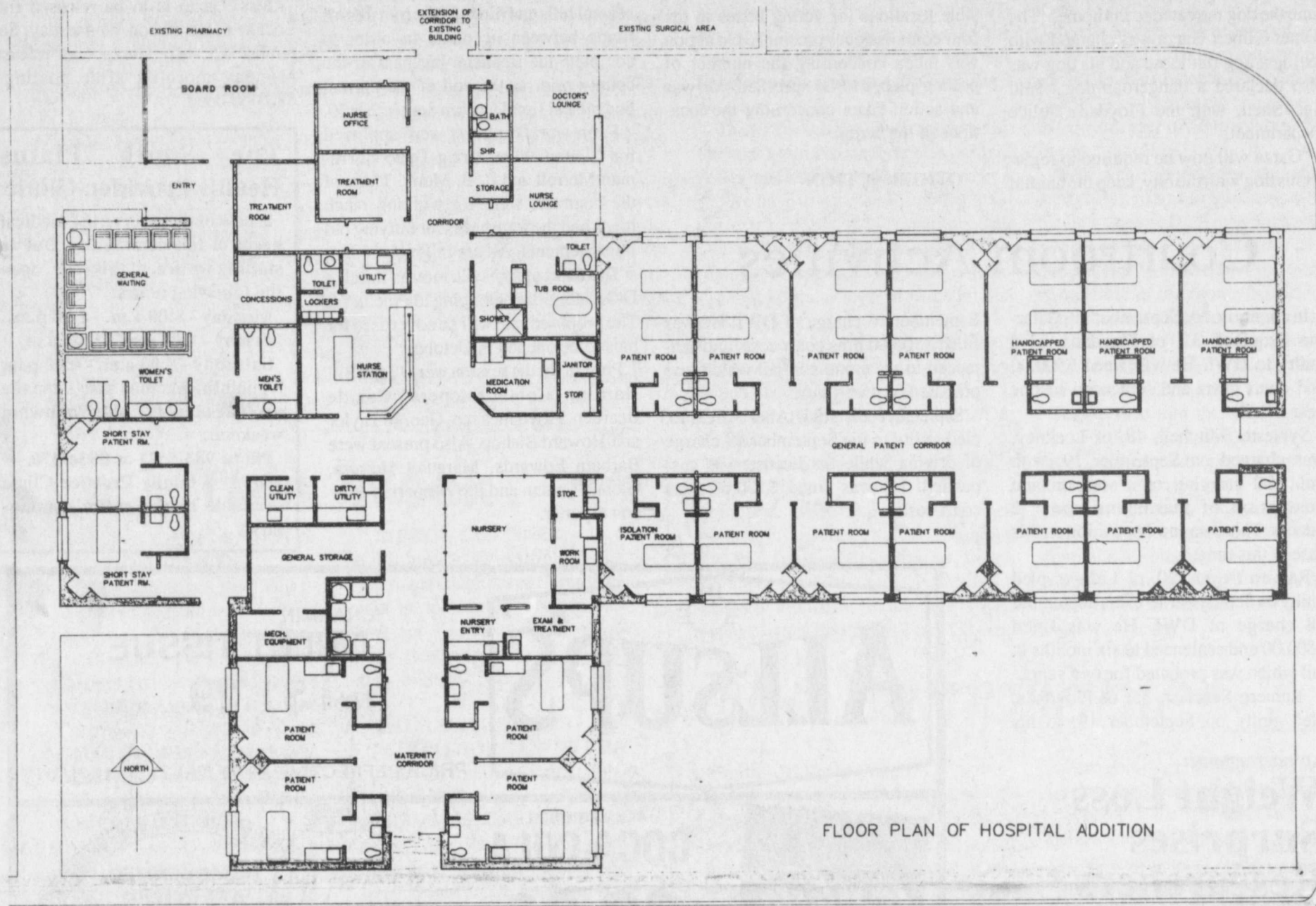

## Lockney General reveals hospital expansion plans

Years of planning ahead and setting aside money for the future has enabled the Lockney Hospital District to approve building expansion and replacement.

For several years the board has planned for this project by setting aside \$95,000 per year. With this money and with money from the Martha Ann Cogdell Trust Foundation, ground will be broken in January on a new building estimated at \$961,717.00. This total is an estimated figure and includes construction, contingencies, architect and engineers fees.

"It is important for the people to know," said Hospital Board President Claude Brown, "that no additional taxes or bond issues will be needed to fund this project."

Mr. Raymond D. Powell, architect for the project, was present at the Lockney Hospital Board meeting September 17, when the final plans of the expansion were approved. Powell will oversee the project.

"This construction is necessary to plan for the future of the hospital," said Administrator Jeff Reecer. "The two main hallways are army barracks that were moved here in the late 40's." The hospital is surveyed every year and for

several years waivers have been granted on the hospital deficiencies by Medicare and Life Safety Code.

"In the expansion process, everything currently used for patient care will be used for office space, storage and ancillary departments. The delivery room and operating room will also remain in the current location. Also staying where they are will be the lab, radiology and the emergency room.

"The construction will expand into the parking lot south of the hospital. A new parking lot will be built across the street between the Hospital Annex and Grace Fellowship Church.

"The new building will consist of 27 beds (with private showers) to replace the current 18 beds. Twenty-three will be private or semi-private and there will be four obstetrical rooms.

"It will also house a nurses station, medication room, tub room, nursery, two treatment rooms for minor procedures, an office for the director of nurses, and a separate hospital waiting room.

"There will also be a separate west side entry into the hospital, off of Main street. The clinic will remain in the same place and will have their same entry."

"The project is scheduled to begin in January," said Brown, "and it should be finished within the year."

## County appoints Bill Hardin to 9-1-1 advisory committee

Floyd County Judge Bill Hardin was reappointed to serve on the South Plains 9-1-1 Advisory Committee by unanimous vote of the members of the county commissioners court during a special called session on Tuesday, September 24. Hardin has completed an initial two year appointment and will serve three years under the terms of his reappointment.

Floyd County Sheriff's Deputy Charles Overstreet was appointed to serve as the alternate on the committee. The court chose him because he is the most

familiar with the 9-1-1 service being installed in the area and has worked diligently to coordinate the plan in Floyd County.

Judge Hardin estimates that the service will be tested in Floyd County during the month of October and go into operation soon after. The Floyd County 9-1-1 will also be answering the calls for Motley County. It is not known at this time if additional dispatchers must be hired to staff the service. Hardin has discussed with the Motley County judge the possibility of Motley County paying for a dispatcher if another must be hired.

### HELP FROM THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

The court approved an agreement with the attorney general's office which will benefit Floyd County monetarily. Under the terms of the recently passed House Bill 202, effective September 1, the attorney general's office will pay 66 percent of certain fees related to the filing and serving of papers in some child support cases.

The agreement approved will allow Floyd County to collect these payments on cases within the court system in Floyd County. Heretofore, the district clerk, courts and sheriff's office have handled the paper work involved in these cases with no reimbursement. District Clerk Barbara Edwards told the commissioners that the money collected would "amount to about \$100 per month, sometimes more, sometimes less."

### VOTING BOXES DISCUSSED

One of the final matters to be decided prior to the submission of a redistricting plan for Floyd County will be the location of voting boxes for future elections. The commissioners discussed the pos-

## Whirlwinds retain county crown

Floydada scored on four of its five first-half possessions and coasted to a 42-0 victory over the Lockney Longhorns on September 20. Lockney's Mitchell-Zimmerman Field was the site of the battle for bragging rights in one of the oldest, traditional rivalries in Texas schoolboy football. So complete was Floydada's domination that Lockney was unable to register a first down until well into the third quarter of play.

