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Caprock Hospital District board declines Methodist clinic offer

Voting three to one, the trustees of the Caprock Hospital District Board of Directors declined an offer presented by Methodist Hospital for clinic services in Floydada at this time.

The action was taken at a called meeting on July 23. Joy Assiter made the motion to decline the offer stating that the clinic is not ready for occupancy at this time and adding, "I feel that we have not allowed ourselves sufficient time to recruit full time physicians for our community in anticipation of reopening the hospital."

Jim Word provided the second on the motion saying, "It is a gamble whatever we do." Assiter, Word and Kenneth Pitts voted for the motion. Board member Jerry Thompson voted against it.

Thompson explained his action by stating, "I feel that we should do what is best for the hospital as well as the community. I think that we need some doctors here, even on a temporary basis. I am aware that our greatest goal, the reopening of the hospital, is not what they (Methodist) are offering, but I don't think it will benefit the community to be without doctors for a long period."

According to hospital administrator Terry Keltz, Methodist Hospital, which had agreed to bear the expenses of recruiting two physicians for the community and the hospital, was making an offer to provide a parttime clinic service in Floydada in exchange for one of the physician recruitments. "Methodist wants to sponsor the Dr. Lyons and Dr. Hanford of the Oakwood Family Prac-

tice in Lubbock in setting up a four afternoon a week situation in Floydada while guaranteeing them \$10,000 per month. This would count as one of our physician recruitments."

Keltz told the board that he had spoken with Ron Rives of Methodist Hospital on Tuesday, July 23, and asked that Methodist adjust the offer so that it would not cost Caprock Hospital a physician recruitment. Rives returned to Keltz with a counter offer which would have allowed Caprock the option, at the end of one year, of reclaiming the second physician recruitment if the clinic arrangement did not work out.

Discussion of the offer centered around what would most benefit the hospital in the long run. Fred Thayer said, "We need to be concerned with

whether or not this would benefit the long term goal of opening the hospital."

Word expressed the concern that people would become accustomed to going elsewhere for medical care if none was offered in the community.

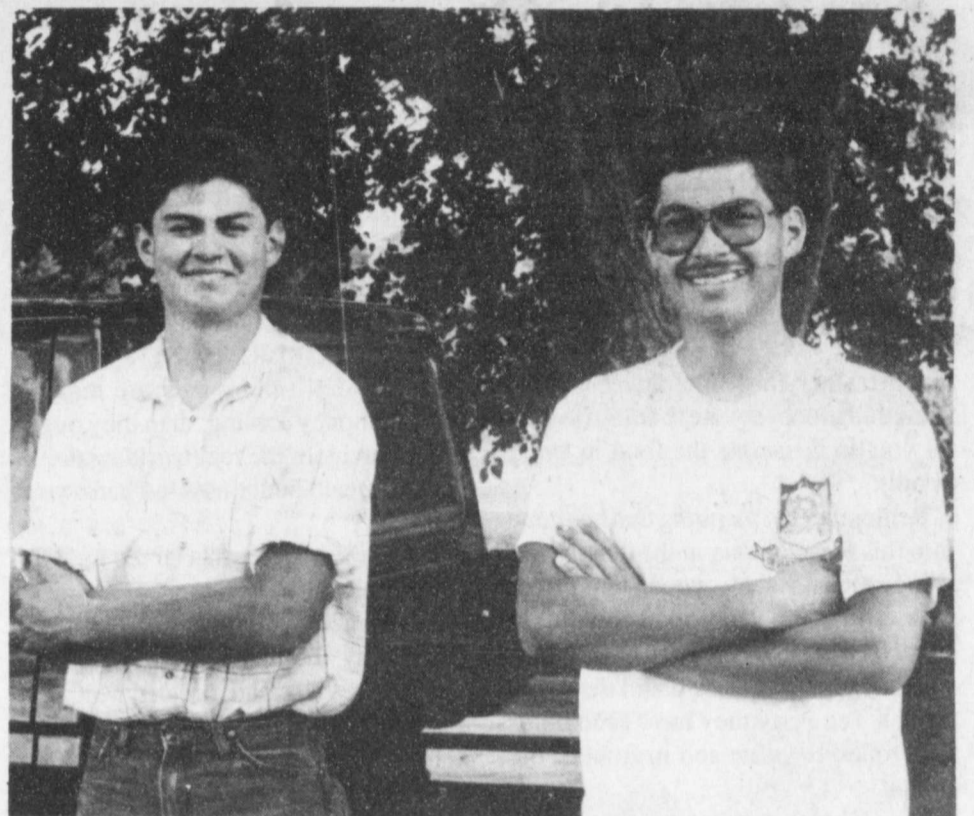
Assiter stated, "I am very negative about this. I want to see us have a hospital again and I feel that our energies need to be directed towards that aim."

Pitts brought up the question of why successful practicing physicians in Lubbock would want to come to Floydada on a part time basis for a year. He added, "In all probability, they would be forced out when we have doctors and the hospital reopens, but I don't see any detriment to the hospital if they come. I would like to see some activity in the clinic."

Thayer then stated, "Realistically, we are looking at reopening the hospital in October of 1992. If two physicians fell into our laps, we would make every effort to reopen at an earlier date, but that is not likely."

"The longer we are closed, the worse the prospect for opening," said Thompson. "I think that if we are closed that long, the prospects of our ever reopening the hospital are very small."

