## Lockney City Council hears audit report in regular meeting

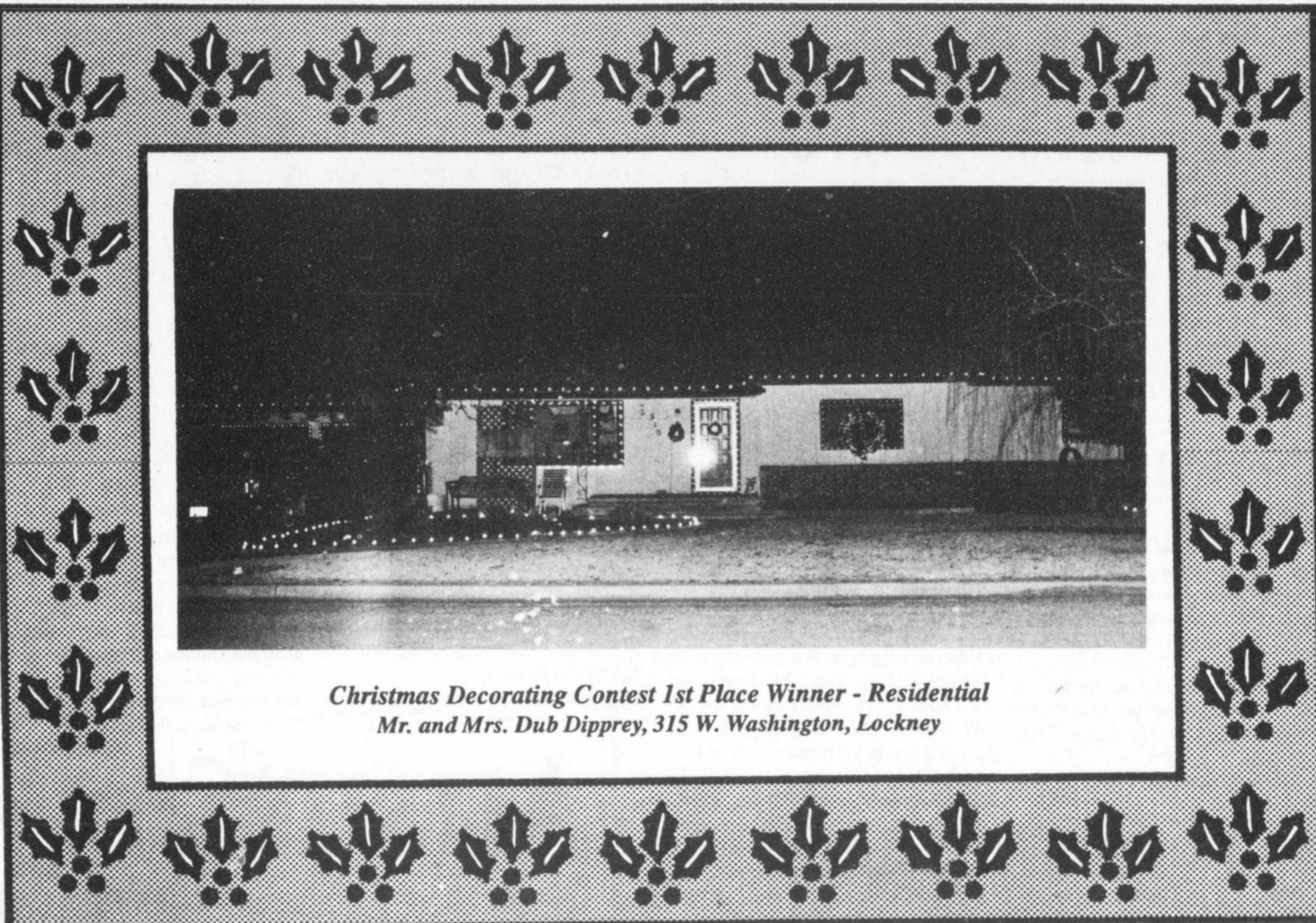
The Lockney City Council met at city hall Thursday, December 12 for their regular meeting.

Darla Chappell, representing Edd Henderson C.P.A.'s, presented the audit report for the six month period between April 1, 1991 and September 30, 1991. The council had changed the ending date for the city's year from March 30 to September 30 in order to have a clearer conception of items to be included in the budget. Those items include the payment of taxes to the city and the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority.

Alderman Copeland made a motion to authorize the City of Lockney to borrow money from the First National Bank in Lockney to begin monthly payments for a street sweeper. The payments will be made over a five year time period unless the council votes to pay off the loan before the five years are up. The motion was seconded by Alderman Fortenberry and all voted for.

