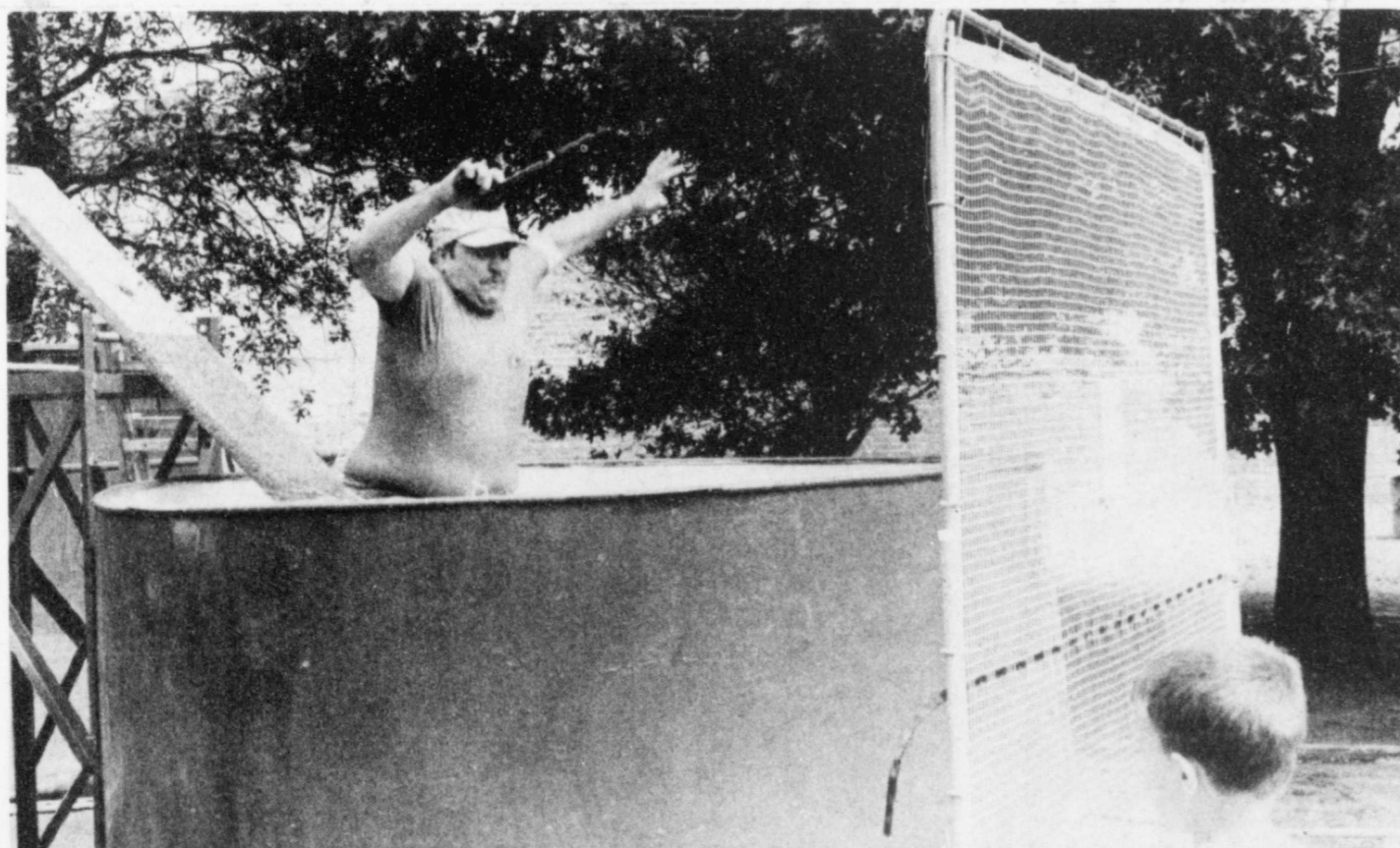

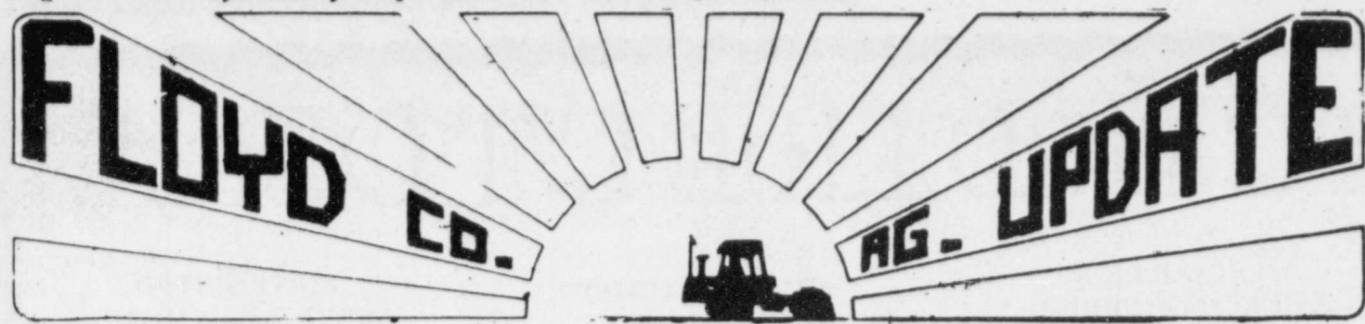

Pits and playas control runoff

Approximately 1,444 tailwater return pits and 1,289 modified playa basins are currently being used to capture irrigation tailwater and rainfall runoff for reuse within the 5.5 million acre High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area, according to a recent District inventory.

Deaf Smith County leads the Water District with 451 tailwater return pits, followed by Parmer County with 338 and Castro County with 309.

There are approximately 300 modified playa basins in Floyd County. Castro County follows with 263 modified playas and Parmer County with 186.

Excess irrigation water, or "tailwater," running off the end of a field has been a serious concern of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 since its creation in 1951. The primary cause of tailwater were furrows runs in excess of about one-half mile which required large flow rates to literally "push" the water through the furrows.

In the mid-1960s, the Water District constructed V-notch weirs and placed them in county bar ditches to measure actual tailwater losses. Flood gauges installed in front of the weirs measured the height of the water flowing through the weir. Signs showing the conversion of the inches of water passing through the weirs into gallons per minute were placed beside each installation.

