WITH THE CHRISTMAS shopping season upon us, it once again gives us the chance to recommend that people do as much of their shopping as possible right here in Friona.

We have "preached" on this subject so often in this column that our readers probably would rather hear their real preacher expound on the subject of "giving" than hear it again, but here's a new twist:

We have borrowed the following editorial from our friend Wendell Tooley of the Tulia Herald. Maybe Wendell has come up with an idea yours truly has missed in the past...anyway, whatever is true for Tulia has to be just as right for Friona.

The editorial was entitled: "THE GIFT THAT SEVEN ENJOY": How's that again?...share your

Christmas dollar with seven others! That's right, and here's how it works. A dollar spent in this community often turns over seven times.

That means this Christmas when you spend a dollar in this community, it may not only bring happiness to the person who receives your Christmas gift, but creates some happiness for possibly seven other persons or business firms in this community.

So...starting with your hometown merchant (who most certainly appreciates and merits your business) you can make a lot of people happy this Christmas.

The Star suggests you consider your hometown business firm when you Christmas shop this year.

Very often, the tendency is to bypass the local businesses in favor of out-of-town purchases with the excuse that "we can't find what we want in our town" or "we can get it cheaper somewhere else."

First, we think shoppers should make certain the local merchants don't have a particular item before they go out of town and, secondly that they carefully consider the extra cost of going out of town before they use the old excuse about getting it cheaper elsewhere.

There's a lot to be said about the convenience and ease of shopping in your hometown...avoid all the parking problems...the big crowd problems...the stress of taking something back that isn't right after Christmas.

Most important of all is the simple fact that our merchants hold our economic base together...they pay taxes that keep our schools, city, county, hospital in service to our people. They buy the advertising in school annuals, all sorts of school promotions...they support all the civic organization projects, the 4-H and FFA...they give to the United Fund. How many of the big out-oftown merchants contribute to these local organizations?

And one last shop-at-home reminder...when you spend money in the big city you just help it grow larger...while helping your hometown grow smaller.

Pictures, Santa Set Saturday

Santa Claus will make his first official visit of the season to Friona on Saturday, December 3, from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. at the Chamber of Commerce Office, 621 Main Street.

At this time, mothers can have their children's pictures made with Santa. The cost will be \$3.00 for one picture or two pictures for \$5.00. The photos will be 5x31/2 inches, and will

be in color. Money raised from the project will go to support the Community Christmas Service. The Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the appearance of Santa Claus Saturday.

Pheasant Season Begins Dec. 10

The 1983 pheasant season will kick off next Saturday morning, December 10.

Once again, the season will be two weeks in duration, spanning three weekends. Final day of the season will be Sunday, December 25.

The bag limit will remain the same as in years past: two cocks per day and four in possession. Only the cock pheasants are legal game.

A good hunting season is anticipated. Jack Patterson, spokesman for the pheasant season, said he had seen a good number of pheasants in the Rhea community. Reports from other parts of the area have also been encouraging.

A large influx of hunters is expected for the opening weekend of the season next weekend.

A contest for the hunter turning in the longest tailfeather will be held sponsored by the Parmer County Game Management Association. Details on where to turn in the feather entries will be announced next week.

Texas followed the lead of its neighboring state, New Mexico, with the passage of House Bill 1421, which authorized the formation of Operation Game Thief. Concerned citizens may call a 24-hour toll-free number, 1-800-792-GAME, to report flagrant violations of Texas' wildlife and fish laws.

Since implementing its game thief

program in 1976, New Mexico has collected over \$79,000 in fines and paid almost \$40,000 in rewards.

Trespassing laws have been stiffened with HB 717 upping criminal trespassing from a Class C to a Class B misdemeanor. In addition, if the offender carries a deadly weapon, he can be charged with a Class A misdemeanor.

Notice has to be present before a person can commit criminal trespassing. Notice is given in three ways: (1) Oral or written communication by owner of property; (2) Presence of fencing to exclude intruders or contain livestock, or (3) Sign posted on property indicating entry is forbidden.