Alderman Fortenberry made a motion that the council approve getting an access card from Consumers Fuel so that the fire department can get gasoline or diesel fuel for the fire trucks or ambulance after hours or on weekends. It was stipulated that Consumers put the print-out tape for the fuel with the cities bill each month. Alderman Copeland seconded the motion and all voted for.

The budget was amended to include an additional charge for the feeding of prisoners in the county jail; increase the amount spent on supplies for the ambulance and include the purchase price of a camcorder for the police department. The camcorder will be used to record evidence at the scene of robberies and wrecks.

## Accountant gives report to school board

The Floydada Independent School District Board of Trustees met briefly on Tuesday, December 17, to hear the accountant's report concerning the financial status of the district at the end of the 1990-91 school year. Representatives of Gary, Bowers and Company of Lubbock appeared before the gathered board members to present the report and answer questions concerning the information it contained.

Micky Henry and Steve Gary told the board that the school financial records were in good order and no problems were found during the audit. Among the items discussed was the bonded and installment indebtedness of the district and the delinquent taxes owed to the district.

Henry told the board that the bonded indebtedness is due to pay off in April of 1993 and that the payments on the air conditioning systems for the local campus buildings is due to pay off during the 1994-95 school year.

He also reported that delinquent taxes are down slightly from 1990. In 1990, the delinquent totals were \$31,500. That figure stood at \$30,400 at the time of this audit.

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## Emergency 9-1-1 service comes to Floyd and Motley Counties

Through the efforts of aggressive city and county governments a dream for additional community safety became a reality for the citizens of Floyd and Motley Counties Thursday, Dec. 19, with the installation of the enhanced 9-1-1 emergency system.

The cutover celebration, held Thursday at the Floyd County Courthouse,

marked the climax of many months of hard work and local community support to bring 9-1-1 service to Floyd and Motley Counties.

Local officials and citizens were on hand to help kick-off the emergency number ceremonies. The Floyd/Motley County 9-1-1 System is the 12th system in the South Plains Regional 9-1-1 Emergency Communications Plan, and one of many enhanced systems under the state 9-1-1 plan to be implemented with the minimum level of service of automatic number identification (ANI).

The push for 9-1-1 service for the area began in early 1987. County government officials were enthusiastic about the idea of a centralized emergency network and overwhelmingly voted to bring the service to these counties. The Floydada, Lockney, Matador and Roaring Springs City Councils and Floyd and Motley Counties Commissioners' Court entered an agreement in November, 1988 with the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) to implement the system county-wide.

Since that time city and county governments of Floyd and Motley Counties and SPAG have worked diligently with telephone companies and emergency agencies to make the 9-1-1 service a reality. Detailed engineering, records coordination and outside plant preparation has been on-going for the past 23 months.

The Floyd County Sheriff's Office is the primary public safety answering point (PSAP). Once the dispatcher determines the nature of the emergency, the call will be transferred or dispatched to the appropriate emergency response

agency.

One of the dramatic features of the 9-1-1 system includes the ability to lock onto an incoming 9-1-1 call by automatic number identification (ANI).

Truly a dual county effort, today's celebration featured a joint proclamation by the county judges and each mayor of participating cities, proclaiming, December 19, 1991 as "9-1-1 Day." Nine-one-one service will be available in cities, as well as rural, unincorporated areas within these counties which in-

cludes the Lockney (652), Floydada (983), Flomot (469), Matador (347), and Roaring Springs (348) telephone exchange boundaries. Anyone residing or visiting any of this area will have access to 9-1-1 service. Additionally, pay phone users will be able to make 9-1-1 calls at no charge.

With the installation of this system now complete, Floyd and Motley Counties residents are urged to "dial 9-1-1" for emergency assistance.

## Floydada council handles routine agenda

A routine agenda for the month of December was addressed by the Floydada City Council during a Tuesday evening session. The first item on the agenda was the presentation and the consideration of the annual audit for the fiscal year ended on September 30, 1991.

Edd Henderson Jr. of the accounting firm Edd Henderson, CPA, presented the report which ran in excess of thirty pages. After stating that the audit had found everything in order, he expressed the opinion, "The audit continues to show that you are managing your city well."

Henderson suggested that the council consider applying for a comprehensive annual financial report through a national association. He told the council that the report, which few cities can qualify for, presents a ten year compilation of all aspects of the financial and credit operations of the city and would be a distinction for the city as well as being an asset in bond considerations and grant applications.