The Longhorns won the coin toss, deferred until the second half, and gave the visitors the choice of receiving the opening kickoff. It would be Lockney's only placement kick in the game.

Following Jeremy Rubio's 15-yard return of Patrick Monroe's kick, Floydada launched an explosive 11-play, 60-yard drive, which consumed more than six minutes of the opening period. Ruben Chavarria carried in from three yards out to open the scoring avalanche. Michael Gilliland's point-after attempt was perfect, and with 5:53 remaining in the first quarter, the "Winds were on their way."

It took even less time for Floydada to return to Lockney's end zone. The "Horns were unable to gain a first down in their initial possession, and sophomore Leo Vargas was called upon to kick his first of six punts. On first down from his own 33-yard line, senior quarterback Billy Villarreal appeared to be stopped for no gain. Using his quick feet - and even quicker moves - the "Wind field general broke away from a wall of would-be tacklers and raced untouched for 67 yards to paydirt. It was the longest rush from scrimmage by a Whirlwind in the 1991 campaign. Gilliland added the extra point, and the scoreboard read, "Floydada 14, Lockney 0."

The Longhorns gained only four net yards in their next offensive possession and Vargas punted back to Floydada. A 14-yard, Villarreal-to-Jaime Suarez aerial moved the "Winds deep into Longhorn territory as the first quarter came to a close.

Floydada continued to drive early in the second stanza, but the Longhorn defense stiffened. Outstanding plays by Carlos Raissez, Max Green, Jimmie Bradley and Andy Stapp led the charge to deny Floydada's advancement toward the Lockney goal line. The "Horns

took over on downs at their own 7-yard line, but were thwarted in their attempt to get any offense generated. Vargas had to punt again, and Floydada received excellent field position on the exchange.

Five plays and 35 yards later, the "Winds were again ringing Lockney's end zone bell. On first down from the Longhorn 3, Jammie Davis punched across the double stripe for his fourth rushing touchdown of the year. Gilliland converted to extend the Whirlwind lead to 21-0.

Due to a strong Floydada defensive surge, led by Adam "Boom-Boom" Gonzales, Todd Cage and Ruben Chavarria, three downs and a punt were the extent of Lockney's next drive. Following a Vargas punt, it only took Villarreal and company five plays to strike. A 10-yard pass to Jammie Davis moved the "Winds to the Lockney 20.

After firing a blank on first down, Villarreal once again went to the air, finding Jaime Suarez streaking toward the end zone on a left corner fade route. Suarez hauled in the arching aerial at the three and high-stepped across the double stripe for his first receiving touchdown of the season. Gilliland's conversion attempt was partially blocked, leaving the score at 27-0 - in favor of the Whirlwinds. Lockney had time for only two short gainers, deep in its own territory, as the halftime horn sounded.

An errant kick by Floydada opened the second half with a surprise for Lock-

I also talked to Riddley Gibson, who is the manager of the cable company that services Floydada and Plainview. He said that when they took MTV off that cable service, their response from the public was very favorable.

One of the families that voted in the Lockney survey expressed an opinion that removing MTV was censorship. I asked Gibson how he responded to that.

He said to ask people if they expect a merchant to carry every brand name that is made. A merchandiser picks from a wide variety of products to sell to the public. Just because he picks one and not the other, does not mean that he is censoring anything. Cable companies are not censoring MTV just because they don't buy the product and neither is the public censoring the cable companies.

People could still have the choice to have MTV in their living room, but the choice should be theirs!

Gibson also said that MTV sells advertising spots on their channel because they can claim to have a market coverage of 20 million people (a number just out of the hat). # Floydada Police Report

Floydada police received a report of harassing telephone calls to a resident in the 200 block of E. Hallie, Wednesday, September 18. The phone company was notified and a trap was placed on the phone. The investigation is continuing.

Also on Wednesday, at 2:30 a.m., Ramiro Reyna, 20, of Floydada Labor Camp, was arrested for DWI in the 600 block of E. Price, after he was observed driving through 2 stop signs and driving on the wrong side of the road.

Thursday, September 19, at 11:50 a.m., a mail carrier was attacked by a dog in the 500 block of W. California. The mailwoman was not bitten because she was able to repel the attack with chemical repellent. The dog retreated and the attacked again.

The repellent was used again and this time the dog retreated to his home. "The owner Gilbert Garza was charged with letting a dog run loose and his dog was also declared a dangerous dog," said Sgt. Snell, with the Floydada Police Department.

"Garza will now be required to register his dog with the city, keep the animal

locked in a pen and show proof of \$100,000 liability. He has 30 days to meet these requirements."

Friday, September 20, a theft was reported from a residence in the 100 block of E. Hallie. \$120.00 in cash was reported missing after several people visited the residence.

Saturday, September 21, at 1:00 p.m. a criminal mischief was observed at the junior high tennis courts. Three boys were seen throwing rocks and several lights were found broken. The youths were identified and the investigation is

WASHINGTON -- A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the development of the product called Food Source One, a project of National Dietary Research, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the formula which has since been improved with other natural colloids has been a windfall for some overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.

# Lockney hospital approves final blueprints

In a regular monthly board meeting, September 17, Lockney General

Hospital's board of directors approved final blue prints for the upcoming construction of improved patient rooms for

Lockney's hospital. The architect in charge of the project, Raymond D. Powell, was present for the

meeting to review the blue prints and discuss the construction. The project is due to begin in January.

Cost of the project was estimated at \$961,717.00 and will be built without any additional taxes or bond issues (see related story).

The board members also approved the first draft of the '92 fiscal year's operating budget. The public hearing for the budget was set for October 15, at 1:00 p.m., in the board room of Lockney's First National Bank.

Board members hired Carolyn Cooper, formerly of Slaton, as the new medical records director. She will be moving to Lockney from Boonesville, Arkansas. "She is an ART with 14 years of experience," said Hospital Administrator Jeff Reecer.

Reecer advised the board that within the next month Lockney General Hospital will be able to accept Medicaid applications, which are being coordinated by the Department of Human Services office in Amarillo.

Bids were opened for the cost of remodeling rooms in the clinic area for the new doctor, Dr. Kevin Stewart.

Jerry Wofford, Inc., was the low bidder at \$21,274. The cost will cover the remodeling of the rooms that formerly housed the medical records office and the insurance office. These rooms will be transformed into an office for Stewart and three more treatment rooms.

Reecer also told the board members that hospital employee, Marsha Harmon, had recently passed her State Boards to become an RN. The hospital paid for Harmon's school under their nursing education program. In this program, the hospital agrees to pay for the schooling in return for the nurse's promise to work at the hospital for a specified number of years.

## LISD meets to approve bids, policies

Lockney school board met for their regular monthly meeting September 19, at 9:00 p.m. to approve bids and new policies.

All principals were present to give enrollment reports and ethnic break-

downs of all campuses.

Appraisal dates were set for Lockney teachers, from October 1 - January 10, for the first semester appraisal; and January 14 - May 20 for the second semester appraisal.

All three principals were named for the first appraisal of their teachers and the outside firm of Galastic Analysis, will perform the second.

Lunchroom bids were opened and discussed by the board. Nine bids were submitted ranging in prices from 1/2% over cost to 20% over cost.