Keltz presented the board with a drawing depicting the steps to be taken before the hospital can be opened. Each step has a financial cost which must be met before proceeding to the next step. (A copy of the drawing accompanies this article) Step one, the payment of outstanding debts, carries a price tag of nearly \$200,000.00. Methodist hospital is presently carrying the financial burden of recruiting two physicians, which

This year Ladies Day emphasizes America's freedoms and natural resources. The day begins at 9:00 a.m. with a crochet exhibit. Entries will be in three categories - those crocheted before 1940; 1940-1965 and 1965-1991. History of each should be attached on a 3x5 card; ribbons will be awarded in each category at 10:15 a.m.

Ladies Day will feature four special speakers and demonstrations. At 9:30 a.m. Doris Weil, a Plainview resident, homemaker and president of the auxiliary of the Association of Soil and Water Conservation District, will speak on

conservation of America's natural resources. Ms. Weil is especially concerned with the prevention of soil erosion and the conservation of the water supply.

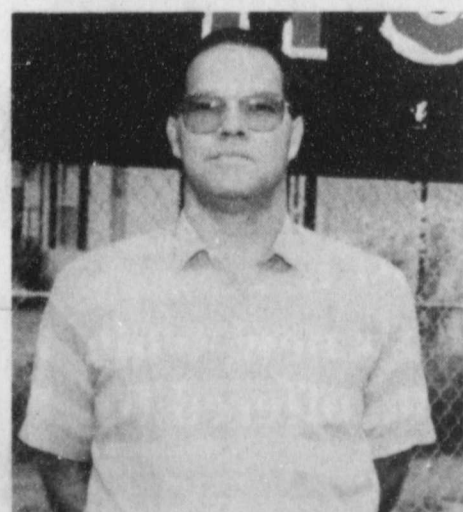

Lockney Longhorns facing new coach

Varsity Longhorns will be facing new challenges, new beginnings and a new head coach/athletic director when they return to two-a-days next month. John Lowe, to be celebrating Longhorn victories next year and with them learning from their defeats.

Lowe, 39, comes to Lockney from the 4A school of Northwest High in Justin (near Ft. Worth), where he was defensive coordinator for four years.

He was raised in Plains, Texas and graduated from Plains High School. After graduation, Lowe attended Texas Tech and majored in physical education with a minor in history.

In 1976, after graduating from Tech, Lowe began his coaching career with

Tulia High School, where he served as assistant coach for two years.

He moved from Tulia to the 4A school of Granbury High where he served for one year.

He then moved to 3A Kermit High, where he served as assistant coach for six years and then on to the 5A Lewisville High School for one year.

Lowe has been married to his wife Diane, for 2 1/2 years. He has two children; Andrea, 16, and Daniel, 13, who live in Kermit.

"At the present time I don't have any big plans," said Lowe. "It is very important for me to first get to know the kids I'll be coaching and to work on making improvements everyday."

Efrén Jr. and J.J. Pérez of Lockney are at home on leave after their two month stay in Turkey during the Desert Storm operation. The brothers are stationed at Soesterberg Air Force Base in the Netherlands. They are members of the U.S. Air Force 32nd Tactical Group.

The brothers are the sons of Efrén and Maria Pérez of Lockney. They have a brother David and a sister Cindy at home. Both are graduates of Lockney High School.

After being recruited Efrén Jr. was stationed at Shepard Air Base in Wichita Falls and received training in F-15 fighter plane mechanics. Six months later J.J. joined the air force and was stationed at Chanute Air Base in Illinois. He was trained as a fuel systems specialist for the F-15.

After their initial training they were shipped to Soesterberg Air Base in the Netherlands. According to J.J., "Soesterberg is one of the choice places to be stationed."

As the Desert Shield conflict was building up their unit was deployed to Turkey and was integrated into the 7440th Composite Air Wing. They served as a support operation. Their tactical group was responsible for keeping the F-15 fighter planes flying. Each plane had two crew chiefs and when it came in they were in charge of servicing and refueling along with any repairs that needed to be made before it went out on the next mission.

Efrén Jr. said, "Every 600 hours the planes were totally checked out. We took them apart, made repairs and put them back together." J.J. explained that he worked on the fuel systems. I work on the fuel pumps, repair fuel leaks and tanks."

The brothers reported that they didn't get off the base in Turkey very often because of bomb threats. "Also," Efrén Jr. stated, "the Turks didn't like us being

there."

"When we did get out there were good buys in leather, gold items and rugs. Those people like to bargain." J.J. remarked.

"We were in Turkey for two months. We went there in January and it was cold. Much like it is here but without any snow," Efrén Jr. said.

"We received letters from the students at Lockney Elementary School and pages of signatures gathered by the Arriba Study Club," Efrén Jr. reported. "I also received letters from a lady in Honeybrook, Pennsylvania that were addressed to Any Soldier, Desert Storm Operation."

J.J. said that he appreciated the letters from the school kids and the study club and that he had received a letter from a girl in Arkansas. Both noted that the mail was appreciated.

Efrén Jr. and J.J. told of the places they had visited while they were overseas. They have seen the sights in nine countries. Efrén Jr. said that the Eiffel Tower was the sight that he had enjoyed most and J.J. stated that he was impressed with the windmills in Holland. He said that there was one road that had twelve of the windmills on it. "The Keukenhof Gardens were a beautiful sight," J.J. commented, "There were flowers everywhere."

