A FRIEND has shared a copy of "Comings, Goings & Doings," which is "published occasionally" by O.R. Stark at the First National Bank at Quitaque. We wanted to share a part of this newsletter with you:

THE FARMER'S SHARE

Have you ever wondered how much money the farmer receives for the cotton he grows that eventually ends up in a pair of blue jeans? Or from the wheat he produces that ends up in a loaf of bread? You plant the cotton, harvest it, have it ginned, then eventually sell it for whatever price the buyer wants to pay you. Then you buy a cotton shirt, and you feel the REAL PINCH of low farm prices. The price you pay for the shirt, or for any other agriculturally-related product, is COMPLETELY OUT OF PROPORTION to what you're paid for the product you've grown.

A cotton shirt that costs you \$15.95 at the store nets the farmer only 56 cents for his cotton. That's only 3 1/2 per cent of the retail price. A \$4.98 bath towel earns the cotton grower only 57 cents and the farmer's share of an \$18.95 pair of blue jeans is only about \$1.68, a mere 8 per cent of the total value. Dr. O.A. Cleveland of Mississippi State University explained how a 65 cent pound of cotton ended up in an \$18.00 pair of jeans. To that initial 65 cents you add 11 cents for ginning and 8 cents for marketing, making it worth 84 cents by the time it gets to the mill. Textile processing costs boost the price of the cotton to \$2.50 and making it into a finished fabric adds another \$2.40. You now have \$4.90. Wholesaling and retailing add \$3.95, so now the pound of cotton totals \$8.85. A pair of jeans has over two pounds of cotton and sells for about \$18.00, but only about \$1.30 of the total proceeds ends up in the farmer's pocket!

Here are some other examples which show HOW UNDERPAID the farmer is in relation to the total selling price of the product he grew. In the first column is the name of the finished product, followed by the current retail price and the approximate price that the farmer received.

THE NAME QUITAQUE--About the time we think there will be a lapse in the misspelling of Quitaque, then in pop some of our customers with spellings that are new and different. A few days ago Don Taylor had a letter from New York addressed to him at "Claritague" Texas, and James Cathey had a letter from Dallas that spelled the town a little like it is pronounced--"Kittyguay."

We still contend that Quitaque is more difficult to spell, and certainly harder to pronounce than Nacogdoches (Editor Victor B. Fain of the Daily Sentinel please take notice) but both places will have to take a back seat forever to the lake up in Massachusetts we read about a few years ago. The lake is located near the town of Webster, and it is named Lake CharGaggagoggmmanchaug-gauggagoggchabunagumau. This is an Indian name which means "You fish on your side, I'll fish on my side, and nobody fishes in the middle."

Area Receives Some Moisture

The Friona area received some of the best moisture in a number of months on Tuesday of this week.

About mid morning on Tuesday, a light rain began falling, and before noon it changed to snow, buffeted by a strong north wind.

An estimated half-inch of moisture was received in the area. An additional .25 inch of moisture had been received here last Friday morning, so residents were able to see some mud for the first time in months.

The moisture might be the salvation for the area's dryland wheat and barley, which has been badly needing a boost. The area had not received nearly as much winter snow as it usually does, and conditions have been exceptionally dry.

