## High winds and tornadoes wreak havoc across county

High winds, a large squall of blowing dust, and tornadoes rolled into Floyd County Wednesday night, June 6, topping Providence wind gauges at 90 mph. Electricity went out in Lockney at approximately 7:00 p.m. and in Floydada at approximately 7:40 p.m. Although slightly cloudy in the county,

there was no warning to storm watchers or residents about the storm that quickly descended on the county.

The National Weather Service stated that the radar showed no tornadoes in the cloud that hit Lockney and Floydada at approximately 7:30, but landowners who later found twisted barns, linemen

repairing snapped power poles, and farmers watching the clouds disagree.

In the Lockney area, the Ellis Butler family (who live east of Lockney on the "old Pinner place") lost a large barn and several outbuildings. The barn, which was anchored down into cement, was lifted up, twisted inside out and blown

approximately 200 yards northeast. A camper on the back of a pickup was also blown away and has not been found.

The Butler's house trailer, which was not anchored down, was not damaged. One mile south of Lockney on 378, the roof of Sam Fortenberry's barn was blown off.

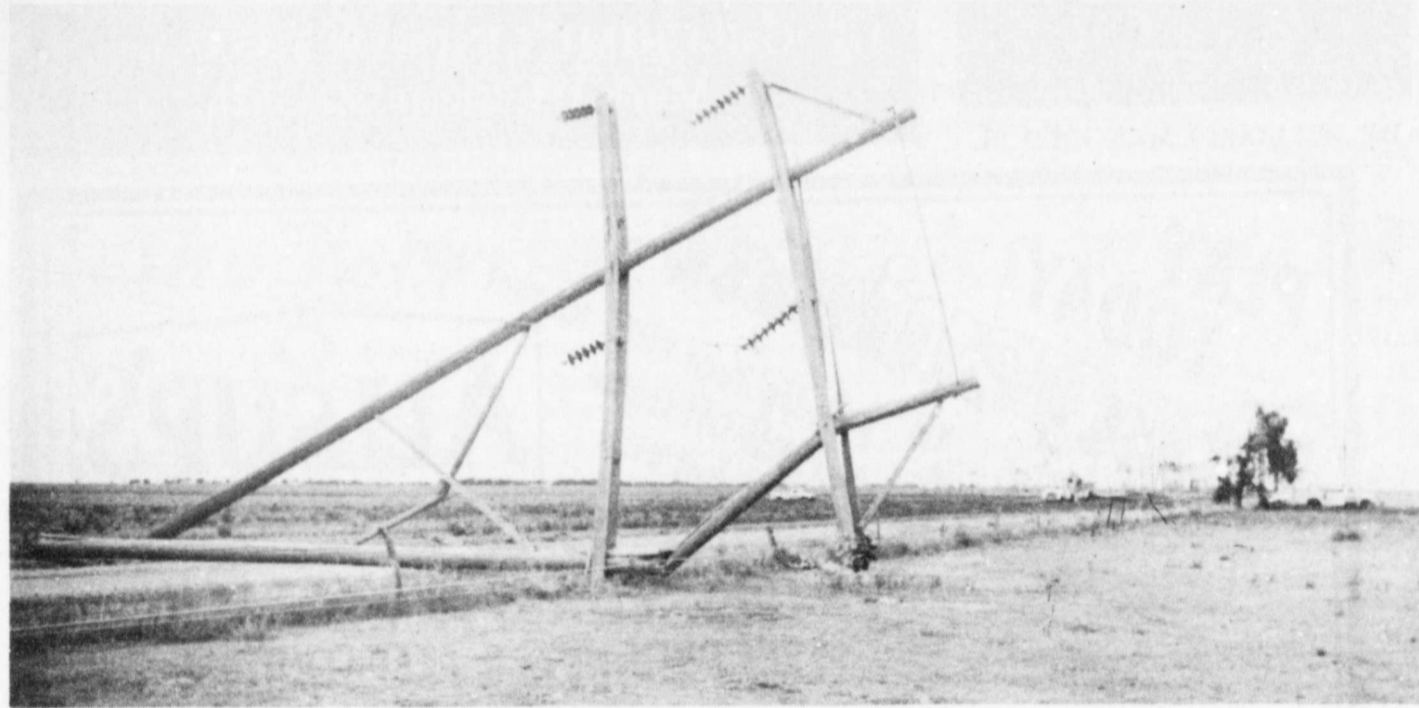
The Crume Gin, north of Providence, reported losing their gin burr house and barracks which had been built for hoe hands in the 1950's. Debris was scattered everywhere at the gin and elsewhere throughout the area.

Two people reported sighting a tornado in the Providence area which may have been responsible for snapping off a telephone pole four feet from the ground and twisting its top off.

Five electric poles on FM 207, near Steve Lloyds farm 4 1/2 miles north of Floydada, were also snapped.

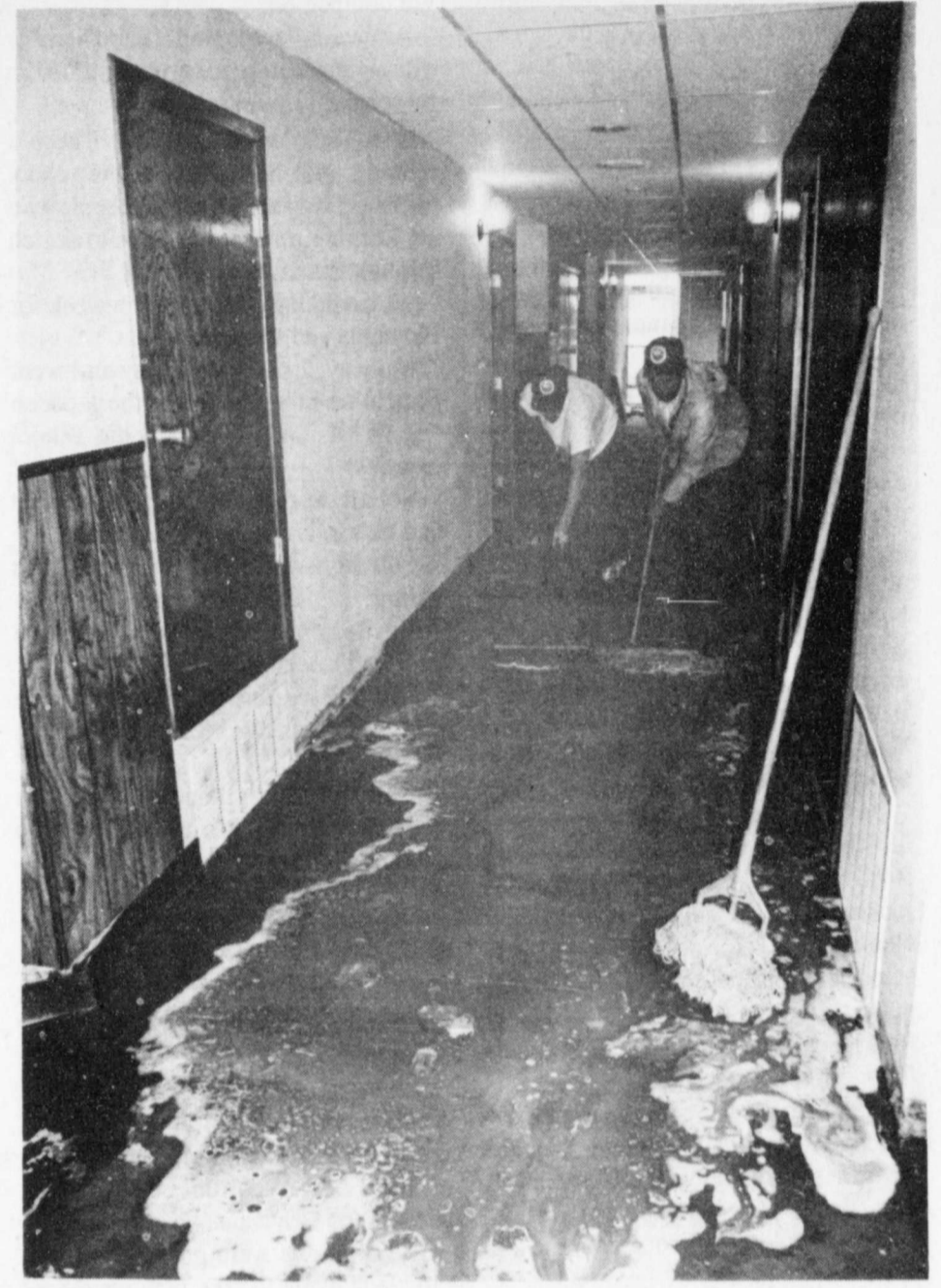
In Harmony a portion of the tin roof of the community center was blown off.