No action was taken on the matter of the comprehensive financial report. Councilman Amado Morales moved that the audit report be tabled for the time being so that each council member could study it before being asked to vote to accept and approve it. Councilman Ruben Barrientoz seconded the motion and the council approved the motion by unanimous vote.

Council members opened bids submitted for the proposed purchase of two used pickups and an auto. Five bids were submitted on the pickups and two were

rejected for not meeting the specifications of the bid, which called for 1985 or later model vehicles and V-8 engines.

The remaining bids were discussed at length before being voted on. A split vote with Morales and Barrientoz against a purchase and Councilmen Wayne Tipton and Clar Schacht in favor, with Councilman Eric Cornelius abstaining, resulted in a tie breaking vote by Mayor Wayne Russell. Russell voted in favor of the purchase and the bid for one pickup was approved. The city will purchase a 1987 1/2 ton Silverado pickup with 33,283 miles on it for \$7,500.00. A second pickup was not selected.

Other bids considered were from John Dunlap (\$9,876.54 for a 1989 1/2 ton Chevrolet with 27,000 miles) and Floydada Ford (\$8935.00 for a 1990 Ford with 40,000 miles).

Two bids were received on the proposed purchase of a car to be used by the police department. One was rejected because it was on a new V-6 auto. The remaining bid, from City Auto for a 1987 Chevrolet Caprice with 44,700 miles at a cost of \$7,225.00, was rejected on a motion by Barrientoz with a second by Morales. The remainder of the voting council approved the motion unanimously.

The sale of a tax title lot located at 300 E. Georgia Street was approved. A bid of \$750.00 from Mrs. A. DeLeon was approved on a motion from Barrientoz, seconded by Tipton. She will have 60 days from the final approval by all taxing entities involved to begin making the improvements mandated by the conditions of the sale. The structure on

the property must be brought up to standard before being used as a residence.

The only other bid received by the taxing entities was from James Lovell. He bid \$500.00 for the property.

A motion by Schacht with a second by Cornelius, was approved by the council calling for the formation of a joint Floydada-Floyd County Airport Zoning Board. The motion also appointed Jerry Thompson and Mitch Probasco to serve as the city representatives on the board.

City manager Gary Brown reported to the council concerning several items the city continues to work on. An application for a paving grant from the Texas Department of Commerce administered through South Plains Area Governments is "not looking very promising." Brown stated that he had come away from a recent meeting with the feeling that anyone who had recently received a grant through the program would not receive a grant this year. Floydada was awarded a paving grant two years ago and a water improvements grant last year.

Brown also reported that design and specification work continues on the park grant and that the paperwork and negotiations for the landfill permit application are still in the working stages.

Brown told the council that advertised efforts to solicit public input prior to the upcoming franchise negotiations with the local Cable TV company had been unsuccessful. Anyone who wishes to advise the city of their comments concerning the service now being received is urged to contact the city manager

The dreaded walk was made searching for the bird through the tall grass. When Lennie found it, he held it up for Brandon to see and braced himself for any tears from the "little man."

Brandon looked at the pheasant and said, "Oh Daddy—Let's get another one!"

# Floydada Police Report

Floydada Police recently cleared up a two year old robbery case with the arrest of a suspect November 25, 1991. A man confessed to the January 1990 robbery of the Floydada Allsup's store and his case will be presented to Floyd County Grand Jurors. There have been no formal charges at this time.

City police were notified by the Texas Rangers on November 26, and told the Rangers had a forged check in their possession that was passed at the Floydada Pay-n-Save.

"The Rangers and a whole lot of police agencies are investigating a statewide forgery ring," said Police Chief James Hale. "The Rangers brought us the check and a picture of the suspect who was identified by a Pay-n-Save employee. The Rangers are looking for a group of men and women who travel all over the state and pass fake company checks from places such as J.C. Penney, Wal Mart, SAMS, and other well known companies. The checks look very authentic. There would be no reason for someone to believe it was not real."

According to Hale, the forgers made over \$500 in Floydada and \$600 in Crosby County. They travel from Houston across the state cashing checks in towns all along the way.

November 27, windows of two cars were shot out. Both cars were parked in the 500 block of S. 5th Street. The rear window of one vehicle was shot and the driver's window of another vehicle was shot out.

December 1, police took a report of a theft from a storage shed in the 700 block of W. Ross. The door of the shed was found kicked open. Stolen was a Snap On tool box and tool chest.