The companies of White Swan and Noble Crisco were the low bidders on the food products necessary to prepare lunches. Noble Crisco bid 3/4 of 1% over the cost and was approved on the majority of the bids. White Swan was lower on a few items and were approved for those.

The sick leave policy was updated by the board to meet state regulations and policy update #40 was also updated.

"We have to approve the policy manual every year," said Superintendent Dub Hallmark. "It is done to meet TEA regulations and new legislative mandates. It keeps us legal as a school district."

The board also approved the purchase of a new 47 passenger diesel engine bus, which should be delivered by May 1. The cost of the bus is estimated at \$32,000.

The board meeting adjourned at 10:30 p.m.

surface, how a nation with a population on the order of Harris County (Houston) could loom so large on the world scene, or why the American Congress would be so responsive to that country's demands. It is only when we look beneath the surface, at the outpouring of "contributions" to American Congressmen, both Democratic and Republican, that an explanation can be found. True, the American-Israeli lobby, or the Israel-American lobby, has concentrated its "giving" on the Democrats. But, in our view, that is simply because the Democrats are in control of Congress and probably will be for some years. If Republicans were in control, the "giving" would flow in that direction as well. It is not a matter of political philosophy. It is merely a matter of what is best for Israel, not America.

For those who care to better understand the Israeli approach to world affairs we refer them to the comments of Mr. Zalman Shover, the Israeli Ambassador to America in May of this year, when Israel announced it was going to "request" the additional \$10 Billion in loan "guarantees". At that time he was quoted as saying, "The world does owe Israel a debt, and owes the Jewish people a debt". He went on to say, "So,

we are going to approach the American government" for the \$10 Billion.

Whether the Israeli government really believes that nonsense, or whether it is merely a way to lay a guilt trip on the American people, or whether it is both, the argument seems to be effective with many in Congress.

We have argued before, in these columns, that America ought to adopt some sort of even-handed approach to problems in the Middle East, for our own interests. That we ought to establish our own policy, and reward those who repair to our standards. For too long it has been the other way around. We have tagged along, and paid for policies adopted by Israel, no matter the consequences.

Now we have a President who, whatever his other faults, appears to be concerned about America's interests on the world scene. For that he is called an anti-semitic liar by a responsible official of the Israeli government, with approving nods from various Congressmen and columnists.

We hope he draws a line in the sand and holds his ground. If he does the American people will be with him. There's too much at stake to continue business as usual.

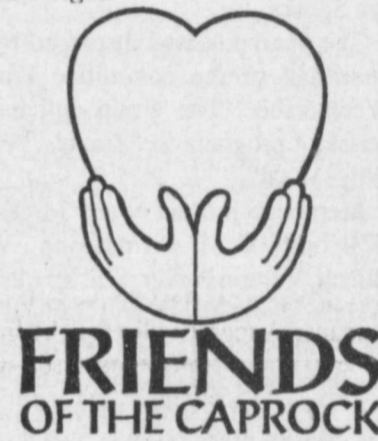
Funds collected in the drive will be used to pay for The Salvation Army's services to the underprivileged in Floydada through the current fiscal year.

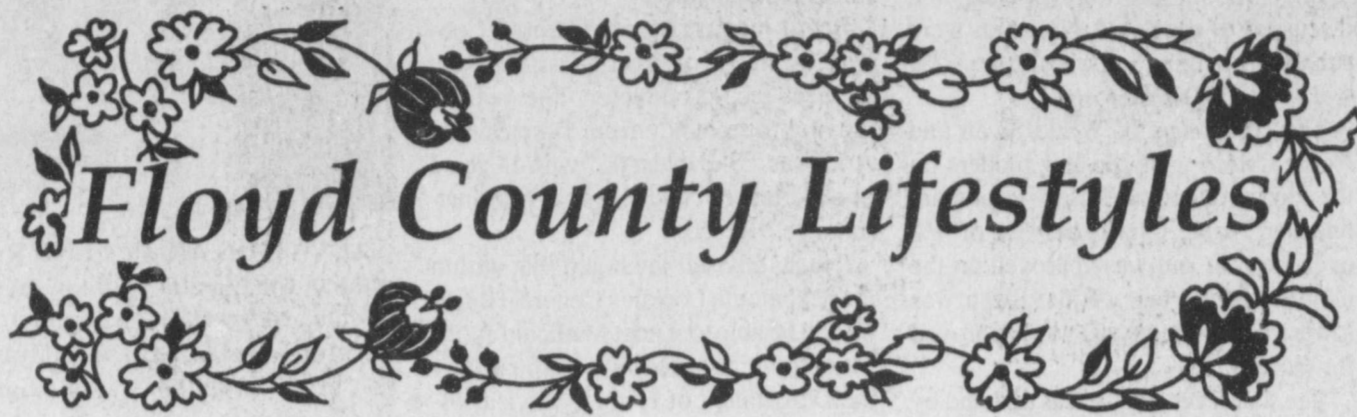
groom, sang "Cherish the Treasure" following the vows.

