THE THREATENED strike by the nation's truck industry holds a lot more than just passing interest for the residents of our area.

Of course we all are aware of the tremendous impact that the trucking industry has on our lives, since the entire nation moves by truck.

One of the biggest objections of the truckers is the proposal to increase the federal use tax from approximately \$221 per year to a maximum of \$2700 per year—more than a whopping ten times its present level.

And, according to one of our contacts, this use tax is to be extended to many farm trucks, particularly tandem trucks. If this federal use tax is increased as per the proposal, custom combine operators would really be hit a lick. They would have to increase their prices accordingly to their customers, the farmers.

At a time when the agriculture industry is having to "tie a knot and hang on," the proposed compounding of the federal use tax might serve as the death knell to many farmers.

Another area where the federal government threatens to hurt the truckers, farmers and consumers is in the tire industry, as the feds are proposing a tax on rubber goods equal to 50 cents per pound at the time of purchase.

If you are a fairly big tire user, you can do a little mental arithmetic and see right quick that this new tax could also cause you a little pain in the hip pocket.

The truckers, and perhaps even the farmers, are not as vocally opposed to the proposed five cents per gallon federal tax, which is supposed to create thousands of new jobs and entail keeping up our country's highways and bridges. (State officials have their doubts as to how effective this program will be, however, and just how much it would benefit our state).

But this outrageous federal use tax, and the companion proposal for the rubber industry, will directly affect everyone who reads this piece. Therefore, if you feel so moved, it might be in order to contact your congressman, and add these new woes to your list.

Congressman Kent Hance, by the way, will be the featured speaker at Friona's Chamber of Commerce banquet the evening of January 20.

If you would like a chance to talk to the congressman in person, then you should get a ticket to the banquet and plan to attend.

EARLIER THIS WEEK, we heard that the city of Lubbock had set an all-time record with a snow depth still on the ground of at least an inch for the 16th consecutive day.

All of the snow has finally melted from the fields and yards, but late this week there was still evidence of our big holiday season snowfall, particularly in the shaded areas and where the snow had been plowed into snowbanks.

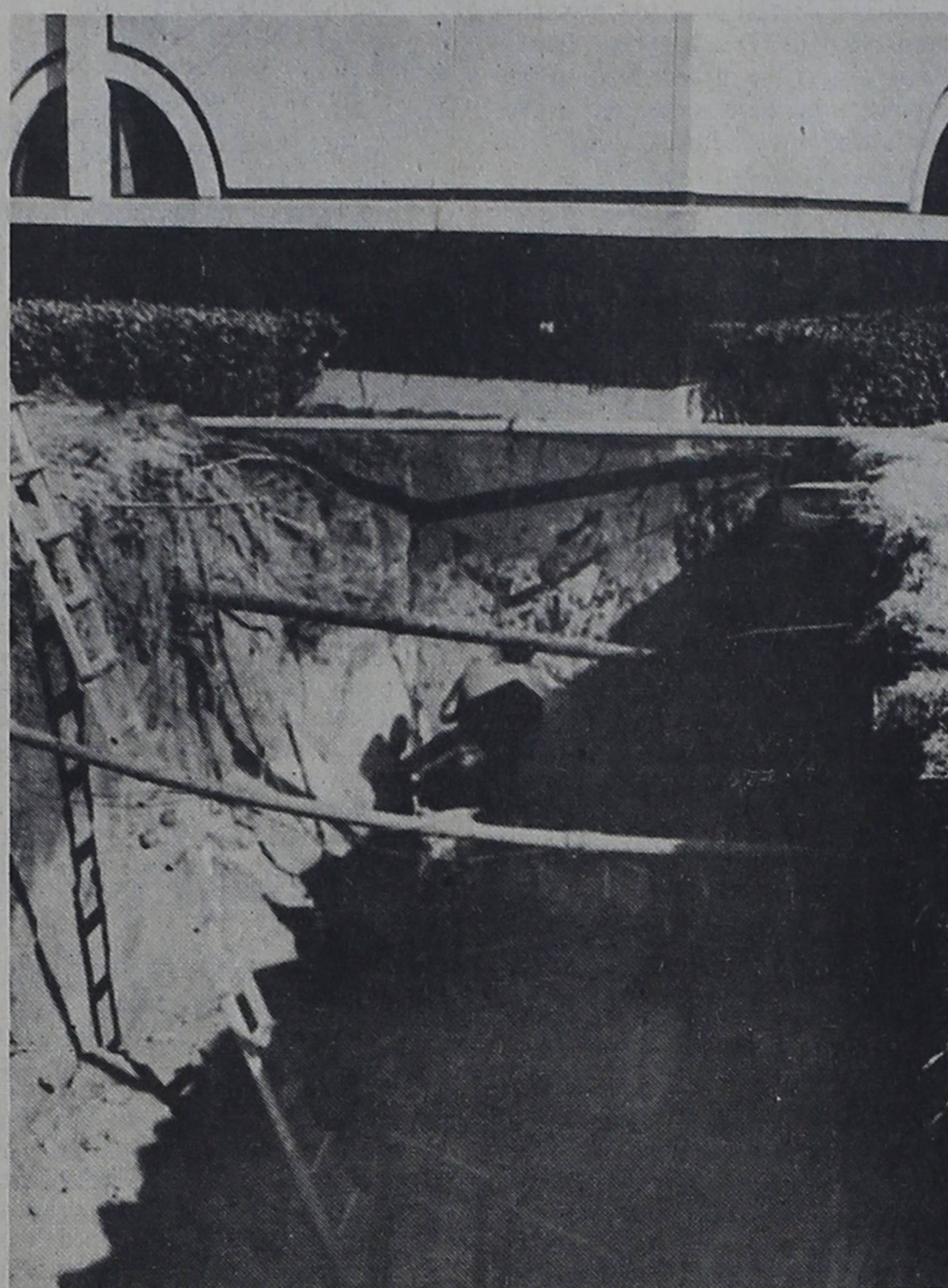

Bank To Provide 24-Hour Tellers

Construction is underway for a computerized after-hours banking service at Friona State Bank, according to bank president Robert Neelley.