Police received a report December 3 of a sexual assault of a 14-year-old girl occurring on September 12. A 17-year-old man has been arrested and the case will be presented to Floyd County Grand Jurors.

Also on December 3, police investigated a forged check report at Floydada's First National Bank. The

same man who passed the check at FNB is also considered a suspect in a forgery at Pay-n-Save, November 19. The investigation is continuing.

Police investigated a robbery which occurred on December 8 in the 400 block of W. Lee. A woman complained to police that her ex-boyfriend entered her residence through a bedroom window, assaulted her and then stole \$70.00. Ricky Camacho, 27, of Floydada was arrested for the robbery and on a warrant for revocation of parole.

December 7, police investigated an accidental shooting which occurred in Floydada. Two men were treated at Lockney General Hospital the night of December 7 after being accidentally shot with a Ruger 22LR revolver. Harold Reeves was treated for a gunshot wound to the hand and was released. Lannie McMurrin received a wound in the thigh and was hospitalized.

December 13 police investigated another forged check report from Floydada's First National Bank. The suspect was identified and arrested on unrelated burglary charges. The forgery and burglary charges will be presented to the grand jurors.

Also on December 13, at 9:21 a.m., police received a report of three young men who had been fighting at the Floydada High School parking lot.

Charged with disorderly conduct were: Casey Criswell, 17; Jeffrey Chad Green, 17, and Robert Lee Green, 19. They were told to see the city judge to pay a fine.

December 14, at 4:59 p.m., police received a report from Perry Brothers of two juveniles shoplifting. \$40.00 in merchandise was stolen. The parents were contacted and the merchandise was returned.

Sometime between December 14 and December 16, a plow disk with a pheasant emblem cut from the center was stolen off the wall of a business in the 900 block of N. 2nd. The value of the loss was estimated at \$250.00.

## Renee Sanders inducted into honorary scholastic society

Renee Sanders, a Tarleton State University student from Floydada, was one of 40 students from the University inducted during the spring semester into the Texas Alpha Kappa Chapter of Alpha Chi, the national honorary scholastic society.

Ms. Sanders is a graduate of Floydada High School. An Accounting major at the University, she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D.R. Sanders.

Membership in Alpha Chi is limited to the top 10 percent, academically, of the junior and senior classes. To be eligible,

a student must have completed at least 30 credit hours at Tarleton and have at least a 3.61 grade point average.

The objectives of Alpha Chi are to promote and to recognize superior scholarship and those elements of character that make for effective service.

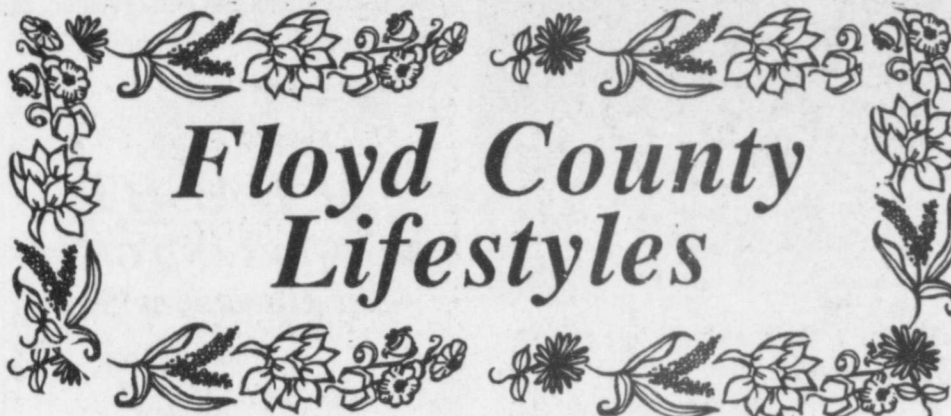

If Sonya could change FHS she would extend the lunch hour. When asked what she likes best about Floydada High School, she replied, "The teachers."