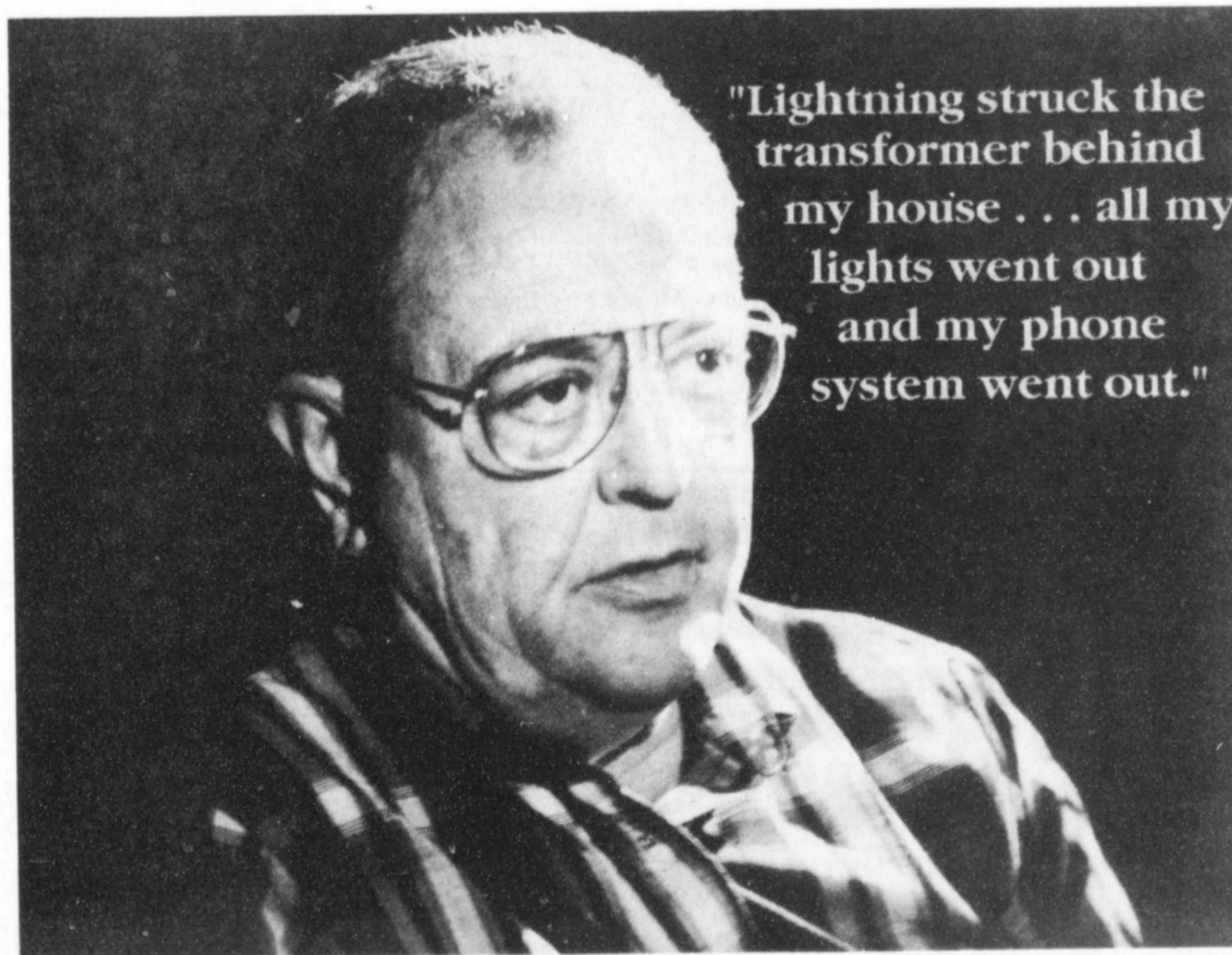

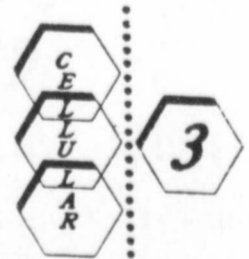

On first down the Whirlwind offensive line rolled out the red carpet for Ruben Chavarria, who took the handoff from Villarreal and rambled 24 yards for a first down at Lockney's 17-yard line. Four plays later Jammie Davis stormed into the end zone from 10 yards out and the 'Winds were on the board for the fifth time. Gilliland connected on the PAT to extend the Whirlwind margin to 34-0.

Lockney's brightest moment, in an otherwise dismal evening, came on the Longhorns' next possession. Floydada was flagged for off-sides on the kickoff and had to repeat the kick from the 35-yard line. Gilliland's next effort sailed to the Lockney 10, and was fielded by Juan Vargas who blazed for 30 yards on the return. Following a late-hit penalty assessed against the 'Winds, the Longhorns set up shop with the fall in Floydada territory for the first time at the 'Wind 44.

Phineas Riddley, Patrick Monroe and Juan Vargas accounted for most of Lockney's yardage in an 11-play, 39 yard drive, which produced the Longhorns' initial first down (with 8:26 remaining in the third quarter). Floydada's defense was determined to hold the Longhorns scoreless, and stalled Lockney's only scoring threat. The 'Winds took over on downs at their own 4-yard line.

Floydada's second unit backfield of Keith Teepie (QB), Kenneth Davis, Quincy Johnson and Tracey Johnson gained one first down on its next series, but Adam Gonzales had to punt for the first time in the shadows of his own goal line. Gonzales' punt was not cleanly fielded by the Longhorn return man. Scott Crader recovered the loose pigskin. Floydada had new life, to preserve the shutout, at the Lockney 41-yard line.

The final quarter opened with the 'Winds in possession at Lockney's 40. Floydada moved 28 yards in five plays, with Quincy Johnson, Tracey Johnson and Teepie carrying the load. Behind the crunching blocks of reserve linemen Rance Golightly and Ramiro Rios, "Q-Dog" Johnson sliced in for Floydada's final touchdown from 12 yards out. The point-after was indicative of how the majority of the breaks had gone Floydada's way since the opening coin flip.

A bad snap on the conversion attempt was deflected from holder Jaime Suarez back to kicker Michael Gilliland. Gilliland lateraled back to Suarez, who tossed a perfect pass to Jammie Davis in the end zone for the two-point conversion. Regardless of how the play developed, the scoreboard still read: Floydada 42, Lockney 0.

Lockney was unable to mount a drive and had to punt back to the 'Winds. The game ended after an exchange of possessions. In the waning moments, a number of new faces filled offensive and defensive slots for the 'Winds, including Gabino Suarez, Jason Pyle, Jonathan Simpson, Israel Medrano and several others up from the junior varsity.

Lockney finished its non-district schedule at 0-3. It will be a pair of Longhorns meeting when Lockney hosts Hart this week in the district opener for both clubs. Hart completed its 2-1 non-district slate with a 19-0 victory over Farwell last week.

The Whirlwinds hope to extend their

blemished 3-0 record when they travel to the always-tough, undefeated but once tied, Canyon Eagles at Canyon on Sept. 27.

### BILL'S NOTES

Entering the fourth week of the 1991 grid season, a lot of folks are asking, "Are the Whirlwinds for real?" Just how strong is this young team that had been projected no better than fourth best in the six-member District 2-3A? With its 20-member junior class, most "experts" figured the 'Winds to be "a year away."

District members selected over the 'Winds in the pre-season polls (and their records after three weeks of non-district action) are: 1. Tulia (1-2); 2. Littlefield (0-2-1); and 3. Dimmitt (1-2). Littlefield has a very good chance of remaining winless as the Wildcats tangle with a very good Denver City club this Friday.

The 3-0 Whirlwinds have scored 102 points in their three outings, while allowing a paltry 12 (and those were scored by Roosevelt late in the game long after the issue had been decided).

Granted, Floydada's opponents the past two weeks haven't been the caliber of clubs that have jumped on Tulia, Littlefield and Dimmitt (Childress, Abernathy, Snyder and Canyon). But, the 'Winds have had the opportunity to mature and develop in the one-sided victories.

I would like to make a few comments about Lockney. The 'Horns were out-manned Friday night, but they are even a younger team than Floydada - while having to learn an entirely new system. John Lowe is a solid coach, with good credentials and experience from top-rated programs. If the kids stand by him and develop as his program progresses, he will produce a winner at the Longhorn corral - you can count on it.

Lowe has a number of outstanding sophomores including Phineas Riddley, Patrick Monroe, Leo Vargas and Carlos Raissez. They may take their lumps during this initial year, but a year of Lowe's off-season conditioning will make a world of difference when next year's two-a-days get underway.

The Whirlwinds played near-flawless ball Friday night. Not enough can be said for the development of Floydada's front walls on both sides of the line. "Chucky" Rios and "Boom-Boom" Gonzales are quickly emerging as among the better defenders in the area. The entire defensive unit was superb and held Lockney to 26 net yards and no first downs in the first 24 minutes of play.

It is difficult to select a defensive play of the game, because there were so many. Perhaps the one that truly stands out was stopping the 'Horns on fourth down at the Whirlwind 4-yard line to preserve the shut-out.

Because of their overall defensive performances, I'll select Adam Gonzales and Ramiro Rios as the outstanding defenders.

The offensive play of the game has to be Villarreal's 67-yard TD romp, which was made possible by Billy's second and third effort (something we are all getting used to).

The offensive players of the game award has to go to "Boom-Boom and the Jolly Green Giants" - Floydada's offensive line - consisting of center Scott Crader, guards Gilliland and Cage and tackles Gonzales and Harris (the Tanks are in there someplace).

Nine different running backs accounted for 323 yards on 48 carries (almost 7-yards-per-pop average). A good portion of that real estate was made possible by the offensive line.

In my pre-season predictions, I forecast a loss this week at Canyon if for no other reason than the Eagles' ability to execute better on their "domed" home field. The way this Whirlwind team is playing right now, it will take more than just that unfriendly field to beat Floydada. It will be the 'Winds first real test - then maybe the question "are they for real?" will be answered.