"Our homecoming was great," stated Efrén and seconded by J.J. "We were met at the airport in Lubbock by our family and friends and when we got back to Lockney everybody has been great. There was a large flashing sign in our yard welcoming us home."

After their stay in the states J.J. will return to the Netherlands and Efrén Jr. will head for Egland Air Force Base in Florida. They have a one and a half years left to serve.

LISD hires athletic director, accepts new dress code policy

Top items on the agenda for the Lockney School Board, July 11, was the hiring of a new athletic director, assistant coach, and the acceptance of a new dress code policy.

"We had approximately 30 people contact us about the positions of athletic director," said Superintendent Dub Hallmark. "We narrowed it down to four and then interviewed those four during the board meeting." After discussion the board voted to hire John Lowe as head coach and athletic director and David Brewer as assistant coach for junior high."

Lowe has 15 years of coaching experience and comes to Lockney from Northwest High School where he served as the assistant coach. Northwest High School, which is in the Denton area, is part of a consolidated school district

which includes many small communities.

The school board also accepted the resignations of Jim Clark who resigned as athletic director and head coach to accept a position as assistant director in Alice. Assistant Coach Malcom Moerbe also resigned to accept the position as assistant coach in Alice.

Gilbert Hinojosa, 34, of Floydada, sexual assault, which occurred on June 21, a second degree felony.

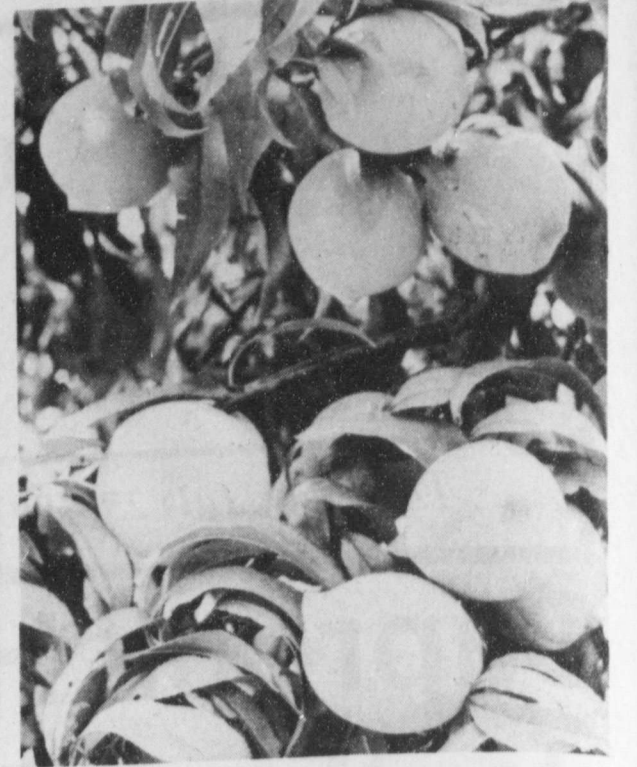
In county court, July 17, Darolyn D. Williams was charged with reckless conduct. There was no disposition on this case.

Floydada Police Report

Rotary District Governor speaks to Floydada members

Jim Cook, Amarillo veterinarian, District Governor of Rotary International, called on Floydada Rotarians, last Wednesday, to "Look Beyond Themselves" to fulfill Rotary's ideals.

Citing the theme of Rotary International President Rajenda K. Saboo, the new district governor said the role of each member is "to be Rotary, not just belong to Rotary."

"Rotary is a force of over a million community and world leaders in 172 countries," said Cook. "We are a good and near perfect democracy with a vision to help others beyond ourselves."

Citing the world-wide service club's successful \$230 million PolioPlus campaign to eradicate polio globally by 1995, its scholarship and group study exchange programs and the Health, Hunger and Humanity project to improve the quality of life in the Third World, Cook urged members to personify Rotary's objectives.

"Philosopher William James said, 'The greatest use of life is to spend it for something that will outlast it'. Rotary's founder, Paul Harris, knew this and spent his life developing an organization dedicated to the principle of Service Above Self," Cook concluded.

The new district governor is charged with the leadership of 2,700 Rotarians in District 5730 which extends from Perryton to Pecos and from Sweetwater to Denver City. In his current round of club

visitations, Cook is conferring with local leaders, reviewing club projects and addressing the general membership. He will visit 56 clubs in 43 cities.

Cook, reared in Sweetwater, graduated from Newman High School and earned his degree in veterinary medicine at Texas A&M University in College Station. Since serving as a captain in the U.S. Air Force from 1956-58, he has practiced veterinary medicine in Amarillo.

A Rotarian since 1966, Cook served Amarillo West Rotary, his home club, as president in 1970-71. He is a Paul Harris Fellow recipient, the highest Rotary honor bestowed upon its members.

A member and past president of the Amarillo A&M Club, the Amarillo Executive Association and the Amarillo Veterinary Medical Association, he also has served as a member of the boards of directors of the Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center, Better Business Bureau, Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, YMCA, Paramount Community Church, Tascosa Country Club, and currently serves the board of directors of Horn Creek Conference Grounds and High Plains Baptist Hospital Area Development Council.

Cook and his wife, Sue, have four children and three grandchildren.