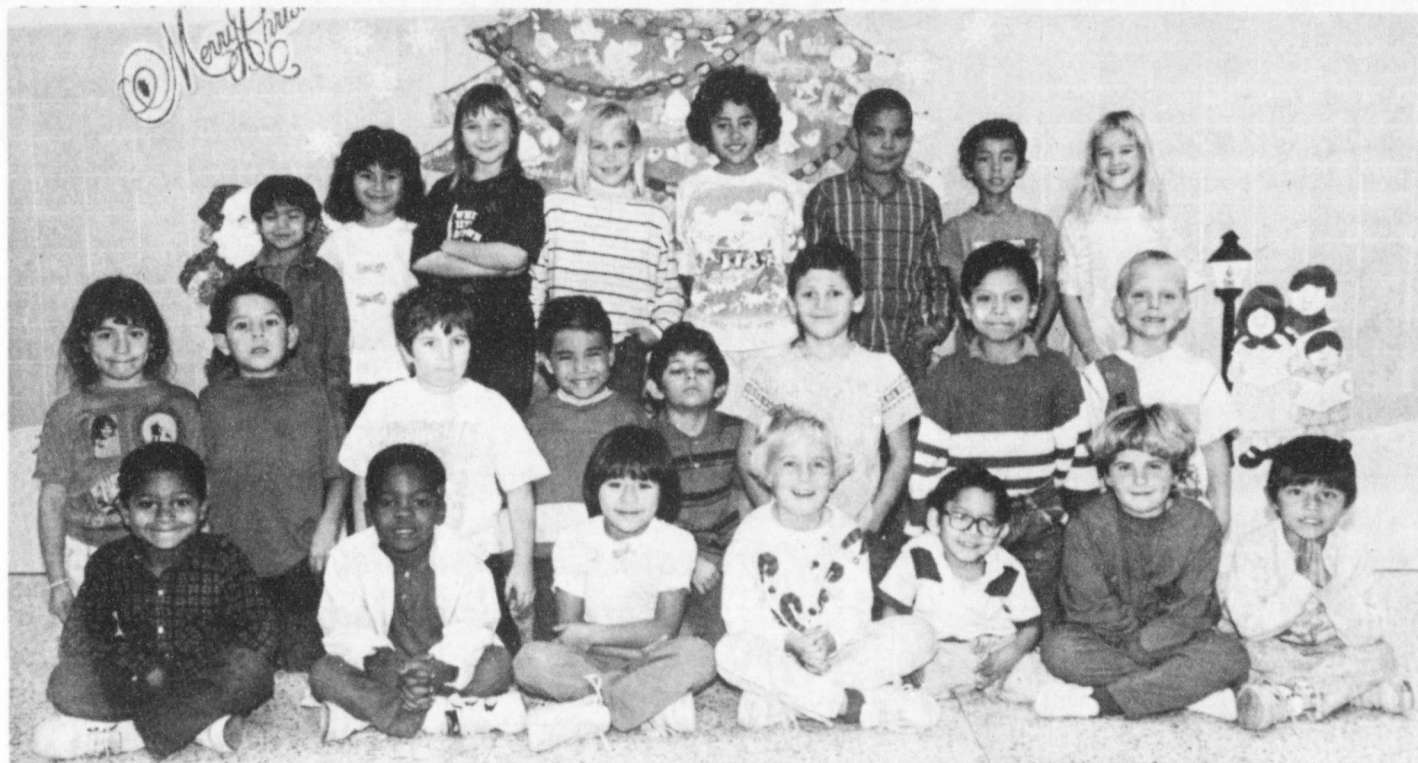