The service, when inaugurated, will offer bank customers the opportunity of withdrawing cash, making a deposit or cashing a check after bank hours and on weekends.

Customers will be issued "E.S.P. cards," which will provide a service similar to that currently being offered by banks in larger cities.

There will be a built-in safeguard, in the form of a secret code, which will prevent someone else from being able to use your card in case it is lost or stolen, Neelley points out.

A small building will house the 24-

hour banking service, and a tunnel will connect that building with the bank. Construction is currently underway on the tunnel.

"We will be installing a computer system which will not only handle the after-hour banking, but will accommodate other services which we are also considering," said Neelley, who indicated that the 24-hour teller system had been in the works for Friona State Bank for a couple of years.

In addition to the 24-hour teller, an additional night deposit will be offered at the new location, featuring better lighting and a front location, for business people who use this service on a regular basis.

Show Slated January 22

The Friona Junior Livestock Show (for all FFA and 4-H youngsters in the Friona School District) will be held Saturday, January 22, it was announced this week.

Animals are to be brought to the showbarn Friday afternoon, January 21. Judging will be conducted in four divisions: barrows, lambs, steers and heifers.

Beginning the show on Saturday will be the barrow judging, to start at 9 a.m. Following in succession, will be judging of lambs, heifers and steers.

Melvin Chisum, vocational-agriculture instructor at Springlake-Earth High School, will judge the show.

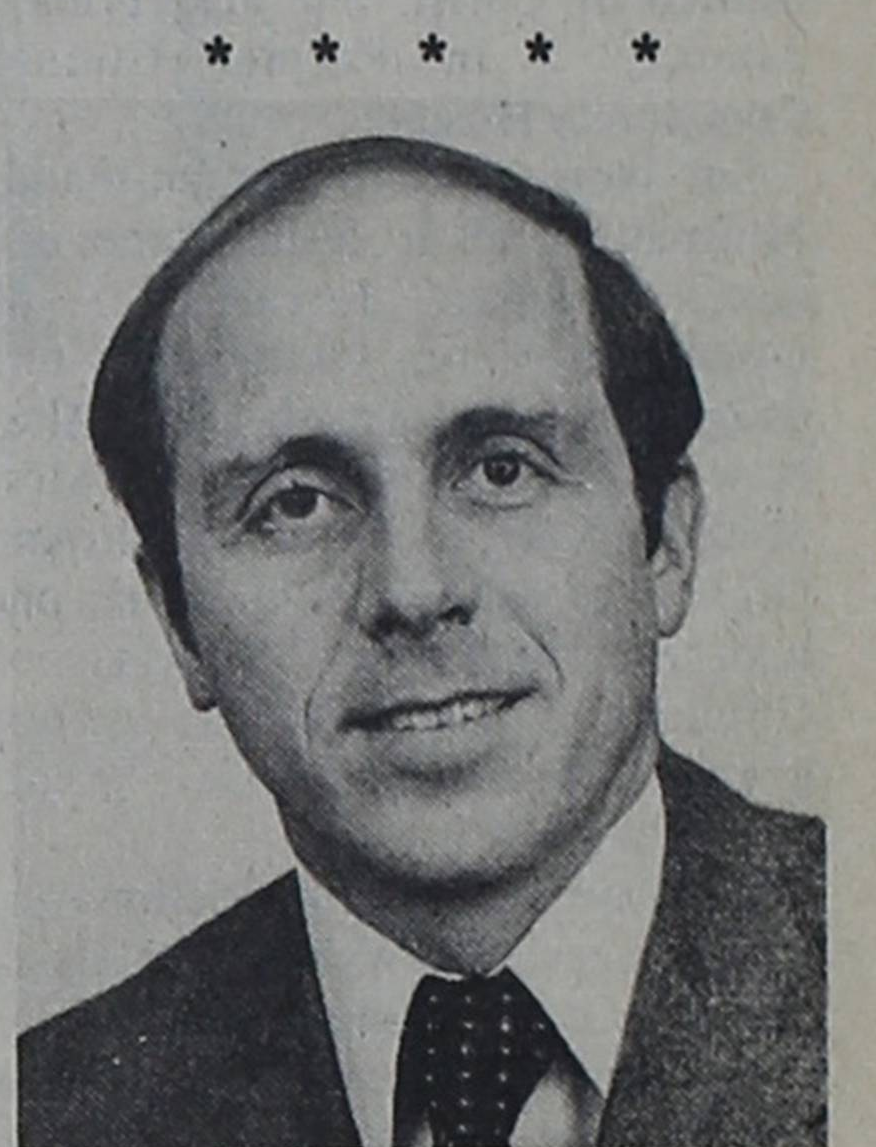

County Salaries OK'd By Court

The 1983 salary schedule for county officials and employees was a main item of business for the Parmer County Commissioners at their regular session Monday, January 10.

The proposal approved allowed for a three per cent increase in salaries for all officials and employees except the four commissioners, who receive no increase in salary or expense allowance.

The county's proposed holiday schedule for 1983 was also approved. County holidays are scheduled for Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Veteran's Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Day.

The 1983 terms of court were designated, with the January term running January 1-June 30, and the July term from July 1-December 31.

A motion was passed to pay the expenses of a visiting judge in the amount of \$194.13, and a visiting court reporter in the amount of \$61.05.

A bill was approved for an autopsy ordered by a county justice of the peace, in the amount of \$500 and transportation costs of \$45.00.

Payment of the county's dues to the County Judges and Commissioners Assn. of Texas, in the amount of \$100, was approved.

Payment of dues to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, through the period ending September 30, 1983 was approved. This amount was \$538.10.

Boarding care bills for county foster children, in the amount of \$1,147, was approved. The amount will be reimbursed to the county.

Judge Porter Roberts stated that the inspector for the Texas Commission on Jail Standards would inspect the county facility February 15.

Extension agents Laura Jacobs and Seth Ralston reported that 4-H programs are in full swing. Ralston reported that local 4-H shows are scheduled at Oklahoma Lane, Farwell, Friona and Bovina, with the county show slated for February 2-5.