I think they are for real, and Canyon will find out when the 'Winds top 'em 14-10.

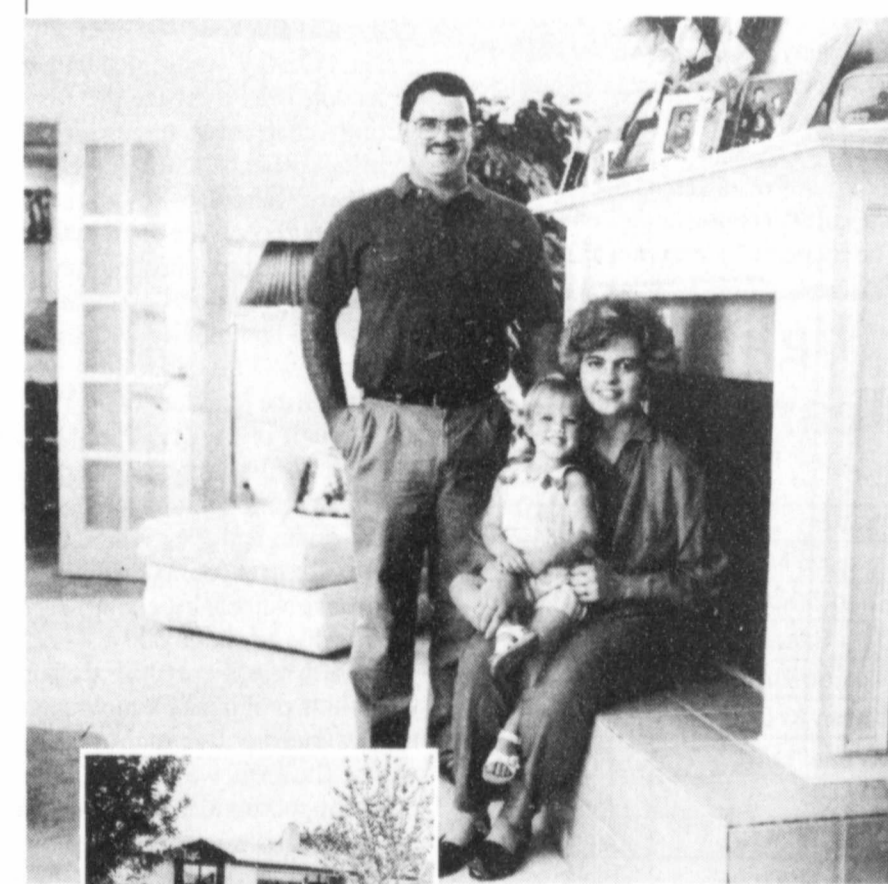
Our offensive line has a chance to be outstanding before the year ends and our backs are better balanced than in previous years. We are an aggressive football team and that is exciting to our coaching

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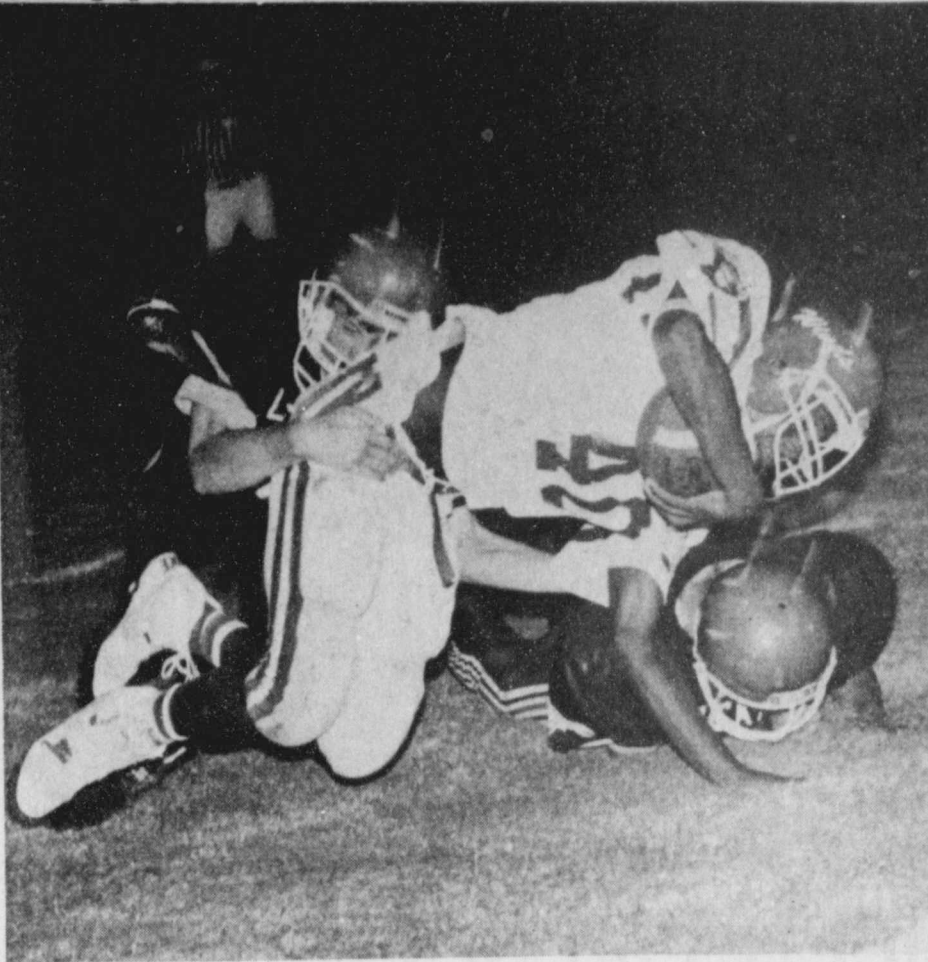