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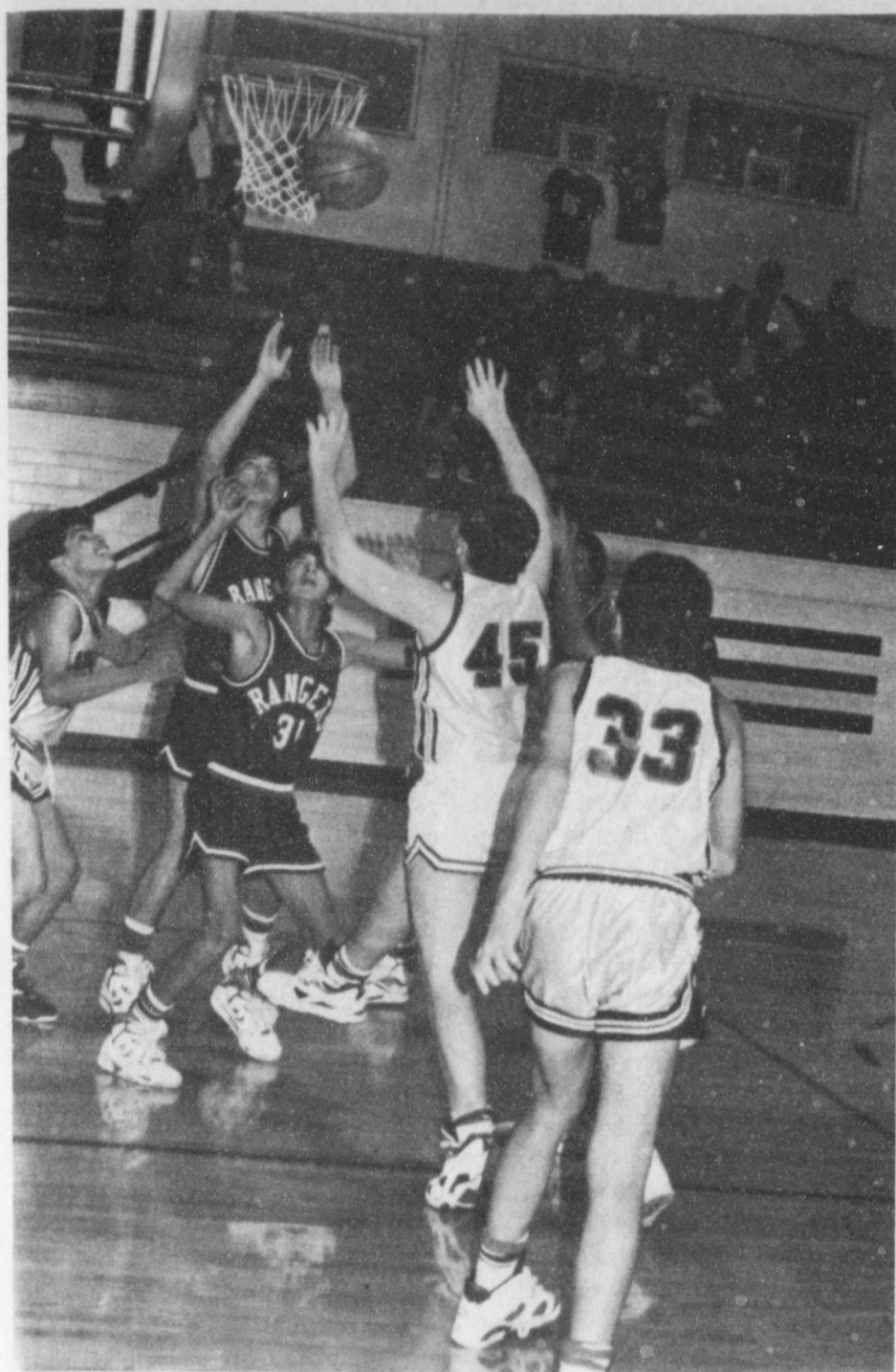