Also, near the Harmony community and south of Barwise, three transmission lines (75 ft. double structure poles) belonging to SPS were snapped and blown over. One more pole was broken but did not fall. These poles carry the lines that feed electricity into the city of Floydada. When they fell the power was cut off into the city. A resident in the area

### What is your community doing during bad weather?

When severe weather strikes the area citizens should be aware that emergency personnel all over the county (and often with help from surrounding counties) are busy following the storm's path and preparing for any kind of emergency situation that may arise because of it.

When the National Weather Service (NWS) issues a severe storm warning for the counties of Crosby, Lubbock, Hale or Floyd, the movement is tracked by a minimum of 9 local emergency departments. These departments begin to implement their emergency operating plans immediately, very often before citizens are aware there are bad clouds approaching.

Each department: the State Highway Department, the Department of Public Safety, the Floyd County Sheriff's Office, the Fire Departments of Floydada, Lockney and Dougherty, Floydada and Lockney Police Department and the city personnel of Floydada have emergency plans they follow.

Each department is trained throughout the year in how to handle emergencies that arise because of the storms and also trained in how to watch for possible tornadoes.

When the alert is issued, the employees of the state highway department are put on standby and are dispersed where needed to close roads due to high water or debris, direct traffic or help clean up and reopen the roads after the storm has passed by.

### Shooting suspect surrenders

Carlos Cavazos, a suspect in the shooting of a Lockney man, Joe Castro Jr., surrendered to the Floyd County Sheriff's Office, Wednesday, June 5, at 4:51 p.m.

A warrant had been issued for Cavazos Wednesday morning, for the attempted murder of Castro.

The shooting occurred in Lockney, Sunday, June 2, at approximately 10:00 p.m., at the women's softball field, near S.E. 3rd and Shurbet Street.

Cavazos is currently free on \$15,000 bond.

D.P.S., along with the Floyd County Sheriff's office, go to different areas of the county to watch the cloud for possible tornado activity. They are also available to drive the various highways to check for problems caused by the storm.

The 3 fire departments in the county also send out personnel to watch clouds. These men usually go 8 to 10 miles from the towns toward the cloud. The primary

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## County Education District forms

During the June regular school board session on June 10, superintendent Jerry Cannon informed Floydada ISD trustees that two members would have to be appointed to serve on the County Education District board. The district, created by the state legislature through Senate Bill 351 and the companion House Bill 2885, joins the two Floyd County schools to equalize the property wealth in the county between the two schools.

A county education district will be able to levy taxes at a rate set by state formulas. It will then collect and redistribute these taxes between the schools comprising the district, in this case, FISD and LISD schools. The district will have the authority to hire staff members, enter into contracts and to call elections.

A governing board, made up of trustees appointed from member school boards, will have the task of conducting an election on August 10 to allow voters to decide the merits of homestead exemptions, personal property exemptions for non-income producing property items, and exemptions for the elderly and disabled.

Board members appointed Charlene Brown and Michael Hinsley to serve on the new county entity. An organizational meeting will be held between June 13 and June 30 under the supervision of Superintendent Cannon. He supervises due to his position as chief administrator of the schools with the largest average daily attendance in the newly formed taxing district.

### Do You Have A Storm Cellar?

The city is in the process of making a list of residents with cellars. If a tornado was to strike the city, emergency workers would check the cellars and basements listed to make sure that no one is trapped inside.

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## Gary Brown meets with Lockney City Council

The Lockney City Council met in regular session Thursday morning to hear a report from Gary Brown on the SPAG Regional Landfill Board meeting. The board also discussed mosquito spraying.

Brown is the Floydada City Manager and he explained that he had been appointed to the South Plains Area Government Regional Landfill Board because Floydada has an application pending for a regional landfill.

He told the group that there are from two to ten landfills in various stages in working towards a permit in a 17 county area that are feasible costwise. Brownfield and Plainview are working toward regional landfills and Floydada is working toward a countywide landfill. 10:45 p.m. She is currently in undetermined condition at a Plainview hospital."

What a way to get a great rain. I heard a farmer's wife saying today that she wanted to pray for it to stop, but then felt guilty because she had been praying for rain for so long.

The winds last Wednesday did so much destruction, but I'm grateful because no one was hurt. When you look at all the debris that had to be flying around, I'm surprised that someone did not get hit by a flying roof, barn or storage shed.

One of the most depressing things to me was the loss of the roof at the Cogdell Clinic. Then the rains came hard on Monday and caved in the ceiling at the clinic, pouring water into the hallway and back into the area where Dr. Jordan's office was.

But then something came out of that experience that made me feel good.

When Terry Keltz (the administrator at the hospital) called me to come take a picture of the caved in ceiling at Cogdell, I got this sinking feeling in the pit of my stomach.

It was still raining when I went out there and I was sure I would find a bunch of very depressed people standing around (kind of a tears in their beer attitude), feeling like they had hit rock bottom.

But that's not what I found. There wasn't a doomed face out there. All I saw was very determined faces and a bunch of very hard working people from the hospital and from the city.

On top of the roof sweeping water and laying temporary roofing was Gary Brown (the city manager), Ray Tinney, Jackie Alaniz, Julian Alaniz and Henry Hernandez.

Inside tearing out carpet and sweeping out water were Jesse Morales, David Rodriguez, Noe Martinez, Brad Swaffor and Jessie Rodriguez.

A dump truck was brought and a front end loader was also supplied to pick up the debris and haul it away. The electric department also supplied a truck to remove the blown off roof from the top of the building.

With the city workers was the skeleton hospital staff working beside them. Even though sopping wet and getting wetter by the minute no one was allowing themselves the luxury of a doom and gloom outlook.

Terry Keltz told me Tuesday morning (after it had rained all night), that he had come to work dressed to sweep water all day again—but he didn't have to because the city did such a great job of putting on a temporary roof.

"I can't believe what they did for us," said Terry. "They came out right away on an emergency call. They didn't have to do that. It is just another demonstration on how the city is working together on the hospital crisis."

And rest assured that everyone is working to get the hospital open again.

I can't guarantee that it will happen, no one can, but I do know that if it does stay closed, it won't be because of the lack of trying and the lack of hard work.

It would be more depressing if it didn't open up again just because we didn't care and weren't going to help anymore.

he was wanted for questioning in the shooting.

Lockney Police Officer Ellis Butler was aware of where Rose lived and went immediately to his residence. Butler found Rose's vehicle at the house and called for backup.

Responding to the call were two Lockney police officers, two DPS troopers, one Floydada police officer, a Floyd County deputy, a Hale County Deputy and a Texas Ranger.

The suspect's home was surrounded. At 4:30 a.m. he was taken into custody without incident.

Rose was arraigned by Lockney J.P. Dottie Stansell and charged with attempted murder. His bond was set, in Plainview, at \$300,000. Rose remains in the Hale County jail.

### OTHER POLICE NEWS

Lockney Police investigated a criminal mischief case on June 5. According to police a 1988 Ford two-door automobile was vandalized when someone took a sharp object and scratched the vehicle in several places. It is unknown where the vehicle was parked at the time of the vandalism.

On June 7 the Lockney Police were called to the Lockney Hospital to investigate a dog bite. A seven year old Lockney girl was bitten on the leg. Police recovered the dog and after it was destroyed, samples were sent to Austin for rabies testing. This is the procedure when a dog has not had a rabies shot.

Lockney Police are investigating the theft of \$220 from a home in the 300 block of West Washington Street. The money was taken from a dresser drawer in the residence.

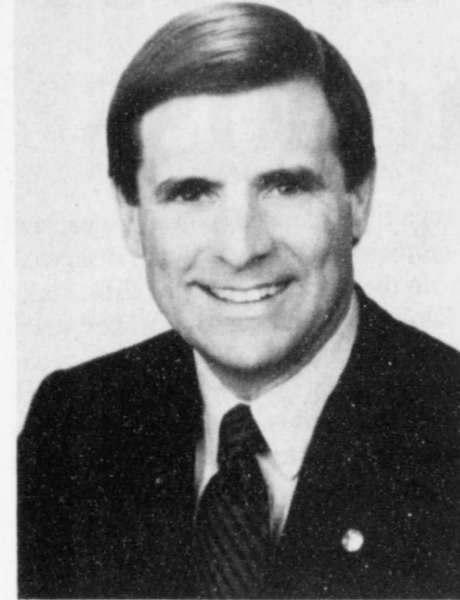
structive surgery at the University of Texas Health Sciences Center. He is now board certified in plastic and reconstructive surgery and certified by the American Board of Legal Medicine.

Dr. Mangold was elected Vice President of the Arizona State Medical Association in 1989, and in that role served as chairman of the state association's Long Range Planning Committee and was active in strategic planning for the future of the association.