Soil Conservation work was approved for Kenny White, Gerald Norton and Sheets & Sheets in precinct 3, when machines are in the area and not in demand. Farmers involved will be billed for the work to be done.

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CHOCOLATE MINT LAYER COOKIES

2-1 oz. squares unsweetened chocolate
1/2 cup butter or margarine
2 eggs 1 cup sugar
1/2 cup flour 1/2 cup chopped pecans
1 1/2 cup powdered sugar
3 Tbsp. butter or margarine, softened
2 Tbsp. whipping cream
3/4 tsp. peppermint extract
1 or 2 drops of green food coloring
1/2 (9 oz. of sweet cooking chocolate)
2 Tbsp. margarine
1 tsp. vanilla

Melt unsweetened chocolate, 1/2 butter in top of double boiler (cool). Beat eggs and 1 cup sugar until light and thick. Stir in flour, pecans and melted chocolate. Spoon mixture into greased 9x9x1/4" baking pan, spreading evenly. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Cool. Combine powdered sugar, 3 Tbsp. butter, whipping cream, mint extract and food coloring and beat well until smooth. Spread evenly over baked layer cover and chill 1 hour or until firm. Melt sweet chocolate and two Tbsp. butter in top of double boiler. Stir in vanilla and drizzle over mint layer. Cover and chill 1 hour or until firm.

OLD FASHIONED FRUIT CAKE

2 cups salad oil 1 cup grape juice
3 cups brown sugar 8 eggs
2 tsp. baking powder 2 tsp. soda
6 cups flour 2 cups candied pineapple
2 tsp. cinnamon 2 cups dark raisins
2 tsp. allspice 3 cups candied cherries
2 tsp. cloves 1 cup light raisins
2 tsp. nutmeg 2 cups chopped dates
2 cups citron fruit 4 tsp. salt
6 cups pecans and walnuts (mixed)
Take half of sifted flour and mix with nut and fruit mixture. Beat well: oil, sugar and eggs. Sift remaining flour, salt, baking powder, soda and spices alternately with grape juice, mix well. Then add fruit and nut mixture. Be sure to mix well. Bake in

225° oven for 2 1/4-4 hours, depending on the size of pan. Let cake cool completely, then wrap in fruit brandy soaked cloth. Then wrap in foil paper for at least 1 week to ripen. Makes about 15 lb. cake.

PEANUT BUTTER FINGERS

1/2 cup butter 1/2 tsp. soda
1/2 cup sugar 1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup brown sugar 1/2 tsp. vanilla
1 egg 1 cup flour
1/3 cup peanut butter 1 cup oats
Cream together butter, sugar, brown sugar. Blend into the mixture the egg, peanut butter, soda, salt and vanilla. Add the flour and oats. Spread in greased 13"x9" pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Remove and sprinkle with 6 oz. pkg. chocolate chips. Let stand 5 minutes. Spread evenly.

In small bowl mix:
1/2 cup powdered sugar
1/4 cup peanut butter
2-4 Tbsp. canned milk
Spread over chocolate top and marble. Cut into squares when cool.

SNOWBALL COOKIES

1 cup sugar 1/2 lb. dates
2 eggs 1/4 lb. oleo
Cook the above ingredients slow until dates melt.
1 tsp. vanilla 3 cups Rice Krispies
1 cup pecans
1 pkg. Angel Flake Coconut
Roll teaspoon of dough in coconut. Shape in balls.

MICROWAVE PEANUT PATTIES

2 cups sugar 2 Tbsp. butter
1/2 cup water 1 tsp. vanilla
Dash of salt
2 to 3 drops of red food coloring
1/2 cup light corn syrup
1 1/2 cups raw peanuts
Combine sugar, water, salt and light corn syrup in a 2-quart glass

measuring cup. Bring to a boil in the microwave (approximately 4 1/2-5 minutes), stir and add peanuts. Return to microwave and cook approximately 7-9 minutes or until a soft ball stage (234 degrees) is reached. Remove from oven; add butter, vanilla and red coloring. Cool and beat until creamy. Drop by Tbsp. onto greased cookie sheet or make into 2 large patties.

Gas Co. Offers Aid On Bills

Responding to a request by the chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, Energas Company announced today that the company will expand its efforts to aid low-income people in paying their energy bills this winter.

Last month, TRC chairman Mack Wallace wrote to all natural gas utility companies in Texas, urging them to create winter energy assistance programs for the disadvantaged in Texas, similar to some pilot programs instigated by utility companies in other states. The Railroad Commission is the state agency that regulates the oil and gas industry in Texas.

Energas is establishing a program to supplement existing programs of financial aid to people in its service territory who would otherwise not be able to pay their heating bills this winter. Energas representatives have been involved on national industry committees studying the results of the pilot energy assistance programs.