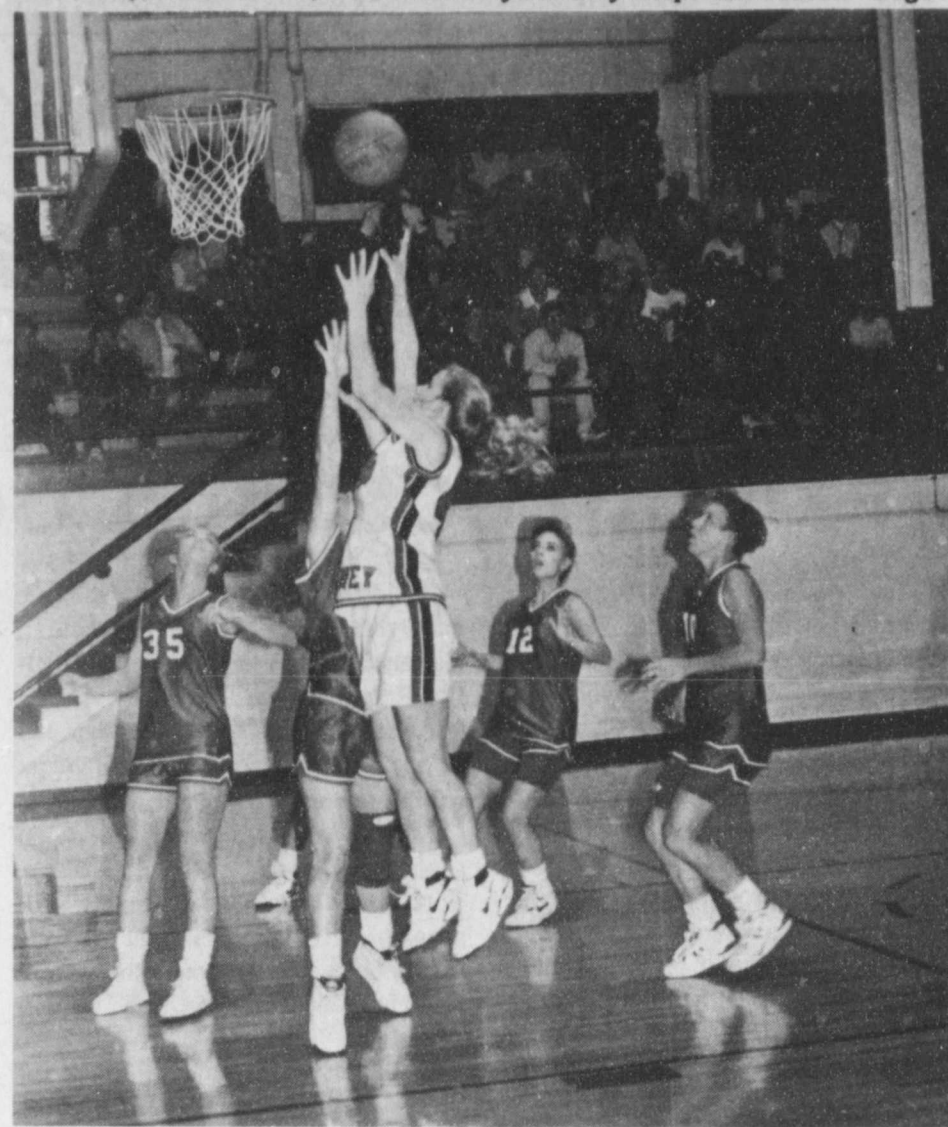

# HAPPY HOLIDAY to One And All

## Toy guns can cause real eye injuries

With Operation Desert Storm still vivid in our memories, this year's Christmas toy market is bristling with

fighting toys that may be dangerous to children's eyes.

Beware of holiday gifts that threaten children's eyes, advises the Lubbock Branch of the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness. Over the last year, statistics noted an alarming 180 percent increase in eye injuries due to toy guns.

Furthermore, this increase does not include injuries due to other gun types such as toy guns with projectiles, BB guns, pellet guns and other spring or gas operated guns, which would have increased the number of injuries significantly.

Not only the Gulf War, but the popularity of action/thriller movies such as "Ninja Turtles," "Robin Hood and "Terminator" contribute to an increase in toy weapons on store shelves. Toys that fire projectiles, have sharp edges or stick-like accessories can cause serious eye injuries or even the loss of an eye.

It is frightening that BB guns are near the top of the gift list for young boys. The leading BB gun manufacturer notes a 30% increase in sales for 1991. The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness-Lubbock Branch warns parents that BB guns pose a special threat to eyes and should not be considered toys.

Dr. Martin S. Cogen, a pediatric ophthalmologist in Birmingham, Alabama, cites a recent eye injury in which "the child I treated was shot with his own gun by a visiting cousin. The BB lodged behind his retina and resulted in the permanent loss of peripheral vision in

one eye. Even so, he is a lucky boy. He could easily have lost vision in that eye entirely."

The National Society to Prevent Blindness (NSPB) wants to help you avoid tragedy this holiday season. When shopping, do not rely solely on the "age labeling" from manufacturers. Keep in mind your child's physical development and personality when considering a toy of any kind.

Some toys, regardless of age labels, may require adult supervision. Consider potential situations that could endanger the child or younger siblings with access to the toys.

The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness-Lubbock Branch can help shoppers make good gift choices with a brochure on child eye safety called "Play It Safe!" It gives a safety check-list for your home and play areas to protect children from needless eye injuries, offers leading causes of eye injuries and how to protect your child's sight. **Perry announces federal funds for agriculture**

Commissioner Rick Perry announced that a congressional appropriations conference committee has agreed to provide some \$1.7 million in federal funds to assist Texas agriculture.

The money will go toward continuing a food safety program; managing the spread of the Imported Fire Ant; and repairing six export livestock pens operated by the Texas Department of Agriculture along the Texas-Mexico border.

House-Senate conferees included these funds in the federal agriculture appropriations bill for fiscal year 1992, which is expected to be approved by Congress next week and forwarded to the president for his signature.

"This is great news for Texas — for consumers and producers alike," said Perry, who has made capturing a greater share of the federal funds pie a major focus of his administration. "By this action, Texas taxpayers will receive a greater return on every dollar they send to Washington.

"Each of these programs not only has an impact on Texas agriculture, but on agriculture across the country," Perry said. "I applaud the leadership provided by members of the Texas congressional delegation and U.S. Reps. Jamie Whit-

ten (D-Miss.) and Joe Skeen (R-N.M.) in assisting TDA address some of the major issues facing our industry."