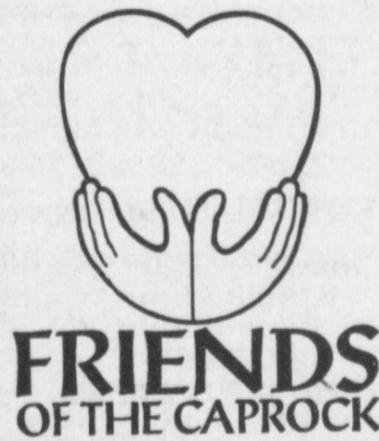

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A asymptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The PLEXAR I user is then free to place or accept another call. CTD is not intended to be used to avoid toll charges. Therefore, CTD will not be available to PLEXAR I customers subscribing to optional Extended Metropolitan Service or Extended Area Calling Service.

If the company's application is approved, the monthly rate for CTD will be \$4.00 for each PLEXAR I station line. Prior to the June 19, 1991, Interim rate approval, Southwestern Bell was billing customers who receive the service \$1.50 for each station line equipped with this feature. In addition, under Southwestern Bell's proposed tariff, every line within the PLEXAR I system must be equipped with this feature. The nonrecurring charge for the additional lines which must be equipped with CTD will be waived for existing CTD customers. The tariffed monthly rate will apply to all existing and future CTD customers.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible. 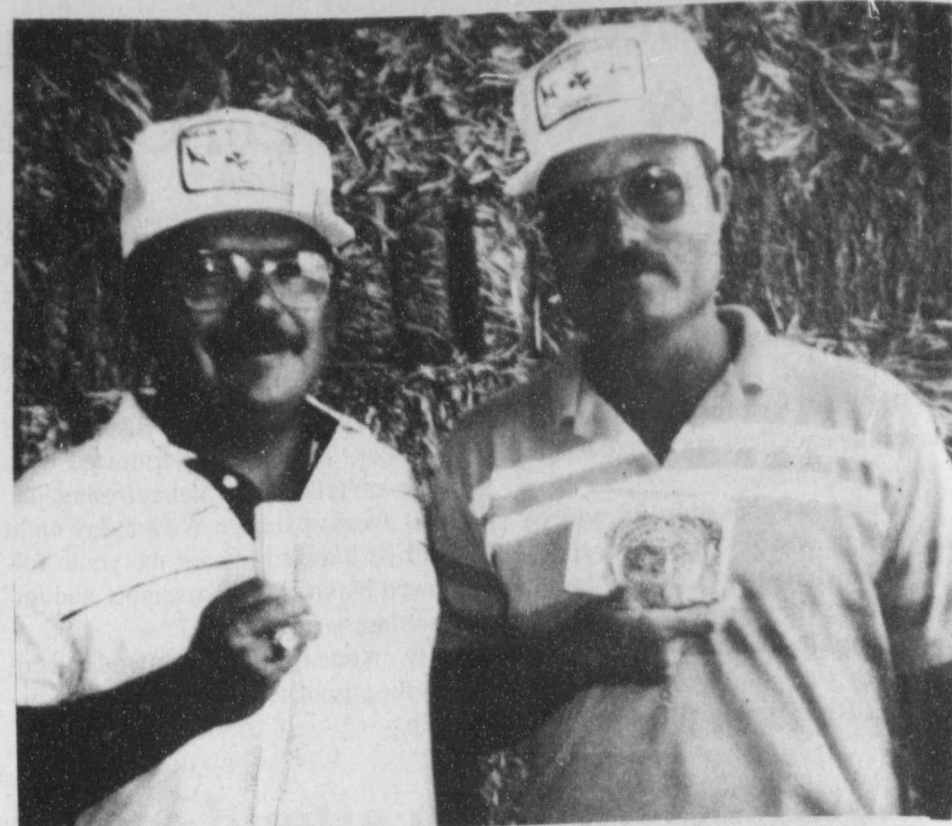

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Tips given for common tomato problems

Tomatoes are by far the most popular home garden vegetable in Texas, but they also cause gardeners the most trouble. A short description follows of the most common problems facing Texas gardeners when they try to raise a bumper crop of vine-ripened tomatoes.

Blossom-end rot. This problem shows up every year. It first appears on the bottom of the tomato as a large, dry, brown or black sunken area. It affects both green and ripening tomatoes and is primarily caused by a fluctuating moisture supply. Blossom-end rot can also be related to a lack of calcium in the plant. Staked and pruned plants are more likely to suffer from blossom-end rot than unstaked or caged plants. During most years, the rot is likely to appear on the earliest tomato fruits of the season. Blossom-end rot starts when the plants are putting on quick growth and are suddenly exposed to a hot dry spell or, in some cases, excessive moisture. The plants are unable to absorb adequate moisture, and this brings on blossom-end rot. Maintaining uniform soil moisture and applying a mulch around the plant will help reduce blossom-end rot.

Insect damage. Stink bugs, spider mites and pin worms are the most destructive insect pests of tomatoes in Texas. Stink bugs suck juice from the developing fruit, causing hardened and discolored spots on the fruit which are very noticeable at maturity. Spider mites can literally suck a plant to death, resulting in low yields of small fruit and ultimately in plant death. Pin worms can devastate a plant if not controlled; they often bore into the fruit near the stem scar and attack the foliage. Control

methods must begin early, utilizing recommended chemicals, if these pests are to be adequately and easily controlled.

Fruit-cracking. Fruit cracking is often a severe problem, especially when the weather changes from hot and dry to sporadically rainy. Tomatoes usually start to crack during warm rainy periods, especially if these conditions follow a dry spell. The tomato simply expands too fast, causing the skin to crack. The best way to avoid cracking is to keep the moisture supply as steady as possible throughout the season.