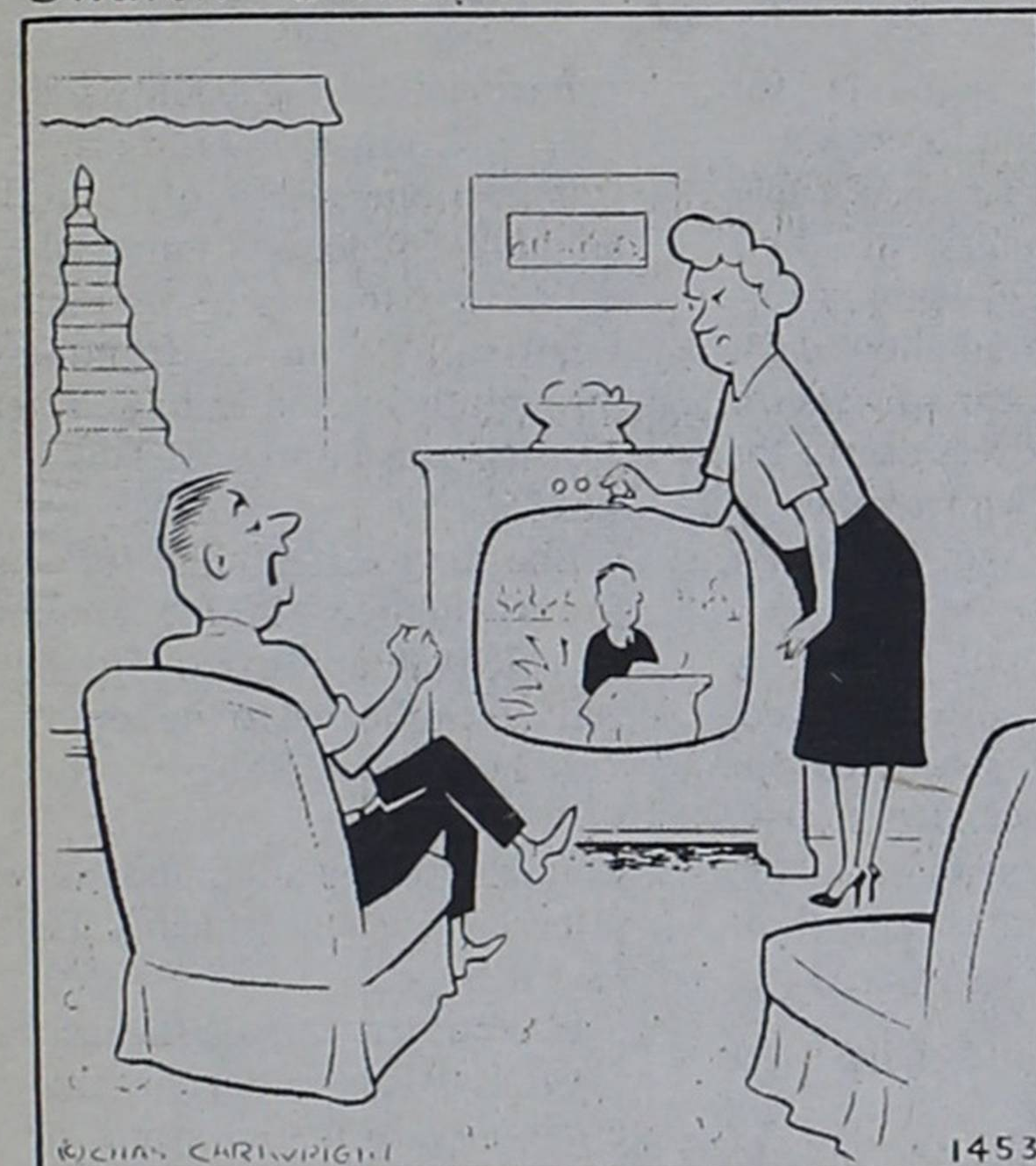

The United States Congress recently passed a law that will adversely affect you and most other savers in the nation. If the exemption is not filed in time, a tax return must be filed the next year -- or the withheld money will be forfeited to the government.

Unless Congress acts to stop the withholding rule, it will go into effect on July 1, 1983. This bank is working to do away with the rule, but we need your help. IT'S YOUR MONEY.

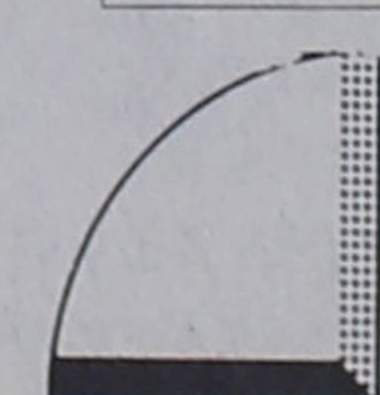

Squaws Win Consolation At Lazbuddie Tourney

The Friona High School Squaws won the consolation championship at the Lazbuddie tournament last weekend, splitting their two games.

The Squaws lost to Hart, 48-40 in the opening round. Friona held a 20-19 halftime lead, only to see the Hart girls outscore them 29-20 in the second half. Sherry O'Brian scored 17 points and Cara Brockman 11 for the Squaws.

Friona had a bye into the consolation finals, where they met the Plainview girls junior varsity. Friona won the game, 49-33, as Miss O'Brian tossed in 10 points.

In a game here Tuesday night, the Squaws opened district 2-AAA play on a sour note, losing to the Abernathy girls, 61-44.

A basket by Diane Johnston tied the game for the Squaws, 4-4, and Cara Brockman canned a dandy long shot with 1:24 on the clock to give the Squaws a 6-4 lead at the end of the opening quarter.

The lead see-sawed in the second quarter. Brockman canned another long shot for an 8-6 Friona lead 55 seconds into the second quarter, and after Abernathy took a 9-8 lead, she sank a free throw to knot the score at 9-all at the 6:04 mark.

Sherry O'Brian scored a pair of baskets within 30 seconds to achieve a 13-all tie after Abernathy again captured the lead. Amanda Perez scored a free throw with nine seconds left to give Friona a 16-all tie at halftime.

But a fast start in the second half by the visiting Antelopes spelled doom for the Squaws. The visitors

scored 11 unanswered points to begin the third quarter, taking a 27-16 lead.

Baskets by Kristi Britting, Miss Brockman and Miss O'Brian rallied the Squaws to within two points, 38-36. It was a three-point play by Miss Brockman with 32 seconds left that completed the rally.

A tally by Abernathy with two seconds on the clock gave the 'Lopes a 40-36 lead after three quarters.

Another slow start by the Squaws led to a 10-point Abernathy lead, and this time Friona couldn't catch up. Abernathy outscored the Squaws, 21-8 in the fourth quarter.

Miss Brockman, playing one of her better games, paced the Squaws in scoring with 18 points, to 13 for Miss O'Brian.

Chiefs Take Second At Lazbuddie

The Friona Chieftains won second place in the Lazbuddie tournament last weekend, in their final tune-up for district play.

The tournament was a last-minute fill-in for several schools who had missed tournaments in December due to bad weather.

The Chieftains downed Hart, 69-35 in the first round. The team jumped out to a 22-6 lead against the outmanned Longhorns, and the bench saw a lot of playing time. Joey Howard scored 18 points to pace the Chieftains' effort.