Candidates To Gather On Monday

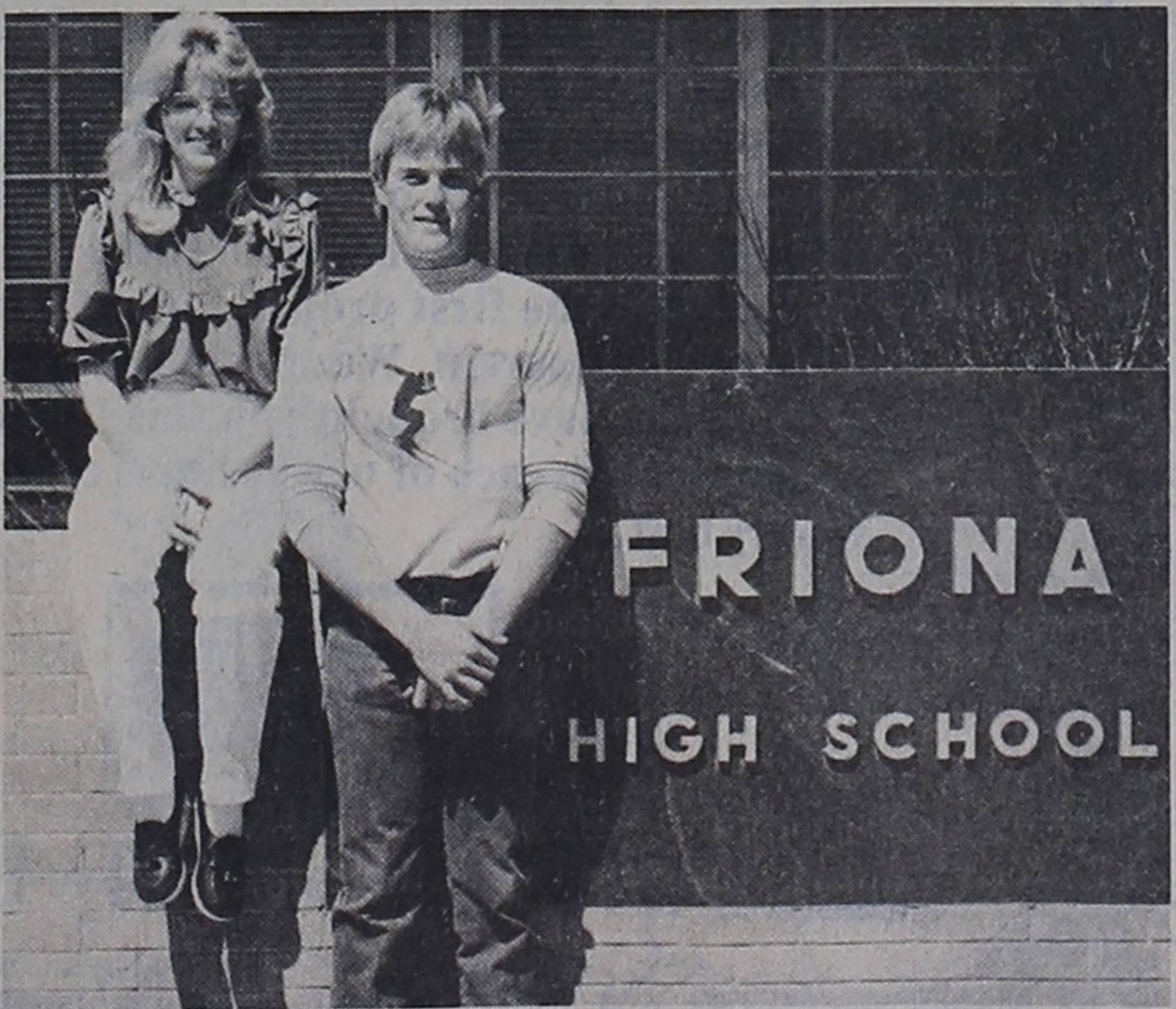

The program will begin at 7:30 p.m. and candidates for the Friona school board and city council races are being invited to participate.

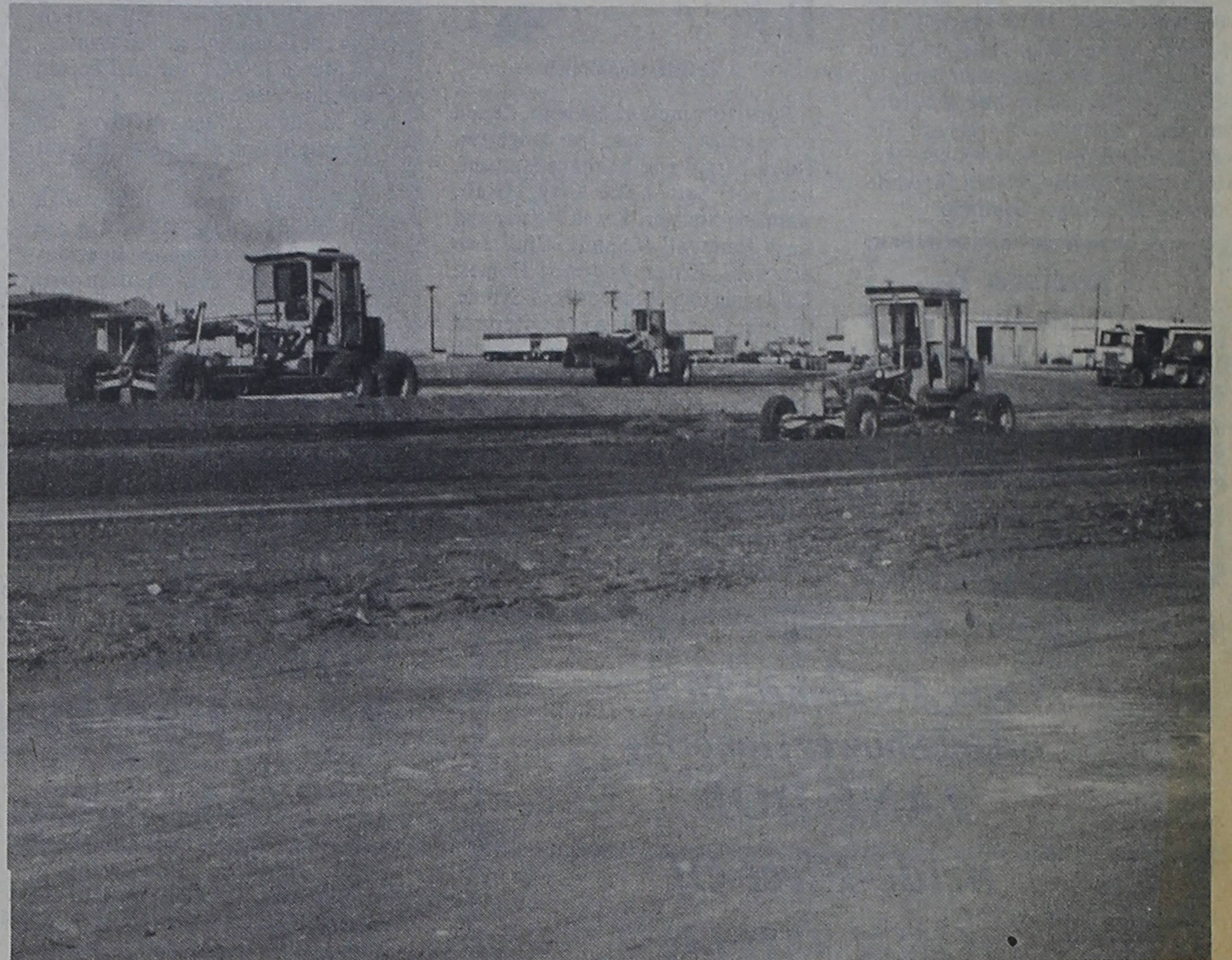
Candidates will introduce themselves, and state their reasons for running. Questions will then be allowed from the floor.