Catfacing. This is another type of tomato cracking or scarring. The tomato fruit develops unusual swellings and streaks of scar tissue, and they can be misshapen and deformed. This is not a disease; it is caused by abnormal development of the female part of the tomato flower at bloom time. Fruit that sets when temperatures are 55 degrees Fahrenheit or below often exhibit catfacing.

Blossom drop. Blossom drop plagues Texas gardeners during both cool and hot conditions. In some years, many of the early-season blossoms fail to set and fall off. This is caused by cool nighttime temperatures below 55 degrees. Once temperatures rise above 75 degrees at night and are combined with temperatures above 92 degrees during the day, most tomato varieties drop their blooms. For this reason it is difficult to get large-fruited tomato varieties, such as Small

Fry or Red Cherry, have the ability to set under relatively cool temperatures as well as high temperatures. These should be planted in every garden in Texas to insure both early as well as mid-season fruit set.

Leaf curl. Curling or "leaf roll" is very common in Texas but it does not usually harm production. Some varieties, such as Texas A&M University's Saladette, Chico and Monte Grande, have genetic characteristics which cause a natural leaf curl. High sunlight conditions in combination with pruning and staking also promote leaf curl. Under severe conditions, leaf curl may result in less protection of the maturing fruits and result in sunscald.

Sunscald. This occurs when green or ripening tomatoes get too much exposure to the hot Texas sun. At first, a whitish patch appears on the side of the tomato facing the sun. This spot tends to get larger as the fruit ripens and becomes grayish-white in color. To guard against sunscald, be careful not to overprune plants and remove protective foliage. Growing tomatoes in cages is an excellent way to avoid most problems associated with sunscald.

Stockholders of the Lockney Cooperatives gathered for their 34th annual meeting on Saturday, July 18th. The banquet was held at the Lockney Elementary School Cafetorium. Paul Schacht served as master of ceremonies.

John Lee Carthel gave the invocation and Margie Ferguson entertained with dinner music. Danny Lambert welcomed the members and guests. Out of town guests present were Byron Robertson, PCA; Dan Brown, Plainview Co-op Compress; Hal Sandefur, Sandefur and Swindle, CPA's; Alan Fondy, Volunteer Purchasing Group; John Phelps, Producers Exchange Insurance; Winn Cox, Farmland Industries; Jim Adams, Plains Cotton Cooperative Association; and David Booth Plains Cooperative Oil Mill.

Hal Sandefur of Sandefur and Swindle, CPA's gave the audit report. Total Current Assets totaled \$3,274,038.66; Fixed Assets \$1,954,453.94 and Other Assets, \$801,222.24. Total Assets amounted to \$6,029,714.84.

Current Liabilities totaled \$2,278,960.34; Term Liabilities \$120,493.00 and Capital Stock and Patron's Equities amount to \$3,630,261.50. Total Liabilities, Capital Stock and Patron's Equities amounted to \$6,029,714.84.

Sandefur told those present that the audit printed in the program is a condensed version and anyone who wants to go over the complete audit can do so at the cooperative office.

Charlie McQuhae, manager, recognized the employees and their families. He told those present that the newly completed dry fertilizer facility cost \$202,000.00. He reported that the dry

fertilizer sales have grown roughly 19 per cent and that he expects the sales to continue to grow.

He stated, "The elevator loss is something that we will have to be contended with for 5 to 7 years. The loss is partly due to less storage income. We aren't handling the volume of grain that we have in the past, mainly due to the CRP, falling water table and cattle grazing out more wheat each spring. Decisions will have to be made in the next couple of years in the elevator department."

He continued, "We are preparing for the season coming up. We are upgrading the gin at South Plains and the system here in Lockney and when we are finished we will do a better job of ginning. "We are working hard to make this the very best cooperative for its members. We are facing challenges ahead and we will be prepared."

The report of the nominating committee was given by Bill Race. John Lee Carthel and Bobby Cox had their names placed in nomination for the one posi-

tion of director that was open. Ballots were distributed and votes counted. John Lee Carthel was retained as a director.

Elected to the 1991-92 nominating committee were James Morris, Warren Mitchell, Nathan Johnson, Hansel Sanders and Charles Huffman.

Regional reports were given: Jim Adams of PCCA reported on the denim mill at Littlefield and David Booth of Plains Cooperative Oil Mill told of the progress they were making in the sales of Cottonseed Oil. He asked everyone present to "ask at the places where you eat out if they are cooking with cottonseed oil and if they aren't to insist that they need to be."

Higinio (Poncho) Garza was recognized for the 18 years that he has worked for the Lockney Cooperatives. As a retirement gift he received a gold watch. A reception in his honor was held immediately following the banquet.

Turn row meeting set Floyd County Entomology Update

Economically damaging fleahopper infestations in cotton have become more prevalent but are still widely scattered. Individual fields could become devastated by this pest so careful scouting is encouraged.

Bollworm activity has generally been light, but fields should continually be checked for pressure. Another bollworm egg lay is predicted for late this week or early next week.

Sorghum producers should check closely their crops for fall army worms feeding in the sorghum head. As sorghum starts to bloom check fields for sorghum midge. Greenbug infestation is light to moderate. Some producers have sprayed for greenbugs.