The District's study concluded that as much as 20 percent of the volume of water pumped by an irrigator could be lost as irrigation tailwater. In addition, it was discovered that tailwater waste encouraged soil erosion.

Since then, the District has actively promoted the use of tailwater return systems to stop accumulation of silt in bar ditches, flooding of county roads, damage to neighboring fields, and to conserve precious groundwater resources.

The Water District designed and constructed several tailwater return demonstration systems in the 1960s. Public tours of these demonstration systems was one method used by the District to promote the adoption of this water conservation technique. The positive re-

sults obtained from these first tailwater return pit installations convinced many irrigators to install and use tailwater return systems on their farms.

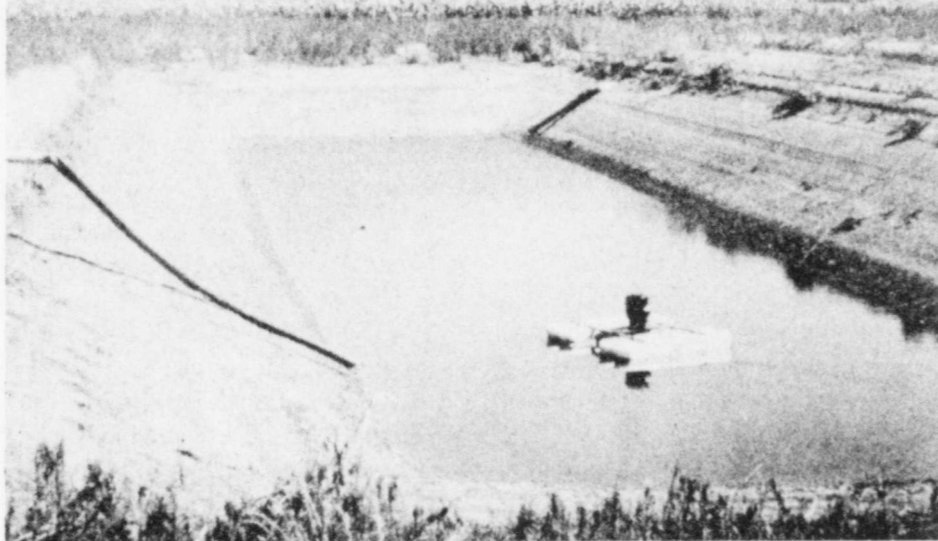
Throughout the years, these tailwater recovery systems have proven to be of great benefit to many High Plains producers. The collection and use of irrigation tailwater reduced the quantity of water to be pumped from the Ogallala Aquifer, which ultimately reduced pumping costs and helped conserve groundwater.