Mrs. McLaughlin invites coaches and parents to bring their Little League teams by and take advantage of the team special.

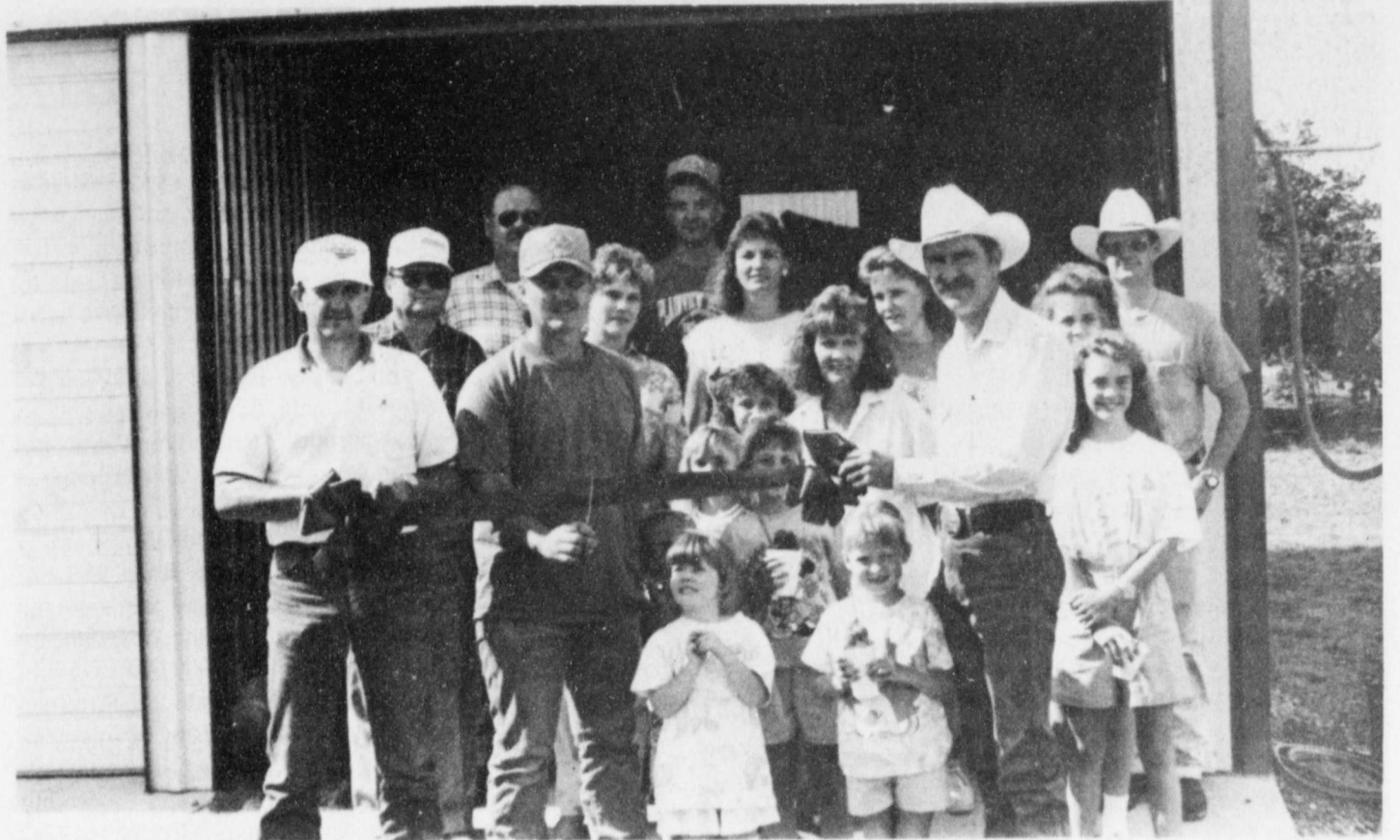

## Commissioners sign prisoner custody agreement with state

Floyd County commissioners voted unanimously to approve the signing of a prisoner custody agreement with the State of Texas. The agreement, when approved by the state, will relieve Floyd County of the burden of housing blue warrant prisoners.

Approval came during the regular June session of the court on Monday, June 10. Motion for the action was made by Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor and seconded by Precinct 1 Commissioner Connie Bearden.

Blue warrant prisoners are those that have been arrested on 'blue warrants' from the state for parole violators. This agreement will be effective until August 31, 1991 and is extendable for one year from that date.

"If I understand this correctly," said County Judge Bill Hardin, "the state agrees to assume responsibility and designate a facility of their choosing to receive these prisoners. This will remove them from our jail as soon as possible and place them under the supervision of the state. We currently are allowed to send one state prisoner per month to Huntsville."

Treasurer Glenna Orman presented her monthly financial report, stating that the county began the month of May with \$211,603.07 in county accounts. Receipts for the month totaled \$419,090.37 and disbursements were \$495,284.39. The remainder, \$135,409.05, remained in county accounts at the end of May.

Orman also reported certificates of deposit totaling \$353,000.00 which

have earned \$16,037.53 in interest to date. These funds are being reserved to fund county operations during the coming months. Installment indebtedness now totals \$45,599.38 and tax collections are 95.34% complete at this time according to Orman.

The remainder of the short morning session was spent in handling routine matters. Among the items addressed was the payment of monthly bills, read-

ing of the minutes and the approval of budget amendments and transfers.

Farm work contracts were approved for five, including Thomas Warren, J. R. Belt, D. C. Mayo, Hershel Swepston and Eddie Fortenberry.

Attending the session were Judge Bill Hardin, commissioners Connie Bearden, Floyd Jackson, George Taylor and Howard Bishop, Glenna Orman and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter.

Brown stated, "Recycling will have a volume problem in our smaller scattered area but we have been told to expect that Texas will reduce its volume of trash up to 40 percent by 1995.

Mayor Kenneth Wofford commented, "We can look for lots of changes in the next few years. I realize that we are in a pattern of change."

"And I can assure you that whatever change does come will be costly to handle," stated Brown.

Brown left the council a questionnaire that they could return to the SPAG Landfill Board with suggestions.

He assured those present that he would keep them informed as to the workings of the board.

The council discussed an application for the spraying of mosquitoes this summer. Southwest Aerial Services Inc. presented a contract which stated that they would continue to spray the city aerially for the same price they charged for 1990. The cost included 51 cents per acre for chemical, 53 cents per acre for 1200 acres. The total cost was \$1282 per spraying.

The council considered two applications for moving mobile homes onto lots inside the city limits. The first application was to move a new mobile home to lots 25-28, Block 2, Moore 2 Addition. After agreeing that the mobile home met requirements and would be skirted the council voted to approve the request.

The second request was to move a used mobile home from 617 North Main to 315 N.E. 3rd Street to replace a structure where Domingo Nuncio lives. The council was told that the present structure will be demolished. They voted to approve the variance if the mobile home and skirting is painted before it is moved onto the lot.

### PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION AUGUST 10, 1991

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

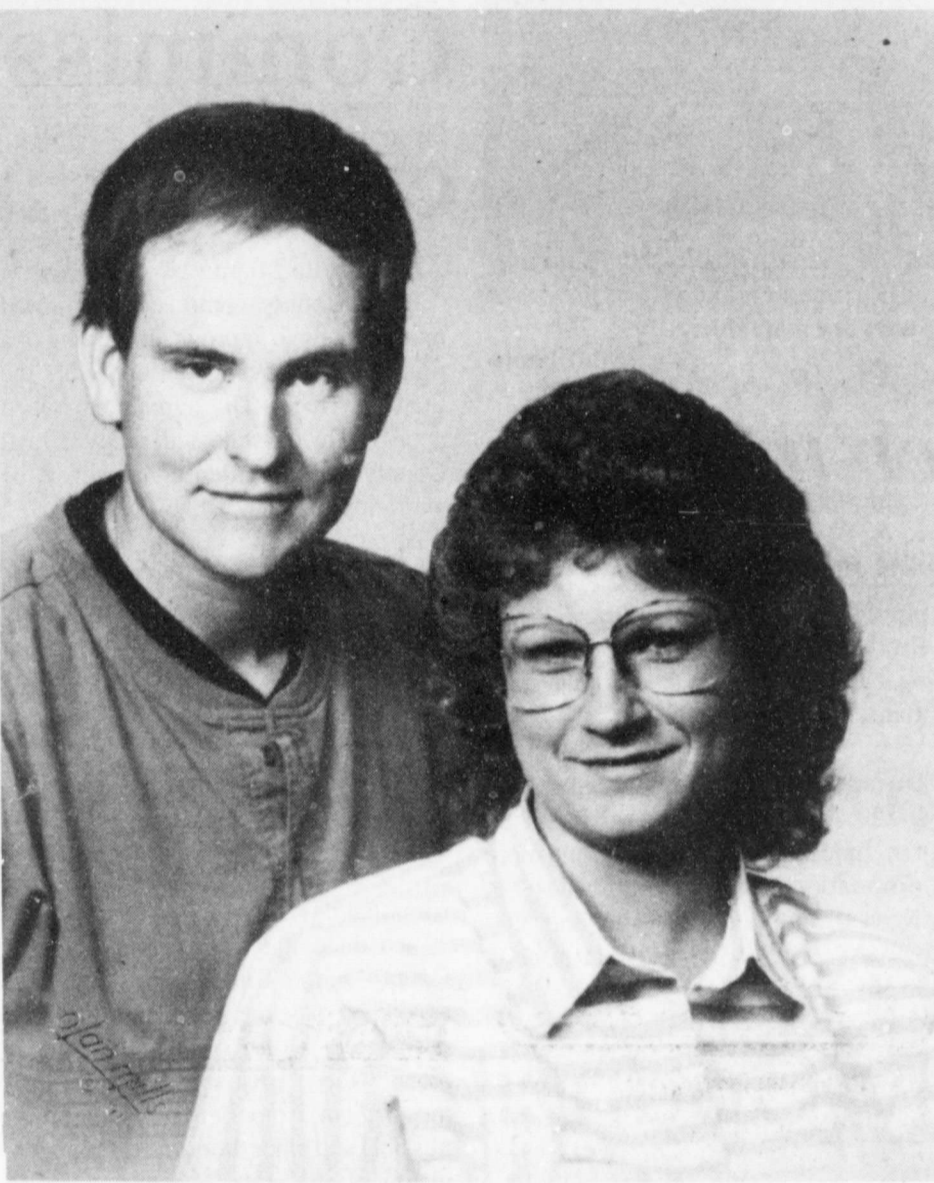

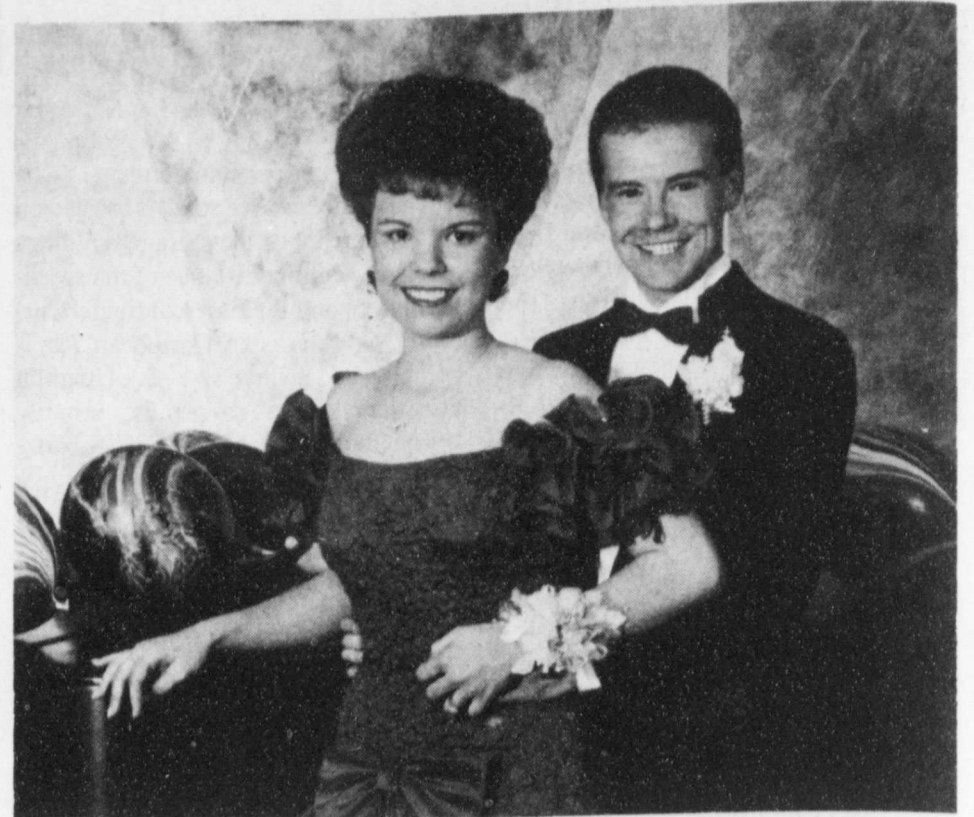

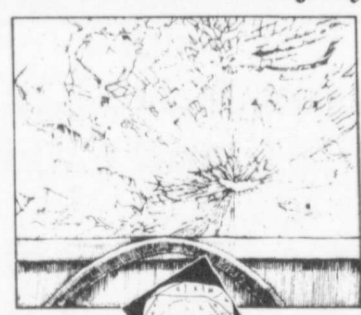

 rate and 90 or more day CD's at 97.5 percent. A 25 percent discount was offered on checks ordered through the bank.

A motion by Andy Hale with a second

from Billy Villarreal was approved by unanimous vote awarding the bank depository bid to the First National Bank of Floydada for the coming two year period.

The second bid opened was for the installation of a biology lab at Floydada High School. Only one bid was received on the project, but it contained a turnkey bid of \$15,878.00 and a bid for just purchase of the equipment (with school personnel doing the installation) at \$13,232.00. Board Hale made the motion to purchase the equipment and install it with school personnel. It was seconded by Villarreal and approved unanimously. Delivery of the equipment, including a teachers station, six multiple student desks and an emergency eye wash station, is expected by August 15.

### RESIGNATIONS AND NEW EMPLOYEES

Resignations were accepted from Elaine Reed (reading teacher at R. C. Andrews), Kelly Williams (high school Spanish) and Tracey Ham (Junior High English).

The board voted to hire several people

to fill vacancies. These included Pamela Ricketts (high school Spanish), Patricia Ritchie (high school English), Rozanne Bishop (Junior High and high school art), Bert Vandiver (assistant principal at high school), Connie Bramlett (compensatory aide to counselors), Melvin Smith (aide for in-school suspension instruction), Tana Copley (teacher for the trainable handicapped at R. C. Andrews Elementary) and Dara Ware (Junior High English).

### BOARD MEMBERS RESIGN

Resignations were also accepted from board members, Dr. Andy Hale and Cyndiann Williams. Hale is moving to Lubbock and Williams resigned for personal reasons. Both were reelected this past spring and leave near full terms vacant. Decisions concerning the filling of these vacancies will be made at the July session of the board.

Cannon presented Hale with a Whirlwind watch as a token of the board's esteem during the meeting. Williams was not present at the meeting.

### SCHOOL CALENDAR SET

The revised school calendar was

approved by the board on a motion by Michael Hinsley and a second by Andy Hale. The vote was unanimous. A revision was necessary to incorporate five additional days in the year as mandated by the state legislature.

The first day of school for students will be August 22. Graduation will be May 29. Holidays include September 2 (Labor Day), November 27-29 (Thanksgiving), December 23-January 6 (Christmas) and March 16-20 (Spring Break). Bad weather days have been set for January 27 and April 17.

### BASEBALL PROGRAM DISCUSSION CONTINUES

Institution of a baseball program at Floydada High School was once more on the agenda for discussion. Coach Dean Bates, athletic director, and about a dozen concerned parents and citizens came before the board to discuss the possibility of beginning a baseball program next spring.

Coach Bates emphasized that a baseball program would cause other spring sports to suffer the loss of participants. "We are not overly blessed with numbers here and the boys track, golf and tennis programs would be effected more than most people would imagine," said Bates.

He recommended beginning with a junior varsity program the first year to allow the team to work up to varsity level competition the following year. Bates also stated that the initial cost of approximately \$13,000 is "a ball park figure".

Superintendent Jerry Cannon stated "If we are going to do this, we need to hire a baseball coach and do it right."

Edd Henderson Jr., one of those requesting a baseball program, indicated that some private individuals had offered financial support for beginning a program. He also said, "I agree that we should do it right if we are going to do it. We need to have a program that the community and the kids can be proud

of."

Board president Charlene Brown presented petitions containing the names of persons in the community who support a baseball program for the schools. Gail and Larry Noland offered the view point that the "interest is there if the program is available when the kids are ready for it." The Noland's cited the participation in the summer baseball program.

No action was taken on the matter as it was only on the agenda for discussion.

### OTHER ACTION

Jimmie Collins presented the tax report for the month, stating, "a balance of \$47,725.48 remains to be collected with \$1,064,045.94 already in." He added that this makes collections 95.7 percent complete as compared to 95.58 percent in 1990.