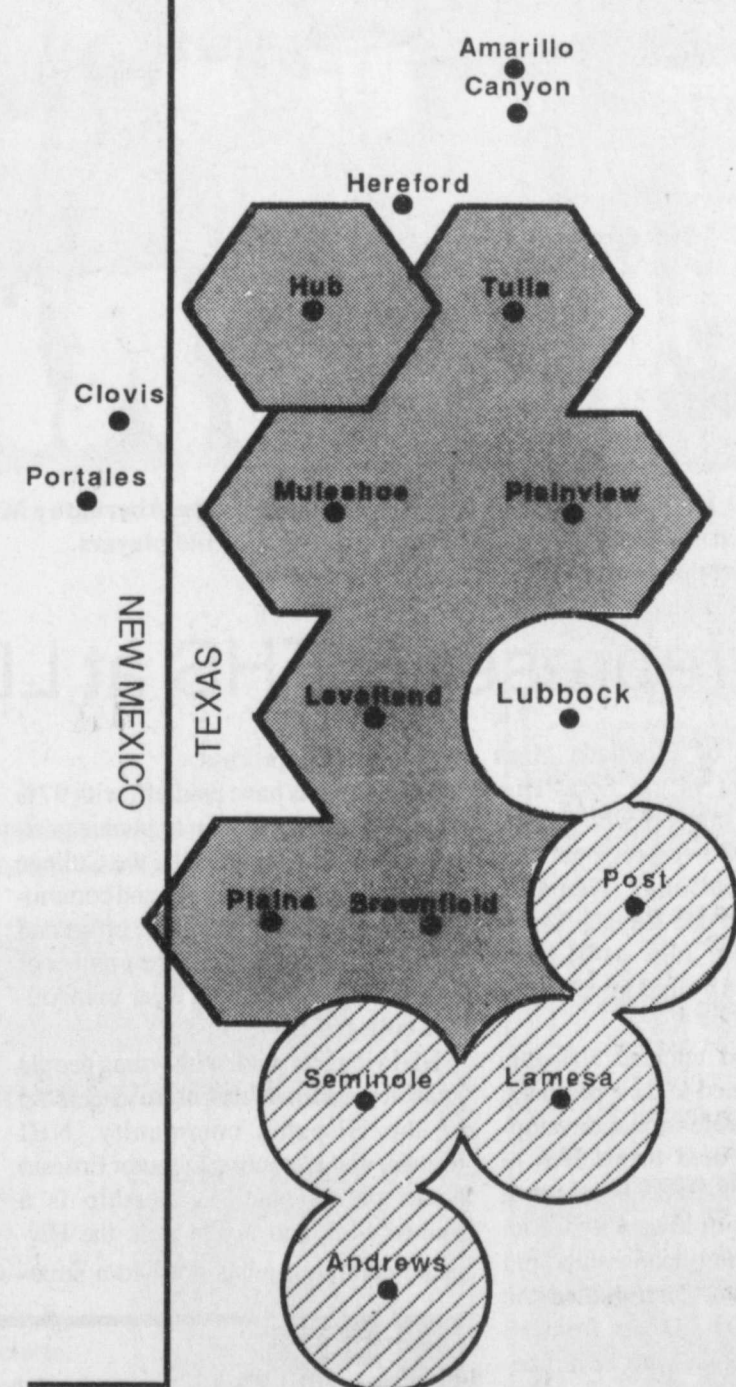
According to Mark Brown, Extension Agent - Entomology, egg laying activity of the southwestern corn borer began in Floyd County last week. Chemical applications can be targeted for SWCB as well as spider mites. The most effective mite treatments in recent years have been a pyrethroid such as Capture or Asana in combination with Cygon (dimethoate).

A section 18 crises exemption has been issued by the Texas Department of Agriculture to allow the use of Capture 2EC for control of Banks grass mite in corn. This exemption is cleared for Floyd County. The conditions of this exemption are as follows: Capture is to be applied at a rate of 0.08 to 0.1 lb. a.i. (5.12 to 6.4 fl. oz. of product) per acre utilizing ground equipment. This exemption will utilize a closed loading system. Applications are limited to 4 per crop season. Do not allow livestock to graze fields prior to harvest. A buffer zone of 500 feet must be maintained near water bodies containing fish or aquatic invertebrates. Do not enter a treated field for at least 24 hours without protective clothing. A thirty (30) day pre-harvest interval is required.