Under the conference committee report, the U.S. Department of Agriculture would receive funding for an ongoing nationwide food safety program. It is anticipated that TDA would receive an additional \$1 million from USDA for the state's participation in the effort.

Texas was one of six states chosen by USDA in March to collect data on pesticide residues that may be found on fresh fruits and vegetables. The data is to be used by the federal government to help determine the amount of pesticides farmers may use on various crops and what residue levels should be allowed on fresh foods.

In addition, USDA would be provided \$3.7 million for its Imported Fire Ant Program. This would include about \$270,000 to continue TDA's fire ant quarantine and inspection efforts, which Perry had urged the conference committee to approve.

Also with Perry's encouragement, conferees proposed \$400,000 to repair TDA's six livestock export pens. This would be the first time Texas received federal funds for the export pens —

located in Brownsville, Laredo, Eagle Pass, Del Rio, El Paso and Houston.

The pens are critical to the export of most livestock traded between the United States and Mexico. Since Jan. 1,

1991, the pens have handled more than 835,000 head of livestock valued at more than \$130 million. The repairs will include replacing roofs, fences and gates, as well as fixing plumbing and electrical systems.

low market prices and lower than expected marketings for the month of October. October marketings totaled only 1.926 million bales, a full 657,000 bales below the 2.583 million bales marketed during this time last year.

Early PCG projections put the final deficiency payment rate at somewhere between 8 and 10 cents. Based on new information a closer estimate of the final payment rate can be made. The unusual circumstances surrounding this year's crop have made the job of predicting how things will turn out a risky undertaking.

PCG now estimates that a final payment rate in the neighborhood of 8.5 to 9.5 cents is likely for this year's crop. This would mean that the final weighted average prices would have to end up somewhere between 63.4 and 64.4 cents per pound.

There seems to be an increasing number of producers who are opting to accept the Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP) in lieu of putting that cotton in the government loan program. The Adjusted World Price (AWP) remains at the 44.07 cent level for the new week ending December 19. More producers are expected to continue taking the LDP and putting their cotton on the market.

"As producers continue taking advantage of the LDP payments, marketings should pick up during the months of November and December as this cotton is placed on the market explains,"

Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President. "This increase in marketings, combined with the current low prices most producers are receiving for that cotton, will probably bring the weighted average price of cotton down to the level where an 8.5 to 9.5 cent deficiency payment is likely."

PCG also notes that the extreme circumstances surrounding this year's crop have made the majority of producers on the High Plains devoted students of the ins and outs of how the deficiency payment is calculated.

Calculation of the deficiency payment rate is based on a formula that calculates the weighted average farm price of cotton and subtracts that figure from the current 72.9 cent target price.

Several factors will have an impact on the final payment rate. One of them is the way the market reacts to the latest USDA estimate of cotton production for 1991. Partially recognizing the impact of the recent devastating weather conditions on the High Plains, USDA lowered its estimate for Texas by 500,000 bales. A significant portion of that decrease, 350,000 bales, is attributed to the High Plains. Crop watchers across the High Plains agree that the new 2.7 million bale estimate for the High Plains is still almost 500,000 bales too high.

Revised marketings and the cents per pound farm prices for January through July and preliminary numbers for August through October are included in the table below.

**Precautions ensure that venison has right taste**

With deer-hunting season in full swing, and Christmas just around the corner venison will no doubt be the main course on many a Texas table.

"Properly prepared it's hard to beat," said Dr. Dale Rollins, wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in San Angelo. "But woe be unto the hunter serving poorly handled venison on Christmas. It can turn the most open-minded consumer away forever."

This unhappy outcome can easily be avoided with a few simple precautions, Rollins said. Aside from the dire social and gastronomical consequences stemming from consuming spoiled meat, it's state law that game taken be maintained in an edible condition.

"A lot of us learned the hard way that it's best to take a little extra time immediately after the harvest to ensure a top-notch product on the table."

Rollins offers these tips to hunters striving to serve the finest fare to their holiday guests:

\* "Field dress your deer immediately if possible. If you want to age the meat or otherwise leave the carcass intact, leave the hide on to prevent drying of the meat's outer surface.

\* "To increase the tenderness and flavor of the meat, age the carcass in cold storage a little above freezing for four to six days. If you're going to process the animal in the field, remove the hide soon after field dressing. If the weather is warm, remove the backstraps and quarter the carcass and place in an ice chest.

Extension Service county offices have pamphlets available on processing and preparing venison and other game, Rollins said.

"A little care in processing and preparing venison will leave a good taste in everybody's mouth."
