

Floyd County faces change in the year 1991

Residents of Floyd County will probably remember the year 1991 with mixed emotions. It was a year with many changes, some good and some

The Gulf War ended quickly and Floyd County soldiers came home to thankful families and a patriotic spirit among their neighbors.

Despair was evident among many Floydada citizens when news of the temporary closure of Caprock Hospital was announced. This was followed quickly by the loss of the only local doctors in Floydada.

Citizens, hospital board members and Administrator Terry Keltz quickly



united and began the difficult process of putting the hospital back on its feet and recruiting new doctors to the area.

At the end of 1991, Keltz and board members are extremely optimistic about the upcoming year.

Without a hospital to run the ambulance service a citizens group was quickly formed to oversee Floydada EMS. The EMS is now looking forward to a successful 1992 with volunteers waiting for training and a new director, Ted Porter.

While the Floydada hospital was groping with debt, Lockney's General Hospital, in September, announced their plans for expansion. The expansion will be paid with cash reserves that Lockney General had been placing aside for this purpose. No new taxes will be levied for this purpose.

Lockney General welcomed a new medical doctor, Dr. Kevin Stewart, to their staff, and Floydada welcomed a new chiropractor, Dr. David Martin.

Farmers across the county will remember '91 with mixed emotions. The late rains, high winds and the early freeze diminished cotton turnout in Floyd County and across the plains. December rains brought stripping and ginning to a halt, but helped the '92

The bountiful '90 cotton crop helped bring Floyd County bank deposits up by almost 12 million dollars in February.

Floydada and Lockney city councils oined together in their battle with garbage. Because of costs and new EPA regulations, Lockney was forced to close their landfill in January. Because of the cost and inconvenience of Lockney residents using the Plainview landfill, the two Floyd County cities joined together in an effort to keep the Floydada landfill open.

High winds and tornadoes wrecked havoc across the county in June. Although large barns and power lines were toppled no injuries were reported from the storm. The wind also ripped off the roof of the newly closed Cogdell Clinic

and drenching rains flooded the inside. The August beating and robbery of an 86-year old Lockney woman, Mary Hutton, shocked the community. The subsequent closure of her store left a hole in the Lockney community which was partially filled by the opening of four new businesses.

The county map took on a new face with the redistricting lines drawn up and accepted by Floyd County Commissioners in September.

The county newspaper also took on a new face with the combining of The Floyd County Hesperian and The Lockney Beacon in March. The new county wide publication, The Floyd County Hesperian-Beacon, ended the era of two separate publications in the county.

A breakdown of the county's headline news in 1991 is as follows:

JANUARY

the ground and all the families possessions were lost. The house was located seven miles southwest of Floydada.

Nine officials elected in the November General Election were sworn into office. They included County Judge Bill Hardin, Justice of the Peace for Precinct 1&4, Lowell Bilbrey; Commissioner, Precinct 4 Howard Bishop; District Clerk Barbara Edwards; County Clerk Margaret Collier; Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2&3 Dottie Stansell; County Treasurer Glenna Orman: Commissioner Precinct 2 Floyd Jackson; and 110th District Judge Randy Hollums.

Leroy Schaffner, administrator of the Caprock Hospital, accepted a position with a hospital in Seymour. He had served through some turbulent times at Caprock Hospital in Floydada. He came to work in Floydada in 1984 as the lab director and was named administrator in

The Lockney landfill was ordered closed by the middle of January after the Lockney City Council met with Linda Wyatt, head of the Lubbock office of the Texas Department of Health.

She explained the rules for closing a landfill and told the council that if the landfill was closed before the E.P.A. regulations came into effect they would be exempt from the closing rules. Wyatt told the council all they would have to do would be to cover the pits, level the area, make sure no trash was sticking through and seed the area. The council voted to do so.

Ron Comer of Triple C Waste Disposal told the council he would continue to haul the container trash to Plainview.

Members of the Lockney council in January were Mayor Dan Smith and Aldermen J.D. Copeland, Gary Marr, Jim Doucette, Kenneth Wofford and Sam Fortenberry.

Lockney Mayor Dan Smith announced that he and his family were moving to their farm and he would not be a candidate in the upcoming election.

Just when it appeared that there was light at the end of the tunnel, the controversy between District Attorney Becky McPherson and the outgoing District Judge David Cave was once again clouded. The State Attorney General's office withdrew a ruling they had previously made stating "A district judge has no authority to appoint a 'special auditor' to conduct a limited inquiry; his authority is limited to the appointment of a regular county auditor." The opinion further stated, "Since the appointment of the auditor was void, and the commissioners court had no part in his appointment, we know of no legal basis to assess any charges against the county for services performed by the auditor." McPherson had asked for the ruling when the controversy arose between Cave and McPherson concerning the Judge's authority to order an audit of the District Attorney's books, and his impartiality in the matter.

The Attorney General's office stated they withdrew the opinion because the case was currently in litigation. Judge

McCoy, who was appointed to oversee the audit controversy has still not made a ruling.

Cave had ordered the audit because he believed double billing from McPherson's office had occurred.

Lockney Mayor Dan Smith met with the Floydada City Council to ask the city to consider letting the residents of Lockney use the Floydada landfill as a place to deposit garbage. The trash in Lockney is currently picked up by Triple C Trash Collectors and hauled to Plainview. The Lockney council told the Floydada Council that they had rather pay Floydada than Plainview for a place to dump their trash. The Floydada City Council agreed to this.

Terry Jones was appointed Postmaster of the Lockney Post Office after Doug Meriwether retired. Jones and his family came to Lockney from LeFors.

Mary Montandon retired after 26 as postmaster of the Aiken post office. Billy Hamlin was named Officer in Charge of the Aiken post office.

The Lockney Rotary Club joined with other Rotarians in the district in a successful attempt to stock a health clinic in a remote area of Chihuahua. The local Rotary Club, with the help of the Lockney Hospital, sent six hospital beds to

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





The City of Lockney has set their 1991 ad valorem tax rate at 38 cents per \$100 valuation.

Lockney ISD enrollment is up by 6 students over the number enrolled last year. As of September 9 the enrollment stood at 812 students.

Early enrollment figures showed Floydada schools down by 60 students. The 1990 figure stood at 1264 and the 1991 enrollment stands at 1204.

With this money and money from the Martha Ann Cogdell Trust Foundation ground will be broken in January on a new building estimated at \$961,717.00. 



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