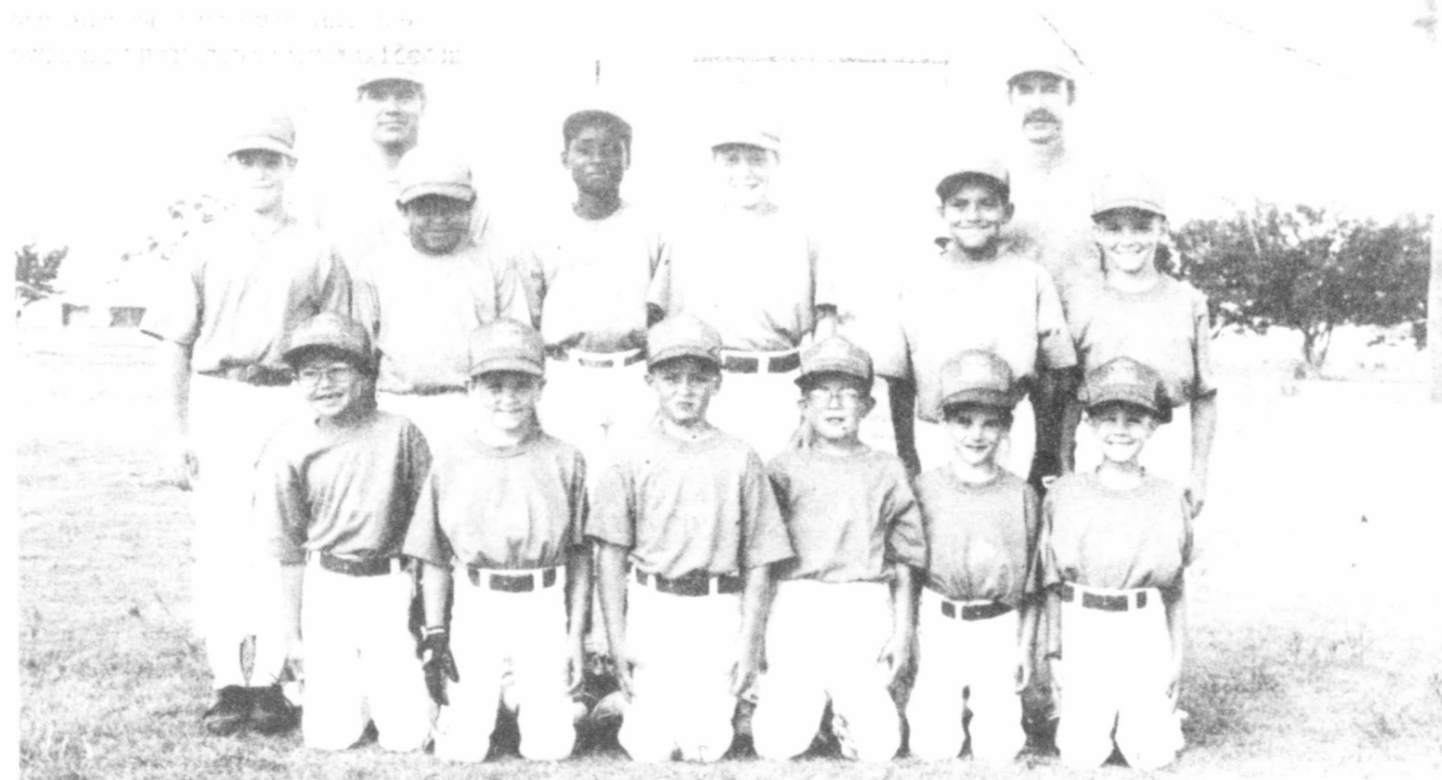

ing shorts. Shorts must be of appropriate length and fit each individual in a manner that is not distracting to the learning environment.

Appropriateness of dress will be determined by the building administrator if questionable attire is worn to school or school functions. Students will not be allowed to wear:

1. Cut-offs; garments must be hemmed or finished at the seams.
2. No gym/athletic shorts.
3. No biker shorts or athletic workout attire.
4. Revealing garments (see through designs, etc.)
5. Shorts that are too short or too tight.

The Board of Trustees has approved the dress code on a temporary trial basis. Students are asked to use good judge-

ment in selecting school clothes that are permitted under these guidelines. It is the desire of the administration that students arrive at school dressed in a manner that displays good grooming and good hygiene in order to have a productive day. All other regulations governing dress were not changed. Garments with vulgar sayings are not allowed and students should be careful to wear appropriate footwear.

A committee of students at the secondary level has been instrumental in establishing the modified dress code and will be assisting in a fashion show to demonstrate examples of shorts that are appropriate and acceptable for school. If parents have questions concerning the policy, each building principal is available for discussion.

