BRK has notified the Consumer Product Safety Commission undertaking the replacement program. Specific models affected by this program are 18391 , $1839 \mathrm{WI}-12,1839 \mathrm{WI}-$ 2839 TH . According to BRK, nearly all of the affected detectors were installed in new homes, apartments and mobile homes purchased in 1988, 1989 and 1990. The detectors do not contain batteries.