Italian Youth Is Here To Study Cattle Industry

A 23-year-old Italian, Luigi Pagliani, has been working at Hi-Pro Feeds since February, learning some of the technical ends of the cattle-feeding industry.

Pagliani has his college degree in animal breeding and nutrition, and was wanting to get some practical experience in the field, prior to enrolling later this year for his master's degree. He will be studying at the University of Aberdeen in England.

Pagliani's father, Paolo (Paul), of Milan, Italy, is president of the Bayer (aspirin) Company's Italy operations. He did some inquiring to find the best place for his son to get some experience in the cattle industry in this country, and was put in touch with the officials at Friona Industries, who have some dealings with one of the Bayer subsidiaries.

Jack Hamil has served as Pagliani's supervisor at Hi-Pro Feeds. At the end of April, the young man is expected to transfer to Swisher County Cattle Co. at Tulia, to pursue the industry from another angle.

At Hi-Pro Feeds, Pagliani has

found out how the lab work is done, and has assisted in various phases of the company's work. Pagliani, who speaks good English, says his stay here has been "A good experience; very interesting."

He says he has been impressed with the differences in this area and his home, which include the landscape, the weather and the food. Another notable difference, he said, was in the size and scope of everything here.

"The people have been very friendly. And I like the weather--except for the wind. It is warmer here than in northern Italy," he said.

Pagliani said he had enjoyed his work at Hi-Pro. "The people here have been very serious. I especially like the lab work. I will miss the people of Friona when I leave--I think I have met about one-half of the population already," the visitor says.

His co-workers at Hi-Pro have given Luigi the nickname of "Squeegie," which he doesn't mind.

Pagliani arrived here on January 30. He expects to work at the feedlot near Tulia for approximately three months, and then will be leaving for home and ultimately England to continue his studies.

Concerning the English language, he says he studied English for five years (Italian high schools are five years in duration), but did not continue it in college except that he did spend one month each year in England.

"I almost had to re-learn it (English) when I came here. Plus, you Texans use the word 'fix' for everything. This was a new term for me," Pagliani admitted. He said that in watching television, he is able to pick up most of the dialogue.

He has two younger brothers in Italy, Carlo (Charlie), 22, and Filippo (Philip), 15.

Hamil says it has been a pleasure working with the young Italian. "We have found him to be exceptionally bright, and eager to learn all he can

Absentee ballots can be cast at the city hall for the city council race, and at Superintendent Tom Jarboe's office in the school race, during office hours.