In the semi-finals, Friona met the host Lazbuddie Longhorns, and prevailed by a 67-44 score. The Chiefs had a 20-11 lead after one quarter, and upped that lead to 39-26 at the half.

A miserable third quarter by Lazbuddie, in which they scored only two points, to Friona's 14, spelled doom for the Longhorns. Charlie Veazey scored 16 points and Howard 15 for the Chieftains.

Meeting district rival Muleshoe in the tournament finals, Friona had its worst game of the tournament, and Muleshoe made off with the title, 65-41.

"We played one of our worst games, and Muleshoe was playing very well," said Coach Tom Johnson. Richie Malouf's 23 points paced Friona's scoring.

The tournament results left Friona with a 9-8 season record entering district play on Friday at Tulia. The Chieftains are in a rebuilding year at a time when every team in the district except Tulia has a winning record.

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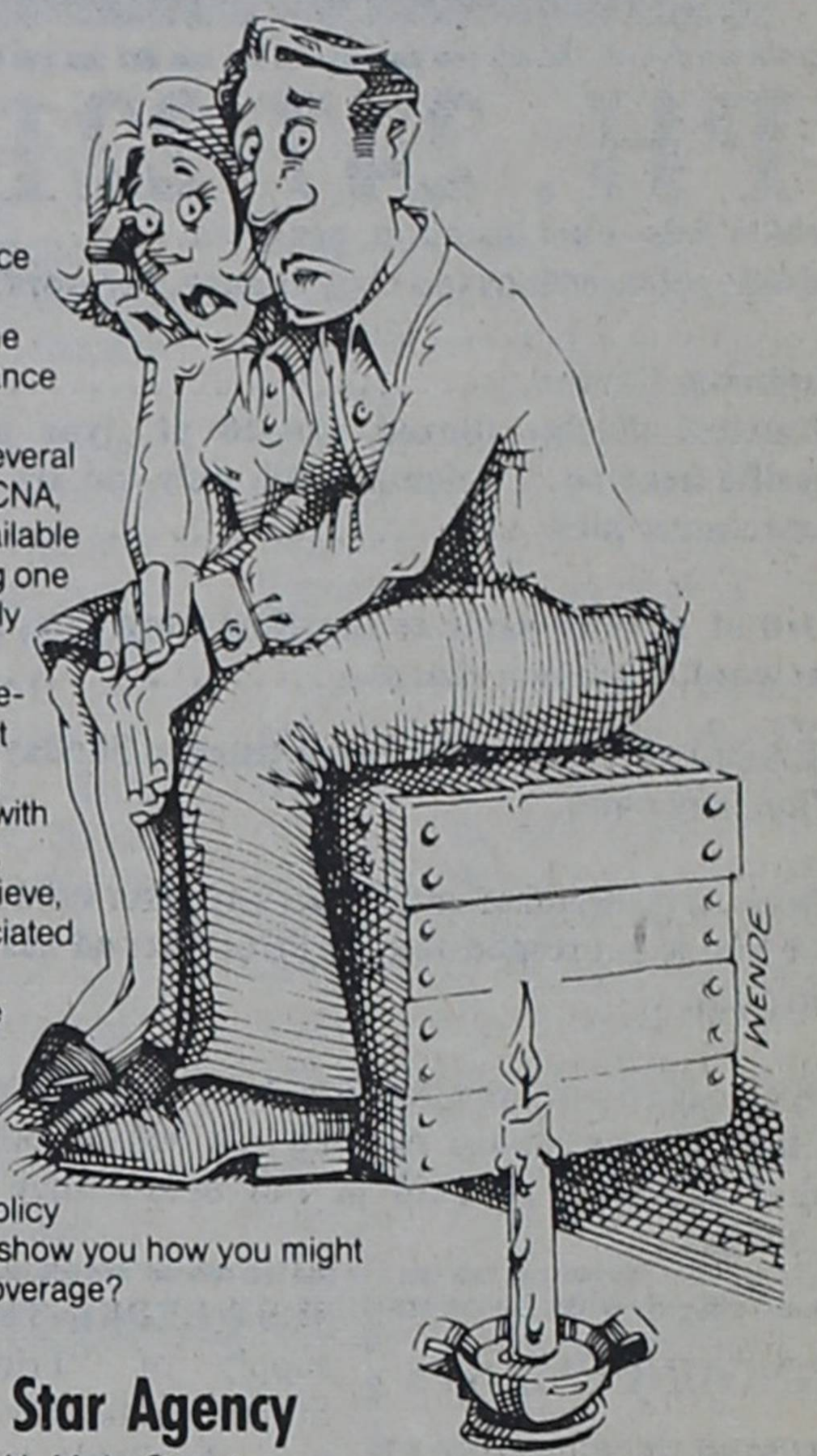