Board members approved the sale of two tax title lots to Rudy Camacho for a total of \$500. The lots are located in

Block 57, Original Town of Floydada, at the corner of Virginia Street and Eleventh Street. Finalization of the sale will depend upon approval by all other taxing entities involved in the matter.

Preliminary budget figures and requests for the coming school year were passed out by Collins. Board members were asked to consider them items before the July session and be ready to discuss budget considerations at that time. Capital improvements were also discussed briefly and everyone asked to make any recommendations in the near future for consideration in next year's budget.

According to Cannon and Collins, the uncertainty of the amount of state money to be received by FISD makes the budgeting process more difficult. Both expressed the belief that solid figures on state funding should be available within the next two or three weeks.

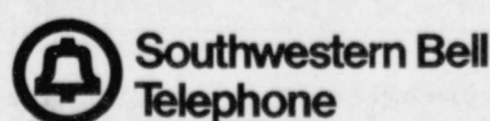
## Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory Assistance Service.

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase the rates for Directory Assistance calls from \$.30 to \$.40 per call (after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no change in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging \$.25 per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones.

If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.4 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers, approximately 155,000 business customers, approximately 500 private pay telephone owners and all customers who make Directory Assistance calls from public pay telephones.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. purpose is to watch the clouds, however if the cloud does damage, the men are prepared to help with rescue or fire fighting if needed.

The two police departments monitor radio activity and stay ready to help warn the citizens of their respective towns. These men are also available to help with traffic and rescue if needed.

The City of Floydada employees report to city hall or the fire hall for possible clean up and/or repair work. All city employees are assigned a specific area or job to do if they are needed.

At most time, the cities are able to sound storm warning sirens if needed. Also, through the cable T.V. systems in both towns, programming may be interrupted and emergency messages delivered to the public.

However, if the electricity is interrupted emergency vehicles will drive the streets with sirens on.

"When you hear the siren (either the city wide siren or the police vehicles), it does not mean to go outside and look, or

drive around," said one storm watcher. "This is your warning to seek shelter. You should heed it immediately."

"If the electricity does go off," said City Manager Gary Brown, "you can be assured that every effort is being made to restore it. Floydada employees and SPS start immediately trying to find the problem, correct it and get your lights back on.

"When people lose their electricity the phones start ringing," said Brown. "During this last storm when the lights were out, I manned the phone from 7:25 p.m. until 2:00 a.m. and received 191 phone calls. Two of them were fire calls and two of them were lost cats.

"Most of the callers told me their electricity was off. They all wondered if we were doing anything about it and wanted to know when it would be back on.

"I hope people will realize that their welfare during severe weather is a concern of many people who receive little if any compensation in comparison to the risks they take. People in this county can be assured that there are many sets of eyes watching the skies for their protection."

## Warm weather may cause heat exhaustion

The weather is warming up and people are beginning to get out and enjoy their favorite outdoor activities. It is important, however, to understand that exertion in high temperature weather can lead to heat exhaustion.

Heat exhaustion results when the body fails to lose heat through radiation, convection or conduction. Factors such as drugs or high humidity can affect the body's ability to control heat.

The staff of The Centre for Cardiac Rehabilitation and Fitness at Methodist Hospital encourages people to be aware of the following warning signals:

- \* Elevation of body temperature
- \* Headache
- \* Chills
- \* Nausea and/or vomiting
- \* Unsteadiness
- \* Pale skin color
- \* Fatigue
- \* Hair erection on upper arms and chest

Because heat exhaustion often results in death, people should see medical attention immediately if any of these symptoms appear.

The best medicine for heat exhaustion is prevention. The following tips should be kept in mind while enjoying the outdoors:

- \* Wear loose-fitting, lightweight, light-colored clothes and a hat
- \* Drink more water than it takes to satisfy thirst
- \* Reduce alcohol consumption, which dehydrates the body
- \* Take cool baths and showers because cool water removes body heat faster than cool air.

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## Hollums and Parks participate in 1991 TTU/GTE-PREP program

Duncan Hollums and Amanda Parks of Floydada are among more than 200 future mathematicians, scientists and engineers who will participate in the 1991 TTU/GTE-PREP program, an eight-week summer course held at the Texas Tech University campus. The course began June 8.

Hollums is the son of John and Teresa Hollums and Amanda is the daughter of Ronald and Phyllis Parks.

The program began with an opening ceremony at 2 p.m. Saturday in Biology Lecture Hall 100. Derald Walling, Ph.D., professor of mathematics and director of TTU/GTE-PREP, introduced the program instructors, a collection of professional educators and graduate students.

Welcoming remarks were presented by Texas Tech's Ronald Anderson, Ph.D., chairman of the department of mathematics, Mason Somerville, Ph.D., dean of the College of Engineering, and Carl Stem, Ph.D., dean of the College of

Business Administration. Gilbert Montez, public affairs manager at GTE Corp., also presented the welcoming remarks.

TTU/GTE-PREP provides an intensive academic experience for high achieving pre-college students who have demonstrated a potential for careers in the areas of business, mathematics, engineering or science.

Students who participate in the program spend six hours each day attending classes, lectures and laboratories. They are required to take tests, complete homework assignments, conduct research and perform in the classroom as regularly enrolled students. The students also must maintain at least a "C" average in their course work.

TTU/GTE-PREP offers three levels of programs: Prep I for first-year students, (composed of seventh- and eighth-graders) Prep II for second-year students (composed of eighth- and ninth-graders) and Prep III for third-

year students (composed of ninth- and 10th-graders).

Prep I provides courses in mathematical thought, computer science, science, business and engineering. The curriculum for Prep II offers similar courses on an advanced level in addition to courses in problem solving, probability and statistics. Prep III provides courses in calculus, university readiness, technical writing and research.

TTU/GTE-Prep is supported by the Texas High Education Coordinating Board, GTE Corp and the Texas Tech department of mathematics. Additional support is provided by the Defense Mapping Agency and the Private Industry Council in conjunction with the Job Training Partnership Act.

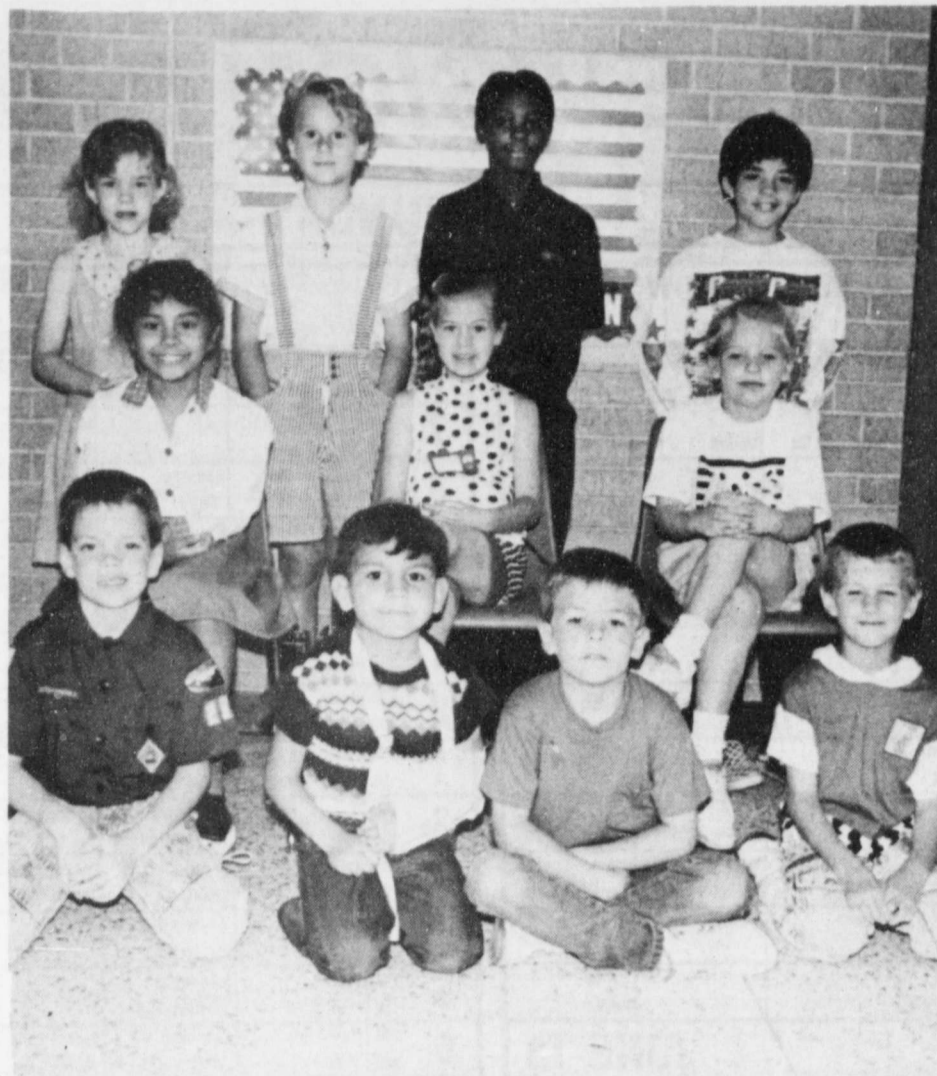

## A&M schedules Beef Short Course

Texas A&M University's 37th Annual Beef Cattle Short Course and trade show is scheduled Aug. 13-14.

