Parker is known for his development

Memphis Belle crew led by Parker

(Editor's Note: Research for this article, by Texas Tech journalism student Tiffany Gentry, was made possible by a grant from the Reader's **Digest Foundation.**)

By Tiffany Gentry When U.S. Air Force Captain Vernon Parker took over the crew of the Memphis Belle, he had no idea he would pilot the World War II bomber during the filming of a major motion picture.

The movie, released shortly after Parker returned home from the war, was just one of the many highlights in his career in the United States Air Force.

His time served in World War II was filled with intense pressure and the constant battle to conquer life-threatening situations, mixed with a little excitement, travel and prestige.

Some events brought glory and victory - others brought sorrow.

Take W.L.C. Jones, Parker's roommate and close friend during one period in the war.

"He was shot down while flying a mission and taken prisoner by the Germans," Parker said. "He remained a POW until the end of the war."

"You didn't make too many friends in

the war," he said. "When one of them died, you were sorry you let yourself get so attached." When the war ended, Parker spent 20

years in the Air Force Reserves before retiring from the armed forces in 1963. At that time, Parker settled with his wife and two children in Floydada, where he opened a photography studio. He is retired today.

Parker's war days began long before his involvement with the Memphis Belle. Prior to commanding the Belle, the 25-year-old fighter pilot enlisted as a volunteer for Great Britain's Royal Air Force in 1940 and served there until the United States entered the war.

A member of the 121 American Eagle Squadron, he flew two types of fighter planes - hurricanes and spitfires.

When the U.S. entered the war in November of 1942, the Americans enlisted in the RAF were transferred to the U.S. Air Force. Most of the men, according to Parker, were given honorable discharges. But Parker had to stay.

"The U.S. didn't have any fighters at the time," Parker said. "The crews didn't have any combat experience, just ordinary training. So they kept me over there as a combat tactic instructor."

As an instructor stationed at the Dyersburg Air Force Base, Tennessee, Parker acted as a mentor, flying with first-time crews and handing down instructions.

Training as a pilot meant teaching perfect precision and how to make split second decisions while in the air.

"A pilot requires much more training than a gunner," Parker said of his important job. "You wanted the pilots to make it back from their missions with as little damage to the aircraft as possible."

Parker said the average plane endured only three to four missions. More startling was the fact that the average life span of a fighter pilot in the war was only 47 days.

"That means 85 percent of the RAF

fighters died," he said. "Only three of us survived out of my squadron."

On bomb raids, planes were in the air for nine and a half hours a day. "You had to learn to live with the fact that every minute your life was on the line," Parker said. "My longest mission was 11 hours."

Most of Parker's 25 missions were

If you own a Panasonic V.C.R. and it is stolen you may have to be able to identify it. Remember when they made that V.C.R. they probably made 10 million just like it. You are going to have to be able to show that particular Panasonic V.C.R. is yours. So please take the time to engrave, your drivers license number on your property, and record the serial numbers on valuable property especially guns. It is also helpful if you take photographs of jewelry and antiques. Their has always been a problem with items being stolen out of vehicles, especially purses. It is not unusual for this to happen in the middle of the day at the Post Office, school or the store. It is very rare that someone gains entry into a vehicle by force. If you must leave valuable items in your vehicle lock them in




her life and once qualified for the World Show in team roping.

daily publishers gnaw on a depression borne of an army of competitors and aging markets, their weekly peers revel in an optimism fed by growing number of readers who can't find the mix of very local news and ads anywhere else. Hard times may have slowed weekly publisher's cash flow but not their upbeat mood."

One publisher was quoted as saying, "More and more customers, overloaded with info-input will cleave to the easyto-read, keeps-me-up-to-date, relaxesme-as-it-informs-me weekly."

Little bits of trivia were scattered throughout the magazine. We found them very interesting.

Take Note Everybody!

"The average full-page open ad rate for the 76 Association of Alternative Newsweeklies papers; \$1,686, (ours is \$327.60); for NAB top metro dailies: \$2,629."