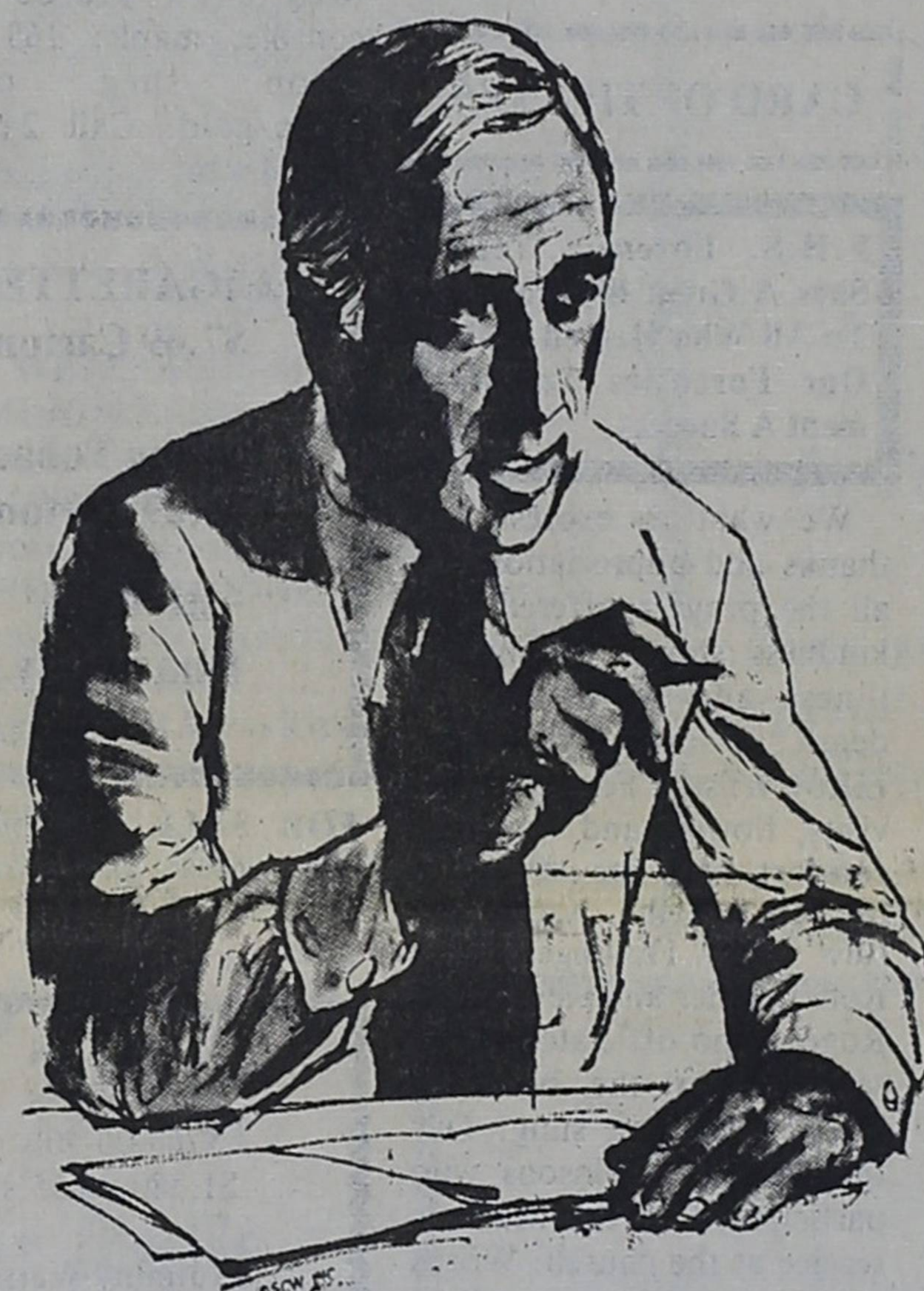

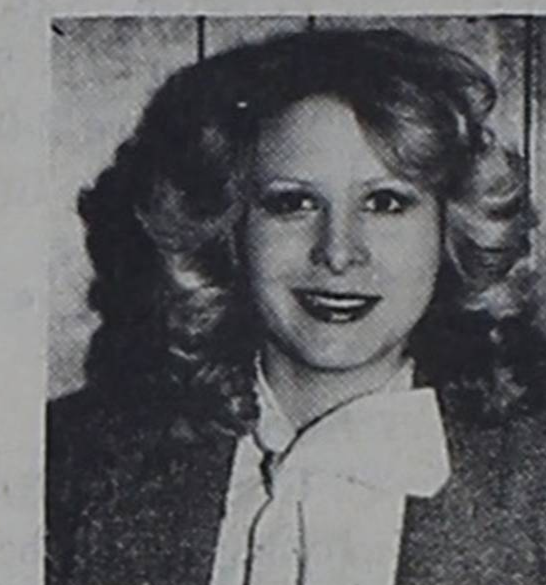

Second session of the Gifted and Talented Institute at West Texas State University will begin on Saturday, January 22, with study programs in art, reading, Spanish, writing and a variety of other subjects.

The second session of the Gifted and Talented Institute for students in grades one through 12 will continue for six Saturdays through February 26. Mary Jane Reeves of the WTSU College of Education coordinates the program.

On January 22, interested students who have completed the first session or who have submitted an application for the second session will meet in Room 101 of the WTSU Science Center at 9 a.m. Parents may meet with the students and will tour the Cornette Library as the students begin their activities.

Students in first through third grades may participate in Perceptual Motor Skills with instruction by Dr. Myron Dees, professor and head of the Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

Dr. Anne Gregory, assistant professor of art, will instruct students in third and fourth grades on ceramics and sculptural projects. She also plans a trip to the Panhandle Plains Historical Museum which is located on campus.

For the intermediate grades, fourth through sixth, classes will include Perceptual Motor Skills, with Dees; art, Gregory; Reading Enrichment for Advanced Readers, Dr. Idalia

Pickens, assistant professor of curriculum and instruction; Say it in Spanish I, with Dr. Mary Gill, associate professor and coordinator of modern languages; Say it in Spanish II, Gill; Doing Sociology, Linda Shelly, instructor in sociology; and Exploring Our Earth, Dr. Gerald Schultz, professor of geology.

Junior high school students may choose from racquetball, instructed by Dees; Introduction to Military Skills, and Marksmanship for Pistol and Rifle, Lt. Col. Jonathan Searles, professor and head of the Department of Military Science; art, Gregory; creative writing, Rick Smith; and Exploring the Stock Market, Jean Walker, instructor in finance.

High school students also may choose to participate in racquetball, introduction to Military Skills, Marksmanship for Pistol and Rifle, creative writing, Exploring the Stock Market and Creative Mathematics,

only for seniors, Dr. Kenneth VanDoren, professor of mathematics and head of the Department of Mathematics and Physics, and Enrichment in Music, Dr. Joe Nelson, professor of music.

Two afternoon programs will be available for students in grades five through 12. George Benson, instructor in computer information systems, will instruct Computer for Beginners and Computer for Experienced Programmers from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m.