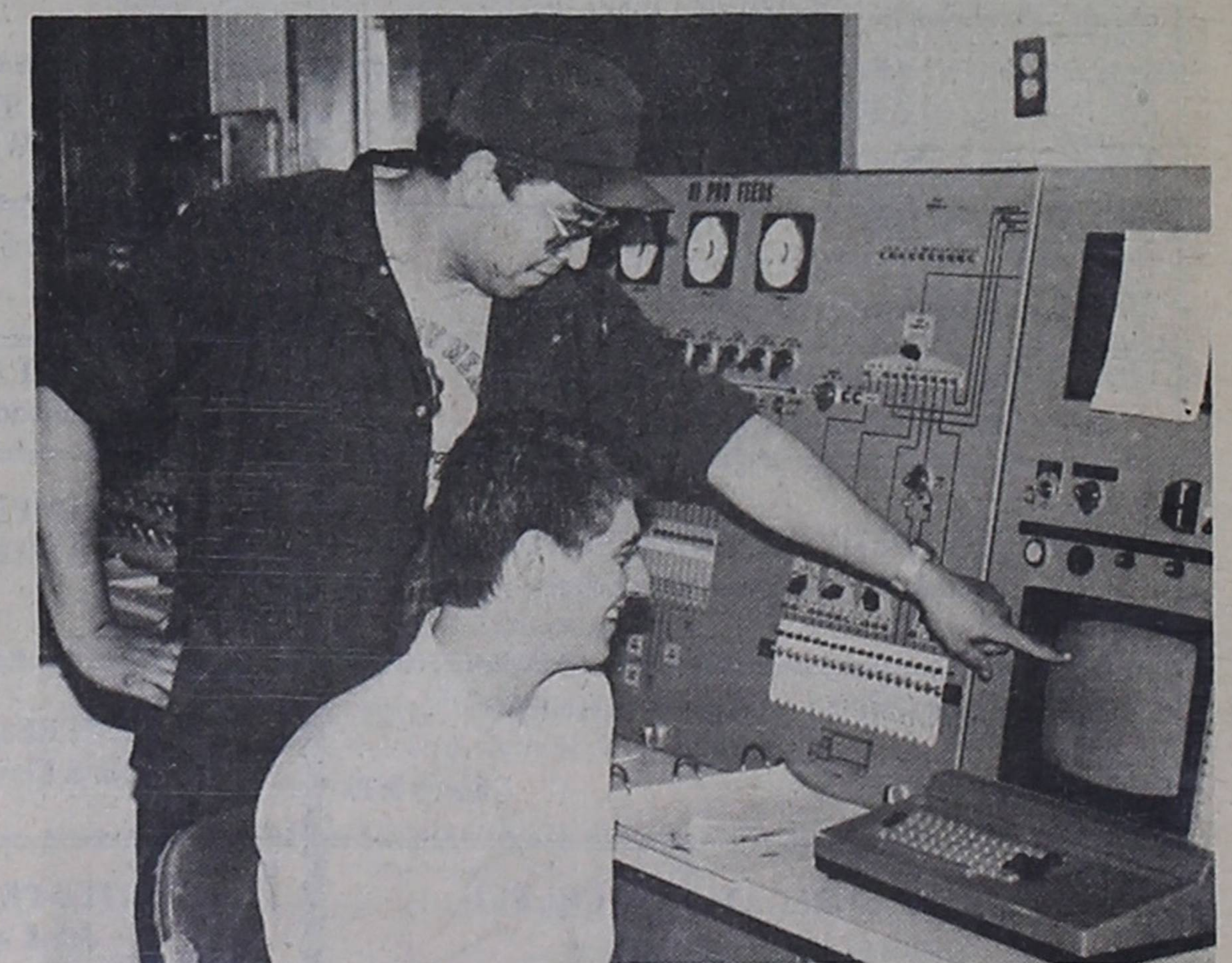
The election will be held on Saturday, April 7.

Poisoning
Fact List

1. There are some 150,000 poisonings that occur each year in Texas.

2. 75-85 per cent of all poisoning episodes occur in children under five years old.

3. The Texas State Poison Center handled 29,109 poisoning emergencies during 1983, and answered some 19,000 general information inquiries.

4. Nearly 10 per cent of the ingestions by children-involved their eating household and garden plants.

5. March 18-24 is National Poison Prevention Week.

6. Medicines are involved in poisoning episodes some 40 per cent of the time.

7. Even if you do not live with small children--you should store cleaning products and medications safely--because small children visit everyone.

8. Syrup of ipecac, a substance for inducing vomiting, should be in every home where small children live or visit. It should never be given before calling the Poison Center or your family physician.

9. Never take medicine in the presence of small children, because they like to imitate adults.

Classes start at 8 a.m. (MST) and students eleven years old or younger must have a parent present.

The course will be taught by Tom Cunningham, hunter-safety instructor, of Clovis, New Mexico.