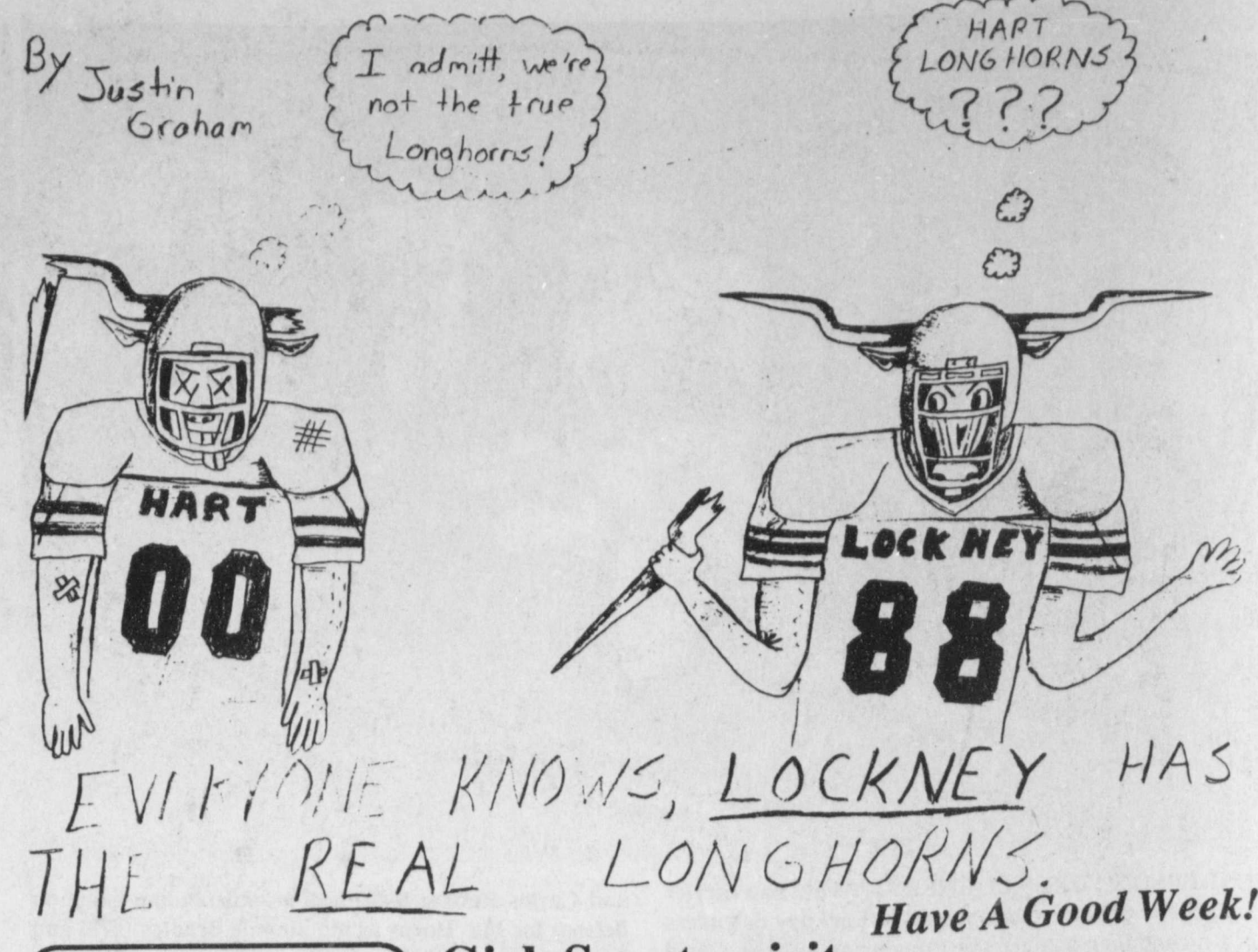

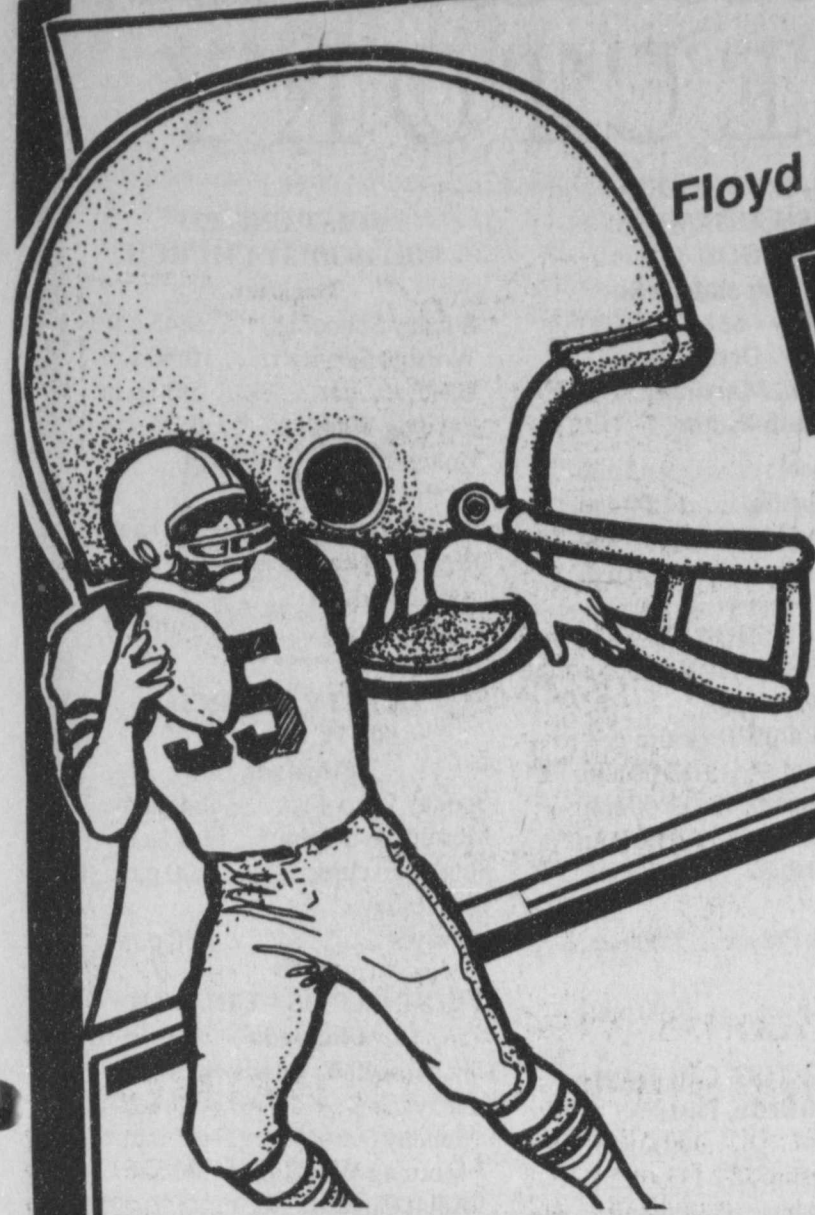
### Public Notice

On June 28, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to add a new optional service offering for business Private Branch Exchange (PBX) Trunk customers called Digital Loop Service. The application has been assigned Docket No. 10461.  
Digital Loop Service provides digital transmission of circuit switched voice and data communications between the customer's premises and the central office. This service allows the customer to use a 1.544 Mbps facility capable of delivering up to 24 line terminations. Southwestern Bell will provide Digital Loop Service within the customer's serving central office where facilities are available.  
If approved by the Commission, the rates for the Digital Loop Service facilities will be \$445 per month for each digital transmission loop arrangement which provides a capacity of up to 24 line terminations, plus \$5 per month for each line termination and \$9 per month for each channel termination. The proposed rate for the unlimited use of the central office varies from \$12.25 up to \$18.90 per month for each line termination depending on the rate group classification, determined by the customer's location. Southwestern Bell estimates revenue of \$2.1 million from this offering during the first year.  
As proposed by Southwestern Bell, customers who currently receive digital loop compatibility through facilities installed under a special construction agreement will have the option to receive their current digital loop arrangements pursuant to the Digital Loop Service Tariff or continue to pay their current charges until they make a change of location or account. Any increase in the number of line terminations to a customer's current digital transmission loop arrangement will be provided pursuant to the proposed Digital Loop Service Tariff; however, the customer will continue to have the option of paying current charges for the existing digital transmission loop capacity. Southwestern Bell's proposal to "grandfather" existing digital loop facility arrangements is subject to review and approval by the Commission.  
Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, but not later than October 15, 1991. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Blvd., Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. 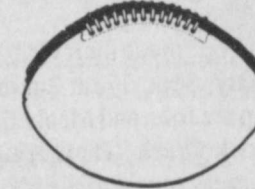
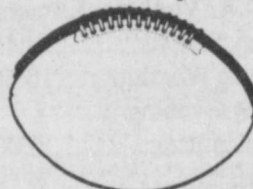

Jaynette Harrison portrays the part of M'Lynn Eatenton, the mother of Shelby Eatenton-Lacherie in "Steel Magnolias". Jaynette is a native Floydadan. She and her husband of 34 years, Max, have resided and farmed in the Lakeview community for 34 years as well. They have two daughters, Debbie Wilks of Lubbock and Tracy Harrison of Irving. Jaynette is employed by the Floydada Independent School District. For seven years she was secretary at A.B. Duncan Elementary School and for 13 years she has been secretary at Floydada High School.