"The program will provide producers with useful information that can be turned into dollars back at the ranch," said Dr. Larry Boleman, Texas Agricultural Extension Service beef cattle specialist and short course coordinator.

Sessions will be at the Kleberg Center and Louis Pearce Pavilion on the campus, Boleman said. The program was set on Tuesday and Wednesday to allow participants to travel and visit with the Texas A&M faculty on Monday.

Boleman said beef cattle specialists have worked closely with beef industry professionals to develop the 1991 program. Special features include a trade show and live animal demonstrations.

Boleman said the agenda includes a complete discussion of lean beef production and the effect of low-fat products on American consumers and beef producers. Latest information on lean beef hamburger sales and their effect on U.S. beef cattle production will be dis-

cussed. Other speakers will address animal welfare and feed product safety.

"Our producers are committed to animal welfare and feed product safety, and they will receive training in the food safety assurance program at the cow/calf level of the industry," he said.

Participants will hear information on profit management, breeding, forage management, nutrition, health and marketing from actual producers with varying sizes of ranching operations.

"All Texas producers should be able to relate to some of these management discussions," Boleman said. "We will have producers representing large cattle herds of more than 1,000 head, medium-sized herds and small herds of 30 to 40 head."

Of special interest, Boleman said, should be the program on strategic management of artificial insemination to provide additional weight gain and marketing advantages. Researchers will share data from a study of more than 20 years in a Texas artificial insemination program.

"Break-out sessions" will allow producers to attend smaller, in-depth classes of interest to them, Boleman said. The sessions include discussions of nutrition, health, pasture, hay, soils and range management and demonstrations of computer software.

Live animal health care and genetic selection demonstrations will be conducted in the Louis Pearce Pavilion.

The trade show will feature about 50 beef industry booths and Texas A&M agriculture department displays. Industry representatives and researchers will be available to answer questions and visit with the participants.

"This program provides a great opportunity for in-depth beef cattle training for beef cattle producers," Boleman said.

## Sorghum producers pleased with rule

At the request of the National Grain Sorghum (NGSP), the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) in Washington has reviewed and made changes in its rule of calculating the farm irrigated acreage maximum for producers who rotate corn and grain sorghum. Under that rule, producers were seeing a reduction in their irrigated acreage maximum if their farm had a history of growing both irrigated corn and irrigated grain sorghum, had participated in the acreage reduction program during one or more of the years 1988 through 1990, and had planted only one of the crops.

Producers had contacted the NGSP

office earlier because they felt they were unfairly losing irrigated base acreage. After reviewing information provided by NGSP, Keith Bjerke, ASCS administrator, said that the rule has been changed and that producers who were affected will be notified of higher farm irrigated acreage maximum and will have their final 1991 deficiency payments computed using the new figures.

"We are very pleased with the resolution of this problem," said Jeff Casten, NGSP president. "We contacted Mr. Bjerke about the inequity, and the ASCS corrected the problem. This is just one example of the effectiveness of our association—we work with producers."

Bill Walden, a sorghum and corn producer from Hereford, Texas was one farmer who was affected by this inequity. Mr. Walden was losing approximately 106 acres of irrigated base. "I contacted the National Grain Sorghum Producers offices for help. They gave me the personal assistance required to resolve my problem."

## Lease directory distributed

The 1991 edition of the popular *Hunter's Clearinghouse Directory* is now available for distribution by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

"The hunter's directory is an extensive listing of Texas landowners who lease their land for hunting and fishing," Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said. "It is designed to put hunters in direct contact with landowners to discuss leasing opportunities."

This year's directory features nearly 500 private landowners with about 750 leases covering more than 4 million acres. The listings specify the county where the lease is located, the number of acres, the type of game and amenities available, as well as other pertinent lease information. Telephone numbers and addresses for the landowner are also included.

"The Clearinghouse is a joint effort of TDA and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department," Perry said. "Through this program, we promote Texas recreational potential, as well as provide some type of additional income to farmers and ranchers."

Leases with whitetail deer, spring turkey, dove, quail, pheasant, duck, goose, javelina, and exotics are listed in the directory by region. A list of landowners who allow people to fish on their property is also included.

Copies of the directory have been distributed to local chambers of commerce and to individual hunters upon request. To receive a copy of the directory, write to Hunter's Clearinghouse, TDA, P.O. Box 12847, Austin, TX 78711 or call (512) 463-7642. A \$5 contribution is requested to cover printing and postage costs.

Landowners wishing to list their land in the directory may send the information to the above address throughout the year.

Because limited copies of the 1991 directory are available, TDA is asking the public to update last year's directory

by requesting a copy of listings that have been added and removed from the 1990 edition. Hunters interested in leases in a particular part of Texas can obtain exclusive listings from specific regions, including the Panhandle, South/Rolling Plains, West, Central, East, South and the Gulf Coast.

The Parks and Wildlife Department also distributes the *Texas Deer Hunting Lease Register*, a list of landowners licensed to lease their land specifically for deer hunting. In addition to private leases, Parks and Wildlife provides information on a variety of public hunting areas in Texas. 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## Drowning major killer of farm children

 Drowning has been the No. 1 killer of children on Texas farms and ranches for the past five years.

"Twenty-three deaths, or 30 percent of all child fatalities on farms during this period, were from drowning," said Thomas D. Valco, an agricultural safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Accidents involving tractors were the second leading cause, with 19 deaths or 24 percent of the five-year total, Valco added. Nine deaths, or just over 11 percent, involved animal-related accidents, the third major cause.

"Nationally," Valco said, "an average of 300 farm children under age 16 die every year from accidents, and at least 5,000 other children are injured while operating or playing near farm equipment or water."

The Wisconsin Center for Health Statistics reported that 100 fatalities occur per 100,000 farm children aged 4 and under, while only 13 deaths occur per 100,000 urban children, he said. All of these fatality statistics, Valco noted, do not count farm children killed in traffic accidents, unless the site of the accident was on a farm.

"Farms, with their stock ponds, inviting streams and farm equipment, are inherently dangerous," Valco said.

"Modern farm lifestyles make accidents more likely," he said. "As more wives work off the farm, husbands often have a dual job of farming and child care, a deadly combination since farm work schedules are very demanding. So, a father may take the children on his tractor to give them personal care, a fact noted in many tractor accidents."

Drowning often is a silent killer, Valco said. "Within seconds, a toddler may drown in a few inches of water. The parent may not hear a cry for help or even a splash. Death comes so quickly."

Closer adult supervision and early teaching of water safety could prevent many drowning deaths, he said.

Four of the 1990 deaths occurred when toddlers fell or stepped into deep water, Valco said.

"Often, young children play near the water's edge and lose their balance," said Stephanie Frerich, Extension Service graduate assistant in farm safety.

"Others wade in what they think is shallow water, only to fall into swift currents or drop into deep holes. Usually, no skilled swimmer is near to help."

Too often, a parent underestimates a child's curiosity and overestimates his or her judgement, Valco explained.

"A child may acknowledge a warning of caution, but this does not mean that the risk or hazard is understood," he

said. "The child's short attention span plus the association of water as a play area generally make most warnings ineffective."

To prevent drownings, Valco said, all ponds and tanks should be fenced and posted to keep young swimmers out.

In addition, he said, parents should:

- \* Never allow children to play near water without constant supervision. Within seconds, a child can run to the water's edge and be in trouble.

- \* Teach children as early as possible how to swim or at least stay afloat until rescued. But even if a child has had swimming lessons, don't consider the youngster to be "water safe."