The New Mexico hunter-safety course is valid in Texas, Colorado or any state and is required for hunters under 18 years old in several states.

55 YEARS AGO--MARCH 22, 1929

The mill is capable of taking any kind of feed stuff in any form in which it may be taken from the farm and converting almost instantly into the very finest of feed for any and all kinds of stock.

45 YEARS AGO--MARCH 24, 1939

The program committee of the Friona Chamber of Commerce has announced a banquet, to be held in the basement of the Congregational Church next Tuesday night. Mr. Cal Farley of Amarillo will be the speaker for the evening.

Glenn Reeve has become the owner of the Ralph Tedford residence property on Fifth Street. Mr. Reeve has taken a position with his father, Mayor F.W. Reeve, in the Reeve Chevrolet Company, and will move his family to town from the farm a half mile west of town.

Brand Law Is Subject Of Amarillo Meeting

A Texas Farm Bureau-sponsored meeting on the Texas cattle brand law will be held at 10 a.m., April 3, in the Hilton Inn at Amarillo, according to Floyd Schueler, president of the Parmer County Farm Bureau.

Schueler said the purpose of the meeting would be to allow Panhandle cattlemen a further opportunity to consider a regional brand law on a local option basis, as authorized in the Texas Farm Bureau policy.

Schueler noted that cattle brands in Texas are registered on a county basis, and that in most instances this system has proven adequate.

However, in the Panhandle where winter blizzards sometime scatter cattle over several counties, cattlemen have "expressed the desire to have a regional brand registration," Schueler commented.

The following beef industry people and TFB staff will appear on the program: George E. Feaster, a member of the Beef Industry Council Board of Directors; Ridge Pate, TFB staff attorney; H.L. Rowe, brand commissioner with the Colorado State Board of Stock Inspection; Don King, general manager of the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raiser Association and J.D. Chieftains Post Some Good Marks In Meet

Although failing for the first time this season to win the team title, the Chieftain track and field team had some good marks in the Tulia Invitational meet last week.

Coach Steve Williams praised the performance of the team, pointing out that several performers came up with their best marks of the season, even in non-winning events.

John Aguirre continued his good showing in the 400-meter dash, winning with a time of 51.0. This performance also ranks Aguirre with the third-best time among all tracksters in the Panhandle, from 5A through A classification.

Daniel Gowens won his third high jump title of the season with a jump of 6-2. The field events were concluded in Friday's freezing, snowy weather. Saturday's events were held in ideal conditions, as it warmed up to over 60 degrees and was a sunny day.

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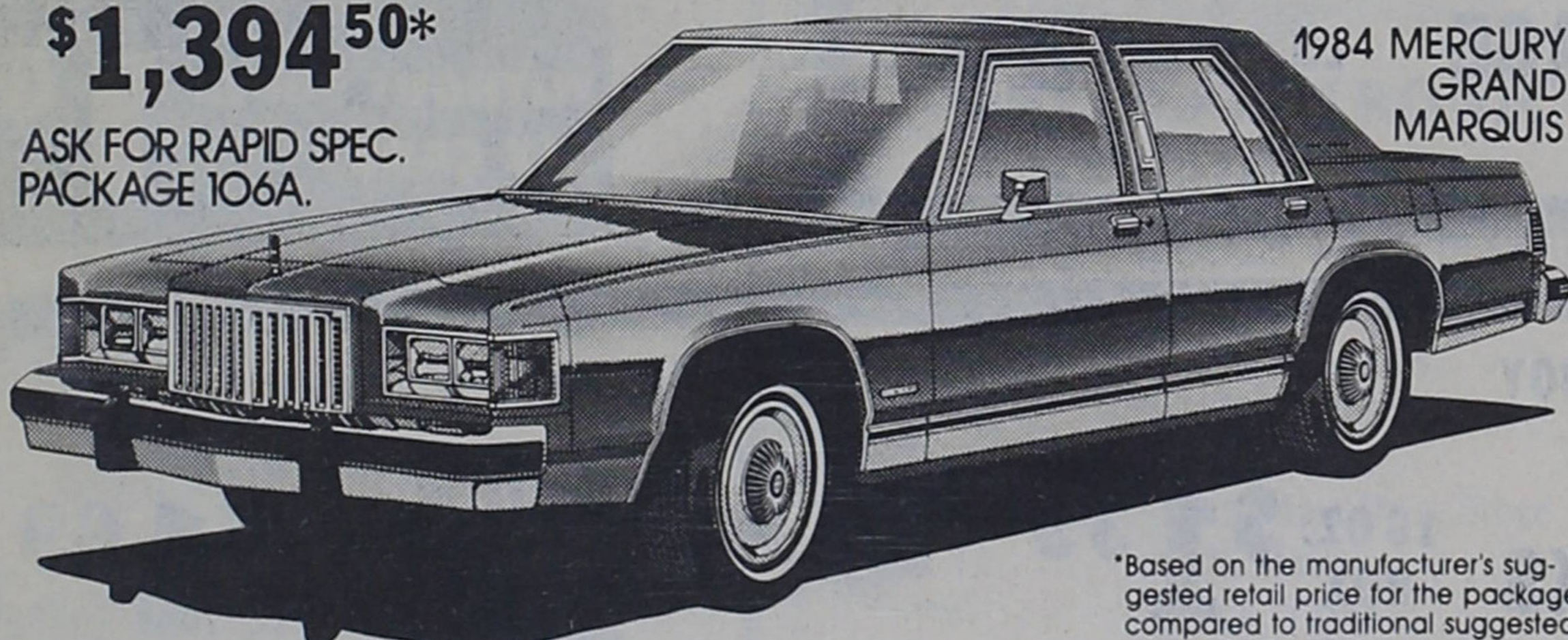