Along with her secretarial duties at school, Jaynette has been the secretary at the Bible Baptist Church for the past 21 years. She also served as the treasurer

of the F.H.S. American Field Service chapter for 12 years and volunteered to be Girl Scout leader for 12 years.

Civic organizations have recognized Jaynette as the 1976 Outstanding Woman and the 1980 First Lady of the Year. Her hobbies include reading, going to church, travelling, eating out, and visiting family and friends.

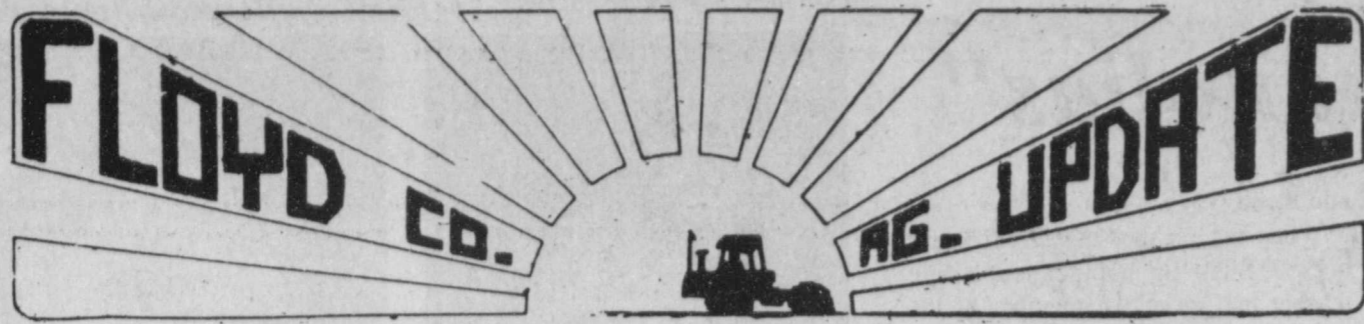

## Wildlife packets and windbreak trees now available from SWCD

The Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation District is now selling trees for the establishment of windbreaks around fields and farmsteads and wildlife packets adaptable to CRP acres to establish wildlife habitats. Windbreaks are relatively cheap to install and maintain. They provide for multiple-use benefits such as beautifying the countryside and/or farmstead, reduction of energy costs for heating and cooling buildings, reduction of soil blowing, and establishes livestock shelters. We encourage all CRP landowners who are incorporating wildlife habitats into CRP acreage to purchase a wildlife packet(s). A limited number of wildlife packets are available. They include quail and pheasant, turkey, deer, and squirrel. Each packet contains 4 species and 25 seedlings of each species (100 total seedlings).

Trees will be sold at a nominal price through the Texas Forest Service. The seedlings are grown at the West Texas Nursery in Lubbock and are adapted to this area. Two new species added this year are the American plum and

skunkbush sumac. Conifers available this year include the Afghanistan Pine (Bullet), Afghanistan Pine, Arizona Cypress, Arizona Cypress (Bullet), Austrian Pine, Ponderosa Pine, and Redcedar. Conifers will be sold for \$60.00 for 40 seedlings plus tax. Bullets will be sold for \$30.00 for 30 seedlings plus tax. We will accept a minimum order of 20 seedlings. Hardwoods available this year include American plum, Catalpa, Cottonwood cuttings, Desert willow, Green ash, Honeylocust, Little walnut, Osage orange, Pecan, Red oak, Russian olive, Sandcherry, and Skunkbush sumac. Hardwoods will be sold for \$35.00 for 100 seedlings plus tax. We will accept a minimum order of 25 seedlings per species.

Tree orders are now being taken at the Soil Conservation Service Office in Floydada. The SWCD Board will continue to sell tree seedlings upon their availability until March 5, 1992. All orders are filled on a first-come first-serve basis. Be sure to get your order in early to get the seedlings you desire

## Communities band together to pursue new jobs for area

Regional communities are aggressively pursuing new jobs for the Panhandle and the South Plains areas, reaching more than 18,000 manufacturing businesses last year, according to Jerry Hinnenkamp, chairman for Public Relations.

Twenty-four Panhandle communities are members of the High Ground of Texas, a marketing coalition founded in 1989.

"The purpose of the group is a cooperative effort of drawing new jobs to the territory," Hinnenkamp said.

"I see it as an excellent opportunity for communities to work together to accomplish something they can't do alone," said member Red McNatt, executive vice president of the Pampa Area Chamber of Commerce. "There is strength in numbers and it makes sense for us to pool our resources for mutual benefit."

The group promotes the area through direct mailouts of promotional pieces to companies nationwide. The mailouts explain the benefits of relocating to the Plains of the Southwest, Hinnenkamp said.

This year the High Ground has produced two mailouts to Los Angeles, one to New York/New Jersey, and is beginning one to Chicago, Hinnenkamp said.

He also said the coalition attends national trade shows with Southwestern Public Company, bringing a booth extolling the area to prospects. The High Ground publishes advertisements in national magazines, according to Hinnenkamp.

The High Ground has two goals, Hinnenkamp said. One of those is to be nationally competitive in attracting business and industry to the Panhandle and South Plains. The second is to produce training for community professionals and volunteers in dealing with prospects, he said.

"I've had a lot of training in economic development from Southwestern Public Service and from the interaction with other communities," said member Rick Osburn, assistant city manager in Leveland.

Currently the High Ground has 10 active projects, Hinnenkamp said. The participating communities will send proposals to these prospective businesses when they receive the companies' criteria for a relocation site. Three businesses identified through the High Ground have visited the area and at least one is still viable, he said.

"It's a low percentage process," Osburn said. "Eventually one will hit right for us and it will be great for everyone."

One by-product of the High Ground is that it has fostered regional cooperation, Hinnenkamp said. Previously, there was no contact between economic development people in the area but now with four meetings a year, the High Ground provides a regional network of support, he said.

"I have been very pleased with the cooperation of the members," said Grady Elder, the executive director of the Plainview/Hale County Industrial Foundation.

Sponsorship of 5 local groups allowed for the start-up of the High Ground of Texas, Hinnenkamp said. They are: Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, South Plains Community Action Corporation, South Plains Association of Governments, Lubbock-Garza Counties Private Industry Council, and Southwestern Public Service Company.

With its \$40,000 budget this year, the group is looking at becoming more financially independent from the original sponsorship "seed money," Hinnenkamp said. Membership registration for 1992 goes out in September, he said. The membership fee is \$500 per community per year.

## County insect situation update

The recent cool, wet weather has been less than desirable for our maturing cotton crop. However, this weather pattern will also hamper larval development of bollworms. I have heard of a few insecticide applications going out within the last 10 days; but as a general rule, pest problems are winding down for the 1991 growing season.

Last week, pheromone trap catches of bollworm moths were on the increase in both Crosby and Floyd Counties. Eggs can be detected in most fields. Worms can also be found, but most of these worms are located in the top portion of the crop that has little, if any, value. It

also appears that these worms are spending more time on a single fruiting form, and therefore, will not cause as much total damage.