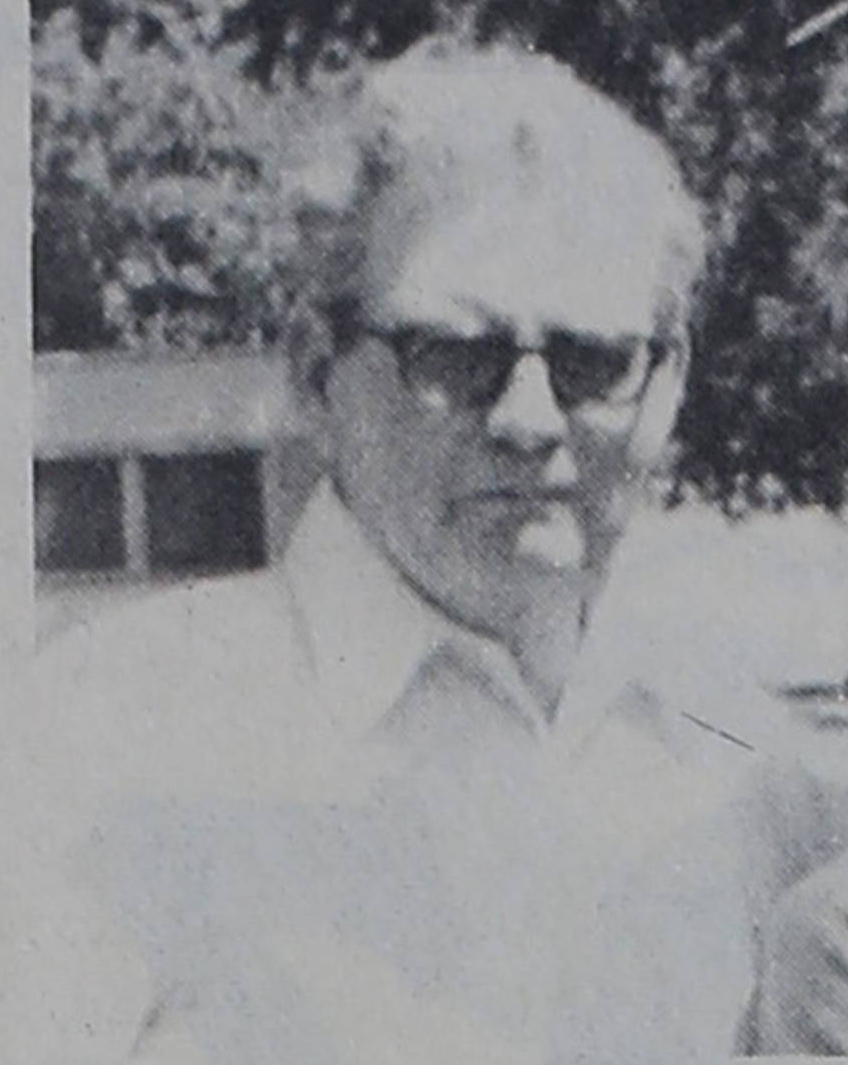
Cost of the half-day program is \$25 and a full-day program costs \$50. The third session will begin on March 26.

Workshop To Explore Solar Energy

A Solar Collector Workshop will be held January 21 and 22 at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West, Amarillo, Texas.

Oldham County Extension Agents Jimmie Walker and Kay Wells have announced the workshop participants will not only be exposed to all the technical information, but will actually, as a group, build a solar collector that could be used on their home.

The schedule is: Friday night, January 21, 5:30-6 p.m. registration; 6-10 p.m. meeting; Saturday morning, January 22, 9 a.m. construction of collector.

Discussion will include several uses to which the solar collectors may be adapted such as: home heating, water heating, grain drying, cooking, drying foods, farrowing houses, melting ice in stock tanks, etc.

Bob Dunsmore, vice president of San Luis Valley Solar Energy Association, will be the main speaker. Dunsmore, experienced with the development of many kinds of solar systems in the Alamosa, Colorado area, has witnessed the growth of solar collectors from zero to 1500.

He has spent eight months in South America in teaching and developing low cost solar systems. Along with passive and active solar systems, he will also discuss solar storage and wind energy development in the Alamosa area. Walker says he will not be teaching from a textbook but from six years of solar collector experience.

Also on the program will be Weedon Echols, area Extension energy specialist, who will discuss future energy costs and savings.

This workshop is open to the public with a \$15 per person registration fee. This fee may be paid upon arrival at the workshop. Registration by telephone or post card by January 20 would be appreciated in planning, refreshments and facilities.

Spring Tops List Of Paramedics

The first weekend in May 1982, Don Spring of Bovina, a former Friona resident, began a paramedic course in Amarillo that would take seven and a half months to complete. The course consisted of eight hours of classroom lecture and eight hours of clinical rotation each week-end until December 11.

Lectures and clinical work during this time involved advanced life support in emergency care including I.V.'s, drug therapy, cardio-monitoring, and respiratory therapy. Don worked in the Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center, ICU, CCU, Pediatrics and respiratory unit of Northwest Texas Hospital. He also spent time working with the AMS Ambulance. One week in September, Don had to work every day from 7

a.m. to 1 p.m. in surgery practicing respiratory therapy.

To complete the class and become a paramedic, the class had to pass seven skills and a written state exam of 200 questions. On December 11, Don took the state test. The 23rd of December Don received a call from the EMS Region I Office in Amarillo that he had indeed passed the test with a 96.5. From the class of fifteen Don made the high score on the test final.

The Ambulance Service in Bovina is in the process of purchasing equipment such as a heart monitor, paddles, and I.V. equipment that could not otherwise be used without a paramedic. Larry Mitchell, another member of the Service, began paramedic training on January 11 in Lubbock.