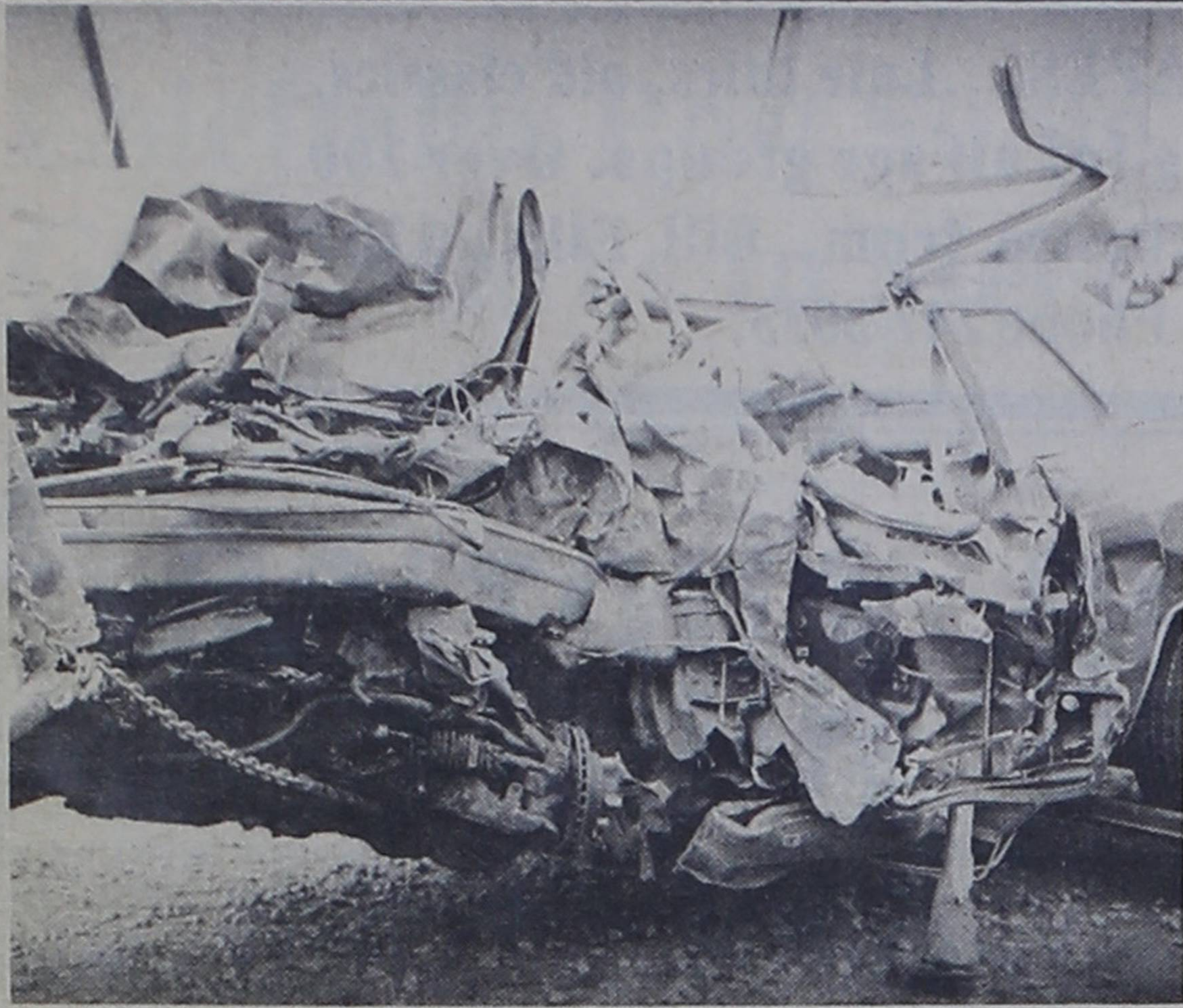

SPS Gives Details On Intertie

Exchanges of electrical power between Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) and Colorado-Ute Electric Association, Inc., of Montrose, Colorado, will be possible through a high-voltage "interconnection" the utilities announced today.