Under the Texas penal code, a Class C misdemeanor carries a maximum \$200 fine. However, treaspassers convicted under the new law, under a Class B misdemeanor, will face a possible \$1,000 fine and/or 180 days in jail.

If the offender carries a deadly weapon, and most hunters do, the Class A misdemeanor can cost up to \$2,000 in fines and up to a year in

Nine Chiefs All-District

Nine members of the Friona Chieftain football team were named to the all-district teams announced this week by District 2-AAA coaches.

The Chieftains landed three spots on the first team offense, two on first team defense and two each on the second teams all-district. In addition, seven other Chieftains gained "honorable mention" status, which meant they received at least two votes in the all-district selection process.

Charlie Morgan made it two years in a row, and was a unanimous choice to the first team offense. Other FHS players on that 11-man team were wide receiver Eloy Caballero and lineman Tim Kirk.

Morgan joined Littlefield's stellar junior runningback Steve Green, also a unanimous choice, and Muleshoe's Trent Hysinger in the District 2-AAA "dream backfield."

Caballero was also named to the first team defense at a safety position, along with linebacker Reese Fleming. Caballero should have been the leading pass interceptor in the district, with 11 for the season and at least one in each district game.

Reese Fleming, who had the leading average for his team in "yards per carry," was named to the second team offense, and teammate Mitch Reeve landed a spot on the unit as a lineman.

Postmaster Wells said that Bass had earned the award from a number of standpoints.

"He has not had a vehicle accident nor personal injury since becoming employed by the Postal Service in April of 1980. He performs his duties in a professional manner, yet takes time to help those who are less fortunate than he," Wells said.


Burial was in West Park Cemetery in Hereford.

This compared with net earnings of \$1.2 million, or 58 cents per share, on sales of \$62 million for the same quarter ended September 30, 1982.



## Dennis Anthony On GSPA Board

In its regular bi-monthly meeting in Amarillo on November 9, Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board installed four new directors. They will serve six-year terms on the board which administers the programs of the sorghum check off established in the Texas High Plains by a referendum of sorghum producers in 1969. Directors are elected by the producers who are affected by the sorghum check off.

New directors are: George Reeves of Dalhart, Jack Cobb of Plains, Delbert Watson of Muleshoe and Weldon Shelton of Lamesa.

Following the installation of new directors, the board elected officers. Albert Scheele of Lockney is the board's new chairman. Scheele previously served as vice chairman. The new vice chairman is Jim Dowty of Dumas. Dennis Anthony of Friona was elected secretary-treasurer. These officers were elected to two year terms. Other members of the twelveman board are: Jack Crowl of Morse. Bob Gillispie of Gruver, Loyall Turner of Spearman, Ralph Mabry of Lubbock and K.B. Parish of Springlake.

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board (TGSPB) conducts and directs grain sorghum promotion through market development, research and education. Its greatest efforts are directed toward establishing and improving markets for Texas sorghum. The work is financed by a refundable assessment of five cents per ton of sorghum deducted at the time of first sale.

Commodity checkoff programs are vital to establishing and maintaining world markets for U.S. feed grains. They provide funding for U.S. Feed Grains Council, a non-profit corporation which expands export markets for U.S. feed grains through a network of fourteen offices with programs in 50 countries of Latin America, Europe, the Middle East, Africa and Asia.

Council activities promote the sale of and demand for U.S. feed grains through technical information and assistance programs. Farmers in the United States depend upon the Council to promote the sale of corn and grain sorghum in world markets. This work is financed jointly by producers and agri-business with twothirds of the funding from producer checkoff programs.

There are statewide sorghum checkoff programs in Kansas and Nebraska. Corn producers have established statewide checkoffs in Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Wisconsin, Virginia and North Carolina.







Navy Machinist's Mate Fireman Kenneth M. Walter, son of Betty M. Walter of Friona, recently departed on a deployment to the Mediterranean.


He was a crew member aboard the frigate USS W.S. Sims, homeported in Mayport, Florida.