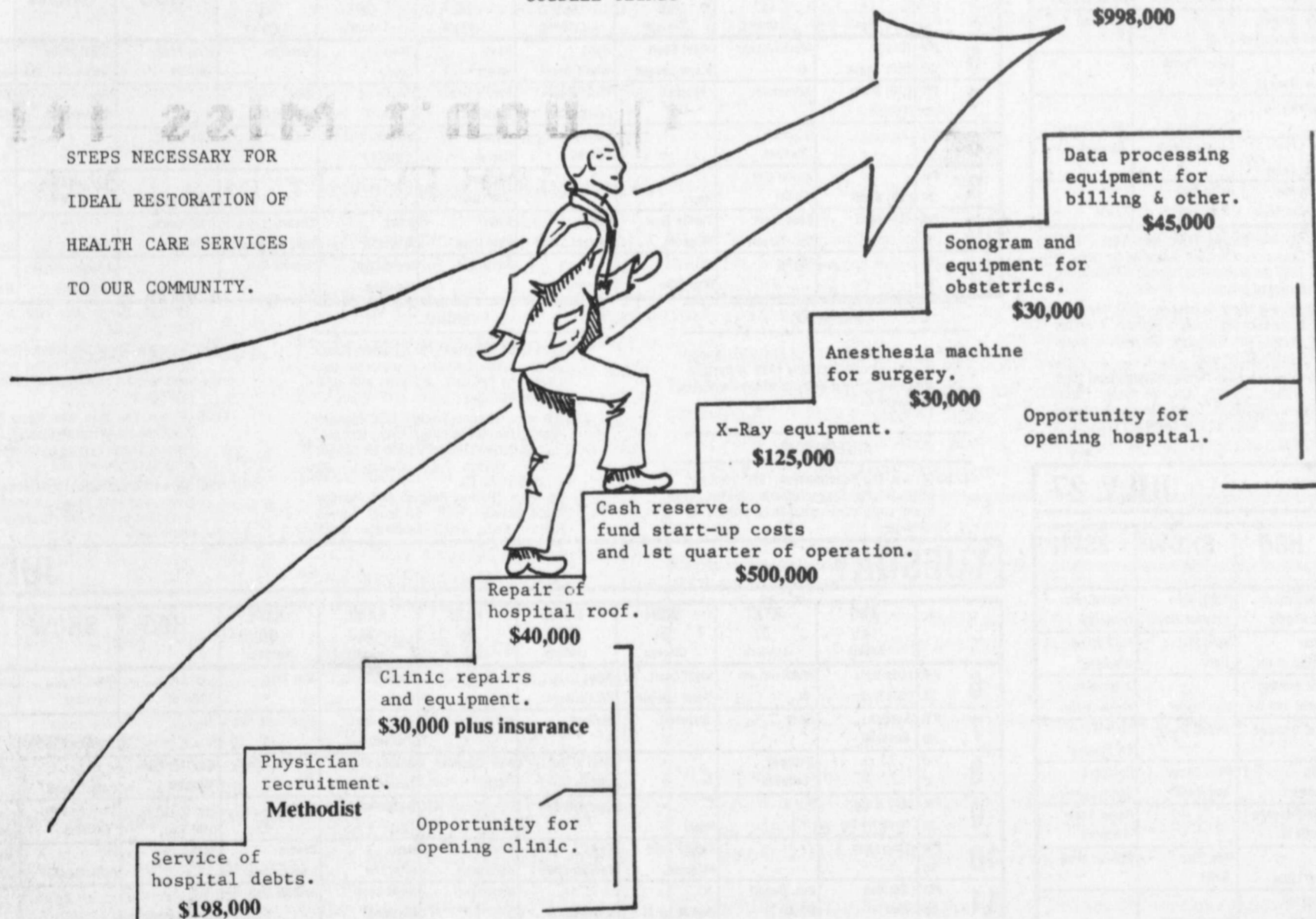

is step two. Next is step three, renovation of the clinic after recent storm and water damage rendered portions of it unusable until repairs are made.

Cost estimates for this step are about \$30,000 in addition to the \$19,000 which insurance will pay. This amount would allow the clinic to be repaired and renovated to make more effective use of the available clinic space and equipment.

Step four is the repair of the hospital roof, estimated to cost about \$540,000.

Step five is the accumulation of a cash reserve totaling \$500,000 to provide operating capital until revenues from patient care and services begins to come in after the hospital is reopened. It is at this point that reopening of the hospital would become feasible said Keltz. Steps six through nine would mean additional upgrading for the facility to bring it up to modern standards.

Step six is the purchase of new x-ray equipment, estimated at \$125,000. Step seven would see the acquisition of an anesthesia machine for the surgery, \$30,000, and step eight, sonogram equipment, also \$30,000. The final step, number 9, would cost about \$45,000 and would add set up current and capable data processing equipment for billing and records management.

"With current tax revenues estimated at \$651,000 per year, reopening is a two year goal," said Thayer. "The Friends of the Caprock organization has dedicated itself to raising additional funds, mostly towards the clinic renovation and the purchase of new equipment in steps six through nine." This could cut down on the length of the closure and get us open faster if we are successful in recruiting doctors."

OTHER MATTERS
The board authorized advertising for

bids in the clinic renovation project. The goal of reopening the clinic has been tentatively set for January of next year. Seeking bids will allow the board to better judge the cost of the project. Methodist Hospital has provided an architect and an interior decorator who each made estimates on the project. The cost according to these professionals would total \$122,000. The board decided to take bids from local sources as they judged the professional estimate to be "a little high for what we want to do."

A motion by Pitts, seconded by Thompson and approved by unanimous vote, directed Keltz to pull in all outstanding debts owed to the hospital district which had previously been turned over to collection agencies. Keltz was then authorized to pursue collection of these outstanding debts.

Attending the 7:00 p.m. session were board members Fred Thayer, Joy Assiter, Jim Word, Jerry Thompson and Kenneth Pitts, administrator Terry Keltz, Joe Stepp and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter.

Mobile unit to detect breast cancer in Floydada August 8

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, "the death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment, breast cancers can be found then they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at

this early stage has a 90%-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women on Thursday, August 8.

The mobile unit will be parked at Thompson Pharmacy, 200 South Main, Floydada. Appointments may be made by calling 983-5111.

The current water temperature at the lake is 78 degrees and the depth is 98.4 ft.

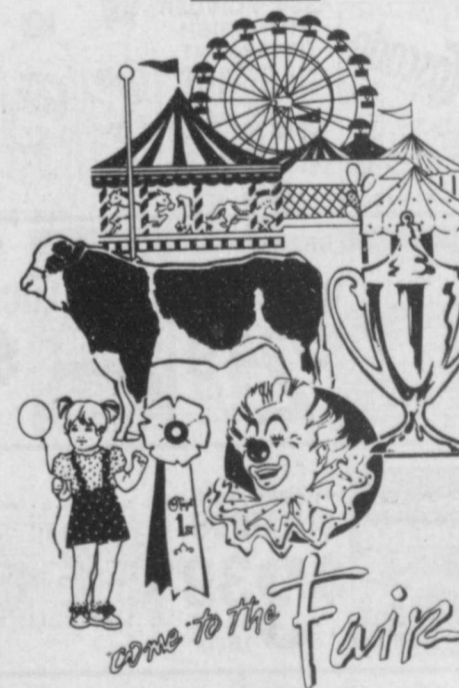