Fall armyworms have been detected in many fields and are causing some fruit damage. The fall armyworm larva is dark in color, with a white, inverted-Y shape on its forehead. Cotton is not one of the preferred feeding hosts of the fall armyworm. However, this pest occasionally damages cotton. The fall armyworm typically does not damage as many fruiting forms in its life cycle as does the bollworm. Hopefully, the damage caused by these fall armyworms, this late in the year, will not be economic in nature.

Aphid numbers have decreased to very minimal numbers in all fields, I am checking, and I do not expect such low numbers to be capable of causing any problems with sticky lint. Producers need to continue checking fields on an individual basis for aphid pressure, as bolls begin opening.

The 1991 season has been a tough year for cotton producers, with considerable pest problems occurring in our area. Hopefully, we will have some mid- and late-winter cold snaps to help reduce overwintering pest populations.

Producers need to practice cultural control methods available to them to also help reduce overwintering pest populations. A good example of effective cultural control includes stalk destruction to reduce overwintering populations of southwestern corn borer. A single tandem disc cultivation or shredding will expose larvae to cold and dry winter conditions. Stalks can also be shredded low enough to the surface to remove the protective frass plug placed just below the girdled area of the stalk by the borer that is overwintering in the root crown. Stalk shredding is more compatible with grazing or minimum tillage operation than plowing. High larval mortality is obtained when plowing or shredding is performed before mid-January.

## Constant exposure to noise cause hearing loss

The full throated sound of machinery at work. The radio blaring so that it can be heard over the roar of a tractor's engine. Noise, noise, noise.

This scenario is only one of many farmers face on a daily basis. And, with this in mind, it is no wonder why research has shown that men who live in rural areas, including farmers, demonstrate a high rate of hearing loss from constant exposure to excessive noise on the job. In fact, findings indicate that noise induced hearing loss, which affects communication capabilities, is occurring in farmers as young as 20 years of age. Half of the males tested had some degree of communication handicap by age 50, and 25 percent had at least the beginning of a handicap by age 30.

The National Safety Council feels that more has to be done to make farmers aware of ways they can preserve their hearing and decrease their risk of injury.

The Council strongly recommends that all workers wear personal protective equipment. To a farmer this would include hearing protectors, which reduce noise levels by 20-30 decibels - enough to significantly lower the risk of hearing loss. Unfortunately, survey shows that less than 25 percent of rural workers (farmers) who reported a history of noise exposure also reported consistent use of hearing protectors.

Many farmers avoid wearing hearing protectors because they feel that they impair their ability to hear critical

sounds, such as warning cries. However the protectors are designed to muffle deafening sounds - not to cut out sounds completely.

While personal protective equipment is vital to every worker's safety, so too, is machinery that is in good working order. Systems that are properly maintained and replaced when new and improved models become available, such as cabs that reduce noise, will be safer, more efficient and certainly easier on the ears.

City roads may have ambulances and speeding automobiles, but country roads have their own hazards such as unmarked intersections and rural rail crossings.

No driver is an island unto himself. Rather he or she is a part of the traffic flow who must respond accordingly and abide by the rules of the road. It is very dangerous for any driver to engulf him/herself in music, radio talk shows, etc., to the point that they are not fully aware of what is going on around them. Whether driving a tractor, pickup truck or sports car always be an alert, responsible driver.

The council reminds all motorists, including farmers, that wearing headphones while driving on public roads is against the law in most states. Additionally, farmers who have tractor radios should keep the volume low enough to stay in touch with things going on around them and to preserve hearing.

## Crop needs gradual warming

"Rain, Rain go away; Come again another day."

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. (PCG) that's the best thing that could happen on the High Plains in the next several weeks.

According to PCG the crop needs a gradual warming trend and several weeks of warm weather. This will allow the bolls to finish maturing before first freeze.

Extension Cotton Specialist James Supak notes that the recent moisture has shown itself to be a mixed blessing for area producers. On the one hand they are glad to get the moisture, most of which is being readily taken into the soil profile, while on the other hand they can't help worrying what effects the cool temperatures of the last several days have had on their crop. So far the crop has exhibited the potential to make good yields despite the problems it has faced this year.

The USDA also retains high hopes for the High Plains crop. Opinions vary. However, almost everyone on the High Plains agrees that the USDA estimate of 3.325 million bales for the area is too high.

Most people feel that the combined effects of a late start and the heavy aphid infestations have not been fully recognized. The onset of cool weather conditions across the area, since the estimate was released September 12, has caused most aspirations of reaching the USDA estimate to dwindle.

"The aphid problem alone could have cost the area as much as 500,000 bales," says Supak. "For now we can only guess about the combined effect that a late

start, aphids and now unfavorable weather will have on the crop."

Supak explains that if warm weather returns to the area gradually, over the course of two or three days, the crop will have a chance to escape relatively unscathed. If the cool conditions remain for a few days then the crop could begin to age prematurely and eventually slow down the boll-fighting process.

One of the things that could happen as a result of an extended period of cool weather is that plant senescence will accelerate. If that happens, explains Supak, boll development will be at best slowed down if not halted altogether.

The uncertain position this year's crop is in makes cotton people on the High Plains continue to wonder about what is going to happen next. Weather and insects have so far teamed together to put a damper on some of the enthusiasm that existed earlier in the season.

"Our attention remains focused on the USDA estimate of the High Plains crop primarily because this area is the only major production region that remains unsure of the kind of crop it has," explains Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President.

"Practically every other major production region has already begun harvesting their crops or have a good idea of the crop's size, here on the High Plains we are still unsure of what this crop will do."

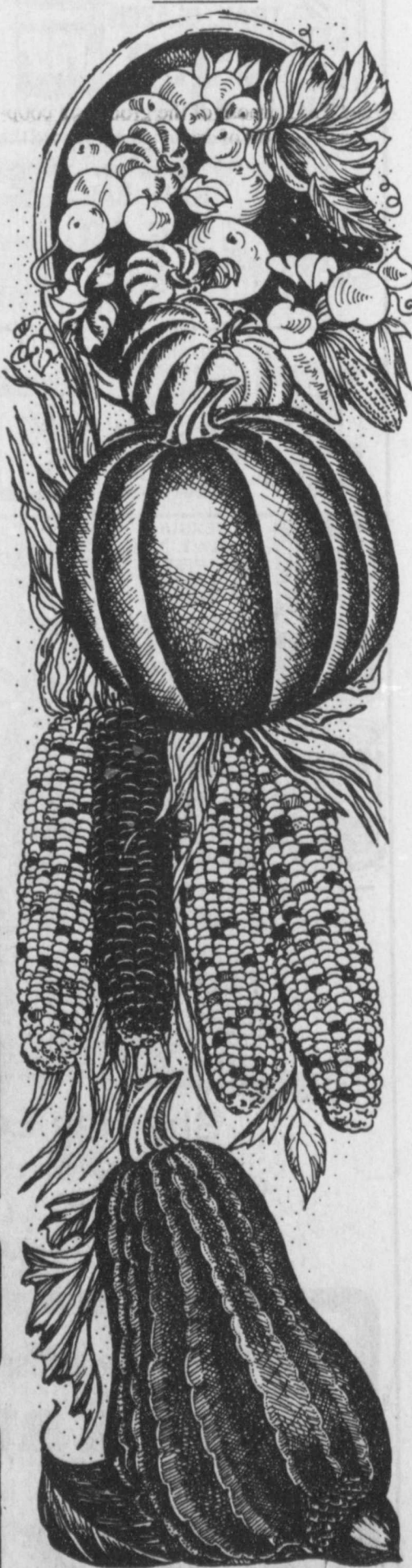