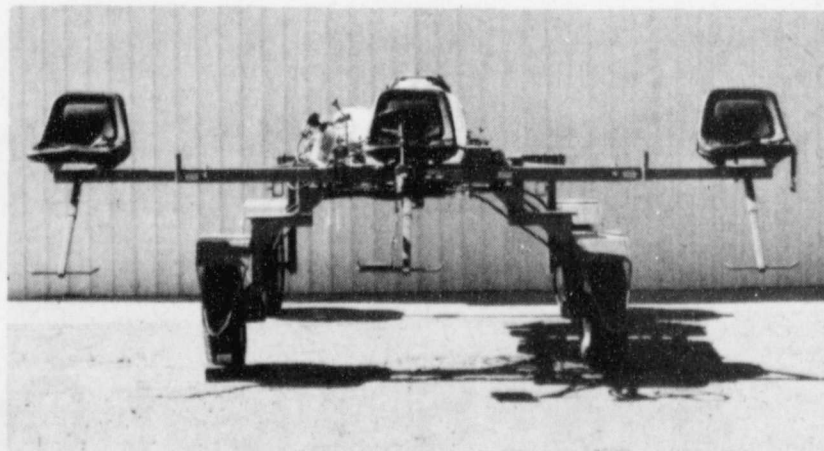
- \* Caretakers should learn how to perform CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) on infants and young children. Contact the local chapter of the American Red Cross or American Heart Association for class schedules and registration details.

- \* Know and post by the telephone all numbers to call for emergency medical service.

leave Cuba as the only country in the West that still refuses to hold even the semblance of an election.

The Governor of Delaware, Michael "Mike" Castle, headed our five-member team. In company with the Ambassador our job was to watch the voting far back in the rain forests, some 70 or 80 miles from the capitol of Paramaribo. It was slow going. The road was dirt. It was rainy season. Sometimes we would go 10 or 12 feet without hitting a large chug hole filled with water. Occasionally we had to stop and barter our way past a roadblock thrown up by whoever was in control of that particular stretch of the jungle. Cigarettes and candy, plus the influence of the Ambassador, did the trick.

The voting procedure, once we got to the polling places, was, by South Texas standards, quite honest. The first station was in an area inhabited essentially by Indians, mostly Caribs and Arawaks. They were hesitant and suspicious, but at least a few of them did come in and vote. As they started through the voting line one of the poll watchers examined the thumb of each prospective voter. If his thumb was clean he, or she, was given a ballot. Then they had to stick their thumb in a bowl of indelible ink, go into a booth and vote, and drop the ballot in a box. The ink made sure they could not come back and vote a second time. Lyndon Johnson would never have made it to the Senate if South Texas counties, and possibly a few in East Texas, had had a procedure like that. And possibly a few other Texas politicians as well, in those counties.

Every polling place was furnished a computer list of registered voters, tied into a master list in the capitol. Each was checked off. And this was a "third world" or even a "fourth world" country.

When polls closed the election judges removed the ballots one at a time, called out to the crowd who got what, and held up the ballot for all to see. Party workers from the various parties would dutifully mark down every vote, and when the counting was done everyone had a tally. Not a bad system. George Parr, former County Judge of Duval County, would never have approved. Nor would Herman Brown, or George Brown, or former Governor Jimmy Allred. I even suspect that my old friend Ed Clark, who looked after Lyndon's affairs for so many years, would have taken a dim view of the procedure, regarding it as completely backward and unnecessary. That all took place on Saturday. On Sunday morning we drafted our report to the President and headed home. By midnight Sunday we were in our own bed.

The new Assembly is yet to meet and elect a President. How it all will come out is anyone's guess. The "government" lost. The people we had hoped to win did in fact win, but not by enough to elect a new President, so deals will have to be cut. But that's their problem.

Floydada police and highway patrol headed quickly for the scene but the storm had already moved through the area and was heading east into Floydada.

"I can't believe how fast it moved in," said Deputy Overstreet, with the Floyd County Sheriff's office. "By the time the National Weather Service called us the storm was through Barwise and almost into Floydada. The electricity was cut off and the siren would not work."

At approximately 8:29 p.m. with no warning siren available, emergency personnel (including city and county) turned the sirens on in their vehicles and drove up and down the streets of Floydada warning citizens to take cover.

"We were able to warn the city of

Floydada well," said Overstreet, "but we felt bad about Lockney. The storm blew in with no warning and we never had a chance to get the word out there."

Electricity and communications also went down in the Lockney area, but at an earlier time. Citizens who depend on their police scanners to cover the storms were told through their cable emergency channels that communications among the Lockney Police and Floyd County Sheriff's office were also out. "We were also without county wide communications for about 35 minutes during the worst part of the storm," said Overstreet. "When the power went out our generator did not come back on. It's supposed to come on automatically, but I had to hand crank it to get it started."

Also, because of the lack of electricity

the warning siren could not be blown in Lockney.

Broken tree branches, blown over fences, and a blown off roof at Garza Laundry (121 S. Wall), in Floydada, were evidence of the passing storm. Another building that fell victim to the high wind in Floydada was the roof of the Cogdell Clinic.

"My theory is that something very heavy was blown onto the roof," said Hospital Administrator Terry Keltz. "If a heavy object hit, it may have buckled the roof enough for the wind to get up under it and blow it off. That is the only way I can see the roof being ripped off. It was a good solid roof about one foot below the brick line."

Adding to the problems of storm watchers trying to find their way in the

dark blowing dust, was a fire alarm call to the Max Yeary farm east of Cedar Hill, at approximately 7:30 p.m.

Brush had been burned earlier in the week on the Yeary farm and all the embers were believed to have been extinguished. "The fire must have whipped up some embers which set fire to a pile of old cedar posts," said Ms. Yeary. "Fortunately the house was not damaged."

Both Lockney and Floydada fire departments responded to this call.

Power was not restored to the city until after 11:00 p.m. Callers to the Sheriff's office were told that an all clear was issued for the county at approximately 9:30 p.m.

### WEEKLY RAINFALL

The only relief that came from the storm was a much needed rain. Wednesday night's rainfall registered approximately 1/2 " in Lockney and .45" in

Floydada. Another rain on Thursday brought another .6" in Lockney and .54" in Floydada.

Monday, June 10, brought a hard rain. Floyd County Sheriff's office reported 1.21 inches on Monday. Russell Equipment reported 1.4" of rain falling in 30 minutes.

In Lockney, Monday's rainfall (which continued through the night) measured 3 inches.

The downpour created an even greater problem at Floydada's Cogdell Clinic, caving in the remaining section of the blown off roof and flooding the interior.

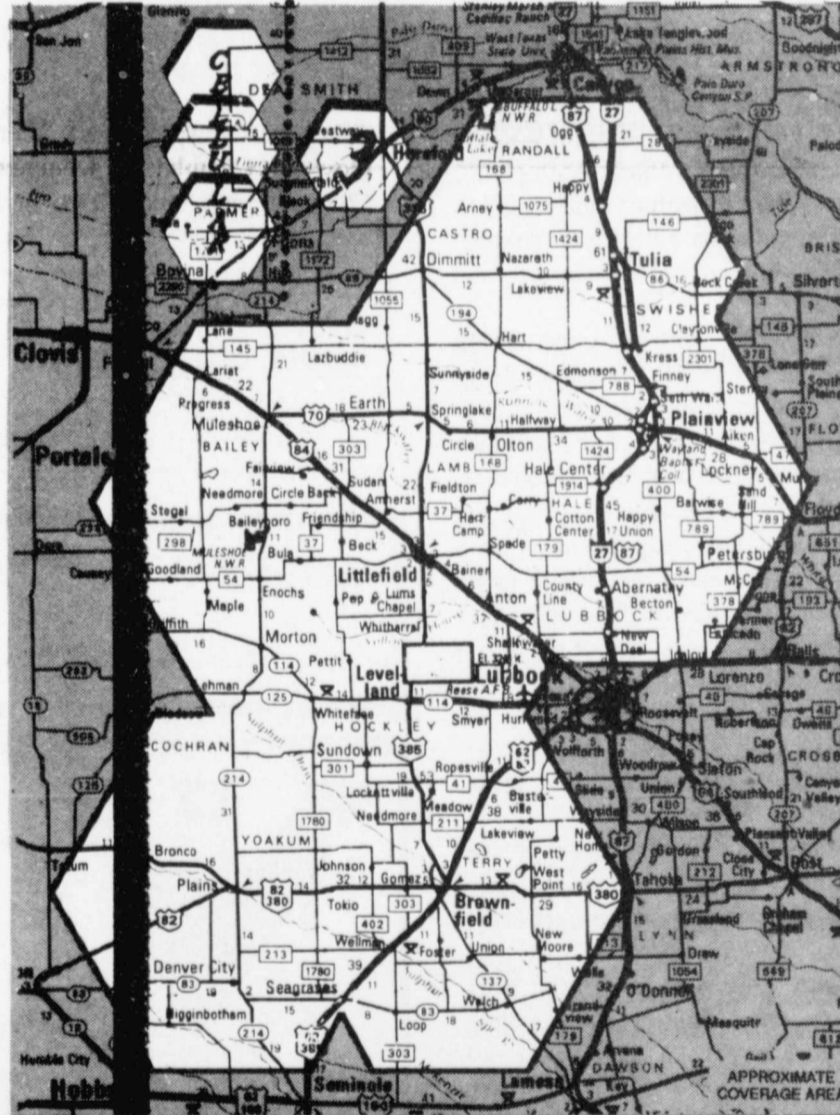
"The building is insured," said Keltz. "The insurance company was notified of the loss of the roof immediately after the winds Wednesday night."