"There are about 7,550 weekly newspapers in the United States, each reaching an average of 8,405 readers for a total of 63.5 million (we figure we have between 8,000 and 9,000 readers). South Dakota leads the nation in per capita weeklies, with one per 5,458 people. Illinois has the most weeklies, 526; Texas is second with 430."

Some famous weekly newspaper owners are: Geraldo Rivera, Walter Cronkite, Oprah Winfrey, Michael Douglas, James "Scotty" Reston, Dan Quayle, and of course Ken Towery! (I added that last one).

Some of the original weekly titles listed were: Unterrified Democrat, from Linn, Missouri (they must be Republicans up there); Hungry Horse News, Columbia Falls, Montana; and Buffalo Reflex, from Buffalo, Missouri.

I said before that we did not get a survey to fill out, and I'm sure that none of the other publishers in this area got one either. The reason I know is because of this following tidbit found in the story:

"The average base salary for a publisher of a single weekly paper is \$39,630; multiple-weekly publishers average \$73,900; and entry-level reporter earns an average of \$15,000-\$16,000. Since 1987, circulation managers have been getting the heftiest raises."

That piece of information caused quite an uproar around here.



Mrs. Abney is a graduate of South


Lockney as the new pastor of the First Baptist Church. He and his family are moving from Lubbock.




The program was a display of projects by several 4-H'ers. Recreation was led by Rhanda Hickerson. Refreshments were served after the meeting was dismissed.



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

The Cargill Foundation again will sponsor \$1,000 scholarships for high school seniors from U.S. farm families, increasing the number from 200 to 250.

"The program has been so favorably accepted throughout the rural community that we decided to expand it this year. It's a good place to put Cargill Foundation money," said Barney Saunders, President of the Cargill Foundation.

The Cargill Scholarship Program for Rural America is open to all high school seniors who graduate next spring and come from families that derive at least half their income from farming. Candidates must enroll full-time next fall at an accredited two- or four-year college, university or vocational-technical school.

The program was established in 1986 to recognize and encourage the academic achievement, accomplishments and talents of rural youth. Thus far, the Cargill Foundation has made 1,000 awards for a total of \$1 million. Selection for the scholarships is handled by the National Future Farmers of America organization, although applicants need not be FFA members.

"The FFA has a long history of administering scholarship programs for many agriculturally based companies. In addition, because it is a national organization that is part of the educational program in many rural high schools, it is ideally suited to administer the program," said Gladys Tripp of Cargill Community Relations. The National FFA Foundation will manage the selection process, which is based on academic record, leadership, extracurricular accomplishments and financial need.





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Detecting Alzheimer's Disease is discussed

Alzheimer's disease, which produces a progressive decline in memory, thinking and behavior, affects more than two million Americans. While the exact cause of this disease remains unknown, medical scientists are working on a cure. Some 60 diseases mimic the symptoms of Alzheimer's. But according to Thomas Hutton, M.D., a neurologist on staff at Methodist Hospital, you should suspect Alzheimer's in a loved one if you notice one or more of the following warning signs:

- Difficulty finding the right word.
 Difficulty with abstract thinking.
- 3. Poor judgment.
- 4. Disorientation related to time and place.

5. Mood or behavioral changes.6. Personality changes.

These symptoms will begin to cause problems for the individual with Alzheimer's - both at home and at work. The person may lose his way en route to a familiar place, forget appointments or names of familiar people, or have problems with simple activities such as getting dressed.

Although exact diagnosis can be made only through analysis of brain tissue after death, an evaluation by a physician is recommended. A complete evaluation may include a thorough physical and neurological examination to rule out other disorders; a mental status test; psychiatric assessment; neuropsychological testing of language skills, attention and perception; and a battery of routine laboratory tests.

If Alzheimer's disease is suspected in a loved one, contact your family physician for an evaluation. Methodist Hospital offers physician referrals for those individuals who do not have a personal physician. The number for physician referrals is 793-4171 or 1-800-624-CARE.

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
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
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