"Shorter row lengths, changes in irrigation application times, use of earthen borders, and improvements in irrigation technology, such as surge valves, have significantly reduced irrigation tailwater waste. However, it was the adoption of the tailwater return pit and modified playa basins which allowed irrigators to manage their tailwater for the first time. We commend our irrigators for imple-

menting this water conservation practice," says A. Wayne Wyatt, High Plains Water District Manager.

Wyatt also noted that many tailwater return systems were not included in the District's recent survey. "The tailwater return systems that were not counted are located on farms where center pivot sprinkler systems have been installed. These return systems have served their initial purpose of recovering irrigation tailwater. Now that the more water-efficient center pivot sprinklers have been installed, these abandoned tailwater return pits are now being used to provide shelter and a source of water for wildlife," he said.

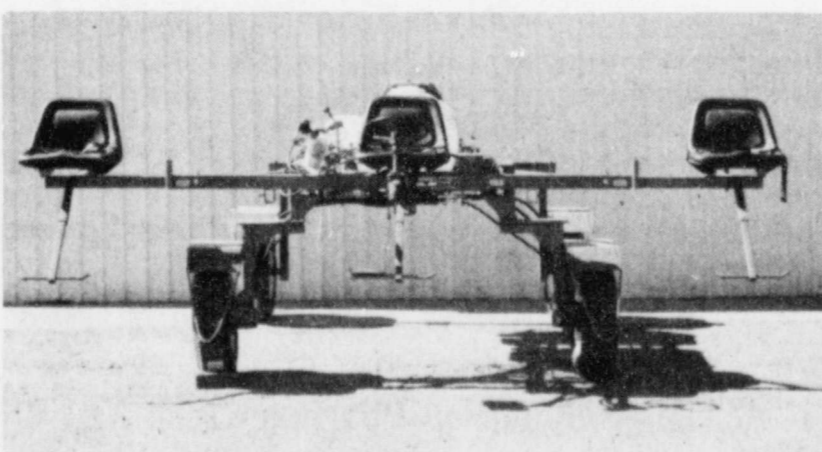

Field scout training

June 4 workshop to teach methods

Training of field scouts who survey crops to assess pest population densities in integrated pest management (IPM) programs in the area will be conducted in Plainview, June 4, by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The workshop at the Ollie Liner Agricultural Center, on South U.S. Hwy. 87 (Business Route), is open to summer scouts of private crop consultants, aerial applicators, pesticide applicators and farmers who scout their own fields. The workshop will begin at 8:30 a.m. and end at 4:30 p.m.

This year's workshop has been accredited by the Texas Department of Agriculture to award five continuing education units (CEU's) toward state recertification of commercial, non-commercial and private pesticide applicators.

Dr. James F. Leser, Extension Service entomologist and workshop coordinator, said this year's course will cover scouting of cotton and grains, identification of plant disease and nutrient deficiency symptoms, common pests, use of herbicides and safe handling of pesticides.

IPM is a coordinated approach to management decisions based on pest populations and economic thresholds. It is designed to effectively control weeds, insects and diseases and maximize profits while creating minimal harm to the environment.

Scouts examine fields in a systematic pattern at regular intervals each week. Producer treatments for pests are based on economic threat to the crop, presence of beneficial insects which are enemies of the pests, and proper timing of pesticide use for maximum return with the lowest chemical input.

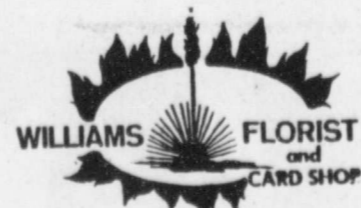