Though the rain was needed, it will be a matter of time before farmers will be able to tell if their new upcoming cotton plants will recover from last Wednesday's wind and sand damage.

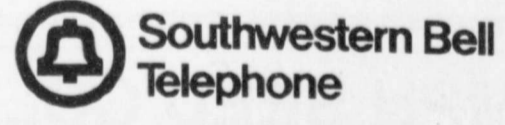

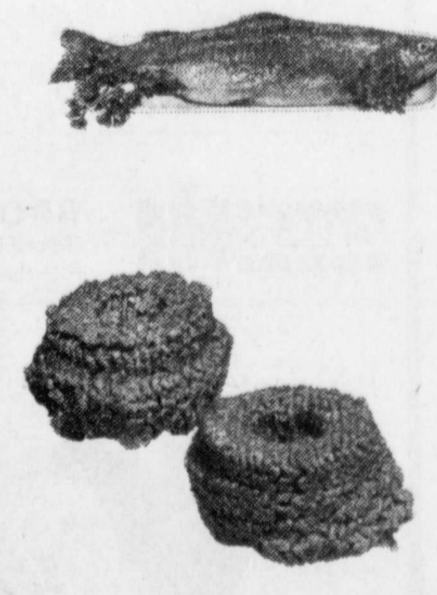

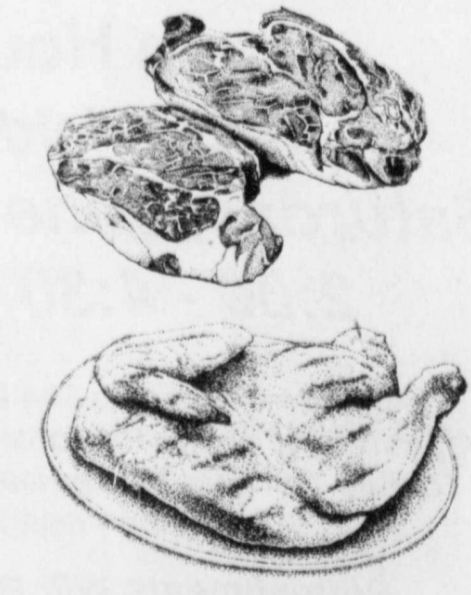

# Letters To The Editor

Dear Ms. Gilroy, We read in the May 27, 1991 issue of the Austin American Statesman newspaper that the Texas Senate rejected the appointment of Kenneth Towery to the Texas Judicial Council. The law requires that one member of this Council be a journalist and Mr. Towery was appointed to fill this position subject to Senate approval.

The article mentioned states in part that "Sen. Steve Carriker, D-Roby, said he had led the opposition to Towery."

The article then quotes Sen. Carriker as saying "He's (referring to Towery) a newspaper owner, but I don't really think he qualifies as a journalist - he's not a working journalist."

By way of background, at the age of 18 years, Kenneth Towery was captured by the Japanese on the island of Corregidor while serving in the U.S. Army during World War II. He thereafter spent four years in a Japanese concentration camp in northern Manchuria. When he was freed from captivity, he returned to the United States and after several months recuperating from this ordeal, he attended college and thereafter went to work for the Cuero Record newspaper and eventually, became its editor. Mr. Towery was appointed by the President of the United States to the United States Information Agency, where he served for a time as Acting Director, and was twice appointed to the Board of the National Corporation for Public Broadcasting serving part of his tenure as its

Chairman. In both appointments to the NCPB, he was approved by the United States Senate without a dissenting vote. Mr. Towery presently owns three small newspapers, writes a regular editorial column, and is personally involved in the operation of the newspapers.

Space does not permit the mention of all of Mr. Towery's accomplishments and services to our Country and State, but we feel compelled to mention that in 1955, Mr. Towery was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for outstanding achievement in the field of journalism, which is the highest and most prestigious award that can be given to any journalist.

This is the man that Sen. Carriker does not think "qualifies as a journalist". It is our sincere opinion that Sen. Carriker has done a disservice to all of the citizens of our State.

First, I want to tell you that we do have a total market package, and it was instituted long before Wal-Mart came to Snyder. I have gotten information to both of your managers with hopes that it would be placed in the hands of the district manager. I would save you money since our 5.8 cents is well below the mail rate. Still, no one seems to want to call attention to themselves or rock the boat. Incidentally, you are the only retailer in Snyder who does not use the Snyder Daily News for its mailers.

There has been no advertising since Christmas, yet we are expected as a newspaper to do our civic duty in promoting your store through our news department. We are frequently asked to take pictures of your contributions, etc.

Your national advertising likes to

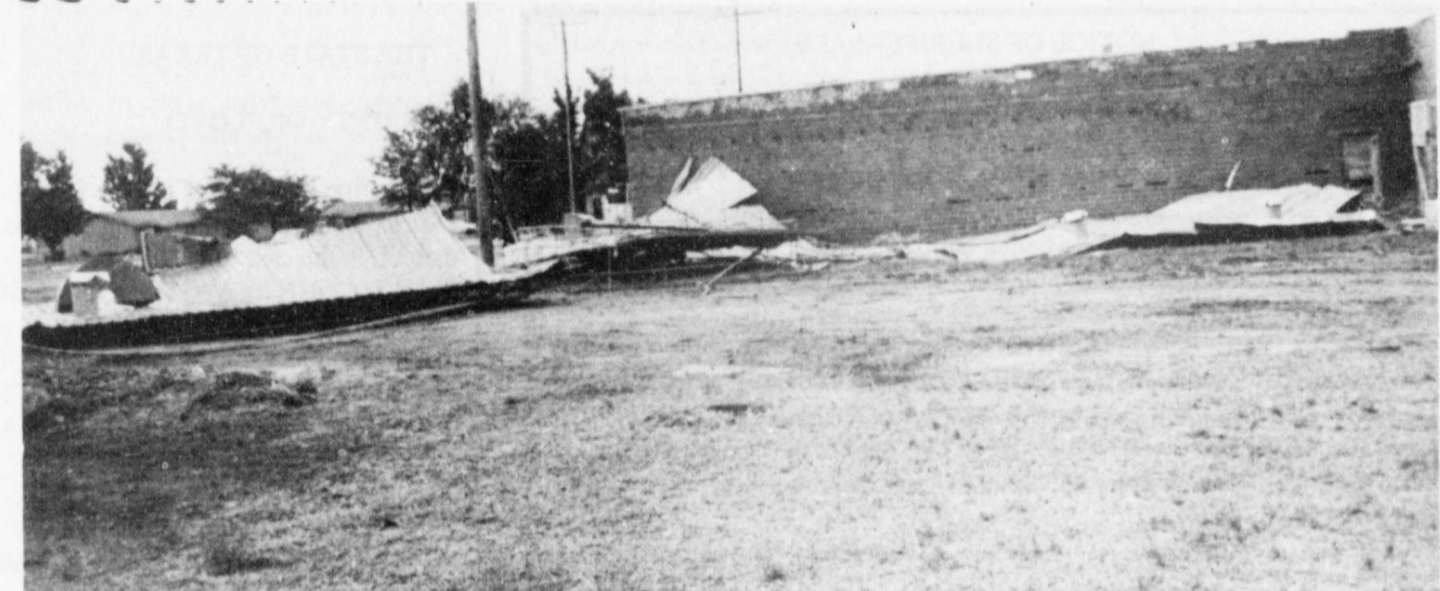

## RAAM Time Station volunteers needed

On July 27, 1991, the Race Across America, the longest and toughest bicycle race in the world, will begin for the 10th consecutive year on the west coast of the United States and pass through Floydada, July 31 and August 3, ending 2,930 miles later in Savannah, Georgia. Since RAAM uses public roads and riders are not allowed to draft and ride in packs, riders will spread out considerably. In order to keep time logs on the field of riders and assist in relaying messages to riders and film crews, event organizers are seeking volunteers from various communities along the way to manage 50 of the different Time Stations located roughly 60 miles apart.

Time Station are merely checkpoints along the roadside, e.g., mini-markets, gas stations, or parks, each having a pay phone available. When a rider and their personnel support crew passes, the Time Station volunteer telephones RAAM Headquarters, via a toll free 800 number, and reports the exact time the