The high-voltage, direct-current (HVDC) interconnection facility will allow SPS and Colorado-Ute to exchange power on a seasonal basis, said Bert Ballengee, Southwestern Public Service Company president and chief operating officer.

"The result will help keep customers' electricity bills as low as possible," Ballengee said.

Power exchanges between utilities, he explained, allow companies to share power plant capabilities. Sharing plant capabilities helps delay building new, expensive power plants that eventually would be paid for by customers.

Ballengee said, "Each utility will help the other meet 'peak demands' for electricity, thus delaying the need for additional power plants in the short run."

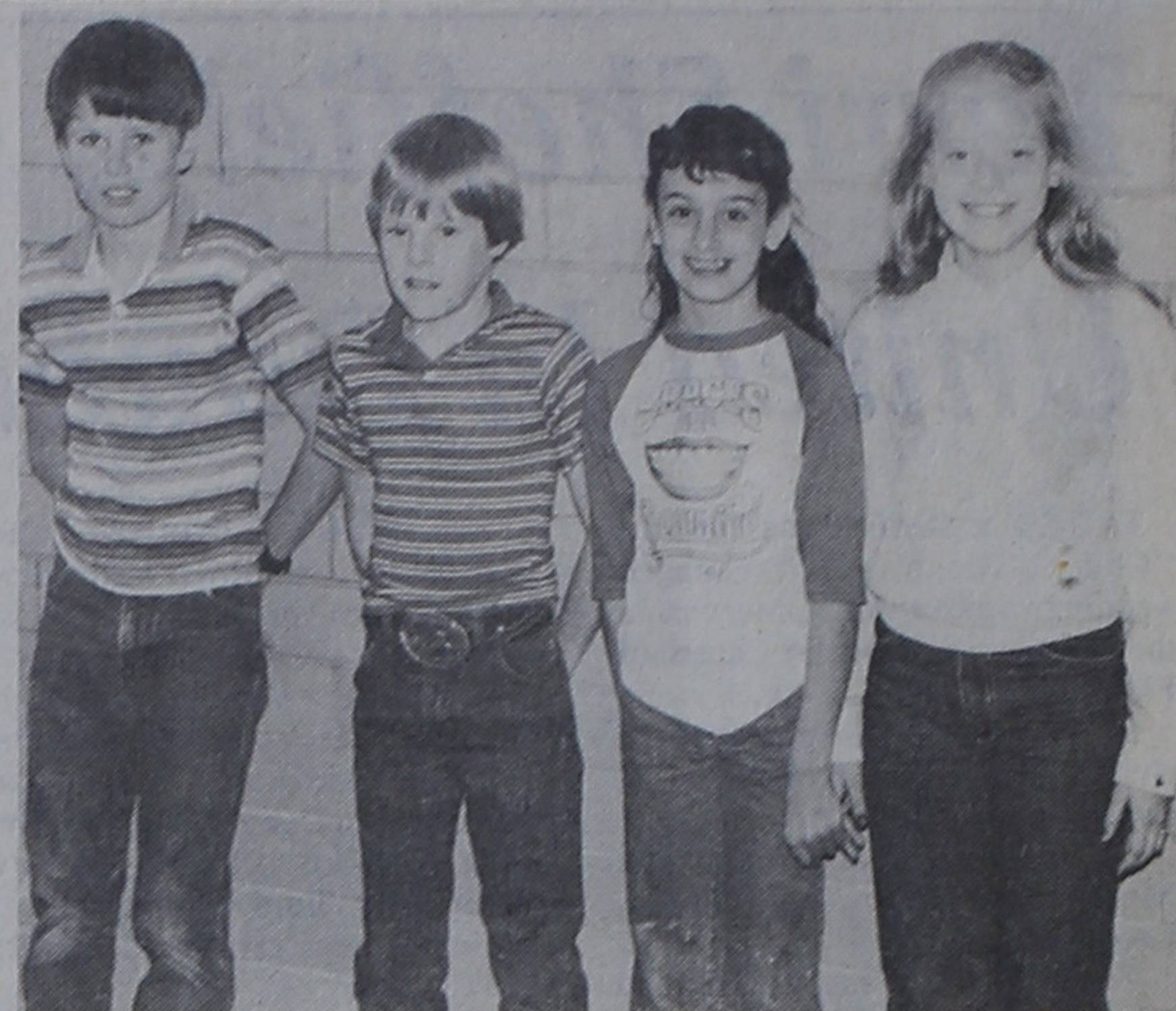

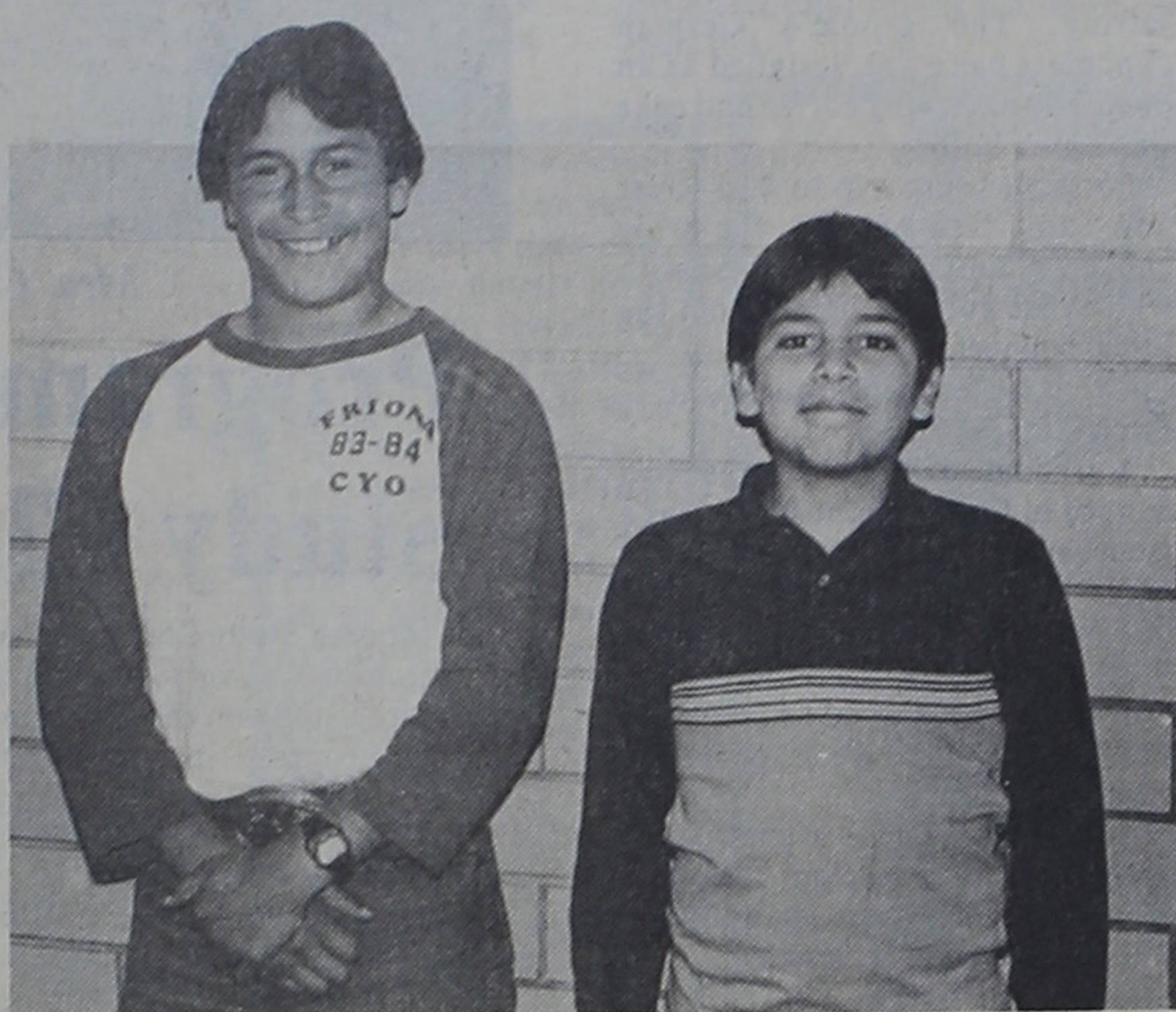

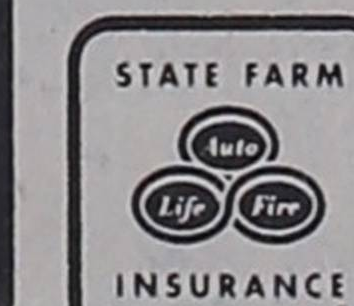