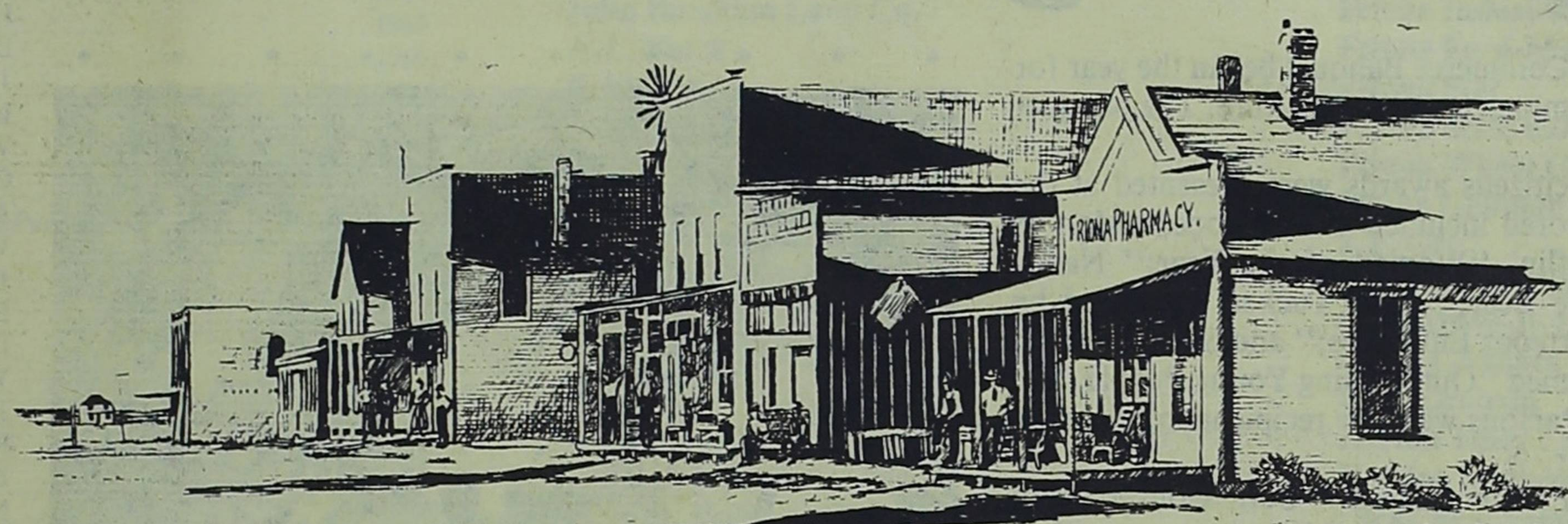

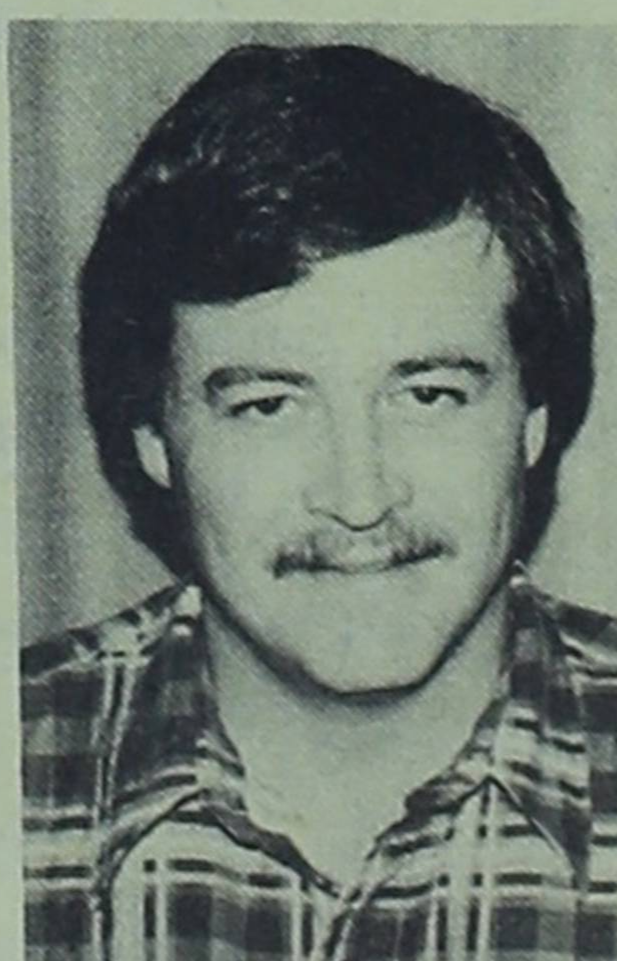

All events held during the local celebration were well attended and termed successful. Congratulations are in order for the hard work and dedication by the Chamber members and committee chairmen.

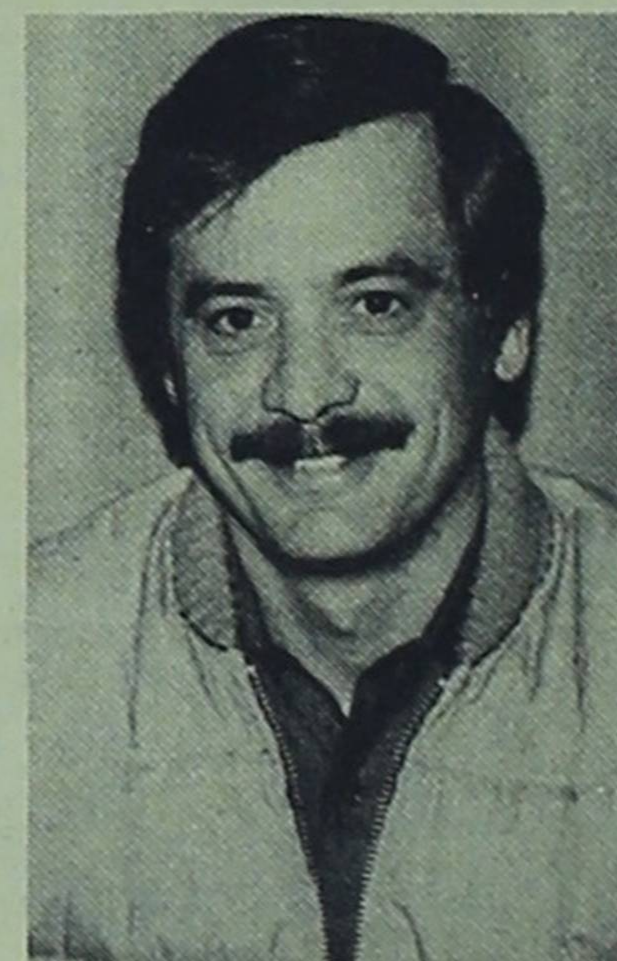
